## Russia begins title defence

The world's top female players take centre stage this week when the 2009 Fed Cup by BNP Paribas gets underway in 12 countries across the world. Eight World Group and World Group II first round ties will be held on 7-8 February, while seven Zonal Group events also take place this week.

Olympic Gold medallist Elena Dementieva makes a return to Fed Cup after an absence of almost three years and headlines a strong Russian side which features world No. 7 Svetlana Kuznetsova, Anna Chakvetadze and Fed Cup debutante Alisa Kleybanova, who knocked out Ana Ivanovic in last week's Australian Open. The Russians will be a formidable opposition for the Chinese, who although they boast two players in the world's top 30 will face the defending champions on home soil in Moscow.

"There are good teams out there, but our girls always agree to play so that's why we are first," said Kuznetsova. "For me, it is the best competition because I like to play on a team, it's so much fun. It's like a group and in tennis, you are always by yourself. When you play as a team, especially when we play at home, it's the best atmosphere and I love being there."

## Nadal and Williams take spoils in Melbourne

Rafael Nadal and Serena Williams were the toast of Melbourne this weekend as they became the 2009 Australian Open singles champions. Nadal won his first Australian Open title and became just the fourth player in history to win Grand Slam titles on three different surfaces, while Williams won her tenth Grand Slam title and regained the world No. 1 ranking.

The two titles were decided in contrasting styles, Nadal took over four hours to subdue three-time champion Roger Federer, who was looking to equal Pete Sampras's record of 14 Grand Slam titles, while Williams took just 59 minutes to sweep past Dinara Safina.

Nadal showed no ill-effects from his record-breaking five hour, 14 minute semifinal victory against Fernando Verdasco as he outlasted Federer 75 36 76(3) 36 62 in four hours, 22 minutes.

"[It is] very special for me. Is a dream win here, one Grand Slam on hardcourt. I worked very hard the last, well, all my life for improve the tennis outside courts, well, outside of clay," Nadal said. "Very happy for the title. Today was really lot of emotions on court. I was there with the best player I ever saw."

In other World Group ties, Carla Suarez Navarro headlines last year's beaten finalists Spain and fresh from her impressive run of form at the Australian Open will be a tough opponent for the Czech Republic. The Czechs do have the home advantage however, as do the Americans, who in the absence of the Williams sisters have chosen to field youngsters Bethanie Mattek and Melanie Oudin alongside the more experienced Jill Craybas and Liezel Huber, for its tie against Argentina. The remaining World Group tie will see France take on Italy in Orleans.

Serbia makes its World Group II debut with its first ever tie against Japan. With two of the world's top eight, Serbia will be a tough proposition for the Japanese team, which started in World Group II in 2008 and advanced to the World Group play-offs, losing to France. Dominika Cibulkova will hope to repeat the success she experienced when winning the Hopman Cup for her country at the beginning of the year and joins Daniela Hantuchova in the Slovakian team which will face Belgium in Bratislava. The Bondarenko sisters once again step up to the plate for Ukraine and will look to rekindle the kind of form which saw them reach last year's play-offs. They go head-to-head against Israel in Kharkiv, a side who will be looking to replicate the success that saw them promoted to World Group in 2008. Zurich will host the clash between Switzerland and Germany.

Four nations from the three zonal Group I events will qualify for April's World Group II Play-offs (two from Europe/Africa, one from Asia/Oceania, one from Americas), where they will take on the four first round losers from World Group II.

Serena Williams won her fourth Australian Open title with an easy 60 63 victory over Safina. The American, who also became the highest earning sportswoman of all-time during the tournament, was in dominant form, as the Russian, who later admitted to suffering with nerves, struggled to find form.

"I'm so excited to win, because I wanted to win, and I feel like I needed to win. I wanted to get to 10. I really needed that, I wanted that for me," Williams said. "You never know what happens in life. I feel like opportunities sometimes don't present themselves twice."

Serena was collecting her second title of the weekend, having already partnered her sister Venus to the women's doubles title on Friday. The sisters defeated Daniela Hantuchova and Ai Sugiyama 63 63 for their eighth Grand Slam doubles title and their third in Australia.

It was also a case of keeping it in the family in the men's doubles, as Bob and Mike Bryan recovered to defeat Mahesh Bhupathi and Mark Knowles 26 75 60 in the final to seal their third Australian Open and seventh Grand Slam title overall.

There was some consolation for Bhupathi in the mixed doubles as he teamed up with Sania Mirza to win the title with a 63 61 victory over Nathalie Dechy and Andy Ram in the final, as Mirza became the first Indian woman to win a Grand Slam title of any sort.

## Bhambri and Pervak triumph at Junior Australian Open

Ksenia Pervak (RUS) made a winning return to junior tennis while Yuki Bhambri (IND) continued his dominance of recent months as both took their first Grand Slam titles at the junior Australian Open.

Top seed Bhambri had won his last two Grade A tournaments on the ITF Junior Circuit and went into the tournament as hot favourite. He started his campaign slowly, however, and when he edged past first round opponent German Sanchez Delfin (MEX) 86 in the third set, it looked like he was feeling the pressure. But the Indian managed to recover his form just in time, and got better and better as he made his way through the draw. In the final he dropped just four games as he eased to victory over unseeded German Alexandros-Fernandinos Georgoudas to take his first Grand Slam title and with it the world No. 1 position.

Ksenia Pervak had been as high as five in the junior world rankings back in 2007, but for the last 18 months she has concentrated on the professional circuit. Her experience proved too much for the rest of the field as she made her way to the final without dropping a set. In the final she was up against reigning Junior Wimbledon champion Laura Robson (GBR), who had yet to lose a match in a Grand Slam tournament. The final promised much but in the end Pervak was too strong for her younger opponent who, like Bhambri, conceded just four games on her way to the title.

The boys' doubles was also a victory for Asia, with Cheng-Peng Hsieh (TPE) claiming his third Grand Slam title when he teamed up with Francis Casey Alcantara (PHI) to beat Mikhail Biryukov (RUS) and Yasutaka Uchiyama (JPN). The US-Croatian pairing of Christina McHale and Alja Tomljanovic took the girls' title with victory over Aleksandra Krunic (SRB) and Sandra Zaniewska (POL).



## Kunieda, Vergeer & Norfolk retain titles in Melbourne

Shingo Kunieda (JPN), Esther Vergeer (NED) and Peter Norfolk (GBR) retained their Australian Wheelchair Tennis Open singles titles on Saturday as the first major of the 2009 NEC Wheelchair Tennis Tour drew to a close.

The extreme heat caused extra challenges for the wheelchair players, with red-hot tyres and wheel rims, and world No. 2 Robin Ammerlaan (NED) was forced to retire from his quarterfinal match when trailing world No. 3 Stephane Houdet (FRA) 46 14. Houdet went on to comfortably reach the final after a 60 62 victory over Maikel Scheffers (NED) in the semifinals, but Kunieda had a much tougher task in his semifinal, coming in danger of losing his 40-match winning streak before beating 2008 runner-up Michael Jeremiasz (FRA) 26 62 64. Houdet posed few problems for Kunieda in the final, the world No. 1 sealing his third successive Australian Open title 62 64.

Former champion Daniela di Toro (AUS) caused a big upset in the women's singles, beating world No. 3 Jiske Griffioen (NED) 63 76(7) to earn a semifinal against Vergeer. Di Toro was the last person to beat Vergeer at the end of January 2003, but almost six years after that victory di Toro became the 356<sup>th</sup> successive opponent to fall to Vergeer, who eased into the final with a 61 63 victory.

World No. 2 Korie Homan (NED) also comfortably reached the final and then had a game point that would have put her 5-0 ahead of Vergeer in the first set of the decider. Vergeer also went 0-2 down in the second set, but on both occasions the world No. 1 put together runs of six games to earn a 64 62 victory and her seventh Australian Open title.

Norfolk lost 26 62 46 to David Wagner (USA) in the second of their three quad singles round-robin matches, but the Briton reversed that result when both players met in the final, prevailing 76(5) 61 to add to his previous Australian Open titles in 2004 and 2008.

Ammerlaan returned to action to partner Kunieda in the men's doubles and the second seeds defeated Stefan Olsson (SWE) and Scheffers 75 61 in the final. Meanwhile, Homan and Vergeer beat Agnieszka Bartczak (POL) and Katharina Kruger (GER) 61 60 in the women's doubles final and Nick Taylor (USA) and Wagner beat Johan Andersson (SWE) and Norfolk 62 63 to win the quad doubles.

## Brits unbeatable at Junior Masters

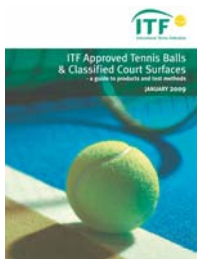
Gordon Reid and Jordanne Whiley led a British clean sweep of the boys' and girls' singles and doubles titles for the second successive year at the 2009 Cruyff Foundation International Wheelchair Tennis Junior Masters in Tarbes, France.

In the boys' singles, four players remained unbeaten going in to Saturday's final set of three round-robin matches. After easing through his first two pool 1 matches, defending champion Reid beat Gustavo Fernandez (ARG) 62 64 to top the pool and earn his place in Sunday's final. Meanwhile, second seed Tom Egberink (NED) set up a rematch of the 2008 final after beating Philip Cochrane (GBR) 61 64 in his final round-robin match to top pool 2.

A double break gave Reid the first set of the final, while a break in the eleventh game of the second set saw the 17-year-old world No.1 on his way to a 62 75 victory. Louise Hunt and Whiley set up the first all-British girls' singles final after each winning their first two of three round-robin matches, but Whiley went on to secure back-to-back victories over Hunt to clinch her third successive Junior Masters title.

Cochrane and Reid beat Egberink and Fernandez 62 63 in the boys' doubles final, while Hunt and Whiley won their third successive girls' doubles title after a 62 64 victory over Mackenzie Soldan (USA) and Brechje Widlak (NED).

## ITF Technical Department publications available



This week sees the publication of the 2009 issue of "ITF Approved Tennis Balls and Classified Court Surfaces – a guide to products and test methods."

Compiled by the ITF Technical Centre, this annual booklet lists all balls that are approved for tournament play under the Rules of Tennis. In addition, over 140 surfaces that have obtained ITF Classification for court pace are also listed. This comprehensive booklet provides information on the testing procedures for ball approval and court surface classification as well as contact details for all suppliers. All ITF National Associations will be receiving copies of this booklet by mail within the next few weeks. As additional balls are approved, and court surfaces classified, they shall be listed on the ITF web site.

Also included in this publication is a section entitled "ITF Guide to Test Methods for Tennis Court Surfaces" which recommends the test methods for testing the key properties of surfaces. This section is a revision to the Initial ITF Study on "Performance Characteristics for Tennis Court Surfaces," which was published in June 1997.

Further developments of the ITF Guide are anticipated, and consequently this section is supported by a web-based resource to communicate such changes. It is hoped that the ITF Guide will promote the development of higher standards for tennis courts and facilities for players of all levels and in assisting, wherever possible, in enhancing the enjoyment of those who choose to play our sport.

Fresh from his Australian Open victory, Rafael Nadal confirmed that his aim for 2009 is to win Davis Cup, after he missed playing in the 2008 final due to injury.

“My dream is to do well in Rotterdam and then Dubai, but my objective is the Davis Cup, which last year I wasn’t able to play in. To win that is a dream that I have this year,” said Nadal, who helped Spain win the 2004 Davis Cup.

Spain face Serbia in the first round of the 2009 Davis Cup by BNP Paribas at home in Benidorm on 6-8 March.
