On court today...

- Novak Djokovic continues his march towards a 25th Grand Slam title on Rod Laver Arena this afternoon, with the world No. 1 bidding to reach a 58th Grand Slam quarterfinal and equal Roger Federer's all-time record for most appearances in the last 8 at the majors. In his way will be France's Adrian Mannarino – and after winning all 3 of his matches here this week in 5 sets, the No. 20 seed will need to display impressive resilience today if he is to defeat Djokovic. An upset victory for Mannarino today would see him through to his first Grand Slam quarterfinal on his 15th appearance at the Australian Open and his 55th appearance at the majors – and would see him set the Open Era record for most attempts before reaching the last 8, both at the Australian Open and at the Grand Slams overall.

- Jannik Sinner has enjoyed 3 comfortable victories en route to the round of 16 this week, but he can expect a stern challenge when he takes on No. 15 seed Karen Khachanov on Margaret Court Arena. Sinner has won 2 of the pair's previous 3 matches – but Khachanov's sole victory came on their only previous encounter at the Grand Slams, when he recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Sinner in 5 sets in the 1st round at the 2020 US Open. Since then, Sinner has firmly established himself as a member of the sport's elite – and Khachanov has struggled against the highest-ranked players in recent times, with just one victory in his last 19 matches against Top 5 opponents.

A 5th meeting between Djokovic and Mannarino, and their 3rd at the Grand Slams – but their first at any level for more than 5 years. Djokovic has won all 4 of their previous meetings, dropping just one of the 11 sets they have played.

Djokovic is facing a lefthanded player at the Australian Open for the 11th time. He has won all 10 previous meetings with lefthanded players at the Australian Open, most recently defeating Yoshihito Nishioka in the 3rd round in 2020.

Djokovic has a 43-13 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams, with 11 of his 13 defeats coming against Rafael Nadal. Mannarino is bidding to become the 4th lefthanded player to defeat Djokovic at a Grand Slam – after Nadal, Jurgen Melzer (who defeated in the quarterfinals at 2010 Roland Garros) and Fernando Verdasco (who defeated Djokovic in the 3rd round at the 2005 US Open).

Djokovic has a 135-40 win-loss record against lefthanded players overall. He has won 14 of the last 16 matches he has played against lefthanded players, with his only defeats to lefthanders in that time coming against Vesely in the quarterfinals at 2022 Dubai and to Nadal in the quarterfinals at 2022 Roland Garros.

Mannarino is facing a world No. 1 for just the 2nd time in his career in his 608th Tour-level match. His only previous meeting with a world No. 1 also came against Djokovic, in the 2nd round at 2016 Wimbledon, when he lost in straight sets. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 11 Hubert Hurkacz in the 2nd round at the 2022 Australian Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Tour-level is No. 3 Daniil Medvedev in the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch last year.

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 14th time and equal Rafael Nadal and John Newcombe in 2nd place on the all-time list for most round of 16 appearances at the Australian Open. This is his 19th Australian Open appearance.

- Djokovic is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the 58th time and equal Roger Federer's **all-time record for most quarterfinals appearances at the Grand Slams**. This is his 73rd Grand Slam appearance.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his **32nd consecutive match-win at the Australian Open**. It is his longest streak of victories here and the longest streak of Australian Open men's singles match-wins in the Open Era. He has not lost an Australian Open match since falling to Chung Hyeon in the round of 16 in 2018, winning the title here in 2019-21 and last year. He did not compete here in 2022.

- The Australian Open is Djokovic's **most successful Grand Slam event in terms** of titles won, his joint most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won, and his 3rd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of quarterfinals reached.

- By reaching the round of 16 here for the 16th time, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of **2nd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at the Australian Open**, ahead of Nadal. Federer, who made 18 round of 16 appearances here, is the only man in the Open Era to have reached the round of 16 here more often than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is **through to the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 63rd time**. He is in 2nd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams, behind Federer, who made 69 round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams.

- Djokovic is contesting his **101st Australian Open match today**. He is the 3rd player, man or woman, to contest 100 singles matches here – after Roger Federer (117 Australian Open matches) and Serena Williams (105).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **11th Australian Open title** and extend his all-time record for most Australian Open men's singles titles. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer and Roy Emerson, by defeating Nadal in the final here in 2019 to win his 7th title – before adding further titles here in 2020 (d. Dominic Thiem), 2021 (d. Daniil Medvedev) and 2023 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He also won the title here in 2008 (d. Jo-Wilfried Tonga), 2011 (d. Andy Murray), 2012 (d. Nadal), 2013 (d. Murray), 2015 (d. Murray) and 2016 (d. Murray).
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **3rd player in history to win at least 11 titles at any Grand Slam event** – after Nadal, who has won 14 titles at Roland Garros, and Margaret Court, who won 11 Australian Open women's singles titles. Martina Navratilova, who won 9 Wimbledon women's singles titles, is the only other player to have won at least 9 titles at one Grand Slam event.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **25th Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of the record for most Grand Slam singles titles, ahead of Court. He would also extend his record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles, ahead of Nadal (22 Grand Slam titles) and Federer (20).
- At 36 years 251 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **3rd man in the Open Era to win multiple Australian Open titles since turning 35** – after Ken Rosewall and Federer, both of whom won 2 titles here after their 35th birthdays. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is also bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35 and his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30**, extending his Open Era records for both feats.
- Djokovic **won 3 Grand Slam titles in 2023**. In addition to his title here, he also won the titles at Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and the US Open (d. Medvedev). He finished runner-up at Wimbledon (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2023** were winning the titles at Adelaide 1 (d. Sebastian Korda), Cincinnati-1000 (d. Alcaraz), Paris-1000 (d. Grigor Dimitrov) and the ATP Finals (d. Jannik Sinner). With a total of 7 titles, he led the Tour for most titles won in 2023.
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Djokovic represented Serbia at the United Cup, where the team reached the quarterfinals before falling to Australia. He won singles matches against China, P.R.'s Zhang Zhizhen and Czechia's Jiri Lehecka but fell to Australia's Alex de Minaur. His defeat to De Minaur ended a 43-match winning streak in Australia, having previously not lost in Australia since falling to Chung in the round of 16 here in 2018.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **99th Tour-level singles title**. Only Jimmy Connors (109 Tour-level titles) and Federer (103) have won more Tour-level singles titles in the Open Era than Djokovic.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked at No. 1**. He began his 408th week as world No. 1 on Monday. He returned to No. 1 after winning the US Open in September and has remained at No. 1 since then. He is one of 3 players in contention for the post-Australian Open No. 1 ranking, alongside Alcaraz and Medvedev.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, and was a member of the team which defeated France in the 2010 final to win the nation's first Davis Cup title. He has a 40-8 win-loss record in Davis Cup singles matches and a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition overall. His 21-match Davis Cup singles winning streak ended during Serbia's semifinal defeat to Italy in November last year, when he fell to Sinner in 3 sets.
- Djokovic is coached by Goran Ivanisevic, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1989, 1994 and 1997.
- **MANNARINO** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time.
- Mannarino is bidding to become the **14th French player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at the Australian Open** – after Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (5 Australian Open quarterfinal appearances), Sebastien Grosjean (4), Gael Monfils, Guy Forget, and Yannick Noah (all 2), and Jeremy Chardy, Arnaud Clement, Nicolas Escude, Wanaro N'Godrella, Lucas Pouille, Patrick Proisy, Fabrice Santoro and Gilles Simon (all one). He is also bidding to become the 22nd Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at the Grand Slams

- If he wins today and reaches the quarterfinals on his 15th Australian Open appearance, Mannarino will go **top of the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching the men’s singles quarterfinals at the Australian Open.**

- If he wins today and reaches the quarterfinals for the first time on his 55th Grand Slam appearance, Mannarino will also go **top of the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching the men’s singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam.**

- The Australian Open is Mannarino’s **3rd-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won and quarterfinals reached.

- By reaching the round of 16 here this year, Mannarino has **equalled his best Grand Slam result.** He has reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 4 other occasions – including once at the Australian Open, in in 2022 (l. Rafael Nadal). He also reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon in 2013 (l. Lukasz Kubot), 2017 (l. Djokovic) and 2018 (l. Roger Federer).
- Mannarino has won all his opening 3 matches here in 5 sets, becoming the **first player to win his opening 3 matches at the Australian Open in 5 sets since Dominik Hrbaty in 2006.** He is also the first player to win his opening 3 matches at a Grand Slam in 5 sets since Juan Pablo Varillas at Roland Garros last year.
- If Mannarino wins in 5 sets today, he will become the **first player in the Open Era to win 4 five-set matches in consecutive rounds at the Grand Slams.** He would become the 2nd player to achieve the feat at any Tour-level event – after Goran Ivanisevic, who recorded 5-set victories in his opening 4 matches at the Barcelona 1992 Olympic Tennis Event.
- Mannarino has won 11 of the last 12 **five-set matches** he has contested – including his victories in the opening 3 rounds here. His only defeat in a 5-set match in that time came against Roger Federer in the 1st round at 2021 Wimbledon, when he retired due to a right knee injury after the first point of the 5th set. He has won all 5 five-set matches he has contested at the Australian Open and has a 14-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Mannarino’s best results in 2023 were **winning his 3rd, 4th and 5th Tour-level titles** – at Newport (d. Alex Michelsen), Astana (d. Sebastian Korda) and Sofia (d. Jack Draper). He also finished as runner-up at Mallorca (l. Christopher Eubanks) and reached the quarterfinals at 6 other Tour-level events.
- Prior to the Australian Open, Mannarino represented France at the United Cup, winning one of the 4 singles matches he contested. He defeated Italy’s Lorenzo Sonego but fell to Germany’s Alexander Zverev, Norway’s Casper Ruud and Poland’s Hubert Hurkacz.

- Mannarino **broke the Top 20, at No. 20, for the first time** last week and plays here at a new career-high ranking of No. 19.
- Mannarino made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2018 and has a 7-2 overall win-loss record in the competition. France will play away to Chinese Taipei in the 2024 Davis Cup Qualifiers in February.
- Mannarino is coached by Erwann Tortuyaux.

A 4th meeting for Khachanov and Sinner and their 2nd at a Grand Slam. The pair have met at Melbourne Park before, in the semifinals at the Great Ocean Road Open the week prior to the Australian Open in 2021.

Sinner leads the pair's overall head-to-head, but Khachanov won their only previous match at the Grand Slam – in the 1st round at the 2020 US Open, when he recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets, one of 3 successful comebacks from 0-2 down that he has recorded during his career.

Sinner is bidding to end a 5-match losing streak against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams. His last victory against a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam came against No. 7 Carlos Alcaraz in the round of 16 at 2022 Wimbledon. At Tour-level, Sinner has won 6 of his last 7 matches against Top 20 players, with his only defeat to a Top 20 player in that time coming against No. 1 Novak Djokovic in the final at the 2023 ATP Finals. He has a 4-12 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 40-35 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.

Khachanov is bidding to defeat a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the first time. He has lost all 9 matches he has played against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, including both of his previous matches against Top 5 players at the Australian Open, against No. 5 Rafael Nadal in the 3rd round in 2022 and against No. 4 Tsitsipas in the semifinals last year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 9 Juan Martin del Potro in the round of 16 at 2019 Roland Garros. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Australian Open is No. 17 Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round last year.

Khachanov has won one of his last 19 matches against Top 5 players at Tour-level, with his only victory against a Top 5 player in that time coming against No. 3 Tsitsipas in the round of 16 at Miami-1000 last year. He has a 3-27 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

- **SINNER** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time and equal his best Australian Open result. This is his 5th Australian Open appearance and his 17th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **first Italian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at the Australian Open on multiple occasions**. Having reached the quarterfinals here last year, he is one of 5 Italian men to have reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open – alongside Giorgio de Stefani (1935), Nicola Pietrangeli (1957), Cristiano Caratti (1991) and Matteo Berrettini (2022).
- Sinner is bidding to reach his 6th Grand Slam quarterfinal and equal Berrettini and Adriano Panatta in **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances by an Italian man**.

- The Australian Open is Sinner's **joint-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won, alongside Roland Garros.

- By reaching the round of 16 here for the 3rd time, Sinner has become the **3rd Italian man in history to reach the round of 16 at the Australian Open on 3 or more occasions** – after Fabio Fognini and Andreas Seppi, who both reached the round of 16 here on 4 occasions.
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 11th time, Sinner has claimed sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by an Italian man**, ahead of Berrettini. Nicola Pietrangeli, who reached the last 16 at the Grand Slams on 16 occasions, is the only Italian man to have reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Sinner.
- **Last year here**, Sinner reached the round of 16. He defeated Kyle Edmund, Tomas Martin Etcheverry and Marton Fucsovics before falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas.
- Sinner's **best Australian Open result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2022 (l. Tsitsipas).
- Sinner's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at Wimbledon last year (l. Novak Djokovic). He has reached at least the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments and is one of only 2 Italian men, alongside Matteo Berrettini to have achieved the feat. In addition to his quarterfinal finish here in 2022, he also reached the quarterfinals at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Rafael Nadal), 2022 Wimbledon (l. Djokovic) and the 2022 US Open (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2023**, Sinner reached the round of 16 at the US Open, where he defeated Yannick Hanfmann, Lorenzo Sonego and Stan Wawrinka before falling to Alexander Zverev, but fell in the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Alexandre Muller, l. Daniel Altmaier).
- At 22 years 165 days, Sinner is bidding to become the **youngest Australian Open men's singles champion** since Djokovic won the title here in 2008 aged 20 years 250 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Sinner's **best result in 2023** was winning his first Masters-1000 level title at Toronto-1000 (d. Alex de Minaur) in his 3rd Masters-1000 final. He also won the titles at Montpellier (d. Maxime Cressy), Beijing (d. Medvedev) and Vienna (d. Medvedev) and finished runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Medvedev), Miami-1000 (l. Medvedev) and the ATP Finals (l. Djokovic).

- Sinner has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open – his only victory in a 5-set match here came against Fucsovcis in the 3rd round last year, when he recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets for the only time in his career to date. His 2 defeats in 5-set matches here came against Shapovalov in the 1st round in 2021 and against Tsitsipas in the round of 16 last year. He has a 5-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Sinner reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 4 after winning the title at Beijing in October last year. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023**, winning all 5 matches he played across singles and doubles at the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga in November. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 11-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. As defending champions, Italy have automatically qualified for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.
- **KHACHANOV** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time. This is his 8th Australian Open appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Khachanov is bidding to **reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the 6th time**. He is one of 11 active players to have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments – alongside Matteo Berrettini, Marin Cilic, Novak Djokovic, Daniil Medvedev, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal, Kei Nishikori, Andrey Rublev, Jannik Sinner and Stan Wawrinka.
- The Australian Open is Khachanov's **2nd-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won, after Roland Garros.

- Last year here, Khachanov equalled his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the semifinals. He defeated Bernabe Zapata Miralles, Jason Kubler, Frances Tiafoe, Yoshihito Nishioka and Sebastian Korda before falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas in the last 4. He also reached the semifinals at the 2022 US Open (l. Casper Ruud).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2023**, Khachanov reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Novak Djokovic) but fell in the 1st round at the US Open (l. Michael Mmoh). He withdrew from Wimbledon due to a stress fracture injury.
- Khachanov's best result in 2023 was winning his **5th Tour-level title** – and first since 2018 Paris-1000 – at Zhuhai (d. Yoshihito Nishioka). He also reached the semifinals at Miami-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and the quarterfinals at a total of 7 other Tour-level events.
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Khachanov competed at Hong Kong but lost his opening match to Emil Ruusuvuori.
- Khachanov has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open, both of which came in 2020 – he defeated Mikael Ymer in the 2nd round before falling to Nick Kyrgios in the 3rd round. He has a 9-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Khachanov **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in June 2019 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 8 the following month. He plays here at No. 15.
- Khachanov **won the men's singles silver medal at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event** in 2021, falling to Alexander Zverev in the gold medal match. Along with Andrey Rublev, who won mixed doubles gold, he became the first tennis player to win medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games.

- Khachanov won the **boys' doubles silver medal** alongside Rublev at the 2014 Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing, China. The pair fell to Orlando Luz/Marcelo Zormann in the gold medal match. He fell to Nishioka in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013.
- Khachanov is coached by Jose Clavet and Vedran Martic.

A 6th meeting for Rublev and De Minaur, and their first at a Grand Slam. De Minaur leads the pair's overall head-to-head but Rublev won their most-recent meeting, in the quarterfinals at Paris-1000 last year.

This is the first meeting between a pair of Top 10 players in the men's singles at the Australian Open this year. Rublev has a 23-37 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level while De Minaur has a 16-39 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level.

Rublev is bidding to end a 5-match losing streak against Top 10 players at Tour-level, having not defeated a Top 10 player since defeating No. 10 Alexander Zverev in the quarterfinals at 2023 Vienna. De Minaur is bidding to extend a 3-match winning streak against Top 10 players, having won all 3 matches he played against Top 10 players at the United Cup this year.

Rublev has won one of the 6 matches he has played against Top 10 players at the Australian Open. The only Top 10 player he has defeated here is No. 10 Holger Rune in the round of 16 here last year. He has a 5-10 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams overall.

De Minaur has won one of the 9 matches he has played against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams, with his only victory against a Top 10 player at the Grand Slams coming against No. 7 Kei Nishikori in the 3rd round at the 2019 US Open. He has lost all 3 matches he has played against Top 10 players at the Australian Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Australian Open is No. 41 Matteo Arnaldi in the 2nd round this year.

- Last year here, Rublev equalled his **best Australian Open result** by reaching the quarterfinals (l. Djokovic). He also reached the quarterfinals here in 2021 (l. Medvedev).
- Rublev's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 9 occasions. In addition to his 2 quarterfinal finishes here, he also reached the quarterfinals at the US Open in 2017 (l. Nadal), 2020 (l. Medvedev), 2022 (l. Cilic) and 2023 (l. Medvedev), and at Roland Garros in 2020 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and 2022 (l. Frances Tiafoe), and at 2023 Wimbledon (l. Djokovic). He is the only man in the Open Era to have lost the first 8 (or more) Grand Slam quarterfinal matches he has reached.
- Rublev's **best result in 2023** was winning his first Masters-1000 title at Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Holger Rune). He also won the title at Bastad (d. Casper Ruud) and finished runner-up at Dubai (l. Medvedev), Banja Luka (l. Dusan Lajovic), Halle (l. Alexander Bublik) and Shanghai-1000 (l. Hubert Hurkacz).
- Prior to the Australian Open, Rublev won his **15th Tour-level title** at Hong Kong (d. Emil Ruusuvuori).
- Rublev has won all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open – in addition to his victory against Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round this year, he also recorded 5-set victories here against David Ferrer in the 1st round in 2018 and against Rune in the round of 16 last year. He has an 8-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Rublev reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in September 2021. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Rublev is a **former junior world No. 1** having topped the boys' rankings for the first time in June 2014 after winning the boys' singles title at 2014 Roland Garros. He reached the quarterfinals at the 2014 Junior Australian Open (l. Stefan Kozlov) and finished runner-up in the boys' doubles with Kozlov at 2014 Wimbledon. - Rublev **won Olympic gold in mixed doubles** alongside Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova at Tokyo 2020, with the pair defeating Karatsev/Elena Vesnina in the final. Along with Khachanov, who won men's singles silver, he became the first tennis player to win medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games.
- Rublev is coached by Fernando Vicente.
- **DE MINAUR** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 7th Australian Open appearance and his 26th Grand Slam overall.
- De Minaur is bidding to become the **35th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the Australian Open quarterfinals** – but just the 3rd in the last 20 years, after Lleyton Hewitt in 2005 and Nick Kyrgios in 2015.
- De Minaur is also bidding to reach his **2nd Grand Slam quarterfinal** and become the 27th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam on multiple occasions. - De Minaur's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at the 2020 US Open, where he fell to eventual champion Dominic Thiem in straight sets.

A total of 15 Australian players began the men's singles draw here this year – the most Australian men to compete at the Australian Open since 1998, when there were 17. He is looking to become the first home player to win the Australian Open men's singles title since Mark Edmondson in 1976.
- De Minaur has won both **5-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open, having defeated Gerald Melzer in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2017 and Henri Laaksonen in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2019. He has a 3-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- De Minaur reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 last week, becoming the first Australian man to be ranked in the Top 10 since Lleyton Hewitt in July 2006. He plays here at the same ranking.
- De Minaur reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 2** in February 2016. He reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2016 Australian Open (l. Jurabek Karimov) and won the doubles event alongside Blake Ellis. He also finished runner-up in the boys' singles event at 2016 Wimbledon (l. Denis Shapovalov).
- De Minaur has led Australia to **back-to-back Davis Cup finals in 2022-23**, the team's first appearances in the Davis Cup final since 2003. The team finished as runners-up to Canada in 2022 and to Italy in 2023. De Minaur won 10 out of 13 Davis Cup matches he contested in 2022-23, with his only defeats coming against Felix Auger-Aliassime in the 2022 final, against Daniel Evans in the 2023 Finals Group Stage and against Sinner in the 2023 final. He has a 15-8 win-loss record in the competition overall. As runners-up in 2023, Australia have qualified automatically for the 2024 Finals Group Stage in September.
- De Minaur is coached by Adolfo Gutierrez.

Tsitsipas and Fritz were contemporaries at junior-level and both reached the junior world No. 1 ranking. They met 3 times at junior-level – Tsitsipas defeated Fritz in the quarterfinals at the 2014 Orange Bowl, but Fritz won both their junior Grand Slam meetings, in the 3rd round of the boys' singles at both 2015 Roland Garros and the 2015 US Open.

Fritz is bidding to defeat a Top 10 player at the Grand Slams for the first time. He has lost all 11 of his previous matches against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams, including all 4 of his previous matches against Top 10 players at the Australian Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 17 Alex de Minaur in the 1st round at the 2021 US Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Australian Open is No. 18 Roberto Bautista Agut in the 3rd round in 2022.

- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Fritz represented USA at the United Cup. He won one of the 2 singles matches he played, defeating Great Britain's Cameron Norrie but falling to Australia's Alex de Minaur.
- Fritz has won 4 of the 8 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open, including his 5-set victory against Facundo Diaz Acosta in the 1st round here this year. He has a 9-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fritz reached a career-high ranking of No. 5 in February last year, becoming the **first American man to be ranked in the Top 5** since Roddick in 2009. He plays here at No. 12.
- Fritz is a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 ITF Junior World Champion after winning the boys' singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys' singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul). He contested the boys' singles at the Australian Open in 2015, reaching the quarterfinals in 2015 (l. Hong Seong-chan).
- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut at the 2019 Finals and has a 5-3 win-loss record in the competition overall. USA play against Ukraine in Lithuania in the 2024 Davis Cup Qualifiers in February.
- Both of Fritz's parents were professional tennis players. His mother, Kathy, is a former Top 10 player.
- Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
