Countdown to Davis Cup World Group Semifinals and Play-offs

All-star line-up for this weekend's action



The 2003 Davis Cup by BNP Paribas World Group semifinals get underway on Friday, with Australia taking on Switzerland and Spain battling Argentina for a place in this year's Final. In addition, Play-off ties on five continents will decide which nations will claim the eight remaining spots in the 2004 World Group. There are also eight zonal ties to complete the promotions and relegations between zonal groups in 2003.

Three of this year's four Grand Slam champions will be in action, as Roland Garros champion and US Open runner-up Juan Carlos Ferrero spearheads Spain's campaign against the visiting Argentines in Malaga, and Wimbledon winner Roger Federer heads the Swiss challenge to Australia in Melbourne. Andy Roddick, riding high on his US Open success, bids to extend his 19-match winning streak when he represents the USA in its World Group Play-off tie in the Slovak Republic.

Spain has home advantage in its bid to return to the final after its triumph in 2000, and Ferrero is joined by fellow Roland Garros champs Albert Costa and Carlos Moya, plus Alex Corretja. Argentina has had late injury worries, with both Guillermo Coria and David Nalbandian doubtful, but Gaston Gaudio and Agustin Calleri will be more than capable of filling their shoes, and just as comfortable as the Spaniards on the clay court in Malaga.

Lleyton Hewitt is joined by Mark Philippoussis for likely singles duty against Switzerland in Melbourne, with Wayne Arthurs and Todd Woodbridge the possible doubles duo. Philippoussis will have the perfect opportunity to exact revenge on Federer for his defeat in the Wimbledon final, and this time the surface will be hard court and the surroundings the Australian Open's Rod Laver Arena. Australia leads previous meetings with Switzerland 2-0, but will not be complacent given that Federer is undefeated in nine matches and 26 sets in the competition. The 21-year-old's teammates are Michel Kratochvil, Ivo Heuberger and George Bastl.

In the Davis Cup by BNP Paribas World Group Play-offs, Germany hosts Belarus, Morocco hosts Great Britain, Netherlands hosts India and Ecuador hosts Romania. Belgium travels to Austria, Brazil goes north to Canada, the Czech Republic travels to Thailand and the USA visits the Slovak Republic.

The top four players in the ATP Champions Race 2003 have qualified for the Tennis Masters Cup Houston, the year-end event where the best eight players of 2003 collide. Andy Roddick and Juan Carlos Ferrero have now been joined by Andre Agassi and Roger Federer (see page 3). The top seven players in the Race automatically qualify for the eight player 2003 Tennis Masters Cup in Houston, which is co-owned by the ITF, Grand Slams and ATP.

ITF and Sportev to launch DavisCup.tv website

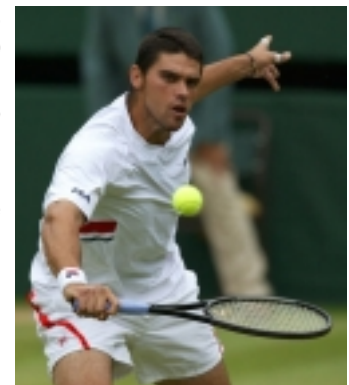

Wimbledon dates stay the same for 2005

The All England Club confirmed on Thursday that Wimbledon will remain in its current calendar slot for 2005, and will be played Monday 20 June to Sunday 3 July.

The announcement came after earlier debate about moving The Championships back by a week to accommodate a third week of tournaments between Roland Garros and Wimbledon.

For 2006 and beyond, the dates for Wimbledon remain provisional as discussions continue on whether to increase the gap between the two Grand Slam tournaments. In 2004, Wimbledon will run from Monday 21 June to Sunday 4 July.

Nations Senior Cup schedule announced

The fourth Nations Senior Cup will be held in Marbella, Spain on 25-27 September, on clay courts at the Puente Romano Hotel. The event, sanctioned by the ITF, is a team event for retired players contested by France, Spain, Germany and Sweden. The format is two singles matches, No. 1 player v No. 1 player, No. 2 v No. 2, and one doubles match in knockout competition.

Spain is the defending Nations Senior World Champion, having won the event when it was last played in 2001. A schedule is shown below, and more information can be found at www.seniorcup.com.

Federer and Agassi next to qualify for Tennis Masters Cup



Roger Federer and Andre Agassi have become the latest players to qualify for the season-ending Tennis Masters Cup, following in the footsteps of Andy Roddick and Juan Carlos Ferrero to ensure that all four Grand Slam tournament winners in 2003 will be making the trip to Houston.

For Wimbledon champion Federer, this will mark his second appearance in the Tennis Masters Cup, having reached the semifinals in Shanghai last year. Australian Open champion Agassi has played in all three previous Tennis Masters Cup events, and finished runner-up to Gustavo Kuerten at the inaugural event in Lisbon in 2000.

Ferrero and Roddick claimed their places last week following their performances at the US Open.



Ball and surface confirmed for Olympics

The surface of the Olympic Tennis Event has now been confirmed as Decoturf II, the same surface as the US Open. ITF partner Wilson has also agreed to provide the same Wilson Tennis Ball for Athens as is used at the US Open.



Nations get ready for Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas and Junior Fed Cup



The second editions of the Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas and Junior Fed Cup, the ITF 16 & Under team competitions, get underway on Tuesday 16 September at the ETUF EV Tennisreige, Essen, Germany. Sixteen boys teams and sixteen girls teams will be fighting it out over six days of competition on the clay courts to take home the coveted Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas and Junior Fed Cup trophies.

The winning nations in 2002, Spain boys and Belarus girls, will not be back to defend their titles having failed to come through the tough European qualifying rounds. There are however some very strong teams that will be eager to take their place on the winner's rostrum.

Under the title of the World Youth Cup, the ETUF EV Tennisreige hosted the 16 & Under team competitions for the first time in 1995. That year, the home teams made the event extra special by both reaching the final, the German boys defeating Czech Republic 3-0 to become champions, and the German girls losing 2-1 to a French team led by Amelie Mauresmo.

This year, the German boys' team has an equally good chance of becoming local heroes. The team will be led by Mischa Zverev, currently No. 22 in the ITF junior rankings, and accompanying him will be two other players inside the top 200 rankings. Providing strong opposition for the Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas title will be the USA, who field a strong team that includes two players, Alex Kuznetsov and Timothy Neilly, currently ranked inside the ITF top 100. Venezuela, winners of the South American qualifying competition, could also prove a threat on their favoured red clay.

Undoubted favourites for the Junior Fed Cup title must be the Netherlands, led by Michaella Krajicek. Krajicek was runner-up at this year's US Open and briefly held the No.1 ranking before surrendering it to US Open champion Kirsten Flipkens. The Dutch team also includes Bibiane Schoofs who along with Krajicek won the ITF U14 team competition, World Junior Tennis, in 2002.

Challenging the Netherlands will be Poland, who field the same team as they did for the 2002 World Junior Tennis Finals. They were defeated there in the final by the Netherlands 3-0, so will no doubt be looking for some revenge. Russia and USA could also be serious contenders for the title, as could Israel, who qualified this year for the first time in history. Leading the Israeli girls will be Shahar Peer, ranked No. 23 in the ITF rankings.

Competition will begin on Tuesday 16 September with three days of round robin play followed by three days of knock-out competition. Each team will play five matches with one day off.

Wheelchair Tennis exhibition at Romanian Open

A rain-soaked Romanian Open in Bucharest provided the backdrop for the latest demonstration of wheelchair tennis. Having been scheduled for Saturday but delayed due to the weather, hundreds of spectators at the ATP event in Bucharest finally got to see the exhibition on Sunday on the clay courts of the Arenele Progresul BNR.



The wheelchair participants, Romania's Dacian Maxim and Gheorghe Filip, had been playing regularly for just a few weeks as part of the Silver Fund project, and had been prepared for the exhibition by ITF Wheelchair Tennis Development Officer Mark Bullock and Irina Cefnea, a local coach who has been assisting the ITF coaches.

The exhibition followed a singles match between Ilie Nastase and Argentina's Guillermo Vilas, and Vilas joined Maxim and Filip for the demonstration, marking the first time that wheelchair tennis has received this kind of exposure in Romania. The night before the exhibition Nastase had appeared on a the popular Romanian television programme 'Surprise, Surprise' and had spoken about wheelchair tennis.



Bullock will remain in Romania for a further two weeks working with the players based at Motivation Romania in Bucharest. There will be three coaching sessions per day for men, women and quads. He plans to visit a school for the disabled in another city and hold several meetings with key people who may be able to assist with the development of the sport in the country.

ITF Vets Team Competitions: next up Group B

After the success of the Group A Vets World Championships in Germany, the attention moves to the Group B events, which will take place in Antalya, Turkey in October. The 11 ITF Vets Team Competitions which make up this group will be held at two venues on 20-26 October and have attracted an entry of 157 teams representing 32 nations.

The competitions will be fought out over six age categories for the men, ranging from over 55 to over 80, and five for the women, from over 55 to over 75. In all categories, the champion nations from the 2002 Group B Championships in Austria will be defending their titles.

This year marks only the second time that the Queen's Cup (Women 75+) has been held, while the second longest-running team competition, the Austria Cup (Men 55+), is being contested for the 27th year. Among the highlights will be the Canadian team's bid to capture the Jack Crawford Cup (Men 70+) for the fourth year in succession.

Mauritius Tennis Federation opens new National Training Centre

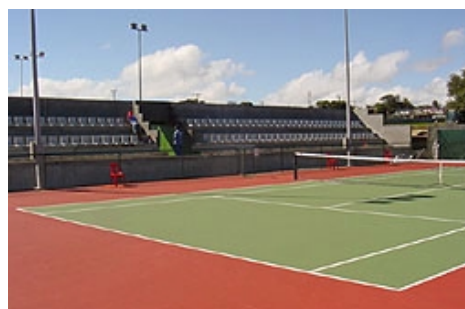
The Mauritius Tennis Federation (MTF) has finally realised its long-cherished dream of having its own National Training Centre. With funding and co-operation from a number of bodies, the new facility, at the Petit Camp in Phoenix, was inaugurated in July in a ceremony attended by many dignitaries including the Minister of Sport for the island.

The hosting of the 6th Indian Ocean Games held earlier this month proved to be the catalyst for the building work. Knowing that they had this important regional event to host, the MTF sought private sponsorship as well as their government's backing. The government assisted by giving the land, which is in a convenient location to the rest of the island, for a nominal fee for a period of 20 years.

Construction in Mauritius is very expensive and the total budget for the facility was 15 million Mauritius Rupees (US\$ 500,000). The MTF received a grant of US\$ 20,000 from the Grand Slam Development Fund, administered by the ITF, towards the establishment of this National Training Centre, and the remainder of the funding was sought from the private sector.

The ownership by a Federation of their own facility is very important to the development of tennis in a country. Having to depend on private clubs and hotels to gain access to courts can be an arduous affair and very expensive, hence limiting the amount of programmes and tournaments that can be run. Despite the fact that building a tennis facility is in itself very expensive and takes a lot of hard work, it does provide a Federation with the flexibility to run its own programmes however they wish, and in turn has a positive impact on the development of tennis.

The new Mauritian National Training Centre will be used to run the ITF-backed School Tennis Initiative and Performance Tennis Initiative as well for holding national tournaments.

ITHF to host Maureen Connolly Challenge Trophy

The International Tennis Hall of Fame in Newport will host the Maureen Connolly Challenge Trophy on 2-4 October 2003.

This is the 30th anniversary of the event, which is a contest between the United States and Great Britain featuring a team of five girls 18 and under players from each nation. Eleven matches are played over three days, consisting of nine singles matches and two doubles. The event is officially sanctioned by the USTA and the Lawn Tennis Association of Great Britain.

The United States leads the head-to-head, having won 18 of the previous 28 Challenges. In 2000, the Maureen Connolly Challenge Trophy ended in a tie, and the event was not held in 2001 due to the tragedy in New York City.

Matches will be held on Bill Talbert Stadium Court at the ITHF and will start at 10:00am. On Thursday 2 October, there will be opening ceremonies followed by four matches, on Friday, four matches, and on Saturday, three matches, closing ceremonies and the trophy presentation.

ITF 14 and Under Caribbean Development Championships 2003

This year's ITF 14 & Under Caribbean Development Championships took place in St Vincent & the Grenadines on 26–31 August. Twelve countries from the region took part in the Championships, which saw Trinidad and Tobago take first place in the final country ranking and Grenada finish in second place.

The singles event was run on a round robin basis on days one and two, progressing to the main event which was held over the next four days using the feed-in consolation system, thus allowing the competition to progress as normal but ensuring that every player, win or lose, played a match every day. Results of the players in the round robin event determined whether they went on to the main draw or into the consolation event. At the end of the tournament, all players in the draw were ranked in merit order. On this basis, the boys' event was won by Richard Chung from Trinidad & Tobago and the girls' winner was compatriot Shenelle Mohammed.

The performance of these players went a long way to helping Trinidad & Tobago take the team trophy. This trophy is awarded to the nation that accumulates the highest number of Championship points in the singles and doubles events. The best three singles results and one doubles result count towards the teams' total.

"The organisation of the event, undertaken by the St Vincent & The Grenadines Lawn Tennis Association for the third consecutive year, was excellent and all players enjoyed the high level of competition and kind hospitality extended by the locals," said Gustavo Granitto, ITF Development Officer for Central America & Caribbean. "The combination of the round robin and consolation events gives all players the opportunity to play the maximum number of singles and doubles matches, and keeps the competition live right up to the last set."

A similar event for the Central American nations will take place in Panama 29 September-5 October.
