Spain and Russia prepare for final

Flags will be flying in Madrid this weekend as Spain takes on reigning champions Russia in the 2008 Fed Cup by BNP Paribas Final, held at the Club de Campo on 13-14 September. This is the 46th Fed Cup Final and the first time that these two nations have met at the last stage. Russia has a 4-1 lead in the head-to-head record, with the most recent meeting being in 2007 at the Small Sports Arena 'Luzhniki' in Moscow. The Russians won that first round tie 5-0, but there's no doubting that the Spanish team are a lot stronger now.

On paper, even without some of their top players, the Russians still have a strong line-up with two of their four players ranked in the Top 10. In addition, their pedigree is unrivalled as they are No.1 in the Fed Cup rankings and have won the title twelve times, including in three of the last four years. World No. 4 Svetlana Kuznetsova will head the Russian team, along with No. 10 and Olympic bronze medallist Vera Zvonareva, who is in exceptional form at the moment. Elena Vesnina played in last year's final, but not in a live rubber, and has a 4-3 win-loss Fed Cup record. The final member of the team, Ekaterina Makarova, is a Fed Cup debutante and has a current world ranking of 56.

So with the Russian team not at full strength, Spain do indeed have a real chance in this final, not least in the doubles, where Virginia Ruano Pascual and Anabel Medina Garrigues picked up a silver medal at the Olympics in Beijing. It also has to be noted that Nuria Llagostera Vives and Medina Garrigues are both unbeaten in Fed Cup singles matches in 2008. Also, with the home support at the Club de Campo - Villa de Madrid and the 'feel good' factor of all that is Spanish tennis at the moment with Rafael Nadal riding high as the world No. 1 and Spain in the Davis Cup semifinals, it will be a fascinating weekend.

The ITF's dedicated website, www.fedcup.com, will carry live scoring, live ball-by-ball commentary on Fed Cup Radio, and also live text commentary during the weekend. There will, of course, be all the usual photos, news and interviews, as well as scorecards and statistics.



Paralympic Tennis Event gets underway

The 2008 Paralympic Tennis Event got underway today at the Olympic Green Tennis Centre in Beijing.

Those in action on the first day included two-time Paralympic women's singles gold medallist and world No. 1 Esther Vergeer (NED) who defeated Athens women's singles bronze medallist Daniela di Toro (AUS) 62 60. Vergeer, who was the flagbearer for the Dutch team at the Opening Ceremony, will now face Katharina Kruger (GER) in the second round. Kruger overcame Agnieszka Bartczak (POL) 76(1) 67(5) 63 in the first round.

Fuli Dong (CHN) provided a Centre Court thrill for her home fans when she secured a straight sets win to knock out the first seed of the Games, eighth seed Mie Yaosa (JPN).

In the men's singles, world No. 1 Shingo Kunieda (JPN) and reigning Paralympic champion Robin Ammerlaan (NED) both got their campaigns off to a winning start when they overcame Britian's Alex Jewitt and Gordon Reid respectively. For further information visit www.itftennis.com/paralympics.

Serena takes spoils in New York

Serena Williams returned to the top of the rankings after capturing her ninth Grand Slam singles title at the US Open. The American defeated Serbian Jelena Jankovic 64 75 to be world No. 1 for the first time since August 2003.

Jankovic, who was playing in her first Grand Slam final, started well before Williams reeled off three breaks to take the first set. The Serb also had her chances in the second set but squandered four set points before a rejuvenated Williams closed out the match.

"I'm so excited," Williams said. "This was magical. It was everything coming together like magic. I wasn't even going for number one and it's just like an added bonus. It is that special because I've been working so hard."

The men's final will take place later today, a day later than scheduled, due to Tropical Storm Hanna which affected play on Saturday. The first semifinal between Roger Federer (SUI) and Novak Djokovic (SRB) was completed before the rain descended with Federer taking victory 63 57 75 62. The Swiss is unbeaten at Flushing Meadows since 2003.

Britain's Andy Murray stands in the way of Federer's fifth consecutive title as he defeated world No. 1 Rafael Nadal in four sets in the other semifinal. Play got underway on Saturday with Murray taking a two set lead before the heavens opened and play was suspended. The match resumed yesterday and a pulsating encounter ensued between the Briton and the Olympic Gold medallist which saw Murray emerge victorious 62 76(5) 46 64.

It will be a historic final whatever the outcome. Federer is vying for his first Grand Slam title of the year and the chance to become the first man since 1924 to win five US Open titles in a row. Meanwhile Murray is hoping to end the 72-year US Open title drought for British men in his first Grand Slam final. For further information visit www.usopen.org.

Junior US Open Champions crowned

American Coco Vandeweghe and Bulgarian Grigor Dimitrov are the new US Open Junior champions after both scored quick-fire wins at Flushing Meadows on Sunday. Sixteen-year-old Vandeweghe picked up her first Junior Grand Slam title with a 76 61 victory over Gabriela Paz of Venezuela. Dimitrov won his second Junior Grand Slam in a row, adding to his boys' Wimbledon title with a 64 63 win over American qualifier Devin Britton.

"I'm on cloud nine right now," said Vandeweghe. "This is my first junior tournament win in the ITF, and to do it at the US Open is an even greater achievement for me."

Vandeweghe took advantage of a top half of the draw bereft of high seeds after the first round defeats of top seed Arantxa Rus (NED) and sixth seed Ana Bogdan (ROU), and the late withdrawal of fourth seed Jessica Moore (AUS). Paz, appearing in her first Grand Slam final, put up a strong resistance in the first set but then faded to leave Vandeweghe as the first American US Open Girls' champion since 1995.

Dimitrov looked strong throughout the week, dropping his only set to top seed Tsung-Hua Yang (TPE) in the semifinals. His final opponent Britton turned out to be the surprise package of the boys' event, coming through qualifying and cutting a swathe through the main draw, knocking out three seeds, including number two and Australian Open champion Bernard Tomic (AUS) in the first round. Dimitrov proved one opponent too many in the final, however, as the Bulgarian eased to a straight sets win and claimed the world No. 1 spot for the first time.

Dimitrov came to the US Open with his eye on the trophy and had been given extra confidence by his victory at Wimbledon. He said his experience at Wimbledon helped him against Britton. "It was my second final in a Grand Slam juniors event," said Dimitrov. "I was feeling very calm when I was playing the match. I wanted to win here because it was my last junior tournament. I was really focused on that."

Alicia Molik retires

Australia's Alicia Molik has announced her retirement from professional tennis with immediate effect. Molik's singles career was highlighted by five singles titles and a bronze medal at the 2004 Athens Olympics. She was also a Top 10 player in doubles, winning seven titles, including two Grand Slams. She reached three Grand Slam mixed doubles finals and represented Australia in Fed Cup for eight years and at three Olympic Games.

ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti said "Everyone at the ITF regrets that Alicia has been forced to retire due to injury and we will miss seeing her regularly on the Tour. She has been a great ambassador for tennis in Australia and around the world and we wish her the best of luck for the future."

Pro Circuit news

The first of two tournaments to take place in Guayaquil, Ecuador was won by 26-year-old Davis Cup player Carlos Avellan. The Ecuadorian needed two tiebreaks to see off the challenge from Luigi D'Agord (ITA), eventually winning 76(3) 76(5) and claiming his first singles title for almost two years.

The second tournament saw the same two players contest the singles final. Another close battle developed, with Avellan winning the first set, but in the second, Avellan reeled off six straight games to wrap up the title with a 75 60 victory.

In Romania, a series of 18 consecutive \$10,000 Men's Circuit Futures tournaments has come to an end. This run of clay court tournaments, played in 13 different venues, produced nine different singles champions with three Romanian players, Gabriel Moraru, Victor Ionita and Teodor-Dacian Craciun, taking four titles apiece.

Athens will play host this week to the first \$100,000+H tournament in Greece on the ITF Women's Circuit. The Vogue Athens Open clay court tournament has attracted eight entrants from within the WTA's top 100 ranked players, including the Greek No. 1 and former world No. 14 Eleni Daniilidou, and will take place at the Athens Lawn Tennis Club. This 109-year-old tennis club, the largest and oldest in Greece, also hosted the tennis event during the first Olympic Games in 1896 as well as Davis and Fed Cup ties.
