## Four nations compete for Davis Cup Final places

France, United States, Russia and Argentina go head-to-head this Friday in the battle for a place in the World Group Final of the 2002 Davis Cup by BNP Paribas.

Defending champion France takes on the US on the Roland Garros clay in what promises to be a fascinating contest. The French, the top ranked Davis Cup nation, have had the home advantage in both their previous Davis Cup ties this year against the Netherlands and the Czech Republic and will again benefit from some passionate home support against the Americans.

France captain Guy Forget has named Sebastien Grosjean, Arnaud Clement, Fabrice Santoro and Michael Llodra as the players to take on the predominantly young American team of Andy Roddick, James Blake, Mardy Fish and Todd Martin. France and the US, currently ranked five in the Davis Cup Nation Ranking, have met thirteen times in Davis Cup, the US holding a 7-6 lead.

Like the French, Russia has made the most of two home ties so far this year, defeating first Switzerland and then Sweden en route to the semifinals, and will be hoping to repeat its success against Argentina at the Sports Palace Luzhniki in Moscow this weekend. Russia will once again be led by Marat Safin, but a finger injury suffered by Yevgeny Kafelnikov in Tashkent last week has put his Davis Cup place in doubt. The Russian No.2 carried the injury into yesterday's final, defeating Vladimir Voltchkov in straight sets, but has scheduled a practice session today to assess the extent of the injury.

Argentine captain Alejandro Gattiker has charged Wimbledon finalist David Nalbandian, Gaston Gaudio, Juan Ignacio Chela and Lucas Arnold with the responsibility of taking on the Russians. A win would result in Argentina's first World Group final for over 20 years. Russia and Argentina, ranked sixth and seventh respectively, have met just once in Davis Cup, the Russians winning 3-2.

## ITF activities

ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti last week left London on a three-leg journey that began in La Baule, France, where he attended the finals of the Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas and Junior Fed Cup. Ricci Bitti took part in the trophy presentation ceremonies for both events.

Today, Ricci Bitti will be in Tremosine in Italy for the Invacare World Team Cup by Camozzi, where he will participate in the opening ceremony of wheelchair tennis' premier team competition. While there he will meet with the Mayor of Tremosine as well as representatives from Invacare and Camozzi.

On Thursday, Ricci Bitti will arrive in Moscow, Russia, for the semifinal of the 2002 Davis Cup by BNP Paribas. Russia will host Argentina at the Sports Palace Luzhniki from 20-22 September. Ricci Bitti plans to meet with Shamil Tarpishev, President of the Russian Tennis Federation and Davis Cup Captain, as well as Enrique Morea, President of the Argentine Tennis Association.

Executive Vice President Juan Margets will represent the ITF at the other Davis Cup by BNP Paribas semifinal at Roland Garros where France takes on the United States. Margets will meet with Christian Bimes, President of the French Tennis Federation and Mervin Heller, President of the United States Tennis Association, ITF sponsors as well as representatives from the Grand Slams.



Five of the players currently in contention for a place in the Tennis Masters Cup in Shanghai will be in Davis Cup action this weekend. Lleyton Hewitt, Marat Safin, Tim Henman, Tommy Haas and Andy Roddick will all represent their country in either Semifinal or World Group Qualifying Round ties around the world.

The top seven players in the Race automatically qualify for the eight player 2002 Tennis Masters Cup in Shanghai, co-owned by the ITF, Grand Slams and ATP.

## Hewitt first to qualify for 2002 Tennis Masters Cup

Defending champion and world No.1 Lleyton Hewitt is the first player to qualify for the 2002 Tennis Masters Cup in Shanghai. The year-end men's tennis finale, a joint event run by the ITF, ATP and Grand Slams, will be held at the Shanghai New Expo Centre from November 12-17.

Hewitt, who became the youngest-ever year-end world No.1 last year when he won the 2001 Tennis Masters Cup in Sydney, is 136 points clear in first place of the ATP Champions Race following his semifinal appearance at the US Open.

Hewitt (690 points) is followed by second-placed Andre Agassi (554 points), who greatly improved his chances of qualifying for Shanghai and closed the gap on No.1 by defeating Hewitt to advance to the final at Flushing Meadows.

Pete Sampras, who beat Agassi in the US Open final, has leapt into contention for Shanghai after surging from 32nd in the Race to 12th. Sampras (347) collected 200 points for winning in New York.

The top seven finishers in the ATP Champions Race qualify for the Tennis Masters Cup. The eighth place will go to either the eighth player on the Race or the highest-placed Grand Slam champion who finishes between eighth and 20th. Roland Garros champion Albert Costa (393) is currently locked in a three-way tie for fifth place. Australian Open champion Thomas Johansson (312), who missed the US Open due to injury, is in 14th place.

## McEnroe captancy extended to 2004

The United States Tennis Association has announced that Patrick McEnroe will continue in the role of US Davis Cup captain until 2004.

McEnroe will lead the U.S. Davis Cup team as it faces defending champion France in the 2002 Davis Cup by BNP Paribas semifinal at Roland Garros in Paris this weekend. Representing the United States against France will be Andy Roddick, James Blake, Todd Martin, and Mardy Fish.

## Rusedski and Bhupathi out of Qualifying Round ties

Great Britain No.2 Greg Rusedski has been forced out of the team taking on Thailand in this weekend's Davis Cup by BNP Paribas World Group Qualifying Round in Birmingham. Rusedski is suffering from a left heel injury sustained during his loss to Pete Sampras at the US Open. He has been replaced in the team by Miles Maclagan.

Meanwhile, US Open doubles champion Mahesh Bhupathi has withdrawn from the Indian team taking on Australia in Adelaide. Indian team captain Ramesh Krishnan has named 25-year-old Vishal Uppal as Bhupathi's replacement. The draw for this weekend's tie will be held in Adelaide on Thursday.



## Records tumble at 2002 US Open

The USTA has announced record-setting television viewership and website traffic for the 2002 US Open, making this year's event one of the most successful in history and, once again, the highest annually attended sports event in the world.

Ratings for CBS Sports' coverage of the US Open finals were significantly higher than previous years. The all-American men's final between Pete Sampras and Andre Agassi rated 7.9, up 44% from last year. The rating was the highest US Open rating since 1990 and higher than the 1995 Sampras-Agassi final rating of 6.9.

The women's final between Venus and Serena Williams was the top-rated sports program on Saturday 7 September, with a 7.2 rating. Overall finals ratings on CBS averaged a 7.6, up 19% against last year. Overall, CBS ratings throughout the tournament were up 6% over last year.

The 2002 US Open attendance of 628,738 remains the highest attendance for any annual sporting event, despite poor weather. The single day attendance record was broken twice, on Friday, August 30 with 55,212 attending the day and night sessions combined, and Saturday, August 21 with 55,734 in attendance.

Website records were also set with visits to usopen.org totalling 12.9 million, up 15% from last year.



### USTA nominates new Chairman, President and CEO

The USTA Nominating Committee has announced the nomination of Alan G. Schwartz as USTA Chairman of the Board, President and Chief Executive Officer to serve a two-year term from 2003-2004. Schwartz is scheduled to take office January 1, 2003.

Schwartz is currently serving a two-year term as First Vice President of the USTA and has been a member of USTA Board of Directors for the past eight years.

"As the national governing body of tennis, I feel it is the USTA's responsibility to aggressively promote and develop the growth of tennis," said Schwartz. "Getting more players into the game and keeping them active is the USTA's top priority."

A graduate of Yale University, where he was captain of the tennis team, Schwartz received an MBA from Harvard Business School. He holds eight national tennis titles, and has held national rankings as both a junior and senior player.

### LTA appoints top Belgian coach

The LTA has appointed Carl Maes, the former coach of Belgian star Kim Clijsters, to the head the LTA Academy at Welwyn, UK.

Maes, 32, coached Clijsters full-time from 1999-2002 having previously been in charge of a national junior squad also including Justine Henin.

Maes began coaching in the late 1980s and reached Level A, the highest standard of coach, in Belgium. He worked full-time for the Flemish Tennis Federation from 1992-1996 and is a specialist in physical conditioning of young players.

LTA Performance Director Patrice Hagelauer said: "We are very pleased to appoint Carl to this important role in British tennis. His success in helping to develop young players was proven through his work in Belgium and we believe his outstanding knowledge of tennis and his ability to bring out the best in young players will prove invaluable."



## Spain wins Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas while Belarus triumphs in Junior Fed Cup

Spain has won the inaugural 16 & Under Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas trophy after defeating USA 3-0 at the Tennis Country Club Barriere in sunny La Baule on Saturday. In doing so, the Spanish boys Rafael Nadal, Tomeu Salva and Marcel Granollers have added the 16 & Under team title to the 14 & Under World Junior Tennis trophy they captured two years ago in Prostějov.

The unseeded Belarus girls enjoyed a magical debut in the Junior Fed Cup, stunning the favourites Czech Republic 3-0 to win their first ever 16 & Under title.

This is the 18<sup>th</sup> year of the 16 & Under team competition but the first time that the event has been renamed with the boys' tournament now sponsored by Davis Cup title sponsor BNP Paribas. Wilson was the 'Official Ball' of the competition for the first time after an agreement was signed with the ITF.

Off to celebrate, Spanish captain Joan Llorens said, "We will all have one glass of champagne each... I congratulate the boys on their win. They concentrated well in their matches and played very intelligently. They showed fighting spirit." He added, "Our aim throughout this year has been to win the Junior Davis Cup. The boys won the Winter Cup and the Borotra Cup earlier in the year so we really wanted to succeed in the Junior Davis Cup as well."

In a showdown between the first and second seeds, the Spanish justified their status as title favourites with Nadal clinching the vital second point, defeating American No. 1 Brendan Evans 62 62. Tomeu Salva had earlier disposed of Phillip Simmonds 62 63. Nadal then partnered Granollers to beat American doubles pairing Scott Oudsema and Simmonds to complete the final scoreline.

In truth, the Spanish team, particularly Nadal, were a level above their competition this week, especially as they had the benefit of playing on their favourite surface, clay. Nevertheless, American captain Ricardo Acuna had expected the boys' final to be closer but said that Spain were just the better team on the day.

He conceded, "We had our chances - in the first set of the opening singles we were up 21 with a break and the Spanish player was pretty nervous. Unfortunately, we weren't able to take advantage. Having said that, we exceeded our expectations on clay. It might have been a different result on hard courts though." The American boys had been hoping to secure a rare junior double after their 14 & Under counterparts won the World Junior Tennis title in Prostějov last month.

In the battle for third position, Uruguay achieved their best ever finish in the 16 & Under event after overcoming a strong Aussie challenge 2-1.

Unlike the girls' semifinals, where China was the only non-European nation, there was a neat geographical spread in the boys' draw, with all four semifinalists - Spain, USA, Uruguay and Australia - representing different Regional Qualifying groups.

The girls' final unfolded into a baseline tussle between Belarus and Czech Republic with both teams having won all 12 of their matches en route to Saturday's face-off.

Daria Kustava opened up for Belarus, coming back from 30 down in the first set to eventually defeat Andrea Hlavackova 63 61. The contest between both teams' top players was closer, peppered with many absorbing rallies for the watching spectators to enjoy. But once again, Belarus had the upper hand with Anastasiya Yakimava eventually outrallying Katerina Bohmova 63 64 to give her country an unassailable 2-0 lead. All four girls then played in the doubles with Kustava and Yakimava defeating the Czechs 62 63 to maintain their perfect 15-0 match record in the competition.

Reflecting on the girls' incredible week in La Baule, Belarus captain Yuri Shcherbakov said, "This is a very big success for Belarus. The girls are very proud to represent their country here. It means everything, for me it means everything and together we fought on court for our country."

He added, "We are very happy but the work must continue. I am smiling but life goes on. The next event is the Orange Bowl so we must prepare for that. Who knows, in two or three years, these girls might make the senior Fed Cup team."

One of the hallmarks of the Belarussians' play this week has been mental strength. Shcherbakov, who coaches Yakimava back in Belarus, said, "It's important to just play every ball, to forget all the previous points and just play your game. Some coaches don't really concentrate on the game when they are on court with the players. I think it's very important to play every ball with your player."

After playing so well all week and reaching a third consecutive Junior Fed Cup final, the Czechs were disappointed to miss out on a record hat trick of titles. Czech captain Katerina Bohmova, whose daughter is the team's No. 1 player, had been confident of victory, especially after Bohmova junior and Hlavackova had been on such good form in the week.

The Russians claimed third position after defeating China 2-0 in the play off tie on Saturday, to ensure that all three medal winners were European.

In an emotional closing ceremony, ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti presented a replica of the Davis Cup trophy to the Spanish boys and the Junior Fed Cup trophy to the Belarussian girls. He congratulated the champions and thanked everyone participating for a week of high-quality and thrilling tennis.



## Development update

## Minsk hosts Level II Coaches course



Nineteen coaches from Belarus, Latvia and Moldova gathered in Minsk, Belarus recently to participate in an Olympic Solidarity funded Advanced Coaches course. The Level II course, held at the National Tennis Centre from 26 August – 6 September, was conducted by Frank Zlesak (CZE), Keith Reynolds (GBR) and Viktor Ivancov, a Level II coach from Lithuania who acted as translator. Simon Kagan, President of the Belarus Tennis Federation and his team assisted the ITF experts, providing an excellent venue and fulfilling all the necessary conditions required for holding such a course.

The ITF/Tennis Europe and the Belarus Tennis Federation joined forces with the International Olympic Committee to organise this project, which recognises the importance of coaches' education in the area of tennis development. Olympic Solidarity awarded a special grant to the ITF to help cover some of the costs related to the implementation of the 12-day course designed to train coaches working with junior advanced level players using the ITF Advanced Coaches Manual.

Frank Zlesak, course director said: "This course in Minsk was particularly motivating for the tutors as most of the coaches had a university degree in Physical Education as well as a good tennis background which made the course level a very high-standard."

The Regional Coaches course in Minsk was the second Olympic Solidarity Regional Level II Coaches Course held this year.

So far in 2002 the ITF/Tennis Europe has worked with more than 12 National Associations in the Coaches' Education area to provide their coaches with the chance of furthering their knowledge and obtaining a coaches certification.

## Draw held for World Team Cup

ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti and the Mayor of Tremosine conducted the draw on Sunday 15th September for the 2002 Invacare World Team Cup by Camozzi, the flagship event of the international wheelchair tennis calendar, which got underway in the Italian resort of Tremosine this morning.

All eight seeded nations in the men's competition, headed by top seeds and defending champions the Netherlands, have a bye into the last 16. The Netherlands are seeded to meet Australia in what could be the pick of the quarterfinals later in the week.

The Dutch are also the number one seeds and defending champions in the women's competition. Thailand have withdrawn from the women's draw, leaving 15 teams contesting the title and giving the Netherlands a bye into the quarterfinals. Meanwhile, number two seeds the United States will meet Great Britain in their opening match.

Defending champions Great Britain have by far the toughest of the two round-robin pools in the Quad competition, facing last year's runners-up Japan, the Netherlands and Israel. Meanwhile, second seeds the United States will play Canada, Italy and Sweden.

There are also two round-robin groups of four in the junior competition, with top seeds the United States playing Sweden, Australia and Sweden in their group, and second seeds and defending champions the Netherlands up against Germany, Great Britain and Canada.

The 2002 Invacare World Team Cup by Camozzi continues until Sunday 22nd September, when the men's final will take place. The women's final takes place a day earlier with the Quad and junior finals the first to take place, on Friday.
