



2025 WIMBLEDON THE CHAMPIONSHIPS



Men's Tournament Preview

2025 Wimbledon is the 138th staging of the Championships, which began in 1877 with Great Britain's Spencer Gore defeating compatriot William Marshall 61 62 64 for the inaugural title. This is the 57th staging of the Championships in the Open Era, the first being in 1968 when Australia's Rod Laver defeated compatriot Tony Roche 63 64 62 in the final. 2025 Wimbledon is the 229th Grand Slam tournament of the Open Era.

This is the 4th edition of the Championships to feature a tiebreak to 10 points when the score reaches 6-6 in the final set. It is the 6th edition of the Championships to feature a final-set tiebreak – in 2019 and 2021, a tiebreak to 7 points was played when the score reached 12-12 in the final set.

POINTS AND PRIZE MONEY

Total prize money for this year's men's singles event is £19,414,000, an 8.2% overall increase on 2024 prize money.

ALCARAZ BIDS FOR WIMBLEDON THREE-PEAT

Carlos Alcaraz won his first Wimbledon title in 2023, defeating Novak Djokovic in 5 sets in the final. Last year, he defeated Djokovic in straight sets in the final to become the 9th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title. This year, he is bidding to become the 5th man in the Open Era to win 3 consecutive Wimbledon titles.

Alcaraz will equal Boris Becker and John McEnroe in 5th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men's singles titles if he wins his 3rd title here this year, while Djokovic is bidding to equal Roger Federer's all-time record of 8 Wimbledon men's singles titles.

ALCARAZ AIMS TO EQUAL WIMBLEDON ICONS ON SLAM LEADERBOARD

Alcaraz won his 5th Grand Slam title at Roland Garros this year, becoming the 15th man in the Open Era to win 5 or more major titles. He is bidding to win his 6th Grand Slam title here and equal Becker and Stefan Edberg in 11th place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men's singles titles.

THREE WIMBLEDON TITLES BEFORE TURNING 23??

Aged 22 years 69 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the 3rd-youngest player in the Open Era to win 3 Wimbledon men's singles titles – after Becker and Bjorn Borg. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

Alcaraz is also bidding to become the 2nd-youngest player in the Open Era to win 6 Grand Slam men's singles titles – after Borg, who won his 6th major title at 1978 Wimbledon aged 22 years 32 days. Borg and Rafael Nadal are the only players in the Open Era to have won 6 Grand Slam singles titles before turning 23. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

ALCARAZ BIDS FOR PARIS-LONDON DOUBLE-DOUBLE

In 2024, Alcaraz became the 13th man in history to win the titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same season. Should he repeat the feat this year, he will become the 4th man in history to win back-to-back Roland Garros and Wimbledon titles on multiple occasions – and the 2nd to do so in consecutive years, after Borg, who won back-to-back titles at Roland Garros in Wimbledon in 3 straight years from 1978 to 1980.

WINNING FIRST SIX GRAND SLAM FINALS

Alcaraz has won all 5 Grand Slam finals he has contested. Should he reach and win the final here this year, he would become the 4th player in history to win his first 6 Grand Slam men's singles finals – after William Renshaw and Federer, who both won the first 7 Grand Slam finals they contested, and Anthony Wilding, who won the first 6 Grand Slam finals he contested.

THE ALCARAZ-SINNER DUOPOLY

Since the start of the 2024 season, Alcaraz and Jannik Sinner have each won 3 Grand Slam titles, with Alcaraz recovering from 0-2 down to defeat Sinner in the final at Roland Garros earlier this month. That match was the pair's first meeting in a Grand Slam final.

Four other players have reached Grand Slam finals in that time – Alexander Zverev with 2 runner-up finishes, and Djokovic, Daniil Medvedev and Taylor Fritz with one runner-up finish each.

CHANNEL SLAM SHOWDOWN

Should Sinner and Alcaraz reach the final here, they will become the 5th pair of players in history to contest the men's singles final at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year – and just the 2nd pair to do so in the Open Era, after Federer and Nadal in 2006-08.

THE NEXT BIG RIVALRY?

Alcaraz defeated Sinner in the final at Roland Garros to extend his lead in the pair's Tour-level head-to-head to 8-4. Alcaraz has won the pair's last 5 meetings, with Sinner's last victory against Alcaraz coming in the semifinals at 2023 Beijing. Their last 3 meetings have come in tournament finals.

Alcaraz has won 3 of the pair's 4 previous Grand Slam meetings – but Sinner won the duo's only previous meeting at Wimbledon, a 4-set victory in the round of 16 in 2022. Alcaraz has also won 3 of the pair's 4 meetings in finals – Sinner won the first final they contested, at 2022 Umag, but Alcaraz has since won their matches in the finals at 2024 Beijing, 2025 Rome-1000 and 2025 Roland Garros.

DOES ALCARAZ HAVE THE SOLUTION TO SINNER?

Sinner has a 92-9 win-loss record since the start of the 2024 season. Of his 9 defeats, 5 have come against Alcaraz, with one defeat against each of Alexander Bublik, Medvedev, Andrey Rublev and Stefanos Tsitsipas.

Sinner's defeat to Alcaraz in the final at 2025 Rome-1000 was his first straight-sets loss since he fell to Djokovic 63 63 in the final at the 2023 ATP Finals, ending a streak of 94 matches in which he had won at least one set. His defeat to Bublik in the 2nd round at 2025 Halle was the first tournament where he failed to reach at least the quarterfinals since 2023 Paris-1000, where he gave a walkover to Alex de Minaur in the 3rd round.

SINNER LOOKS TO MAKE ITALIAN HISTORY

World No. 1 Sinner is bidding to become the first Italian player, man or woman, to win a singles title at Wimbledon. 2021 men's singles runner-up Matteo Berrettini and 2024 women's singles runner-up Jasmine Paolini are the only Italian players in history to have reached a singles final at Wimbledon.

Sinner is also aiming to win his 4th Grand Slam title here and extend his lead at the top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam singles titles won by an Italian player. (see table overleaf)

SINNER LOOKS TO COMPLETE SET OF GRAND SLAM FINAL APPEARANCES

Having reached the final at Roland Garros for the first time this year, Sinner is bidding to reach his first Wimbledon final and become the 11th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. He would become the 3rd player in the Open Era to achieve the feat at Wimbledon, after Ivan Lendl and Jim Courier – neither of whom won a Wimbledon title in their careers.

Sinner is making his 23rd Grand Slam appearance at Wimbledon this year. If he reaches the final here and completes the set of Grand Slam final appearances, he will go 3rd on the Open Era list for fewest Grand Slam appearances before reaching the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments – behind Courier and Andre Agassi, who completed the set of Grand Slam final appearances on, respectively, their 19th and 22nd Grand Slam appearances.

NO. 1 RANKING UPDATE

Sinner will remain as world No. 1 when the new rankings are published on Monday 14 July, regardless of results at this year's Wimbledon.

DJOKOVIC BIDS FOR MORE GRAND SLAM HISTORY

Seven-time Wimbledon champion Djokovic is bidding to win his 25th Grand Slam title and extend his all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles, ahead of Nadal and Federer. Djokovic equalled Nadal at the top of the list by winning the 2023 Australian Open (defeating Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final) and claimed sole ownership of the record by winning 2023 Roland Garros (defeating Casper Ruud in the final). He won the 2023 US Open (defeating Medvedev in the final) for his 24th Grand Slam title.

Djokovic is bidding to become the first player in history to win 8 or more titles at 2 Grand Slam tournaments. In addition to his 7 titles here, he has also won 10 titles at the Australian Open (as well as 3 titles at Roland Garros and 4 titles at the US Open). He is also one of 3 players, men or women, to have won the singles titles at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments on 3 or more occasions – alongside Steffi Graf and Serena Williams.

DJOKOVIC LOOKS TO BECOME OLDEST GRAND SLAM CHAMPION

Aged 38 years 52 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the oldest player in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam men's singles title. Ken Rosewall is the only man in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title aged 37 or older, at the 1972 Australian Open. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

Should he reach the final here, Djokovic will become the 2nd man in the Open Era to reach multiple Grand Slam finals after turning 37 – after Rosewall, who contested 3 Grand Slam finals after his 37th birthday.

Djokovic is bidding to become the oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days. Djokovic is bidding to win his 5th Grand Slam title since turning 35 and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He claimed sole ownership of the record by winning the 2023 US Open, ahead of Federer and Rosewall.

Djokovic is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era. He claimed sole ownership of the record by winning his 11th Grand Slam title since turning 30 at 2023 Roland Garros, moving ahead of Serena Williams, and extended his lead by winning the title at the 2023 US Open.

MIND THE GAP

Djokovic's 24 Grand Slam title victories have spanned 15 years and 8 months – in the Open Era, only Serena Williams and Nadal have a larger gap between first and most-recent Grand Slam title victories than Djokovic.

A NEW NAME ON THE TROPHY?

Following the retirements of 2-time Wimbledon champions Andy Murray and Nadal last year, just 2 active players, Alcaraz and Djokovic, have won a Wimbledon men's singles title – together with Federer, Murray and Nadal, they have won the last 23 Wimbledon men's singles titles between them.

Six active male players have reached the Wimbledon final. In addition to Alcaraz and Djokovic, 4 active male players have finished as runner-up here – Matteo Berrettini (2021), Marin Cilic (2017), Nick Kyrgios (2022) and Milos Raonic (2016).

By comparison, 7 active players have reached the men's singles final at the Australian Open (3 active champions), 7 active players have reached the men's singles final at Roland Garros (3 active champions) and 10 active players have reached the men's singles final at the US Open (6 active champions).

SO NEAR YET SO FAR

Eight active players have reached at least one Grand Slam men's singles final during their careers but are still bidding for their first major title. Of those 8 players, just 3 have reached the final at Wimbledon – Milos Raonic (2016), Matteo Berrettini (2021) and Nick Kyrgios (2022).

ZVEREV AND FRITZ SEEK MAJOR BREAKTHROUGH

Should either No. 3 seed Zverev or No. 5 seed Fritz win the title here, they will enter the Top 5 on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Grand Slam title. Zverev, who is making his 38th Grand Slam appearance, would go 2nd on the list. Fritz, who is making his 36th Grand Slam appearance, would go joint-2nd on the list, alongside Stan Wawrinka. By reaching his 3rd Grand Slam final at the Australian Open this year, where he fell to Sinner in straight sets, Zverev equalled Michael Stich in 2nd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam final appearances by a German man. Becker, who reached 10 Grand Slam finals, is the only German man to have reached more Grand Slam finals than Zverev in the Open Era.

If he wins the title here, Zverev will become the 3rd German man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title – after Becker (champion in 1985, 1986 and 1989) and Stich (1991 champion). He would also become the first German man to win a Grand Slam title since Becker at the 1996 Australian Open. If he reaches the final here, he will become the first German player to reach the Wimbledon men's singles final since Becker finished runner-up in 1995.

Fritz reached his first Grand Slam final at the 2024 US Open, also falling to Sinner in straight sets. He became the first American man to reach a Grand Slam final since Andy Roddick finished runner-up at 2009 Wimbledon. If he wins the title here, he will become the first American man to win the Wimbledon title since Pete Sampras won his 7th Wimbledon title in 2000 and the first American man to win a Grand Slam title since Roddick at the 2003 US Open.

DRAPER LEADS THE BRITISH CONTENDERS

No. 4 seed Jack Draper leads the 13 British players in the men's draw this year – it is the highest-number of British men to start the main draw at Wimbledon since 1978, when there were 14. Across both men's and women's singles draws, there are 23 British players competing here this year – the highest-number of Brits competing in singles at Wimbledon since 1984, when there were also 23 players across the 2 draws.

By reaching his first Grand Slam semifinal at the US Open last year, Draper became the 8th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam – after Murray (21 Grand Slam semifinal appearances), Tim Henman (6), Roger Taylor (3) and Kyle Edmund, John Lloyd, Cameron Norrie and Greg Rusedski (all one).

Since Murray won his 2nd title here in 2016, Norrie is the only British man to have reached the semifinals at Wimbledon. In 2022, he became the 4th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon – after Murray (7 Wimbledon semifinal appearances), Henman (4) and Taylor (2). (see table overleaf)

In 2012 Murray ended a 74-year wait for a British men's singles finalist at Wimbledon when he finished as runner-up to Federer. The following year, he became the first British men's singles champion here since Fred Perry in 1936, defeating Djokovic in the final. Murray won the title for a 2nd time in 2016, defeating Raonic in the final.

British men have won the title here more times (37) than any other nation and Wimbledon has the most-recent home men's singles champion of the 4 Grand Slam tournaments.

No. 9 seed Medvedev is bidding to win a 2nd Grand Slam title, having won his first by defeating Djokovic in the final at the 2021 US Open. If Medvedev wins his 2nd title here on his 14th Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will equal Marat Safin at the top of the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title.

ALCARAZ, BUBLIK AND FRITZ STAR IN 2025 GRASS COURT SEASON

Alcaraz and Alexander Bublik repeated their pre-Wimbledon grass court successes from 2023, with Bublik defeating Medvedev to win his 2nd title at Halle, and Alcaraz defeating Jiri Lehecka to win his 2nd title at Queen's. In 2023, both continued the momentum into Wimbledon, with Alcaraz winning his first title here and Bublik reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time.

Fritz defeated Zverev to win the title at Stuttgart before adding a 2nd grass court title this season at Eastbourne, defeating Jenson Brooksby in the final. Fritz became the 5th man in the Open Era to win 2 grass court titles in a season prior to Wimbledon – after Mark Edmondson in 1981 (Adelaide and Bristol), both Lleyton Hewitt ('s-Hertogenbosch and Queen's) and Thomas Johansson (Nottingham and Halle) in 2001, and Matteo Berrettini in 2022 (Stuttgart and Queen's).

Elsewhere, Gabriel Diallo overcame Zizou Bergs to win his first Tour-level title at 's-Hertogenbosch, while Tallon Griekspoor won his 2nd Tour-level grass-court title at Mallorca, defeating Corentin Moutet in the final.

In the last 20 years, the Wimbledon men's singles champion came into the tournament having won one of the pre-Wimbledon grass court events on 8 occasions – Federer (2005-06, 2017 Halle), Nadal (2008 Queen's), Murray (2013, 2016 Queen's) and Alcaraz (2023 Queen's).

THE WEEK BEFORE

In the Open Era, the pre-Wimbledon tournaments have produced 17 Wimbledon men's singles champions between them – 12 from Queen's and 5 from Halle – but no winner of an event the week before Wimbledon has ever gone on to win the men's singles title.

Since 1998, when Patrick Rafter won back-to-back titles at Long Island and the US Open, the only player to win a Grand Slam title having won a tournament the previous week is Djokovic, who won back-to-back titles at Belgrade and Roland Garros in 2021.

NO WARM-UP NECESSARY

In the Open Era, just 7 different men have won the Wimbledon title without playing a warm-up event on grass. Borg won all 5 of his Wimbledon titles straight off the clay court season, while Djokovic has won 6 of his 7 titles here without playing a grass court event prior to Wimbledon. (see table overleaf)

OLDEST AND YOUNGEST

At 38 years 315 days, Gael Monfils is the oldest man to start the main draw here this year. He is one of 9 players aged 35 or older to compete here this year – there are two other 38-year-olds (Djokovic and Fabio Fognini), two 37-year-olds (Mannarino and Roberto Bautista Agut), one 36-year-old (Cilic) and three 35-year-olds (Daniel Evans, Dusan Lajovic and Jan-Lennard Struff).

At 18 years 326 days, Joao Fonseca is the youngest man to compete here this year. He is one of 4 teenagers to start the men's main draw – alongside Henry Searle (19 years 106 days), Learner Tien (19 years 223 days) and Jakub Mensik (19 years 315 days). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

BIRTHDAY BOYS

WILD CARDS

Wimbledon awarded all 8 wild cards for this year's men's singles to British players: Jay Clarke, Oliver Crawford, Daniel Evans, Arthur Fery, George Loffhagen, Johannus Monday, Jack Pinnington Jones and Henry Searle. It is the 2nd consecutive year that all men's singles wild card recipients at Wimbledon are British – prior to last year, the last time that all men's singles wild cards were British was 2003.

LEFTHANDERS

There are 15 lefthanders starting in this year's men's singles. In the Open Era, 5 lefthanded players have won the men's singles title here: Laver (1968-69), Connors (1974, 1982), McEnroe (1981, 1983-84), Goran Ivanisevic (2001) and Nadal (2008, 2010).
