Action to resume in Davis Cup by BNP Paribas



Action resumes in the Davis Cup by BNP Paribas this week with three Zonal Group III and IV events getting underway on Wednesday, before the World Group Quarterfinals and 25 Group I and II ties take centre stage from Friday.

Nine of the world's top ten players have been nominated to play over the weekend, with six taking part in the World Group and three in Group I ties. In the World Group, Belarus contests its first ever quarterfinal, against Argentina in Minsk, while last year's beaten finalists Spain should prove difficult opponents for the Netherlands in Mallorca. Sweden, conquerors of reigning champions Australia in the first round, have another tricky away tie, this time facing the USA in Delray Beach. Meanwhile Switzerland and France meet for the third time in four years, with France hoping that as in those two recent ties - both quarterfinals - the away team comes out victorious.

There are ten ties scheduled for Group I, and among the issues decided by these ties will be the eight nations who will advance to September's World Group Play-offs. **Members of the media are reminded that if they wish to attend the draw for the Play-offs, which will be held at Cannizaro House, Wimbledon, London at 12 noon BST on Tuesday 13 April, they should email communications@itftennis.com.**

There are now 15 Group II ties scheduled for the weekend, after the Danish Tennis Federation (DTF) informed the ITF that it will not send a team to the tie with Algeria. Obituary: Fred Hoyles

The ITF was saddened to learn of the recent death of Fred Hoyles, referee at Wimbledon from 1976 to 1982.

Born in Lincolnshire, Great Britain, Hoyles was an amateur tennis player for many years. He gave up the game at the age of 40 and joined the Referee Society. After taking on a number of British tournaments he began refereeing at international events and in 1967 he joined Wimbledon.

After retiring from Wimbledon, Hoyles took charge of several international matches, including the Davis Cup Final between Australia and Sweden and the qualifying rounds for the 1988 Seoul Olympics.



Andy Roddick moved into second position in the INDESIT ATP 2004 Race after claiming his second title of the year at the NASDAQ-100 Open in Miami. Roddick is now just 137 points behind current leader Roger Federer. Guillermo Coria, who reached the final in Miami, moved up to seventh position. The top seven players in the Race, plus eligible Grand Slam champions, automatically qualify for the eight-player 2004 Tennis Masters Cup in Houston on 13-21 November. The event is co-owned by the ITF, Grand Slams and ATP.

Olympic entries by country (cont.)

Entries 'By Country' closed on 1 April 2004 and by that deadline a total of 77 nations had submitted their entries, endorsed by their respective National Olympic Committees. Of those 77 nations 68 indicated they would nominate players for the Men's events and 56 indicated they would enter the Women's events.

These nations are not guaranteed places in the Tennis Event in Athens, but by entering 'By Country' they have the right to either enter players eligible for direct entry by ranking, or apply for ITF Places (Wild Cards). A total of 52 countries were represented at the 2000 Olympic Games Tennis Event in Sydney.

Direct entry places in the Tennis Event will be allocated based on the international computer rankings of 14 June. At this point nations that have entered 'By Country' will be sent player nomination forms and application forms for ITF Places. Nations must then submit these forms to the ITF by than 28 June 2004, when the ITF will select the ITF Places.

ITF East Africa Training Camp

The annual East Africa Training Camp began on 22 March with players travelling from Kenya and Rwanda to Bujumbura, Burundi to take part. The six-day camp was conducted by Prince Madema, ITF Assistant Development Officer for Southern & East Africa. He was assisted by local coaches and invited coaches George Oyoo from Kenya & Sylvain Rutikanga of Rwanda. This was followed by a four-day tournament which gave the 36 players – including 18 locals – the chance to consolidate what they had learnt during the camp.

This project gave a number of children from Burundi the opportunity to play tennis, learn from different coaches and raise the level of their play in order to fulfill their potential. Each player improved rapidly and overall the camp was another great success. Furthermore, the camp has helped the Fédération de Tennis du Burundi in their preparations for hosting the 13 & Under Junior Circuit in August which will be the second time Burundi has hosted this event. The camp ended on 30 March with all players departing to their respective countries to prepare for the African Junior Championships taking place later this month in Cairo, Egypt.

International Junior Championships of Egypt

The International Junior Championships of Egypt commence on Tuesday, 6 April at Cairo's Smash Tennis Academy. This event is the warm-up event for the 27th ITF/CAT African Junior Championships, which will be taking place at the same venue on 12-17 April. Both events are being hosted by the Egyptian Tennis Federation in collaboration with the ITF and the Confederation of African Tennis.

This week's tournament offers competition in three age categories - 18 & Under, 16 & Under and 14 & Under - and has attracted a record number of entries this year, a total of 121 boys and 98 girls. Whilst the 16 & Under and 14 & Under events are closed and only African players holding an African passport may compete, the 18 & Under event, a Grade 3 tournament which offers valuable junior world ranking points, has attracted entries from around the world in addition to the 21 African nations who received a direct invitation to the event.

This variety and the level of the entries not only promises an exciting week of competition, but will also allow players to adapt to the North African clay in preparation for the African Junior Championships. Feed-in consolation events will be organised so that players have the opportunity to play a singles match every day, giving the African players vital match-play exposure in anticipation of their continent's most prestigious junior event. Last year's 18 & Under Champions in this tournament, South Africa's Fritz Wolmarans and Egypt's Heidi el Tabakh, went on to lift the 18 & Under trophies at the African Junior Championships.

WADA issues modified 2004 List of Prohibited Substances

The World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) has issued a modified version of the 2004 list of prohibited methods and substances, following a recommendation from the Chair of the WADA Health, Medical and Research Committee, and after approval by the WADA Executive Committee. The changes do not affect the substances currently on the List but aim at preventing any legal loophole in case of the discovery of a new "designer steroid".

Under the Tennis Anti-Doping Programme, players are tested for the WADA list of banned substances in accordance with the WADA Code. The modified list, together with further information on the Tennis Anti-Doping Programme, is available to view and download from the ITF website at www.itftennis.com/abouttheitf/rulesregs/antidoping.asp. The new List comes into force immediately as authorized by Article 4.1 of the WADA Code.

The discovery of the "designer steroid" Tetrahydrogestrinone (THG), has made clear that the definition of "analogue" as defined under sections S4 and S5 of the former List is inappropriately restrictive. In fact, in its former version, the List required an analogue to have both a similar chemical structure and similar pharmacological effects. However, contrary to good medical and pharmaceutical practice, these "designer steroids" are administered to athletes despite the lack of any studies on their pharmacological effects.

Therefore, in order to be able to cover new "designer steroids" in the future and to prosecute such cases quickly, it is important that substances that have a similar chemical structure or similar pharmacological effects be prohibited.

In consequence, the references to "analogues" and "mimetics" in sections S4 and S5 have been deleted and replaced by the same wording that is used in sections S1 and S8, namely: "... and other substances with similar chemical structure or similar pharmacological effect(s)". The "pharmacological effect(s)" can be interpreted both in plural and singular.

ITF 14 & Under Asian Championships

The Indonesian Tennis Federation (PELTI) is at the forefront of tennis among the Asian nations when it comes to junior development, and for the second time in three years it played host to the ITF 14 & Under Asian Championships Zone 1 event in Jakarta on 21 March - 4 April 2004.

The Championships, which were held at the Kemayuran Tennis Center in Jakarta, attracted the best 14 & under Asian junior players from the nations of China, Chinese Taipei, Hong Kong China, India, Japan, Philippines, Thailand and Indonesia. An ITF team also took part in the event, which included the best players from the Zone 2-4 ITF Asian events, representing the nations of Jordan, Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan, Lebanon, Malaysia, Myanmar, Oman, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Syria, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan.

Prior to the start of the event a three-day training camp was conducted by Suresh Menon, ITF Development Officer for Asia, assisted by the ITF team coaches and coaches of the various teams. The camp was followed by two consecutive five-day tournaments using a feed-in consolation system in which all players contest a singles match each day, leading to a final overall ranking. Points are awarded for each tournament and added together at the end of the event, to provide the final ranking. This ranking determines who will qualify to be on the Asian ITF Team that will travel to Europe for six weeks.

The rain that had threatened to force the event inside never materialised but was replaced by soaring temperatures, which at times reached the high 30s indoors. Despite these difficult conditions, the juniors performed admirably and produced some high quality tennis throughout the championships.

In the first girls' event, Guo Xuan Yu (CHN) swept aside No. 1 seed Dilyara Saidkhodjaeva (UZB) in the semifinals to set up a final with her teammate, Han Xin Yun (CHN), which Yun won 63 60. The two Chinese girls went on to contest the final of the second event, in which Yun survived a close first set to clinch her second title 76(2) 64.

The two girls also dominated the doubles events. In the opening final Yun teamed up with Chen Mu Ying (TPE) to defeat Yu and Lui Meng (CHN) 46 75 62. In the second final, Yun partnered Meng to a 64 75 victory over home favourites Lutfiana Budiharto and Jessy Rompies (INA).

In the boys' events, the home crowd had something to celebrate when Christopher Rungkat (INA) clinched victory in the first singles final. Rungkat, the No. 1 seed, defeated No. 4 seed Kittiphong Wachiramanowong (THA) in a three-set thriller 61 06 76(4). The second boys' singles final was an all-Thai affair, with Wachiramanowong defeating Peerakit Siributwong (THA) 75 61.

In the doubles, Wachiramanowong and Peerapach Tupwong (THA) defeated Yu-Chi Chang and Sa Chen (TPE) 62 63 in the final of the first event. In the second final, Chang and Chen made up for their loss by defeating Eko Septian and Lenz Theodor (INA) 46 60 63.

PELTI President and Asian Tennis Federation Vice President, Ms Martina Wijaya said: "Junior tennis, especially the under 14 category, needs to be given more priority. PELTI is working tirelessly to organize more tournaments in this age group and is always ready to support Asian junior development by organizing future ITF U14 Asian Junior Championships."

Hall and Vergeer triumph in Miami

ITF Wheelchair Tennis World Champions David Hall (AUS) and Esther Vergeer (NED) won the respective men's and women's singles titles at the Nasdaq-100 Open Wheelchair Tennis Championships (CS1), a part of the NEC Wheelchair Tennis Tour, in Miami.

Open to 16 leading men and eight women, the wheelchair event took place at Crandon Park Tennis Centre, Key Biscayne, directly alongside the closing stages of the main ATP/WTA tournament. This year's Nasdaq-100 Open had its strongest ever field as the players began the final two weeks of the race for ranking points ahead of the qualification deadline for the Paralympic Games in Athens.

Fourth seed Martin Legner (AUT), last year's beaten finalist, was a surprise early casualty after losing 57 62 64 to Eric Stuurman (NED) in the quarterfinals. However Stuurman's challenge ended at the hands of defending champion Robin Ammerlaan (NED) 63 63 in the semifinals. In the other half of the draw, world No. 1 David Hall (AUS) eased to a 62 62 semifinal win over third seed Satoshi Saida (JPN).

An intriguing final saw Hall score a closely-fought 64 64 victory over the No. 2 seed, thereby regaining a title he last won in 2002, but was unable to defend in 2003 due to illness.

There were no surprises in the women's singles as the world's top four players reached the semifinals. However, second seed Daniela Di Toro (AUS) had to come from a set down to defeat world No. 5 Sharon Clark 26 63 61 in her opening match.

The Australian had another tough match in the last four as she edged past Sonja Peters (NED) 64 75, while top seed and defending champion Vergeer saw off the challenge of Maaïke Smit (NED) 60 64.

In the final, Vergeer seized the advantage straight away as she swept to a 61 62 victory that gives her her third Nasdaq-100 title following wins in 2000 and 2003.

In the men's doubles, Hall and Shingo Kunieda (JPN) prevailed in a thrilling semifinal against top seeds Legner and Michael Jeremiasz (FRA) 46 75 76(4). The unseeded pairing then produced another great comeback to beat second seeds Ammerlaan and Satoshi Saida (JPN) 26 64 60 in the final.

The women's doubles saw Di Toro and Sharon Clark (USA) also cause an upset in the semifinals as they defeated Dutch second seeds Peters and Walraven 62 63. However, in the final, top seeds Vergeer and Smit collected yet another doubles title as they recorded a comfortable 62 64 win over Di Toro and Clark.

After the Nasdaq-100 Open, the world's leading players now head down the Florida coast to Boca Raton for this week's Florida Open (CS1), which again has its strongest ever field.

The Paralympic qualification deadline is 12 April, which is a public holiday in the UK. The world rankings for that week will therefore be issued on Tuesday 13 April. As soon as the information is available, a complete list of qualified athletes for Athens will be sent to National Paralympic Committees and published on www.itfwheelchairtennis.com.

Meanwhile 27 young players from Great Britain attended a development camp at Nottingham Tennis Centre last weekend, sponsored by NEC (UK) Ltd and organised by the British Tennis Foundation. The camp was led by Martin McElhatton, Chairman of the National Wheelchair Tennis Association, assisted by the ITF's Wheelchair Tennis Development Officer Mark Bullock.

ITF Vets Rankings

While the first three months of the year are a relatively quiet time on the ITF Vets Circuit, this has not prevented changes occurring at the top in five of the age categories in the new ITF Vets Rankings.

While John Morrison and Alex Swetka's joint dethroning of fellow American Albert Ritzenberg in the 85 category is the only change on the men's side, reigning world champion Rene Simpson has shot to women's 35 No.1, after four tournament victories in her native Canada. Argentina's Beatriz Villaverde (women's 45) and Doris Devries, of USA, (women's 65) have done likewise, while in the women's 55 Germany's Heide Orth returns to the top after capturing the European Indoors, and now tops the 55 and 60 rankings.

Of those players competing in new age categories for the first time, effectively starting from zero, the best starts have been made by Louise Russ of USA (women's 75) and Germany's Peter Adrigan (men's 60), who are No. 7 and No. 5 respectively. It should also be noted that USA's John Powless has enjoyed a fantastic start to the year, winning three Grade 1 events on three different continents and narrowly missing the top spot in men's 70.

The ITF Vets department is pleased to announce that 116 teams from 24 nations have entered the Group A Team Competitions that will be held in Turkey in May, including for the first time, Moldova.

It was also decided during the recent ITF Vets Committee meeting that, following overwhelming support from players and administrators alike, by means of a questionnaire, the ITF Vets World Championships for all age categories will take place on an annual basis. Furthermore, with effect from 2005, the 55 age group will transfer to Group A in a move to balance out the two groups.

USTA and TIA Come out Swinging

The USTA and the Tennis Industry Association has announced the launch of Tennis Welcome Centers, a large grass roots campaign that will operate under a new branding promotion, 'Tennis. Come out Swinging'.

There will be a network of over 3,300 Tennis Welcome Centers across the US, accessible through www.TennisWelcomeCenter.com, which will offer new players the chance to 'Learn to Play tennis...FAST!' under certified tennis professionals.

The campaign represents a collective effort from many sections of the tennis community, including the NRPA (National Recreation and Park Association), USPTA, PTR, ATP, WTA Tour, WTT, tournament owners, tennis clubs and other facilities, racket, ball and footwear manufacturers, retailers, and tennis broadcasters.

A national print advertising campaign featuring actress/model Daisy Fuentes, NASCAR champion Jeff Gordon, boxing champion Roy Jones Jr., and 60 Minutes host Mike Wallace, launches on 11 April, and will be supported by promotions on many tennis products in the US, with a TV campaign also in development.

LTA and UK Government create 26 more indoor courts

The LTA has announced the allocation of £4.4 million from Sport England's Community Club Development Fund to projects that will see 26 indoor courts built this year.

This funding will give 13 tennis clubs enough capital to complete projects which are aimed at giving juniors more facilities to take up the game and enjoy year-round coaching.

Schemes receiving some of the largest sums are located within Sport England's top priority areas, such as Harlow in Essex, Torquay in Devon, Eastgate in Lincoln and Blackheath in London.

As part of its Club Vision programme, the LTA has invested up to £12million in new club facility development in the past year.

Obituary: Wlodimierz Reczek

The ITF was saddened to learn of the death of Mr Wlodimierz Reczek, IOC member from 1961 to 1996 and IOC honorary member since 1996.

Reczek was a President of the Polish Olympic Committee for over 20 years, as well as President of the Polish Football Federation and of the Supreme Committee for Sports and Tourism.

He chaired the IOC's Cultural Commission twice, was a member of the Information and Culture Commission and also of the Commission for the International Olympic Academy and Olympic Education. In addition, he found time to write several books on physical education and the history of sport and Olympism in Poland.

"The death of Mr Reczek is a great loss to the sports and Olympic world," said Jacques Rogge, IOC President.
