A first Wimbledon title for Alcaraz...

Alcaraz is bidding to win his first Wimbledon title and become just the 3rd Spanish player to win the men's singles title here, after Manuel Santana in 1966 and Rafael Nadal in 2008 and 2010. Having won his first Grand Slam title at the US Open last year, he would also become the 4th Spanish player to win multiple Grand Slam titles, after Nadal, Santana and Sergi Bruguera. He would become the 4th active male player to win the Wimbledon title, after Djokovic, Nadal and Andy Murray.

... or a record-equalling 8th Wimbledon title for Djokovic?

An 8th Wimbledon title-victory for Djokovic will see him equal Roger Federer's all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles titles. He would also equal Margaret Court's all-time record of 24 Grand Slam singles titles. It would make him the 2nd man in history to win the opening 3 Grand Slam titles of the season, having achieved the feat for the first time in 2021. The only other man to win the opening 3 Grand Slam titles of the season on multiple occasions is Rod Laver, who went on to win the Grand Slam in both 1962 and 1969.

Prize money

Today's champion receives £2,350,000 in prize money, while the runner-up collects £1,175,000. In total, the prize fund for the men's singles event at 2023 Wimbledon is £16,077,000.

Battle for No. 1

For the 3rd time in the last 4 Grand Slam men's singles finals, the winner is guaranteed to become world No. 1 when the new rankings are published on Monday.

If Alcaraz wins, he will retain the No. 1 ranking, beginning his 29th week as world No. 1 tomorrow. If Djokovic wins, he will return to the No. 1 ranking (3 weeks after ceding it to Alcaraz), beginning a record-extending 390th week as world No. 1 tomorrow.

No. 1 v No. 2

This is the 51st meeting between the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds in a Grand Slam men's singles final in the Open Era – and the 16th at Wimbledon. Of the 50 previous Grand Slam finals between the Top 2 seeds in the Open Era, the No. 1 seed has won 25 times and the No. 2 seed has won 25 times. Of the 15 previous Wimbledon finals between the Top 2 seeds in the Open Era the No. 1 seed has won 9 times and the No. 2 seed has won 6 times.

This is the first meeting between the Top 2 seeds in a Grand Slam men's singles final since the 2021 US Open, when No. 2 Daniil Medvedev defeated No. 1 Djokovic. It is the first time that the Top 2 seeds have contested the Wimbledon men's singles final since 2019 – when No. 1 Djokovic defeated No. 2 Federer.

The Djokovic-Nadal duopoly

Between them, Djokovic and Nadal have won 17 of the last 20 Grand Slam titles (since 2018 Roland Garros) – but Alcaraz is one of only 3 other players to have won a Grand Slam title in that time, having won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open. Fellow US Open champions Dominic Thiem (2020) and Medvedev (2021) are the only other players to have won Grand Slam titles in that time. Djokovic has won 11 Grand Slam titles in that time, with Nadal winning 6 Grand Slam titles.

Decades apart

With Alcaraz (20 years 72 days) and Djokovic (36 years 55 days) contesting the final here this year, this match represents the 3rd-largest age gap between players in a Grand Slam men's singles final in the Open Era – behind the 2 Grand Slam finals between Jimmy Connors and Ken Rosewall at Wimbledon and the US Open in 1974.

All 3 Grand Slam men's singles finals in 2023 are in the Top 10 on the Open Era list for largest age gap between participants – with the Roland Garros final between Djokovic and Casper Ruud in 7th place on the list and the Australian Open final between Djokovic and Stefanos Tsitsipas in joint-9th place.

Djokovic is bidding to become the oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. He is one of 3 men in the Open Era to have reached the Wimbledon final aged 35 or older, alongside Federer and Rosewall, who both also reached 2 finals here after turning 35.

Djokovic is also bidding to win his 4th Grand Slam title since turning 35 and claim sole ownership of the Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older, ahead of Federer and Rosewall.

While Djokovic could become the oldest Wimbledon men's singles champion in the Open Era here today, no player born after Djokovic has won the Wimbledon men's singles title.

By contrast, Alcaraz is bidding to become the 3rd-youngest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title – after Boris Becker (who won his first 2 Wimbledon titles aged 17 years 227 days in 1985 and aged 18 years 226 days in 1986) and Bjorn Borg (who won his first Wimbledon title aged 20 years 27 days). He has become the 6th man in the Open Era to reach the Wimbledon final prior to turning 21, and the first since Nadal finished runner-up here aged 20 years 26 days in 2006.

Alcaraz is bidding to become the 5th man in the Open Era to win multiple Grand Slam titles prior to turning 21 – after Mats Wilander (4 Grand Slam titles prior to turning 21), Borg (3), and Becker and Nadal (both 2).

Wimbledon final appearances

By reaching the final here for the 9th time, Djokovic has closed the gap on Federer at the top of the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles final appearances.

Alcaraz is in joint-first place on the list for most Tour-level matches won in 2023, and will go clear at the top of the list, ahead of Medvedev, if he wins his 47th Tour-level match this season today. Djokovic is in 6th place on the list and is bidding to win his 34th Tour-level match this season.

2023 grass court leaders

Alcaraz is at the top of the list for most Tour-level matches won on grass in 2023, having won the title at Queen's last month as well as his opening 6 matches here. Djokovic did not contest a grass court event prior to Wimbledon and is in joint-12th place on the list – if he wins today, he will climb to joint-7th place. Alcaraz and Djokovic are the only men who remain unbeaten on grass at Tour-level this season.

A 3rd meeting for Alcaraz and Djokovic, their 2nd at a Grand Slam, but their first on grass. It is also their first meeting in a final, with both of their previous meetings having come in semifinals.

Djokovic is bidding to extend a 4-match winning streak against world No. 1s. He has not lost to a world No. 1 since falling to Andy Murray in the title match at the 2016 ATP Finals. He has a 15-17 win-loss record against No. 1-ranked players at Tour-level overall.

Djokovic won his 2 previous matches against world No. 1s at Wimbledon, both of which came against Rafael Nadal – in the final in 2011 and in the semifinals in 2018. He has a 4-5 win-loss record against No. 1-ranked players at the Grand Slams, but has not fallen to a world No. 1 at a Grand Slam since the final at 2014 Roland Garros, when he lost to Nadal.

Alcaraz is bidding to defeat a Top 2 player for the 2nd time. He has a 1-2 win-loss record against Top 2 players, with his only previous victory against a player ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 coming against No. 1 Djokovic in the semifinals at Madrid-1000 last year.

Alcaraz lost his only previous match against a Top 2 player at the Grand Slams, falling to No. 2 Daniil Medvedev in the 2nd round at 2021 Wimbledon – at the time, Alcaraz was ranked at No. 75.

- ALCARAZ is bidding to become the 3rd Spanish player in history to win the Wimbledon men's singles title after Manuel Santana, who won the title here in 1966, and Rafael Nadal, who won the title here in 2008 and 2010.
- Alcaraz is also bidding to become the 5th Spanish player in history to win a Wimbledon singles title after Santana, Nadal, Conchita Martinez (who won the women's singles title here in 1994) and Garbine Muguruza (who won the women's singles title here in 2017).
- Alcaraz is bidding to win his 2nd Grand Slam title and become the 4th Spanish player in history to win multiple
 Grand Slam men's singles titles after Nadal, Santana and Sergi Bruguera.

Aged 20 years 72 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the 3rd-youngest player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon men's singles title – after Boris Becker (who won his first 2 Wimbledon titles aged 17 years 227 days in 1985 and aged 18 years 226 days in 1986) and Bjorn Borg (who won his first Wimbledon title aged 20 years 27 days).

- If Alcaraz wins his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 2nd Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will equal the **Open Era record for fewest attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title**. In the Open Era, 6 players have won their 2nd Grand Slam singles titles on their 2nd appearances after winning their first most recently Andy Murray, who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2012 US Open before winning his 2nd Grand Slam title at 2013 Wimbledon on his 2nd Grand Slam appearance since his first title.
- Wimbledon is Alcaraz's **3rd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won**, behind Roland Garros and the US Open. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 10th Grand Slam overall.

- By reaching the final here, Alcaraz has become the 3rd Spanish man in history to reach the final at Wimbledon

 after Nadal (5 Wimbledon final appearances) and Santana (one). (NB Manuel Alonso-Areyzaga fell in the Wimbledon all-comers' final in 1921)
- By reaching the final here, Alcaraz has become the **6th Spanish player in history to reach a singles final at Wimbledon** after Santana, Nadal, Martinez, Muguruza (who also finished as women's singles runner-up in 2015) and Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario (who finished as women's singles runner-up in 1995 and 1996).
- By reaching his 2nd Grand Slam final, Alcaraz has become the **9th Spanish man in history to reach a final at the Grand Slams on multiple occasions** after Nadal (30 Grand Slam final appearances), Santana (4), Sergi Bruguera and Juan Carlos Ferrero (both 3), and Andres Gimeno, Manuel Orantes, Alex Corretja and Carlos Moya (all 2).
- By reaching his 2nd Grand Slam final, Alcaraz has become the **7th man in the Open Era to reach multiple Grand Slam finals prior to turning 21** and the first since Djokovic, who reached his first 2 Grand Slam finals prior to turning 21 in 2007-08.
- By reaching the final here, Alcaraz has recorded his best Wimbledon result. His previous best Wimbledon result
 was reaching the round of 16 here last year, when he defeated Jan-Lennard Struff, Tallon Griekspoor and Oscar
 Otte before falling to Jannik Sinner. His only other appearance here came as a wild card in 2021, when he reached
 the 2nd round (d. Yasutaka Uchiyama, I. Daniil Medvedev).
- Alcaraz won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open, defeating Casper Ruud 64 26 76(1) 63 in the final.
 Aged 19 years 129 days, became the youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion since Nadal (19 years 2 days) at 2005 Roland Garros and youngest US Open men's singles champion since Pete Sampras (19 years 28 days) in 1990.
- At the Grand Slams this year, Alcaraz reached the semifinals at Roland Garros (I. Djokovic). He withdrew from the Australian Open due to a right leg injury.
- Alcaraz won his first grass court title at Queen's last month, defeating Alex de Minaur in the final. It was his 3rd grass court event as a professional, with his only previous appearances on grass coming at Wimbledon in 2021 and 2022. He contested 2 grass court events as a junior reaching the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at both J1 Roehampton (I. Valentin Royer) and Wimbledon (I. Martin Damm) in 2019.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the 8th man in the Open Era to win the titles at Queen's and Wimbledon in the same year – and the first since Murray won Queen's and Wimbledon back-to-back in 2016.

- Alcaraz's other highlights in 2023 are winning the titles at Buenos Aires (d. Cameron Norrie), Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev), Barcelona (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Madrid-1000 (d. Struff). He also finished runner-up at Rio de Janeiro (l. Norrie) and reached the semifinals at Miami-1000 (l. Sinner).
- Alcaraz has won 8 of the 9 five-set matches he has contested, his only loss coming against Matteo Berrettini in
 the 3rd round at the 2022 Australian Open. Since that loss, he has won 5 consecutive five-set matches. Alcaraz
 has won both of the five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon, against Y Uchiyama in the 1st round in
 2021, and against Struff in the 1st round here last year.
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the youngest world No. 1 in history after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He began his 28th week as world No. 1 on Monday, having returned to the No. 1 ranking following his title-victory at Queen's last month. He will remain at No. 1 on Monday 17 July if he wins today.

- Alcaraz led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest, defeating France in the title
 match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior
 events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz made his Davis Cup debut for Spain in 2022 and has won one of the 2 matches he has contested in the
 competition to date. Spain will compete in Valencia alongside Serbia, Czechia and Korea, Rep. in Group C at the
 2023 Davis Cup Finals.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 and 2003 Roland Garros champion Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2007 and 2009.
- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to win his 8th Wimbledon title and equal Roger Federer's all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles titles.

• Djokovic is bidding to become the **2nd man in history to win the first 3 Grand Slam tournaments of the season on 2 occasions** – after Rod Laver, who won the opening 3 Grand Slam tournaments of the year in both 1962 and 1969, and went on to win the Grand Slam on both occasions. Don Budge is the only other player to have won the Grand Slam in men's singles.

• At 36 years 55 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title** and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. Last year, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days.

• Djokovic has a **23-11 win-loss record in Grand Slam finals**. He has won 7 of the 8 Wimbledon finals he has contested, with his only defeat in a final here coming against Andy Murray in 2013. He has also won 6 of the last 7 Grand Slam finals he has contested, with his only defeat in a Grand Slam final in that time coming against Daniil Medvedev the 2021 US Open.

• Djokovic is bidding to record his **35th consecutive match-win at Wimbledon**. By winning his opening 4 matches here this year, he claimed sole ownership of 3rd place on the list for longest Wimbledon men's singles winning streak in the Open Era, ahead of Pete Sampras' 31-match winning streak here in 1997-2001.

- Djokovic is also bidding to record his **35th consecutive Tour-level grass court match-win**, having not lost a Tour-level grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen's. His current streak is the 3rd-longest Tour-level men's singles winning streak on grass in the Open Era behind Federer's streak of 65 consecutive match-wins on grass in 2003-08 and Borg's streak of 41 consecutive match-wins on grass in 1976-81
- Djokovic is bidding to win his 95th Tour-level title and equal Ivan Lendl in **3rd place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level men's singles titles won**. Of Djokovic's 94 Tour-level singles titles, 8 have come on grass in addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 67 titles on hard courts and 19 titles on clay.

 Wimbledon is Djokovic's joint-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won. It is his 2nd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of titles won and joint-2nd most successful Grand Slam event in terms of finals reached.

- By reaching his **9th Wimbledon final**, Djokovic has closed the gap on Federer at the top of the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles finals reached. Federer (who reached the final here on 12 occasions) is the only man in history to have reached the final here more often than Djokovic.
- By reaching his **35th Grand Slam final**, Djokovic has extended his all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached and claimed sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles final appearances, among men and women, ahead of Chris Evert.
- Djokovic his contesting his 402nd Grand Slam match today. By contesting his 400th Grand Slam match in the
 quarterfinals this year, Djokovic became the 3rd player in history to contest 400 singles matches at the Grand
 Slams after Federer (429 Wimbledon matches) and Serena Williams (419).
- Djokovic is contesting his 103rd Wimbledon match today. By contesting his 100th Wimbledon match in the round of 16 here this year, he became the **3rd player in history to contest 100 men's singles matches at Wimbledon** after Federer (119 Wimbledon matches) and Connors (102).
- By contesting his Wimbledon 100th match in the round of 16 here, Djokovic also became the **8th player in history to contest 100 singles matches at Wimbledon** after Martina Navratilova (119 Wimbledon matches), Federer (119), Serena Williams (112), Evert (111), Billie Jean King (110), Venus Williams (109) and Connors (102).

- By defeating Jordan Thompson for his 350th Grand Slam match-win in the 2nd round here, Djokovic became the 3rd player in history to record 350 singles match-wins at the Grand Slams after Federer (369 Grand Slam match-wins) and Serena Williams (365).
- Djokovic is making his **18th Wimbledon appearance**. He is in joint-5th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances, alongside Mikhail Youzhny behind Federer (22 Wimbledon appearances), Connors and Feliciano Lopez (both 20), and Fernando Verdasco (19).
- Djokovic is also making his 71st Grand Slam appearance. He is in joint-3rd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances, alongside Verdasco and Richard Gasquet, who also made his 71st Grand Slam appearance at Wimbledon this year. Federer and Lopez, who both made 81 Grand Slam appearances, are the only players to have contested the men's singles at more Grand Slam events than Djokovic.
- Last year here, Djokovic won his 7th Wimbledon title, defeating Nick Kyrgios 46 63 64 76(3) in the final. He also won the title here in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer) and 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini)
- Djokovic won his **22nd and 23rd Grand Slam titles** at the Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) this year, equalling Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won at the Australian Open before claiming sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros.
- Djokovic's other highlights in 2023 are winning the title at Adelaide I (d. Sebastian Korda), and reaching the semifinals at Dubai (I. Medvedev) and the quarterfinals at Banja Luka (I. Dusan Lajovic) and Rome-1000 (I. Holger Rune).
- Djokovic did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022.
- Djokovic has a 10-1 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeat in a 5-set match here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (35-9) and has a 38-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Djokovic holds the **record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 389 weeks. He plays here at No. 2 but will return to No. 1 on Monday 17 July if he wins today.
- Djokovic has played Davis Cup for Serbia since 2004, has a 42-13 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Czechia and Korea, Rep. in Group C at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals.
- Djokovic is coached by 2001 Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic.
