On court today...

- Novak Djokovic and Stefanos Tsitsipas will meet in the final match of the day on Centre Court, with Tsitsipas aiming to end an 11-match losing streak against the 24-time Grand Slam champion. Tsitsipas won 2 of the pair's first 3 meetings in 2018-19, but Djokovic has proved too good since then – including in their 2 clashes in Grand Slam finals, at 2021 Roland Garros and the 2023 Australian Open. A Top 10 player for most of the last decade, Tsitsipas' recent form sees him now ranked at No. 87 – and Djokovic has never lost a Wimbledon match to a player ranked that low. But Tsitsipas will have been encouraged by a strong 1st round performance which saw him drop just 7 games against Hugo Gaston, while Djokovic, meanwhile, took more than 3 hours to defeat Wu Yibing on Monday.
- Jannik Sinner toiled to a 5-set victory over Miomir Kecmanovic in the first match of his title defence on Monday, and returns to Centre Court today to take on Portugal's Nuno Borges. Sinner may have hoped for a simpler opening match here than the clash with Kecmanovic – but he will also be relieved to have put a streak of 5 defeats in 5-set matches behind him. His win against Kecmanovic saw him equal Nicola Pietrangeli's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles matches won by an Italian player and he will claim sole ownership of the record if he wins again today. Borges is facing a world No. 1 for the first time today – and he is also aiming to defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on his 11th attempt.
- The final match on No. 2 Court today is an all-Spanish match-up between 19-year-old Rafael Jodar and 34-year-old Pablo Carreno Busta. The pair met in the round of 16 at Roland Garros just a few weeks ago, with Jodar successfully recovering from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets for the first time in his career. Should Jodar win again today, he will join Rafael Nadal and Carlos Alcaraz as the only Spanish teenagers in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon. Regardless of what happens in today's match, Carreno Busta has already made history here – by advancing to the 2nd round for the first time on his 8th appearance here, he has set a new Open Era record for most appearances before reaching the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon.
- On Court 18, Mallorca champion Alejandro Davidovich Fokina aims to extend his winning streak when he plays Hungary's Fabian Marozsan. Davidovich Fokina's victory at Mallorca last week ended a streak of 5 Tour-level finals without a title-victory – and he will hope to carry that momentum with him at Wimbledon. The Spaniard is also a former junior champion here. Marozsan is one of 2 Hungarians through to the 2nd round here alongside Marton Fucsovics. If both reach the 3rd round here, it will be the first time that 2 Hungarians have reached the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon since 1939.

- Defending champion **SINNER** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 5th consecutive year. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner is bidding to record his 95th Grand Slam match-win and claim sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles matches won by an Italian player**, ahead of Nicola Pietrangeli.
- Sinner advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Miomir Kecmanovic 46 63 67(7) 62 63 in the 1st round on Monday, **ending a streak of 5 consecutive defeats 5-set matches**. It was his first win in a 5-set match here, having previously lost both 5-set matches he had contested at Wimbledon – in the quarterfinals in both 2022, when he lost to Novak Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead, and in 2024 when he fell to Daniil Medvedev. He has a 7-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Last year here, Sinner won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating 2-time defending champion Carlos Alcaraz in the final. He became the first Italian player, man or woman, to win a Wimbledon singles title. By reaching his first Wimbledon final, he also became the 11th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. Alcaraz then became the 12th player to achieve the feat by reaching his first Australian Open final this year.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **10th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title** – after Rod Laver, John Newcombe, Bjorn Borg, John McEnroe, Boris Becker, Pete Sampras, Roger Federer, Djokovic and Alcaraz.
- Sinner is a **4-time Grand Slam champion**. In addition to his title here last year, he also won the titles at the Australian Open in 2024 (d. Medvedev) and 2025 (d. Alexander Zverev) and at the 2024 US Open (d. Taylor Fritz). He holds the record for most Grand Slam singles titles won by an Italian player – ahead of 2-time Grand Slam champion Pietrangeli, who won the men's singles title at Roland Garros in 1959 and 1960.
- In Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Djokovic) and the 2nd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Clement Tabur before falling to Juan Manuel Cerundolo in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was his earliest Grand Slam exit since falling to Daniel Altmaier in the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros.
- Sinner **leads the Tour for most singles titles won in 2026**. He has won the titles at all 5 Masters-1000 events this season – at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev), Miami-1000 (d. Jiri Lehecka), Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Alcaraz), Madrid-1000 (d. Zverev) and Rome-1000 (d. Casper Ruud). By winning the title at Rome-1000 he became the 2nd player to complete the set of Masters-1000 titles, after Djokovic.
- Sinner has **lost 3 matches in 2026** – in addition to his defeats at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also fell in the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Jakub Mensik).

- Sinner has **won 2 Tour-level titles on grass**. In addition to his Wimbledon title last year, he won the title at 2024 Halle (d. Hubert Hurkacz). He is one of 4 Italian men to have won a Tour-level title on grass in the Open Era – alongside Berrettini (4 grass court titles), and Andreas Seppi and Lorenzo Sonego (both one). He is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Sinner became **world No. 1** for the first time following 2024 Roland Garros and begins his 78th week as world No. 1 today. He will remain world No. 1 following Wimbledon regardless of results at this tournament.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to Davis Cup title in 2023 and 2024**. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 15-4 overall win-loss record in the competition but did not compete in Davis Cup in 2025 as Italy won their 3rd consecutive title. As hosts, Italy have received a wild card to the 2026 Davis Cup Final 8 in Bologna in November.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.
- **BORGES** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and 18th Grand Slam overall.
- Borges is bidding to become the **3rd Portuguese player in history, man or woman, to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Michelle Larcher de Brito (2013, 2014) and Joao Sousa (2016, 2019). By reaching the 2nd round here for the 2nd time, he has become the 3rd Portuguese player in history, man or woman, to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon on multiple occasions – after Larcher de Brito (2009, 2013, 2014) and Sousa (2016, 2019).
- Borges is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 8th time and equal Sousa's **all-time record for most 3rd round appearances at a Grand Slam by a Portuguese player, man or woman**. Sousa reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open in 2015, 2016 and 2019, at Wimbledon in 2016 and 2019, and at the US Open in 2013, 2016 and 2018.
- Borges advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Tristan Boyer 63 75 75 in the 1st round on Monday.
- Last year here, Borges recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the 3rd round. He defeated Francisco Cerundolo and Billy Harris for his first Wimbledon match-wins before falling to Karen Khachanov in 5 sets. He fell in the 1st round on his first 3 main draw appearances here – as a lucky loser in 2022 (l. Mackenzie McDonald) and as a direct acceptance in 2023 (l. Francisco Cerundolo) and 2024 (l. Yoshihito Nishioka).
- Borges' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at both the Australian Open and the US Open in 2024, losing to Daniil Medvedev on both occasions.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Borges reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Learner Tien) and Roland Garros (l. Andrey Rublev).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Borges reached his **first Tour-level semifinal on grass** at Mallorca. He defeated Adrian Mannarino, Jan-Lennard Struff and Luciano Darderi before falling to Ethan Quinn. He also reached the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Terence Atmane, l. Marin Cilic) but fell in the 1st round at Halle (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Borges' **other highlights in 2026** are reaching the quarterfinals at Hong Kong (l. Rublev) and Barcelona (l. Hamad Medjedovic).
- Borges has contested **2 events at Challenger-level in 2026**. He reached the quarterfinals at both the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (l. Marcos Giron) and the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Matteo Arnaldi).
- Borges is **facing a world No. 1 for the first time**. The highest-ranked player he has previously faced is No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz, to whom he lost in the 1st round at 2023 Barcelona.
- Borges is **bidding to defeat a Top 5 player for the first time**. He has lost all 10 matches he has played against Top 5 players, including all 3 matches he has played against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams – to No. 3 Medvedev in the round of 16 at the 2024 Australian Open, to No. 5 Medvedev in the round of 16 at the 2024 US Open and to No. 3 Alcaraz in the 3rd round at the 2025 Australian Open. The highest-ranked players he has defeated at Tour-level are No. 8 Casper Ruud in the 2nd round at 2025 Roland Garros and No. 8 Auger-Aliassime in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.

- Borges lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Khachanov in the 3rd round here last year. He has a 4-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Borges reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 30 in September 2024. He plays here at No. 48.
- Borges **played college tennis** at Mississippi State University for 4 years (2016-19) and reached the 2019 NCAA singles final (l. Paul Jubb).
- Borges reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 44 in April 2015. He reached the 2nd round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2015 (d. Ryan James Storrie, l. Michael Mmoh).
- Borges made his **Davis Cup** debut for Portugal in 2021 and has an 9-12 overall win-loss record in the competition. Portugal will play away against El Salvador in a World Group II tie in September.
- Borges is coached by Rui Machado and Hugo Anao.

NO. 3 FELIX AUGER-ALIASSIME (CAN) v DINO PRIZMIC (CRO)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Auger-Aliassime has lost matches to players ranked as low as No. 89 Prizmic on his last 3 Wimbledon appearances – he fell to No. 119 Michael Mmoh in the 1st round here in 2023, to No. 93 Thanasi Kokkinakis in the 1st round here in 2024 and to No. 125 Jan-Lennard Struff in the 2nd round here last year.

- **AUGER-ALIASSIME** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam overall.
- Auger-Aliassime advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Alexander Shevchenko 63 61 64 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Auger-Aliassime reached the 2nd round, defeating James Duckworth for his first Wimbledon match-win since 2021 before falling to Jan-Lennard Struff.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2021, when he defeated Thiago Monteiro, Mikael Ymer, Nick Kyrgios and Alexander Zverev before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions – at the US Open in both 2021 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and 2025 (l. Jannik Sinner). By reaching the semifinals in 2021 he became the first Canadian man to reach the semifinals at the US Open, and the first man born in the 2000s to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Auger-Aliassime reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Flavio Cobolli) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open, retiring due to a left thigh injury against Nuno Borges.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Auger-Aliassime reached the quarterfinals at both 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Kamil Majchrzak) and Halle (l. Frances Tiafoe).
- Auger-Aliassime's best result in 2026 is winning his **9th Tour-level title** at Montpellier (d. Adrian Mannarino). His other highlights this season are finishing runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Alex de Minaur), reaching the semifinals at Dubai (l. Daniil Medvedev) and reaching the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Sinner).
- Auger-Aliassime has **reached 2 Tour-level finals on grass** – finishing runner-up at Stuttgart in both 2019 (l. Berrettini) and 2021 (l. Marin Cilic).
- Auger-Aliassime has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He recorded 5-set victories against Zverev in the round of 16 in 2021 and Duckworth in the 1st round last year, but fell to Kokkinakis in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2024. He has an 8-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Auger-Aliassime broke the Top 5 for the first time in November last year and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 4 earlier this month. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He reached the quarterfinals in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur) and reached the final in the boys' doubles with Denis Shapovalov that year losing to Kenneth Raisma/Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final. He was also part of Canadian teams

that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.

- Auger-Aliassime **led Canada to the Davis Cup title in 2022**, defeating Australia in the final. He won 8 of the 9 matches he contested in the competition that year. He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 13-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada will play at home against France in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang.
- **PRIZMIC** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 5th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Prizmic advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Adam Walton 46 76(3) 64 62 in his **first Tour-level match on grass** in the 1st round on Monday.
- Prizmic was **ranked too low to enter qualifying here in 2025**. He has made one appearance in qualifying here – in 2024, when he reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Clement Tabur, l. Hugo Gaston). His victory against Tabur was his only previous match-win on grass, at any professional level, prior to Wimbledon this year.
- Prizmic recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the 2nd round at Roland Garros this year, defeating Michael Zheng for his first Grand Slam match-win before falling to Joao Fonseca in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He fell in the 1st round on his first 3 Grand Slam main draw appearances – as a qualifier at the 2024 Australian Open (l. Novak Djokovic) and at the 2025 US Open (l. Andrey Rublev) and as a lucky loser at the 2026 Australian Open (l. James Duckworth).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Prizmic attempted to qualify at Queen's but fell to Rinky Hijikata in the 1st round of qualifying. His appearances in qualifying at Wimbledon in 2024 and at Queen's this year are his only previous appearances at professional grass court events.
- Prizmic's **best Tour-level results in 2026** are reaching the round of 16 as a qualifier at Rome-1000 (l. Karen Khachanov) and the 3rd round as a qualifier at Madrid-1000 (l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry). He has fallen in the 1st or 2nd round at the 6 other Tour-level events he has contested this year.
- Prizmic has contested **one Challenger-level event in 2026**, finishing runner-up at the Monza Challenger (ITA) (l. Raphael Collignon).
- Prizmic is **bidding to defeat a Top 5 player for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-1 win-loss record against Top 5 players, with both of his previous matches against Top 5 players coming against Djokovic – he fell to No. 1 Djokovic in the 1st round at the 2024 Australian Open but defeated No. 4 Djokovic in the 2nd round at Rome-1000 this year.
- Prizmic has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested – to Duckworth in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year and to Fonseca in the 2nd round at Roland Garros last month.
- Prizmic **broke the Top 100 for the first time** in April this year and reached a career-high ranking of No. 70 last month. He plays here at No. 89.
- Prizmic had a **successful junior career**. He won the boys' singles title at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Juan Carlos Prado Angelo) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 8 in January 2023. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2022 (d. Tanapatt Nirundorn, l. Coleman Wong).
- Prizmic made his **Davis Cup** debut for Croatia at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and has a 3-3 win-loss record in the competition. Croatia will play away against Germany in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Prizmic is coached by Bojan Jelovac and Marko Toi.

A 15th meeting for Djokovic and Tsitsipas and their 4th at a Grand Slam – but their first at Wimbledon or on grass. Tsitsipas won 2 of the pair's first 3 meetings but has since lost 11 consecutive matches against Djokovic.

The pair have contested 2 Grand Slam finals – at 2021 Roland Garros, when Djokovic recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets and claim his 19th major title, and at the 2023 Australian Open, when Djokovic won in straight sets for his 22nd major title. They have met just once since then, with Djokovic recording a straight-sets victory in the quarterfinals at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event.

Excluding a meeting in the group stage at the 2022 ATP Finals, this is the pair's earliest meeting in a tournament. Of their 14 previous meetings, 12 have come at the quarterfinal stage of a tournament or later. They have contested the final at 6 Tour-level events, all of which have been won by Djokovic.

Djokovic has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 87 Tsitsipas once before – to No. 117 Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Djokovic at Wimbledon is No. 75 Marat Safin in the 2nd round in 2008.

- Seven-time Wimbledon champion **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 20th time and extend his Open Era record for most appearances in the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Roger Federer, by reaching the 3rd round here for the 19th time last year.
- Djokovic is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 78th time and extend his **Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles 3rd round appearances**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer, by reaching the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 75th time at the 2025 US Open.
- At 39 years 51 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **6th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon aged 39 or older** – after Pancho Gonzales (1968 and 1969), Torben Ulrich (1968 and 1970), Frank Sedgman (1971), Ken Rosewall (1974 and 1975) and Federer (2021). He was the 2nd-oldest man to begin the men's singles main draw here this year – after Stan Wawrinka (41 years 106 days). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

- Djokovic is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time since turning 39 and become the **6th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at the Grand Slams on multiple occasions aged 39 or older** – after Gonzales and Rosewall (both 8 Grand Slam 3rd round appearances aged 39 or older), Ulrich (4) and Federer and Sedgman (both 2).
- Djokovic has **lost in the 2nd round at Wimbledon once before** – in 2008, when he fell to Marat Safin. It remains his earliest defeat at Wimbledon.
- Djokovic advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Wu Yibing 64 57 64 64 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Djokovic reached the semifinals, falling to Jannik Sinner in straight sets. It was the first time that he had failed to reach the final here since 2017, when he retired due to an elbow injury in the quarterfinals against Tomas Berdych. He won 4 consecutive titles here in 2018-22*, before finishing runner-up here in 2023-24. (*NB no tournament in 2020)
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **8th Wimbledon title** and equal Federer's all-time record for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles. He is also bidding to equal Federer and Helen Wills Moody in 2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon singles titles won among men and women, behind 9-time Wimbledon champion Martina Navratilova.
- Djokovic has contested **10 Wimbledon finals**. His 7 titles came in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer), 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini) and 2022 (d. Nick Kyrgios). He also finished runner-up in 2013 (l. Andy Murray), 2023 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and 2024 (l. Alcaraz).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **25th Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women. His most-recent Grand Slam title-victories came in 2023 – he equalled Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles at the 2023 Australian Open (d. Tsitsipas), claimed sole ownership of the record at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and equalled Margaret Court's all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles among men and women at the 2023 US Open (d. Daniil Medvedev).
- Djokovic reached his **38th Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, falling to Alcaraz in 4 sets. At 38 years 255 days, he became the 2nd player, man or woman, in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam singles final aged 38 or older – after Rosewall, who finished runner-up at 1974 Wimbledon aged 39 years 246 days and at the 1974 US Open aged 39 years 310 days. The oldest player to reach a Grand Slam women's singles final in the Open Era is Serena Williams, who finished runner-up at the 2019 US Open aged 37 years 346 days.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest player in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam men's singles title**. Rosewall, who won the title at the 1972 Australian Open aged 37 years 62 days, is the only man in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title aged 37 or older.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35**. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.
- Djokovic is making his 21st Wimbledon appearance, claiming sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances**, ahead of Jimmy Connors. Federer, who competed in the men's singles here on 22 occasions, is the only player to have made more Wimbledon men's singles appearances than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is making his 83rd Grand Slam appearance overall, extending his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances**. He equalled the previous record, held by Federer and Feliciano Lopez, by making his 81st Grand Slam appearance at the Australian Open this year before claiming sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **104th Wimbledon match-win**. He is in 3rd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon singles matches won, among men and women. Navratilova (120 Wimbledon match-wins) and Federer (105) are first and 2nd on the list, respectively.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his 406th Grand Slam match-win and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles matches won, among men and women**. By defeating Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at 2024 Roland Garros for his 370th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, falling to Joao Fonseca in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was the 2nd time he had lost a match from 2-0 up, after his defeat to Jurgen Melzer in the quarterfinals at 2010 Roland Garros. It was also his joint-earliest defeat at a Grand Slam since falling to Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open – he also fell in the 3rd round at the 2024 US Open (l. Alexei Popyrin).
- Djokovic is contesting his **5th event of the 2026 season here**. In addition to his appearances at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also competed at Indian Wells-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Kamil Majchrzak and Aleksandar Kovacevic before falling to Jack Draper in the round of 16, and at Rome-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round before falling to Dino Prizmic in the 2nd round.
- Djokovic is **one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass**, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles who has not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **102nd Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the all-time list for most Tour-level men's singles titles won – behind Connors (109 titles) and Federer (103).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **9th Tour-level title on grass**. In addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils).
- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the 2023 final. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-10) and has a 41-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked at No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended in June 2024, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He plays here at No. 7.
- Djokovic became the **5th player to complete the career 'Golden Slam' in singles** by winning Olympic singles gold for Serbia at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event, defeating Alcaraz in the final. He joined Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams as the only players to have achieved the feat. He also won Olympic singles bronze at Beijing 2008 and is the only player to have won a medal for Serbia in the Olympic Tennis Event.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 46-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia play at home against Lithuania in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- **TSITSIPAS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 36th Grand Slam overall.
- Tsitsipas is bidding to **reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 18th time – but for the first time since 2024 Roland Garros**, when he reached the quarterfinals (l. Carlos Alcaraz). He has lost in the 1st or 2nd round at the last 8 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Tsitsipas advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Hugo Gaston 61 64 62 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Tsitsipas retired due to a back injury during his 1st round match against Valentin Royer.
- Tsitsipas' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – in 2018 (l. John Isner) and in 2023 (l. Christopher Eubanks)
- Tsitsipas is a **2-time Grand Slam finalist**. He finished runner-up at 2021 Roland Garros, where he fell to Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead, and also lost to Djokovic in the final at the 2023 Australian Open. He is the only Greek player in history to have reached a Grand Slam final.

- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Tsitsipas reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Shintaro Mochizuki, l. Tomas Machac) and Roland Garros (d. Alexandre Muller, l. Matteo Arnaldi).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Tsitsipas competed at Mallorca but fell to Ignacio Buse in the 1st round.
- Tsitsipas' **best results in 2026** are reaching the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Andrey Rublev), the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Casper Ruud) and the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Arthur Fils).
- Tsitsipas has won 3 of the 5 **five-set matches** he has contested in the main draw at Wimbledon, defeating Jared Donaldson in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2018 and both Dominic Thiem and Andy Murray in 5 sets in the opening 2 rounds in 2023, but falling to Thomas Fabbiano in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2019 and Eubanks in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2023. He also won a 5-set match against Joris de Loore in Wimbledon qualifying in 2017. He has an 11-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Tsitsipas' has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2022 Mallorca (d. Roberto Bautista Agut). He is one of 27 players who began the main draw here to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Tsitsipas is a **former Top 5 player**, having reached a career-high ranking of No. 3 in August 2021. He dropped outside the Top 50 for the first time since April 2018 in March this year and plays here at No. 87.
- Tsitsipas is a **former junior world No. 1**. His best Grand Slam singles results as a junior were reaching the semifinals at both Wimbledon (l. Denis Shapovalov) and the US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) in 2016. He also won the boys' doubles title alongside Kenneth Raisma at 2016 Wimbledon (d. Auger-Aliassime/Shapovalov).
- Tsitsipas made his **Davis Cup** debut for Greece at the 2019 Europe Group III event in Athens and has a 17-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. Greece will play away against Slovakia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Tsitsipas is coached by Thomas Perrin.

NO. 8 DANIIL MEDVEDEV v DANIEL MERIDA (ESP)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Medvedev has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 84 Merida on 6 occasions – including once at Wimbledon. He fell to No. 124 Ruben Bemelmans in the 2nd round here on his Wimbledon debut in 2017.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 6th time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 37th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Medvedev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Marin Cilic 61 62 64 in the 1st round on Monday.
- Medvedev has **lost in the 1st round at 4 of the last 5 Grand Slam events**. In 2025, he fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Cameron Norrie), Wimbledon (l. Benjamin Bonzi) and the US Open (l. Bonzi). He also fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year (l. Adam Walton).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Medvedev reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open. He defeated Jesper de Jong, Quentin Halys and Fabian Marozsan before falling to Learner Tien.
- Medvedev's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the semifinals in 2023 and 2024, falling to Carlos Alcaraz on both occasions.
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in straight sets and ending both Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak.
- Medvedev has reached **6 Grand Slam finals**. In addition to his title at the 2021 US Open, he also finished runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Djokovic) and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic), 2022 (l. Nadal) and 2024 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- If Medvedev wins his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 18th Grand Slam appearance after winning his first, he will claim the **Open Era record for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title**. The record is currently held by Marat Safin, who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2000 US Open and won his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 14th attempt at the 2005 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Medvedev reached the semifinals at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Kamil Majchrzak) and the quarterfinals at Halle (l. Daniel Altmaier).
- Medvedev's best results in 2026 are winning his **22nd and 23rd Tour-level titles** – at Brisbane (d. Brandon Nakashima) and Dubai, where Tallon Griekspoor gave a walkover in the final due to a left hamstring injury. By winning his 2nd title at Dubai, he ended a streak of 22 titles won at different events.
- Medvedev's **other Tour-level highlights in 2026** are finishing runner-up at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Sinner) and reaching the semifinals at Rome-1000 (l. Sinner).
- Medvedev has **won one Tour-level grass court title** – at 2021 Mallorca (d. Sam Querrey).

- Medvedev has won 3 of the 7 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon and has a 10-14 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (Djokovic, Nadal, Roger Federer and Andy Murray) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 9.
- Medvedev reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, I. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Thomas Johansson, who reached the semifinals here in 2005, and Rohan Goetzke.
- **MERIDA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 2nd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Merida advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Camilo Ugo Carabelli for his **first Grand Slam match-win** in the 1st round on Monday. Ugo Carabelli won the opening 2 sets before retiring due to a left ankle injury with the score at 46 36 62 3-0.
- Merida made his **Grand Slam main draw debut** at Roland Garros this year, falling to Ben Shelton in the 1st round.
- Merida was **ranked too low to enter qualifying at Wimbledon last year**. He has made 2 appearances in the qualifying draws at the Grand Slams – he reached the final round of qualifying at the 2025 US Open, where he defeated Dalibor Svrčina and Titouan Droguet before falling to Lloyd Harris, and reached the 2nd round of qualifying at the Australian Open this year (d. Oliver Crawford, I. Lukas Klein).
- Merida's best result in 2026 is reaching his **first Tour-level final** as a qualifier at Bucharest, finishing runner-up to Mariano Navone. He defeated Otto Virtanen, Adrian Mannarino, Droguet and Fabian Marozsan in the opening 4 rounds for his first Tour-level match-wins before falling to Navone in the final.
- Merida is bidding to record his **8th Tour-level match-win**. His only Tour-level victories prior to this event came in his runner-up finish at Bucharest and in a 3rd round finish as a qualifier at Madrid-1000 this year, where he defeated Marco Trungelliti and Corentin Moutet before falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas. He lost in the 1st round at the 3 other Tour-level events he has contested prior to Wimbledon – he made his Tour-level debut as a qualifier at Indian Wells-1000 this year, falling to Alex Michelsen in the 1st round, and also fell in the 1st round as a qualifier at Rome-1000 (I. Nikoloz Basilashvili) and as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Merida attempted to qualify at Queen's but fell to Martin Damm in the 1st round of qualifying. It was the only professional event he has contested on grass prior to Wimbledon.
- Merida has contested 7 events at Challenger-level in 2026. His best result is winning his **2nd Challenger-level title** at the Tenerife 1 Challenger (ESP) (d. Francesco Maestrelli). He also finished runner-up at the Perugia Challenger (ITA) (I. Henrique Rocha) and reached the semifinals at the Tenerife 2 Challenger (ESP) (I. Alejandro Moro Canas).
- Merida is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the first time**. He lost his only previous match against a Top 10 player, falling to No. 5 Shelton in the 1st round at Roland Garros. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 30 Moutet in the 2nd round at Madrid-1000 this year.
- Merida **broke the Top 100 for the first time** in May this year and reached a career-high ranking of No. 82 in June. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 84.
- Merida reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 15 in January 2022 and reached the boys' singles quarterfinals at Roland Garros in 2021 (I. Luca van Assche) and 2022 (I. Dino Prizmic). He fell in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon in 2021 (I. Vojtech Petr).
- Merida is coached by Israel Sevilla-Guillermo Martinez.

NO. 16 LEARNER TIEN (USA) v MARTON FUCSOVICS (HUN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Fucsovics has won one of the 3 matches he has played against lefthanded players at Wimbledon. He defeated Jiri Vesely in the 2nd round in 2021 but fell to Gilles Muller in the 1st round in 2017 and to Ben Shelton in the 3rd round last year. He has a 5-3 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams and a 26-26 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- **TIEN** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 10th Grand Slam overall.
- Tien advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Dalibor Svrčina 61 64 67(4) 63 in the 1st round on Monday
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Tien has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round on his Wimbledon debut last year (d. Nishesh Basavareddy, l. Nicolas Jarry).
- Tien recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals at the Australian Open this year. He defeated Marcos Giron, Alexander Shevchenko, Nuno Borges and Daniil Medvedev before falling to Alexander Zverev.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Tien reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Cristian Garin and Facundo Diaz Acosta before falling to Flavio Cobolli.
- Tien's best result in 2026 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Geneva (d. Mariano Navone). His other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Delray Beach (l. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner) and Houston (l. Roman Andres Burruchaga).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Tien reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Max Schoenhaus, l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Tien **won the title at the 2025 Next Gen ATP Finals** in December (d. Alexander Blockx). It was his 2nd consecutive appearance in the final at the Next Gen ATP Finals, having also finished as runner-up in 2024 (l. Joao Fonseca).
- Tien is one of **18 American men who began the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year** – the most since 1995, when 21 Americans contested the men's singles draw here. USA had more players and more seeded players (6) start the men's singles draw here this year than any other nation.
- Tien has won all 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level – against Camilo Ugo Carabelli and Medvedev in the opening 2 rounds at the Australian Open last year, against Giron in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year and against Diaz Acosta in the 2nd round at Roland Garros this year.
- Tien broke the Top 20 for the first time in May this year. He plays here at a **new career-high ranking** of No. 17.
- Tien had a **good junior career**. He reached 2 Grand Slam boys' singles finals in 2023 – at the Australian Open (l. Alexander Blockx) and the US Open (l. Fonseca) – and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 4 in February 2023. He reached the quarterfinals on his only appearance in junior event here, in 2022 (l. Martin Landaluce).
- Tien is coached by Michael Chang, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1994, and Erik Kortland.

- **FUCSOVICS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 36th Grand Slam overall.
- Fucsovics is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time and **equal the all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles 3rd round appearances by a Hungarian player**. Bela von Kehrling (who reached the 3rd round here on 4 occasions in 1927-30) and Jozsef Asboth (1947-49 and 1951) jointly hold the record.
- If Fucsovics and fellow Hungarian Fabian Marozsan (who plays Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in the 2nd round today) both reach the 3rd round here, it will be the **2nd time in history that multiple Hungarian players have reached the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after 1939, when Emil Gabori and Otto Szigeti reached the 3rd round here.
- If Fucsovics and Marozsan both reach the 3rd round here, it will be the **first time that multiple Hungarian players have reached the men's singles 3rd round at a Grand Slam since 1974 Roland Garros**, when Attila Korpas and Balazs Taroczy both reached the 3rd round.
- Fucsovics advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Luca Van Assche in the 1st round on Monday. Van Assche retired with a lower back injury with Fucsovics leading 63 4-0.
- With Fucsovics and Marozsan both reaching the 2nd round here this year, it is the **2nd consecutive year that multiple Hungarian players have reached the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon** after both men reached the 2nd round here last year. 2025 was the first time that multiple Hungarian players reached the men's singles 2nd round here since 1953, when Zoltan Katona and Istvan Sikorszki both reached the 2nd round.
- **Last year here**, Fucsovics reached the 3rd round as a lucky loser. He fell to Chris Rodesch in the final round of qualifying but gained entry to the main draw when Borna Coric withdrew. He defeated both Aleksandar Kovacevic and Gael Monfils in 5 sets before falling to Ben Shelton.
- Fucsovics' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals here in 2021. He defeated Jannik Sinner, Jiri Vesely, Diego Schwartzman and Andrey Rublev before falling to eventual champion Novak Djokovic. He became the first Hungarian man to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal since Balazs Taroczy at 1981 Roland Garros and the first to do so at Wimbledon since Asboth in 1948.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fucsovics reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Camilo Ugo Carabelli, l. Alexander Bublik) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Matteo Berrettini).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Fucsovics reached the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Hubert Hurkacz, l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) but fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Brandon Nakashima).
- Fucsovics' **best result in 2026** is reaching the 3rd round at Indian Wells-1000, where he defeated Christopher O'Connell and Lorenzo Musetti before falling to Arthur Fils. He has fallen in the 1st or 2nd round at the 12 other events he has contested this year.
- Fucsovics has won **one of his last 17 matches against Top 20 players**, with his victory against No. 5 Musetti in the 2nd round at Indian Wells-1000 this year ending a 14-match losing streak against Top 20 players. He has a 20-66 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Fucsovics is bidding to **end a 9-match losing streak against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams**. He has not defeated a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam since defeating No. 7 Rublev in the round of 16 here in 2021. He has a 2-4 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Wimbledon and a 7-19 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams overall.
- Fucsovics has won **3 Tour-level titles** – at 2018 Geneva (d. Peter Gojowczyk), where he became the first Hungarian man to win a Tour-level title since Taroczy at 1982 Hilversum, and at 2024 Bucharest (d. Mariano Navone) and 2025 Winston-Salem (d. Botic van de Zandschulp).
- Fucsovics has won 3 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested here – including his 5-set victories against Kovacevic and Monfils in the opening 2 rounds last year. He defeated Rublev in 5 sets in the round of 16 here in 2021, but fell to Fabio Fognini in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2019. He has an 12-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Fucsovics reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in March 2019. He plays here at No. 76.
- Fucsovics has played **Davis Cup** for Hungary since 2010 and has a 35-22 overall win-loss record in the competition. Hungary will play away against Luxembourg in a 2026 World Group I tie in September.
- Fucsovics is coached by Adam Kellner.

Paul has lost a Tour-level matches to a player ranked as low as No. 200 Kwon twice before – when he retired against No. 204 Martin Damm due to a left ankle injury in the 2nd round at 2024 Miami-1000, and when he fell to No. 507 Jenson Brooksby in the semifinals at 2025 Houston.

- **PAUL** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 28th Grand Slam overall.
- Paul advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Alexandre Muller 61 62 61 for his **50th Grand Slam match-win** in the 1st round on Monday. He became the 3rd active American player to record 50 Grand Slam men's singles match-wins – after Taylor Fritz (68 Grand Slam match-wins) and Frances Tiafoe (61). (NB written prior to the conclusion of Tiafoe's 1st round match)
- **Last year here**, Paul reached the 2nd round (d. Johannus Monday, l. Sebastian Ofner). It was the earliest defeat in his 4 previous Wimbledon appearances.
- Paul's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2024. As No. 12 seed, he defeated Pedro Martinez, Otto Virtanen, Alexander Bublik and Roberto Bautista Agut before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- Paul's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 Australian Open (l. Novak Djokovic).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Paul reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Alcaraz) and the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Casper Ruud).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Paul finished runner-up at Queen's, falling to Francisco Cerundolo in the final.
- Paul's best result in 2026 is winning his **5th Tour-level title** at Houston (d. Roman Andres Burruchaga). His other highlights are finishing runner-up at Delray Beach (l. Sebastian Korda), Hamburg (l. Ignacio Buse) and Queen's, reaching the semifinals at Adelaide (l. Tomas Machac) and reaching the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Arthur Fils).
- Paul won his **first Tour-level title on grass** at 2024 Queen's (d. Lorenzo Musetti), becoming the 8th American man in the Open Era to win the title at Queen's and the first since Sam Querrey in 2010. He is one of 27 players who began the men's singles main draw here to have won a Tour-level title on grass.

- Paul has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, falling to Jiri Lehecka in 5 sets in the 3rd round in 2023 but defeating Virtanen in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2024. He has an 11-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Paul is one of **18 American men who began the singles draw at Wimbledon this year** – the most since 1995, when 21 Americans contested the men's singles draw here. USA had more players and more seeded players (6) in the men's singles draw here this year than any other nation.
- Paul reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 8 in June 2025. He dropped outside the Top 20 for the first time since March 2023 in January this year and has been ranked no higher than No. 18 this season. He plays here at No. 25.
- Paul had a **successful junior career**. He won the 2015 Roland Garros boys' singles title (d. Fritz), finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Fritz) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in September 2015. He reached the quarterfinals on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Patrik-Niklas Salminen).
- Paul made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2020 for USA and has a 6-5 win-loss record in the competition. USA play away against Czechia in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Paul is coached by Brad Stine and Hugo Armando.
- Qualifier **Kwon** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and 21st Grand Slam overall.
- Kwon is bidding to become the **2nd South Korean player in history to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Lee Hyung-Taik, who reached the 3rd round here in 2007.
- Kwon is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time and become the **3rd South Korean player to reach the men's singles 3rd round at the Grand Slams on multiple occasions** – after Lee (6 Grand Slam 3rd round appearances) and Chung Hyeon (3).
- Kwon advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Martin Landaluce 64 63 63 for his **first Grand Slam main draw match-win since 2024 Roland Garros** in the 1st round on Monday.
- Kwon defeated Nikolas Sanchez Izquierdo (ESP) 76(7) 63, No. 18 seed Arthur Gea (FRA) 57 63 64 and Alejandro Moro Canas (ESP) 64 76(6) 63 in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the 2nd time he has successfully qualified at Wimbledon on his 3rd attempt and the 3rd time he has successfully qualified at the Grand Slams on his 7th attempt.
- Kwon is making his **first Grand Slam appearance since the 2024 US Open**, when he fell to Alexei Popyrin in the 1st round. He also fell in the 1st round on his most-recent appearance at Wimbledon in 2024 (l. Holger Rune). Between January 2025 and June 2026, Kwon competed exclusively at events in East Asia while fulfilling South Korean military service.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Kwon has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round here in 2021 (d. Daniel Masur before falling to Dominik Koepfer).
- Kwon's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at 2021 Roland Garros. He defeated Kevin Anderson and Andreas Seppi before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Kwon competed as a lucky loser at the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR), falling to Otto Virtanen in the 1st round of the main draw. It was his first appearance on grass at any level since falling in the 1st round here in 2024.
- Kwon is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win on grass**. Prior to this event, his only Tour-level match-wins on grass came in his 2nd round finish here in 2021 and in a semifinal finish as a lucky loser at 2021 Eastbourne, when he defeated Marton Fucsovics and Ilya Ivashka before falling to Alex de Minaur.
- Kwon is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win in 2026**. His only Tour-level match-wins in 2026 prior to this event came during Korea, Rep.'s Davis Cup Qualifiers 1st Round victory against Argentina in February, when he defeated both Marco Trungelliti and Thiago Agustin Tirante.

- Kwon has contested 7 Challenger events in 2026. His best results at Challenger-level in 2026 are winning his **4th, 5th and 6th Challenger titles** – as a qualifier at **the** Phan Thiet 1 Challenger (VIE) (d. Iliia Simakina), as a wild card at the Gwangju Challenger (KOR) (d. August Holmgren) and as a direct acceptance at the Wuxi Challenger (CHN) (d. Bu Yunchaokete).
- Kwon is bidding to **defeat a Top 30 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all 14 matches he has played against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams, including all 3 matches he has played against Top 30 players at Wimbledon. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 60 Landaluce in the 1st round here this year.
- Kwon has won **one of the last 10 matches he has played against Top 30 players**. He defeated No. 19 Alexander Bublik in Korea, Rep.'s 2025 Davis Cup World Group I victory against Kazakhstan – it was his most-recent match against a Top 30 player, ending a 9-match losing streak against Top 30 players. He has a 7-32 win-loss record against top 30 players at Tour-level overall.
- Kwon has won **2 Tour-level titles** – at 2021 Nur-Sultan (d. James Duckworth) and 2023 Adelaide 2 (d. Roberto Bautista Agut), where he became the first South Korean man to win multiple Tour-level titles. Lee is the only other South Korean man to win a Tour-level singles title, having won the title at 2003 Sydney.
- Kwon has won one of the 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only victory in a 5-set match coming against Rune in the 1st round at the 2022 Australian Open. He lost to Koepfer in the 2nd round here in 2021 in the only 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon.
- Kwon reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 52 in November 2021. He fell as low as No. 865 in February 2024 but broke back inside the Top 200 for the first time since January 2024 in May this year. He plays here at No. 200.
- Kwon made his **Davis Cup** debut for Korea, Rep. in 2017 and has a 15-11 win-loss record in the competition. Korea, Rep. will play at home against India in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Kwon reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 46 in March 2015 and reached the boys' singles 2nd round at the 2015 Australian Open in the only Grand Slam event he contested as a junior (d. Jumpei Kamasaki, I. Jurabek Karimov).
- Kwon is coached by Daniel Yoo.

- **DAVIDOVICH FOKINA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 25th Grand Slam overall.
- Davidovich Fokina advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Juan Manuel Cerundolo 64 64 76(4) in the 1st round on Monday.
- Davidovich Fokina's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round on his 2 most recent appearances here – in 2023, when he defeated Arthur Fils and Botic van de Zandschulp before falling to Holger Rune in 5 sets, and last year, when he defeated Brandon Holt and Van de Zandschulp before falling to Taylor Fritz. He missed Wimbledon in 2024 due to a back injury.
- Davidovich Fokina's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2021 Roland Garros, where he defeated Mikhail Kukushkin, Van De Zandschulp, Casper Ruud and Federico Delbonis before falling to Alexander Zverev.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Davidovich Fokina reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where defeated Filip Misolic and Reilly Opelka in the opening 2 rounds before retiring against Tommy Paul. He reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Damir Dzumhur, l. Thiago Agustín Tirante).
- Davidovich Fokina won his **first Tour-level title** at Mallorca last week, defeating Ethan Quinn in the final. He had previously lost in 5 Tour-level finals, 4 of which came in 2025. Elsewhere on grass this season, he reached the quarterfinals at Queen's (l. Tommy Paul) but fell in the 1st round at Stuttgart (l. Mattia Bellucci).
- Davidovich Fokina's **other highlights in 2026** are reaching the semifinals at Adelaide (l. Ugo Humbert) and the quarterfinals at Dallas (l. Denis Shapovalov).
- Davidovich Fokina has won one of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He defeated Hubert Hurkacz in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2022, but lost 5-set matches here to Denis Kudla in the 1st round in 2021, to Jiri Vesely in the 2nd round in 2022 and to Rune in the 3rd round in 2023. He has an 11-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Davidovich Fokina broke the Top 20 for the first time in July 2025 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 14 in November. He plays here at No. 23.
- In 2017, Davidovich Fokina became the **first Spanish boys' singles champion at Wimbledon** since Manuel Orantes in 1967, defeating Axel Geller in the title match. He is one of 5 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions who began the men's main draw here this year. He also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Alexei Popyrin) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in July that year.

- Davidovich Fokina made his **Davis Cup** debut for Spain in 2022 and has a 1-5 overall win-loss record in the competition. Spain will play away against Chile in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Davidovich Fokina is coached by Jose Clavet.
- **MAROZSAN** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 13th Grand Slam overall.
- Marozsan is bidding to become the **10th Hungarian player in history to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Jozsef Asboth and Bela von Kehrling (both 4 appearances in the 3rd round here), Marton Fucsovics (who is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time this year), Balazs Taroczy (2) and Szabolcs Baranyi, Emil Gabori, Emil Gabrowitz, Istvan Gulyas and Otto Szigeti (all one).
- If Marozsan and Fucsovics (who plays Learner Tien in the 2nd round today) both reach the 3rd round here, it will be the **2nd time in history that multiple Hungarian players have reached the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after 1939, when Gabori and Szigeti both reached the 3rd round here.
- If Marozsan and Fucsovics both reach the 3rd round here, it will be the **first time that multiple Hungarian players have reached the men's singles 3rd round at a Grand Slam since 1974 Roland Garros**, when Attila Korpas and Taroczy both reached the 3rd round.
- Marozsan advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Thiago Agustin Tirante 75 63 64 in the 1st round on Monday.
- With Marozsan and Fucsovics both reaching the 2nd round here this year, it is the **2nd consecutive year that multiple Hungarian players have reached the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon** after both men also reached the 2nd round here last year. It was the first time that multiple Hungarian players reached the men's singles 2nd round here since 1953, when Zoltan Katona and Istvan Sikorszki both reached the 2nd round.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Marozsan has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round here last year, when he defeated James McCabe for his first Wimbledon match-win before falling to Jaume Munar.
- Marozsan's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on all 3 of his appearances at the Australian Open – in 2024 (l. Taylor Fritz), 2025 (l. Lorenzo Sonego) and this year (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Marozsan fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Miomir Kecmanovic).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Marozsan reached the semifinals at Mallorca, defeating Alex Molcan, Alejandro Tabilo and Kecmanovic before falling to Davidovich Fokina. He also reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Kecmanovic, l. Fritz) but fell in the 1st round at Stuttgart (l. Gauthier Onclin).
- Marozsan's **other highlights in 2026** are reaching the semifinals at Auckland (l. Jakub Mensik) and Bucharest (l. Daniel Merida).
- Marozsan is bidding to **defeat a Top 30 player at a Grand Slam for the 4th time**. He has a 3-5 win-loss record against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams, with all 3 of his victories coming at the Australian Open – against No. 21 Francisco Cerundolo in the 2nd round in 2024, against No. 16 Frances Tiafoe in the 2nd round in 2025 and against No. 28 Arthur Rinderknech in the 1st round this year.
- Marozsan is bidding to end a **5-match losing streak against Top 30 players at Tour-level**, having not defeated a Top 30 player since defeating No. 28 Rinderknech in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year. He has a 15-37 win-loss record against Top 30 players.
- Marozsan has won 4 of the 5 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level, with his only defeat coming against Medvedev in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year. He has never contested a 5-set match in the main draw here, but did contest a 5-set match in Wimbledon qualifying in 2023, falling to Maximilian Marterer in the final round of qualifying.
- Marozsan reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 36 in May 2024. He plays here at No. 53.
- Marozsan made his **Davis Cup** debut for Hungary in 2021 and has a 6-11 overall win-loss record in the competition. Hungary will play away against Luxembourg in a World Group I tie in September.
- Marozsan is coached here by Gyorgy Balazs and Roman Hajdusik.

A 2nd meeting for Jodar and Carreno Busta – and their 2nd at consecutive Grand Slam events, with Jodar having won in 5 sets in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year.

That victory was Jodar's first successful comeback from 0-2 down. It was the 6th time that Carreno Busta had lost a match from 2-0 up – he also lost from 2-0 up against Mikhail Youzhny in the 1st round at 2014 Roland Garros, against Kei Nishikori in the round of 16 at the 2019 Australian Open, against Alexander Zverev in the semifinals at the 2020 US Open, against Maxime Cressy in the 1st round at the 2021 US Open and against Benjamin Bonzi in the 2nd round at the 2023 Australian Open.

This is the 13th men's singles match between 2 Spanish players at Wimbledon in the Open Era – and the first since 2015, when Pablo Andujar defeated Guillermo Garcia-Lopez in the 1st round.

This is the 177th men's singles match between 2 Spanish players at the Grand Slams in the Open Era. There have been far fewer all-Spanish men's singles matches at Wimbledon in the Open Era than at the other Grand Slam tournaments – there have been 90 all-Spanish men's singles matches at Roland Garros in the Open Era, 44 at the US Open and 30 at the Australian Open.

Jodar has won both of his previous Tour-level matches against Spanish players. In addition to his victory against Carreno Busta at Roland Garros last month, he defeated Jaume Munar in the 1st round at Barcelona in April.

Carreno Busta lost his only previous match against a Spanish player at Wimbledon – on his debut here in 2014, when he fell to David Ferrer in the 1st round. He has a 2-5 win-loss record against Spanish players at the Grand Slams and a 30-28 win-loss record against Spanish players at Tour-level overall.

- **JODAR** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 3rd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- At 19 years 298 days, Jodar is bidding to become the **3rd Spanish teenager in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Rafael Nadal (who reached the 3rd round here aged 17 years 33 days in 2003) and Carlos Alcaraz (who reached the 3rd round here aged 19 years 66 days in 2022). (NB age calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Jodar is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time and become the **4th Spanish teenager in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 3rd round at the Grand Slams on multiple occasions** – after Alcaraz (6 Grand Slam 3rd round appearances as a teenager), Nadal (5*) and Tommy Robredo (2). (*NB Nadal also reached the 3rd round during the tournament he turned 20, at 2006 Roland Garros)
- Jodar advanced to the 2nd round after defeating wild card Felix Gill 63 63 75 for his **first Wimbledon match-win** in the 1st round on Monday.

- By reaching the 2nd round here, Jodar has become the **6th Spanish teenager in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon** – after Jose Moreno Tallada (1973), Sergi Bruguera (1990), Tommy Robredo (2001), Nadal (2003 and 2005) and Alcaraz (2021-22).
- Jodar recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals on his Roland Garros debut this year. He defeated Aleksandar Kovacevic, James Duckworth, Alex Michelsen and Carreno Busta before falling to Alexander Zverev in the last 8.
- Jodar made his **Grand Slam debut** as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year, successfully qualifying for a Grand Slam on his first attempt. He defeated Rei Sakamoto in 5 sets in the 1st round before falling to No. 16 seed Jakub Mensik in the 2nd round. He was not ranked high enough to enter qualifying at any Grand Slam tournaments prior to this season.
- Jodar's best result in 2026 is winning his **first Tour-level title** at Marrakech this year (d. Marco Trungelliti). He also reached the semifinals as a wild card at Barcelona (l. Arthur Fils) and reached the quarterfinals as a wild card at Madrid-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner), and as a direct acceptance at Rome-1000 (l. Luciano Darderi) and Roland Garros.
- Jodar has also contested **one Challenger-level event in 2026**, finishing runner-up as a qualifier at the Canberra Challenger (AUS) (l. Alexander Blockx).
- Jodar **made his Tour-level debut at the 2025 Next Gen ATP Finals**, where he won 2 of the 3 matches he contested in the group stage but did not advance to the semifinals.
- Jodar is contesting his **first professional event on grass**, at any level. He withdrew from Queen's due to an abdominal injury and is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon. He contested 2 events on grass as a junior in 2024 – he won the title at J300 Roehampton (GBR) (d. Charlie Robertson) before reaching the boys' singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon (l. Naoya Honda).
- Jodar has won all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level – against Sakamoto in the 1st round at the Australian Open and against both Michelsen in the 3rd round and Carreno Busta in the round of 16 at Roland Garros. His victory against Carreno Busta was his first successful comeback from 0-2 down.
- Jodar broke the Top 500, Top 400, Top 300 and Top 200 for the first time in 2025. He broke the Top 100 for the first time in March this year, before breaking the Top 50 for the first time in April after his semifinal finish at Barcelona. He reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 23 earlier this month and plays here 3 places lower at No. 26.
- Jodar had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 4 after winning the boys' singles title at the 2024 US Open (d. Nicolai Budkov Kjaer). He also finished runner-up at the 2024 ITF World Tennis Tour Junior Finals (l. Mees Rottgering). His quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2024 was his only appearance in the junior event at Wimbledon.
- Jodar **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Virginia for one season in 2024-25 and was named an ITA all-American in singles. He turned professional in December 2025, forfeiting his college eligibility.
- Jodar is coached by his father, Rafael Sr.
- **CARRENO BUSTA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 44th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Carreno Busta advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Denis Shapovlov for his **first Wimbledon match-win** in the 1st round on Monday. Carreno Busta was leading 63 76(7) when Shapovalov retired due to a left shoulder injury.
- By reaching the 2nd round here for the first time on his 8th attempt, Carreno Busta has set a **new Open Era record for most attempts before winning a men's singles match at Wimbledon** – ahead of Jeff Tarango and Paolo Lorenzi, who both recorded their first Wimbledon match-wins on their 7th appearances in the main draw here.
- Carreno Busta **lost in the 1st round on all 7 of his previous Wimbledon appearances** – on his debut here in 2014 (l. David Ferrer), and in 2015 (l. Gael Monfils), 2016 (l. Milos Raonic), 2018 (l. Radu Albot), 2019 (l. Alexei Popyrin), 2021 (l. Sam Querrey) and 2022 (l. Dusan Lajovic).
- Carreno Busta is making his **first Wimbledon appearance since 2022**. He withdrew from the tournament in 2023-25. He has struggled with knee, leg and elbow injuries in recent years, dropping outside the Top 1000 in January 2024 and played just 9 professional events in the 18-month period between January 2023 and June 2024.

- Carreno Busta's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions – at the US Open in 2017 (l. Kevin Anderson) and 2020 (l. Alexander Zverev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Carreno Busta reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros, where he defeated Jiri Lehecka, Thanasi Kokkinakis and Thiago Agustin Tirante before falling to Jodar, but fell to Jakub Mensik in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Carreno Busta is bidding to record his **8th Tour-level match-win in 2026**. He recorded just 3 victories at Tour-level prior to Roland Garros – in 2nd round finishes at Montpellier (d. Miomir Kecmanovic, l. Tallon Griekspoor), as a qualifier at Dubai (d. Denis Shapovalov, l. Jiri Lehecka) and as a wild card at Madrid-1000 (d. Marton Fucsovics, l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina).
- Carreno Busta has contested 3 events at Challenger-level this season. His best result is winning his **15th Challenger-level title** at the Murcia Challenger (ESP) (d. Roberto Carballes Baena). He also finished runner-up at the Alicante Challenger (ESP) (l. Pablo Llamas Ruiz) and reached the quarterfinals at the Valencia Challenger (ESP), where he gave a walkover to Jaume Munar due to a right shoulder injury.
- Carreno Busta is contesting his **first grass court event since 2024 Mallorca**, where he fell to Carballes Baena in the 1st round. That event was his only appearance on grass, at any level, since his last Wimbledon appearance in 2022. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Carreno Busta's **best grass court performances** are reaching the semifinals at 2019 Antalya (l. Lorenzo Sonego) and 2021 Mallorca (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- Carreno Busta has **won one the last 15 matches he has contested against Top 30 players**, with his only victory against a Top 30 player in that time coming against No. 12 Lehecka in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year. He has a 58-106 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Tour-level and an 11-24 win-loss record against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams.
- Carreno Busta has won one of the last 8 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only victory in a 5-set match in that time coming against Griekspoor in the 2nd round at the 2022 Australian Open. He has a 7-16 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Carreno Busta is a **former Top 10 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 10 in September 2017. He plays here at No. 71.
- Carreno Busta won the **men's singles bronze medal at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event** in 2021. He fell to Karen Khachanov in the semifinals before defeating Novak Djokovic in the bronze medal match.
- Carreno Busta made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2016 and has an 8-11 win-loss record the competition. He won 2 of the 5 singles matches he contested in the competition in 2025 as Spain finished as runners-up to Italy. He was also a member of the Spanish team that won the nation's 6th Davis Cup title in 2019. As runners-up last year, Spain received a bye to the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round and will play away against Chile in September.
- Carreno Busta is coached by Victor Lopez Moron.

- **FONSECA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 7th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Fonseca is bidding to become the **6th Brazilian player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Jose-Edison Mandarino (who reached the 3rd round here in 1968 and 1970*), Carlos Kirmayr (1976 and 1981), Cassio Motta (1983-84), Gustavo Kuerten (1999-2000) and Flavio Saretta (2002-03). (*NB Mandarino also reached the 3rd round here prior to the Open Era, in 1967)
- Fonseca advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Roberto Bautista Agut 76(4) 64 63 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Fonseca reached the 3rd round on his Wimbledon debut, defeating Jacob Fearnley and Jenson Brooksby before falling to qualifier Nicolas Jarry. He became the 10th Brazilian player to reach the men's singles 3rd round here in the Open Era – and the first since Thomaz Belucci in 2010. Aged 18 years 326 days, he also became the youngest player to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon since 2011, when Bernard Tomic reached the quarterfinals here aged 18 years 255 days. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Fonseca recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros this year, defeating Luka Pavlovic, Dino Prizmic, Novak Djokovic and Casper Ruud before falling to Jakub Mensik. He recovered from 0-2 down to defeat both Prizmic and Djokovic in 5 sets – his first victories in 5-set matches. He has a 2-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall but has not contested a 5-set match here.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fonseca fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Eliot Spizzirri). It is the only time he has lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam.

- Fonseca won his **first 2 Tour-level titles in 2025** – at Buenos Aires (d. Francisco Cerundolo) and Basel (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina). He also won the title at the 2024 Next Gen ATP Finals (d. Learner Tien).
- Fonseca is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win on grass**. Prior to Wimbledon this year, his only Tour-level match-wins on the surface came last year, in his 3rd round finish here and in a 2nd round finish at Eastbourne (d. Zizou Bergs, l. Taylor Fritz).
- Fonseca broke the Top 50 for the first time in July last year after reaching the 3rd round here. He reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 24 in November and plays here 3 places lower at No. 27.

- Fonseca is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the top of the boys' rankings for the first time in September 2023 after winning the boys' singles title at the 2023 US Open (d. Tien). He reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles here in 2023 (l. Henry Searle).
- Fonseca made his **Davis Cup** debut for Brazil at the 2024 Finals Group Stage and has a 4-2 win-loss record in the competition. Brazil will play at home against Switzerland in a 2026 World Group I tie in September.
- Fonseca is coached by Guilherme Teixeira.
- **DE JONG** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- De Jong advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Rinky Hijikata 76(4) 36 57 64 63 in a 1st round match which began on Monday and concluded on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon debut, De Jong reached the 2nd round. He defeated Christopher Eubanks in 5 sets before falling to Miomir Kecmanovic.
- De Jong recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the round of 16 as a lucky loser at Roland Garros this year. He fell to Michael Zheng in the final round of qualifying but gained entry to the main draw after Arthur Fils withdrew. He defeated Stan Wawrinka, Federico Cina and Karen Khachanov before falling to eventual champion Alexander Zverev. He became the first lucky loser to reach the round of 16 at Roland Garros since David Goffin in 2012.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, De Jong fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- De Jong is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win of 2026**. His only victories at Tour-level this year prior to this event came in his round of 16 finish at Roland Garros, and during Netherlands' Davis Cup Qualifiers 1st Round defeat to India, in which he lost to Dhakshinewar Suresh before defeating Sumit Nagal. He has lost in the 1st round at the 7 other Tour-level events he has contested this season.
- De Jong has contested 5 events at Challenger-level in 2026. His best result is winning his **4th Challenger-level title** at the Cattolica Challenger (ITA) (d. Roberto Carballes Baena). His other highlights are reaching the semifinals at the Murcia Challenger (ESP) (l. Carballes Baena) and the quarterfinals at the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Gianluca Cadenasso).
- De Jong is bidding to record his **3rd Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only victories in Tour-level grass court matches have come in the 1st round here in 2025 and this year. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- De Jong is bidding to **defeat a Top 30 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-5 win-loss record against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams, with his only victory coming against No. 15 Khachanov in the 3rd round at Roland Garros this year. He has a 4-13 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Tour-level overall.
- De Jong has won both **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Eubanks in the 1st round last year and against Hijikata in the 1st round this year. He has a 5-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall, with his only defeat in a 5-set match coming against Brandon Nakashima in the 1st round at the US Open last year.
- De Jong broke the Top 100 for the first time in March last year and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 71 in January. He plays here at No. 73.
- De Jong reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 38 in May 2018. He reached the 2nd round of the boys' singles here in 2018 (d. Titouan Droguet, l. Tristan Boyer) but fell in the 1st round of the boys' singles in 2017 (l. Brian Cernoch).
- De Jong made his **Davis Cup** debut for Netherlands in 2025 and has a 2-2 win-loss record in the competition. He was a member of the Dutch team which finished as runners-up in 2024 but did not contest a match. Netherlands will play at home against Colombia in a World Group I tie in September.
- De Jong is coached by Bas van Bentum.

- Struff's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round on 4 occasions – including last year, when he defeated Filip Misolic and Felix Auger-Aliassime before falling to Carlos Alcaraz. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2018 (l. Roger Federer), 2019 (l. Mikhail Kukushkin) and 2024 (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- Struff's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 3 occasions – at Roland Garros in 2019 (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2021 (l. Diego Schwartzman), and as a qualifier at the 2025 US Open (l. Djokovic).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Struff reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Alexander Bublik, l. Jaime Faria) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Vit Kopriva).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Struff reached the 2nd round at Stuttgart (d. Alexis Galarneau, l. Alexander Bublik) and as a wild card at Mallorca (d. Martin Landaluce, l. Nuno Borges).
- Struff is bidding to record **back-to-back match-wins at a Tour-level event for the first time since October 2025**, when he defeated Mackenzie McDonald and Karen Khachanov to reach the quarterfinals at Almaty before falling to Corentin Moutet. He has lost in the 1st or 2nd round at all 12 Tour-level events he has contested prior to Wimbledon in 2026.
- Struff has reached **one Tour-level final on grass** – at 2023 Stuttgart, where he finished runner-up to Frances Tiafoe.
- Struff reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 21 in June 2023. He plays here at No. 74.
- Struff made his **Davis Cup** debut for Germany in 2015 and has a 21-12 win-loss record in the competition overall. Germany will play at home against Croatia in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Struff is coached by Markus Wislsperger.

- **BUSE** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 3rd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Buse is bidding to become the **first Peruvian player in history to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon**. Laura Gildemeister is the only Peruvian player in history, man or woman, to reach the singles 3rd round here, having reached the women's singles 3rd round here on 5 occasions, in 1987 and 1989-92.
- Buse is also bidding to become the **5th Peruvian player in history to reach the men's singles 3rd round at a Grand Slam** – after Jaime Yzaga (11 Grand Slam 3rd round appearances), Luis Horna (2) and Pablo Arraya and Juan Pablo Varillas (both one).
- Buse advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Emilio Nava 76(3) 36 75 60 for his **first Grand Slam match-win** in the 1st round on Monday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Buse has become the **3rd Peruvian player in history to reach the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon** – after his great uncle, Enrique Buse (who reached the 2nd round here in 1946) and Yzaga (who reached the 2nd round here in 1991-92 and 1994).
- Buse **lost in the 1st round on his previous 2 Grand Slam main draw appearances** – as a qualifier at the 2025 US Open (l. Ben Shelton) and as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros this year (l. Andrey Rublev). He was not ranked high enough to enter the main draw at the Australian Open this year and did not enter the qualifying draw.
- **Last year here**, Buse fell in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Arthur Cazaux). It was his first appearance on grass at any professional level.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Buse reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Marcos Giron, l. Brandon Nakashima) and Mallorca (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas, l. Vit Kopriva). They were his first appearances at Tour-level grass court events.
- Buse's best result in 2026 is winning his **first Tour-level title** as a qualifier at Hamburg (d. Tommy Paul), becoming the first Peruvian man to win a Tour-level singles title since Horna won the title at 2007 Vina del Mar. He also reached the semifinals at Rio de Janeiro (l. Alejandro Tabilo).
- Buse broke the Top 100 for the first time in January and **broke the Top 50 for the first time** in May after winning the title at Hamburg, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 31. He plays here at No. 34.
- Buse had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 9 in January 2022 and reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2022 (d. Cooper Williams, l. Alexander Blockx).
- Buse made his **Davis Cup** debut for Peru in 2023 and has a 7-4 win-loss record in the competition. Peru will play at home against Paraguay in a World Group I tie in September.
- Buse is coached by Juan Lizariturry.

- **BROOKSBY** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and 15th Grand Slam overall.
- Brooksby advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Aleksandar Vukic 76(7) 61 61 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Brooksby reached the 2nd round, defeating Tallon Griekspoor before falling to Joao Fonseca.
- Brooksby's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round in 2022. He defeated Mikhail Kukushkin and Benjamin Bonzi before falling to Cristian Garin.
- Brooksby's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 as a wild card at the 2021 US Open, where he defeated Mikael Ymer, Taylor Fritz and Aslan Karatsev before falling to Novak Djokovic. Aged 20 years 321 days, he became the youngest American man to reach the round of 16 at the US Open since Andy Roddick (19 years 10 days) in 2001.
- **At the Grand Slams in 2026**, Brooksby fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Alexander Bublik) and Roland Garros (l. Mariano Navone).
- Brooksby's **best Tour-level result in 2026** is reaching the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Daniil Medvedev). He has fallen in the 1st or 2nd round at the 14 other Tour-level events he has contested in 2026 prior to Wimbledon.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Brooksby reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Martin Damm, l. Francisco Cerundolo) and Eastbourne (d. Vukic, l. Ugo Humbert) but fell in the 1st round at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Zhang Zhizhen). His 2nd round finish at Queen's ended an 8-match Tour-level losing streak – he had previously not recorded a victory since reaching the 2nd round at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Alexei Popyrin, l. Frances Tiafoe).
- Brooksby has reached **2 Tour-level finals on grass**. He finished runner-up at 2021 Newport (l. Kevin Anderson) and as a lucky loser at 2025 Eastbourne (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Brooksby has **won one of the last 14 matches he has played against Top 40 players**, with his only victory against a Top 40 player in that time coming against No. 16 Karen Khachanov in the 2nd round at Dubai this year. He has a 23-40 win-loss record against Top 40 players at Tour-level overall.
- Brooksby is one of **18 American men who began the singles draw at Wimbledon this year** – the most since 1995, when 21 Americans contested the men's singles draw here. USA had more players in the men's singles draw here this year than any other nation.
- Brooksby has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested, all at the US Open, defeating Karatsev in the 3rd round in 2021 and Vukic in the 1st round last year before falling to Flavio Cobolli in the 2nd round last year.
- Brooksby reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 33 in June 2022. He broke back inside the Top 50 for the first time since March 2023 in December last year but has been ranked between No. 50 and No. 100 since April. He plays here at No. 81.
- Brooksby **missed 2 years on Tour from January 2023 to January 2025**. He did not contest an event, at any level, between the 2023 Australian Open and the 2025 Australian Open. He underwent left wrist surgery in March 2023 and right wrist surgery in May 2023 and served a 13-month anti-doping suspension. He was eligible to return to competition from March 2024.
- Brooksby contested his **only junior Grand Slam event at the 2018 US Open** – where, as a wild card, he reached the semifinals (l. Lorenzo Musetti). He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 54 and only competed at junior events in North America.
- Brooksby is currently without a permanent coach.
