Federer a class apart in Houston

Roger Federer provided a fitting end to a sublime year by winning the Tennis Masters Cup in Houston on Sunday, defeating Lleyton Hewitt in the Final 63 62.

For winning the event without losing a match, Federer received \$1.52 million and a silver Mercedes convertible sports car. Earlier in the week he was presented with the INDESIT ATP 2004 Race Trophy, for finishing the year as World No. 1.

In a rain affected final that was shortened to the best of three sets from the scheduled best of five, Federer took the last five games in a row. It was Federer's 74th match win and 11th title of the year, and he has now won 13 consecutive finals going back to Vienna last October, an Open Era record.

The victory was Federer's 23rd consecutive win against a top-10 ranked opponent, a run stretching back to last year's Masters Cup. Six of those victories have come at Hewitt's expense this season, including a straight-sets thrashing in the final of the US Open.

"It is nice to be on the board with so many other great players," said Federer. "All the records I broke or equalled this year have just been fantastic. Like Lleyton said, the last one and a half years for me have really started to go like a rocket. This is a great end. Only a few guys have won two Masters Cups in a row. It's nice."

Hewitt's runner-up finish was not quite enough to lift him above Andy Roddick into second place behind Federer in the year-end rankings. Nevertheless, Hewitt felt he could take 'a lot of positives' from his performances this year.

Russia welcomes Fed Cup Semifinals and Final



Moscow gets ready to host the deciding stage of the 2004 Fed Cup competition this week, with Russia, Austria, France and Spain lining up for the semifinals on Wednesday and Thursday. After a days break, the final will be held on Saturday and Sunday.

Russia, three times a Grand Slam nation this season, is staging the event for the second year running, but this time at Moscow's brand new Krylatskoe Ice Stadium. With a capacity of 5,200, the home team are likely to receive strong support from fans hoping that an outstanding year for their country can be capped with a first Fed Cup triumph.










First, Russia will have to get past Austria in the semifinals. Fielding two of this years Grand Slam champions in World No. 3 Anastasia Myskina and World No. 5 Svetlana Kuznetsova, the Russians also boast a 3-1 advantage in previous meetings with Austria. However the host nation was on the receiving end of a semifinal upset at the hands of France last year, and will be guarding against any complacency.

“It’s only been Roger that I’ve ended up losing to in the two finals. I could have had a lot better results in the other Slams if I didn’t bump into Roger in the 16s.”

The event was heavily affected by rain all week, yet despite all the delays and interruptions, the standard of tennis was fantastically high. After the round-robin stages, the top four players in the world went through to the semifinals. In perhaps the best match of the week, Federer defeated Marat Safin in one semifinal 63 76(18), the second set tie-break lasting 26 minutes and equalling, in points, the longest tie-break ever recorded in men’s tennis. Hewitt defeated Andy Roddick 63 62 in the other semifinal.

The doubles event also saw the four top-ranked teams reaching the semifinals, where Bob and Mike Bryan defeated newly crowned year-end No. 1 team Mark Knowles and Daniel Nestor 62 64. Wayne Black and Kevin Ullyett upset Jonas Bjorkman and Todd Woodbridge 64 62 in the other semifinal, before the Bryan brothers matched Federer and retained their title, winning the final 46 75 64 62. This will be a boost to the US Davis Cup team, likely to feature the Bryans as its doubles pairing, as it prepares for the Davis Cup by BNP Paribas Final in Seville.

Defending champion France takes on five-times winner Spain in the other semifinal. The French are bidding to become the first nation since the United States in 1999-2000 to win two successive Fed Cup titles; victory for France would give the country its third title overall, and veteran team member Mary Pierce has the chance to be involved in all three. France leads Spain 4-2 in their head-to-head.

Looking ahead to the final at the weekend, Russia and France are tied 3-3 in previous meetings, while Russia leads both Austria and Spain 3-1. France leads Austria 4-0. France will retain its position at No. 1 in the ITF Fed Cup Nations Ranking unless it fails to make the final. If that happens, then the winner of the competition will take over in the top spot.

The nations will do battle on a fast carpet surface. The draw for the semifinals takes place on site at 14:00 local time this Tuesday, 23 November. On Friday, the Draw for the Final will be at 13:00, immediately followed by the Draw for the 2005 Fed Cup competition. Patrick McEnroe announced as US Davis Cup Captain in 2006

Strasbourg to host France v Sweden Davis Cup 2005 tie

The French Tennis Federation has announced that, for the first time, Strasbourg has been selected as the venue for France’s Davis Cup First Round tie against Sweden on 4-6 March.

The proposed venue would be Rhenus Sport, a 6,000-capacity hall usually used by the local basketball team. The surface has yet to be decided. All Davis Cup first round venues are subject to ITF approval.

Federer, Sharapova, Mauresmo and Davenport honoured by ITWA

World No.1 Roger Federer’s remarkable achievements this year have been doubly recognised by the International Tennis Writers Association (ITWA) in their 2004 awards.

Federer was unanimously voted Player of the Year by tennis writers and was also honoured with ITWA’s Ambassador for Tennis award for his efforts to promote the sport.

Maria Sharapova won the women’s Player of the Year award while, in an echo of their tight duel for the No.1 ranking, Lindsay Davenport and Amelie Mauresmo were neck and neck in the voting for the women’s Ambassador for Tennis award. The pair will share the honour after voting ended in a dead heat. ITWA presented the winners with Montblanc pens.

WADA Foundation Board

ITF President, Francesco Ricci Bitti attended the meeting of the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) Foundation Board in Montreal on 21 November. A number of important decisions were taken at the meeting including an increase of US\$ 1.47 million in the expenditure budget for 2005 to a total of US\$ 21.705 million.

Dick Pound was re-elected chairman for another three years and Brian Mikkelsen, Minister of Sport for Denmark was elected to the position of vice-chair. The nomination of Dr Babette Pluim to the WADA Health Medical Research Committee, was accepted. Dr Pluim is a member of the ITF Sport Science and Medicine Commission.

Davenport claims coveted year-end No. 1 ranking

Lindsay Davenport put the finishing touches on her stunning 2004 season by securing the year-end World No. 1 ranking.

It marks the third time Davenport, 28, has finished the year atop the world rankings and adds yet another achievement to her remarkable 2004 season, which includes the Porsche Race to the Championships title she claimed earlier this month. She previously ended the year at No. 1 in 2001 and 1998.

Davenport took over the No. 1 ranking on 18 October after reaching the Kremlin Cup semifinals in Moscow. It marked the sixth time she had taken over the No. 1 ranking at any point in her career.

Sharapova claims WTA Tour Championships Title

Maria Sharapova came back from 4-0 down in the third set of the WTA Tour Championships Final against Serena Williams to win the match and the title 46 62 64.

The victory repeated the young Russian's triumph over the American in the Wimbledon Final, earning her a winner's cheque of one million dollars, along with a brand new Porsche Cayenne. Sharapova announced she would be donating the vehicle to the victims of September's school hostage tragedy in Beslan, Russia.

10th ITF South American Regional Coaches Workshop

The 10th ITF South American Coaches Workshop came to a close in Asunción, Paraguay on Saturday 20 November 2004. The five-day workshop, which was organized by the ITF in conjunction with the Asociación Paraguaya de Tenis and the Confederación Sudamericana de Tenis (COSAT), was held at the Hotel Resort Casino Yacht and Golf Club Paraguayo. Wilson Sporting Goods also supported the workshop. This year's event attracted more than 160 coaches from all South American nations including 45 local coaches.

The aim of the Workshop is to bring together some of the world's leading tennis coaches and sports scientists to present on the most up-to-date information related to tennis training. Speakers at this year's event included Dr Paul Roetert (USA), Dr Dietmar Samulski (GER), Gustavo Luza (ARG), Javier Capitaine (ARG), Diego García (ARG), Dr Javier Maquirriáin (ARG), Marcelo Albamonte (ARG), Carlos Castellán (ARG), Daniel Rosenbaum (BRA), Roberta Burzagli (BRA), Eccio Rondón (VEN), Larissa Schaerer (PAR), Jorge Atischa (CHI), Richard González (URU), Ivan Molina (ITF Touring Team Coach), Miguel Crespo (ITF Development Research Officer), Miguel Miranda (ITF Development Officer for South America), and Dave Miley (Executive Director, ITF Tennis Development).

The inauguration ceremony was attended by Miguel Carrizosa, President of the Senate of the Republic of Paraguay, Rubén Meilnicke (President of the Asociación Paraguaya de Tenis), Daniel Lugo (Sports Manager of the Resort) and Ramón Zubizarreta (President of the Olympic Committee of Paraguay (COP), who opened the Workshop.

Zubizarreta said: "I am delighted to see such great enthusiasm amongst the participants and speakers. The COP is proud to host this workshop and we hope to continue with this coaches' education programme with even greater passion."

Larissa Schaerer, workshop coordinator, said: "I would like to thank the speakers for sharing their knowledge and experience of high-level tennis training with the participating South American coaches."

The South American Workshop is the fourth of five ITF Regional Workshops to be held in 2004. Regional Workshops are held biennially and are aimed at national and local coaches working with all levels of players. Executive Director of Tennis Development, Dave Miley said: "Regional workshops are so important for the development of tennis in the region. It is nice to see many top coaches from South America attending this workshop and taking the time to learn from some of the world's most experienced coaches."



ITF Central American 14 & Under Development Championships

The 7th ITF Central American 14 & Under Development Championships took place from 15 to 18 November 2004 and were hosted for a second consecutive year by the Federación Panameña de Tenis (FPT) at its National Centre in Panama City.

The event, which is organised in collaboration with COTECC, attracted entries from the following five countries who sent teams to take part in the Championships: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Panama.

The tournament was run using the feed-in consolation format for both the singles and doubles events. Top players from the region competed in the event with the boys' singles being won by Andres Bucaro from Guatemala whilst the girls' event saw a home win when Nicole Stanziola from Panama took the singles title. Both players had won the 2004 JITIC event, which demonstrates the high level of competition at these Championships.

Gustavo Granitto, ITF Development Officer for Central America & Caribbean, commented: "Whilst expressing our gratitude to the FPT for organising the event, Jorge Cano, Tournament Director, told me what a positive effect the Championships had had, not least because two Panamanian girls reached the girls' singles final."

The ITF Central American 14 & Under Development Championships is used as the basis for monitoring the progress of regional players who have come up through the various ITF development programmes and for selection to the ITF Central American & Caribbean Junior team to South America.
