



# 2025 WIMBLEDON WOMEN'S WHEELCHAIR SINGLES FINAL NOTES Saturday 12 July

## NO. 1 YUI KAMIJI (JPN) v NO. 4 WANG ZIYING (CHN)

### Head-to-head: Kamiji leads 8-1

A 10th meeting for Kamiji and Wang – and their first at a Grand Slam. The pair met for the first time at the 2024 Melbourne Wheelchair Open (AUS), and Kamiji has won 8 of their 9 meetings since then. Wang recorded her first victory against Kamiji in the final at Daegu (KOR) this year.

This is the pair's 2nd meeting on grass. Kamiji won 75 62 when they met in the semifinals at the British Open Roehampton (GBR) last week.

The winner of today's match will become the 4th player to win the Wimbledon women's singles wheelchair title – after Diede de Groot (6 Wimbledon singles titles) and Jiske Griffioen and Aniek van Koot (one each). The winner will also become the first non-Dutch player to win the women's wheelchair singles title here.

The winner of today's match will become the 14th player to win a Wimbledon wheelchair singles title across all categories. Both the men's wheelchair singles final and the quad wheelchair singles final at Wimbledon this year are being contested by a pair of former Wimbledon champions.

- KAMIJI** is bidding to win her first Wimbledon singles title and become the 4th wheelchair tennis player to complete the career Golden Slam in singles – after Dylan Alcott in quad wheelchair singles, Diede de Groot in women's wheelchair singles and Shingo Kunieda in men's wheelchair singles.

- Kamiji is bidding to become the **5th wheelchair tennis player to complete the career Grand Slam in singles**. In addition to Alcott, De Groot and Kunieda, Alfie Hewett has also completed the career Grand Slam in men's wheelchair singles.
- Kamiji is bidding to win her **first Wimbledon title**. By reaching the final here, she has equalled her best Wimbledon result – her only previous appearance in the final here came in 2022, when she finished runner-up to De Groot.
- Kamiji is bidding to win her **11th Grand Slam singles title**. She will claim sole ownership of 5th place on the list for most Grand Slam wheelchair singles titles, ahead of Hewett, if she wins today and Hewett loses the men's wheelchair singles final here on Sunday. She has won 5 titles at Roland Garros, 3 titles at the Australian Open and 2 titles at the US Open.

Players in wheelchair singles finals at 2025 Wimbledon in **bold**

- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Kamiji won the titles at both the Australian Open and Roland Garros, defeating Aniek van Koot at both events. They were her first Grand Slam singles titles since 2020 Roland Garros – De Groot had won the women's wheelchair singles titles at all 15 Grand Slam tournaments held since then.
- Kamiji is bidding to become the **5th player in wheelchair tennis history to win the singles titles at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year** – after Alcott, De Groot, Kunieda and Gustavo Fernandez. Alcott (in 2021) and De Groot (in 2021-23) are the only players who subsequently completed the Grand Slam.

- Kamiji is contesting her **30th Grand Slam singles final**. In addition to her only previous appearance in the final here in 2022, she has a 5-4 win-loss record in finals at Roland Garros, a 3-7 win-loss record in Australian Open finals and a 2-7 win-loss record in US Open finals.
- Kamiji is making her **9th appearance at Wimbledon** and contesting her 45th Grand Slam overall. Last year here, she reached the semifinals (l. Van Koot).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Kamiji won the title at the British Open Roehampton (GBR) (d. Van Koot). It was her 3rd title on grass – she also won the titles at the 2021 Birmingham (GBR) (d. Van Koot) and the 2024 British Open Roehampton (GBR) (d. De Groot).
- Kamiji has won **109 singles titles** – including 4 titles this season. In addition to her title-victories at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Roehampton this year, she also won the title at Miki, Hyogo (JPN) (d. Saki Takamuro). She finished runner-up at the 3 other individual events she has contested this season – at the Melbourne Wheelchair Open (AUS) (l. Li Xiaohui), Daegu (KOR) (l. Wang Ziyang) and Iizuka, Fukuoka (JPN) (l. Li) – and won all 5 matches she has contested in the Wheelchair World Team Cup.
- Kamiji is a **23-time Grand Slam doubles champion**. She has won 8 Wimbledon doubles titles – alongside Jordanne Whaley in 2014-17 and 2021, alongside De Groot in 2018, alongside Dana Mathewson in 2022 and alongside Kgothatso Montjane in 2024. She and Montjane fell to Li/Wang in the 1st round of the women's doubles here this year.
- Kamiji won the **gold medal in women's singles at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Wheelchair Tennis Event**, where she defeated De Groot in the final to become the first non-Dutch player to win a gold medal in women's singles at the Paralympics.
- Kamiji is a **5-time Paralympic medallist**. In addition to her gold medal in women's singles at Paris 2024, she also won the gold medal in women's doubles at Paris 2024 alongside Manami Tanaka, as she and Tanaka became the first non-Dutch women to win the gold medal in Paralympic women's doubles. She also won the silver in the women's singles at Tokyo 2020, the bronze medal in women's singles at Rio 2016 and the bronze medal in women's doubles alongside Ohtani at Tokyo 2020.
- Kamiji reached the **world No. 1 ranking** for the first time in May 2014. She was ranked at No. 2 from September 2019 until January 2025, when she returned to the No. 1 ranking after winning the title at the Australian Open. She plays here at the same ranking.
- Kamiji is coached by Masayoshi Ono.

- **WANG** is bidding to win her first Grand Slam singles title and become the first Chinese player to win a Grand Slam wheelchair singles title.
- Wang is bidding to become the **2nd Chinese player to win a Grand Slam singles title** (excluding junior events) – after Li Na, who won the women's singles titles at 2011 Roland Garros and the 2014 Australian Open.
- By reaching the final here, Wang has become the **2nd Chinese player to reach a Grand Slam wheelchair singles final** – after Zhu Zhenzhen, who finished runner-up at 2024 Roland Garros. She has become the 4th Chinese player to reach a Grand Slam singles final (excluding junior events) – after Li Na (4 Grand Slam final appearances), Zheng Qinwen (who finished runner-up in the women's singles at the 2024 Australian Open) and Zhu.
- By reaching the final here, Wang has recorded her **best Grand Slam result**. Her previous best result at the Grand Slams was reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions – on her Wimbledon debut last year (l. Diede de Groot) and at the Australian Open this year (l. Aniek van Koot). She is making her 2nd appearance at Wimbledon and contesting her 5th Grand Slam overall.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Wang reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Angelica Bernal, l. Kgothatso Montjane). Roland Garros is the only tournament she has contested in 2025 where she has failed to reach the semifinals.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Wang reached the semifinals at the British Open Roehampton (GBR). She defeated Cornelia Oosthuizen and Lucy Shuker before falling to Kamiji.
- Wang has won **15 singles titles** – including one this season, at Daegu (KOR) (d. Kamiji). Her other highlights this season are finishing runner-up at the Victorian Wheelchair Open (AUS) (l. Van Koot) and Busan (KOR) (l. Li Xiaohui) and reaching the semifinals at 5 other events.
- Wang won her **first Grand Slam doubles title at the Australian Open this year** – she and Li Xiaohui defeated Manami Tanaka/Zhu Zhenzhen in the final to become the first Chinese players to win a Grand Slam wheelchair doubles title. They also finished runner-up at Roland Garros (l. Kamiji/Montjane) and will face Bernal/Ksenia Chasteau in the women's doubles final here on Sunday.
- Wang won her **first Paralympic medal** at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Wheelchair Tennis Event, partnering Guo Luoyao to a bronze medal in the women's doubles. The pair fell to Kamiji/Tanaka in the semifinals before defeating Li/Zhu in the bronze medal match. She also contested the women's singles bronze medal match at Paris 2024, falling to Van Koot in straight sets.
- Wang reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 4 last month. She plays here at the same ranking.
- Wang is coached by Ralph Yin.
