

2025 ROLAND GARROS MEN'S WHEELCHAIR SINGLES FINAL NOTES Saturday 7 June

NO. 1 TOKITO ODA (JPN) v NO. 2 ALFIE HEWETT (GBR)

Head-to-head: Oda leads 10-9

A 20th meeting for Oda and Hewett, their 2nd at Roland Garros and their 6th at a Grand Slam, with all 5 previous Grand Slam meetings coming in finals. Oda defeated Hewett in the final here in 2023 and leads the head-to-head at the Grand Slams 3-2 overall. The pair have contested 5 of the last 8 Grand Slam men's wheelchair singles finals.

This is the pair's 16th meeting in a final. Oda leads 9-6 in finals, including winning 4 of the pair's last 5 meetings in finals. Hewett won their most recent meeting, in a final or otherwise, to win the title at the 2025 Australian Open.

This is their 4th meeting on clay, with Oda winning all 3 previous meetings on the surface – in the final at the 2023 Roland Garros, in the final at the 2024 French Riviera Open and in the gold medal match at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Wheelchair Tennis Event.

Oda and Hewett are both former Roland Garros champions. Oda is bidding to become the 3rd player to win the men's wheelchair singles title here on 3 or more occasions – after Shingo Kunieda and Hewett.

Oda and Hewett are both in the Top 5 on the list for most Grand Slam men's wheelchair singles titles won. Oda will equal Gustavo Fernandez in 3rd place on the list if he wins his 5th major title today, while Hewett is in 2nd place on the list and is bidding to extend his lead over Fernandez. - Lefthander **ODA** is bidding to win his 3rd consecutive Roland Garros men's wheelchair singles title and become the 2nd player to win 3 consecutive men's wheelchair singles title here after Shingo Kunieda, who won 4 consecutive titles here in 2007-10.
- Oda is also bidding to become the 3rd player to win 3 consecutive men's wheelchair singles titles at a Grand Slam – after David Hall and Kunieda.

- Oda is bidding to win his 3rd Roland Garros title and become the 3rd player to win the men's wheelchair singles title here on 3 or more occasions – after Kunieda (8 titles) and Hewett (3). He defeated Hewett to win his first title here in 2023 and successfully defended his title in 2024, defeating Gustavo Fernandez in the final.
- Oda is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam singles title**. In addition to his 2 titles here, he also won the titlea at 2023 Wimbledon and the 2024 Australian Open, defeating Hewett in the final on both occasions.
- Oda is also bidding to become the 3rd Japanese player to win 5 or more Grand Slam wheelchair singles titles after Kunieda (28 Grand Slam singles titles) and Yui Kamiji (9). Mie Yaosa is the only other Japanese player to win a Grand Slam wheelchair singles title, winning the 2005 Australian Open women's wheelchair singles title. (NB Yui Kamiji is bidding to win her 10th Grand Slam singles title today)

- By winning the title here in 2023 aged 17 years 33 days, Oda became the **youngest player to win a Grand Slam singles title (in any discipline excluding juniors) since the 1997 US Open**, when Martina Hingis won the women's singles title aged 16 years 342 days. He also become the youngest man in history to win a Grand Slam singles title in any discipline.
- Oda is contesting his **7th Grand Slam final**. In addition to his 4 Grand Slam titles, he finished runner-up at the Australian Open in 2023 and 2025, falling to Hewett on both occasions.
- Oda has won 13 of the 14 singles matches he has contested at Roland Garros. His only singles defeat here came on his Grand Slam debut in 2022, when he fell to Kunieda in the semifinals. He is making his 4th appearance here and his 12th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Oda has won 2 singles titles in 2025 at the Melbourne Wheelchair Open (AUS) (d. Hewett) and the Japan Open (d. Martin de la Puente). He finished runner-up at the Australian Open in the only other individual event he contested, falling to Hewett in his only singles loss so far in 2025.
- Oda has also won 8 doubles titles. He will bid to win his first Grand Slam doubles title when he contests his 6th Grand Slam doubles final later today – he and Stephane Houdet take on No. 1 seeds and 5-time defending champions Hewett/Gordon Reid.
- Oda became the youngest player ever to win the Paralympic men's singles gold medal at Paris 2024. Aged 18 years 123 days, he defeated Hewett in the final to become the 3rd Japanese player to win a Paralympics singles gold medal in any wheelchair tennis category after Kunieda, who won the men's singles gold medal at Beijing 2008, London 2012 and Tokyo 2020, and Kamiji, who won the women's singles gold medal at Paris 2024. He also won the men's wheelchair doubles silver medal alongside Takuya Miki, falling to Hewett/Reid in the gold medal match.
- Oda **became world No. 1 for the first time** after winning the title at 2023 Roland Garros. Aged 17 years 35 days, he became the youngest man in history to hold the No. 1 ranking in any senior tennis discipline. He has been ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 since reaching his first Grand Slam final at the 2023 Australian Open and plays here at No. 1.
- Oda is coached by Yuya Okado.
- **HEWETT** is bidding to win his 4th Roland Garros title. He won the title here in 2017 (d. Gustavo Fernandez), 2020 (d. Joachim Gerard) and 2021 (d. Shingo Kunieda).
- Hewett is bidding to win his 11th Grand Slam title. In addition to his 3 titles at Roland Garros, he has won the titles at the US Open in 2018 (d. Kunieda), 2019 (d. Stephane Houdet), 2022 (d. Kunieda) and 2023 (d. Gordon Reid), at the Australian Open in 2023 (d. Oda) and 2025 (d. Oda), and at 2024 Wimbledon (d. Martin de la Puente).
- Hewett is contesting his 20th Grand Slam final. In addition to his 10 title victories, he also reached the final at the US Open in 2017 (I. Houdet), 2020 (I. Kunieda) and 2021 (I. Kunieda), at the Australian Open in 2021 (I. Gerard), 2022 (I. Kunieda), and 2024 (I. Oda), at Wimbledon in 2022 (I. Kunieda) and 2023 (I. Oda), and at 2023 Roland Garros (I. Oda).
- Hewett is making his 9th appearance at Roland Garros and is contesting his 33rd Grand Slam overall. Last year here, he fell to Fernandez in the semifinals.
- Hewett's best results in 2025 are winning 4 titles. In addition to his title at the Australian Open, he also won the titles at the Cajun Classic (USA) (d. De La Puente), Munich (GER) (d. Fernandez) and Rome (ITA) (d. Ruben Spaargaren). He finished runner-up at the Melbourne Wheelchair Open (AUS) (I. Oda) and reached the semifinals at the Victorian Wheelchair Open (AUS) (I. Fernandez).
- Hewett has also **won 88 doubles titles** including 22 Grand Slam doubles titles, all with Reid, at Wimbledon in 2016-18, 2021, 2023 and 2024, at the US Open 2017-21, at the Australian Open in 2020-25, and at Roland Garros in 2020-24. He and Reid face Houdet/Oda in the doubles final here later today.
- Hewett is a 5-time Paralympic medallist. He has won 2 silver medals in men's wheelchair singles, reaching
 the final at both Rio 2016 (I. Reid) and Paris 2024 (I. Oda). He won a gold medal alongside Reid in men's
 doubles at Paris 2024, with the pair having previously won silver medals at both Rio 2016 and Tokyo 2020.

•	Hewett reached the world No. 1 ranking for the first time in January 2018. He was the youngest player in
	history to hold the men's No. 1 ranking until Oda became world No. 1 in June 2023 aged 17. Hewett has been
	ranked inside the Top 10 since September 2016. He plays here at No. 2.

• Hewett is coached by Craig Allen.
