Junior Tournament Preview

In 1947, the first boys' singles event was held at Roland Garros, with the first girls' singles event taking place 6 years later in 1953. The boys' doubles and girls' doubles events were introduced in 1981. This is the 82nd edition of the boys' singles tournament here, the 73rd edition of the girls' singles tournament, and the 36th editions of both the boys' doubles and girls' doubles tournaments.

2025 Roland Garros is the 124th edition of the French championships overall, which began in 1891 as a closed championship reserved for national players or players enrolled in French clubs, and the 95th tournament since the event became international in 1925. This is the 92nd time that the tournament has been held at Roland Garros, which was built for the Davis Cup Final between France and USA in 1928.

SLAM CHAMPIONS IN THE DRAWS

With 2025 Australian Open junior singles champions Henry Bernet and Wakana Sonobe not competing in Paris, there are no junior Grand Slam singles champions competing at the 2025 Roland Garros junior event.

There are 6 junior Grand Slam champions playing in the singles events here: Maxwell Exsted (2024 and 2025 Australian Open boys' doubles winner), Jan Kumstat (2025 Australian Open boys' doubles winner), Max Schoenhaus (2024 Wimbledon boys' doubles winner), Alena Kovackova (2023 Wimbledon girls' doubles winner), and twin sisters Annika and Kristina Penickova (2025 Australian Open girls' doubles winners).

KOUAME LEADS FRENCH HOPES

Moise Kouame is the top-ranked French player across the boys' singles and girls' singles draws here this year – and he will bid to become a 3rd home champion in the boys' singles in the last 5 years, after Luca van Assche and Gabriel Debru won the boys' titles here in 2021 and 2022, respectively. 2020 champion Elsa Jacquemot is the last French player to have won the girls' singles title here.

In total, there have been 14 French boys' singles champions and 15 French girls' singles champions at Roland Garros since the competitions were established.

MAKING NATIONAL HISTORY

Top juniors in both the boys' and girls' singles can make history for their nations should they win the title here. Boys' singles No. 3 seed Oskari Paldanius could become the second Finnish player ever to win a junior Grand Slam singles title, after Jarkko Nieminen won the boys' singles title at the 1999 US Open, and No. 7 seed Amir Omarkanov could become the first Kazakhstani player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title.

Girls' singles No. 1 seed Emerson Jones could become the first Australian player to win a junior singles title here since 1968, when Lesley Hunt and Phil Dent won the girls' and boys' singles titles respectively. Belgium's Jeline Vandromme, seeded No. 3 here, could become the 2nd player from her nation to win the girls' singles title here, after Justine Henin won the girls' singles in 1997, and the 4th Belgian to win a junior singles title here overall, after Jacky Brichant won the inaugural boys' singles title in 1947 and Kimmer Coppejans won the boys' singles title in 2012.

China, P.R.'s Zhang Ruien, No. 11 seed in the girls' singles, could become the first Chinese player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title outside the US Open – and the 3rd Chinese player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title overall, after Wu Yibing won the boys' singles at the 2017 US Open and Wang Xiyu won the girls' singles at the 2018 US Open. Should she win the title here this year, Zhang would become Asia's first Roland Garros girls' singles champion since Indonesia's Angelique Widjaja in 2002.

AT THE DOUBLE

Tereza Valentova won both the girls' singles and the girls' doubles titles in 2024, a feat also achieved by fellow Czech player Lucie Havlickova in 2022. Valentova and Havlickova are the only players to have won both girls' singles and doubles at Roland Garros in the same year since Agnes Szavay in 2005.

Dominic Stricker is the most-recent player to win the boys' singles and boys' doubles titles here in 2020. In total, 3 boys and 5 girls have won the junior singles and doubles titles at Roland Garros in the same year.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

The Grand Slams are the pinnacle of the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors, with J500 events representing the next-most prestigious level of tournament. There have been 4 events at J500-level in 2025 so far, all of which have been played on clay, with 4 different players claiming the girls' singles titles, while Italy's Jacopo Vasami and Spain's Andres Santamarta Roig have split the boys' singles titles with 2 each.

The 3rd level of tournament on the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors is J300-level, with 13 clay court events at that level have taken place so far in 2025.

Colombia's Alejandro Arcila (J300 Salinas and J300 Lima), Romania's Yannick Theodor Alexandrescou (J300 Asuncion and J300 Vrsar) and Bulgaria's Alexander Vasilev (J300 Villena and J300 Plovdiv) are the boys who have won multiple J300 titles on clay this year.

Lithuania's Laima Vladson (J300 Asuncion and J300 Porto Alegre) and Spain's Charo Esquiva Banuls (J300 Villena and J300 Beaulieu-sur-Mer) are the 2 girls to have won multiple J300 titles on clay this year.

J300 Charleroi-Marcinelle, which concludes on Saturday 31 May, is the last big clay court junior tournament on the tour prior to Roland Garros.

PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS

Three of the Top 10 seeds in the girls' singles have won a professional title in 2025: No. 1 Emerson Jones, No. 3 Jeline Vandromme and No. 7 Jana Kovackova, all of whom have won one title this year. Jones won W35 Fukuoka in Japan on 11 May, adding to her first professional title at W75 Sydney in November last year. Vandromme won W15 Manacor in Spain on 2 March for her first professional title, while Kovackova won her first professional title on 30 March at W35 Antalya in Turkiye.

No. 9 seed Ivan Ivanov of Bulgaria is the highest-seeded player in the boys' singles draw to have won a professional title, having won his first at M15 Szentendre in Hungary on 18 May. Great Britain's Oliver Bonding won his first professional title at M15 Lannion in France in February. Serbia's Ognjen Milic finished runner-up at M15 Kursumlijska Banja in Serbia on 4 May, while Finland's No. 3 seed Oskari Paldanius and France's Moise Kouame both reached their first professional finals at different M15 events in Sharm El Sheikh in Egypt in March. Italy's Pierluigi Basile reached the final at M15 Alcala de Henares in Spain in November last year.

FLYING THE FLAG

Several juniors here have experienced a taste of Davis Cup or Billie Jean King Cup action. Vandromme made her competition debut at the Europe/Africa Group I event in Vilnius, Lithuania in April this year, defeating Alize Cornet in the opening match of Belgium's 2-0 victory over France. Serbia's Teodora Kostovic won one of the 3 matches she played for her nation at the same event as she too made her competition debut, defeating Klaudija Bubelyte in Serbia's 2-1 victory over Lithuania. Israel's Mika Buchnik, Sweden's Nellie Taraba Wallberg, Latvia's Beatrise Zeltina and Bulgaria's Rositsa Dencheva have also all represented their nations in Billie Jean King Cup.

In Davis Cup, Morocco's Karim Bennani claimed his first Davis Cup match win on his competition debut during his nation's 4-0 victory against Zimbabwe in a World Group II Play-off tie in February, defeating Ronan Tashinga Mtisi.

2025 LEADERS

Romania's Yannick Theodor Alexandrescou and USA's Keaton Hance jointly lead the boys' singles list for most match-wins at J300-level and above in 2025, and USA's Julieta Pareja tops the girls' singles list for most match-wins at J300-level and above this year.

2024 CHAMPIONS MAKE WAVES ON PROFESSIONAL TOURS

Tereza Valentova remains eligible to compete at junior-level, but is currently focusing on her professional career and has not played any junior tournaments since winning the girls' singles title here last year.

Valentova, 18, reached a career-high ranking of world No. 170 at the end of March, and currently sits at No. 172. She has won 7 professional titles on the ITF World Tennis Tour – 5 in 2024 and 2 so far this year, winning W75 Porto (POR) in January and W75 Murska Sobota (SLO) in March. She made her Grand Slam women's singles main draw debut as a qualifier at Roland Garros this year – she won her 3 matches in qualifying without dropping a set before defeating Chloe Paquet in 3 sets in the 1st round. She then fell to No. 2 seed Coco Gauff in the 2nd round.

18-year-old Kaylan Bigun played the boys' singles at Wimbledon and the US Open last year following his triumph in Paris, reaching the quarterfinals at both events, before ending his junior career. He currently plays college tennis at UCLA. He has also contested 2 Challenger-level events in 2025, both as a wild card, reaching the 2nd round at the Cleveland Challenger (USA) in January and falling in the 1st round of qualifying at the San Diego Challenger (USA) in February. He reached a career-high No. 765 in the ATP rankings in February, and currently sits at No. 938. He received a wild card into men's singles qualifying at the 2024 US Open, but fell to Valentin Vacherot in the 1st round.

FUTURE GREATNESS

Six men and six women have won both the junior singles and the men's or women's singles titles here. Stan Wawrinka and Simona Halep are the only junior champions since 2000 to go on to win the men's or women's singles title.

JUNIOR CHAMPIONS IN 2025 MEN'S AND WOMEN'S MAIN DRAWS

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are France's Mathys Domenc (15 years 323 days) and China, P.R.'s Sun Xinran (14 years 319 days), respectively. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

The oldest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Czechia's Jan Kumstat (18 years 156 days) and Sweden's Linea Bajraliu (18 years 147 days), respectively. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

In the boys' draw there is one fifteen-year-old, 16 sixteen-year-olds, 30 seventeen-year-olds and 17 eighteen-year-olds. In the girls' draw there are 2 fourteen-year-olds, 11 fifteen-year-olds, 14 sixteen-year-olds, 22 seventeen-year-olds and 15 eighteen-year-olds. Seven players celebrate a birthday during the tournament.

WILD CARDS

French players received 7 of the 8 available wild cards in the girls' singles draw: Ophelie Boullay, Eleejah Inisan, Cindy Langlais, Daphnee Mpetshi Perricard, Margot Phanthala, Nehira Sanon and Dune Vaissaud. (Ksenia Efremova was originally awarded a wild card but used a special exempt place instead, with her wild card awarded to Phanthala.) Brazil's Pietra Rivoli was also awarded a wild card through the Roland Garros Junior Series.

French players also received 7 of the 8 available wild cards in the boys' singles draw: Damien Clerc, Mathys Domenc, Pierre-Antoine Faut, Aaron Gabet, Daniel Jade, Mickael Kaouk and Ferdinand Livet Novkirichka. Brazil's Pedro Chabalgoity was also awarded a wild card through the Roland Garros Junior Series.

COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

A total of 36 nations are represented in the junior singles draws at 2025 Roland Garros, with USA having the most players competing in both the boys' singles event and overall, and France having the most players competing in the girls' singles event. (NB 5 players are competing as neutral athletes here)

There have been 75 Roland Garros boys' singles champions since the competition was first held in 1947, with 3 players – Ingo Buding, John Newcombe and Guillermo Perez-Roldan – winning the tournament twice. There have been 71 girls' singles champions here since the inaugural competition in 1953, with Martina Hingis the only female player to win 2 junior Roland Garros singles titles.
