Wimbledon underway for juniors



The time of year has arrived for the juniors to put away their clay court shoes and head for the lawns of Wimbledon. For most juniors, grass is an unknown quantity and many experience their first taste of grass on the hallowed turf of the All England Club.



The winner of the tournament is often the player who learns to adapt their game quicker. Many Wimbledon junior champions have gone on to repeat their success on the professional level by winning the Wimbledon crown - Bjorn Borg, Pat Cash, Stefan Edberg and Martina Hingis, to name a few.

Already, there has been a shock in the boys' field with the exit of top seed Yeu-Tzuoo Wang. The Chinese Taipei teenager lost to Dutch player Michel Koning in the first round of the boys' singles.

One of the remaining favourites for the 2002 trophy is Argentinean Brian Dabul (left), the current World No.1 from Buenos Aires. Dabul would probably be the first to admit that grass isn't his favourite surface, and last year, his first experience at Wimbledon saw him lose in the first round. However, a year on, will Dabul have learned how to master the green stuff?

This year French boys have monopolised the Grand Slams taking three of the four semifinal spots in Australia and both places in the final at Roland Garros. Leading the challenge at Wimbledon will be Clement Morel, winner of the Australian Open and currently ranked No. 2. Following closely behind will be Jo-Wilfred Tsonga, a semifinalist in Australia and quarterfinalist in Paris, while Mathieu Montcourt will also be hoping to seize this opportunity to emulate his peers' success.

Alex Bogdanovic has a great chance of becoming the first Briton for forty years to lift the junior Wimbledon trophy. Born in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Bogdanovic moved to England with his parents when he was eight years old and last week the 18-year-old proved he has the game for grass by winning the junior Stella Artois invitational event. However, what remains to be seen is if he will be able to cope with the pressure that comes with being a Brit at Wimbledon.

Australia's Todd Reid will be looking to improve on his quarterfinal appearance last year. Reid has already notched up some impressive performances this year, reaching the singles final and winning the doubles on home soil at the Australian Open. The-18-year-old, now resident in Florida, has also proved that he can adapt his game to grass giving Greg Rusedski a scare in Nottingham, taking the first set of their match 64 before going on to lose in three.

Last year's semifinalist Philipp Petzschner from Germany goes into this year's tournament with the perfect preparation, a win in the Grade 1 event at Roehampton. If his form continues he will be a real contender for the title.

In the girls' draw, current No.1 Barbora Strycova of the Czech Republic (below) will be looking to add a second Grand Slam title to her collection. The 2002 Australian Open champion has also notched up two



Grand Slam doubles titles leading to a No.1 doubles ranking, thus proving that she can volley. On top of these credentials she also lists grass as one of her favourite surfaces.

Australian Open semifinalist Su Wei Hsieh is looking to improve on her second round exit from Wimbledon last year. The diminutive 16-year-old from Chinese Taipei has been concentrating on women's events this year but returns to Wimbledon hoping to mirror the success of her Asian counterpart Angelique Widjaja who took the title last year.

German Anna-Lena Groenefeld has risen rapidly up the rankings of late, winning recent tournaments in Belgium and Frankfurt and claiming a spot in the top ten rankings. In Frankfurt she defeated Strycova to take the title and, as Strycova's doubles partner in Paris, picked up her first doubles Grand Slam title. The test for Groenefeld will be how she copes with the

grass on her first visit to Wimbledon.

Fifteen-year-old Maria Sharapova could be a hot tip for the title this year. The Russian who trains at the Bollettieri Academy in Florida has attracted much press attention after winning a match as a wild card at the Indian Wells women's event in March. Fortunately, Sharapova has the talent to justify the limelight and reached the final of the Australian Open this year. She will be hoping to make a dream debut at SW19 next week.

Another of the talented crop of Russian girls is Vera Douchvina, winner at Roehampton last week. In her first year of playing junior Grand Slams the 15-year-old from Moscow has certainly made her mark, reaching the quarters in Australia and semis at Roland Garros. With confidence levels high thanks to a tournament win on grass, Douchvina could be a real threat this week.

Development news

ITF/CAT Southern Africa 14 & Under Circuit 2002



The 2002 ITF/CAT Southern Africa 14 & Under Circuit began on 20th June with a four-day training camp held at the University of Pretoria in South Africa. Eleven of twelve countries from the region were represented including Angola, Botswana, Lesotho, Malawi, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, South Africa, Swaziland, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

Twenty-three boys, 19 girls and 12 coaches participated in the training camp that focused on preparation for the South African Tennis Association (SATA) Junior Tournament, the Jack Van Der Westerhuizen, which started last Monday. The training camp included lectures by Karl Davies, ITF Development Officer for East & Southern Africa and Prince Madema, ITF Zonal Development Officer for East & Southern Africa. After these lectures, the players put into practice what they had learned with the assistance of their respective team coaches, focusing primarily on the technical and tactical areas of the five game situations. During the camp, Wilmarie Loots, biokinetic trainer from the University of Pretoria, conducted a fitness test for all the players. Following the test, Wilmarie presented a lecture detailing specific methods to improve the components of fitness that were tested. Wilmarie was then able to give each child a fitness report to take back to their respective countries so that they can work on their weaknesses, if any. Overall, the fitness test results indicated that on average, the players were weaker in upper body strength and power.

Following the training camp, the SATA Jack Van Westerhuizen Tournament took place last week. This is the second consecutive year that SATA tournaments have formed part of the circuit - the idea being to increase participation in SATA events from countries in the region and to take advantage of the high standard of these tournaments. The format for this five-day tournament was Round Robin for the first three days and then a knock-out round for the top two players in each pool. Overall, 20 of the 42 players playing on the Circuit made it to the knock-out stage. The finals took place on Friday with teenagers from the training camp involved in the following stages:

Boys U/14 final: Eric Fisher (RSA) d Simon Koenig (MRI) 36 62 63

Girls U/14 final: Suzelle Davin (NAM) d Riona Vather (RSA) 62 63

Girls U/12 final: Mariska Kuschke (NAM) d Bankane Magakgala (RSA) 36 64 13-11

The ITF/CAT Southern Africa 14 & Under Circuit forms an important part of the development of tennis in the region by identifying talented players to receive assistance from the ITF. This assistance can be in the form of invitations to participate in ITF regional teams or training camps or to attend the ITF/SATA Training Centre in Pretoria. Female tennis in the region has steadily grown over the years and has specifically benefited from this type of ITF assistance. This year we are able to see an example of how the region is producing female tennis players, which seems to be driven within families and down the generations. For example, Tapiwa Marobela from Botswana and Kederile Magakgala from South Africa both participated in the Southern African 14 & Under Circuit in 2000 and due to their performance on the circuit are now attending the ITF/SATA Training Centre in Pretoria on a full time basis. This year, following in their sisters' footsteps, Tapiwa's sister, Shatani and Kederile's sister, Bankane are now playing the same circuit that their sisters played two years ago!

After taking a rest day over the weekend, the players are now taking part in two three-day ITF organised tournaments at the University of Pretoria with the circuit finishing on 5 July.

Wheelchair news

Hall and Di Toro lead Australia in Invacare World Team Cup



World No. 2 David Hall (below left) and Daniela Di Toro will head Australia's team of five athletes in the Invacare World Team Cup by Camozzi to be held in Tremosine, Italy from 16-22 September. They will be joined by Anthony Bonaccorso, Matthew Long and Lesly Page.

For the first time, an Australian junior wheelchair tennis team will compete in the Invacare World Team Cup by Camozzi with Ben Weekes, Heath Davidson, Jerry Markoja and Thomas Laing entering the boys' singles and doubles.



Australian teams have taken three titles since the first World Team Cup was held in 1985. Hall has led Australia's men to three trophies in 1994, 1996 and 2000 with Di Toro leading the women to victory in 1999. However, the Dutch will be the nation to beat according to Australia's Team Manager Sallee Caldwell. She said, "The Dutch team is very strong with the top three women and the No. 1 and No. 3 men in their line-up... But Australia also has a good winning record at the World Team Cup and I know the players are extremely keen to ensure they do well in Italy."

Scholarships announced

Australia's top male and female wheelchair tennis players, David Hall and Daniela Di Toro (right) were each awarded a \$10,000 scholarship from Optus, Tennis Australia announced last Wednesday, 26 June.

Both players were Australia's highest ranked wheelchair tennis athletes last year, with Hall finishing the season No. 2 while Di Toro was No. 3 in the world rankings.

Optus provides support at every level of Australian team tennis. Danny Leddin, Optus General Manager of Sales – Southern Region said, "Daniela and David are great ambassadors for their sport and Optus hopes this scholarship will help them continue to achieve fantastic results on the international tennis circuit."

In addition to announcing the 2001 winners, a new award scheme was also outlined for wheelchair tennis players in 2002, the Optus Wheelchair Ranking Improvements Awards. The new scheme has been widened to include incentive awards based on a player's ranking. A player will receive \$6,000 for reaching the top ten, \$3,000 for earning a top 20 position, \$2,000 for a top 50 position and \$1,000 for securing a top 100 ranking provided they still hold this ranking at the end of December 2002. An award of \$1,000 will also be presented to one player whose ranking has improved the most from 1 January 2002 to 31 December 2002.

Di Toro commented, "I think it's fantastic that Optus is supporting wheelchair tennis through these ranking improvements awards as it will really help players develop their game and compete overseas. It gives that little bit more incentive for players to work hard to improve and maintain their ranking."





Invacare World Team Cup contract signed for 2003



The contract for the staging of the 2003 Invacare World Team Cup in Poland was signed by ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti and Włodzimierz Wapinski of the Polish Wheelchair Tennis Federation (above) on Friday 28 June at the ITF office in London.

This will be the first time that the Invacare World Team Cup will be staged in Eastern Europe. The competition will be held in Sopot at the venue of the ATP Tour event. After two consecutive years in the mountains of Italy and Switzerland, the Invacare World Team Cup will move to a seaside location in Poland. The Polish men's team has performed well in the Invacare World Team Cup in recent years and a home crowd may well inspire them to further success.

John Parsons honoured

The Daily Telegraph's tennis correspondent John Parsons has become the first journalist to receive the Carl Aavold Award for international achievement. The LTA's highest award is named in honour of a former LTA president.

Parsons said, "I've had 43 years of covering tennis which has, to a large extent, become my life. The only thing missing has been a Wimbledon British men's singles champion. I'm keeping my fingers crossed." Former winners of the Carl Aavold Award include Dan Maskell and Fred Perry.

George Barnes

Former International Tennis Hall of Fame Director George Barnes died on Monday 3 June aged 102.

He had a distinguished career in tennis administration and was particularly supportive of the junior game. In 1977, he was elected to the International Tennis Hall of Fame's Board of Directors and he continued to serve until 1995. A year later he became an Honorary Director.

Career highlights include being USTA President from 1960-61 when Barnes campaigned to develop the Fed Cup as a vehicle with which to promote women's tennis.

In 1995, the George Barnes Tennis Center in San Diego was founded and carries its founder's ideals of providing children of all socio-economic backgrounds the opportunity to play tennis. He is survived by his daughter, Ruth Jorgensen.
