Belgians name Fed Cup team

The Belgian Tennis Federation has announced that their team for the Fed Cup World Group Semifinals and Final will be Els Callens, Caroline Maes, Elke Clijsters and Kirsten Flipkens.

Belgium will play the United States in the semifinals on 19-20 November at Moscow's Olympic Stadium, with the American team already announced as Meghann Shaughnessy, Lisa Raymond, Alexandra Stevenson and Martina Navratilova. The winner of this tie will face the winner of the France versus Russia semifinal in the final on 22-23 November.

Flipkens, 17, is currently No. 1 in the ITF Junior World Rankings and is in contention to end the year in the top spot following her back-to-back Grand Slam victories at Wimbledon and the US Open. She will be making her Fed Cup debut in Moscow.

The other teenager on the team, 18-year-old Elke Clijsters, was 2002 ITF Junior World Doubles Champion. This will be her second Fed Cup tie, having played doubles in Belgium's quarterfinal loss to Italy in July 2002.

Callens was part of the 2001 Belgium team that won the nation's first Fed Cup title in 2001.

Davis Cup Final series tickets sell out

Series tickets for the three days of the Davis Cup by BNP Paribas final between Australia and Spain sold out on Monday within half an hour of going on sale. The tickets were made available in Australia at 12 noon to ensure that fans from all states had equal access.

One-day ground pass tickets for are still available, allowing 1,200 people a day to watch the action on a giant video screen in Garden Square at Melbourne Park, with bars and additional entertainment on site. ITF activities

Both ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti and ITF Executive Vice President Juan Margets will be travelling to Paris this week for a meeting of the ITF Board of Directors.

It will be the first gathering of the new Board since their election at the AGM in September.



Spain's Carlos Moya is the seventh player to qualify for the Tennis Masters Cup in Houston. Moya clinched his place on Friday as a result of No. 10 Sebastien Grosjean losing his quarterfinal match in St. Petersburg, Russia. The 27-year-old Moya joins countryman and ATP Champions Race leader Juan Carlos Ferrero in the Tennis Masters Cup. David Nalbandian, Mark Philippoussis, Sebastien Grosjean, Paradorn Srichaphan and Younes El Aynaoui are in contention for the final spot, which will be determined at the BNP Paribas Masters in Paris this week. A player's ATP Champions Race position is based on points received from the four Grand Slams, nine Tennis Masters Series tournaments, and his best five results from International Series events. The top seven players in the Race automatically qualify for the eight-player 2003 Tennis Masters Cup in Houston, which is co-owned by the ITF, Grand Slams and ATP.

Amelie Mauresmo qualifies for WTA Tour Championships

France's Amelie Mauresmo has become the fourth woman to qualify for the season-ending WTA Tour Championships being held 5-10 November at the STAPLES Center in Los Angeles.

Mauresmo, currently ranked No. 7 in the world, joins Justin Henin-Hardenne, Kim Clijsters and Jennifer Capriati in the eight-player round robin singles field. Serena Williams and Lindsay

Davenport qualified but withdrew due to injuries.

Seven are in contention for the last four singles spots, which will be decided in the next two weeks: Elena Dementieva, Venus Williams, Anastasia Myskina, Chanda Rubin, Ai Sugiyama, Vera Zvonareva and Nadia Petrova.

The last of the pairings for the four-team doubles event has also been decided, with Cara Black/Elena Likhovtseva joining Virginia Ruano Pascual/Paola Suarez, Clijsters/Sugiyama and Martina Navratilova/Svetlana Kuznetsova.

Nations gather at ITF Worldwide Coaches Workshop

The 13th ITF Worldwide Coaches Workshop came to a close on Saturday 25 October. The biennial event was organised by the ITF and the Portuguese Tennis Federation (FPT) and attracted more than 300 coaches from 100 countries worldwide.

"It's been a fantastic week," said Richard Gonzales, School Tennis Initiative Co-ordinator of Uruguay. "The quality of the presentations both on and off court by experts in all aspects of high performance tennis has been first class. Plus the chance to mix with coaches from all over the world, makes this event very special."

Among the coaches presenting at this year's Workshop were Bob Brett, former coach to Boris Becker, Niki Pilic, ex-top ten player and former doubles world No. 1, and Javier Duarte, Spain's former Davis Cup captain and ex-coach of Alex Corretja and Alberto Berasategui.

Speaking at the closing dinner, ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti said, "The ITF regards its relationship with the coaching community as one of the most effective ways of growing the sport of tennis throughout the world... Coaches play a vital role in the development of players at every level and I am gratified to see that so many coaches have taken the opportunity to join us in Vilamoura."

FPT President and co-host Manuel Valle-Domingues also confirmed Portugal's commitment to coaches education by signing an agreement with the ITF to use the ITF's material in Portugal's coaches education programme. More than 80 countries worldwide are currently using the ITF coaching syllabae in their coaching programmes.

New Davis Cup Captain for Great Britain

Jeremy Bates, the LTA's Head of Performance, will be adding to his duties next year as he takes over the role of Great Britain Davis Cup Captain from Roger Taylor on 1 January. In a new move, team selection will be made by Bates in consultation with senior figures at the LTA. David Felgate, who retains overall responsibility for nurturing talent in Great Britain, is likely to be foremost among those.

Bates, 41, who played for Great Britain in 51 matches over 20 ties between 1985 and 1994, initially has a one-year contract. His task in that year will be to try to lead Britain back into the World Group, after the defeat to Morocco in the Davis Cup by BNP Paribas World Group Play-offs in September. Great Britain face the winners of the Finland v Luxembourg tie in the second round of Europe/Africa Zone Group I, on 9-11 April, with the winner earning a place in the Play-offs next September.

ITF Level 2 Officiating School Buenos Aires, Argentina 23-26 October

An ITF Level 2 Officiating School was held in Buenos Aires, Argentina on 23-26 October. The School was taught by ITF/Grand Slam officials Andi Egli and Jorge Dias.

ITF Level 2 Schools are the second stage in the process of training to be a tennis official, providing an opportunity to gain the ITF White Badge Certification. Students are assessed through both a written exam and practical sessions.

New men's champions crowned at 2003 Camozzi Wheelchair Tennis Doubles Masters

A new venue and a new title sponsor for the 2003 Camozzi Wheelchair Tennis Doubles Masters in Brescia, Italy, also brought new champions in the men's event, with top seeds Satoshi Saida (JPN) and Martin Legner (AUT) going one better than their runners-up spot last year to claim the spoils.

Saida and Legner beat last year's champions Kai Schrammeyer (GER) and Stephen Welch (USA) in the pool stage of the competition while second seeds Jayant Mistry (GBR) and Michael Jeremiasz (FRA) finally dethroned Schrammeyer and Welch in the semifinals, recovering well to win 16 63 62.

Meanwhile, 2000 finalists Robin Ammerlaan and Eric Stuurman (NED) took Saida and Legner to a final set tiebreak in their semifinal, but the top seeds came through to snatch victory 64 26 76(4). Another three-set thriller loomed in the final, but Saida and Legner just managed to secure a second set tie-break against Mistry and Jeremiasz to win 63 76.

The women's event began with an upset for Dutch second seeds Sharon Walraven and Jiske Griffioen, who lost 36 64 75 to Betty Klave (NED) and Florence Gravellier (FRA) in their opening pool match. Ultimately however it was Klave and Gravellier who lost out on a place in the semifinals as Japanese duo Mie Yaosa and Chiyoko Ohmae joined Walraven and Griffioen in the last four.

Yuka Chokyu (CAN) and Beth Arnoult (USA) finished second to two-time Doubles Masters champions Esther Vergeer and Maaïke Smit in their pool, but found Walraven and Griffioen back on form in the semifinals as the second seeds secured a convincing 63 61 win. Vergeer and Smit's 62 62 win over Yaosa and Ohmae in the other semifinal set up an all-Dutch final where Vergeer and Smit clinched another 62 62 victory and their third successive title.

An first-ever Quad event was contested by four of the world's top-ranked partnerships, the competition producing some very tight matches. Top seeds Peter Norfolk (GBR) and Sarah Hunter (CAN) defeated second seeds David Wagner and Rick Draney of the United States 64 63 in the pool, and the two partnerships met again in the final, with Norfolk and Hunter this time claiming a 64 61 victory to become the first Quad champions.

The inaugural Camozzi Doubles Masters began with Vergeer, Legner, Jeremiasz and Italian player Ivano Boriva playing an exhibition match in front of an audience packed with schoolchildren. The week's festivities also included a concert on Saturday night, where Stephen Welch was in party mood despite defeat in the Men's semifinals as he entertained his fellow players with his piano skills.

Six of the players from the men's field and five from the women's field at the Camozzi Doubles Masters now move on to Amersfoort, the Netherlands, for this week's 10th Anniversary NEC Wheelchair Tennis Masters. The top eight ranked men, representing eight different countries, and eight of the top ten women, headed by defending champions David Hall (AUS) and Esther Vergeer (NED), will fight it out from Tuesday 28 October to Sunday 2 November for the most prestigious title on the NEC Wheelchair Tennis Tour. United States dominates ITF Vets Team Competitions



The United States captured the majority of the titles at this year's ITF Vets Team Competitions for the Group B age categories. Their prowess in Antalya, Turkey spanned all the age groups from the youngest at 55+ to the eldest, 80+ for the men, and 75+ for the women.

USA regained its winning form in the Gardner Mulloy Cup (Men's 80+) and Bitsy Grant Cup (Men's 75+), beating Australia and France respectively in the finals. The Americans have won these events more times than any other nation. Additionally, USA retained two titles, both the Althea Gibson Cup (Women's 70+) and Queen's Cup (Women's 75+) returning to the States for the second year running.

If rules of logic were valid in tennis then top seed Canada would be celebrating its fourth consecutive victory in the Jack Crawford Cup. However fortune was favouring their neighbours this year, USA defeating Canada 2-1 in the final of the Men's 70+ competition after Canada had won the first match. The USA was also victorious in the Maureen Connolly Cup (Women's 55+) and the Austria Cup (Men's 55+), bringing its total of titles for the week to seven.

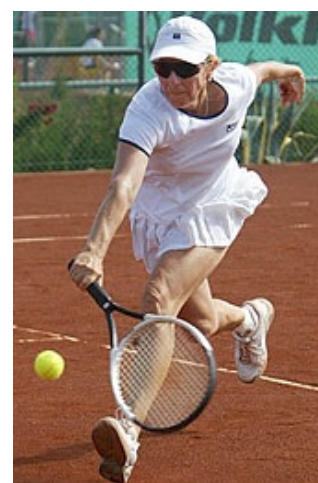
The Austrian 60+ team stood out as the most dominant force in the Von Cramm Cup, defeating Australia 3-0 in the final. As one of only two nations along with the USA to retain their titles from last year, the Austrians were clearly delighted with their success. Peter Fuchs and world No. 1 Peter Pokorny remain undefeated in singles as they move on to the ITF Vets World Championships this week.

Mexico was one of just a few nations to get past the USA during the ITF Vets Team Competitions, playing an amazing semifinal tie on Friday in the Britannia Cup to upset the No. 1 seeds. Gabino Palafox and Ricardo Narcio's impressive form in the singles took Mexico to their first final in the Men's 65 event. The final was certain to be a showpiece tie as Germany, runner-up in 2002, was determined to reverse its fortune. After the two singles matches the Germans' goal was realised to much delight, and they went on to a clean 3-0 sweep.

South Africa also enjoyed a first-time victory in the Kitty Godfree Cup, defeating defending champions USA. Janine Lieffrig, the No. 1 South African player and new to this 65+ age group, overpowered her opponent Dorothy Matthiesen with forceful play committing very few unforced errors. Matthiesen paid credit to the South African team whose No. 2 player Audrey Van Coller endured long singles matches all week as well as forming part of the doubles pairing.

Aside from the USA, only Germany managed to secure more than one top position. The No. 1 German player Heide Orth, who often competes with players ten years her junior, excelled in her own age group, the women's 60+ Alice Marble Cup, not dropping a single set in the six day tournament.

ITF Vets World Championships underway



Team competition made way for individual play as the 23rd ITF Vets World Championships (Group B) started on Sunday. The tournament has attracted over 500 entries from 30 nations, with every continent being well represented at the Club Ali Bey Manavgat resort in Antalya, Turkey. There are 24 singles and doubles events spread across 12 age categories.

All the women who were crowned champions in Austria in 2002 have returned to defend their titles. In the Women's 55 singles, Marie Pinterova (HUN) bids to add to the ten Vets' world titles she has already, but will have to avenge her defeat to Carol Campling (AUS) in last year's final and stave off the challenge of Petro Kruger (RSA). Heide Orth (GER), the title holder, and Rosy Darmon (FRA), champion in 2000, are among the leading contenders in the Women's 60 singles, along with last year's runner-up Suella Steel (USA).

Dorothy Mathiessen (USA) bids for her third title in a row in the Women's 65 singles but countrywoman Doris Devries will be hoping to improve on the runner-up position that she has occupied for the last two years. The Women's 70 singles could prove to be the most competitive event, as 2002 victor Louise Russ (USA) is joined by runner-up Rita Lauder (GBR), 2001 champion Ruth Illingworth (GBR) and Mary Boswell (USA), the reigning world No. 1 in the age category. Elaine Mason (USA) goes for her fourth consecutive title in the Women's 75 singles and 2002 finalist Betty Eisenstein (USA) is also back.

The Men's 55 singles boasts three former champions: Hans Plotz (GER), Lito Alvarez (AUS) and Frank Briscoe (RSA), plus current world No. 1 Peter Adrigan (GER). Defending champion in the Men's 60 singles, Peter Pokorny (AUT), faces last year's finalist Stasys Labanauskas (LTU) and three players who were previously champions in younger age groups: Bob Howes (AUS), Giorgio Rohrich (ITA) and Jim Parker (USA). Top-ranked Bodo Nitsche (GER) has his first attempt at the Men's 65 singles title but faces stiff competition from 2001 champion Peter Froelich (AUS) and Jim Nelson (USA).

In the Men's 70s category Lorne Main and Ken Sinclair (CAN) will pair up in an attempt to win their tenth world doubles crown and are also strong contenders in singles, Main having won the title in 2001 and Sinclair in 2002. James Perley (USA), twice a former champion, and Henri Crutchet (FRA), runner-up in Austria, will also be in contention. Graydon Nichols (USA) will hope to go one better than last year's runner-up position in the Men's 75 singles.

The Men's 80 singles sees last year's finalists in contention again, champion Cornelius Marre (NED) and Frank Pitt (AUS), but a big danger will come from Robert Sherman, currently at No. 1 and winner of some six ITF Vets World Championships over the years. Claude De Montgolfier (FRA) is likely to fight it out with Albert Ritzenberg (USA) for the Men's 85 title.
