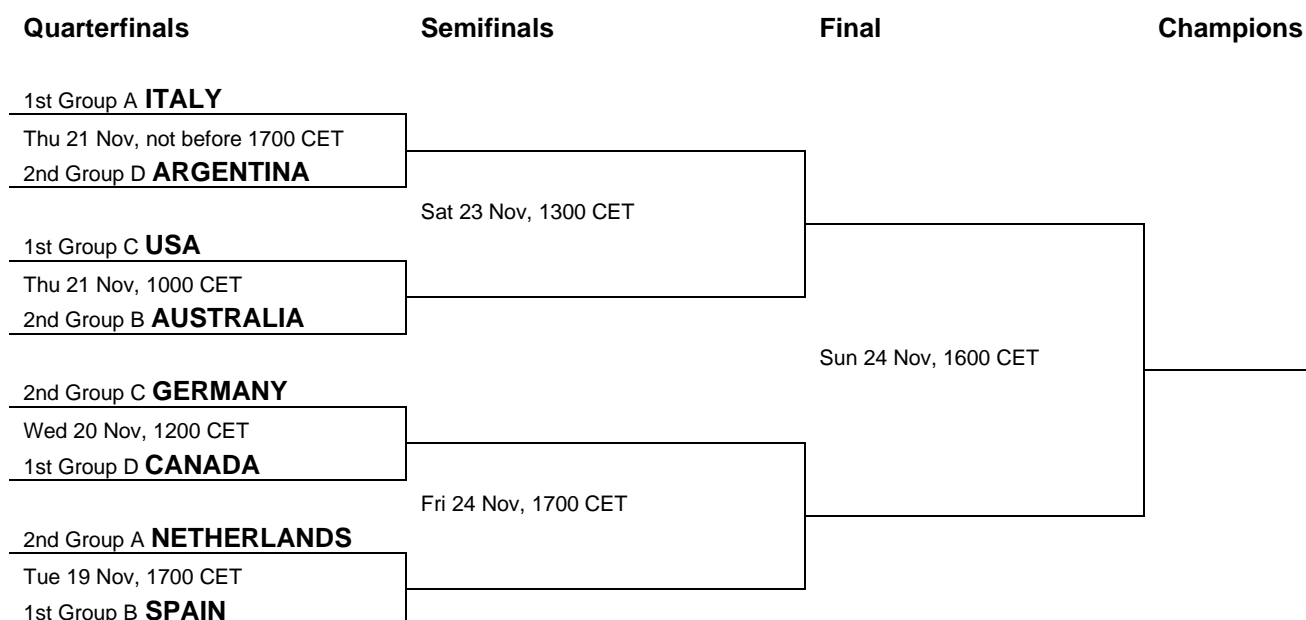

FORMAT

The 16 teams at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals were divided into 4 groups of 4 teams and contested ties in a round-robin format from Tuesday 10 to Sunday 15 September. The 4 groups were each played in a different city – Bologna, Valencia, Zhuhai and Manchester – and the 4 group winners and 4 group runners-up have advanced to the Final 8 knockout stage in Malaga, Spain this week.

The quarterfinals take place from Tuesday 19 to Thursday 21 November, with 2 ties taking place on Thursday. The semifinals will be played on Friday 22 and Saturday 23 November, before the 2024 Davis Cup final is contested on Sunday 24 November.



FINAL 8 SCHEDULE

The Final 8 knockout stage begins on Tuesday 19 November, with Group B winners Spain up against Group A runners-up Netherlands.

HEAD-TO-HEADS

All 4 quarterfinal ties this week are match-ups that have been played at least once before in the Davis Cup. Three of the 4 quarterfinal match-ups have been played at most 8 times – Netherlands’ 9th meeting with Spain on Tuesday, Germany’s 2nd meeting with Canada on Wednesday, and Italy’s 6th meeting with Argentina on Thursday.

On Tuesday, hosts Spain take on Netherlands for the 9th time in Davis Cup history, and the first time in 20 years, having last met in the World Group quarterfinals in April 2004. After Spain won their first 5 encounters between 1923 and 1984, Netherlands claimed victories in the World Group first round in 1993 and 2001, before Spain won their most recent meeting in 2004 to take their head-to-head record to 6-2 over the Dutch.

On Wednesday, Canada face Germany in a repeat of their only previous meeting, having faced off in the quarterfinals at the 2022 Finals, also in Malaga. After Jan-Lennard Struff defeated Denis Shapovalov in the opening match of the tie, Felix Auger-Aliassime defeated Oscar Otte before Shapovalov partnered Vasek Pospisil to defeat Kevin Krawietz and Tim Puetz, completing the comeback and sending Canada to the last 4. Canada went all the way that year to claim their first Davis Cup title, while Germany will look to reverse their quarterfinal fortunes this time around.

On Thursday morning, USA and Australia will contest their 48th Davis Cup tie in what is the most-played head-to-head in competition history. The two nations first met in 1905 in just the 5th edition of the competition, as USA defeated Australasia 5-0 in the World Group Final to reach the Challenge Round. USA leads the head-to-head 26-21, while Australia won their most recent meeting 3-2 in the 2017 World Group quarterfinals. The two nations are also the most successful in competition history, with USA winning 32 titles and Australia winning 28 times.

On Thursday evening, defending champions Italy take on Argentina in a 6th meeting between the two nations, with Italy leading the head-to-head 3-2. After Argentina won their first meeting 5-0 back in 1983 in the World Group quarterfinals, the two nations have met 4 times since 2014. Italy won 3-1 in the 2014 World Group first round, 3-2 in the 2017 World Group first round, and 2-1 in the 2022 Finals group stage, while Argentina claimed a 3-1 victory in the 2016 World Group quarterfinal en route to their first title in 2016.

2025 DAVIS CUP

The 2024 Davis Cup champions will qualify automatically for the 2025 Davis Cup Qualifiers second round. The host nation for the 2025 Davis Cup Finals will receive a wild card to the Finals, provided they have a Top 50 Nations Ranking or at least one player with an ATP Top 10 singles ranking. If the host does not meet this criteria, the place will be re-allocated.

A pool of 24 teams – made up of the 16 teams at this year’s Finals and the 12 winning nations from the World Group I ties in September this year, minus the 2024 champions and the host nation (if meets criteria) – will compete in the 2025 Davis Cup Qualifiers first round, which will be played on a home-and-away basis on the week commencing 27th January. The winning nations will then progress to the 2025 Davis Cup Qualifiers second round, also played on a home-and-away basis on the week commencing 8th September. The winning nations from those ties will qualify for the 2025 Davis Cup Finals, to be played at a neutral venue in November.

PAST CHAMPIONS

In total, 16 nations have won the Davis Cup. Just one nation competing at the Final 8 knockout stage this year has never previously won the Davis Cup title: Netherlands.

NATIONS AND PLAYERS

157 nations entered the Davis Cup during 2024. 808 players have been nominated to represent their nations this season – of whom 655 have played at least one match so far. The figure for number of nations competing this year is an all-time record.

DAVIS CUP NATIONS RANKING

Argentina – Team Information

- **ARGENTINA** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since 2016. They are making their 3rd appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- **At the Finals group stage in September**, Argentina lost to Canada 2-1 before defeating Great Britain 2-1 and Finland 3-0 to finish in 2nd place in Group D in Manchester.
- **Last season**, Argentina fell to Finland 1-3 in the Qualifiers in Espoo in February before defeating Lithuania 4-0 in a World Group I tie in Buenos Aires in September.
- **In the Qualifiers this year**, Argentina defeated Kazakhstan 3-2 in Rosario to secure their place at the Finals. Sebastian Baez defeated Dmitry Popko in a final-set tiebreak in the decisive 5th match to seal the victory for Argentina.
- In 2016, Argentina **won the Davis Cup title for the first time in their history**. They defeated Poland 3-2 in Gdansk, Italy 3-1 in Pesaro, Great Britain 3-2 in Glasgow and Croatia 3-2 in Zagreb to become just the 2nd nation to win the title after playing all four ties away from home after France in 2001.
- Prior to winning the title in 2016, Argentina held the record for **most appearances in the Davis Cup final without victory**. They have finished runner-up on 4 occasions – in 1981 (l. USA), 2006 (l. Russia), 2008 (l. Spain) and 2011 (l. Spain).
- Argentina are currently ranked No. 15 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings (18 Nov)**. They are one of 10 nations to have been ranked No. 1 since the Rankings were introduced in 2001 (alongside Australia, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy, Russia and Spain), having been ranked No. 1 between November 2016 and October 2017.
- **Captain Guillermo Coria** has led the Argentinian team since 2022 and has an 5-5 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Argentina in Davis Cup between 2004 and 2005 and had a 5-3 overall match win-loss record.

- **Davis Cup:** Baez made his Davis Cup debut during the 2022 Qualifiers, defeating Czechia's Jiri Lehecka in the only match he contested. He lost all 3 matches he contested at the 2022 Finals, but won the only match he contested in the competition in 2023, defeating Ricardas Berankis during Argentina's World Group I victory over Lithuania. He also won the decisive 5th match of Argentina's victory against Kazakhstan in the Qualifiers this year, defeating Dmitry Popko. He fell to Canada's Felix Auger-Aliassime in the only match he contested at the Finals Group Stage in September.

 - **Davis Cup:** Cerundolo made his Davis Cup debut at the 2022 Finals Group Stage. He lost both matches he contested at the event, falling to both Italy's Jannik Sinner and Croatia's Borna Coric. He recorded his first Davis Cup match-wins in 2023, defeating Otto Virtanen during Argentina's defeat to Finland in the Qualifiers and defeating Villus Gaubas during Argentina's World Group I victory over Lithuania. He has won 3 of the 5 matches he has contested in the competition in 2024, winning one of the 2 matches he contested during Argentina's victory against Kazakhstan in the Qualifiers, defeating Popko but falling to Timofei Skatov. He then won 2 of the 3 matches he contested at the Finals Group Stage in September, falling to Canada's Denis Shapovalov before defeating Great Britain's Jack Draper and Finland's Otto Virtanen.

He won both matches he contested at the Finals Group Stage in September, defeating Great Britain's Daniel Evans and Finland's Eero Vasa for his first 2 competition match-wins in live play.

Australia – Team Information

- **AUSTRALIA** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the 3rd consecutive year after finishing as runners-up the last 2 years, and for the 3rd time since 2016. They are making their 5th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- **At the Finals group stage in September**, Australia defeated France 2-1 and Czechia 3-0 before falling to Spain 2-1 to finish in 2nd place in Group B in Valencia.
- **Last season**, Australia lost to Great Britain but defeated France and Switzerland to finish in 2nd place in Finals Group B in Manchester. At the Final 8 knockout stage in Malaga, they defeated Czechia 2-1 and Finland 2-0 to reach back-to-back Davis Cup finals for the first time since 2000-1 before falling to Italy 2-0. As runners-up in 2023, Australia qualified automatically for the Finals this year.
- Australia are **28-time Davis Cup champions**, having won the title more than any other nation except USA, who have won 32 Davis Cup titles. They won their most recent title in 2003, defeating Spain 3-1 in the final in Melbourne. Since then, their best performance is reaching the final in the last 2 seasons.
- By defeating Czechia in the quarterfinals last year, Australia became the **2nd nation to win 200 Davis Cup ties** – after USA (227 Davis Cup ties won). Australia have a total win-loss record of 201-77 in Davis Cup ties.
- If Australia win the title this year, 21 years after their most recent Davis Cup title, it will be the **longest gap between Australia's Davis Cup successes**. Their biggest gap between titles before their current spell was 20 years, between 1919 and 1939.
- Australia are currently ranked No. 2 on the **Davis Cup Nations Ranking**. They are one of only 10 nations (alongside Argentina, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy, Russia and Spain) to have been ranked No. 1 since the Davis Cup Nations Ranking was introduced, having held the top position when the Rankings were launched in December 2001 and again in December 2003-February 2004.
- **Captain Lleyton Hewitt** has led the Australian team since 2016 and has an 19-11 tie win-loss record as captain, including leading the team to the final in 2022 and 2023. As a player, he represented Australia in Davis Cup between 1999 and 2018, was part of the Australian teams that won the title in 1999 and 2003, and had a 59-21 overall match win-loss record. He holds the Australian Davis Cup records for most total match-wins, most singles match-wins and most ties played.

- [CANADA](#) are bidding to reach the Davis Cup semifinals for the 3rd time since 2016 after runs to the final and the title in 2019 and 2022 respectively. They are making their 5th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- **At the Finals group stage in September**, Canada defeated Argentina 2-1, Finland 3-0, and Great Britain 2-1 to finish in first place in Group D in Manchester.
- **Last season**, Canada reached the Davis Cup quarterfinals. After automatically qualifying for the Finals group stage as 2022 champions, they defeated Italy 3-0, Sweden 3-0, and Chile 2-1 to finish in first place in Group A in Bologna. At the Final 8 knockout stage in Malaga, they fell 1-2 to Finland in the quarterfinals.
- In 2022, Canada **won the Davis Cup title for the first time**. As a wild card, the team finished in 2nd place in Finals Group C in Valencia. They then defeated Germany, Italy and Australia at the Final 8 knockout stage in Malaga to win their first title. Their best result prior to winning the title in 2022 was reaching the final in 2019 (l. Spain). Their previous best result was reaching the semifinals, which they achieved in 1913 and 2013.
- Canada are currently ranked No. 3 on the **Davis Cup Nations Ranking**. They reached the No. 1 spot for the first time in February 2023, becoming the 9th nation to have held the No. 1 ranking since the Rankings were introduced in December 2001. They are one of 10 nations to have been ranked No. 1, alongside Australia, Argentina, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy, Russia and Spain.
- **Captain Frank Dancevic** has led the Canadian team since 2018 and has an 15-7 tie win-loss record as captain. Germany – Team Information

- **GERMANY** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the 2nd time since the Davis Cup Finals were introduced in 2019. This is their 5th Finals appearance.
- **At the Finals group stage in September**, Germany defeated Slovakia 3-0, Chile 3-0, and fell to USA 1-2 to finish in 2nd place in Group C in Zhuhai.
- **Last season**, Germany fell to Switzerland 2-3 in the Qualifiers in Trier in February before defeating Bosnia and Herzegovina 4-0 in a World Group I tie in Mostar in September.
- **In the Qualifiers this year**, Germany defeated Hungary 3-2 in Tatabanya to secure their place at the Finals. Jan-Lennard Struff defeated Mate Valkusz in the 4th match of the tie to seal the victory for Germany.
- Germany have won **3 Davis Cup titles**, most recently in 1993 when they defeated Australia. They also won the title in 1988-89, defeating Sweden on both occasions – it is one of only 8 successful Davis Cup title defences since the abolition of the Challenge Round in 1972. Since the current format was introduced in 2019, their best result is reaching the semifinals in 2021 (l. Russian Tennis Federation).
- Germany rose to No. 4 on the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings (18 Nov)** in February this year – their best ranking since the Rankings were introduced in 2001. They are currently ranked No. 5.
- **Captain Michael Kohlmann** has led the German team since 2015 and has an 19-9 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Germany in Davis Cup between 2000 and 2007 and had a 4-4 overall match win-loss record.

Italy – Team Information

- **ITALY** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the 3rd consecutive year. They are making their 5th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- **At the Finals group stage in September**, Italy defeated Brazil 2-1, Belgium 2-1 and Netherlands 2-1 to finish in 1st place in Group A in Bologna.
- **Last season**, Italy won their 2nd Davis Cup title. They received a wild card to the Finals, where they fell to Canada 0-3 before defeating Chile 3-0 and Sweden 2-1 to finish in 2nd place in Group A, then defeated Netherlands 2-1 in the quarterfinals, Serbia 2-1 in the semifinals, and Australia 2-0 in the final. As 2023 champions, Italy automatically qualified for the Finals this year.
- Italy were also **Davis Cup champions in 1976**, defeating Chile in the final, and have finished as runners-up on 6 further occasions – most recently in 1998, when they fell to Sweden.
- Italy's Nicola Pietrangeli is the **leading all-time Davis Cup player**. He holds the record for playing the most matches (164), as well as the records for the most wins in both singles (78-32) and doubles (42-12). He also forms half of the most successful doubles partnership with Orlando Sirola (34-8).
- Italy are currently ranked No. 1 on the **Davis Cup Nations Ranking**, reaching the top ranking after winning the competition in November 2023. They are the 10th nation (alongside Argentina, Australia, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Russia, Spain and Canada) to have been ranked No. 1 since the Davis Cup Nations Ranking was introduced.
- **Captain Filippo Volandri** has led the Italian team since 2021 and has an 15-3 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Italy in Davis Cup between 2001 and 2010 and had a 10-7 overall match win-loss record.

Netherlands – Team Information

- **NETHERLANDS** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the 2nd time ever after doing so in 2001. They are making their 4th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- **At the Finals group stage in September**, Netherlands defeated Brazil 2-1 but fell to Belgium and Italy 1-2, eventually finishing in 2nd place in Group A in Bologna.
- **Last season**, Netherlands defeated Slovakia 4-0 in Groningen to secure their place at the Finals. The team then finished in first place in Finals Group D in Split after defeating USA and Finland 2-1 before falling to Croatia 1-2 to advance to the Final 8 knockout stage. They fell to Italy 1-2 in the quarterfinals in Malaga.
- **In the Qualifiers this year**, Netherlands defeated Switzerland 3-2 in Groningen to secure their place at the Finals. Tallon Griekspoor recorded singles victories against Marc-Andrea Huesler and Leandro Riedi while Botic van de Zandschulp completed the team's comeback from 1-2 down by defeating Huesler in the deciding singles match.
- Netherlands' **best Davis Cup performance** is reaching the World Group semifinals in 2001 – the team defeated Spain and Germany before falling to eventual champion France in the last 4.
- Netherlands are currently ranked at their highest ever **Davis Cup Nations Ranking** of No. 6. Their previous highest ranking was No. 7, which they held from the introduction of the ranking in December 2001 until April 2002.

Spain – Team Information

- **SPAIN** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since they won the title in 2019. They reached the quarterfinals in 2022 but fell in the group stage in both 2021 and 2022. They are making their 5th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- **Last season**, Spain received a wild card for the Finals group stage, finishing in 3rd place in Finals Group C in Valencia. They fell to both Czechia and Serbia 0-3 before defeating Korea, Republic 2-1. They were awarded a wild card to compete at the Finals this year.
- In 2019, Spain won their **6th Davis Cup title**, defeating Canada 2-0 in the final, with Roberto Bautista Agut and Rafael Nadal recording victories over Felix Auger-Aliassime and Denis Shapovalov, respectively.
- Spain are bidding to win their 7th Davis Cup title this season and equal Sweden in 5th place on the **all-time list for most Davis Cup titles won**. In addition to their title in 2019, they also won the title in 2000 (d. Australia), 2004 (d. USA), 2008 (d. Argentina), 2009 (d. Czechia) and 2011 (d. Argentina). They also finished runners-up in 1965 (l. Australia), 1967 (l. Australia), 2003 (l. Australia) and 2012 (l. Czechia).
- Spain are currently ranked No. 10 on the **Davis Cup Nations Ranking**. They are one of 10 nations to have held the No. 1 ranking (alongside Argentina, Australia, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy and Russia), having been ranked No. 1 between September 2004 and September 2005, and again between July 2009 and February 2013.
- **Captain David Ferrer** has led the Spanish team since 2023 and has an 4-2 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Spain in Davis Cup between 2006 and 2018 and had a 28-5 overall match win-loss record. He is in 4th place on the list for most Davis Cup singles matches won by a Spanish player.

- [USA](#) are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since 2018. This is their 5th Finals appearance.
- **At the Finals group stage in September**, USA defeated Chile and Slovakia 3-0 and Germany 2-1 to finish in 1st place in Group C in Zhuhai.
- **Last season**, USA defeated Uzbekistan 4-0 in the Qualifiers in Tashkent in February. They finished in 3rd place in Finals Group D in Split in September, defeating Croatia 2-1 but falling to Netherlands 1-2 and Finland 0-3.
- **In the Qualifiers this year**, USA defeated Ukraine 4-0 on neutral ground in Vilnius, Lithuania. Sebastian Korda and Christopher Eubanks recorded singles victories on day one before Austin Krajicek/Rajeev Ram recorded a doubles victory to seal the tie for USA.
- USA have contested **309 Davis Cup ties** – more than any other nation. They have also recorded more Davis Cup victories than any other nation and are bidding for their 231st Davis Cup victory this week.
- USA won their **32nd Davis Cup title** in 2007, defeating Russia 4-1 in Portland, Oregon. USA are at the top of the all-time list for most Davis Cup titles – ahead of Australia (28 titles) and Great Britain and France (10 titles each).
- If USA win the title this year, 17 years after their most recent Davis Cup title, it will be the **longest gap between USA's Davis Cup successes**. Their title in 2007 came 12 years after their previous title in 1995.
- USA are currently ranked No. 4 on the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings (18 Nov)**. Their best position since the Rankings were introduced in 2001 is No. 2, which they reached for the first time in September 2007.
- **Captain Bob Bryan** has led the American team since September 2023 after taking charge of the team for the first time at the 2022 Finals group stage, and has an 7-3 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented USA in Davis Cup between 2003 and 2021, and was part of the American team that won the
