



2025 WIMBLEDON THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Wheelchair Tournament Preview

In 2016, the first wheelchair singles events were held at Wimbledon, with men's and women's singles tournaments both taking place for the first time. A men's wheelchair doubles event had been held at Wimbledon since 2005, and a women's wheelchair doubles event had been added in 2009. The quad singles and doubles tournaments began in 2019. This is the 9th edition of the Wimbledon men's and women's wheelchair singles events and the 6th edition of the Wimbledon quad wheelchair singles event. 2025 Wimbledon is the 138th staging of the Championships overall.

This will be the 4th edition of the Championships to feature a tiebreak to 10 points when the score reaches 6-6 in the final set. Prior to 2022, the wheelchair singles events here had been played as best-of-3-tiebreak sets, with a tiebreak to 7 points in the final set.

For the first time in 2024, the men's and women's wheelchair singles draws expanded from 8 players to 16, with those draws remaining that size this year. The quad wheelchair singles draw remains at 8 players. The wheelchair tournament has been 6-day event since 2024, with the opening round of singles matches this year taking place from Tuesday 8 July.

KAMIJI AIMS FOR CAREER GOLDEN SLAM

Yui Kamiji made history at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Wheelchair Tennis Event by defeating Diede de Groot to become the first non-Dutch player to win the wheelchair women's singles gold medal. Having won multiple titles at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and the US Open, Wimbledon remains the only major singles trophy eluding Kamiji, with her best result here being a runner-up finish to De Groot in 2022.

Should she win the title here this year, she would join Dylan Alcott, De Groot and Shingo Kunieda as the 4th player to complete the career Golden Slam in wheelchair singles - winning the titles at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments and a Paralympic gold medal.

A total of 4 players have won the career Grand Slam in wheelchair singles. In addition to Alcott, De Groot and Kunieda, Alfie Hewett completed the career Grand Slam in men's wheelchair singles by winning his first Wimbledon singles title last year. Hewett's best results at the Paralympics are silver medal finishes at both Rio 2016 and Paris 2024.

WINNING FIRST THREE GRAND SLAMS OF THE YEAR

Kamiji is bidding to become the 5th player in wheelchair tennis history to win the singles titles at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year – after Alcott, De Groot, Kunieda and Gustavo Fernandez. Alcott (in 2021) and De Groot (in 2021-23) are the only players who subsequently completed the Grand Slam.

DE GROOT LEADS THE WAY AT WIMBLEDON

Thirteen players have won a Wimbledon wheelchair singles title, with De Groot leading the way with 6 previous singles title-victories here. De Groot is one of 2 active players to have won multiple Wimbledon singles titles, alongside 2-time quad wheelchair singles champion Niels Vink.

Fernandez, Joachim Gerard, Jiske Griffioen, Hewett, Tokito Oda, Gordon Reid, Sam Schroder and Aniek van Koot are all bidding to become 2-time Wimbledon singles champions this year.

ODA BIDS FOR PARIS-LONDON DOUBLE-DOUBLE

By winning the title here in 2023, Oda became the 3rd player to win the men's wheelchair singles titles at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year – after Fernandez in 2019 and Kunieda in 2022. After winning his 3rd consecutive Roland Garros title last month, he aims to become the first to achieve the feat twice by winning the title here again this year.

SASSON DISRUPTS DUTCH DOMINANCE IN QUAD DIVISION

The rivalry between Vink and Schroder has dominated the quad division since Alcott's retirement at the 2022 Australian Open, with one of the pair winning the title at 11 of the 13 Grand Slam tournaments since then. Schroder has won 6 Grand Slam titles in that time and Vink has won 5 titles.

However, Guy Sasson, who made his Grand Slam debut at the US Open last year, has disrupted that dominance. He has reached his first Grand Slam singles final at the 2024 Australian Open, falling to Schroder, before winning his first Grand Slam singles title by defeating Schroder in the final at 2024 Roland Garros. He successfully defended his Roland Garros title last month, defeating Schroder in the final for the 2nd straight year.

Vink became the 2nd player to retain a Wimbledon quad wheelchair singles title – after Alcott, who won the titles at the first 2 quad singles events here in 2019 and 2021 – by successfully defending his title here last year, and is bidding for a 3rd consecutive Wimbledon singles title this year.

Should Sasson (or any other player in the quad singles draw other than Schroder or Vink) win the title here this year, they will become the 4th quad player to win a Wimbledon singles title.

HEWETT LEADS ACTIVE PLAYERS IN MEN'S CATEGORY

Kunieda enjoys a healthy lead at the top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam wheelchair singles titles (in any category), having retired with 28 Grand Slam titles to his name.

Hewett claimed sole ownership of 2nd place on the list for most Grand Slam men's wheelchair singles titles by winning his 6th major title at the 2022 US Open, and has since extended his lead over Fernandez with 4 further Grand Slam title-victories. Oda equalled Fernandez in 3rd place on the list by winning his 5th major title at Roland Garros last month and will claim sole ownership of 3rd place if he wins his 2nd Wimbledon title this year.

DE GROOT BIDS TO EXTEND ALL-TIME WOMEN'S SLAM TITLE RECORD

De Groot's streak of 15 consecutive Grand Slam singles titles from the 2021 Australian Open to 2024 Wimbledon has seen her overtake Vergeer and claim sole ownership of first place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam women's wheelchair singles titles with 23 titles.

Kamiji is in 3rd place on the list, while the 2 other former Wimbledon champions in the draw, Jiske Griffioen and Van Koot, are in 4th and 5th place on the list, respectively, for most Grand Slam women's wheelchair singles titles.

THE RACE TO CATCH ALCOTT IN QUAD DIVISION

Alcott retired having won a total of 15 Grand Slam quad wheelchair singles titles – comfortably ahead of Peter Norfolk and David Wagner’s tallies of 6 major titles each at the time.

Schroder has since overtaken Norfolk and Wagner by winning his 7th Grand Slam title at the Australian Open this year. Vink is bidding for his 6th Grand Slam title and would equal Norfolk and Wagner in 3rd place on the list if he wins his 3rd consecutive Wimbledon title this year.

HOME FAVOURITES

By winning the men’s singles title here last year, Hewett became the 2nd British player to win a Wimbledon singles title. Reid won the inaugural Wimbledon men’s wheelchair singles title in 2016. Wimbledon now has the most recent home wheelchair singles champion among the 4 Grand Slam tournaments.

There are 8 British players competing in the wheelchair tournament here this year – Hewett, Reid and wild cards Ben Bartram and Dahnnon Ward in the men’s singles, wild cards Cornelia Oosthuizen and Lucy Shuker in the women’s singles, and Andy Lapthorne and wild card Gregory Slade in the quad singles.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

Many of the field competing at Wimbledon played at the Eastbourne Open and the British Open Roehampton in the 2 weeks prior to the wheelchair event here.

In the women’s events, Angelica Bernal won her first match against De Groot on her 17th attempt in the final at Eastbourne to win the first grass court title of her career. Kamiji then successfully defended her title at Roehampton, defeating Van Koot in the final.

In the men’s events, Fernandez has enjoyed a strong grass court season, defeating Ruben Spaargaren to win the title at Eastbourne before finishing runner-up to Hewett in a 3-set final at Roehampton.

In the quad events, Andy Lapthorne won his first title of the season at Eastbourne, defeating Ahmet Kaplan in the final, before Vink defeated Schroder in 3 sets in the final at Roehampton.

WIMBLEDON DEBUTANTS

There are 8 players making their Wimbledon debuts this year – 3 in the men's event (Ji Zhenxu, Sergei Lysov and Dahnon Ward), 4 players in the women's event (Macarena Cabrillana, Ksenia Chasteau, Cornelia Oosthuizen and Saki Takamuro) and one player in the quad event (Francisco Cayulef). Oosthuizen and Ward are making their Grand Slam debut at Wimbledon, while the 38 other players competing in the wheelchair events here have previously contested at least one Grand Slam tournament.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

At 19 years 66 days, Oda is the youngest player to compete in the wheelchair event here this year – he is more than 35 years younger than the oldest player, Houdet (54 years 235 days).

LEFTHANDERS

There are 9 lefthanders in the wheelchair singles draws at Wimbledon this year – 3 in the men's event (Daniel Caverzaschi, Oda and Reid), 4 in the women's event (Kamiji, Kgothatso Montjane, Van Koot and Zhu Zhenzhen) and 2 in the quad event (Lapthorne and Schroder). Oda, Reid, Schroder and Van Koot are the only lefthanded players to have won a Wimbledon wheelchair singles title.

WILD CARDS

Five wild cards have been awarded across the wheelchair events this year, all of them going to British players. Bartram and Ward are wild cards in the men's wheelchair singles, Oosthuizen and Shuker are wild cards in the women's wheelchair singles and Slade is the sole wild card in the quad wheelchair singles.

COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

A total of 14 nations are represented in the wheelchair singles draws at 2025 Wimbledon, with Great Britain Netherlands having the most players competing across the 3 events overall. Great Britain and Netherlands are the only nations with representatives in each of the men's, women's and quad wheelchair events here.
