Wheelchair Tournament Preview

In 2007, the first wheelchair events were held at Roland Garros, with men's and women's singles and doubles tournaments all taking place. The quad singles and doubles tournaments began in 2019. This is the 20th edition of the Roland Garros wheelchair tournament overall and the 8th edition of the Roland Garros quad wheelchair tournaments.

2026 Roland Garros is the 125th edition of the French championships overall, which began in 1891 as a closed championship reserved for national players or players enrolled in French clubs, and the 96th tournament since the event became international in 1925. This is the 93rd time that the tournament has been held at Roland Garros, which was built for the Davis Cup Final between France and USA in 1928.

All three wheelchair singles draws remain the same size as in 2025. The men's and women's wheelchair singles events were expanded for the 2023 tournament, with 16 players competing in both events (up from 12 players in 2022 and from 8 players in 2021). The quad wheelchair singles event expanded to 8 players (from 4) in 2022.

50 YEARS OF WHEELCHAIR TENNIS

The 2026 season marks the 50th anniversary of wheelchair tennis. Brad Parks founded the sport in California, USA in 1976 and it has gone from strength to strength since then, becoming a full Paralympic medal sport at Barcelona 1992. At the Paris 2024 Wheelchair Tennis Event, record crowds at Roland Garros witnessed historic medal-winning moments.

Wheelchair tennis made its Grand Slam debut at the Australian Open in 2002. By 2007, all four Grand Slam tournaments included wheelchair competitions as part of the ITF Wheelchair Tennis Tour. Since then, draw sizes and prize money have increased across all divisions, with matches regularly played on show courts, further raising the sport's profile on tennis's biggest stages.

The UNIQLO Wheelchair Tennis Tour delivers more than 160 tournaments across over 40 countries, offering more than \$6.7 million in prize money. This year will also see the start of the ITF's new Premier Tier level of competition, comprising more than 25 UNIQLO Wheelchair Tennis Tour events, and with more than 10 set to take place alongside and integrated with Tour-level tournaments.

WHEELCHAIR TENNIS HALL OF CHAMPIONS

To recognise the 50th anniversary of wheelchair tennis, the ITF has launched the [Wheelchair Tennis Hall of Champions](#) – a digital platform celebrating players, coaches and contributors who have played a pivotal role in the growth of the sport.

Groups of inductees have been celebrated throughout the season, and further inductions will take place in a ceremony on Court Suzanne Lenglen on Thursday 4 June. This ceremony will honour seven French individuals who have made significant contributions to the wheelchair game at an international and domestic level: Jean-Paul Cournet, Pierre Fusade, Laurent Giammartini, Florence Gravelier, Michael Jeremiasz, Jean-Pierre Limborg and Yannick Noah.

ODA AIMS FOR FOUR-IN-A-ROW AT ROLAND GARROS

In 2023, Tokito Oda defeated Alfie Hewett to win the Roland Garros men’s wheelchair singles title and become the youngest player to win a Grand Slam singles title in any male category (excluding juniors). He successfully defended the title in both 2024, defeating 2-time Roland Garros champion Gustavo Fernandez in the final, and last year, defeating 3-time Roland Garros champion Hewett in the final. With victory Oda became the second player to secure three consecutive wheelchair men’s singles titles at Roland Garros, after compatriot Shingo Kunieda, who won the first four editions of the event from 2007 to 2010.

Should Oda claim a fourth consecutive title here this year he would join Kunieda as the only players to win 4 consecutive wheelchair men’s singles titles at the same Grand Slam tournament.

Should he win a 4th consecutive title here, Oda will also become the 4th player to record a streak of 4 Roland Garros wheelchair singles titles.

TOKITO BEGINS TO BUILD A NOTEWORTHY STREAK

By winning the titles at Roland Garros, Wimbledon and the US Open last year and the title at the Australian Open earlier this year, Tokito Oda became the 2nd player to win 4 consecutive Grand Slam men’s wheelchair singles titles.

Since 2017, when all 4 Grand Slam events held men’s wheelchair singles events for the first time, the now-retired Shingo Kunieda is the only other player to have recorded a streak of 4 consecutive men’s wheelchair singles titles – winning the title at all 4 Grand Slam events from the 2021 US Open through to 2022 Wimbledon. Prior to the introduction of the singles events at Wimbledon, Kunieda also recorded a streak of 12 consecutive Grand Slam titles in 2007-11 and a streak of 6 consecutive Grand Slam titles in 2014-15.

Across all wheelchair tennis categories, Oda would become the 4th player to record a streak of 5 consecutive Grand Slam singles titles since 2017 – after Kunieda, Dylan Alcott (who won 5 consecutive major titles in 2018-19 and another 5 consecutive major titles in 2020-21) and Diede De Groot (who won 15 consecutive major titles in 2021-24).

By winning the title at the Australian Open this year aged just 19 years 269 days, Oda also became the youngest man in professional tennis history to hold all 4 Grand Slam singles titles simultaneously – ahead of Don Budge, who completed the Grand Slam at the 1938 US Championships aged 22 years 363 days. He also became the 2nd-youngest player, man or woman, to hold all 4 Grand Slam singles titles simultaneously – after Steffi Graf, who completed the Grand Slam at the 1988 US Open aged 19 years 89 days.

THE ODA-HEWETT DUOPOLY

Between 2007 and 2022, Kunieda was the dominant force in wheelchair men’s tennis, winning the title at 28 of the 51 Grand Slam men’s wheelchair singles tournaments played in that period. Kunieda retired in January 2023 just before that year’s Australian Open having won a total of 50 Grand Slam titles across singles and doubles.

Since Kunieda’s retirement, Oda and Hewett have combined to win all 12 Grand Slam men’s wheelchair singles tournaments played, Oda winning 8 and Hewett 4, and have faced each other in 7 of the 12 major finals in that time. Oda leads the head-to-head in Grand Slam finals 5-2, including his victories against Hewett in the final at Roland Garros in 2023 and 2025.

DE GROOT AND KAMIJI AIM FOR SIXTH ROLAND GARROS CROWNS

Both De Groot and Yui Kamiji are bidding to win a 6th Roland Garros title this year and equal Vergeer in 2nd place on the list for most Roland Garros wheelchair singles titles.

De Groot won the title here in 2019 before winning 4 consecutive titles from 2021 to 2024, defeating Kamiji in the final on the first 4 occasions and Zhu Zhenzhen in the final in 2024.

Kamiji won her first title here in 2014, when she defeated Aniek van Koot in the final, before winning back-to-back titles in 2017 and 2018, defeating Sabine Ellerbrock in 2017 and De Groot in 2018. She won her 4th title in 2020, defeating compatriot Momoko Ohtani in the final, and her 5th title last year, defeating Van Koot in the final.

CHINESE COMPETITORS AIM FOR MORE HISTORY

Wang Ziying's title-victory at 2025 Wimbledon saw her become the first Chinese player to win a wheelchair singles title – and just the 2nd Chinese player to win a Grand Slam singles title in any professional tennis category after 2-time Grand Slam women's singles champion Li Na.

At the Australian Open earlier this year, Li Xiaohui joined her compatriot by defeating Diede de Groot in the women's singles final to claim her first Grand Slam singles title.

Wang and Li are one of 4 Chinese players in the women's wheelchair singles here, alongside Guo Luoyao and Zhu Zhenzhen. They are joined by Ji Zhenxu in the men's wheelchair singles here.

DE GROOT AIMS FOR A RETURN TO THE TOP

De Groot dominated the Tour for 8 years from 2017 to 2024, winning the women's wheelchair singles title at 23 of the 30 Grand Slam tournaments during that time. She underwent hip surgery in late 2024 and missed 8 months on Tour, returning to Grand Slam action at Roland Garros last year.

De Groot reached her first Grand Slam final since her return from injury at the Australian Open in January, falling to Li. She is aiming to win her 24th major title on her 5th appearance since her return. Her streak of 4 Grand Slam appearances without winning a title is her longest since making her Grand Slam debut at the 2017 Australian Open.

SASSON CARVING ROLAND GARROS NICHE

The rivalry between Sam Schroder and Niels Vink has dominated the quad division since Dylan Alcott's retirement at the 2022 Australian Open. The pair won all 8 of the Grand Slam titles from the 2022 Australian Open until the 2024 Australian Open.

However, Guy Sasson, who made his Grand Slam debut at the 2023 US Open, has disrupted that dominance. He reached his first Grand Slam singles final at the 2024 Australian Open, falling to Schroder, before winning his first Grand Slam singles title by defeating Schroder in the final here in 2024.

Sasson reached his 3rd Grand Slam singles final and successfully defended his title here in 2025, this time defeating Vink in the final.

If Sasson successfully defends his title again to record a 3rd consecutive Roland Garros title, he will match Alcott as the only player to win 3 Roland Garros quad singles titles, both consecutively and overall. He would also become the 6th player across all wheelchair tennis categories to win 3 consecutive Roland Garros singles titles.

Should any player in the quad singles draw other than Sasson or Vink win the title here this year, they will become the 4th quad player to win a Roland Garros singles title – after Alcott (3 titles), Vink and Sasson (both 2).

SCHRODER BIDS TO COMPLETE CAREER GRAND SLAM

Schroder is bidding to win his first Roland Garros title and become the 7th player to win the career Grand Slam in wheelchair singles after Alcott, De Groot, Kunieda, Hewett, Oda and Vink. He has won 4 Australian Open titles (2022-25), 2 US Open titles (2020, 2023) and one Wimbledon title (2022). He has finished runner-up here on 4 occasions – falling to Alcott in 2021, Vink in 2022 and 2023, and Sasson in 2024.

GRAND SLAM LEADERBOARD

De Groot is in 2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam wheelchair singles titles across all categories, behind 28-time major champion Kunieda. Kamiji is in 5th place on the list, while Hewett is one place further back in 6th.

HEWETT LEADS ACTIVE PLAYERS IN MEN'S CATEGORY

Kunieda enjoys a healthy lead at the top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam wheelchair singles titles (in any category), having retired with 28 Grand Slam titles to his name. Hewett is in 2nd place on the list for men's wheelchair singles titles, closely followed by Oda in 3rd.

DE GROOT LOOKS TO EXTEND ALL-TIME WOMEN'S SLAM TITLE RECORD

De Groot won her 22nd Grand Slam singles title at 2024 Roland Garros to overtake Vergeer at the top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam women's wheelchair singles titles, before adding a 23rd major singles title at 2024 Wimbledon. The 2 other former Roland Garros champions in the women's wheelchair singles draw, Kamiji and Jiske Griffioen, are in 3rd and 4th place on the list, respectively, for most Grand Slam women's wheelchair singles titles.

THE RACE TO CATCH ALCOTT IN QUAD DIVISION

Alcott retired having won a total of 15 Grand Slam quad wheelchair singles titles – comfortably ahead of Peter Norfolk and David Wagner's tallies of 6 major titles each.

Vink claimed sole ownership of 2nd place on the list by winning his 8th Grand Slam singles title at the Australian Open in January. Schroder could join Vink in 2nd place on the list with his 8th Grand Slam title if he wins here.

HOME FAVOURITES

Roland Garros has gone the longest of the four Grand Slam tournaments without a home champion in a wheelchair singles event. Houdet, who won the men's singles title here in 2012 and 2013, is the only French player to have won a Roland Garros wheelchair singles title.

There are 6 French players competing in the wheelchair tournament here this year – Frederic Cattaneo, Houdet and Guilhem Laget in the men's singles and Ksenia Chasteau, Pauline Derouledé and Charlotte Fairbank in the women's singles.

ROLAND GARROS DEBUTANTS

There are 5 players making their Roland Garros debuts this year – 2 players in the men's event (Ji Zhenxu, Daniel Rodrigues), one player in the women's event (Jinte Bos) and 2 players in the quad event (Gonzalo Enrique Lazarte and Jin Woodman). All 5 players have previously made an appearance in the main draw at a Grand Slam event.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

At just 17 years 36 days, Jin Woodman is the youngest player to compete in the wheelchair event here this year, and the only teenager. He is more than 38 years younger than the oldest player, Stephane Houdet (55 years 198 days). Kgothatso Montjane, the second oldest player in the women's wheelchair singles draw, celebrates her 40th birthday on Wednesday 3 June.

LEFTHANDERS

There are 11 lefthanders in the wheelchair singles draws at Roland Garros this year – 4 in the men's event (Daniel Caverzaschi, Laget, Oda, Gordon Reid), 5 in the women's event (Fairbank, Kamiji, Montjane, Van Koot and Zhu) and 2 in the quad event (Andy Lapthorne and Schroder). Kamiji and Oda are the only lefthanded players to have won wheelchair singles titles at Roland Garros.

WILD CARDS

French players received 4 of the 5 available wild cards – Cattaneo and Laget in the men's event and Derouledé and Fairbank in the women's event. The wild card in the quad event went to Great Britain's Gregory Slade.

COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

A total of 14 nations are represented in the wheelchair singles draws at 2026 Roland Garros, with Netherlands having the most players competing in the women's event and overall, and France having the most players competing in the men's event. Netherlands are the only nation with representation in all 3 wheelchair singles draws.

FORGING FUTURE STARS

After the US Open became the first Grand Slam to introduce a junior wheelchair category in 2022, Roland Garros joined them in 2024, before the Australian Open followed suit with their first junior wheelchair event in 2025.

The 2024 and 2025 wheelchair boys' and girls' singles draws were draws of 4 each with a semifinal and final stage, and the boys' and girls' doubles saw the same 4 players in each category contest a straight final.

Austria's Maximilian Taucher has won both editions of the boys' singles, defeating Netherlands' Ivar van Rijt in the 2024 final and USA's Charlie Cooper in the 2025 final. France's Ksenia Chasteau defeated USA's Maylee Phelps to win the inaugural girls' title in 2024, and Brazil's Vitoria Miranda won the title in 2025, defeating American Sabina Czauz in the final.

ROLAND GARROS HONOUR ROLL

There have been 6 Roland Garros men's wheelchair singles champions and 6 Roland Garros women's wheelchair singles champions since those tournaments were established in 2007. Alcott won the first 3 editions of the quad wheelchair singles event, before Vink won the title in 2022 and 2023, and Sasson won in 2024 and 2025. Of the 15 players to have won a senior wheelchair singles title here, 11 have won the title on multiple occasions.
