Gaudio and Myskina triumph in Paris

Gaston Gaudio (ARG) and Anastasia Myskina (RUS) wrote themselves into the history books with Roland Garros victories on the weekend. Gaudio became only the second Argentine since Guillermo Vilas in 1977 to lift the trophy, while Myskina went one better to become the first woman from her country to ever win a Grand Slam title.

Gaudio was crowned champion in bizarre circumstances with a five-set victory over fellow Argentine Guillermo Coria. The unseeded Gaudio won 06 36 64 61 86, but not before he saved two match points and watched his opponent virtually walk through the fourth set due to a cramping problem which he later blamed on nerves.

The favourite going into the match, Coria looked to be cruising to victory when he took an early two-set lead on the Philippe Chatrier Court in Paris. But then Gaudio made his presence known, grabbing a tight third set before Coria, clearly not comfortable, called for treatment. Tapping his serves over and playing virtually at a standstill, Coria looked set to quit in the fourth set. However, he bravely hung on until the final set began.

Coria lifted his game in the fifth set and despite being severely hampered by the problem, he moved around the court and battled to match point twice at 6-5, but on both occasions sent shots wide. Two games later Gaudio clinched his first Grand Slam title when he sent a backhand past his weakened opponent.

Myskina wrote her name in the history books with a crushing 61 62 victory over good friend, Elena Dementieva. Not only did she become the first Russian woman to win the title at Roland Garros, but she became the first woman from her country to capture a Grand Slam singles crown.

Barcelona hosts 2004 ITF AGM

The ITF Annual General Meeting is being held in Barcelona this week, hosted by the Spanish Tennis Federation (RFET) and the Catalan Tennis Federation (FCT). This is the final event of the year-long Centenary Celebrations for the Catalan Tennis Federation. Ninety-six nations are attending this year's AGM.

Tuesday's Key Issues Sessions, ahead of the formal AGM on Wednesday, will include a presentation from the ATHOC General Manager of Sports Mr Makis Assimakopoulos about the upcoming Olympic Tennis Event. Other topics include Anti-Doping, Commercial, Ambush Marketing, Finance, Constitution, Fed Cup, Davis Cup, Marketing the Game, Development, Juniors, Technical and the ITF Survey.

Functions include delegates lunches hosted by the LTA on Tuesday and Fed Cup Champions France on Wednesday. The RFET/FCT will host a welcome party on Tuesday at the Palau de Pedralbes while the Gala Davis Cup Dinner, hosted by Tennis Australia and the ITF, will take place at Parque Guell on Wednesday night.

Tennis Europe re-launches website

Tennis Europe has re-launched its website www.tenniseurope.org.

In the biggest overhaul of the site since its inception four years ago, Tennis Europe has updated the design and content, as well as that of the site's sister publication, Tennis Europe News.

The new site gives the company's communications a modern new look and a coherent identity.

Tennis Europe is one of six regional associations affiliated to the ITF. The non-profit organising body is based in Basel, Switzerland. The federation is comprised of 48 European member nations and manages approximately 500 tennis tournaments a year across the continent.



Roland Garros champion Gaston Gaudio moved 34 places to fourth position in the INDESIT ATP 2004 Race after claiming his first Grand Slam title in Paris. Roland Garros runner-up Guillermo Coria moved up to second position, while Britain's Tim Henman jumped to seventh after reaching the semifinals in Paris. The top seven players in the Race, plus eligible Grand Slam champions, automatically qualify for the eight-player 2004 Tennis Masters Cup in Houston on 13-21 November. The event is co-owned by the ITF, Grand Slams and ATP.

Obituary: Finn Kalhauge, Danish Tennis Federation President



The President of the Danish Tennis Federation (DTF), Mr Finn Kalhauge, died suddenly in Paris on Tuesday 1 June after suffering from a heart attack. He was 59 years old.

Kalhauge was elected to the DTF committee in March 1989, where he did comprehensive work for Danish junior tennis. The Dane became acting president in January 2003 and two months later he was unanimously elected to DTF President. In his work with the DTF, Kalhauge strongly believed in the promotion of tennis and the important role of the clubs in increasing numbers of players. He also believed it was important to focus on recruiting and educating more coaches.

Kalhauge himself was an enthusiastic tennis player and was the President of Tarup-Pårup Tennis Club for eight years, building the club to be one of Fyn's leading clubs. Kalhauge was a key promoter and for many years the Tournament Director of the Fyn Open. Later he became Tournament Director of the Copenhagen Open and held the position for five years. He was a qualified electrician and in addition to his voluntarily work at the DTF he ran his own business in his hometown Odense.

Mr. Kalhauges early death leaves a hole in Danish tennis society where he will be sadly missed. Among his colleagues he was known and respected as a warm, outgoing and obliging person. Our condolences go to his wife, children, grandchild and family during this difficult time.

Tennis Masters Cup returns to Shanghai

Tennis Masters Cup, the culminating event of the men's professional tournament season, will return to Shanghai, China for three years beginning in 2005. Following the huge success of the Tennis Masters Cup Shanghai 2002, China's largest city won the right, after a six-month worldwide bidding process, to stage the season finale in 2005-2007.

The tournament, which is co-owned by the ATP, ITF and Grand Slams, will be staged at the new state-of-the-art Qi Zhong (pronounced Chi-Jong) Tennis Center. The tennis facility, which will become Asia's biggest, is being built on 80 acres in the Minghang district, 27 kilometers southwest of the city. The Tennis Center, due for completion in May 2005, will include a dual-purpose indoor-outdoor 15,000-seat centre court and 40 indoor and outdoor courts.

"The ITF's Development Department has been very active not only in China but also in the entire Asia/Pacific region for many years and it is very gratifying for us to see the tremendous growth of tennis in that part of the world," said ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti. "The Tennis Masters Cup in Shanghai is a great platform for the top level of our sport in that region, attracting not only wider audiences but also important sponsorship relationships to tennis and this can only help the ITF as we prepare for the Tennis Event at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing."

The 2004 Tennis Masters Cup is being held for the second year in Houston, Texas on November 13-21. The top eight players and top eight doubles team at the end of each year compete in a round robin format for US\$4.45 million in prize money and the chance to end the year as World No. 1. Previous cities to host the Tennis Masters Cup have included Lisbon (2000), Sydney (2001), Shanghai (2002), and Houston (2003-2004). Shanghai has also hosted the Heineken Open since 2000, a favourite stop on the circuit for many of the professional players.

Monfils and Karatancheva win Junior Roland Garros

France's Gael Monfils added his home Grand Slam to the Australian Open boys' title he won in January with a 62 62 demolition of USA's Alex Kuznetsov at Roland Garros. Bulgarian Sesil Karatancheva notched up an equally impressive victory to score her debut junior Grand Slam title, with a 64 60 victory over Romania's Madalina Gojnea. The voluble 15-year-old was so excited afterwards that she could barely contain herself.

"I'm really excited as you can see," she said, sporting a huge smile. "I'm really touched right now because I didn't expect to win. When I first came here I was so excited just to be in Paris, where I had never been before but now I feel different because I actually won. This is a big step and I'm already thinking forward to the French Open next year because now I understand how much I want to come back here and win the women's title. It's the beginning of something and I'd like to finish it and make the second goal come true just like this one did."

The teenager, who is based at Nick Bollettieri's academy in Bradenton, Florida, says she will be returning there to celebrate her memorable victory at Roland Garros.

Like Karatancheva, 17-year-old Monfils withstood the pressures that come with being the pre-tournament favourite, galloping through his matches with an air of calm that belied his years. He only dropped one set en route to his second junior Grand Slam title and took little over an hour to dispatch Kuznetsov in the final.

"It's my reward for hard work with my coaches," he said. "I already won in Australia, so it proves that that it's not luck and that I'm confirming what I'm able to do. I personally do not put pressure on myself but I have to believe in what I'm doing. There's no reason why I shouldn't play well in the main draw now because I'm one of the best juniors. It's possible if I work hard. Maybe in two or three years maybe I will be able to hold the men's trophy."

Having now won the first two Grand Slams of the year all thoughts automatically turn to the junior Grand Slam; "I heard that Stefan Edberg was the only one who ever done it, if I could win the other two it would be great, it's a great challenge."

The Czech-Dutch partnership of Katerina Bohmova and Michaela Krajicek joined forces to win the girls' doubles title on Saturday, beating the Russian pairing of Irina Kotkina and Yaroslava Shvedova 63 62.

The Spanish duo of Pablo Andujar and Marcel Granollers-Pujol secured the boys' doubles trophy with a 63 62 victory over the US/German team of Alex Kuznetsov and Mihail Zverev.

"I feel great," said Myskina. "What can I say? I can't believe still what I've done. Just really, really happy. It means a lot. Everything. I mean, that's one of the goals. It's one of the dreams. When you win it's something, it's different. It's a lot of emotions, it's a lot of things going on right now. It's really hard to explain what I'm feeling, but I'm still shaking."

The last time a Russian woman was in the final at Roland Garros was in 1988 when Natasha Zvereva, from the former Soviet Union, was brushed aside 60 60 in a record 34 minutes by Germany's Steffi Graf.

Myskina's victory moves her to third place in the world rankings behind Belgians Justine Henin-Hardenne and Kim Clijsters, while Dementieva has climbed four places to No.6.

Top seeds Virginia Ruano Pascual and Paola Suarez swept to their third women's doubles title at the French Open defeating second seeds Elena Likhovtseva and Svetlana Kuznetsova 60 63.

The men's doubles final was won by the unseeded pairing of Xavier Malisse and Olivier Rochus who beat the French sixth seeded combination of Michael Llodra and Fabrice Santoro 75 75.

French teenagers Tatiana Golovin and Richard Gasquet gave the home crowd something to cheer about, winning the mixed doubles title against the unseeded Zimbabwe sister-brother pairing of Cara and Wayne Black 63 64.

A first for Wheelchair Tennis at Roland Garros

Spectators at Roland Garros last Thursday and Friday were treated to the Grand Slam's first ever wheelchair tennis matches. Thursday's exhibition included two singles matches with Esther Vergeer (NED) and David Hall (AUS), the 2003 ITF Wheelchair Tennis World Champions and current World No. 1 and No. 2 respectively, taking on the No. 1 French players, Florence Gravelier and Michael Jeremiasz. In the first of the matches,

despite a close first set, Vergeer took command of the match, defeating her French counterpart 63 61. The second singles ran to three sets but eventually ended in a French victory, Jeremiasz overcoming Hall 36 75 64.

On Friday the players competed in a mixed doubles exhibition match, with Vergeer and Hall partnering Jeremiasz and Gravelier respectively. In front of another large and enthusiastic crowd on court seven, Vergeer and Jeremiasz finally emerged victorious after two extremely close sets, 63 75.

The two exhibitions provided a tremendous showcase for the sport and the ITF would like to extend their thanks to the French Tennis Federation for the organisation of the exhibitions and for the opportunity to demonstrate wheelchair tennis at its best.
