Federer secures seventh Grand Slam title

Amelie Mauresmo and Roger Federer took the singles titles at the Australian Open, the first Grand Slam of the year, but the event will be remembered for so much more than just their respective triumphs.

The run of unheralded Marcos Baghdatis, ranked No. 54 coming into the tournament, really captured the imagination both with the manner in which he conducted himself over the two weeks, and his exciting, uninhibited play. The 20 year-old Cypriot, who moved from Limassol to Paris at the age of 13 to train at the Mouratoglou Tennis Academy (formerly the Bob Brett Academy) on an Olympic Solidarity Youth Development Programme Scholarship, and who was a member of an ITF Development Touring Team in 1999 funded by the Grand Slam Development Fund, was stopped in the men's final by world No. 1 Roger Federer 57 75 60 62.

It is Federer's second Australian Open title and his seventh career Grand Slam crown. He became the first man since Pete Sampras in 1993/94 to win three consecutive Grand Slam titles, the first top seed to win in Melbourne since Andre Agassi in 2000, and the 12th different man to win multiple Australian Opens. Federer was overcome with emotion as he was presented with the trophy by his tennis idol, Rod Laver. "I don't forget, you know, that it's been a tough road for me," said Federer, "I amaze myself every time I do well. It's been so consistent, too, you know, winning so many slams, seven out of the last eleven I think it was. You know, it's quite incredible."

Baghdatis, who has risen to No. 27 on the INDESIT ATP Ranking, remarked "It's a dream come true, that's the only thing I can say, it was a great dream and it feels great."

Mauresmo won her first Grand Slam title when Justine Henin-Hardenne was forced to retire in Saturday's Final due to a gastrointestinal problem, with the Frenchwoman leading 61 20.

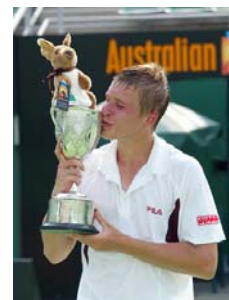

Debut wins in 2006 Australian Open Juniors

France's Alexandre Sidorenko and Russian Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova picked up debut Junior Grand Slam singles titles after two compelling finals at Melbourne Park on Sunday.

Sidorenko, who boasts Russian parentage, defeated Australia's Nick Lindahl 63 76 coming from 2-5 down in the second set and sneaking through a close tiebreak to wrap the match up in straight sets.





"It's very wonderful," said Sidorenko who was only ranked 130 in the world before coming to Australia. "I have no words to explain this. It's like a dream for me also to win a Grand Slam - in the juniors, but it's a Grand Slam. So for me, it's very nice. I'm very happy today."

"I have been waiting so long for this and really worked hard for this as well," said Mauresmo. "It's really a great achievement. I now have achieved everything I announced in my career: Fed Cup, being No. 1 and winning a Grand Slam. So I'm very proud of that, I have to say. I'm probably the proudest woman for now."

The other story from the women's draw was the return of three-time champion and six-time finalist Martina Hingis. She has come out of retirement and was playing the Australian Open for the first time since 2002. Hingis had a great singles tournament by reaching the quarterfinals, and went on to cap a fantastic return by winning the mixed doubles with Mahesh Bhupathi, defeating the sixth seeds Daniel Nestor and Elena Likhovtseva 63 63.

The women's doubles title saw history being made when Zi Yan and Jie Zheng became the first players from China to win a Grand Slam crown. The 12th seeds came back from match point down to defeat top seeds Lisa Raymond and Samantha Stosur 26 76 63. Yan and Zheng join the Olympic doubles gold medalists Tian Tian Sun and Ting Li in bringing tennis glory to their country. The men's doubles went to the Bryan twins, Bob and Mike, for the first time. They rallied from a set down to defeat the seventh seeds Martin Damm and Leander Paes 46 63 64.

Fourteen-year-old Pavlyuchenkova also had to pull off something of a comeback in her 16 62 63 win over top seed Caroline Wozniacki of Denmark. The Russian was a set and 0-2 down before clawing her way back into the match to extend her unbeaten run in Australia to 18 matches – she also won both warm-up events at Traralgon and Nottingham.

Pavlyuchenkova, who trains in Ostrava in the Czech Republic with her father Sergey, said "I'm so happy and I really wonder about it. I just played well. I don't know what to say because I thought that I couldn't win that tournament, that it was too difficult for me and I felt tired in the match."

The eighth-seeded Russian also won the Australian Open doubles title with Canada's Sharon Fichman overcoming Alize Cornet of France and Italian Corrina Dentoni 62 62 in a late Saturday night final, as extreme heat and thundery showers had delayed play. The Polish duo of Blazej Koniusz and Grzegorz Panfil were crowned boys' doubles champions after defeating Americans Kellen Damico and Nathaniel Schnugg 76 63.

The weather dominated the headlines for much of the week as temperatures soared into the forties before two days of showers brought the cool change. The juniors coped remarkably well with the difficult playing conditions. Although Marin Cilic (CRO), Donald Young (USA), Alexa Glatch (USA) and Marina Erakovic (NZL) were notable absentees, the boys' and girls' singles draw was very strong with tournament favourite Thiemo De Bakker from the Netherlands arriving in great form following success at the preceding events. However, he was defeated by No.16 seed Russian Pavel Chekhov who was in turn knocked out by special exempt Sidorenko in the semifinals.

Elsewhere in the tournament, Kei Nishikori became the first Japanese boy to reach the last eight of a Junior Grand Slam and his compatriot Ayumi Morita dazzled with her booming ground strokes until Wozniacki overcame her in the last four. No.2 seed Robin Roshardt, who hit with Roger Federer in preparation for the tournament, fell in the first round while the second seeded girl Raluca Olaru from Romania lost to Pavlyuchenkova in the semifinals. Kazakhstan's Amina Rakhim, a member of the ITF touring team, recorded her best result reaching the quarterfinals of a Grand Slam for the first time.



No.1 seeds triumph at Wheelchair Classic 8s

Michael Jeremiasz (FRA) and Esther Vergeer (NED) both justified their World No.1 rankings as they began their 2006 NEC Wheelchair Tennis Tour campaigns by winning the men's and women's singles titles on Sunday at the Wheelchair Classic 8s at the Australian Open.

Jeremiasz and his opponent Satoshi Saida (JPN) were both contesting their first Classic 8s singles finals. Saida had produced an upset in his opening match, defeating former champion Robin Ammerlaan (NED) in straight sets, but despite taking the first set of the final off Jeremiasz, it was the Frenchman who eventually proved the stronger, etching out a 57 64 63 win to earn the best possible start to the year, having missed last year's Classic 8s following shoulder surgery.

Vergeer had also missed last year's event while recuperating from surgery, but she maintained her unbeaten record in four Classic 8s challenges as she powered past compatriot and World No.3 Jiske Griffioen 64 60 in the women's final. The Dutch top seed had moved into the final after semifinal opponent Florence Gravelier (FRA) had been forced to retire with a shoulder injury when 0-5 down in the first set of their semifinal, while Griffioen had beaten defending champions Mie Yaosa (JPN) and second seed Sharon Walraven (NED) en route to the final.

Second seeds Jeremiasz and Saida had to be content with the runners-up prize in the men's doubles final against Ammerlaan and Martin Legner (AUT). An exciting match well worthy of Show Court Two at Melbourne Park ended in a Championship tiebreak with the Dutch-Austrian partnership securing a 36 63 10(5) victory.

Meanwhile, top seeds Griffioen and Vergeer stole the show in the women's doubles final on Margaret Court Arena, easing to a 62 60 win over Yuka Chokyu (CAN) and Mie Yaosa (JPN).

ITF/Tennis Europe North East Regional Training Camp

The sixth edition of the ITF/Tennis Europe North East Regional Training Camp for players aged 14 & under came to a successful conclusion in Siauliai, Lithuania last week. The camp, which ran 12-17 January, attracted 32 players and 12 coaches from the neighbouring countries of Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Belarus and the Ukraine. Hrvoje Zmajic, ITF/Tennis Europe Development Officer, conducted the camp along with the visiting coaches at the Siauliai Tennis School, which, with four indoor courts, a fitness centre and a lecture room, is well equipped to host such an event.

Players and coaches were involved in both on-court and off-court training sessions with the main objective of the camp being to improve tactical skills and develop a better understanding of tennis.

Hrvoje Zmajic said, "During the training camp we focused on combining high intensity with some fun games in the on-court and off-court practice sessions. The training camp was a great success which was due in part to the very good quality of the visiting coaches." Ramunas Grusas, Director of Siauliai Tennis School added, "These training camps are an excellent project for participating countries. It provides important experience for young players who have just started their international career. At the same time their coaches have the possibility to share their opinions and discuss good practices during the camp."

On completion of the camp, players had the opportunity to test their newly acquired skills in the Tennis Europe 14 & Under Junior Tournament also held at the Siauliai Tennis School. Both the boys' and girls' competitions were dominated by players that took part in the training camp. In the girls singles three players reached the semifinals, Iveta Dapkute (LTU), Maryna Zanevska (UKR) and Palina Pekhava (BLR). In the final match Maryna dominated her compatriot Maryna Kozachenko (UKR) and won in straight sets 61 62.
