### On court today...

- World No. 1 Carlos Alcaraz faces 2021 Wimbledon finalist Matteo Berrettini in the 3rd match on Centre Court today – and, if this match is anything like their previous Grand Slam encounter, the fans will be in for a treat. Berrettini won in a final-set tiebreak when the pair met at the Australian Open last year, and while Alcaraz has won their 2 other meetings on Tour, both of those matches also went to a deciding set. Alcaraz lost to an Italian player at this stage here last year, falling to Jannik Sinner, and will be keen to avoid a similar fate this time. For Berrettini, a victory against Alcaraz today would represent his first win against a No. 1-ranked player on his 4th attempt. It would also be his first victory against a Top 5 opponent since defeating No. 3 Dominic Thiem at the 2021 ATP Cup and end a 9-match match losing streak against Top 5 players.
- No. 3 seed Daniil Medvedev, No. 5 seed Stefanos Tsitsipas and No. 6 seed Holger Rune are also in action today, with all 3 men bidding to reach their first Wimbledon quarterfinals. For Medvedev, who faces Jiri Lehecka, this would see him become the 10th active male player to reach the last 8 at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments – and the 2nd to do so at Wimbledon this year, after Andrey Rublev achieved the feat on Sunday. For Tsitsipas, victory against Wimbledon debutant Christopher Eubanks would make him the first Greek player in history to reach the quarterfinals here. And for Rune, who is up against former Wimbledon semifinalist Grigor Dimitrov, a win today would make him the 2nd Danish player to reach the last 8 here, after Kurt Nielsen in 1953, 1955 and 1958.

A 4th meeting for Alcaraz and Berrettini, their 2nd at a Grand Slam and their first on grass. Alcaraz leads the overall head-to-head but Berrettini won their only previous match at the Grand Slams – in a final-set tiebreak in the 3rd round at the Australian Open last year.

Alcaraz is facing an Italian player in the round of 16 at Wimbledon for the 2nd straight year, having lost to Jannik Sinner in the last 16 here in 2022. He has a 10-6 win-loss record against Italian players at Tour-level overall.

Berrettini is bidding to defeat a world No. 1 for the first time on his 4th attempt. All 3 of his previous meetings with No. 1-ranked players came against Novak Djokovic in 2021 – in the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, in the final at Wimbledon and in the quarterfinals at the US Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 13 Gael Monfils in the quarterfinals at the 2019 US Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Wimbledon is No. 17 Alex de Minaur in the 2nd round here this year.

Berrettini is also bidding to end a 9-match losing streak against Top 5 players. He has not defeated a Top 5 player since the 2021 ATP Cup, when he defeated No. 3 Dominic Thiem in the group stage. He has a 4-15 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

- **ALCARAZ** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 10th Grand Slam overall.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **13th Spanish man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon**. He would become the 4th active Spanish player to reach the quarterfinals here – after Rafael Nadal (8 Wimbledon quarterfinal appearances) and Roberto Bautista Agut and Fernando Verdasco (both one).

- Alcaraz is bidding to reach his 5th Grand Slam quarterfinal and become the **12th Spanish man in history reach the quarterfinals at the Grand Slams on 5 or more occasions** – after Nadal (47 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), David Ferrer (17), Manuel Orantes and Manuel Santana (both 10), Juan Carlos Ferrero (9), Carlos Moya (8), Andres Gimeno and Tommy Robredo (both 7), Alex Corretja (6), and Manuel Alonson-Areyzaga and Albert Costa (both 5).
- Aged 20 years 72 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2014**, when Nick Kyrgios reached the quarterfinals here aged 19 years 70 days. (NB all ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **8th man in the Open Era to reach 5 or more quarterfinals at the Grand Slams prior to turning 21** – after Bjorn Borg and Mats Wilander (who both made 8 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances prior to their 21st birthdays), Boris Becker (7), Nadal (6), and Andre Agassi, Goran Ivanisevic and Novak Djokovic (all 5).
- If Alcaraz and Holger Rune (20 years 78 days) both win today and reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time that multiple players aged under 21 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2004** – when Mario Ancic (20 years 96 days) and Florian Mayer (20 years 273 days) both reached the quarterfinals here.
- If Alcaraz and Rune both win today, they will play each other in the **first Wimbledon men's singles quarterfinal contested by 2 players aged under 21 in the Open Era**. It will also be the first Grand Slam men's singles quarterfinal contested by 2 players aged under 21 since the 2009 US Open, when Juan Martin del Potro (20 years 355 days) defeated Marin Cilic (20 years 350 days).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Alcaraz has become the **9th Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Nadal (10 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Feliciano Lopez (6), Ferrer and Verdasco (both 5), Ferrero and Roberto Bautista Agut (both 4), and Gimeno and Orantes (both 2).
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 6th time, Alcaraz has become the **19th Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the last 16 at the Grand Slams on 6 or more occasions**. He is the 5th active Spanish man to record at least 6 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances – after Nadal (54 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Verdasco (18), Bautista Agut (13) and Pablo Carreno Busta (9).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Alcaraz has equalled his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the round of 16. He also reached the round of 16 here last year, when he defeated Jan-Lennard Struff, Tallon Griekspoor and Oscar Otte before falling to Jannik Sinner. His only other appearance here came as a wild card in 2021, when he reached the 2nd round (d. Yasutaka Uchiyama, l. Daniil Medvedev).
- Alcaraz won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2022 US Open, defeating Casper Ruud in the final. Aged 19 years 129 days, became the youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion since Nadal (19 years 2 days) at 2005 Roland Garros and youngest US Open men's singles champion since Pete Sampras (19 years 28 days) in 1990.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **3rd-youngest player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon men's singles title** – after Becker (who won his first 2 Wimbledon titles aged 17 years 227 days in 1985 and aged 18 years 226 days in 1986) and Borg (who won his first Wimbledon title aged 20 years 27 days).
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **5th man in the Open Era to win multiple Grand Slam titles prior to turning 21** – after Wilander (who won 4 Grand Slam titles prior to his 21st birthday), Borg (3) and Becker and Nadal (both 2).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Alcaraz reached the semifinals at Roland Garros (l. Novak Djokovic). He withdrew from the Australian Open due to a right leg injury.
- Alcaraz won his **first grass court title** at Queen's last month, defeating Alex de Minaur in the final. It was his 3rd grass court event as a professional, with his only previous appearances on grass coming at Wimbledon in 2021 and 2022. He contested 2 grass court events as a junior – reaching the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at both J1 Roehampton (l. Valentin Royer) and Wimbledon (l. Martin Damm) in 2019.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the 8th man to **win the title at Queen's and Wimbledon in the same year** – after Becker, Jimmy Connors, Lleyton Hewitt, John McEnroe, Andy Murray, Nadal and Sampras.

- Alcaraz's **other highlights in 2023** are winning the titles at Buenos Aires (d. Cameron Norrie), Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev), Barcelona (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Madrid-1000 (d. Struff). With 5 titles so far this season, he is in joint-first place on the list for most Tour-level titles won in 2023, alongside Medvedev. He also finished runner-up at Rio de Janeiro (l. Norrie) and reached the semifinals at Miami-1000 (l. Sinner).
- Alcaraz is bidding to record his **44th Tour-level match win of 2023**. He is in 2nd place on the list for most Tour-level match-wins in 2023.

- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He began his 27th week as world No. 1 on Monday, having returned to the No. 1 ranking following his title victory at Queen's last month. He will remain at No. 1 on Monday 17 July if he records a better or equal Wimbledon result to Djokovic.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz made his **Davis Cup** debut for Spain in 2022 and has won one of the 2 matches he has contested in the competition to date. Spain will compete in Valencia alongside Serbia, Czechia and Korea, Rep. in Group C at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals.
- BERRETTINI** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Berrettini is bidding to become the **2nd Italian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Jannik Sinner, who has reached the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time this year. He is one of 6 Italian men in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon, alongside Uberto de Morpurgo (1928), Nicola Pietrangeli (1955, 1960), Adriano Panatta (1979), Davide Sanguinetti (1998) and Sinner (2022 and 2023).
- Berrettini is bidding to reach his 6th Grand Slam quarterfinal and claim sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances by an Italian man**, ahead of Adriano Panatta.

- If Berrettini wins today and joins Sinner in the quarterfinals here this year, it will be the **first time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon**. It will also be the 7th time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam – and the 3rd time that both Berrettini and Sinner have reached the quarterfinals at the same Grand Slam tournament, after the 2022 Australian Open and 2022 US Open.
- By reaching the round of 16 here for the Berrettini has become the **2nd Italian man in history to reach the round the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Pietrangeli, who reached the last 16 here on 5 occasions. Sinner, who has reached the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this week, is the only other Italian man to have reached the last 16 here on multiple occasions.

- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 10th time, Berrettini has claimed sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by an Italian man** – ahead of Giuseppe Merlo and Sinner. Pietrangeli (16 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances) is the only Italian man to have reached the last 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Berrettini.
- With Berrettini and Sinner both reaching the round of 16 here this year, it is the **3rd time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon** – after 1949 (Rolando del Bello and Giovanni Cucelli), 1955 (Merlo and Pietrangeli) and 2021 (Berrettini and Lorenzo Sonego).
- **Last year here**, Berrettini withdrew from the event after testing positive for Covid-19. Prior to Wimbledon in 2022, he won the titles at both Stuttgart (d. Andy Murray) and Queen's (d. Filip Krajinovic) in the first 2 weeks of the grass court season, becoming the first man to win 2 grass court titles prior to Wimbledon since 2001 – when Lleyton Hewitt ('s-Hertogenbosch and Queen's) and Thomas Johansson (Nottingham and Halle) both won 2 grass court titles prior to Wimbledon.
- On his last appearance here, in 2021, Berrettini reached his **first Grand Slam final**, falling to Novak Djokovic in 4 sets. He became the first Italian man to reach a Grand Slam final since Panatta at 1976 Roland Garros and the first Italian man in history to contest the final at Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Berrettini fell to Murray in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open. He withdrew from Roland Garros due to an abdominal injury.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Berrettini competed at Stuttgart, falling to Sonego in the 1st round. He withdrew from Queen's due to an abdominal injury.
- Berrettini's **best Tour-level result in 2023** is reaching the quarterfinals at Acapulco, where he retired against Holger Rune due to a right leg injury. He also reached the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000 but gave a walkover to Rune due to an oblique muscle injury. He made his first appearance at Challenger-level since 2019, reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (l. Alexander Shevchenko).
- Berrettini has won **7 Tour-level singles titles** – of which 4 have come on grass. In addition to his victories at Stuttgart and Queen's last year, he also won the titles at 2019 Stuttgart (d. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and 2021 Queen's (d. Cameron Norrie). He is one of 2 players to reach the round of 16 here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass, alongside Djokovic. His 3 other titles have come on clay – at 2018 Gstaad, 2019 Budapest and 2021 Belgrade I.
- Berrettini's has won the 7 of the 9 **five-set matches** he has contested – including both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon, defeating Jack Sock in the 1st round in 2018 and Diego Schwartzman in the 3rd round in 2019. His only defeats in 5-set matches came at the Australian Open – against Tennys Sandgren in the 2nd round in 2020 and against Murray in the 1st round this year.
- Berrettini reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in January 2022 after reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open. He plays here at No. 38 – his lowest ranking since April 2019.
- Berrettini made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 5-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. Italy will compete in Bologna alongside Canada, Sweden and Chile in Group A at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals.
- Berrettini is coached by Vincenzo Santopadre, Marco Gulisano and Umberto Rianna.

### NO. 3 DANIIL MEDVEDEV v JIRI LEHECKA (CZE)

#### Head-to-head: first meeting

Lehecka is bidding to defeat a Top 5 player for the 2nd time. He has a 1-4 win-loss record against Top 5 players, with his only victory coming against No. 5 Andrey Rublev in the quarterfinals at Doha this year. He lost his only previous Grand Slam match against a Top 5 player – against No. 4 Stefanos Tsitsipas in the quarterfinals at the Australian Open this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 12 Cameron Norrie in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 25th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Medvedev is bidding to reach his first Wimbledon quarterfinal and become the **11th active male player to reach the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments** – after Matteo Berrettini, Marin Cilic, Novak Djokovic, Karen Khachanov, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal, Kei Nishikori, Andrey Rublev, Jannik Sinner and Stan Wawrinka. (NB Rublev has completed the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam events by reaching the quarterfinals here this year).
- Medvedev is bidding to reach his **7th Grand Slam quarterfinal** – but his first since the 2022 Australian Open, when he finished runner-up. He has failed to advance beyond the round of 16 at all 4 Grand Slam events he has contested since then.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Medvedev has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the round of 16 here in 2021 (l. Hubert Hurkacz). He did not compete here in 2022.
- Medvedev won his first **Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Djokovic in straight sets and ending both Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak. He has also reached 3 other Grand Slam finals – at the 2019 US Open (l. Nadal) and the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic) and 2022 (l. Nadal).

- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Medvedev reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Sebastian Korda) but fell to qualifier Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round at Roland Garros.
- Medvedev has **won 5 Tour-level titles in 2023** – at Rotterdam (d. Sinner), Doha (d. Murray), Dubai (d. Rublev), Miami-1000 (d. Sinner) and Rome-1000 (d. Holger Rune). He is in joint-first place on the list for most Tour-level titles won in 2023, alongside Carlos Alcaraz.
- Medvedev is bidding to record his **45th Tour-level match win of 2023**. He has recorded more Tour-level match-wins than any other player so far this season.

- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Medvedev reached the quarterfinals at Halle, defeating Laslo Djere and Marcos Giron before falling to Roberto Bautista Agut, but lost his opening match at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Adrian Mannarino).
- Medvedev's **other highlights in 2023** are reaching the final at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz), the semifinals at Adelaide I (l. Djokovic) and the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Rune) and Halle (l. Bautista Agut).
- Medvedev has **won one Tour-level grass court title** – at 2021 Mallorca (d. Sam Querrey). Of his 19 other Tour-level titles, 18 have come on hard courts, with his only clay court title to date coming at Rome-1000 this year.
- Medvedev has won one of the 5 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He defeated Marin Cilic in 5 sets in the 3rd round here in 2021, but has lost 5-set matches here against Ruben Bemelmans in the 2nd round in 2017, Adrian Mannarino in the 3rd round in 2018, David Goffin in the 3rd round in 2019 and Hurkacz in the round of 16 in 2021.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray and Rafael Nadal) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 and plays here at No. 3. He is no longer in contention for the post-Wimbledon No. 1 ranking, following the performances of Alcaraz and Djokovic so far this fortnight.
- Medvedev reached a career-high **junior** ranking of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, l. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **LEHECKA** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 7th Grand Slam overall.
- Lehecka is bidding to become the **7th Czech man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Ivan Lendl (7 Wimbledon quarterfinal appearances), Tomas Berdych (5), Jan Kodes (3), and Petr Korda, Tomas Smid and Radek Stepanek (all one).
- Lehecka is also bidding to become the **8th Czech man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at the Grand Slams on multiple occasions** – after Lendl (34 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), Berdych (17), Kodes (10), Korda (6), Karel Novacek (3) and Smid (2).
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon main draw debut, Lehecka fell to Filip Krajinovic in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Lehecka's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at the Australian Open this year. He defeated Borna Coric, Christopher Eubanks, Cameron Norrie and Felix Auger-Aliassime for his first Grand Slam match-wins before falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2023**, Lehecka reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Jan-Lennard Struff, l. Marcos Giron).

- Lehecka's **other highlights in 2023** are reaching the semifinals at Doha (l. Andy Murray), the quarterfinals at Banja Luka (l. Miomir Kecmanovic) and the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Karen Khachanov) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Taylor Fritz). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Prostějov Challenger (CZE) (l. Lukas Klein).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Lehecka recorded his first grass court match-wins as a professional by reaching the 2nd round at both Stuttgart (d. Giron, l. Frances Tiafoe) and Queen's (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, l. Carlos Alcaraz). His only other appearances on grass as a professional came in 2022 – when he fell in the 1st round at both Stuttgart (l. Nick Kyrgios) and Wimbledon, and lost in the 1st round of qualifying at Halle (l. Dominic Stricker).
- Lehecka's **career-best Tour-level results** are reaching the semifinals at 2022 Rotterdam (l. Tsitsipas) and at Doha this year.
- Lehecka has won 3 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested. He fell to Krajinovic in 5 sets in the 1st round here last year, but has won all 3 five-set matches he has contested since then – against Norrie in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year, against Struff in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year and against Tommy Paul in the 3rd round here this year.
- Lehecka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 36 in April this year. He plays here one place lower at No. 37.
- Lehecka had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 10 in March 2019 and reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at both the Australian Open and US Open in 2019, falling to Emilio Nava on both occasions. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (d. Harry Wendelken, l. William Grant) and also won the boys' doubles title alongside Jonas Forejtek here that year.
- Lehecka made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 4-7 win-loss record in the competition. Czechia will participate in the Finals in September.
- Lehecka is coached by Michal Navratil.

# NO. 5 STEFANOS TSITSIPAS (GRE) v CHRISTOPHER EUBANKS (USA)

### Head-to-head: first meeting

Eubanks is bidding to defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on his 2nd attempt. He lost his only previous match against a Top 5 player, falling to No. 5 Daniil Medvedev in the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 13 Cameron Norrie in the 2nd round here this year.

Eubanks and Tsitsipas are at the top of the list for most tiebreaks contested during the 2023 grass court season, with Eubanks playing 12 tiebreaks in that time and Tsitsipas playing 11.

Eubanks has a 9-3 win-loss record in tiebreaks during the grass court season this year and has won the last 8 tiebreaks he has contested. The last 4 sets he has contested have all gone to tiebreaks, all of which he has won.

Tsitsipas has a 6-5 win-loss record in tiebreaks during the grass court season this year. He has played 7 tiebreaks so far at Wimbledon, winning 5 of them.

- **TSITSIPAS** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time and become the first Greek player in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 24th Grand Slam overall.
- Tsitsipas is bidding to reach his **8th Grand Slam quarterfinal**. He is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals at 3 consecutive Grand Slam tournaments for the first time in his career. He is one of 2 Greek players in history to have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam, alongside Maria Sakkari, who reached her first 2 Grand Slam quarterfinals at Roland Garros and the US Open in 2021.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Tsitsipas has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the round of 16 here in 2018, defeating Gregoire Barrere, Jared Donaldson and Thomas Fabbiano before falling to John Isner in straight sets. He became the first Greek man to reach the last 16 at a Grand Slam since Nicky Kalogeropoulos at 1964 Wimbledon.
- By defeating Dominic Thiem and Andy Murray in the opening 2 rounds here, Tsitsipas became the **first man to defeat 2 former Grand Slam champions at the same Grand Slam event** since Grigor Dimitrov at the 2021

Australian Open – Dimitrov defeated 2014 US Open champion Marin Cilic in the 1st round and 2020 US Open champion Thiem in the round of 16.

- **Last year here**, as No. 4 seed, Tsitsipas reached the 3rd round, defeating Alexander Ritschard and Jordan Thompson before falling to Nick Kyrgios.
- Tsitsipas reached his **2nd Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, falling to Novak Djokovic in straight sets. He also reached the final at 2021 Roland Garros, where he fell to Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He is the only Greek player in history to have reached a Grand Slam final.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Tsitsipas reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Tsitsipas' **other highlights in 2023** are finishing runner-up at Barcelona (l. Alcaraz) and reaching the semifinals at Rome-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev), and the quarterfinals at Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Taylor Fritz) and Madrid-1000 (l. Jan-Lennard Struff)
- Tsitsipas has won 3 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested in the main draw at Wimbledon – including his 5-set victories against Thiem and Murray here this year. He also defeated Donaldson in 5 sets the 2nd round here in 2018 but fell to Fabbiano in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2019. He has an 11-6 win-loss record in 5 set matches at Tour-level overall and also won a 5-set match against Joris de Loore in the final round of qualifying at 2017 Wimbledon.
- Tsitsipas reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in August 2021. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 5.
- Tsitsipas is a **former junior world No. 1**. His best Grand Slam singles results as a junior were reaching the semifinals at both Wimbledon (l. Denis Shapovalov) and the US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) in 2016. He also won the boys' doubles title alongside Kenneth Raisma at 2016 Wimbledon (d. Auger-Aliassime/Shapovalov).
- Tsitsipas made his **Davis Cup** debut for Greece at the 2019 Europe Group III event in Athens and has a 10-1 overall win-loss record in the competition. Greece will play at home against Slovakia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Tsitsipas is coached by his father, Apostolos Tsitsipas.
- **EUBANKS** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 9th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Eubanks is bidding to become the **14th man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals on his Wimbledon debut** – and the 2nd to do so in 2023. On Sunday, Roman Safiullin became the first man to reach the quarterfinals on his Wimbledon debut since Nick Kyrgios in 2014.

- If Eubanks wins today and joins Safiullin in the quarterfinals, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple Wimbledon debutants have reached the men's singles quarterfinals**.

- Eubanks is bidding to become the **46th American man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon**. He would become the 3rd active American man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon – after John Isner (who reached the quarterfinals in 2018) and Taylor Fritz (2022).
- Eubanks is bidding to become the **83rd American man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. He would also become the 8th active American man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam – after Isner (3 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), Tennys Sandgren and Frances Tiafoe (both 2), and Fritz, Sebastian Korda, Tommy Paul and Ben Shelton (all one).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Eubanks has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best result at the Grand Slams was reaching the 2nd round Grand Slam on 2 occasions – as a qualifier at the 2022 US Open (d. Pedro Martinez, I. Jannik Sinner) and as a wild card at the Australian Open this year (d. Soonwoo Kwon, I. Jiri Lehecka).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Eubanks fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (I. Holger Rune).
- **Last year here**, Eubanks reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Tomas Barrios Vera, I. Lukas Rosol). He also fell in qualifying here in 2018, 2019 and 2021.
- Eubanks' best result in 2023 is winning his **first Tour-level title** – on grass at Mallorca last month (d. Adrian Mannarino). He is one of 9 players to reach the men's singles round of 16 here this year to have won a Tour-level grass court title. He also reached his first quarterfinal at Masters-1000-level as a qualifier at Miami-1000 this year (I. Daniil Medvedev).
- **Elsewhere on grass in 2023**, Eubanks lost in the 1st round as a qualifier at both Stuttgart (I. Richard Gasquet) and Halle (I. Hubert Hurkacz). He also reached the 2nd round at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (d. Aleksandar Kovacevic, I. Jurij Rodionov).
- Eubanks' **best results at Challenger-level in 2023** are reaching the semifinals at the Gwangju Challenger (KOR) (I. Jordan Thompson) and reaching the quarterfinals at the Seoul Challenger (KOR) (I. Aleksandar Vukic) and the Busan Challenger (KOR) (I. Vukic).
- Eubanks is bidding to extend an **8-match Tour-level winning streak**, having won 5 matches en route to the title at Mallorca last week and his opening 3 matches here. He has not lost a match at Tour-level since falling to Hurkacz in the 1st round at Halle last month.
- Eubanks has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested. He fell to Cristian Garin in 5 sets in the 1st round at the 2019 US Open but recorded his first victory in a 5-set match against Kwon in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Eubanks **broke the Top 50 for the first time** last week following his title-victory at Mallorca and plays here at a new career-high ranking of No. 43.
- Eubanks **played college tennis**. He represented Georgia Tech in 2014-17 and was named a 2-time all-American and awarded ACC Player of the Year in 2016 and 2017.
- Eubanks is coached by Ruan Roelofse.

#### Head-to-head: first meeting

Dimitrov is bidding to defeat a Top 10 player at Wimbledon for the 3rd time – and for the 2nd consecutive match, having defeated No. 10 Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round here. He has a 2-2 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Wimbledon, with his other victory coming against No. 5 Andy Murray in the quarterfinals in 2014. He has a 4-13 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams and a 33-78 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.

Rune is bidding to defeat a Top 30 player on grass for the 2nd time. He has a 1-2 win-loss record against Top 30 players on grass at Tour-level, with his only victory coming against No. 16 Lorenzo Musetti in the quarterfinals at Queen's this year.

Rune has won one of his last 5 matches against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams, with his only victory against a Top 30 player at a Grand Slam in that time coming against No. 23 Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year. He has a 3-5 win-loss record against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams and a 25-21 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Tour-level overall.

- **RUNE** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Rune is bidding to become the **2nd Danish player in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Kurt Nielsen, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1953, 1955 and 1958.
- Rune is bidding to reach his **3rd Grand Slam quarterfinal**. By reaching his 2nd Grand Slam quarterfinal at Roland Garros this year, he became the 3rd Danish player in history to reach the quarterfinals at the Grand Slams on multiple occasions – after Caroline Wozniacki (10 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances) and Nielsen (4).
- If Rune (20 years 78 days) wins today and Carlos Alcaraz (20 years 72 days) loses, Rune will become the **youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2014** – when Nick Kyrgios reached the quarterfinals here aged 19 years 70 days. (NB all ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

- If Rune and Alcaraz both win today and reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time that multiple players aged under 21 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2004** – when Mario Ancic (20 years 96 days) and Florian Mayer (20 years 273 days) both reached the quarterfinals here.
- If Rune and Alcaraz both win today, they will play each other in the **first Wimbledon men's singles quarterfinal contested by 2 players aged under 21 in the Open Era**. It will also be the first Grand Slam men's singles quarterfinal contested by 2 players aged under 21 since the 2009 US Open, when Juan Martin del Potro (20 years 355 days) defeated Marin Cilic (20 years 350 days).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Rune has become the **7th Danish man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Erik Larsen (who reached the last 16 here in 1913), Einer Ulrich (1926), Nielsen (1953, 1954, 1955 and 1958), Jurgen Ulrich (1959, 1960 and 1964), Torben Ulrich (1960) and Jan Leschly (1966).
- By reaching the round of 16 at the Grand Slams for the 4th time, Rune has become the **3rd Danish man in history to reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 4 or more occasions** – after Nielsen (11 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances) and Torben Ulrich (6).
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon debut, Rune fell to Marcos Giron in the 1st round.
- Rune's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in both 2022 and 2023, losing to Casper Ruud on both occasions.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Rune reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open, falling to Andrey Rublev in 5 sets.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Rune reached the semifinals at Queen's, where he defeated Maxime Cressy, Ryan Peniston and Lorenzo Musetti to record his first grass court victories as a professional, before falling to Alex de Minaur. He had lost in the 1st round at the 3 professional grass court events he played prior to this year – at Halle (l. Pablo Carreno Busta), Eastbourne (l. Peniston) and Wimbledon in 2022.
- Rune's **best result in 2023** is successfully defending his title at Munich (d. Botic van de Zandschulp). He also reached the final at Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Rublev) and Rome-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev), and the semifinals at Acapulco and Queen's, falling to De Minaur at both events.
- Rune won his **first Masters-1000 title** at 2022 Paris-1000, defeating Novak Djokovic in the final. He became the first Danish player to win a Masters-1000 title and the first player to record 5 victories against Top 10 opponents at any event other than the ATP Finals since the ATP Tour began in 1990.
- Rune is bidding to record his **37th Tour-level match win of 2023**. He is in joint-3rd place on the list for most Tour-level match-wins in 2023, alongside Jannik Sinner.

- Rune has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested – including his 5-set victory against Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in the 3rd round here. He lost the first 2 five-set matches of his career – falling to Soonwo Kwon in the 1st round at the 2022 Australian Open and to Rublev in the round of 16 at the 2023 Australian Open – before winning his first 5-set match against Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year.
- Rune **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in November 2022 after winning the title at Paris-1000. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 6 in May and plays here at the same ranking.
- Rune is a **former junior world No. 1**. He won the boys' singles title at 2019 Roland Garros (d. Toby Kodat) and reached the top ranking in October that year. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Anton Matusevich).
- Rune is coached by Lars Christensen and Patrick Mouratoglu.

- **DIMITROV** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and his 51st Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Dimitrov is bidding to become the **3rd Bulgarian player to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Katerina Maleeva (who reached the women’s singles quarterfinals here in 1990 and 1992) and Tsvetana Pironkova (2010 and 2011).
- Dimitrov is bidding to reach his **7th Grand Slam quarterfinal** and equal Katerina Maleeva in 2nd place on the list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances by a Bulgarian player. He is currently in 3rd place on the list, behind Manuela Maleeva (8 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances while representing Bulgaria) and Katerina Maleeva (7). He is the only Bulgarian man in history to have reached a Grand Slam quarterfinal
- Dimitrov is bidding to record his **20th Wimbledon match-win**. By defeating Sho Shimabukuro for his 17th Wimbledon match-win in the 1st round, Dimitrov claimed sole ownership of 2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon match-wins by a Bulgarian player, ahead of Katerina Maleeva and Manuela Maleeva. Magdalena Maleeva, who recorded 21 Wimbledon match-wins, is the only Bulgarian player to have recorded more match-wins here than Dimitrov.
- Dimitrov is **through to the round of 16 at Wimbledon for the 3rd time – and for the first time since 2017**. Since reaching the last 16 here in 2017, he has lost in the 1st round or 2nd round on all 4 of his appearances at Wimbledon prior to this year.
- Dimitrov is **through to the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 14th time** – and for the 2nd straight Grand Slam tournament. It would be the first time he has reached the round of 16 at back-to-back Grand Slam events since 2020-21, when he reached the last 16 at 2020 Roland Garros and the quarterfinals at the 2021 Australian Open.
- **Last year here**, Dimitrov reached retired due to a left leg injury during his 1st round match against Johnson.
- Dimitrov’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 3 occasions – including once at Wimbledon, in 2014 (l. Novak Djokovic). He also reached the semifinals at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and the 2019 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Dimitrov reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev) and the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Djokovic).
- Dimitrov is contesting **50th consecutive Grand Slam tournament** here this year, putting him in joint-9th place on the all-time list for most consecutive appearances in the men’s singles at the Grand Slams, alongside David Ferrer, Guillermo Garcia-Lopez and Stan Wawrinka. He owns the longest active streak of Grand Slam appearances, having contested the main draw at every Grand Slam tournament since the 2011 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Dimitrov reached the quarterfinals as qualifier at Queen’s, defeating Emil Ruusuvuori and Francisco Cerundolo before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- Dimitrov’s **best result in 2023** is finishing runner-up as a wild card at Geneva (l. Nicolas Jarry). He also reached the semifinals at Rotterdam (l. Medvedev) and the quarterfinals at Marseille (l. Alexander Bublik).
- Dimitrov has lost 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** that he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Alexandr Dolgoplov in 5 sets in the 3rd round here in 2014, but lost 5-set matches to Grega Zemlja in the 2nd round in 2013 and to Moutet in the 1st round in 2019. He has a 10-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Dimitrov has won **8 Tour-level singles titles**, one of which came on grass – at 2014 Queen’s (d. Feliciano Lopez).
- Dimitrov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 after winning the title at the 2017 ATP Finals (d. David Goffin). He plays here at No. 24.
- Dimitrov is **one of 2 former Wimbledon boys’ singles champions** to reach the round of 16 from the 6 who began the men’s main draw here this year. He won the boys’ singles titles here (d. Henri Kontinen) and at the US Open (d. Devin Britton) in 2008 and finished the year at No. 3 in the ITF Junior Rankings.
- Dimitrov was part of the ITF 14 & Under European Team in Europe in 2004-05 and the ITF 16 & Under European A Team in Europe in 2006, funded by the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund).
- Dimitrov is coached by Daniel Vallverdu.

- **DJOKOVIC** is contesting his 100th Wimbledon match today, becoming the 3rd player in history to contest 100 men's singles matches at Wimbledon – after Roger Federer (119 Wimbledon matches) and Jimmy Connors (102).
- By contesting his 100th match here, Djokovic also becomes the **8th player in history to contest 100 singles matches at Wimbledon** – after Martina Navratilova (119 Wimbledon matches), Federer (119), Serena Williams (112), Chris Evert (111), Billie Jean King (110), Venus Williams (109) and Connors (102).
- Djokovic is bidding to reach **his 14th Wimbledon quarterfinal** and join Connors in 2nd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles quarterfinal appearances.

- Djokovic is also bidding to reach his **56th Grand Slam quarterfinal**. He is in 2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances, behind Federer. (see table overleaf)

- At 36 years 55 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **3rd oldest man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after Federer (who reached the quarterfinals here on 3 occasions aged older than Djokovic is now) and Ken Rosewall (who reached the quarterfinals here on 2 occasions aged older than Djokovic is now).
- Djokovic is bidding to record his 32nd consecutive match-win at Wimbledon and claim sole ownership of **3rd place on the list for longest Wimbledon men's singles winning streak in the Open Era** ahead of Pete Sampras' 31-match winning streak here in 1997-2001.

- Djokovic is also bidding to record his **32nd consecutive Tour-level grass court match-win**, having not lost a Tour-level grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen's. His current streak is the 3rd-longest Tour-level men's singles winning streak on grass in the Open Era – behind Federer's streak of 65 consecutive match-wins on grass in 2003-08 and Borg's streak of 41 consecutive match-wins on grass in 1976-81.
- Wimbledon is Djokovic's **2nd most successful Grand Slam event in terms of titles won**, and joint-2nd most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won and quarterfinals reached.

- Djokovic is **through to the round of 16 at Wimbledon for the 15th time**. He is in 3rd place in the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at Wimbledon – behind Federer (18 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances) and Connors (16).
- Djokovic is **through to the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 61st time**. He is in 2nd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams – behind Federer (69 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances).
- By defeating Jordan Thompson for his 350th Grand Slam match-win in the 2nd round here, Djokovic became the **3rd player in history to record 350 match-wins at the Grand Slams** – after Roger Federer (369 Grand Slam match-wins) and Serena Williams (365).
- Last year here**, Djokovic won his 7th Wimbledon title, defeating Nick Kyrgios 46 63 64 76(3) in the final. He also won the title here in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer) and 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **8th Wimbledon title** and equal Federer's all-time record for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won. He is also bidding to equal Federer and Helen Wills Moody in 2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon singles titles won among men and women, behind 9-time Wimbledon champion Martina Navratilova.

- Djokovic is also bidding to win his **5th consecutive Wimbledon title** and become the 3rd man in the Open Era to record a streak of 5 consecutive Wimbledon titles – after Federer (who won 5 straight titles here in 2003-07) and Borg (1976-80).
- Djokovic won his **22nd and 23rd Grand Slam titles** at the Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) this year, equalling Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won at the Australian Open before claiming sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his 24th Grand Slam title and equal Margaret Court's **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles won** among men and women. By winning his 23rd Grand Slam title at Roland Garros last month, he became the 3rd player to win 23 or more Grand Slam singles titles, alongside Court and Serena Williams.
- Djokovic is bidding to **win the opening 3 Grand Slam titles of the year** for the 2nd time in his career, having become the 5th man in history to achieve the feat (and first since Rod Laver in 1969) in 2021. He is also bidding to become the 4th man in history to win Roland Garros and Wimbledon back-to-back on multiple occasions, after Borg, Laver and Nadal.
- At 36 years 55 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title** and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. Last year, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **4th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and claim sole ownership of the Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older – ahead of Federer and Ken Rosewall. He is also bidding to win his 12th Grand Slam titles since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.
- Djokovic is making his **18th Wimbledon appearance**. He is in joint-5th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances, alongside Mikhail Youzhny – behind Federer (22 Wimbledon appearances), Connors and Feliciano Lopez (both 20) and Fernando Verdasco (19).
- Djokovic is also making his **71st Grand Slam appearance**. He is in joint-3rd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances, alongside Verdasco and Richard Gasquet, who also made his 71st Grand Slam appearance at Wimbledon this year. Federer and Lopez, who both made 81 Grand Slam appearances, are the only players to have contested the men's singles at more Grand Slam events than Djokovic.
- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2023** are winning the title at Adelaide (d. Sebastian Korda), and reaching the semifinals at Dubai (l. Daniil Medvedev) and the quarterfinals at Banja Luka (l. Dusan Lajovic) and Rome-1000 (l. Holger Rune).
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 14 players in the men's singles who has not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **95th Tour-level title** and equal Ivan Lendl in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won – behind Connors (109 Tour-level titles) and Federer (103). Of Djokovic's 94 Tour-level singles titles, 8 have come on grass – in addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 67 titles on hard courts and 19 titles on clay.
- Djokovic has a 10-1 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeat in a 5-set match here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (35-9) and has a 38-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 389 weeks. He plays here at No. 2 but will return to No. 1 on Monday 17 July if he records a better Wimbledon result than Carlos Alcaraz.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 42-13 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Czechia and Korea, Rep. in Group C at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals.
- Djokovic is coached by 2001 Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic.

- **HURKACZ** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 21st Grand Slam overall.
- Hurkacz is bidding to become the **first Polish man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon on multiple occasions**. He is one of 4 Polish men to reach the quarterfinals here, after Wojtek Fibak (who reached the quarterfinals here in 1980), Lukasz Kubot (2013) and Jerzy Janowicz (2013).
- Hurkacz is bidding to become the **2nd Polish player in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Agnieszka Radwanska, who reached the women’s singles quarterfinals here on 5 occasions.
- Hurkacz is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time and become the **2nd Polish man in history reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal on multiple occasions** – after Fibak, who reached 4 Grand Slam quarterfinals.
- If Hurkacz and Iga Swiatek, who is bidding to reach the quarterfinals of the women’s singles here this year, both win today, it will be the **2nd time in history that multiple Polish players have reached the singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after 2013 Wimbledon, when Janowicz and Kubot reached the men’s singles quarterfinals and Radwanska reached the women’s singles quarterfinals.
- **Last year here**, Hurkacz fell to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in 5 sets in the 1st round. He also fell in the 1st round as a lucky loser on his debut here in 2018 (l. Bernard Tomic).
- Hurkacz’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021, when he defeated Federer in the quarterfinals before falling to Matteo Berrettini in the last 4. He became the 2nd Polish man in history to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam after Janowicz, who reached the semifinals at 2013 Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Hurkacz reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Sebastian Korda) and the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Juan Pablo Varillas).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Hurkacz reached the semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) but fell in the 2nd round on his title defence at Halle (d. Christopher Eubanks, l. Tallon Griekspoor).
- Hurkacz’s best Tour-level result in 2023 is winning his **6th Tour-level title** at Marseille (d. Benjamin Bonzi). He also reached the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Djokovic).
- Hurkacz’s **best grass court performance** is winning the title at 2022 Halle (d. Daniil Medvedev), where he became the first Polish man to win a Tour-level grass court title in the Open Era. His 5 other Tour-level titles have come on hard courts.
- Hurkacz is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-3 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, with his only victory coming against No. 2 Daniil Medvedev in the round of 16 here in 2021. He has a 7-11 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Medvedev in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2021 but fell to Davidovich Fokina in 5 sets in the 1st round last year. Prior to Wimbledon this year, the last 6 Grand Slam matches he had contested had been 5-set matches. He has a 6-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in October 2021 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 the following month. He plays here at No. 18.
- Hurkacz has played **Davis Cup** for Poland since 2016 and has an 8-9 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will host Barbados in a World Group II tie in September.
- Hurkacz reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 29 in January 2015. He lost in the 1st round on both of his appearances in the boys’ singles at Wimbledon – in 2014 (l. Lucas Miedler) and 2015 (l. Viktor Durasovic).
- Hurkacz has received support from the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund), having been awarded a \$25,000 grant in 2018.
- Hurkacz is coached by Craig Boynton.
