Wheelchair Tournament Preview

In 2002, the first Grand Slam wheelchair tournament was held at the Australian Open, with Robin Ammerlaan and Esther Vergeer winning the inaugural men's and women's wheelchair singles events. The first Australian Open quad wheelchair singles and doubles events were contested in 2008, with Peter Norfolk becoming the first Australian Open quad singles champion.

These are the 23rd editions of the Australian Open men's and women's wheelchair singles events and the 17th edition of the Australian Open quad wheelchair singles event. The 2024 Australian Open is the 112th edition of the event overall and is being played at Melbourne Park for the 37th time, having first been played here in 1988, when the venue was known as Flinders Park.

The men's and women's wheelchair singles draws were expanded to 16 players for the first time in 2023, and the quad wheelchair singles draw has been expanded from 8 to 16 players for the first time this year.

DE GROOT BIDS FOR THIRTEENTH STRAIGHT SLAM TITLE

Netherlands' Diede de Groot recorded 2 consecutive Grand Slam-winning seasons in 2021 and 2022, becoming the first tennis player, in any discipline, to win the Grand Slam in back-to-back years. She then won another Grand Slam in 2023, becoming the first tennis player, in any discipline, to win the Grand Slam in 3 years. She is the 3-time defending champion here – having defeated Yui Kamiji to win the title in 2021, Aniek van Koot in 2022, and Kamiji again in 2023 – and a 5-time Australian Open singles champion overall.

De Groot is bidding to win a 13th consecutive Grand Slam title here and claim sole ownership of the record for the longest Grand Slam wheelchair singles title-winning streak. She overtook compatriot Esther Vergeer by winning her 12th consecutive Grand Slam title at the 2023 US Open, equalling Shingo Kunieda at the top of the all-time record list. Her last defeat at a Grand Slam came in the semifinals at 2020 Roland Garros, when she fell to Momoko Ohtani in straight sets.

Note: 2017 was the first season when all four Grand Slam tournaments held men's and women's wheelchair singles events.

The quad wheelchair singles events have been held at all four Grand Slam tournaments since 2019.

THE RIVALRY GROWS

Following the retirement of 28-time Grand slam singles champion Shingo Kunieda at the start of 2023, two men have forged ahead at the top of the men's game – fellow Japanese Tokito Oda, still just 17 years old, and British star Alfie Hewett. Hewett faced Kunieda in 7 Grand Slam singles finals, winning 3 and losing 4, so the legend's retirement presented a huge opportunity for Hewett.

Entering 2023, Hewett led his head-to-head with Oda 3-1, and defeated the then 16-year-old in the Australian Open final for his first singles title in Melbourne. The two met in the next two Grand Slam finals at Roland Garros and Wimbledon, with Oda winning on both occasions for his first 2 Grand Slam titles. Wimbledon remains the only Grand Slam singles title that Hewett is yet to win.

After Oda lost in the 1st round at the US Open, Hewett capitalised to claim his 4th singles title in New York and ensure he and Oda split the year's Grand Slam titles. Hewett went on to win his 3rd Wheelchair Tennis Masters singles title and finish the year ranked at world No. 1.

DUTCH DOMINANCE IN QUAD SINGLES

Sam Schroder defeated fellow Dutchman Niels Vink in the 2023 Australian Open quad wheelchair singles final to successfully defend his title from 2022 and claim his 4th Grand Slam singles title.

As in 2022, the rivalry between Schroder and fellow Dutchman Niels Vink dominated the quad division in 2023. The pair also contested the quad singles finals at both Roland Garros and the US Open, with Vink winning in Paris for his 3rd Grand Slam singles title and Schroder triumphing in New York for his 5th. Wimbledon was the only Grand Slam where the two men did not meet in the final, as Schroder fell to Heath Davidson in the semifinals before Vink defeated Davidson in the final for his 4th Grand Slam singles title and first at SW19.

Vink ended the year as the world No. 1 ahead of Schroder. Vink, who is bidding to complete the Grand Slam in quad singles here, enters the event as No. 1 seed, while Schroder is No. 2 seed.

DE GROOT CHASES DOWN ALL-TIME GREATS

De Groot is bidding to win her 6th Australian Open title and close the gap on 7-time champion Dylan Alcott in 3rd place on the list for most Australian Open wheelchair singles titles.

Three-time Australian Open champion David Wagner is also aiming to win another title here and ascend the list, while Kamiji, Schroder and Jiske Griffioen are all bidding to win their 3rd Australian Open singles titles this year.

HEWETT LEADS ACTIVE PLAYERS

Kunieda enjoys a healthy lead at the top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam wheelchair singles titles (in any category), having retired at the start of 2023 with 28 Grand Slam titles to his name – including victories at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2022.

Hewett claimed sole ownership of 2nd place on the list for most Grand Slam men's wheelchair singles titles by winning his 6th major title at the US Open in 2022, before claiming his first Australian Open singles title and 4th US Open singles title in 2023 to move to 8 titles overall. Houdet will look to draw level with Fernandez in 3rd place by winning his 5th Grand Slam title. Should 2-time Grand Slam champions Gerard, Reid or Oda win the title here this year, they will equal Robin Ammerlaan and David Hall in 5th place on the list.

DE GROOT BIDS TO EQUAL VERGEER

De Groot's streak of 12 consecutive Grand Slam singles titles has seen her move to within one title of matching the great Vergeer's 21 titles at the top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam women's wheelchair singles titles.

Fellow Dutch players Griffioen and Van Koot – both former Australian Open singles champions – are also bidding to add to their tallies, while Kamiji, the only non-Dutch player in the Top 5 of the list, is aiming for her 9th Grand Slam title.

THE RACE TO CATCH ALCOTT

Alcott retired having won a total of 15 Grand Slam quad wheelchair singles titles – comfortably ahead of Peter Norfolk and Wagner's tallies of 6 major titles each.

Wagner will bid to win a 7th Grand Slam title and claim sole ownership of 2nd place on the list here. Schroder aims to equal Wagner and Norfolk with his 6th Grand Slam title, while a title-victory for Vink would see him equal Schroder in 4th place on the list.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

Most of the field competing at the Australian Open this week have played at the Victorian Wheelchair Open and the Melbourne Wheelchair Open over the last 2 weeks, with both events having been contested at the Hume Tennis Centre in the north of Melbourne.

The 3 finals at the Melbourne Wheelchair Open were all between the Top 2 players in each category, with No. 2 seeds Oda and Schroder overcoming Hewett and Vink respectively (Vink had t oretire against Schroder due to injury), while Kamiji came within a point of ending De Groot's winning streak in the women's singles final before De Groot battled back to win in a final-set tiebreak.

2023 LEADERS LOOK TO CONTINUE THE MOMENTUM

Martin de la Puente topped the list for most men's wheelchair singles victories in 2023, ahead of Oda and Hewett.

De Groot led the women's wheelchair singles tour for most match-wins last year with a perfect season, ahead of Kamiji and Zhu Zhenzhen.

Vink easily topped the list for most quad wheelchair singles wins, with 20 more than 2nd-placed Schroder – and his only 2 defeats of the season came against Schroder, in the finals at the Australian Open and US Open. Of Schroder's 10 defeats last season, 7 came against Vink.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

At just 17 years 264 days, Oda is the youngest player to compete in the wheelchair events here this year – he is more than 35 years younger than the oldest player, Houdet (53 years 68 days). At Roland Garros in 2022, Oda became the youngest wheelchair player to have ever contested a Grand Slam.

HOME FAVOURITES

Two Australian players have won Australian Open wheelchair singles titles – Alcott won 7 consecutive quad wheelchair singles titles here in 2015-21, while Hall won 3 men's wheelchair singles titles here in 2003-05.

Among the 4 Grand Slam tournaments, the Australian Open has the most-recent home champion in a wheelchair singles event thanks to Alcott's 7 years of success in the quad division.

There are 4 Australian players competing in the wheelchair tournament here this year – Ben Weekes and Anderson Parker in the men's singles, and Heath Davidson and Finn Broadbent in the quad singles.

LEFTHANDERS

There are 10 lefthanders in the wheelchair singles draws at the Australian Open this year – 6 in the women's event (Shiori Funamizu, Kamiji, Kgothatso Montjane, Maria Florencia Moreno, Van Koot and Zhu) and 2 each in the men's (Oda and Reid) and quad (Lapthorne and Schroder) events. Kamiji, Reid, Schroder and Van Koot are the only lefthanded players to have won an Australian Open singles title.

COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

A total of 18 nations are represented in the wheelchair singles draws at the 2024 Australian Open, with Netherlands having the most players competing across the 3 events overall. Great Britain, Netherlands and USA are the only 3 nations with representatives in each of the men's, women's and quad wheelchair events here.
