

## 2025 ROLAND GARROS WOMEN'S WHEELCHAIR SINGLES FINAL NOTES Saturday 7 June

NO. 1 YUI KAMIJI (JPN) v NO. 2 ANIEK VAN KOOT (NED)

Head-to-head: Kamiji leads 50-21

A 72nd meeting between Kamiji and Van Koot, and their 20th meeting at the Grand Slams. Kamiji leads their overall head-to-head (50-21), their head-to-head at the Grand Slams (11-8) and their head-to-head at Roland Garros (5-1).

This is the pair's 5th meeting in a Grand Slam final. Kamiji has won all 4 of their previous meetings in Grand Slam finals – at both Roland Garros and the US Open in 2014, and at the Australian Open in both 2020 and 2025.

Since defeating Kamiji in the quarterfinals at the 2022 Australian Open, Van Koot has won one of the 13 matches she has played against Kamiji. Her only victory against Kamiji in that time was a 57 64 75 victory in the semifinals at Wimbledon last year.

Kamiji has won both of the pair's meetings in 2025 – a 62 62 victory in the final at the Australian Open and a 62 61 victory on clay at the Wheelchair World Team Cup.

Kamiji is bidding to equal Diede de Groot in 2nd place on the list for most Roland Garros women's wheelchair singles titles. Van Koot is bidding to become the 7th player to win the women's wheelchair singles title here.

Both Kamiji and Van Koot are in the Top 5 on the list for most Grand Slam women's wheelchair singles titles. Kamiji could become the 3rd player to win 10 Grand Slam women's wheelchair singles titles, while Van Koot could equal Griffioen in 4th place on the list if she wins her 4th major title.

- **KAMIJI** is bidding to win her 5th Roland Garros singles title. She won the title here in 2014 (d. Van Koot), 2017 (d. Sabine Ellerbrook), 2018 (d. Diede De Groot) and 2020 (d. Momoko Ohtani).
- Kamiji is bidding to equal De Groot in 4th place on the list for most Roland Garros wheelchair singles titles, across all wheelchair tennis categories.

- Kamiji is bidding to win her **10th Grand Slam singles title**. In addition to her 4 titles here, she also won the titles at the US Open in 2014 (d. Van Koot) and 2017 (d. De Groot), and at the Australian Open in 2017 (d. Jiske Griffioen), 2020 (d. Van Koot) and 2025 (d. Van Koot).
- Kamiji is bidding to become the **6th player to win 10 or more Grand Slam wheelchair singles titles**, across all wheelchair tennis categories.

- Kamiji is contesting her **9th Roland Garros singles final**. In addition to her 4 title victories here, she also finished runner-up in 2019, 2021, 2022 and 2023, losing to De Groot in the final on all 4 occasions.
- Kamiji is contesting her **29th Grand Slam singles final**. She has a 4-4 win-loss record in finals at Roland Garros by comparison, she has a 3-7 win-loss record in Australian Open finals, a 2-7 win-loss record in US Open finals and lost the only final she has contested at Wimbledon.
- Kamiji is making her **13th appearance at Roland Garros** and her 44th Grand Slam appearance overall. Last year here, she fell to Momoko Ohtani in the quarterfinals.
- Kamiji has won 107 singles titles including 2 titles this season. In addition to her title-victory at the Australian Open, she also won the title at Miki, Hyogo (JPN) (d. Saki Takamuro). She finished runner-up at the 3 other individual events she has contested this season at the Melbourne Wheelchair Open (AUS) (I. Li Xiaohui), Daegu (KOR) (I. Wang Ziying) and Iizuka, Fukuoka (JPN) (I. Li) and won all 5 matches she has contested in the Wheelchair World Team Cup.
- Kamiji is a **22-time Grand Slam doubles champion**. She has won 5 Roland Garros doubles titles alongside Jordanne Whiley in 2014 (d. Marjolein Buis/Jiske Griffioen) and 2016 (d. Griffioen/Van Koot), alongside Buis in 2017 (d. Griffioen/Van Koot) and alongside Kgothatso Montjane in 2023 (d. De Groot/Maria Florencia Moreno) and this year (d. Li/Wang Ziying).
- Kamiji won the **gold medal in women's singles at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Wheelchair Tennis Event**, where she defeated De Groot in the final to become the first non-Dutch player to win a gold medal in women's singles at the Paralympics.
- Kamiji is a **5-time Paralympic medallist**. In addition to her gold medal in women's singles at Paris 2024, she also won the gold medal in women's doubles at Paris 2024 alongside Manami Tanaka, as she and Tanaka became the first non-Dutch women to win the gold medal in Paralympic women's doubles. She also won the silver in the women's singles at Tokyo 2020, the bronze medal in both women's singles at Rio 2016 and the bronze medal in women's doubles alongside Ohtani at Tokyo 2020.
- Kamiji reached the **world No. 1 ranking** for the first time in May 2014. She was ranked at No. 2 from September 2019 until January 2025, when she returned to the No. 1 ranking after winning the title at the Australian Open.
- · Kamiji is coached by Masayoshi Ono.
- **VAN KOOT** is bidding to win her first Roland Garros singles title and become the 2nd player to complete the career Grand Slam in women's wheelchair singles, after Diede de Groot.

- Van Koot is bidding to win her 4th Grand Slam singles title. She won her first 2 Grand Slam titles in 2013, defeating Sabine Ellerbrock in the final at both the Australian Open and the US Open. She also won the titles at 2019 Wimbledon (d. De Groot).
- Van Koot is contesting her **4th Roland Garros singles final**. She has lost all 3 singles finals she has contested here in 2012 (I. Esther Vergeer), 2014 (I. Kamiji) and 2015 (I. Jiske Griffioen).
- Van Koot is contesting her **17th Grand Slam final**. In addition to her 0-3 win-loss record in finals here, she has a 1-5 win-loss record in finals at the Australian Open including her defeat to Kamiji in the final at the Australian Open this year as well as a 1-3 win-loss record in finals at Wimbledon and a 1-2 win-loss record in finals at the US Open.

- Van Koot is making her **17th appearance at Roland Garros** and her 56th Grand Slam appearance overall. Last year here, she fell to De Groot in the semifinals.
- Van Koot has won 60 singles titles including 3 titles this season. She won the titles at the Victorian Wheelchair Open (AUS) (d. Wang Ziying), Baton Rouge (USA) (d. Ksenia Chasteau) and Seoul (KOR) (d. Zhu Zhenzhen). She also finished runner-up at the Georgia Open (USA) (l. Lizzy de Greef) and Rome (l. Li Xiaohui).
- Van Koot is a 24-time Grand Slam doubles champion. She has won 9 Roland Garros doubles titles alongside Daniela di Toro in 2010, alongside Griffioen in 2013 and 2015, and alongside De Groot in 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2024. She and Pauline Deroulede fell to No. 2 seeds Li/Wang in the semifinals here this year.
- Van Koot is a 7-time Paralympic medallist. She has 3 medals in singles winning silver medals at London 2012 (I. Vergeer) and at Rio 2016 (I. Griffioen) and a bronze medal at Paris 2024, where she fell to Kamiji in the semifinals before defeating Wang in the bronze medal match. She has won 4 medals in doubles winning gold medals alongside Griffioen at Rio 2016 and alongside De Groot at Tokyo 2020, and winning silver medals alongside Griffioen at London 2012 and alongside De Groot at Paris 2024.
- Van Koot was ranked as world No. 1 in January-June 2013 and again in September 2013-January 2014.
  She returned to the No. 2 ranking in March this year for the first time since August 2019 and plays here at the same ranking.
- Van Koot is coached by Robin van Beveren.
