Monday 29 June

1st Round – Top Half

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On court today...

- Defending champion Jannik Sinner opens the action on Centre Court today, taking on Serbia's Miomir Kecmanovic. Victory for Sinner today would be his 94th Grand Slam match-win, which would see him equal Nicola Pietrangeli's all-time record for most Grand Slam match-wins by an Italian player – and he will be confident of getting the win, having won all 4 of his previous matches against Kecmanovic, including a straight-sets triumph here in 2024. But he will also be wary of another upset, having been stunned by Juan Manuel Cerundolo in the 2nd round at Roland Garros just a few weeks ago. Should Kecmanovic hand the world No. 1 another surprise defeat today, Sinner would become just the 3rd defending men's singles champion to lose in the 1st round at Wimbledon – after Manuel Santana in 1967 and Lleyton Hewitt in 2003.
- Seven-time Wimbledon winner Novak Djokovic will contest the final match of the day on Centre Court, with the 39-year-old up against Wu Yibing of China, P.R. Djokovic fell to Sinner in the semifinals here last year, marking the first time that he had failed to reach the final here since 2017. Having finished runner-up at the Australian Open in January, Djokovic remains a formidable opponent for any player, even in his 40th year. He passed a century of Wimbledon match-wins here in 2025 and now needs just 3 more to equal Roger Federer's all-time record for most men's singles victories here. Wu returned to Grand Slam action this year for the first time since 2023, having struggled with injuries in the last 2 seasons – and will have nothing to lose against one of the sport's greatest-ever players.
- A pair of former US Open champions square off in the 2nd match on No. 1 Court this afternoon, with Daniil Medvedev facing Marin Cilic. Medvedev has endured a difficult run of form at the Grand Slams of late, with the former world No. 1 losing in the 1st round at 4 of the last 5 majors. The 30-year-old is a 2-time Wimbledon semifinalist, and will hope that a victory over Cilic today can be the catalyst for another deep run here this year. Cilic, who finished runner-up to Federer here in 2017, put in another strong Wimbledon performance in 2025, reaching the last 16 after struggling with injuries for much of the previous 2 years – and, at the age of 37, the Croatian will hope for another strong result this fortnight. But Medvedev might have the psychological edge when it comes to matches between the pair – he recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets when they contested a 3rd round match here in 2021 and also won their most-recent encounter, on grass at 's-Hertogenbosch earlier this month.

A 5th meeting for Sinner and Kecmanovic – and their 2nd at a Grand Slam. Their only previous meeting at the Grand Slams came in the 3rd round here in 2024, with Sinner dropping just 7 games in a straight-sets victory.

- Defending champion **SINNER** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 5th consecutive year. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner is bidding to record his 94th Grand Slam match-win and equal Nicola Pietrangeli's **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles matches won by an Italian player**.
- Sinner has **lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam on 4 occasions** – including once at Wimbledon, on his debut here in 2021 (l. Marton Fucsovics). He also lost in the 1st round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2019 US Open (l. Stan Wawrinka), and at both the 2020 US Open (l. Karen Khachanov) and the 2021 Australian Open (l. Denis Shapovalov).
- Sinner is bidding to avoid becoming the **3rd defending men's singles champion to lose in the 1st round at Wimbledon** – after 1966 champion Manuel Santana, who lost to Charlie Pasarell in the 1st round in 1967, and 2002 champion Lleyton Hewitt, who lost to Ivo Karlovic in the 1st round in 2003.
- Last year here, Sinner won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating 2-time defending champion Carlos Alcaraz in the final. He became the first Italian player, man or woman, to win a Wimbledon singles title. By reaching his first Wimbledon final, he also became the 11th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. Alcaraz then became the 12th player to achieve the feat by reaching his first Australian Open final this year.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **10th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title** – after Rod Laver, John Newcombe, Bjorn Borg, John McEnroe, Boris Becker, Pete Sampras, Roger Federer, Novak Djokovic and Alcaraz.
- Sinner is a **4-time Grand Slam champion**. In addition to his title here last year, he also won the titles at the Australian Open in 2024 (d. Daniil Medvedev) and 2025 (d. Alexander Zverev) and at the 2024 US Open (d. Taylor Fritz).
- By winning his 3rd Grand Slam title at the 2025 Australian Open, Sinner claimed sole ownership of the record for **most Grand Slam singles titles won by an Italian player** – moving ahead of 2-time Grand Slam champion Pietrangeli, who won the men's singles title at Roland Garros in 1959 and 1960.
- In Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Djokovic) and the 2nd round at Roland Garros, defeating Clement Tabur before falling to Juan Manuel Cerundolo in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was his earliest Grand Slam exit since falling to Daniel Altmaier in the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros.

- Sinner **leads the Tour for most singles titles won in 2026**. He has won the titles at all 5 Masters-1000 events this season – at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Daniil Medvedev), Miami-1000 (d. Jiri Lehecka), Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Alcaraz), Madrid-1000 (d. Alexander Zverev) and Rome-1000 (d. Casper Ruud). By winning the title at Rome-1000 he became the 2nd player to complete the set of Masters-1000 titles, after Djokovic.
- Sinner has **lost 3 matches in 2026** – in addition to his defeats at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also fell in the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Jakub Mensik).
- Sinner has **won 2 Tour-level titles on grass**. In addition to his Wimbledon title last year, he won the title at 2024 Halle (d. Hubert Hurkacz). He is one of 4 Italian men to have won a Tour-level title on grass in the Open Era – alongside Berrettini (4 grass court titles), and Andreas Seppi and Lorenzo Sonego (both one). He is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Sinner has won one of the last 9 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only victory in a 5-set match in that time coming against Medvedev in the final at the 2024 Australian Open. He has lost both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon – in the quarterfinals in both 2022, when he lost to Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead, and in 2024 when he fell to Medvedev. He has a 6-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Sinner became **world No. 1** for the first time following 2024 Roland Garros and begins his 78th week as world No. 1 today. He will remain world No. 1 following Wimbledon regardless of results at this tournament.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to Davis Cup title in 2023 and 2024**. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 15-4 overall win-loss record in the competition but did not compete in Davis Cup in 2025 as Italy won their 3rd consecutive title. As hosts, Italy have received a wild card to the 2026 Davis Cup Final 8 in Bologna in November.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.
- **KECMANOVIC** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 6th time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 30th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Last year here, Kecmanovic equalled his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the 3rd round. He defeated Alex Michelsen and Jesper de Jong before falling to Novak Djokovic. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2022 (l. Djokovic) and 2024 (l. Sinner).
- Kecmanovic's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open on 2 occasions – in 2022 (l. Gael Monfils) and 2024 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Kecmanovic reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Fabian Marozsan, l. Nuno Borges) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry).
- Kecmanovic's **best results in 2026** are reaching the semifinals at Acapulco (l. Flavio Cobolli) and the quarterfinals at Dallas (l. Ben Shelton).
- Kecmanovic has contested 2 events at Challenger-level this year, winning his **3rd Challenger-level title** at the Valencia Challenger (ESP) (d. Daniel Vallejo) and reaching the quarterfinals at the Cap Cana Challenger (DOM) (l. Adam Walton).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Kecmanovic reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca, where he defeated Antoine Ghibaud and Lorenzo Sonego before falling to Fabian Marozsan. He fell in the 1st round at Halle (l. Marozsan).
- Kecmanovic is bidding to **defeat a world No. 1 for the first time**. He has lost all 4 matches he has contested against No. 1-ranked players, including his only previous match against a world No. 1 at a Grand Slam, when he fell to Sinner in the 3rd round here in 2024. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 4 Alexander Zverev in the 2nd round at Acapulco this year.

- Kecmanovic is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all 7 matches he has contested against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams – including all 4 matches he has contested against Top 10 players at Wimbledon. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 14 Tommy Paul in the 3rd round at the 2024 Australian Open and the highest-ranked player he has defeated at Wimbledon is No. 27 Tallon Griekspoor in the 2nd round in 2024.
- Kecmanovic has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – including his 5-set victory against Michelsen in the 1st round here last year. He also defeated Griekspoor in 5 sets in the 2nd round here in 2024 but fell to Roberto Bautista Agut in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2021. He has a 9-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Kecmanovic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 27 in January 2023. He plays here at No. 50.
- Kecmanovic is a **former junior world No. 1**. He became the first player to win back-to-back titles at the Orange Bowl since Billy Martin in 1973-74, winning the title in both 2015 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and 2016 (d. Wu Yibing). He also reached the final at the 2016 US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and was named ITF Junior World Champion that year. His best performance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon was reaching the 3rd round in 2016 (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux).
- Kecmanovic made his **Davis Cup** debut for Serbia at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals, has a 10-8 overall win-loss record in the competition and was a member of the Serbian team which reached the semifinals in 2023, falling to Italy. Serbia will play at home against Lithuania in a 2026 World Group I tie in September.
- Kecmanovic is coached by Viktor Troicki, who reached the round of 16 here in 2012 and 2015.

NO. 3 FELIX AUGER-ALIASSIME (CAN) v ALEXANDER SHEVCHENKO (KAZ)

Head-to-head: Auger-Aliassime leads 1-0

A 2nd meeting for Auger-Aliassime and Shevchenko – but their first at a Grand Slam or on grass. The pair were both born in 2000 (Auger-Aliassime in August, Shevchenko in November) but never played a match at junior-level.

Auger-Aliassime has lost matches to players ranked as low as No. 99 Shevchenko on 2 of his last 3 Wimbledon appearances – he fell to No. 119 Michael Mmoh in the 1st round here in 2023 and fell to No. 125 Jan-Lennard Struff in the 2nd round here last year. He also fell to No. 93 Thanasi Kokkinakis in the 1st round here in 2024.

- **AUGER-ALIASSIME** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam overall.
- Auger-Aliassime has **lost in the 1st round at Wimbledon on 3 occasions** – in 2022 (l. Maxime Cressy), 2023 (l. Michael Mmoh) and 2024 (l. Thanasi Kokkinakis). He has lost in the 1st round at the Grand Slams on 13 occasions in total.
- **Last year here**, Auger-Aliassime reached the 2nd round, defeating James Duckworth for his first Wimbledon match-win since 2021 before falling to Jan-Lennard Struff.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2021, when he defeated Thiago Monteiro, Mikael Ymer, Nick Kyrgios and Alexander Zverev before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions – at the US Open in both 2021 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and 2025 (l. Jannik Sinner). By reaching the semifinals in 2021 he became the first Canadian man to reach the semifinals at the US Open, and the first man born in the 2000s to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Auger-Aliassime reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Flavio Cobolli) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open, retiring due to a left thigh injury against Nuno Borges.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Auger-Aliassime reached the quarterfinals at both 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Kamil Majchrzak) and Halle (l. Frances Tiafoe).
- Auger-Aliassime's best result in 2026 is winning his **9th Tour-level title** at Montpellier (d. Adrian Mannarino). His other highlights this season are finishing runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Alex de Minaur), reaching the semifinals at Dubai (l. Daniil Medvedev) and reaching the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Sinner).
- Auger-Aliassime has **reached 2 Tour-level finals on grass** – finishing runner-up at Stuttgart in both 2019 (l. Berrettini) and 2021 (l. Marin Cilic).
- Auger-Aliassime has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He recorded 5-set victories against Zverev in the round of 16 in 2021 and Duckworth in the 1st round last year, but fell to Kokkinakis in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2024. He has an 8-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Auger-Aliassime broke the Top 5 for the first time in November last year and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 4 earlier this month. He plays here at the same ranking.

- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He reached the quarterfinals in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur) and reached the final in the boys' doubles with Denis Shapovalov that year losing to Kenneth Raisma/Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final. He was also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.
- Auger-Aliassime **led Canada to the Davis Cup title in 2022**, defeating Australia in the final. He won 8 of the 9 matches he contested in the competition that year. He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 13-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada will play at home against France in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang.
- **SHEVCHENKO** is bidding to record his first Wimbledon match-win and reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam for the 6th time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam overall.
- Shevchenko has **lost in the 1st round on his 3 previous Wimbledon appearances** – in 2023 (l. Adrian Mannarino), 2024 (l. Ugo Humbert) and 2025 (l. Reilly Opelka).
- Shevchenko's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round on 5 occasions – including at the Australian Open this year, when he defeated Elias Ymer before falling to Learner Tien. He also reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros in 2023 (d. Oscar Otte, l. Lorenzo Musetti), 2024 (d. Aslan Karatsev, l. Corentin Moutet) and as a lucky loser in 2025 (d. Dusan Lajovic, l. Ethan Quinn), and at the 2024 US Open, where he defeated Dominik Koepfer before retiring against Frances Tiafoe.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Shevchenko fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Alex Michelsen).
- Shevchenko's **best Tour-level results in 2026** are reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Adelaide (l. Humbert) and the 3rd round as a direct acceptance at Miami-1000 (l. Humbert).
- Shevchenko has **contested 7 Challenger-level events in 2026**. His best results are finishing runner-up at the at the Bratislava 1 Challenger (SVK) (l. Taro Daniel) and reaching the quarterfinals at the Pau Challenger (FRA) (l. Henri Squire).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Shevchenko attempted to qualify at Mallorca but fell to Abedallah Shelbayh in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Shevchenko is bidding to record his **2nd match-win on grass, at any level**. He recorded his only previous match-win on grass in a 2nd round finish at 2024 Mallorca (d. Constant Lestienne, l. Alejandro Tabilo).
- Shevchenko is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time**. He has lost all 6 matches he has contested against Top 5 players, including his only previous match against a Top 5 player at the Grand Slams – when he fell to No. 3 Carlos Alcaraz in the 1st round at the 2025 Australian Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 7 Holger Rune in the 2nd round at 2024 Rotterdam and the highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 82 Karatsev in the 1st round at 2024 Roland Garros.
- Shevchenko has **won one of the last 7 matches he has contested against Top 10 players**. Since defeating Rune at 2024 Rotterdam, he lost 6 consecutive matches against Top 10 players before defeating No. 9 Ben Shelton in the 2nd round at Miami-1000 this year.
- Shevchenko has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested. He defeated Karatsev in 5 sets in the 1st round at 2024 Roland Garros, but lost 5-set matches to Humbert in the 1st round at 2024 Wimbledon and to Quinn in the 2nd round at Roland Garros last year.
- Shevchenko reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 45 in February 2024. He plays here at No. 99.
- Shevchenko made his **Davis Cup** debut for Kazakhstan in 2024 and has a 3-3 overall win-loss record in the competition. Kazakhstan will play at home against Thailand in a World Group II tie in September.
- Shevchenko is coached by Andelo Novkovic.

NO. 7 NOVAK DJOKOVIC (SRB) v WU YIBING (CHN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Djokovic has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 102 Wu once before – to No. 117 Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Djokovic at Wimbledon is No. 75 Marat Safin in the 2nd round in 2008.

- Seven-time Wimbledon champion **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here.
- Djokovic has lost in the **1st round at a Grand Slam on 2 occasions** – at the Australian Open in 2005 (l. Marat Safin) and 2006 (l. Paul Goldstein).
- Djokovic is making his 21st Wimbledon appearance, claiming sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances**, ahead of Jimmy Connors. Roger Federer, who competed in the men's singles here on 22 occasions, is the only player to have made more Wimbledon men's singles appearances than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is making his 83rd Grand Slam appearance overall, extending his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances**. He equalled the previous record, held by Federer and Feliciano Lopez, by making his 81st Grand Slam appearance at the Australian Open this year before claiming sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros.
- At 39 years 51 days, Djokovic is the **2nd-oldest man to begin the men's singles main draw here this year** – after Stan Wawrinka (41 years 106 days). He is bidding to become the 11th man in the Open Era to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon aged 39 or older. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- **Last year here**, Djokovic reached the semifinals, falling to Jannik Sinner in straight sets. It was the first time that he had failed to reach the final here since 2017, when he retired due to an elbow injury in the quarterfinals against Tomas Berdych. He won 4 consecutive titles here in 2018-22*, before finishing runner-up here in 2023-24. (*NB no tournament in 2020)
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **8th Wimbledon title** and equal Federer's all-time record for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles. He is also bidding to equal Federer and Helen Wills Moody in 2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon singles titles won among men and women, behind 9-time Wimbledon champion Martina Navratilova.
- Djokovic has contested **10 Wimbledon finals**. His 7 titles came in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer), 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini) and 2022 (d. Nick Kyrgios). He also finished runner-up in 2013 (l. Andy Murray), 2023 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and 2024 (l. Alcaraz).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **25th Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women. His most-recent Grand Slam title-victories came in 2023 – he equalled Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles at the 2023 Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas), claimed sole ownership of the record at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and equalled Margaret Court's all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles among men and women at the 2023 US Open (d. Daniil Medvedev).
- Djokovic reached his **38th Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, falling to Alcaraz in 4 sets. At 38 years 255 days, he became the 2nd player, man or woman, in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam singles final aged 38 or

older – after Ken Rosewall, who finished runner-up at 1974 Wimbledon aged 39 years 246 days and at the 1974 US Open aged 39 years 310 days. The oldest player to reach a Grand Slam women's singles final in the Open Era is Serena Williams, who finished runner-up at the 2019 US Open aged 37 years 346 days.

- At 39 years 51 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest player in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam men's singles title**. Rosewall, who won the title at the 1972 Australian Open aged 37 years 62 days, is the only man in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title aged 37 or older. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35**. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his 405th Grand Slam match-win and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles matches won, among men and women**. By defeating Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at 2024 Roland Garros for his 370th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **103rd Wimbledon match-win**. He is in 3rd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon singles matches won, among men and women. Navratilova (120 Wimbledon match-wins) and Federer (105) are first and 2nd on the list, respectively.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, falling to Joao Fonseca in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was the 2nd time he had lost a match from 2-0 up, after his defeat to Jurgen Melzer in the quarterfinals at 2010 Roland Garros. It was also his joint-earliest defeat at a Grand Slam since falling to Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open – he also fell in the 3rd round at the 2024 US Open (l. Alexei Popyrin).
- Djokovic is contesting his **5th event of the 2026 season here**. In addition to his appearances at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also competed at Indian Wells-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Kamil Majchrzak and Aleksandar Kovacevic before falling to Jack Draper in the round of 16, and at Rome-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round before falling to Dino Prizmic in the 2nd round.
- Djokovic is **one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass**, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles who has not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **102nd Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the all-time list for most Tour-level men's singles titles won – behind Connors (109 titles) and Federer (103).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **9th Tour-level title on grass**. In addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils).
- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the 2023 final. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-10) and has a 41-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked at No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended in June 2024, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He plays here at No. 7.
- Djokovic became the **5th player to complete the career 'Golden Slam' in singles** by winning Olympic singles gold for Serbia at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event, defeating Alcaraz in the final. He joined Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams as the only players to have achieved the feat. He also won Olympic singles bronze at Beijing 2008 and is the only player to have won a medal for Serbia in the Olympic Tennis Event.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 46-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia play at home against Lithuania in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.

- **WU** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Wu made his **Wimbledon debut** in 2023, falling to Frances Tiafoe in the 1st round. He became the 2nd Chinese man to compete at Wimbledon in the Open Era, after Zhang Zhizhen, who made his debut here in 2021. He has not competed here, in the main draw or qualifying, since his debut in 2023 – he missed the event due to injury in 2024 and was not ranked high enough to enter qualifying here last year.
- Wu's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2022 US Open. He defeated Nikoloz Basilashvili and Nuno Borges before falling to No. 1 seed Daniil Medvedev. He became the first Chinese man in history to reach the 3rd round at the US Open.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Wu reached the 2nd round as a qualifier at the Australian Open (d. Luca Nardi, l. Eliot Spizzirri) and as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros (d. Marcos Giron, l. Flavio Cobolli). His appearance at the Australian Open was his first appearance in the main draw at a Grand Slam since he reached the 2nd round at the 2023 US Open (d. Dusan Lajovic, l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Wu fell in the 1st round at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Thijs Boogaard). He also fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Eastbourne (l. Jan Choinski) and reached the 2nd round at the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR) (d. Rei Sakamoto, l. Remy Bertola). His appearance at 's-Hertogenbosch was his first appearance on grass, at any level, since competing in the main draw here in 2023.
- Wu is bidding to record his **2nd Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous Tour-level win on grass came in a 2nd round finish at 2023 Stuttgart (d. Nick Kyrgios, l. Marton Fucsovics) in his first event on grass as a professional. His only other match-win on grass at any professional level came in his 2nd round finish at the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR) earlier this month.
- Wu's **best Tour-level result in 2026** is reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Acapulco, where he defeated Casper Ruud and Sho Shimabukuro before falling to Flavio Cobolli.
- Wu is bidding to record his **7th Tour-level match-win of 2026**. In addition to his 2 victories at Acapulco, he also recorded Tour-level match-wins in 2nd round finishes at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and as a wild card at Hong Kong (d. Fabian Marozsan, l. Andrey Rublev), and defeated Nuno Borges in China, P.R.'s Davis Cup World Group I Play-off tie against Portugal.
- Wu has contested 3 events at Challenger-level this season. His best result is winning his **7th Challenger-level title** at the Sarasota Challenger (USA) (d. Stefan Dostanic). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Aix En Provence Challenger (FRA) (l. Ethan Quinn) but fell in the 2nd round at the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR).
- Wu is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost both matches he has played against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams – against No. 1 Daniil Medvedev in the 3rd round at the 2022 US Open and No. 10 Tiafoe in the 1st round here in 2023. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 35 Nikoloz Basilashvili in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open.
- Wu is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-5 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level, with his only victory coming against No. 8 Taylor Fritz in the semifinals at 2023 Dallas.
- Wu has won 3 of the 5 **five-set matches** he has contested. He recorded 5-set victories against Jason Jung in a 2017 Davis Cup Asia/Oceania Group I tie, against Borges in the 2nd round at the 2022 US Open and against Dusan Lajovic in the 1st round at the 2023 US Open. He has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- Wu has won **one Tour-level title** – at 2023 Dallas (d. John Isner). He became the first Chinese man to win a Tour-level title or reach a Tour-level final. Shang Juncheng since became the 2nd Chinese man to win a Tour-level title when he won the title 2024 Chengdu.
- Wu broke the Top 100 for the first time in January 2023 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 54 in May 2023. He fell as low as No. 584 in July 2024 while not competing due to injury and broke back inside the Top 100 for the first time since October 2023 in April this year. He plays here at No. 102.
- Wu was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles and doubles titles at the 2017 US Open, defeating Axel Geller in the singles final, and became junior world No. 1 as a result. He also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Yshai Oliel). His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the quarterfinals in 2017 (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina).

- Wu made his **Davis Cup** debut for China, P.R. in 2017 and has a 4-2 win-loss record in the competition. China, P.R. will play away against Norway in a World Group I tie in September.
- Wu is coached by Dante Bottini.

A 6th meeting for Medvedev and Cilic, their 3rd at a Grand Slam and their 2nd at Wimbledon. Medvedev won their previous meeting here by recording his first win from 0-2 down when they met in the 3rd round in 2021. Cilic won their other meeting at a Grand Slam, defeating Medvedev in straight sets in the round of 16 at 2022 Roland Garros.

This is the pair's 3rd meeting on grass. Medvedev won both of their previous meetings on grass, having defeated Cilic in the quarterfinals at 's-Hertogenbosch earlier this month in addition to his victory here in 2021.

Medvedev and Cilic are 2 of the 6 Grand Slam champions appearing in the men's main draw here this year. Both men's sole Grand Slam title to date came at the US Open – in 2021 and 2014, respectively.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 7th time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 37th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Medvedev has **lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam on 11 occasions** – including on 4 of his last 5 Grand Slam appearances. In 2025, he fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (I. Cameron Norrie), Wimbledon (I. Benjamin Bonzi) and the US Open (I. Bonzi). He also fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year (I. Adam Walton).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Medvedev reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open. He defeated Jesper de Jong, Quentin Halys and Fabian Marozsan before falling to Learner Tien.
- Medvedev's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the semifinals in 2023 and 2024, falling to Carlos Alcaraz on both occasions.
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in straight sets and ending both Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak.
- Medvedev has reached **6 Grand Slam finals**. In addition to his title at the 2021 US Open, he also finished runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (I. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (I. Djokovic) and at the Australian Open in 2021 (I. Djokovic), 2022 (I. Nadal) and 2024 (I. Jannik Sinner).
- If Medvedev wins his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 18th Grand Slam appearance after winning his first, he will claim the **Open Era record for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title**. The record is currently held by Marat Safin, who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2000 US Open and won his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 14th attempt at the 2005 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Medvedev reached the semifinals at 's-Hertogenbosch (I. Kamil Majchrzak) and the quarterfinals at Halle (I. Daniel Altmaier).

- Medvedev's best results in 2026 are winning his **22nd and 23rd Tour-level titles** – at Brisbane (d. Brandon Nakashima) and Dubai, where Tallon Griekspoor gave a walkover in the final due to a left hamstring injury. By winning his 2nd title at Dubai, he ended a streak of 22 titles won at different events.
- Medvedev's **other Tour-level highlights in 2026** are finishing runner-up at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Sinner) and reaching the semifinals at Rome-1000 (l. Sinner).
- Medvedev has **won one Tour-level grass court title** – at 2021 Mallorca (d. Sam Querrey).
- Medvedev has won 3 of the 7 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, including his win against Cilic in the 3rd round here in 2021. He has a 10-14 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (Djokovic, Nadal, Roger Federer and Andy Murray) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 9.
- Medvedev reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, l. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Thomas Johansson, who reached the semifinals here in 2005, and Rohan Goetzke.
- **CILIC** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 13th time. This is his 16th Wimbledon appearance and his 65th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Cilic reached the round of 16. He defeated Raphael Collignon, Jack Draper and Jaume Munar for his first Grand Slam match-wins since 2022 before falling to Flavio Cobolli. It was his first Wimbledon appearance since 2021 – he withdrew from the 2022 tournament due to illness and underwent knee surgery in January 2023 which saw him miss the event here in 2023 and 2024.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Cilic reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where he defeated Daniel Altmaier and Denis Shapovalov before falling to Casper Ruud, but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Moise Kouame).
- Cilic is a **former Wimbledon runner-up**. He reached the final here in 2017, falling to Roger Federer in straight sets. By reaching the final, he became just the 2nd Croatian player – man or woman – to reach multiple Grand Slam finals after Goran Ivanisevic.
- Cilic **won his only Grand Slam title to date** at the 2014 US Open, defeating Kei Nishikori in the final. He was the first Croatian to win a Grand Slam title since Ivanisevic at 2001 Wimbledon. He also finished runner-up at the 2018 Australian Open (l. Federer).
- Cilic **missed 8 of the 12 Grand Slam tournaments in 2023-25** due to a knee injury for which he underwent surgery in January 2023. He contested just 14 events at any level between January 2023 and February 2025.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Cilic reached the quarterfinals at 's-Hertogenbosch, where he defeated Shapovalov and Nuno Borges before falling to Medvedev, but fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Ugo Humbert).
- Cilic's **best result in 2026** is reaching the semifinals at Dallas (l. Taylor Fritz). He also reached the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Cilic has won **3 Tour-level titles on grass** – at Queen's in 2012 (d. David Nalbandian) and 2018 (d. Novak Djokovic) and at 2021 Stuttgart (d. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Cilic is bidding to end a **6-match losing streak against Top 10 players**. He has lost all 6 matches he has played against Top 10 players since defeating No. 4 Jack Draper in the 2nd round here last year. He has a 3-6 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Wimbledon, a 15-30 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams and a 39-104 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Having won 34 five-set matches at Tour-level, Cilic is in **4th place on the Open Era list for most 5-set matches won at Tour-level**. (see table overleaf)

- Cilic is in 4th place on the all-time list for **most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams**. He has a 6-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon, a 28-15 win-loss record in 5-set matches at the Grand Slams and a 34-20 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Cilic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in January 2018 following his runner-up finish at the Australian Open. He dropped out of the rankings in January 2024 and re-entered the Top 200 in November that year and re-entered the Top 100 after winning the title at the Nottingham 2 Challenger in June last year. He plays here at No. 62.
- Cilic reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at 2005 Wimbledon (l. Robin Haase). He finished the year as **junior world No. 2** behind Donald Young after winning the boys' singles at Roland Garros (d. Antal van der Duim) and also reaching the quarterfinals at the Australian Open and the US Open.
- Cilic became a **Davis Cup** champion after leading Croatia to the title in 2018. He won 6 of the 7 matches he contested during 2018 and defeated Lucas Pouille in the 4th match of the final to seal Croatia's 2nd Davis Cup title. He was also a member of the Croatian team which finished as runners-up to Russian Tennis Federation in 2021. He has a 43-25 win-loss record in the competition and holds the record for most Davis Cup match-wins by a player representing Croatia. Croatia will play away against Germany in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Cilic is coached by Vilim Visak.

A 5th meeting between Ruud and Hurkacz but a first on grass. Ruud won their only previous meeting at a Grand Slam, their first meeting, in the round of 16 at 2022 Roland Garros.

Ruud has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 96 Hurkacz on 5 occasions – including twice at Wimbledon. He fell to No. 112 Ugo Humbert in the 2nd round in 2022 and to No. 142 Liam Broady in the 2nd round in 2023. He also fell to No. 98 Egor Gerasimov in the 1st round at the 2020 Australian Open, to No. 117 Botić van de Zandschulp in the 2nd round at the 2021 US Open and to No. 107 Raphael Collignon in the 2nd round at the 2025 US Open.

Both Ruud and Hurkacz missed Wimbledon in 2025, Ruud withdrawing due to a knee injury and Hurkacz withdrawing due to a lower back injury. They both reached the 2nd round on their most recent appearances here in 2024.

- **RUUD** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 30th Grand Slam overall.
- Ruud's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 2nd round on 3 occasions – in 2022 (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, l. Ugo Humbert), 2023 (d. Laurent Lokoli, l. Liam Broady) and 2024 (d. Alex Bolt, l. Fabio Fognini). He lost in the 1st round on his 2 other appearances in the main draw here – in 2019 (l. John Isner) and 2021 (l. Jordan Thompson). He withdrew from Wimbledon last year due to a knee injury.
- Ruud is **3-time Grand Slam finalist**, finishing as runner-up at 2022 Roland Garros (l. Rafael Nadal), the 2022 US Open (l. Carlos Alcaraz), and 2023 Roland Garros (l. Novak Djokovic). He is the only Norwegian player in history to have contested a Grand Slam singles final at professional level.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Ruud reached the round of 16 at both the Australian Open (l. Ben Shelton) and Roland Garros (l. Joao Fonseca).
- Ruud's **best result in 2026** is reaching his 4th Masters-1000 final at Rome-1000, falling to Jannik Sinner in the final. He also reached the semifinals at Geneva (l. Mariano Navone) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Alexander Blockx) and Delray Beach (l. Sebastian Korda).
- Ruud is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win on grass** in his 13th Tour-level match on the surface. His only previous match-wins on grass came in a quarterfinal finish at 2021 Mallorca, when he defeated Gilles Simon and Tennys Sandgren before falling to Daniil Medvedev in the quarterfinals, and in his 2nd round finishes at Wimbledon in 2022-24. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Ruud has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Thompson in the 1st round in 2021 and against Broady in the 2nd round in 2023. He has a 12-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall and has won 6 of the last 7 five-set matches he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming against Raphael Collignon in the 2nd round at the 2025 US Open.

- Ruud reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after his runner-up finish at the 2022 US Open. He plays here at No. 12.
- Ruud is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the top of the boys' world rankings in January 2016, becoming the first Norwegian player to reach the No. 1 ranking. His best result as a junior was winning the title at the Grade A Osaka Mayor's Cup in 2015 (d. Mate Valkusz). He reached the 2nd round of the boys' singles here in 2015 (d. Jumpei Yamasaki, l. Alvaro Lopez San Martin) but fell in the 1st round of the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Ulises Blanch).
- Ruud has played **Davis Cup** for Norway since 2015 and has a 25-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. Norway will play at home against China, P.R. in a World Group I tie in September.
- Ruud is coached by his father, Christian Ruud, who lost in the 1st round on all 5 of his Wimbledon appearances in 1995-97, 1999 and 2000.
- **HURKACZ** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 5th time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 31st Grand Slam overall.
- Hurkacz **did not compete at Wimbledon in 2025**, withdrawing ahead of the tournament with a lower back injury. On his most recent appearance in 2024 he reached the 2nd round, defeating Radu Albot before retiring with a right knee injury in the 4th set against Arthur Fils. He has lost in the 1st round here twice before – as a lucky loser on his debut here in 2018 (l. Bernard Tomic) and as No. 7 seed in 2022 (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina).
- Hurkacz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021, when he defeated Roger Federer in the quarterfinals before falling to Matteo Berrettini in the last 4. He became the 2nd Polish man in history to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam after Jerzy Janowicz, who reached the semifinals at 2013 Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Hurkacz reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Zizou Bergs, l. Ethan Quinn) and Roland Garros (d. Jaume Munar, l. Frances Tiafoe).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Hurkacz reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Andrey Rublev, l. Daniel Altmaier) but fell in the 1st round at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Marton Fucsovics).
- Hurkacz's **best Tour-level result in 2026** is reaching the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000, where he defeated Luciano Darderi and Fabian Marozsan before falling to Valentin Vacherot. It is the only occasion he has won back-to-back matches at an individual event this season. He has fallen in the 1st or 2nd round at the 11 other Tour-level tournaments he has contested in 2026. He was also a member of the Polish team that won the United Cup title this year, winning 4 of the 5 singles matches he contested at the event.
- Hurkacz has also contested **2 Challenger-level events in 2026**. He finished runner-up as a wild card at the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Matteo Arnaldi) but lost his opening match at the Cap Cana Challenger (DOM) (l. Mattia Bellucci). They were his first appearances at Challenger-level since reaching the semifinals as a wild card at the 2019 Poznan Challenger (POL).
- Hurkacz has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2022 Halle (d. Daniil Medvedev), where he became the first Polish man in the Open Era to win a Tour-level title on grass. He is one of 27 players competing here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Hurkacz is bidding to defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 5th time. He has a 4-9 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, with 3 of his victories coming at Wimbledon – against No. 2 Medvedev in the round of 16 and No. 8 Federer in the quarterfinals in 2021, and against No. 16 Lorenzo Musetti in the 3rd round in 2023. He has a 34-69 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz has won one of the **2 five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Medvedev in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2021 but fell to Davidovich Fokina in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2022. He has a 9-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz is a **former Top 10 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 6 in August 2024. He dropped outside the Top 100 for the first time since August 2018 on 15 June before returning to the Top 100 last week. He plays here at No. 96.
- Hurkacz made his **Davis Cup** debut for Poland in 2016 and has an 11-9 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will play away against Australia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Hurkacz is coached by Gilles Cervara and Matt Terczynski.

NO. 12 ANDREY RUBLEV v (Q) ROMAN SAFIULLIN

Head-to-head: first meeting

A first professional meeting for Rublev and Safiullin. The pair, both 28, were contemporaries at junior-level and contested one match as juniors – in the final at the 2014 Trofeo Bonfiglio in Milan, Italy, with Safiullin recording a 62-63 victory.

Rublev has won 7 of the 8 matches he has contested against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, including both of his previous matches against qualifiers at Wimbledon – against Stefano Travaglia in the 1st round in 2017 and against Adrian Mannarino in the 3rd round last year. His only defeat to a qualifier at a Grand Slam came against Joao Fonseca in the 1st round at the 2025 Australian Open. He has a 46-13 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

Rublev has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 132 Safiullin. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Rublev at a Grand Slam is No. 122 Francisco Comesana in the 1st round here in 2024.

- **RUBLEV** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 6th time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 35th Grand Slam overall.
- Rublev has **lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam on 7 occasions** – including once at Wimbledon. He fell to Francesco Comesana in the 1st round here in 2024.
- **Last year here**, Rublev reached the round of 16. He defeated Laslo Djere, Lloyd Harris and Adrian Mannarino before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- Rublev's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2023 (l. Novak Djokovic), completing the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Rublev's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 10 occasions. In addition to his quarterfinal finish here in 2023, he has also reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Daniil Medvedev), 2023 (l. Djokovic) and 2024 (l. Jannik Sinner), at Roland Garros in 2020 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and 2022 (l. Marin Cilic) and at the US Open in 2017 (l. Rafael Nadal), 2020 (l. Medvedev), 2022 (l. Frances Tiafoe), and 2023 (l. Medvedev). Of the 51 men in the Open Era to have reached 10 or more Grand Slam quarterfinals, he is the only one to have never reached a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Rublev reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Jakub Mensik) and the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Francisco Cerundolo).
- Rublev's **best result in 2026** is finishing runner-up at Barcelona (l. Arthur Fils). He also reached the semifinals at Hong Kong (l. Lorenzo Musetti), Doha (l. Alcaraz) and Dubai (l. Tallon Griekspoor) and the quarterfinals at Rome-1000 (l. Sinner).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Rublev competed at Halle but fell to Hubert Hurkacz in the 1st round.
- Rublev has **reached 2 Tour-level finals on grass** – finishing runner-up at Halle in both 2021 (l. Ugo Humbert) and 2023 (l. Alexander Bublik).

- Rublev has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He recorded 5-set victories against Travaglia in the 1st round in 2017 and Alexander Bublik in the round of 16 in 2023, but lost 5-set matches to both Albert Ramos-Vinolas in the 2nd round in 2017 and Marton Fucsovics in the round of 16 in 2021. He has an 11-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Rublev reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in September 2021. He plays here at No. 13.
- Rublev is a **former junior world No. 1** having topped the boys' rankings for the first time in June 2014 after winning the boys' singles title at 2014 Roland Garros (d. Jaume Munar). He also won two medals at the Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing, China, P.R. later that year, winning boys' singles bronze and boys' doubles silver with Khachanov. He was named 2014 ITF Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Tim van Rijthoven).
- Rublev **won Olympic gold in mixed doubles** alongside Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova at Tokyo 2020, with the pair defeating Aslan Karatsev/Elena Vesnina in the final. Along with Khachanov, who won men's singles silver, he became the first tennis player to win medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games. He did not compete at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event.
- Rublev is coached by Fernando Vicente and Marat Safin, who reached the semifinals here in 2008.
- Qualifier **SAFIULLIN** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 16th Grand Slam overall.
- As No. 15 seed, Safiullin defeated James McCabe (AUS) 63 76(4), Kimmer Coppejans (BEL) 76(2) 75 and Jerome Kym (SUI) 46 76(2) 36 76(6) 64 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was his 2nd appearance in qualifying here – he reached the 2nd round of qualifying in 2021 (d. Ivo Karlovic, l. Federico Gaio). It is the 4th time he has successfully qualified on his 9th appearance in the qualifying draw at a Grand Slam.
- **Last year here**, Safiullin fell to Luciano Darderi in 5 sets in the 1st round. He has a 2-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches in the main draw here and a 3-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Safiullin's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on his Wimbledon debut in 2023. He defeated Roberto Bautista Agut, Corentin Moutet, Guido Pella and Denis Shapovalov before falling to Jannik Sinner. Ranked No. 92, he became the lowest-ranked man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since No. 144 Nick Kyrgios in 2014.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Safiullin qualified for the main draw at Roland Garros before falling to Casper Ruud in 5 sets in the 1st round. He did not compete at the Australian Open due to an injury which saw him miss 6 months on Tour between September 2025 and February 2026.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Safiullin fell in the 1st round as a lucky loser at Stuttgart (l. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (l. Zhang Zhizhen).
- Safiullin is bidding to record his **first Tour-level match-win in 2026**. His only 2 appearances in the main draw at Tour-level events this season have come at Roland Garros and Stuttgart. His last Tour-level match-win came in a 2nd round finish at the 2025 US Open (d. Gael Monfils, l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) – the final event he contested last season.
- Safiullin has **competed mainly at Challenger-level since making his comeback from injury in February**. He won back-to-back Challenger titles as a qualifier at Oeiras 3 (POR) (d. Valentin Royer) and as a direct acceptance at Mauthausen (AUT) (d. Jaime Faria) in April-May. They were the 7th and 8th Challenger-level titles of his career. He also reached the semifinals at the Montemar Challenger (ESP) (l. Pablo Llamas Ruiz) in March.
- Safiullin is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all 5 matches he has contested against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, including his only match against a Top 20 player at Wimbledon – against No. 8 Sinner in the quarterfinals in 2023. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 23 Bautista Agut in the 1st round here in 2023.
- Safiullin is bidding to end a **7-match Tour-level losing streak against Top 20 players**. He has not defeated a Top 20 player since defeating No. 17 Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round at 2024 Shanghai-1000. He has an 8-25 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Safiullin reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 36 in January 2024. He dropped outside the Top 200 for the first time since February 2020 in March this year, but re-entered in April and plays here at No. 132.

- Safiullin was a **successful junior**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in May 2014 and won the boys' singles title at the 2015 Australian Open (d. Hong Seong-chan). He never contested the boys' singles here.
- Safiullin is coached by Karl Adrian Ringdal Noerstenaes.

- Darderi recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year. He defeated Cristian Garin, Sebastian Baez and Karen Khachanov before falling to Jannik Sinner.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Darderi reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Sebastian Ofner, l. Francisco Comesana).
- Darderi's best result in 2026 is winning his **5th Tour-level title** at Santiago (d. Yannick Hanfmann). He also finished runner-up at Buenos Aires (l. Francisco Cerundolo), reached the semifinals at Marrakech (l. Marco Trungelliti) and Rome-1000 (l. Casper Ruud) and reached the quarterfinals at Auckland (l. Marcos Giron) and Hamburg (l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Darderi reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca. He received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Hanfmann in the 2nd round before falling to Nuno Borges.

- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon debut, Quinn reached the 2nd round (d. Henry Searle, l. Kamil Majchrzak).
- Quinn's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 2 occasions – as a qualifier at 2025 Roland Garros, when he defeated Grigor Dimitrov and Alexander Shevchenko before falling to Tallon Griekspoor, and at the Australian Open this year, when he defeated Griekspoor and Hubert Hurkacz before falling to Jakub Mensik.

- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Quinn fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Francisco Comesana).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Quinn reached his **first Tour-level final** at Mallorca, finishing runner-up to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina. His other Tour-level highlights this season are reaching the 3rd round at both the Australian Open and Miami-1000 (l. Jiri Lehecka).

- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Tien reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Cristian Garin and Facundo Diaz Acosta before falling to Flavio Cobolli.
- Tien's best result in 2026 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Geneva (d. Mariano Navone). He won his first Tour-level title at Metz last year (d. Cameron Norrie). His other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Delray Beach (l. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner) and Houston (l. Roman Andres Burruchaga).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Tien reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Max Schoenhaus, l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).

- **SVRCINA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon main draw debut. This is his 3rd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- **Last year here**, Svrcina reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Omar Jasika, l. Lukas Klein). He also reached the 2nd round of Wimbledon qualifying in 2022 (d. Vasek Pospisil, l. Christian Harrison) but fell in the 1st round of qualifying here in 2023 (l. Altug Celikbilek) and 2024 (l. Thiago Agustin Tirante).
- Svrcina is bidding to record his **2nd Grand Slam match-win**. He reached the 2nd round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2023 Australian Open (d. Jaume Munar, l. Yoshihito Nishioka). He fell in the 1st round on his only other Grand Slam main draw appearance – as a direct acceptance at the Australian Open this year, where he fell to Munar in the only 5-set match he has contested to date.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Svrcina reached the final round of qualifying at Roland Garros. He defeated Guy den Ouden and Federico Agustin Gomez before falling to Thomas Faurel.
- Svrcina is contesting his **first Tour-level match on grass today**. His only appearances on grass at professional level have come at Wimbledon qualifying in 2022-25. He is one of 17 players competing in the men's singles who did not contest a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this year. He contested 5 events on grass as a junior in 2018-19.
- Svrcina is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win in 2026**. His only victories at Tour-level this season have come against Sweden's Olle Wallin in the Davis Cup Qualifiers 1st Round and in 2nd round finishes at Acapulco (d. James Duckworth, l. Paul has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 126 Muller once before – when he fell to No. 165 Sebastian Ofner in the 2nd round here last year.

- **PAUL** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 28th Grand Slam overall.
- Paul is bidding to record his **50th Grand Slam match-win** and become the 3rd active American player to record 50 Grand Slam men's singles match-wins – after Taylor Fritz (67 Grand Slam match-wins) and Frances Tiafoe (61).
- **Last year here**, Paul reached the 2nd round (d. Johannus Monday, l. Sebastian Ofner). It was the earliest defeat in his 4 previous Wimbledon appearances.
- Paul's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2024. As No. 12 seed, he defeated Pedro Martinez, Otto Virtanen, Alexander Bublik and Roberto Bautista Agut before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- Paul's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 Australian Open (l. Novak Djokovic).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Paul reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Alcaraz) and the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Casper Ruud).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Paul finished runner-up at Queen's, falling to Francisco Cerundolo in the final.
- Paul's best result in 2026 is winning his **5th Tour-level title** at Houston (d. Roman Andres Burruchaga). His other highlights are finishing runner-up at Delray Beach (l. Sebastian Korda), Hamburg (l. Ignacio Buse) and Queen's, reaching the semifinals at Adelaide (l. Tomas Machac) and reaching the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Arthur Fils).
- Paul won his **first Tour-level title on grass** at 2024 Queen's (d. Lorenzo Musetti), becoming the 8th American man in the Open Era to win the title at Queen's and the first since Sam Querrey in 2010. He is one of 27 players who began the men's singles main draw here to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Paul has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, falling to Jiri Lehecka in 5 sets in the 3rd round in 2023 but defeating Virtanen in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2024. He has an 11-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Paul is one of **18 American men competing at Wimbledon this year** – the most since 1995, when 21 Americans contested the men's singles draw here. USA has more players and more seeded players (6) in the men's singles draw here this year than any other nation.

- Paul reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 8 in June 2025. He dropped outside the Top 20 for the first time since March 2023 in January this year and has been ranked no higher than No. 18 this season. He plays here at No. 25.
- Paul had a **successful junior career**. He won the 2015 Roland Garros boys' singles title (d. Fritz), finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Fritz) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in September 2015. He reached the quarterfinals on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Patrik-Niklas Salminen).
- Paul made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2020 for USA and has a 6-5 win-loss record in the competition. USA play away against Czechia in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Paul is coached by Brad Stine and Hugo Armando.
- **MULLER** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 17th Grand Slam overall.
- Muller's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 2nd round on his first 2 main draw appearances here – in 2023 (d. Arthur Rinderknech, l. Carlos Alcaraz) and 2024 (d. Hugo Gaston, l. Daniil Medvedev). Last year, he fell to Novak Djokovic in the 1st round.
- Muller's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round on 6 occasions. In addition to his 2nd round finishes here in 2023 and 2024, he also reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open as a lucky loser in 2021 (d. Juan Ignacio Londero, l. Diego Schwartzman) and as a direct acceptance this year (d. Alexei Popyrin, l. Alexander Zverev), and as a wild card at both 2024 Roland Garros (d. Luca Nardi, l. Matteo Arnaldi) and the 2024 US Open (d. Adam Walton, l. Zverev).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Muller fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros, retiring due to a right leg injury against Stefanos Tsitsipas.
- Muller's **best Tour-level result in 2026** is reaching the quarterfinals at Marrakech, where he defeated Federico Cina and Vit Kopriya before retiring against Rafael Jodar due to illness. He has recorded just 2 other Tour-level match-wins this season – in 2nd round finishes at Hong Kong (d. Miomir Kecmanovic, l. Marcos Giron) and the Australian Open.
- Muller is bidding to end a **7-match losing streak at all levels**. He has not recorded a victory, at any level, since reaching the final round of qualifying at Barcelona in April (d. Max Alcala Gurri, l. Otto Virtanen).
- Muller is bidding to record his **3rd Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only Tour-level wins on grass came in 2nd round finishes here in 2023 and 2024. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw here who did not contest a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this year.
- Muller is bidding to **defeat a Top 30 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all 10 matches he has contested against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams, including all 3 matches he has contested against Top 30 players at Wimbledon. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 50 Popyrin in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Muller has **won one of the last 9 matches he has contested against Top 30 players**. His only victory against a Top 30 player in that time came against No. 10 Karen Khachanov in the 1st round at Beijing last year. he has a 9-28 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Tour-level overall.
- Muller has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested. He lost 5-set matches to Thiago Monteiro in the 1st round at 2017 Roland Garros and to Hugo Grenier in the 1st round at the 2024 Australian Open before recording his first victory in a 5-set match against Popyrin in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Muller reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 38 in August last year. He dropped to No. 127 in May – his lowest ranking since March 2023 – and plays here one place higher at No. 126.
- Muller made his **Davis Cup** debut during France's victory over Slovakia in the Qualifiers 1st Round this year, falling to Alex Molcan in the only match he contested. France will play away against Canada in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Muller is coached by Xavier Pujo.

NO. 23 RAFAEL JODAR (ESP) v (WC) FELIX GILL (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Jodar has never faced a player ranked as low as No. 220 Gill at Tour-level. The lowest-ranked player he has faced at Tour-level is No. 203 Rei Sakamoto, whom he defeated in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year for his first Grand Slam match-win. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Jodar at Tour-level is No. 136 Nicolai Budkov Kjaer in the group stage at the 2025 Next Gen ATP Finals.

Jodar is facing a lefthanded player at a Grand Slam for the first time. He has a 3-3 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- **JODAR** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 3rd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- At 19 years 298 days, Jodar is bidding to become the **6th Spanish teenager in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon** – after Jose Moreno Tallada (1973), Sergi Bruguera (1990), Tommy Robredo (2001), Rafael Nadal (2003, 2005) and Carlos Alcaraz (2021-22). (NB age calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Jodar recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals on his Roland Garros debut this year. He defeated Aleksandar Kovacevic, James Duckworth, Alex Michelsen and Pablo Carreno Busta before falling to Alexander Zverev in the last 8.
- Jodar made his **Grand Slam debut** as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year, successfully qualifying for a Grand Slam on his first attempt. He defeated Rei Sakamoto in 5 sets in the 1st round before falling to No. 16 seed Jakub Mensik in the 2nd round. He was not ranked high enough to enter qualifying at any Grand Slam tournaments prior to this season.
- Jodar's best result in 2026 is winning his **first Tour-level title** at Marrakech this year (d. Marco Trungelliti). He also reached the semifinals as a wild card at Barcelona (l. Arthur Fils) and reached the quarterfinals as a wild card at Madrid-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner), and as a direct acceptance at Rome-1000 (l. Luciano Darderi) and Roland Garros.
- Jodar has also contested **one Challenger-level event in 2026**, finishing runner-up as a qualifier at the Canberra Challenger (AUS) (l. Alexander Blockx).
- Jodar **made his Tour-level debut at the 2025 Next Gen ATP Finals**, where he won 2 of the 3 matches he contested in the group stage but did not advance to the semifinals.
- Jodar is contesting his **first professional event on grass**, at any level. He withdrew from Queen's due to an abdominal injury and is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon. He contested 2 events on grass as a junior in 2024 – he won the title at J300 Roehampton (GBR) (d. Charlie Robertson) before reaching the boys' singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon (l. Naoya Honda).
- Jodar has won all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level – against Sakamoto in the 1st round at the Australian Open and against both Michelsen in the 3rd round and Carreno Busta in the round of 16 at Roland Garros. His victory against Carreno Busta was his first successful comeback from 0-2 down.

- Jodar broke the Top 500, Top 400, Top 300 and Top 200 for the first time in 2025. He broke the Top 100 for the first time in March this year, before breaking the Top 50 for the first time in April after his semifinal finish at Barcelona. He reached a **career-high ranking** earlier this month and plays here 3 places lower at No. 26.
- Jodar had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 4 after winning the boys' singles title at the 2024 US Open (d. Nicolai Budkov Kjaer). He also finished runner-up at the 2024 ITF World Tennis Tour Junior Finals (l. Mees Rottgering). His quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2024 was his only appearance in the junior event at Wimbledon.
- Jodar **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Virginia for one season in 2024-25 and was named an ITA all-American in singles. He turned professional in December 2025, forfeiting his college eligibility.
- Jodar is coached by his father, Rafael Sr.
- Wild card **GILL** is making his Grand Slam debut today.
- Gill has **competed in Wimbledon qualifying** on 3 occasions. He reached the 2nd round of qualifying here as a wild card in 2021 (d. Danilo Petrovic, l. Marc Polmans) but fell in the 1st round of qualifying as a wild card in both 2022 (l. Gastao Elias) and 2024 (l. Emilio Nava). He did not compete in qualifying here last year.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Gill reached the final round of qualifying at Roland Garros. He defeated Aziz Dougaz and Alex Molcan before falling to Kyrian Jacquet. It was his first appearance in a Grand Slam qualifying draw away from Wimbledon, having been ranked too low to enter qualifying at any Grand Slam tournament prior to Roland Garros this year.
- Gill made his **Tour-level debut** as lucky loser at Eastbourne last week, falling to Jan Choinski in the 2nd round after receiving a bye in the 1st round.
- **Elsewhere on grass this season**, Gill reached the 2nd round as a wild card at both the Birmingham Challenger (GBR) (d. Ugo Blanchet, l. Kamil Majchrzak) and the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR) (d. Hugo Gaston, l. Otto Virtanen) but fell in the 1st round as a wild card at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (l. Filippo Romano).
- Gill has competed mainly at Challenger-level in 2026. He reached his **first Challenger-level final** at the Pune Challenger (IND), finishing runner-up to Federico Cina, and also reached the semifinals at the New Delhi Challenger (IND) (l. Stefanos Sakellariadis) and the Barletta Challenger (ITA) (l. Lukas Neumayer).
- Gill has also contested 3 events on the World Tennis Tour in 2026, including winning his **9th World Tennis Tour title** at M25 Antalya (TUR) in January (d. Filip Cristian Jianu).
- Gill is **facing a Top 50 player for the first time**, at any level. The highest-ranked player he has faced, at any level, is No. 78 Majchrzak, to whom he lost in the 2nd round at the Birmingham Challenger (GBR) this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 110 Molcan in the 2nd round of qualifying at Roland Garros this year.
- Gill is one of **16 lefthanders** to begin the men's main draw here this year. Rafael Nadal is the last lefthanded player to win the men's title here in 2010.
- Gill is one of the **12 British players** competing in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year. It is the 2nd-highest number of Brits in the men's singles draw here since 1978 (14 British men in the singles draw at Wimbledon) after last year, when 13 British men competed in singles here.
- Gill broke the Top 300 for the first time in February after reaching the semifinals at the New Delhi Challenger (IND). He plays here at a **career-high ranking** of No. 220.
- Gill reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 28 in January 2020. His best result at junior-level was winning the title at J2 Gyor (HUN) in September 2019 (d. Jerome Kym). He lost in the 1st round as a wild card on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Nicolas Alvarez Varona).
- Gill is coached by Mark Taylor.

NO. 24 JOAO FONSECA (BRA) v ROBERTO BAUTISTA AGUT (ESP)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Fonseca has lost a Tour-level match to a player ranked as low as No. 183 Bautista Agut once before – when he fell to No. 188 Jan Choinski in the 1st round at 2024 Estoril. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Fonseca at a Grand Slam is No. 143 Nicolas Jarry in the 3rd round here last year.

Aged 19 years 325 days, Fonseca is the 2nd-youngest player competing in the men's main draw here – after Rafael Jodar (19 years 298 days). He is 18 years 129 days younger than Bautista Agut – who, at 38 years 89 days, is the 3rd-oldest player competing in the men's main draw here, behind Stan Wawrinka (41 years 106 days) and Novak Djokovic (39 years 51 days). (NB all ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

- **FONSECA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 7th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- **Last year here**, Fonseca reached the 3rd round on his Wimbledon debut, defeating Jacob Fearnley and Jenson Brooksby before falling to qualifier Nicolas Jarry. He became the 10th Brazilian man to reach the 3rd round here in the Open Era – and the first since Thomaz Belucci in 2010. Aged 18 years 326 days, he also became the youngest player to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon since 2011, when Bernard Tomic reached the quarterfinals here aged 18 years 255 days. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Fonseca recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros this year, defeating Luka Pavlovic, Dino Prizmic, Novak Djokovic and Casper Ruud before falling to Jakub Mensik. He recovered from 0-2 down to defeat both Prizmic and Djokovic in 5 sets – his first victories in 5-set matches. He has a 2-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall but has not contested a 5-set match here.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fonseca fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Eliot Spizzirri). It is the only time he has lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam.
- Fonseca's **best results in 2026** are quarterfinal finishes at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev), Munich (l. Ben Shelton) and Roland Garros. He also reached the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Fonseca fell in the 1st round at Halle (l. Yannick Hanfmann). He withdrew from Eastbourne due to a right shoulder injury.
- Fonseca won his **first 2 Tour-level titles in 2025** – at Buenos Aires (d. Francisco Cerundolo) and Basel (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina). He also won the title at the 2024 Next Gen ATP Finals (d. Learner Tien).
- Fonseca is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only Tour-level match-wins on the surface came last year, in his 3rd round finish here and in a 2nd round finish at Eastbourne (d. Zizou Bergs, l. Taylor Fritz).
- Fonseca broke the Top 50 for the first time in July last year after reaching the 3rd round here. He reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 24 in November and plays here 3 places lower at No. 27.

- Fonseca is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the top of the boys' rankings for the first time in September 2023 after winning the boys' singles title at the 2023 US Open (d. Tien). He reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles here in 2023 (l. Henry Searle).
- Fonseca made his **Davis Cup** debut for Brazil at the 2024 Finals Group Stage and has a 4-2 win-loss record in the competition. Brazil will play at home against Switzerland in a 2026 World Group I tie in September.
- Fonseca is coached by Guilherme Teixeira.
- **BAUTISTA AGUT** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 10th time. This is his 12th Wimbledon appearance and his 52nd Grand Slam overall. Having announced his intention to retire from professional tennis at the end of the 2026 season, this will be his final Wimbledon appearance.
- Aged 38 years 89 days, Bautista Agut is the 3rd-oldest man to begin the men's singles main draw here this year – after 41-year-old Stan Wawrinka and 39-year-old Novak Djokovic. He is bidding to become the **19th man in the Open Era to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon aged 38 or older**. (NB Adrian Mannarino, who turns 38 today, will contest his 1st round match here on Tuesday; ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Bautista Agut has **lost in the 1st round at Wimbledon twice before** – in 2023, when he fell to Roman Safiullin in 5 sets, and last year (l. Cameron Norrie).
- Bautista Agut's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2019 (l. Djokovic).
- Bautista Agut is bidding to end a **7-match Grand Slam losing streak**. Since reaching the 2nd round at the 2024 US Open (d. Luca Nardi, l. Ben Shelton), he has lost in the 1st round at all 6 Grand Slam events – including at both the Australian Open (l. Shang Juncheng) and Roland Garros (l. Brandon Nakashima) this year.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Bautista Agut fell in the 1st round at Stuttgart (l. Marcos Giron). He also reached the final round of qualifying at Halle (d. Benito Sanchez Martinez, l. Raphael Collignon).
- Bautista Agut is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win in 2026**. His only Tour-level wins this season have come in 2nd round finishes at Montpellier (d. Christopher O'Connell, l. Martin Damm), Indian Wells-1000 (d. Fabian Marozsan, l. Jack Draper), Miami-1000 (d. James Duckworth, l. Karen Khachanov) and Rome-1000 (d. Francesco Maestrelli, l. Brandon Nakashima). He fell in the 1st round at the 8 other Tour-level events he has contested this year.
- Bautista Agut has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2014 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Benjamin Becker). He is one of 27 players competing in the men's singles here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Bautista Agut has won 3 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, with his only defeat in a 5-set match here coming against Safiullin in the 1st round in 2023. He has a 14-12 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Bautista Agut is a **former Top 10 player**, having reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 in November 2019. He dropped to No. 183 today – his lowest ranking since November 2011.
- Bautista Agut has played **Davis Cup** since 2014 and has a 15-7 win-loss record in the competition. He was part of the Spain team that won the competition for the 6th time in 2019, winning 2 of the 3 singles matches he played at the Finals. Spain will play away against Chile in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Bautista Agut is coached by Daniel Gimeno-Traver and Jose Luis Vendrell Bru.

NO. 25 ARTHUR RINDERKNECH (FRA) v (Q) OLIVER TARVET (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Rinderknech has lost a Tour-level match to a player ranked as low as Tarvet once before – when he fell to No. 385 Omni Kumar in the 1st round at 2023 Winston-Salem. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Rinderknech at a Grand Slam is No. 151 Oscar Otte in the 1st round here in 2021.

Rinderknech lost the only match he has played against a qualifier at Wimbledon, to Otte in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 1-2 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams overall, falling to Yosuke Watanuki in the 1st round at the 2023 Australian Open but defeating Jurij Rodionov in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.

Rinderknech has won 6 of the last 7 matches he has contested against qualifiers at Tour-level. His only defeat to a qualifier in that time came against his cousin Valentin Vacherot in the final at 2025 Shanghai-1000. He has a 15-16 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

This is the 71st Wimbledon men's singles match between a French player and a British player in the Open Era, and the first since 2023, when Quentin Halys defeated Daniel Evans and Liam Broady defeated Constant Lestienne, both in the 1st round. French players lead 36-34 in the 70 previous matches. Valentin Royer will face Harry Wendelken in the 72nd Wimbledon men's singles match between a French player and a British player in the Open Era on Tuesday.

This is the 157th Grand Slam men's singles match between a French player and a British player in the Open Era – British players lead 89-67 in the 156 previous matches.

Rinderknech is facing a British player at a Grand Slam for the first time. He has a 2-4 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall. He has won all 3 of his previous matches against players at their home Grand Slam – defeating Alexei Popyrin in the 1st round at the 2022 Australian Open, fellow Frenchman Richard Gasquet in the 1st round at 2023 Roland Garros and Christopher Eubanks in the 1st round at the 2024 US Open.

- **RINDERKNECH** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 23rd Grand Slam overall.
- Rinderknech has **lost in the 1st round here on 3 occasions**, on his first 3 appearances here – as a qualifier in 2021 (l. Oscar Otte) and as a direct acceptance in 2022 (l. Denis Shapovalov) and 2023 (l. Alexandre Muller).
- Last year here, Rinderknech recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the 3rd round. He defeated both Alexander Zverev and Cristian Garin in 5 sets before falling to Kamil Majchrzak.
- Rinderknech's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the 2025 US Open. He defeated Roberto Carballes Baena, Alejandro Davidovich Fokina and Benjamin Bonzi before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Rinderknech reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Jurij Rodionov, l. Matteo Berrettini) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Fabian Marozsan).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Rinderknech fell in the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch after receiving a bye in the 1st round (l. Adrina Mannarino) and fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Hamad Medjedovic).

- Rinderknech's **best results in 2026** are reaching the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Andrey Rublev) and Geneva (l. Alexander Bublik). He has lost in his first or 2nd match at the 11 other Tour-level events he has contested this year.
- Rinderknech has won 3 of the 5 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. In addition to his 5-set victories against Zverev and Garin here last year, he also defeated Kei Nishikori in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2024. He has a 7-5 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Rinderknech reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 24 in May. He plays here 4 places lower at No. 28.
- Rinderknech played **college tennis**. He represented Texas A&M University from 2014 to 2018 and was named a 3-time All-American in singles.
- Rinderknech made his **Davis Cup** debut for France at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals and has a 7-6 overall win-loss record in the competition, including defeating Norbert Gombos and Alex Molcan in France's 3-1 victory against Slovakia in the 2026 Qualifiers 1st Round in February. France will play away against Canada in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Rinderknech is coached by Lucas Pouille, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2016.
- Qualifier **TARVET** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time on his 2nd Grand Slam appearance. It is also his 2nd Tour-level appearance, having made both his Grand Slam debut and Tour-level debut at 2025 Wimbledon.
- **Last year here**, Tarvet successfully qualified for the main draw and reached the 2nd round. He defeated Leandro Riedi for his first Tour-level match-win before falling to No. 2 seed Carlos Alcaraz.
- As a wild card in **Wimbledon qualifying last week**, Tarvet defeated Alex Bolt (AUS) 76(3) 75, Alexis Galarneau (CAN) 75 62 and No. 31 seed Stefanos Sakellaris (GRE) 64 62 75. It was his 2nd appearance in qualifying at a Grand Slam tournament after Wimbledon last year.
- By successfully qualifying here for the 2nd straight year, Tarvet has become the **3rd British man to qualify at Wimbledon in consecutive years in the Open Era** – after John Paish (1969-70) and Jamie Delgado (2004-05).
- Tarvet is one of 3 British men to qualify here, alongside Max Basing and Billy Harris. It is the **first time that multiple British men have successfully qualified at Wimbledon since 1999**, when Delgado, Arvind Parmar and Danny Sapsford all qualified here.
- Tarvet is contesting his **4th professional event of 2026 here**. His only other appearances at professional events came as a wild card at 3 British grass court Challenger events earlier this month – he reached the quarterfinals at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (l. Filippo Romano) but fell in the 1st round at both the Birmingham Challenger (GBR) (l. Coleman Wong) and Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR) (l. Roman Safiullin).
- Tarvet has won **6 titles on the World Tennis Tour**. He won 2 titles at M15-level in both 2023 and 2024, and won 2 more titles in 2025, at M15 San Diego, CA (USA) in June (d. Leo Vithontien) and M25 Roehampton (GBR) in August (d. Paul Jubb).
- Tarvet is bidding to **defeat a Top 100 player for the first time on his 2nd attempt**. He lost the only match he has played against a Top 100 player, falling to No. 2 Alcaraz in the 2nd round here last year. The next-highest-ranked player he has faced is No. 109 Wong, to whom he lost in the 1st round at the Birmingham Challenger (GBR) this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 123 Tristan Schoolkate in the 2nd round at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) earlier this month.
- Tarvet is one of the 12 British players competing in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year. It is the **2nd-highest number of Brits in the men's singles draw here since 1978** (14 British men in the singles draw at Wimbledon) after last year, when 13 British men competed in singles here.
- Tarvet reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 324 in February. He plays here at No. 348 or No. 349* and was the 2nd-lowest-ranked player to begin the men's singles here this year – after No. 492 Thanasi Kokkinakis, who entered using a protected ranking. (*ranking depends on outcome of Challenger events on Sunday; please check [ATP rankings](#) on Monday)
- Tarvet **played college tennis**. He represented the University of San Diego from 2022 to 2026, turning professional after graduating in May. He earned all-American honours in singles in both 2024, 2025 and 2026 and in doubles in 2025.

- Tarvet reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 189 in May 2021. He contested 2 grass courts events as a junior, falling in the 1st round as a wild card in the boys' singles at both 2021 J1 Roehampton (GBR) (l. Matthew William Donald) and 2021 Wimbledon (l. Viacheslav Bielinskyi). He was never ranked high enough to contest the junior events at the other Grand Slam tournaments.
- Tarvet is coached by Stuart Havelock and University of San Diego coaches Ryan Keckley and Alex Funkhouser.

NO. 26 CAMERON NORRIE (GBR) v (Q) MICHAEL ZHENG (USA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Norrie lost the first 2 matches he played against qualifiers at the Grand Slams – to Elliot Benchetrit in the 1st round at 2019 Roland Garros and to Gregoire Barrere in the 1st round at the 2019 US Open – but has won the 8 matches he has played against qualifiers at the Grand Slams since then. He has won both of his previous matches against qualifiers at Wimbledon, defeating Tomas Machac in the 1st round in 2023 and Nicolas Jarry in the round of 16 last year. He has a 40-15 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

Norrie has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 144 Zheng twice before – to No. 273 Benchetrit in the 1st round at 2019 Roland Garros and to No. 153 Daniel Elahi Galan in the 1st round at 2020 Roland Garros. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Norrie at Wimbledon is No. 71 Aljaz Bedene in the 1st round in 2018.

- Lefthander **NORRIE** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 7th consecutive time. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 34th Grand Slam overall.
- Norrie has **lost in the 1st round here twice before** – on his first 2 Wimbledon appearances, on his Grand Slam debut as a wild card in 2017 (l. Jo-Wilfried Tsonga) and as a direct acceptance in 2018 (l. Aljaz Bedene).
- **Last year here**, Norrie reached the quarterfinals. He defeated Roberto Bautista Agut, Frances Tiafoe, Mattia Bellucci and Nicolas Jarry before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- Norrie's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2022 (l. Novak Djokovic). He became the 4th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon – after Andy Murray (7 Wimbledon semifinal appearances), Tim Henman (4) and Roger Taylor (2).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Norrie reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Alexander Zverev) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros, retiring due to a rib injury against Daniel Vallejo.
- Norrie's **best results in 2026** are reaching the quarterfinals at Indian Wells (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and Barcelona (l. Rafael Jodar) and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Norrie fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina).
- Norrie is bidding to end a **5-match losing streak**. Since reaching the round of 16 at Madrid-1000, where he defeated Tomas Machac and Thiago Agustin Tirante before falling to Sinner, he has fallen in his opening match at Rome-1000 (l. Tirante), Geneva (l. Mariano Navone), Roland Garros and Queen's.
- Norrie has won all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Jaume Munar in the 2nd round and David Goffin in the quarterfinals in 2022 and against Jarry in the round of 16 last year. He has a 9-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Norrie is one of **16 lefthanders** to begin the men's main draw here this year. Rafael Nadal is the last lefthanded player to win the men's title here in 2010.

- Norrie is the highest-ranked of the **12 British players** competing in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year. It is the 2nd-highest number of Brits in the men's singles draw here since 1978 (14 British men in the singles draw at Wimbledon) after last year, when 13 British men competed in singles here. He and Murray are the only British men to have reached the round of 16 or better at Wimbledon in the last 20 years.
- Norrie reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 8 in September 2022 and is one of 5 British men to have been ranked in the Top 10, alongside Greg Rusedski, Henman, Murray and Jack Draper. He plays here at No. 29.
- Norrie **played college tennis**. He represented Texas Christian University and finished his college career in 2017 as the NCAA's top-ranked male player. He compiled a 77-20 win-loss record in singles in college tennis from 2014 to 2017.
- Norrie was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 10 in March 2013. He fell in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles event here in 2013 (l. Laslo Djere).
- Norrie made his **Davis Cup** debut for Great Britain in 2018 and has a 10-8 win-loss record in the competition. Great Britain will play at home against Ecuador in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Norrie is coached by Facundo Lugones.
- Qualifier **ZHENG** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon main draw debut. This is his 3rd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- As No. 26 seed, Zheng defeated Henri Squire (GER) 62 76(3), Laslo Djere (SRB) 75 63 and Colton Smith (USA) 64 46 62 63 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was his first appearance in qualifying here and was the 3rd time he has successfully qualified on his 6th appearance in the qualifying draw at a Grand Slam.
- Zheng made his **Grand Slam main draw debut** as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year, defeating Sebastian Korda in 5 sets in the 1st round for his first Tour-level match-win before retiring against Corentin Moutet due to a left thigh injury in the 2nd round. He also qualified at Roland Garros, falling to Dino Prizmic in the 1st round of the main draw.
- Zheng is bidding to record his **2nd Tour-level match-win**. He made his Tour-level debut at the Australian Open this year and has lost in the 1st round at the 3 other Tour-level events he has played since then – as a wild card at both Dallas (l. Korda) and Indian Wells-1000 (l. Vit Kopriva) and as a qualifier at Roland Garros.
- Zheng's 3 victories in qualifying last week were his **first match-wins on grass at any professional level**. He lost in the 1st round in the 3 other grass court events he has contested – as a wild card at the 2025 Newport Challenger (USA) (l. Bernard Tomic) and as a direct acceptance at both the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (l. Mark Lajal) and the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR) (l. Shintaro Mochizuki) last month.
- Zheng's **other highlight this year** is reaching the semifinals at the Noumea Challenger (CAL) (l. Arthur Gea). Prior to this season, he had never competed at a Challenger event outside the United States or Puerto Rico.
- Zheng is **facing a Top 50 player for the 2nd time**. The highest-ranked player he has previously faced, at any level, is No. 37 Moutet in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 53 Korda in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Zheng is one of **18 American men competing at Wimbledon this year** – the most since 1995, when 21 Americans contested the men's singles draw here. USA has more players in the men's singles draw here this year than any other nation.
- Zheng broke the Top 200 for the first time in October 2025. He reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 143 last week and plays here one place lower at No. 144.
- Zheng **played college tennis** at Columbia University, ending his college career in May this year. He won the NCAA Individual Tennis Championship in 2024 and 2025 after finishing runner-up in 2023, becoming the first men's player to win consecutive titles since Steve Johnson in 2011 and 2012 and the 9th men's player to do so overall.
- Zheng is a **former Wimbledon boys' singles runner-up**. He reached the boys' singles final here in 2022, falling to Mili Poljicak. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in July 2022.
- Zheng is coached by Ruan Roelofse.

NO. 28 BRANDON NAKASHIMA (USA) v (WC) JACK PINNINGTON JONES (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Nakashima is facing a British player at Wimbledon for the first time. He has a 3-2 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level events played in the UK and an 8-7 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall.

Nakashima has lost Grand Slam matches to a player ranked as low as No. 138 Pinnington Jones twice before. He fell to No. 138 Alex Molcan in the 2nd round at the 2021 US Open and to No. 175 Jerome Kym in the 2nd round at the 2025 US Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Nakashima at Wimbledon is No. 70 Jordan Thompson in the 1st round in 2023.

- **Last year here**, Nakashima reached the 3rd round. He defeated Bu Yunchaokete and Reilly Opelka before falling to Lorenzo Sonego.
- Nakashima's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – including at Wimbledon in 2022, when he defeated Nicola Pietrangeli, Denis Shapovalov and Daniel Elahi Galan before falling to Nick Kyrgios in 5 sets. He also reached the round of 16 at the 2024 US Open (l. Alexander Zverev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Nakashima reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Roberto Bautista Agut and Luca Van Assche before falling to Felix Auger-Aliassime, but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Botic van de Zandschulp).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Nakashima reached the semifinals at Queen's (l. Francisco Cerundolo). It was the 2nd time he had reached the semifinals at a Tour-level grass court event, having also reached the semifinals at 2024 Stuttgart (l. Jack Draper).
- Nakashima's **other highlights in 2026** are finishing runner-up at Brisbane (l. Daniil Medvedev) and reaching the semifinals at Acapulco (l. Frances Tiafoe).
- Nakashima is one of **18 American men competing at Wimbledon this year** – the most since 1995, when 21 Americans contested the men's singles draw here. USA has more players and more seeded players (6) in the men's singles draw here this year than any other nation.
- Nakashima has lost all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, falling to Kyrgios in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2022, to Jordan Thompson in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2023 and to Sonego in the 3rd round last year. He has a 3-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Nakashima reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 29 in May 2025. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 31.
- Nakashima **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Virginia for one season before turning professional in 2019.

- Nakashima had a **successful junior career** and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in December 2018. His best result at a Grand Slam junior event was reaching the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2019 US Open (l. Jonas Forejtek). His best result in the boys' singles at Wimbledon was reaching the 3rd round in 2019 (l. Harold Mayot).
- Nakashima made his **Davis Cup** debut at the 2024 Finals Group Stage and has won all 3 matches he has contested in the competition to date. USA will play away against Czechia in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Nakashima is coached by Wayne Ferreira, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1994.
- Wild card **PINNINGTON JONES** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd straight year. This is 2nd Grand Slam main draw appearance, having made his Grand Slam debut here last year.
- **Last year here**, as a wild card on his Grand Slam debut, Pinnington Jones reached the 2nd round. He defeated Tomas Martin Etcheverry for his first Tour-level match-win before falling to Flavio Cobolli.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Pinnington Jones fell in the 1st round of qualifying at both the Australian Open (l. Gilles Arnaud Bailly) and Roland Garros (l. Vitaliy Sachko).
- Pinnington Jones **contested 4 events on grass prior to Wimbledon this year**. At Tour-level, he reached the 2nd round as a wild card at Eastbourne (d. Marco Trungelliti, l. Jack Draper) but fell in the 1st round as a wild card at Queen's (l. Denis Shapovalov). At Challenger-level, he reached the 2nd round at Ilkley (GBR) (d. Harry Wendelken, l. Filippo Romano) but fell in the 1st round at Birmingham (GBR) (l. Aleksandar Vukic).
- Pinnington Jones' best result in 2026 is reaching his **first Tour-level quarterfinal** as a qualifier at Dallas. He defeated Cobolli and Eliot Spizzirri before falling to Marin Cilic. His best result at Challenger-level is finishing runner-up at the Soma Bay Challenger (EGY), where he retired due to a right foot injury against Lloyd Harris.
- Pinnington Jones is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win**. In addition to his 2 victories en route to the quarterfinals at Dallas, his only Tour-level match-wins have come in 2nd round finishes at Wimbledon last year and at Eastbourne last week.
- Pinnington Jones is bidding to **defeat a Top 50 player for the 3rd time**, at any level. He has a 2-3 win-loss record against Top 50 players at all levels, with his 2 victories coming against No. 39 Cameron Norrie in the 2nd round at the 2024 Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR) and No. 20 Cobolli in the 1st round at Dallas this year.
- Pinnington Jones reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 132 in May this year. He plays here at No. 138.
- Pinnington Jones **played college tennis**. He represented Texas Christian University from 2022 to 2025, earning all-American honours in singles in 2024 and 2025. He was named the NCAA Championships most outstanding player in 2024.
- Pinnington Jones had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 6 in January 2021 and reached the boys' singles quarterfinals here the same year (l. Victor Lilov). He also won the title on grass at 2021 J1 Roehampton (GBR) (d. Daniel Rincon).
- Pinnington Jones is coached by David Felgate.
