A 2nd Grand Slam title for Medvedev...

Daniil Medvedev is bidding to win his 2nd Grand Slam title and become the 32nd player in the Open Era, and 75th in history, to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles. He would become the 6th active player to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles – after Carlos Alcaraz, Novak Djokovic, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal and Stan Wawrinka. He is contesting his 8th Grand Slam event since winning his first major title and will go joint-5th on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title, alongside Yevgeny Kafelnikov, if he wins today.

... or a major breakthrough for Sinner?

Jannik Sinner is bidding to win his first Grand Slam title on his first appearance in a Grand Slam final. He would become the 3rd Italian player to win a Grand Slam men's singles title, and the first to do so at the Australian Open, as well as becoming the 58th Grand Slam men's singles champion in the Open Era and the 153rd Grand Slam men's singles champion in history. At 22 years 165 days, Sinner will also become the youngest player to win the Australian Open men's singles title since 2008, when Djokovic won the title here aged 20 years 250 days, if he wins tonight's match.

Prize money

Tonight's champion receives \$3,150,000 (AUD) in prize money, while the runner-up collects \$1,725,000. In total, the prize fund for the men's singles at the 2024 Australian Open is \$29,775,000 (AUD).

Rankings update

Sinner is guaranteed to remain at No. 4 – his career-high ranking – when the new rankings are published on Monday 29 January, regardless of the result of tonight's final. Medvedev will remain at No. 3 if he loses tonight but will rise to No. 2 for the first time since June last year if he wins this evening.

No. 3 v No. 4

This is the 13th time in the Open Era that the No. 3 and No. 4 seeds have met in a men's singles final at a Grand Slam. Of the previous 12 Grand Slam finals, No. 3 and No. 4 seeds are level at 6 wins apiece. This is the 4th time in the Open Era that the No. 3 and No. 4 seeds have met in the Australian Open men's singles final – after 1988 (when No. 3 Mats Wilander defeated No. 4 Pat Cash), 2005 (when No. 4 Marat Safin defeated No. 3 Lleyton Hewitt) and 2023 (when No. 4 Djokovic defeated No. 3 Stefanos Tsitsipas).

A new name on the trophy

The winner of today's match will become the 27th man in the Open Era to win the Australian Open title – and the first new men's champion here since Wawrinka won his only Australian Open title to date in 2014. Since then, Djokovic has won 6 titles here (2015, 2016, 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2023), Roger Federer won 2 titles (2017 and 2018) and Nadal has won one title (2022).

Breaking the Djokovic-Nadal duopoly

Between them, Djokovic and Nadal have won 18 of the last 22 Grand Slam men's singles titles (since 2018 Roland Garros), with Dominic Thiem (2020 US Open), Medvedev (2021 US Open) and Alcaraz (2022 US Open and 2023 Wimbledon) the only other players to have won major titles in that time. Djokovic has won 12 Grand Slam titles in that time, with Nadal claiming 6 Grand Slam titles.

Medvedev has faced either Djokovic or Nadal in his 5 previous Grand Slam final appearances, losing a final to each at both the Australian Open and the US Open, but defeating Djokovic to win the 2021 US Open title.

Australian Open final appearances

By reaching his 3rd Australian Open final, Medvedev has become the 13th player in the Open Era to reach the Australian Open final on 3 or more occasions – and the 4th active player to do so, after Djokovic, Nadal and Murray.

Having reached the final here for the first time, Sinner has become the 9th active player to reach an Australian Open men's singles final. He is the 56th man in the Open Era – and the 105th in history – to reach the final here.

Grand Slam final appearances

By reaching his 6th Grand Slam final, Medvedev has become the 19th player in the Open Era to reach 6 or more Grand Slam men's singles finals. He is in 4th place on the list for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached among active players.

Sinner has become the 18th active player to reach a Grand Slam men's singles final. He is the 112th man in the Open Era – and the 264th in history – to reach a Grand Slam final.

Most matches won in 2024

The winner of tonight's match will go joint-3rd on the list for most Tour-level match-wins in 2024 – and will be the only player in the Top 10 on the list to retain an unbeaten record this season.

Continuing the momentum from 2023

Since the beginning of the 2023 season, Medvedev and Sinner have won more men's singles matches than any other players on Tour. Medvedev finished top of the list for most Tour-level match-wins in 2023 with a 66-18 win-loss record – ahead of Alcaraz (65-12) and Sinner (64-15). Sinner's performance here has seen him overtake Alcaraz in 2nd place on the list for most matches won in 2023-24.

Medvedev and Sinner have also won more matches on hard courts than any other men on Tour since the beginning of last season. Medvedev ended the 2023 season with most Tour-level match-wins on hard courts with a 49-12 win-loss record, with Sinner in 2nd place on the list with a 45-9 win-loss record – and the 2 retain the Top 2 places on the list for most matches won on hard courts in 2023-24.

A 10th meeting for Medvedev and Sinner but their first at a Grand Slam. Medvedev won the pair's first 6 meetings, but Sinner ended that losing streak by defeating Medvedev for the first time in the final at Beijing in October last year and has also won their 2 subsequent meetings.

This is the pair's 5th meeting in a Tour-level final. All 4 of their previous meetings in finals came during the 2023 season, with Medvedev winning in the finals at both Rotterdam and Miami-1000 before Sinner won in the finals at both Beijing and Vienna.

This is the 3rd match between a pair of Top 5 players at the Australian Open this year, after Sinner's victories over No. 5 Andrey Rublev in the quarterfinals and No. 1 Novak Djokovic in the semifinals. Sinner's victories against Rublev and Djokovic were his first victories against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, having previously lost all 8 matches he had played against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, including his 2 previous matches against Top 5 players at the Australian Open.

Sinner has won 9 of his last 10 matches against Top 5 players at Tour-level, with his only defeat against a Top 5 player in that time coming against Djokovic in the final at the 2023 ATP Finals. He has a 13-20 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

Medvedev is bidding to defeat a Top 5 player at the Australian Open for the 2nd time. He has a 1-3 win-loss record against Top 5 players here, with his only victory coming against No. 4 Stefanos Tsitsipas in the semifinals in 2022. He has a 4-8 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams overall.

Medvedev has won one of his last 5 matches against Top 5 players at Tour-level, with his only victory against a Top 5 player in that time coming against No. 5 Rublev in the group stage at the 2023 ATP Finals. He has a 15-28 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to win his first Australian Open title. This is his 8th Australian Open appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Medvedev is bidding to win his 2nd Grand Slam title and become the **32nd player in the Open Era – and 75th in history – to win multiple Grand Slam men’s singles titles**. He would become the 6th active player to win multiple Grand Slam men’s singles titles – after Novak Djokovic (24 Grand Slam titles), Rafael Nadal (22), Andy Murray and Stan Wawrinka (both 3), and Carlos Alcaraz (2).
- If Medvedev wins his 2nd Grand Slam title here on his 8th Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will go **joint-5th on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men’s singles title**, alongside Yevgeny Kafelnikov.

- Medvedev is bidding to win his **first Australian Open title on his 3rd appearance in the final**, having fallen to Djokovic in the final here in 2021 and fallen to Nadal in the final here in 2022. He has a 1-4 win-loss record in Grand Slam finals overall.

- The Australian Open is Medvedev’s **joint-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of finals reached, alongside the US Open, and his 2nd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won.

- By reaching his 3rd final here, Medvedev has become the **13th man in the Open Era to reach the Australian Open final on 3 or more occasions** – and the 4th active player to do so, after Djokovic, Nadal and Murray.

- By reaching his 6th Grand Slam final, Medvedev has become the **19th player in the Open Era to reach 6 or more Grand Slam men's singles finals**. He is in 4th place on the list for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached among active players – behind Djokovic (36 Grand Slam finals reached), Nadal (30) and Murray (11).
- Medvedev's victories against Emil Ruusuvuori in the 2nd round and Alexander Zverev in the semifinals here this year were his **3rd and 4th successful comebacks from 0-2 down**. He also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Marin Cilic in the 3rd round at 2021 Wimbledon and to defeat Felix Auger-Aliassime in the quarterfinals here in 2022. He also won a 5-set match against Hubert Hurkacz in the quarterfinals here this week. He has a 5-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at the Australian Open and a 7-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- By recording 2 successful comebacks from 0-2 down so far here this year, Medvedev has become the **3rd player in the Open Era to record 2 successful comebacks from 0-2 down en route to a Grand Slam final** – after 1981 Australian Open runner-up Steve Denton (who recovered from 0-2 down to defeat both Kevin Curren in the 2nd round and John Alexander in the 3rd round) and 1995 Australian Open runner-up Pete Sampras (who recovered from 0-2 down to defeat both Magnus Larsson in the round of 16 and Jim Courier in the quarterfinals).
- If Medvedev wins today, he will become the **2nd player in the Open Era to record 2 successful comebacks from 0-2 down en route to a Grand Slam title** – after Djokovic, who recorded 2 successful comebacks from 0-2 down en route to the title at 2021 Roland Garros, recovering from 0-2 down to defeat both Lorenzo Musetti in the round of 16 and Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final.
- If Medvedev records a successful comeback from 0-2 down today, he will become the **4th player in the Open Era to record 3 successful comebacks from 0-2 at a Grand Slam tournament** – after Nicolas Escude at the 1998 Australian Open, Albert Costa at 2003 Roland Garros, and Tommy Robredo at 2013 Roland Garros.
- If Medvedev wins today's match in 5 sets, he will become the **5th player in the Open Era to record 4 five-set victories at a Grand Slam tournament** – after Denton at the 1981 Australian Open, Todd Martin at 1994 Wimbledon, Nicolas Lapentti at the 1999 Australian Open and Albert Costa at 2003 Roland Garros. He would become the first player in the Open Era to record 4 five-set victories en route to a Grand Slam title.
- If Medvedev wins today, he will become the **6th player in the Open Era to record 3 five-set victories en route to a Grand Slam title** – after Bjorn Borg at both 1974 Roland Garros and 1977 Wimbledon, Stefan Edberg at the 1992 US Open, Gustavo Kuerten at 1997 Roland Garros, Roger Federer at the 2017 Australian Open and Alcaraz at the 2022 US Open.
- **Last year here**, Medvedev reached the 3rd round (l. Sebastian Korda). It was his earliest defeat at the Australian Open since 2018, when he fell to Chung Hyeon in the 2nd round.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2023**, Medvedev reached the semifinals at Wimbledon for the first time (l. Alcaraz) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Thiago Seyboth Wild).
- Medvedev's **best results in 2023** were winning the titles at Rotterdam (d. Sinner), Doha (d. Murray), Dubai (d. Rublev), Miami-1000 (d. Sinner) and Rome-1000 (d. Holger Rune). He also finished runner-up at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz), Beijing (l. Sinner) and Vienna (l. Sinner). With a 66-18 win-loss record last season, he led the Tour for most matches won in 2023. He did not contest a Tour-level event prior to the Australian Open this year.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (comprising Djokovic, Nadal, Federer and Murray) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 3 but will rise to No. 2 on Monday if he wins tonight's match.
- Medvedev reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, l. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.

- **SINNER** is bidding to become the first Italian player in history to win an Australian Open singles title. This is his 5th Australian Open appearance and his 17th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **3rd Italian player to win a Grand Slam men's singles title** – after Nicola Pietrangeli, who won back-to-back Roland Garros titles in 1959-60, and Adriano Panatta, who won the title at 1976 Roland Garros.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **5th Italian player, man or woman, to win a Grand Slam singles title**. Flavia Pennetta, who won the women's singles title at the 2015 US Open, is the most-recent Italian player to have won a Grand Slam singles title.

- At 22 years 165 days, Sinner is bidding to become the **youngest player to win the Australian Open men's singles title since 2008**, when Novak Djokovic won the title here aged 20 years 250 days.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **6th player in the Open Era to win the Davis Cup with his nation before winning the men's singles title at the next Australian Open tournament** – and the first since Djokovic, who won the Davis Cup title with Serbia in 2010 before winning his 2nd title here in 2011.

- The Australian Open is Sinner's **most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won and finals reached.

- By reaching the final here, Sinner has become the **first Italian player in history, man or woman, to reach an Australian Open singles final**. The previous best performance by an Italian player here was Matteo Berrettini's semifinal finish in 2022.
- By reaching his first Grand Slam final, Sinner has become the **5th Italian player in history to reach a Grand Slam men's singles final** – after Pietrangeli (who reached the finals at Rolan Garros in 1959-61 and 1964), Berrettini (2021 Wimbledon), Giorgio de Stefani (1932 Roland Garros) and Panatta (1976 Roland Garros).
- By reaching his first Grand Slam final, Sinner has also become the **9th Italian player in history, man or woman, to reach a Grand Slam singles final** – after Pietrangeli (4 Grand Slam final appearances), Francesca Schiavone (2), and Berrettini, De Stefani, Panatta, Pennetta, Sara Errani and Roberta Vinci (all one).
- By reaching the final here, Sinner has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best result at the Grand Slams was reaching the semifinals at Wimbledon last year (l. Djokovic). His previous best result at the Australian Open was reaching the quarterfinals in 2022 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).

- By defeating Djokovic in the semifinals here, Sinner **ended Djokovic's 33-match winning streak at the Australian Open** and became the first player to defeat Djokovic here since Chung Hyeon in the round of 16 in 2018. He also became the first player to defeat Djokovic in either a semifinal or a final here – Djokovic had won all 10 of his previous semifinal matches at the Australian Open and has won all 10 Australian Open finals he has contested.
- **Last year here**, Sinner reached the round of 16. He defeated Kyle Edmund, Tomas Martin Etcheverry and Marton Fucsovics before falling to Tsitsipas.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2023**, Sinner reached the round of 16 at the US Open, where he defeated Yannick Hanfmann, Lorenzo Sonego and Stan Wawrinka before falling to Alexander Zverev, but fell in the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Alexandre Muller, l. Daniel Altmaier).
- Sinner's **best result in 2023** was winning his first Masters-1000 level title at Toronto-1000 (d. Alex de Minaur) in his 3rd Masters-1000 final. He also won the titles at Montpellier (d. Maxime Cressy), Beijing (d. Medvedev) and Vienna (d. Medvedev) and finished runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Medvedev), Miami-1000 (l. Medvedev) and the ATP Finals (l. Djokovic).
- Sinner has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open – his only victory in a 5-set match here came against Fucsovics in the 3rd round last year, when he recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets for the only time in his career to date. His 2 defeats in 5-set matches here came against Denis Shapovalov in the 1st round in 2021 and against Tsitsipas in the round of 16 last year. He has a 5-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Sinner reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 4 after winning the title at Beijing in October last year. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023**, winning all 5 matches he played across singles and doubles at the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga in November. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 11-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. As defending champions, Italy have automatically qualified for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
