



## 2026 ROLAND GARROS

### Junior Tournament Preview

In 1947, the first boys' singles event was held at Roland Garros, with the first girls' singles event taking place 6 years later in 1953. The boys' doubles and girls' doubles events were introduced in 1981. This is the 83rd edition of the boys' singles tournament here, the 74th edition of the girls' singles tournament, and the 37th editions of both the boys' doubles and girls' doubles tournaments.

2026 Roland Garros is the 125th edition of the French championships overall, which began in 1891 as a closed championship reserved for national players or players enrolled in French clubs, and the 96th tournament since the event became international in 1925. This is the 93rd time that the tournament has been held at Roland Garros, which was built for the Davis Cup Final between France and USA in 1928.

#### **SESKO SEEKS MORE HISTORY FOR SLOVENIA**

Ziga Sesko defeated USA's Keaton Hance to lift the boys' singles title at the Australian Open in February, becoming the first Slovenian player to win a Grand Slam boys' singles title and the first Slovenian player to win a junior singles title in Melbourne.

He also became the 3rd Slovenian player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title, – after Mima Jausovec (who won the girls' singles titles at 1973 Roland Garros and 1974 Wimbledon) and Katarina Srebotnik (who won the girls' singles title at 1998 Wimbledon). He will join Jausovec as the only Slovenian players to win multiple junior Grand Slam singles' titles and a junior Roland Garros singles title if he also wins the title here.

Sesko is also bidding to become the 5th boy to win the opening 2 junior Grand Slam titles of the season – after John Newcombe (1961 and 1962), Stefan Edberg (who won the Grand Slam in boys' singles in 1984), Daniel Elsner (1997) and Gael Monfils (who won the boys' singles titles at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2004).

#### **EFREMOVA SEEKS BACK-TO-BACK CROWNS**

France's Ksenia Efremova won the girls' singles title at the 2026 Australian Open, defeating Ekaterina Tupitsyna to become the 2nd French player to win the girls' singles title in Melbourne, after Virginie Razzano in 1999. She is bidding to become the 5th French player to win multiple Grand Slam girls' singles titles – after Monique Salfati (who won the girls' singles titles at 1963 Roland Garros and 1963 Wimbledon), Pascale Paradis (1983 Roland Garros and Wimbledon), Amelie Mauresmo (1996 Roland Garros and Wimbledon) and Razanno (1999 Australian Open and 2000 Roland Garros).

Efremova is also bidding to become the 5th girl to win the opening 2 junior Grand Slam titles of the season – after Robyn Ebbenn (1961), Lesley Hunt (1968), Magdalena Maleeva (who won the Australian Open and Roland Garros titles in 1990 and also won the US Open title later in the year) and Alina Korneeva (2023).

#### **HIGH HOPES FOR TOP FRENCH TALENTS**

France boasts a top seed in in both junior singles draws here. Efremova is the No. 1 seed in the girls' singles draw and Yannick Theodor Alexandrescou (who previously represented Romania) is the No. 2 seed in the boys' singles draw.

Efremova is bidding to become the first French player to win the girls' singles here since Elsa Jacquemot in 2020, while Alexandrescou is bidding to become the 3rd French player to win the boys' singles here since 2020 after Luca Van Assche in 2021 and Gabriel Debru in 2022.

In total, there have been 14 French boys' singles champions and 15 French girls' singles champions at Roland Garros since the competitions were established.

## SLAM CHAMPIONS IN THE DRAWS

Sesko and Efremova are the only junior Grand Slam singles champions competing at the 2026 Roland Garros junior event.

There are 6 junior Grand Slam champions playing in the singles events here: Connor Doig and Dimitar Kisimov (2026 Australian Open boys' doubles winners), Keaton Hance and Jack Kennedy (2025 US Open boys' doubles winners), Jana Kovackova (2025 US Open and 2026 Australian Open girls' doubles winner) and Sonja Zhenikhova (2025 Roland Garros girls' doubles winner).

## MAKING NATIONAL HISTORY

Top juniors in both the boys' and girls' singles can make history for their nations should they win the title here. Brazil has 3 top seed competing across both draws – boys' singles No. 1 seed Luis Guto Miguel and girls' singles No. 4 seed Victoria Luiza Barros and No. 5 seed Nauhany Vitoria Leme Da Silva. They all have the chance to become the first Brazilian player to win a Roland Garros junior singles title and Barros and Leme Da Silva are both bidding to become the first Brazilian player to win a Grand Slam girls' singles title.

Boys' singles No. 6 seed Ryo Tabata could become the first Japanese player to win a junior singles title here since 1969, when Kazuko Sawamatsu won the girls' singles title, the only junior Roland Garros singles title won by a Japanese player. No. 7 seed. Zangar Nurlanuly could become the first Kazakhstani player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title.

Girls' singles No. 4 seed Sun Xinran could become the first Chinese player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title outside the US Open – and the 3rd Chinese player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title overall, after Wu Yibing won the boys' singles at the 2017 US Open and Wang Xiyu won the girls' singles at the 2018 US Open. Should she win the title here this year, Sun would become Asia's first Roland Garros girls' singles champion since Indonesia's Angelique Widjaja in 2002.

## AT THE DOUBLE

Tereza Valentova won both the girls' singles and the girls' doubles titles in 2024, a feat also achieved by fellow Czech player Lucie Havlickova in 2022. Valentova and Havlickova are the only players to have won both girls' singles and doubles at Roland Garros in the same year since Agnes Szavay in 2005.

Dominic Stricker is the most-recent player to win the boys' singles and boys' doubles titles here in 2020. In total, 3 boys and 5 girls have won the junior singles and doubles titles at Roland Garros in the same year.

## GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

The Grand Slam tournaments are the pinnacle of the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors, with J500 events representing the next-most prestigious level of tournament. There have been 4 events at J500-level in 2026 so far, all of which have been played on clay, with 4 different players claiming the girls' singles titles, while 3 different players won the boys' singles titles, with Germany's Jamie Mackenzie winning both J500 Offenbach and J500 Milan.

The 3rd level of tournament on the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors is J300-level, with 12 clay court events at that level having taken place so far in 2026.

Italy's Raffaele Ciurnelli (J300 Casablanca and J300 Villena) is the only boy to have won multiple J300 titles on clay this year and Brazil's Nauhany Vitoria Leme Da Silva (J300 Santa Cruz and J300 Porto Alegre) is the only girl to have won multiple J300 titles on clay this year.

J300 Charleroi-Marcinelle, which concludes on Saturday 30 May, is the last big clay court junior tournament on the tour prior to Roland Garros.

## PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS

No. 2 seed Julieta Pareja is the only Top 10 seed in the girls' singles to have won a professional title in 2026, at W50 Chihuahua in Mexico on 22 March. No. 1 seed Efremova, No. 3 seed Jana Kovackova and No. 4 seed Sun Xinran have all won multiple professional titles in their careers, but not yet this season, while Nauhany Vitoria Leme Da Silva has won one professional title, at W15 Sao Joao da Boa Vista in Brazil in October last year.

Three of the Top 10 seeds in the boys' singles have won a professional title in 2026, all 3 of whom are American: No. 4 Jack Kennedy, No. 5 Keaton Hance and No. 10 Michael Antonius, all of whom have won one title this year, all in the US and all their first professional titles. Kennedy won M15 Boca Raton on 12 April, Hance won M15 Orlando, FL on 26 April, while Antonius won M25 Bakersfield, CA on 22 March.

## FLYING THE FLAG

Several juniors here have experienced a taste of Davis Cup or Billie Jean King Cup action. They include Brazil's Victoria Luiza Barros and Nauhany Vitoria Leme Da Silva. Leme Da Silva made her debut at the 2025 Play-offs, winning one of the 2 matches she contested at the event. Barros made her competition debut at the 2026 Americas Group I event in April alongside a returning Leme Da Silva. Barros won all 4 matches she contested at the event, one in singles and 3 in doubles, while Leme Da Silva won all 5 matches she contested, 4 in singles and one in doubles, as both played a starring role in securing promotion to the 2026 Play-offs for Brazil.

Latvia's Adelina Lacinova made her Billie Jean King Cup debut aged 15 in April 2023 and has recorded a 6-5 overall win-loss record for her nation so far, including winning 4 of the 5 matches she contested at the 2026 Europe/Africa Group I event in April.

In Davis Cup, Slovenia's Ziga Sesko claimed his first Davis Cup match win on his competition debut during his nation's 4-0 victory against Uruguay in a World Group II tie in September, defeating Francisco Llanes. Puerto Rico's Yannik Alvarez has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition across singles and doubles, defeating Honduras' Alejandro Obando and partnering Jake Fellows to defeat Bolivia's Boris Arias/Federico Zeballos at the 2025 Americas Group III event in June last year.

Ecuador's Emilio Camacho made his competition debut in the 4th match of Ecuador's 3-1 victory against Australia at the 2026 Qualifiers, falling to Jason Kubler after the tie had already been decided. Connor Doig made his Davis Cup debut for South Africa in a 1-4 defeat to Morocco in a 2025 World Group II tie, falling to Taha Baadi in the only match he played.

## 2026 LEADERS

Austria's Thilo Behrmann leads the boys' singles list for most match-wins at J300-level and above in 2026, and China, P.R.'s Sun Xinran tops the girls' singles list for most match-wins at J300-level and above this year.

## 2025 CHAMPIONS MAKE STRIDES ON PROFESSIONAL TOURS

Lilli Tagger remains eligible to compete at junior-level but is currently focusing on her professional career and has not played any junior tournaments since reaching the girls' singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon last July.

Tagger, 18, had already won her first professional title at W35 Terrassa (ESP) in March 2025 ahead of winning the girls' singles here last June. After Wimbledon in July, she won back-to-back pro titles at W75 Bucharest (ROU) and W75 Kursumlijska Banja (SRB) in September. As a wild card on her WTA Tour main draw debut, she finished runner-up at Jiujiang in November.

Tagger made her Grand Slam women's singles qualifying debut at the 2026 Australian Open, reaching the final round of qualifying before falling to Lanlana Tararudee. She then won her 4th and biggest title to date at W100 Fujairah (UAE) in February. She currently sits at a career-high ranking of No. 90 and made her Grand Slam women's singles main draw debut as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros this year. She then fell to No. 32 seed Wang Xinyu in the 1st round.

18-year-old Niels McDonald contested 3 more junior events last year after winning the boys' singles title in Paris, most recently winning the title at J300 Oberpullendorf (AUT) in September. He is still eligible to compete as a junior but has only contested professional events in 2026. He has contested 12 professional events so far this year, with his best result coming in a quarterfinal finish at M15 Oberhaching (GER) in February. He reached a career-high No. 1003 in the ATP rankings on 3 May and currently sits at No. 1014. He received a wild card into men's singles qualifying at the ATP Tour event at Hamburg but fell to Ignacio Buse in the 1st round.

## FUTURE GREATNESS

Six men and seven women have won both the junior singles and the men's or women's singles titles here. Stan Wawrinka, Simona Halep and Coco Gauff are the only junior champions since 2000 to go on to win the men's or women's singles title.

## YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are France's Benoit Geldof (15 years 347 days) and Brazil's Eduarda Gomes (13 years 331 days), respectively. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

The oldest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Romania's Matei Todoron (18 years 154 days) and Czechia's Denisa Zoldakova (18 years 156 days), respectively. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

In the boys' draw there is one fifteen-year-old, 8 sixteen-year-olds, 30 seventeen-year-olds and 25 eighteen-year-olds. In the girls' draw there is one thirteen-year-old, 3 fourteen-year-olds, 10 fifteen-year-olds, 19 sixteen-year-olds, 20 seventeen-year-olds and 11 eighteen-year-olds. Three players celebrate a birthday during the tournament.

## WILD CARDS

French players received 7 of the 8 available wild cards in the girls' singles draw: Daniel Baranes, Ninon Carpentier, Capucine Cedillo Vayson de Pradenne, Eleejah Inisan, Cindy Langlais, Daphnee Mpetshi Perricard and Nehira Sanon. Brazil's Eduarda Gomez was also awarded a wild card through the Roland Garros Junior Series.

French players also received 7 of the 8 available wild cards in the boys' singles draw: Aaron Gabet, Benoit Geldof, Mickael Kaouk, Ferdinand Livet Novkirichka, Matisse Martin, Pablo Pradat and Timeo Truffelli. Brazil's Leonardo Storck Franca was also awarded a wild card through the Roland Garros Junior Series.

## COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

A total of 37 nations are represented in the junior singles draws at 2026 Roland Garros, with France and USA jointly having the most players competing in both the boys' singles event, the girls' singles event and overall. (NB 11 players are competing as neutral athletes here)
