Curry to receive ITHF Golden Achievement Award

The International Tennis Hall of Fame (ITHF) has announced that John Curry, Chairman of The All England Lawn Tennis Ground PLC, and Chairman of both the All England Lawn Tennis Club and The Lawn Tennis Championships from 1989-1999, will receive its 2004 Golden Achievement Award.

The Golden Achievement Award is presented annually by the ITHF to individuals who have made significant contributions to the fields of tennis administration, promotion or education, and have devoted long and outstanding service to the game.

In addition to his Chairmanship of the AELTC and the Wimbledon Championships, Curry was an active participant on the Grand Slam Committee, which is composed of the Chairmen and other executives of the four Grand Slam events and the President of the ITF.

In the 1997 Queen's Birthday Honours, Curry was made a Commander of the British Empire (CBE), an honour awarded to British citizens for exceptional achievement and service.

Curry's name was put forward for nomination by the ITF, whose President Francesco Ricci Bitti sits on the ITHF Golden Achievement Award Selection Committee. Other members of the committee are Chairman Geoff Pollard, Ruurd de Boer, Jane Brown, J. Howard "Bumpy" Frazer, Jan Francke and Regine Tourres.

Presentation of the award will be made on Saturday 19 June at the International Club Ball, which marks the start of the Wimbledon Championships.

The International Hall of Fame this year celebrates its 50th anniversary. Activities marking the 50th Anniversary Celebration of the ITHF include the Class of 2004 Induction Ceremony, which will take place in Newport, RI on 5-11 July. Information and tickets are available at www.tennisfame.com.



ITF sends condolences to RFET over Madrid bombings

The ITF mourns with one of our major national associations, Spain, the needless loss of life caused by the tragic bombings in Madrid last Thursday. At 11:00 this morning, the ITF staff in Roehampton observed the three minutes silence for the victims of the Madrid bombings.

ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti has written to Agustin Pujol, President of the Spanish Tennis Federation, sending his expressions of regret and condolence and noting that the ITF will be proud to host both its 2004 Annual General Meeting in Barcelona and the draw for the 2005 Davis Cup by BNP Paribas in Madrid.

"Like all international sports governing bodies, we are made up of a family of nations working together for common goals – in our case, tennis," said Ricci Bitti. "The ITF's flagship competitions, Davis Cup and Fed Cup, were founded to foster international understanding through sport. Tragedies like the Madrid bombings and other attacks on innocent people make us even more devoted to these principles and we will continue to work hard with our member nations towards that goal. On behalf of the ITF, I would like to send our condolences to the families of the dead and injured and to the people of Spain. Their courage in the face of danger was shown in the peaceful demonstrations on Friday throughout their nation."

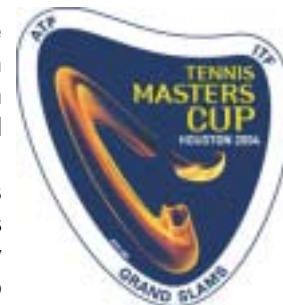
Get interactive on Daviscup.com

Advisory Notice - Supplements

The ITF would like to draw attention once again to its advisory notice, sent out last year, on dietary supplements. Further information is available on the anti-doping section of the ITF website: www.itftennis.com.

National Associations should ensure that their players, coaches, medical staff, advisors, employees, agents, representatives or any individuals connected with their organisation or tennis are aware of the issues surrounding dietary supplements.

Supplements mean risk. Don't take them!

NO REGULATION

Dietary supplements can contain banned substances. In April 2002 the International Olympic Committee issued a report that revealed that of 634 supplements tested, 94 (14.8%) contained unlabeled substances that would have led to a positive doping test. In addition to these 94 a further 66 (10.4%) returned borderline results for various unlabeled substances. Regulation of the manufacture and distribution of supplements is limited and there is consequently no guarantee of either content or accurate labelling. The contents of particular products may change from batch to batch and labels do not always indicate all of the ingredients. Nor do they always do so in a way that identifies prohibited substances. It is not possible for the ITF or any other organization to guarantee the safety and legality of any supplement. The connection between dietary supplements and positive test results for banned substances has been widely reported for a number of years. High-profile international athletes in a number of sports have tested positive because they have used dietary supplements. Athletes (and their coaches, trainers and doctors) can no longer credibly claim ignorance of the risks of positive test results due to use of dietary supplements. Athletes use dietary supplements at their own risk of testing positive and committing a doping infraction.

ENHANCED PERFORMANCE?

Very few claims of enhanced performance through supplement use are confirmed by valid research. Good marketing is not a guarantee of a good product. Remember that a primary motivation for most people wishing to sell dietary supplements is to make a profit. Appropriate training and diet are the key ingredients to maximizing performance.

NUTRITIONAL SUBSTANCES

Nutritional Supplements are being increasingly used worldwide in the sports community. In sports subjected to drug testing, the ingestion of these supplements pose a special risk because they may contain or they may be contaminated with substances that are specifically banned by the Tennis Anti-Doping Programme. Unlike prescription medications, in which the purity of the product can typically be verified by governmental regulatory authorities, the purity of supplements is at best uncertain and therefore the risk of testing positive in a doping test must be borne by the consumer who uses supplements.

THE WORLD ANTI-DOPING AGENCY (WADA)

WADA warned against the use of so-called 'nutritional substances' such as dietary supplements. The WADA position is reproduced below. Should you require further information related to this Advisory Notice, please contact the ITF.

WADA POSITION ON THE USE OF NUTRITIONAL SUPPLEMENTS

WADA believes that elite athletes can and should meet the nutritional needs of a grueling training regimen through a healthy, balanced diet. There is no conclusive scientific evidence that demonstrates supplements provide significant benefit to an elite athlete. Because WADA is concerned about inadequate labeling and insufficient quality control in the production of many nutritional supplements, the agency recommends elite athletes do not take nutritional supplements. Doping control authorities cannot judge intent; they can only judge what is found in the body. Ultimately, athletes are responsible for what they ingest, so it is possible that the use of some nutritional supplements could lead to an athlete being found guilty of a doping offense. It is WADA's position that taking a poorly labeled nutritional supplement should not be regarded as an adequate defense in a doping hearing. (Posted 15.7.03)

Kleybanova returns to defend Banana Bowl

Alisa Kleybanova returns to the scene of her biggest triumph to date when the 34th Banana Bowl takes place in Sao Paulo, Brazil, this week. The 14-year-old Russian dominated proceedings last year and lifted her first Grade A title, propelling her to an eventual year-end ranking of No. 3. She will be a big favourite to defend her crown this year.

All four semifinalists from last year's girls' singles event return this year. Last year's runner-up Krysty Marcio (USA) and Hungary's Agnes Szavay could offer some particularly tough opposition, both having already pocketed ITF Junior titles this year.

New Zealand's Marina Erakovic, who has established herself in the top 20, was narrowly beaten by Kleybanova in the Yucatan Cup and could pose a threat along with Slovenia's Ana Jerman and Russia's Evgeniya Rodina, both of whom have won one title and reached one final so far this year. Brazil's Jenifer Widjaja has a similar record so far this year and can also enjoy the added advantage of playing in her home town.

In the boys' event, a new Grade A champion is guaranteed, as none of this year's entrants have previously earned that distinction. Bruno Rosa of Brazil and Argentina's Juan-Pablo Amado reached the semifinals last year and are fancied to go one step further this time. Amado recently claimed his first ITF Junior title, while Rosa will not lack support in front of his home crowd. Another Argentine, Juan-Martin Del Potro, has also been successful in South America this year, while Italian Fabio Fognini, who reached the last eight at the Australian Open, and Yucatan Cup finalist Pablo Andujar-Alba (ESP) will be hoping to transfer their good form to the clay courts of the Esporte Club Pinheiros.

Kawatei elected ATF Honorary Life President

Eiichi Kawatei of Japan, who held the post of President of the Asian Tennis Federation from 1989-1993, was unanimously elected ATF Honorary Life President at the Asian Tennis Federation AGM in Doha, Qatar over the weekend. Kawatei also served as a member of the ITF Board of Directors from 1981-2003 and is still a Vice President of the Japan Tennis Association and a member of the ITF Olympic Committee.

The ATF AGM was hosted by Sheikh Mohammad Al-Thani of Qatar, a member of the ATF Board of Directors, and was chaired by Vice President (West Asia) Sheikh Ahmad Al-Subah of Kuwait and Anil Khanna of India, also a Vice President (South Asia) of the Asian Tennis Federation as well as a Board Member of the ITF. Al-Subah and Khanna served in place of ATF President Salvador H. Andrada of the Philippines who is recovering from ill health.

ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti and ITF Executive Director, Commercial, Jan Menneken attended the ATF AGM and spoke to the delegates from approximately 15 nations.

"The ATF AGM was a very productive assembly for key representatives of our Asian member nations," said the ITF President. "Asia is one of the most important current and future markets for tennis with the Olympic Games scheduled for Beijing in 2008. Our greetings and wishes for improved health go to our friend, Salvador Andrada, and our thanks to Sheikh Al-Thani and the Board of Directors of the Qatar Tennis Association as well as to the other ATF nations for their hospitality.

"We were also very pleased with the honour bestowed on Eiichi Kawatei whose selfless dedication to our sport deserves this kind of tribute."

Olympic entry deadline nears

All National Associations are reminded that the deadline for submitting their Entry by Country forms to the ITF is 1 April 2004.

'By Country' entry forms were sent to all Class B and Class C member nations of the ITF in early February.

Any nation wishing to nominate players to participate in the Olympic Tennis Event, including those nations intending to apply for ITF Places (Wild Cards) nearer the event, must complete this Entry Form By Country in the first instance.

These forms must be endorsed by the relevant National Olympic Committee (NOC) before being submitted.

All nations endorsed by their NOC to enter the 2004 Olympic Tennis Event will be advised by 17 June 2004 which of their players are eligible for direct entry into the events – men's singles, men's doubles, women's singles and women's doubles – based on their international computer ranking. Nations then have until 28 June 2004 to submit their individual player nominations to the ITF, once again with the endorsement of their NOC.

The final step in the entry process takes place on 21 July when the respective NOCs submit their athlete entry forms to the Athens 2004 Organising Committee.

The Olympic Tennis Event takes place at the purpose-built Olympic Tennis Centre in Athens from 15-22 August. Please visit the ITF's Olympic Tennis Website at www.itftennis.com/olympics. ITF/CAT East African Prize Money Circuit starts in Sudan

The first of three tournaments that form the ITF/CAT East African Prize Money Circuit took place last week in the Sudan capital Khartoum. This week, the event takes place in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia before moving on next week to Nairobi, Kenya.

The circuit is one of many ITF Development Programme initiatives taking place in Africa designed to provide competitive opportunities for top African junior and senior players who do not have the means to compete internationally. The circuit is also used by National Associations to help prepare their players for Davis Cup and Fed Cup competition. The project has been well supported by National Associations with events enjoying the same exposure as their national tournaments.

Total prize money for circuit events is \$4,500, with the ITF contributing \$2,500 and the host nation \$2,000. Speaking at the start of the Sudan event, Prince Madema, ITF Assistant Development Officer for Southern and East Africa commented: "The Sudan leg has attracted top players from Burundi, Egypt, Kenya, Zimbabwe and the host nation Sudan. This is a promising turn out and shows the great appeal of this circuit. For some of the players, the prize money they earn at these circuits helps them to go on and participate in ITF Futures events around Africa."

"The project looks set to grow bigger and bigger with more countries willing to host events and more players keen to take part," said Madema. "One of the most encouraging aspects is that this circuit has increased the number of women participating in tennis. I recall that when the circuit was first introduced in 1998 we often had to cancel the women's section due to lack of participation, but this year all of the East African events have a strong field of female players."

ITF/Tennis Europe Small States Championships 14 & Under

The ITF/Tennis Europe Small States Championships for players aged 14 & Under came to a close in Esch-sur-Alzette, Luxembourg at the weekend. Hosted by the Luxembourg Tennis Federation (LTF) for the second successive year, the competition, which has become one of the most important events on the junior calendar for the Small States in Europe, welcomed players from Andorra, Cyprus, Iceland, Luxembourg and Malta. A special invitation was also extended to Albania and Azerbaijan to take part in the nine-day event which consisted of two consecutive tournaments and a feed-in consolation system allowing participants to play one singles match every day.

In the boys' event, Matthew Asciak from Malta justified his number one seeding by sweeping aside the rest of the draw to win the two singles tournaments, defeating Christian Durbach from Luxembourg in straight sets on both occasions. The two boys also faced each other in the final of the two boys' doubles events. In the first tournament Durbach and Paul Jome (LUX) defeated Asciak and Clayton Zammin (MAL) in straight sets 60 60. In the second doubles event, Asciak and Zammin, who were determined not to lose a second final in as many weeks, played some excellent tennis against Durbach and his new doubles partner Christophe Nickels (LUX) to win 76 63.

In the girls' event, the number two seed Catherine Gauche (LUX) clinched victory in the two singles events. In the first tournament Gauche played some excellent tennis to set up a meeting with the number one seed, Danijela Islamaj from Albania. Islamaj won the first set but Gauche came back in the second set to clinch a three-set victory 46 61 64. In the second singles tournament, Gauche and Islamaj once again met in the final, but this time Gauche was in control from the onset winning in straight sets 75 62.

In the doubles event, Kimberly Cassar and Elaine Genovese from Malta dominated the first tournament defeating the Albanian pairing of Daniela Islamaj and Paskualina Vajkollari 62 61. Determined to make up for their defeat in the first final, Islamaj and Vajkollari made their way to the final of the second girls' doubles event without dropping a set to defeat Natasha Feidt (LUX) and her partner Aliyeva Sevil from Azerbaijan 61 61.

ITF/Tennis Europe Development Officer Hrvoje Zmajic commented: "This event offers players from the Small States of Europe a great opportunity to compete with players of the same level. I am very happy to see that more good players are coming from countries like Albania and Azerbaijan. The success in an event like this one is very important for making tennis more popular in the Small States where we have to compete against sports like soccer and basketball".

Based on the combined results from the two tournaments, the best players will be invited to be members of the ITF/Tennis Europe Small States Team that will travel under the direction of Rymvidas Mugevicius (LTU) to participate in three tournaments as part of the 2004 European 14 & Under Junior Tour.
