2026 WIMBLEDON DAY 4 MEN'S NOTES Thursday 2 July 2nd Round – Bottom Half

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On court today...

- Matteo Berrettini ended the Wimbledon career of Stan Wawrinka on Tuesday, winning a 4-set match in which all 4 sets went to tiebreaks – just the 11th example of a men's singles match with 4 tiebreaks in Wimbledon history. His reward for doing so is a clash with French star Arthur Fils on Centre Court today. Both men have struggled with injuries in recent years (indeed, their only previous meeting, at 2024 Tokyo, ended prematurely, with Berrettini retiring due to an abdominal injury) but fans will hope that the pair stay healthy, as both have displayed some of their best form in 2026. Fils won his 4th Tour-level title at Barcelona in April, while Berrettini advanced to a Grand Slam quarterfinal for the first time in more than 3 years at Roland Garros.
- Roland Garros champion Alexander Zverev faces France's Valentin Royer on No. 1 Court today, with Zverev aiming for another victory that would take him a step closer to a first Wimbledon final. The German has reached the final at the 3 other Grand Slam events, but his best result at Wimbledon remains 3 appearances in the round of 16. Should he continue his recent good form and go all the way to the final here, he would become the 13th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments – and the 3rd to do so in the last 12 months, after Jannik Sinner at 2025 Wimbledon and Carlos Alcaraz at the 2026 Australian Open. If Royer is going to be the man to stop him today, the Frenchman will need to record his first victory against a Top 5 player on his 4th attempt.
- Grigor Dimitrov's 2025 Wimbledon campaign ended in a painful retirement while 2 sets up against Sinner, so he will have been delighted with a solid performance and straight-sets victory against Dane Sweeny on his Wimbledon return on Tuesday. Dimitrov, who is competing here as a wild card this year, now faces Czechia's Jakub Mensik in the final match of the day on No. 1 Court. Mensik needed 5 sets to dispatch another wild card, Toby Samuel, in the 1st round here, and will hope he can record another victory today against the 2014 semifinalist. The Czech 20-year-old reached his first Grand Slam semifinal at Roland Garros last month and will hope to continue form at this major event.
- Just 3 British men advanced to the 2nd round here this year – and all 3 are in action today. Jan Choinski, who broke the Top 100 for the first time this week, faces Frances Tiafoe, while wild cards Arthur Fery and Jacob Fearnley are up against Otto Virtanen and Jaume Munar, respectively. Should either Fery or Fearnley reach the 3rd round here, they would become the 4th British wild card to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon since 2000. Should both British wild cards advance, it will be the 3rd time in the Open Era that multiple British wild cards have reached the 3rd round of the men's singles at Wimbledon – after 1993 (when Andrew Foster and Chris Wilkinson both reached the 3rd round here) and 1997 (when Mark Petchey and Andrew Richardson did so).

NO. 2 ALEXANDER ZVEREV (GER) v VALENTIN ROYER (FRA)

Head-to-head: Zverev leads 1-0

A 2nd meeting for Zverev and Royer, but their first at a Grand Slam or on grass. Zverev won their only previous meeting, which came at Masters-1000 level last year.

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to record his 50th Tour-level match-win on grass and become the 8th active player to record 50 Tour-level match-wins on grass.
- Zverev is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 7th time. This is his 10th Wimbledon appearance and his 42nd Grand Slam overall.
- Zverev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Alexander Blockx 64 67(8) 76(5) 76(0) in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, Zverev fell to Arthur Rinderknech in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Zverev's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 on 3 occasions – in 2017 (l. Milos Raonic), 2021 (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and 2024 (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Zverev won his **first Grand Slam title** at Roland Garros this year, defeating Flavio Cobolli in 5 sets in the final. By winning his first Grand Slam title on his 41st appearance at a major, he went 2nd on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances before winning a first title – after Goran Ivanisevic, who won the title here in 2001 on his 48th major appearance. He also became the first German player to win a Grand Slam men's singles title since Boris Becker at the 1996 Australian Open.
- Zverev has reached **3 other Grand Slam finals**. In addition to his title at Roland Garros this year, he finished runner-up at the 2020 US Open (l. Dominic Thiem), 2024 Roland Garros (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the 2025 Australian Open (l. Sinner).
- Zverev is bidding to become the **3rd German man to win the Wimbledon title in the Open Era**, after Becker (1985-86, 1989) and Michael Stich (1991).
- Zverev is bidding to win his 2nd Grand Slam title on his first Grand Slam appearance since winning his first major title and set the **Open Era record for fewest attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title**. In the Open Era, 7 players have won their 2nd Grand Slam men's singles titles on their 2nd appearances after winning their first – Alcaraz, Sergi Bruguera, Roger Federer, Jan Kodes, Murray, Stan Smith and Guillermo Vilas.
- Zverev is bidding to become the **14th man in history to win back-to-back Roland Garros and Wimbledon titles** – and the 7th in the Open Era after Rod Laver (1969*), Bjorn Borg (1978-80), Rafael Nadal (2008, 2010), Federer (2009), Novak Djokovic (2021) and Alcaraz (2024). (*NB Laver also achieved the feat prior to the Open Era, in 1962)
- If Zverev reaches the final here, he will become the **13th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments** – and the 4th player in the Open Era to complete the set of Grand Slam final appearances at Wimbledon, after Ivan Lendl (1986), Jim Courier (1993) and Sinner (2025). He would also become the 3rd player to achieve the feat in the last 12 months, after Sinner at 2025 Wimbledon and Alcaraz at the Australian Open this year.

- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Alcaraz).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at Halle (l. Fritz).
- Zverev's **other highlights in 2026** are finishing runner-up at Madrid-1000 (l. Sinner) and reaching the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Sinner), Miami-1000 (l. Sinner), Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Sinner) and Munich (l. Cobolli).
- Zverev has won 3 of the 8 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 24-15 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Zverev has reached **3 Tour-level finals on grass** – at Halle in both 2016 (l. Florian Mayer) and 2017 (l. Roger Federer) and at Stuttgart last year (l. Fritz).
- Zverev reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after reaching the semifinals at 2022 Roland Garros. He plays here at No. 3.
- Zverev **won Olympic singles gold for Germany** at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event in 2021, defeating Russian Olympic Committee's Karen Khachanov in the final. It was Germany's 3rd Olympic gold medal in tennis – after Steffi Graf in women's singles at Seoul 1988 and Becker/Stich in men's doubles at Barcelona 1992. He reached the quarterfinals on his title defence at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event (l. Musetti).
- Zverev was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2014 Australian Open, defeating Stefan Kozlov in the final. He also finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2013 Roland Garros (l. Christian Garin) and was named 2013 Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (l. Kozlov).
- Zverev has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2016 and has an 11-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Germany will play at home against Croatia in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- **ROYER** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 6th Grand Slam overall.
- Royer advanced to the 2nd round after defeating wild card Harry Wendelken 46 63 63 63 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, as a qualifier on his Wimbledon debut, Royer reached the 2nd round. He defeated Stefanos Tsitsipas for his first Tour-level match-win when Tsitsipas retired due to a back injury in the 1st round before falling to Adrian Mannarino.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Royer has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. In addition to his 2nd round finish here last year, he also reached the 2nd round as a wild card at the 2025 US Open (d. Bu Yunchaokete, l. Denis Shapovalov) and as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros this year (d. Hugo Dellien, l. Novak Djokovic).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Royer fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Royer is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win in 2026**. Prior to this event, his only Tour-level match-wins this year had come in 2nd round finishes at Doha (d. Pierre-Hugues Herbert, l. Carlos Alcaraz) and Roland Garros. He lost in the 1st round at the 12 other Tour-level events he has contested this season.
- Royer has competed at **6 Challenger-level events this season**. His best results are finishing runner-up at the Oeiras 3 Challenger (POR) (l. Roman Safiullin) and reaching the quarterfinals at the Cap Cana Challenger (DOM) (l. Mariano Navone) and the Monza Challenger (ITA) (l. Dino Prizmic).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Royer competed at Mallorca but fell to Ethan Quinn in the 1st round. His appearance at Mallorca was just his 2nd Tour-level event on grass, after making his Tour-level debut on grass here last year.
- Royer is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time**. He has lost all 3 matches he has contested against Top 5 players, including his only previous match against a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam – against No. 4 Djokovic in the 2nd round at Roland Garros this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 14 Andrey Rublev in the 2nd round at 2025 Hangzhou.

- Royer lost the only **5-set match** he has contested – on his Grand Slam and Tour-level debut at 2025 Roland Garros, when he fell to Daniel Elahi Galan in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Royer reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 54 in February this year. He plays here at No. 75.
- Royer had a **successful junior career**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 8 in October 2019. He finished 3rd at the 2019 ITF World Tennis Tour Junior Finals in Chengdu, China, P.R. He fell in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Shintaro Mochizuki).
- Royer is coached by Julien Gillet.

A 7th meeting for De Minaur and Mannarino, their 4th on grass and their 2nd at a Grand Slam. De Minaur won their only previous meeting at a major, winning in 4 sets in the 2nd round at the 2023 Australian Open.

De Minaur has won 2 of the pair's 3 previous meetings on grass. Mannarino won their first meeting on grass in the 2nd round at 2022 's-Hertogenbosch – his only win against De Minaur to date – before De Minaur defeated Mannarino in the quarterfinals at 2023 Queen's and in the semifinals at 's-Hertogenbosch last month.

De Minaur has won 2 of the 3 matches he has played against lefthanded players at Wimbledon. He fell to Rafael Nadal in the 3rd round in 2018, but defeated Jack Draper and Liam Broady in the 2nd and 3rd round respectively in 2022. He has a 5-4 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams.

De Minaur has won 6 of the last 7 matches he has played against lefthanded players at Tour-level, with his only defeat to a lefthanded player in that time coming against Cameron Norrie in the 3rd round at Indian Wells-1000 this year. He has a 40-20 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- **DE MINAUR** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 5th time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 36th Grand Slam overall.
- De Minaur advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Roman Andres Burruchaga 76(5) 61 60 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, De Minaur reached the round of 16. He defeated Roberto Carballes Baena, Arthur Cazaux and August Holmgren before falling to Novak Djokovic.
- De Minaur's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2024, when he withdrew ahead of his last 8 match against Djokovic due to a hip injury.
- De Minaur's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 7 occasions. In addition to his quarterfinal finish here in 2024, he has also reached the quarterfinals at the US Open in 2020 (l. Dominic Thiem), 2024 (l. Jack Draper) and 2025 (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime), at 2024 Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev) and at the Australian Open in 2025 (l. Jannik Sinner) and 2026 (l. Carlos Alcaraz). He is one of 3 players to have reached 7 or more Grand Slam men's singles quarterfinals without advancing to a semifinal – alongside Andrey Rublev (10 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances) and Tommy Robredo (7).

- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, De Minaur reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros. He defeated Toby Samuel and received a walkover against Alexander Blockx before falling to Jakub Mensik. His match against Mensik was his 100th Grand Slam match.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, De Minaur finished runner-up at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Kamil Majchrzak) and reached the quarterfinals at Queen's (l. Brandon Nakashima).
- De Minaur's best result in 2026 is winning his **11th Tour-level title** at Rotterdam (d. Auger-Aliassime). He also reached the semifinals at Hamburg (l. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Valentin Vacherot).
- De Minaur has **won 2 Tour-level titles on grass** – at 2021 Eastbourne (d. Lorenzo Sonego) and 2024 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Sebastian Korda). He is one of 11 players who began the men's singles draw here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- De Minaur has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – falling to Steve Johnson in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2019 and to Cristian Garin in the round of 16 in 2022, despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 3-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- De Minaur **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in January 2024 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 6 in July 2024 following his quarterfinal finish at Wimbledon. He plays here at the same ranking.
- De Minaur is a **former Wimbledon boys' singles finalist**. He reached the boys' singles final here in 2016 (l. Denis Shapovalov). He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in February 2016 and also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Tommy Paul) and the 2016 Australian Open (l. Jurabek Karimov).
- De Minaur led Australia to **back-to-back Davis Cup finals in 2022-23**, the team's first appearances in the Davis Cup final since 2003. The team finished as runners-up to Canada in 2022 and to Italy in 2023. De Minaur won 10 out of 13 Davis Cup matches he contested in 2022-23 and has a 17-11 win-loss record in the competition overall since making his debut in 2018. Australia will play at home against Poland in a 2026 World Group I tie in September.
- De Minaur is coached by Adolfo Gutierrez and Matt Reid.
- Lefthander **MANNARINO** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 5th time. This is his 15th Wimbledon appearance and his 64th Grand Slam overall.
- Mannarino advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Titouan Droguet 62 64 61 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, as a qualifier, Mannarino reached the 3rd round. He defeated Christopher O'Connell and Valentin Royer before falling to Andrey Rublev.
- Mannarino's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 6 occasions, including 3 times at Wimbledon – in 2013 (l. Lukasz Kubot), 2017 (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2018 (l. Roger Federer). He also reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open in 2022 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2024 (l. Djokovic) and at the 2025 US Open (l. Jiri Lehecka).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Mannarino fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Rinky Hijikata) and Roland Garros (l. Ugo Humbert).
- Mannarino has **competed 53 of the last 54 Grand Slam tournaments**, including this event. His defeat in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros last year ended a streak of 48 consecutive Grand Slam main draw appearances from the 2013 Australian Open through the 2025 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Mannarino reached the semifinals at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. De Minaur) and the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Jakub Mensik, l. Arthur Fery) but fell in the 1st round at Mallorca (l. Nuno Borges).
- Mannarino's **best result in 2026** is finishing runner-up at Montpellier (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime). He has fallen in the 1st or 2nd round at 16 of the 18 Tour-level events he has contested this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Mannarino is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at Wimbledon for the first time**. He has lost all 6 matches he has played against Top 10 players here. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Wimbledon is No. 14 Gael Monfils in the 3rd round in 2017.

- Mannarino is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He lost the first 22 matches he played against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams before defeating No. 6 Ben Shelton in his most-recent match against a Top 10 player at a major – in the 3rd round at the US Open last year, when Shelton retired after the 4th set due to a left shoulder injury.
- Mannarino has won **one of the last 15 matches he has played against Top 10 players at Tour-level**, with his only victory against a Top 10 player in that time coming against No. 6 Shelton in the 3rd round at the US Open last year. He has an 11-64 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Mannarino has won 11 of the last 12 **five-set matches** he has contested. Since falling to Andy Murray in 5 sets in the 2nd round at the 2015 US Open, his only defeat in a 5-set match came against Federer here in 2021, when he retired after the first point of the 5th set due to a right knee injury. He has a 5-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 14-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Mannarino has won **5 Tour-level titles**, including 2 on grass – at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Jordan Thompson) and at 2023 Newport (d. Alex Michelsen). He has also reached 3 further Tour-level finals on grass – at Antalya in 2017 (l. Yuichi Sugita) and 2018 (l. Damir Dzumhur) and at 2023 Mallorca (l. Christopher Eubanks). He is one of 11 players who began the men's singles draw this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- Mannarino reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 17 in January 2024. He plays here at No. 40.
- Mannarino has played **Davis Cup** for France since 2018 and has an 8-2 win-loss record in the competition. France will play away against Canada in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Mannarino is coached by Erwann Tortuyaux.

NO. 6 TAYLOR FRITZ (USA) v PATRICK KYPSON (USA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

This is a 2nd all-American match in the men's singles here this year – after Kypson's 36 61 64 64 victory against Mackenzie McDonald in the 1st round on Tuesday. This is the 392nd all-American men's singles match at Wimbledon in the Open Era and the 1,470th all-American men's singles match at the Grand Slams in the Open Era.

Fritz and Kypson are 2 of the 12 American players to reach the men's singles 2nd round here – the 2nd-most since 1995 (when 16 American men reached the 2nd round here) after 2022, when 13 American men reached the 2nd round here. A total of 18 American players began the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year – the most since 1995, when 21 Americans contested the men's singles draw here. USA had more players and more seeded players (6) in the men's singles draw here this year than any other nation.

Fritz has won 2 of the 3 matches he has played against fellow American players at Wimbledon. He fell to John Isner in the 1st round here in 2017 but defeated Brandon Nakashima and Steve Johnson in the opening 2 rounds in 2021. He has a 9-6 win-loss record against fellow American players at the Grand Slams and a 63-35 win-loss record against American players at Tour-level overall.

Kypson won the only match he has played against another American player at the Grand Slams – against McDonald in the 1st round here this year. He has a 2-3 win-loss record against fellow Americans at Tour-level overall.

Fritz has never lost a Wimbledon match to a player ranked as low as No. 113 Kypson. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Fritz here is No. 59 Mikael Ymer in the 2nd round in 2023. He has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 113 Kypson on 4 occasions – he fell to No. 131 Bernabe Zapata Miralles in the 2nd round at 2022 Roland Garros, No. 303 Brandon Holt in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open, to No. 113 Alexei Popyrin in the 1st round at the 2023 Australian Open and to No. 148 Nishesh Basavareddy in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.

- **FRITZ** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 5th time. This is his 10th Wimbledon appearance and his 40th Grand Slam overall.
- Fritz advanced to the 2nd round after defeating lucky loser Dusan Lajovic 63 64 64 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Last year here, Fritz recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals. He defeated Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard, Gabriel Diallo, Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, Jordan Thompson and Karen Khachanov before falling to Carlos Alcaraz. He has reached the quarterfinals or better here in 3 of the last 4 years – he reached the quarterfinals in 2022 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2024 (l. Lorenzo Musetti) but fell in the 2nd round in 2023 (l. Mikael Ymer).
- Fritz reached his **first Grand Slam final** at the 2024 US Open, where he fell to Jannik Sinner in straight sets. He became the first American player to reach the US Open men's singles final since Andy Roddick finished runner-up in 2006 and the first American player to reach a Grand Slam men's singles final since Roddick finished runner-up at 2009 Wimbledon.

- If Fritz wins his first major title on his 40th Grand Slam appearance, he will go **3rd on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Grand Slam men's singles title** – behind Goran Ivanisevic, who won his only major title at 2001 Wimbledon on his 48th Grand Slam appearance and Alexander Zverev, who won his first major title at Roland Garros this year on his 41st Grand Slam appearance.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Fritz reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open, where he defeated Valentin Royer, Vit Kopriva and Stan Wawrinka before falling to Musetti, but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Nishesh Basavareddy).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Fritz finished runner-up at both Stuttgart (l. Ben Shelton) and Halle (l. Frances Tiafoe). He withdrew from Eastbourne. It was the 2nd straight year that he has reached 2 Tour-level finals on grass prior to Wimbledon – he won the titles at both Stuttgart (d. Zverev) and Eastbourne (d. Jenson Brooksby) in 2025.
- Fritz has **won 5 Tour-level titles on grass**, putting him in 2nd place on the list for most Tour-level men's singles titles total among active players – behind Novak Djokovic, who has won 8 Tour-level titles on grass. In addition to his titles at Stuttgart and Eastbourne last year, he has won 3 other titles at Eastbourne – in 2019 (d. Sam Querrey), 2022 (d. Maxime Cressy) and 2024 (d. Max Purcell).
- Fritz's **other highlights in 2026** are finishing runner-up at Dallas (l. Shelton), reaching the quarterfinals at Delray Beach (l. Tommy Paul) and the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (l. Jiri Lehecka).
- Fritz has won 5 of the 9 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, including his wins against Mpetshi Perricard and Diallo in the opening 2 rounds last year. He has a 14-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fritz reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 4 in November 2024. He plays here at No. 7.
- Fritz is a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 Junior World Champion after winning the boys' singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys' singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul). His best result in the boys' singles here was reaching the semifinals in 2015 (l. Reilly Opelka).
- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has an 8-4 win-loss record in the competition. USA will play away against Czechia in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Both of Fritz's parents were professional tennis players. His mother, Kathy May, is a former Top 10 player.
- Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
- **KYPSON** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 5th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Kypson advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Mackenzie McDonald 36 61 64 64 for his **first Grand Slam match-win** in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Kypson **lost in the 1st round on his previous 4 Grand Slam main draw appearances** – as a wild card at the 2017 US Open (l. Adrian Panenka), 2023 Roland Garros (l. Radu Albot) and at the Australian Open in 2024 (l. Emil Ruusuvuori) and this year (l. Francisco Comesana). He was ranked high enough for direct acceptance at Roland Garros this year but withdrew ahead of the tournament due to an abdominal injury.
- Kypson **was not ranked high enough to compete in qualifying here last year**. He reached the 2nd round of qualifying on his only appearance in qualifying here in 2024, defeating Stuart Parker before falling to Leandro Riedi.
- Kypson is bidding to record his **3rd Tour-level match-win in 2026**. Prior to this event, his only Tour-level match-win this season came in a 2nd round finish as a qualifier at Acapulco (d. Alex de Minaur, l. Brandon Nakashima). He fell in the 1st round at the 6 other Tour-level events he contested prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Kypson is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win overall**. Prior to this season, his only Tour-level match-wins came in a quarterfinal finish as a wild card at 2024 Delray Beach, where he defeated Miomir Kecmanovic and Constant Lestienne before falling to Marcos Giron, and in a 2nd round finish as a wild card at 2024 Indian Wells-1000 (d. Ethan Quinn, l. Ugo Humbert).

- Kypson is bidding to record his **4th match-win on grass at any professional level**. Prior to this event, his only professional match-wins on grass came in a 2nd round finish at the 2024 Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (d. Tristan Schoolkate, l. Benjamin Bonzi) and in qualifying here in 2024. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Kypson has competed at **2 Challenger-level events in 2026**. He reached the semifinals at the San Diego Challenger (USA) (l. Sebastian Korda) but falling in the 1st round at the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Matteo Berrettini).
- Kypson is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the 2nd time**. He won the only match he has played against a Top 10 player, defeating No. 6 De Minaur in the 1st round at Acapulco this year.
- Kypson **broke the Top 100 for the first time** in March this year and reached a career-high ranking of No. 89 in May. He plays here at No. 113.
- Kypson **played college tennis** at Texas A&M University in 2017-18.
- Kypson was a **good junior**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 18 in July 2017 after reaching the boys' singles semifinals here (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina) and was a member of the victorious USA team which won the 2013 World Junior Tennis Finals in Prostějov, defeating Australia 2-0 in the final.
- Kypson is coached by Alejandro Gonzalez.

Cobolli has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 79 Duckworth once before – when he fell to No. 186 Arthur Fery in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Cobolli at Wimbledon is No. 19 Alejandro Tabilo in the 2nd round in 2024.

- **COBOLLI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 12th Grand Slam overall.
- Cobolli advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Mariano Navone 16 76(5) 63 76(8) in the 1st round in a match which began on Tuesday and concluded on Wednesday.
- **Last year here**, Cobolli reached his first Grand Slam quarterfinal. He defeated Beibit Zhukayev, Jack Pinnington Jones, Jakub Mensik and Marin Cilic before falling to Novak Djokovic. On his only other main draw appearance here, in 2024, he reached the 2nd round (d. Rinky Hijikata, I. Alejandro Tabilo).
- Cobolli reached his **first Grand Slam final** at Roland Garros this year, falling to Alexander Zverev in 5 sets. He became the 6th Italian player in history to reach a Grand Slam men's singles final – after Jannik Sinner (6 Grand Slam final appearances), Nicola Pietrangeli (4), and Matteo Berrettini, Giorgio de Stefani and Adriano Panatta (one).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Cobolli fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (I. Arthur Fery).
- Cobolli's other highlight in 2026 is winning his **3rd Tour-level title** at Acapulco (d. Frances Tiafoe). He also finished runner-up at Munich (I. Ben Shelton), reached the semifinals at Delray Beach (I. Sebastian Korda) and reached the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000 (I. Zverev).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Cobolli competed at Halle but fell to Tiafoe in the 1st round.
- Cobolli lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon. He fell to Tabilo in 5 sets in the 2nd round here in 2024. He has a 3-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Cobolli reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 earlier this month after his runner-up finish at Roland Garros. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Cobolli was a **good junior**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 8 in January 2020 and finished his junior career by winning the boys' doubles title at 2020 Roland Garros alongside Dominic Stricker. He reached the 2nd round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (d. Sergey Fomin, I. Filip Cristian Jianu).

- Cobolli made his Davis Cup debut for Italy in 2024 and **competed in Italy's title-winning seasons in 2024 and 2025**, winning 4 of the 5 Davis Cup matches he has contested since making his debut. As hosts, Italy have received a wild card to the 2026 Davis Cup Final 8 Knockout Stage in Bologna in November.
- Cobolli is coached by his father, Stefano Cobolli.
- **DUCKWORTH** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 41st Grand Slam overall.
- Duckworth advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Tallon Griekspoor 64 46 75 64 for his **first Wimbledon match-win since 2021** in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, Duckworth fell in the 1st round (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime). He also fell in the 1st round here in 2022 (l. Andy Murray) and as a lucky loser in 2024 (l. Alex de Minaur). He fell in qualifying here in 2022.
- Duckworth's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round here in 2021, when he defeated Radu Albot and Sam Querrey before falling to Lorenzo Sonego.

- Duckworth has competed at 4 Challenger-level events in 2026. His best results are winning his **18th Challenger-level title** at the Mexico City Challenger (MEX) (d. Stefano Napolitano) and finishing runner-up at the San Luis Potosi Challenger (MEX) (l. Nicolas Mejia).
- Duckworth **is bidding to defeat a Top 10 player for the first time**. He has lost all 17 matches he has contested against Top 10 players – including both of his previous matches against Top 10 players at Wimbledon, falling to No. 3 Alexander Zverev in the 1st round in 2018 and to No. 9 De Minaur in the 1st round in 2024. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Tour-level is No. 13 David Goffin in the 2nd round at 2021 Miami-1000. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 49 Diallo in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- Duckworth has won one of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He defeated Malek Jaziri in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2015, but has lost 5-set matches here to Denis Kudla in the 1st round in 2013, to Richard Gasquet in the 1st round in 2014 and to Auger-Aliassime in the 1st round last year. He has a 5-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Duckworth reached **a career-high ranking** of No. 46 in January 2022. He plays here at No. 79.
- Duckworth was a **good junior player**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 7 in July 2010. He reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2010 Roland Garros (l. Agustin Velotti) and the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at the 2010 Australian Open (l. Gianni Mina) and 2010 Wimbledon (l. Marton Fucsovics).
- Duckworth is coached by Paul Baccanello.

NO. 10 ALEXANDER BUBLIK (KAZ) v (Q) KYRIAN JACQUET (FRA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Bublik has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 139 Jacquet once before – to No. 184 Jack Sock in the 2nd round at the 2021 US Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Bublik at Wimbledon is No. 116 Gregoire Barrere in the 1st round in 2019.

Bublik has won one of the 2 matches he has contested against qualifiers at Wimbledon – he fell to Barrere in the 1st round here in 2019 but defeated Maximilian Marterer in the 3rd round in 2023. He has a 5-3 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams and a 30-18 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

He became the 2nd Kazakhstani player to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam – after Mikhail Kukushkin, who reached the round of 16 at both the 2012 Australian Open and 2019 Wimbledon.
- Bublik's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros last year. He defeated James Duckworth, Alex de Minaur, Henrique Rocha and Jack Draper before falling to Jannik Sinner. He became the first Kazakhstani player to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Bublik reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Alex de Minaur) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Jan-Lennard Struff).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Bublik reached the semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Taylor Fritz) but fell in the 1st round at Halle (l. Mattia Bellucci).
- Bublik's best result in 2026 is winning his **9th Tour-level title** at Hong Kong (d. Lorenzo Musetti). He also reached the semifinals at Rotterdam (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime), Geneva (l. Learner Tien) and Stuttgart and the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Bublik has won **2 Tour-level titles on grass** – at Halle in both 2023 (d. Andrey Rublev) and 2025 (d. Daniil Medvedev). He is one of 11 players who started the men's singles main draw here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- Bublik has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested in the main draw at Wimbledon – including his 5-set victory against Kokkinakis in the 1st round here this year. He also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Jakub Mensik in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2024, but lost 5-set matches to Rublev in the round of 16 in 2023 and to Munar in the 1st round last year. He also reached the semifinals at the Canberra Challenger (AUS) (l. Rafael Jodar), the Zadar Challenger (CRO) (l. Arthur Gea) and the Dublin Challenger (IRL).
- Jacquet is **facing a Top 20 player for the 2nd time**. The only Top 20 player he has previously faced is No. 9 Dimitrov, to whom he lost in the 1st round at the 2024 US Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 76 Mattia Bellucci in the semifinals at the Manama Challenger (BRN) this year.
- Jacquet has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested – against Borges in the 1st round at 2025 Roland Garros and against Nava in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Jacquet reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 102 in February this year. He plays here at No. 139.
- Jacquet is coached by Stephane Robert.

NO. 13 JIRI LEHECKA (CZE) v ALEX MOLCAN (SVK)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Lehecka has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 101 Molcan once before – to No. 198 Arthur Gea in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Lehecka at Wimbledon is No. 73 Mattia Bellucci in the 2nd round last year.

Lehecka lost his only previous match against a lefthanded player at Wimbledon – falling to Bellucci in the 2nd round here last year. He has won the 3 other matches he has played against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams and has a 16-12 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

This is the 5th Wimbledon men's singles match between a Czech player and a Slovakian player since Czechoslovakia was dissolved at the end of 1992 – and the first since 2013, when Czechia's Tomas Berdych defeated Slovakia's Martin Klizan in the 1st round. Czech players lead Slovakian players 3-1 in previous men's singles matches here.

This is the 15th Grand Slam men's singles match between a Czech player and a Slovakia player since the end of 1992 – and the first since the 2014 US Open, when Berdych defeated Klizan in the 2nd round. Czech players lead Slovakian players 8-6 in previous Grand Slam men's singles matches.

- Molcan is bidding to become **5th Slovakian player to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Miloslav Mecir (who reached the 3rd round here in 1986-89), Karol Kucera (1996, 1999 and 2003), Karol Beck (2004 and 2011) and Lukas Lacko (2012 and 2016).
- Molcan advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Daniel Altmaier 64 36 75 62 in a 1st round match which began on Tuesday and finished on Wednesday.
- Molcan's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 2 occasions – including on his Wimbledon debut in 2022, when he defeated Pedro Martinez and Marcos Giron before falling to Taylor Fritz. He also reached the 3rd round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2021 US Open (l. Diego Schwartzman).
- Molcan is making his **first Grand Slam main draw appearance since the 2023 US Open**, when he fell to Grigor Dimitrov in the 1st round. He struggled with knee and wrist injuries in 2024-25 and was ranked too low to enter any qualifying at any Grand Slam tournament from 2024 Wimbledon through the 2025 US Open.
- **On his last appearance here**, in 2023, Molcan fell in the 1st round (l. Mikael Ymer).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Molcan reached the 2nd round of qualifying at both the Australian Open (d. Sho Shimabukuro, l. Alexander Blockx) and Roland Garros (d. Oliver Crawford, l. Felix Gill).
- Molcan's **best results in 2026** are reaching the semifinals as a qualifier at Munich (l. Ben Shelton) and the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Bucharest (l. Mariano Navone). Excluding Davis Cup ties, they were his first appearances at Tour-level events since February 2024, when he fell in the 1st round as a qualifier at Santiago (l. Federico Coria).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Molcan fell in the 1st round as a qualifier at Mallorca (l. Fabian Marozsan).
- Molcan has contested **5 events at Challenger-level this year**. His best results are finishing runner-up at the Prostějov Challenger (CZE) (l. Sebastian Baez) and reaching the quarterfinals at the Zadar Challenger (CRO) (l. Stefano Travaglia) and the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Tallon Griekspoor).
- Molcan is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all 5 matches he has contested against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, including his only previous match against a Top 20 player at Wimbledon – against No. 14 Fritz in the 3rd round in 2022. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 50 Martinez in the 1st round here in 2022.
- Molcan has **won one of the 2 matches he has contested against Top 20 players in 2026** – he defeated No. 11 Alexander Bublik in the 1st round at Munich but fell to No. 6 Shelton in the semifinals. They were his first matches against Top 20 players since 2023. He has a 4-19 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Molcan has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level. He has never contested a 5-set match in the main draw here, but has contested one 5-set match at Wimbledon qualifying – when he fell to Antoine Hoang in 5 sets in the final round of qualifying in 2021.
- Molcan reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 38 in May 2022. He dropped as low as No. 646 in March last year but re-entered the Top 200 in September and plays here at No. 101.

- Molcan was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 18 in March 2015. His best result in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2014 (d. Nicolas Alvarez, l. Johan Sebastien Tatlot).
- Molcan made his **Davis Cup** debut for Slovakia in 2021 and has a 7-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. Slovakia will play at home against Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Molcan is coached by Karol Beck and Marian Vajda.

He also won the 2 other matches he has contested against wild cards at the Grand Slams – he defeated Tristan Schoolkate in the 2nd round at the 2024 US Open and Titouan Droguet in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.

- **MENSİK** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 11th Grand Slam overall.
- Mensik advanced to the 2nd round after defeating wild card Toby Samuel 57 63 63 36 76(7) in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Mensik recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the 3rd round here last year. He defeated Hugo Gaston and Marcos Giron before falling to Flavio Cobolli.
- Mensik recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the semifinals at Roland Garros this year. He defeated Titouan Droguet, Mariano Navone, Alex de Minaur, Andrey Rublev and Joao Fonseca before falling to Alexander Zverev. Aged 20 years 279, he became the youngest Czech man in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Mensik reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open. He defeated Pablo Carreno Busta, Rafael Jodar and Ethan Quinn before giving a walkover to Novak Djokovic due to an abdominal injury.
- Mensik's other highlights this year are winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Auckland (d. Sebastian Baez), reaching the semifinals at Doha (l. Arthur Fils) and the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Tallon Griekspoor).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Mensik competed at Queen's but fell to Adrian Mannarino in the 1st round.
- Mensik has **won all 4 five-set matches he has played in 2026** – including his 5-set victory against Samuel in the 1st round here. He also recorded 5-set victories against Carreno Busta in the 1st round at the Australian Open, against Navone in the 2nd round at Roland Garros and against Rublev in the round of 16 at Roland Garros. He lost 6 of the 7 five-set matches he had contested prior to this season, including his only previous 5-set match at Wimbledon – to Alexander Bublik in the 1st round in 2024. He has a 5-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Mensik reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 12 in March this year. He plays here at No. 18.

- Mensik had a **successful junior career**. He reached the 2022 Australian Open boys' singles final, falling to Bruno Kuzuhara in 3 sets, becoming the 2nd Czech player to reach the boys' singles final at the Australian Open after 2011 junior champion Jiri Vesely. He reached the 2nd round of the boys' singles in his only appearance as a junior here in 2022 (d. Henry Searle, l. Pedro Rodenas). He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in April 2022.
- Mensik made his **Davis Cup** debut for Czechia in 2023 and has an 8-7 overall win-loss record in the competition. Czechia will play at home against USA in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- **DIMITROV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 8th time. This is his 16th Wimbledon appearance and his 61st Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Dimitrov advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Dane Sweeny 76(4) 63 75 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, Dimitrov reached the round of 16, where he retired due to a pectoral injury while leading eventual champion Jannik Sinner 63 75 2-2. It was the 5th consecutive Grand Slam event where he retired from a match, having also retired against Daniil Medvedev in the round of 16 here in 2024 due to a knee injury, against Frances Tiafoe in the quarterfinals at the 2024 US Open due to a groin injury, against Francesco Passaro in the 1st round at the 2025 Australian Open due to a hip injury and against Ethan Quinn in the 1st round at 2025 Roland Garros due to a left thigh injury.
- Dimitrov's streak of **58 consecutive Grand Slam appearances** ended when he withdrew from the 2025 US Open due to ongoing recovery from the injury sustained at Wimbledon last year. He had previously contested the main draw at every Grand Slam tournament since the 2011 Australian Open – the 5th-longest streak of Grand Slam men's singles appearances in history.
- Dimitrov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 3 occasions – including once at Wimbledon, in 2014 (l. Novak Djokovic). He also reached the semifinals at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and the 2019 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Dimitrov fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Tomas Machac). He also fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Jaime Faria) in his first appearance in qualifying at a Grand Slam since the 2011 Australian Open.

Raphael Collignon) and Indian Wells-1000 (d. Terence Atmane, l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Dimitrov has contested 3 events at Challenger-level this season – his **first appearances at Challenger-level since 2012**. In addition to his quarterfinal finish at the Dublin Challenger (IRL), he fell in the 1st round as a wild card at both the Aix En Provence Challenger (FRA) (l. Pol Martin Tiffon) and the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Martin Damm).
- Dimitrov has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2014 Queen's (d. Feliciano Lopez). He is one of 27 players who began the men's singles draw here this year who has won at least one Tour-level title on grass.
- Dimitrov has **won one of his last 5 matches against Top 20 players at Wimbledon**, with his only victory against a Top 20 player here in that time coming against No. 10 Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round in 2023. He has a 4-7 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Wimbledon.
- Dimitrov has **won one of his last 5 matches against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams**, with his only victory against a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam in that time coming against No. 6 Andrey Rublev in the round of 16 at the 2024 US Open. He has a 14-24 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams.
- Dimitrov is bidding to end a **7-match losing streak against Top 20 players**. He has lost all 7 matches he has played against Top 20 players since defeating No. 6 Rublev in the round of 16 at the 2024 US Open. He has an 82-131 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Dimitrov has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** that he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 13-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.

- Dimitrov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 after winning the title at the 2017 ATP Finals (d. David Goffin). He dropped out of the Top 100 for the first time since April 2012 in April this year after more than 14 consecutive years inside the Top 100. He plays here at No. 146.
- Dimitrov is **one of 4 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** through to the 2nd round here from the 5 who began the men's singles event this year. He won the boys' singles titles here (d. Henri Kontinen) and at the US Open (d. Devin Britton) in 2008 and finished the year at No. 3 in the Junior Rankings.
- Dimitrov is coached by David Nalbandian, who finished as runner-up here in 2002, and Jamie Delgado.

NO. 17 FRANCES TIAFOE (USA) v JAN CHOINSKI (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Tiafoe is facing a British player in the 2nd round at Wimbledon for the 2nd straight year – he lost to Cameron Norrie in the 2nd round here in 2025. It is the only match he has contested against a British player at a Grand Slam. He has a 10-10 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall.

Tiafoe has never lost a Wimbledon match to a player ranked as low as No. 100 Choinski. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Tiafoe here is No. 61 Norrie in the 2nd round last year. He has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as Choinski on 3 occasions – he fell to No. 118 Denis Shapovalov in the 2nd round at 2024 Roland Garros, to No. 144 Jan-Lennard Struff in the 3rd round at the 2025 US Open and to No. 104 Matteo Arnaldi in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year.

- Tiafoe advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Terence Atmane 76(6) 61 46 64 in a 1st round match which began on Tuesday and ended on Wednesday.
- **Last year here**, Tiafoe reached the 2nd round (d. Elmer Moeller, l. Cameron Norrie).
- Tiafoe's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2022. He defeated Andrea Vavassori, Maximilian Marterer and Alexander Bublik before falling to David Goffin.
- Tiafoe's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the US Open on 2 occasions – in 2022 (l. Alcaraz) and 2024 (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Tiafoe is contesting his **39th consecutive Grand Slam tournament** here this year. It is the longest active streak of Grand Slam men's singles appearances. He has contested the main draw at every Grand Slam tournament since the 2016 US Open.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Tiafoe reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Matteo Arnaldi) and the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Tiafoe won his **2nd Tour-level title on grass** at Halle (d. Taylor Fritz), becoming the first American champion at the event. He also reached the quarterfinals at Stuttgart (l. Jiri Lehecka). His other grass court title came at Stuttgart in 2023 (d. Jan-Lennard Struff). He is one of 11 players who started the men's singles main draw here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- Tiafoe's **other highlights in 2026** are finishing runner-up at Acapulco (l. Flavio Cobolli), reaching the semifinals at Houston (l. Tommy Paul), reaching the quarterfinals at Delray Beach (l. Learner Tien) and Miami-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner) and reaching the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Tiafoe has won one of the 5 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Matteo Arnaldi in the 1st round in 2024, when he recorded his first successful comeback from 0-2 down. He has a 10-16 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Tiafoe had a **successful junior career**. Aged just 15, he won the 2013 Orange Bowl (d. Stefan Kozlov), becoming the youngest boys' singles winner in the event's history. He also reached the boys' singles semifinals at the 2014 US Open (l. Quentin Halys) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Noah Rubin).
- Tiafoe made his **Davis Cup** debut in September 2018 and has a 1-7 win-loss record in the competition. USA play away against Czechia in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Tiafoe is coached by Mark Kovacs.
- **CHOINSKI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 4th Grand Slam overall.
- Choinski advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Vit Kopriva 63 75 62 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Choinski has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the 2nd round as a wild card on his Grand Slam debut here in 2023 (d. Dusan Lajovic, l. Hubert Hurkacz). He lost in the 1st round on his 2 other appearances in the main draw at the Grand Slams – as a wild card here in 2024 (l. Luciano Darderi) and as a qualifier at the 2024 US Open (l. Roberto Carballes Baena).
- **Last year here**, Choinski fell in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Mark Lajal). He also lost in qualifying here in 2019.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Choinski reached the 2nd round of qualifying at Roland Garros, where he defeated Andres Andrade before giving a walkover to Pierre-Hugues Herbert, but fell in the 1st round of qualifying at the Australian Open (l. Leandro Riedi).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Choinski reached the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Eastbourne. He defeated Alexei Popyrin and Felix Gill for his **first Tour-level match-wins in 2026** before falling to Zizou Bergs. - Choinski **broke the Top 100 for the first time this week**. He plays here at a new career-high ranking of No. 100.
- Choinski had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 17 in December 2014 and reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2014 US Open, retiring due to illness against Omar Jasika. He lost in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Michael Mmoh).
- Choinski is coached by his father, Andrzej Choinski, and Gunter Bresnik.

- **HANFMANN** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Hanfmann advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard 67(6) 76(9) 62 63 for his **first Wimbledon match-win** in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Hanfmann has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He has reached the 2nd round at a Grand Slam on 3 previous occasions – at the Australian Open as a qualifier in 2022 (d. Thanasi Kokkinakis, l. Rafael Nadal) and as a direct acceptance this year (d. Zachary Svajda, l. Carlos Alcaraz) and as a lucky loser at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Thiago Monteiro, l. Francisco Cerundolo).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Hanfmann fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Hamad Medjedovic).
- **Last year here**, Hanfmann reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Hugo Grenier, l. Beibit Zhukayev). He fell in the 1st round on his 3 previous appearances in the main draw here – in 2021 (l. Jiri Vesely), 2023 (l. Taylor Fritz) and 2024 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- Hanfmann's best result in 2026 is reaching his **3rd Tour-level final** at Santiago, finishing runner-up to Luciano Darderi. It was his first appearance in a Tour-level final since 2020. He also reached the quarterfinals at Marrakech, where he gave a walkover to Darderi due to illness.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Hanfmann reached the 2nd round at Stuttgart (d. Aleksandar Kovacevic, l. Mattia Bellucci), Halle (d. Joao Fonseca, l. Alexander Zverev) and Mallorca (d. Daniel Vallejo, l. Darderi).
- Hanfmann has **won one of the last 7 matches he has contested against Top 30 players**, with his only victory against a Top 30 player in that time coming against No. 25 Fonseca in the 1st round at Halle. He has an 18-37 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Tour-level overall.
- Hanfmann lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Fritz in the 1st round in 2023. He has a 1-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall, having defeated Monteiro in 5 sets in the 1st round at 2023 Roland Garros but fallen to Rinky Hijikata in 5 sets in the 1st round at the 2023 Australian Open, despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- Hanfmann reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 45 in July 2023. He plays here at No. 56.
- Hanfmann **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Southern California in 2012-15, helping the team win 2 NCAA national titles.
- Hanfmann **made his Davis Cup debut for Germany** in 2017 and was a member of the German teams that reached the semifinals in 2024 and 2025. He has a 6-1 win-loss record overall in the competition. Germany will play at home against Croatia in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Hanfmann is coached by Petar Popovic.

- **FILS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 10th Grand Slam overall.
- Fils advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Raphael Collignon 75 61 63 in the 1st round on Tuesday. It was the first time he has won a Grand Slam match in straight sets in his 19th Grand Slam match.
- Fils is making his **first Grand Slam appearance since 2025 Roland Garros**, when he defeated Nicolas Jarry and Jaume Munar before giving a walkover to Andrey Rublev due to a back injury. He contested just one event in 2025 after Roland Garros, reaching the 3rd round at Toronto-1000 (l. Jiri Lehecka). He missed the Australian Open this year and began his 2026 season at Montpellier in February. He retired in his opening match at Rome-1000 due to a hip injury and missed Roland Garros before making his comeback in the 1st round here on Tuesday.
- Fils' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on his most-recent Wimbledon appearance in 2024. He defeated Dominic Stricker, Hubert Hurkacz and Roman Safiullin before falling to Alex de Minaur. Aged 20 years 32 days, he became the youngest Frenchman to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since Richard Gasquet (19 years 15 days) in 2005.
- Fils' best result in 2026 is winning his **4th Tour-level title** at Barcelona (d. Andrey Rublev). He also finished runner-up at Doha (l. Carlos Alcaraz), reached the semifinals at Miami-1000 (l. Jiri Lehecka) and Madrid-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner) and reached the quarterfinals at Montpellier (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Fils **did not contest a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of 17 players competing in the men's singles here to have not competed on grass at any level prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Fils has won 3 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested, including the only 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon – against Safiullin in the 3rd round in 2024. At the 2023 US Open, he defeated Tallon Griekspoor in the 1st round in 5 sets before falling to Matteo Arnaldi in the 2nd round, also in 5 sets. He also won his most-recent Grand Slam match before Wimbledon this year in 5 sets, against Munar in the 2nd round at Roland Garros last year.
- Fils reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 14 in April last year. He dropped to No. 42 in January – his lowest-ranking since March 2024 – but plays here at No. 24.
- Fils was a **successful junior**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 3 in July 2021, a month after finishing runner-up in the boys' singles at 2021 Roland Garros (l. Luca Van Assche). He also won the 2021 Roland Garros boys' doubles title alongside Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon in 2021 (d. Kokoro Isomura, l. Victor Lilov).

- Fils made his **Davis Cup** debut for France in 2023 and has a 2-3 win-loss record in the competition. France will play away against Canada in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Fils is coached by Ivan Cinkus and 2001 Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic.
- **BERRETTINI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 26th Grand Slam overall.
- Berrettini advanced to the 2nd round after defeating wild card Stan Wawrinka 67(7) 76(16) 76(7) 76(5) in the 1st round on Tuesday. It was the **11th men's singles match at Wimbledon where 4 sets went to tiebreaks** and the 9th men's singles match at Wimbledon where the first 4 sets went to tiebreaks – and the 2nd match to do so at Wimbledon this year, after Martin Damm defeated Marco Trungelliti 76(5) 67(5) 76(2) 76(5) in the 1st round on Monday.
- At 34 points, the 2nd set tiebreak in Berrettini's victory over Wawrinka was the **2nd-longest tiebreak in a men's singles match at Wimbledon** – after the 36-point tiebreak in John Isner's 76(17) 76(3) 75 victory against Jarkko Nieminen in the 2nd round in 2014. It was the 4th-longest tiebreak in a men's singles match at the Grand Slams.
- **Last year here**, Berrettini fell to Kamil Majchrzak in 5 sets in the 1st round. It was the first time he had failed to reach the 2nd round here.
- Berrettini became the **first Italian man in history to contest the final at Wimbledon in 2021**, falling to Novak Djokovic in 4 sets. He also became the first Italian man to reach a Grand Slam final since Adriano Panatta at 1976 Roland Garros. He is one of 3 active Italian players to have reached a Grand Slam men's singles final, alongside Jannik Sinner (6 Grand Slam final appearances) and Flavio Cobolli (one).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Berrettini reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros – the first time he has reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since the 2022 US Open. He defeated Marton Fucsovics, Arthur Rinderknech, Francisco Comesana and Juan Manuel Cerundolo before retiring against Matteo Arnaldi due to a hip injury. He withdrew from the Australian Open due to an oblique injury.
- Berrettini's **other highlights in 2026** are reaching the quarterfinals at Rio de Janeiro (l. Ignacio Buse) and the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Valentin Vacherot) and as a wild card at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Joao Fonseca). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Hubert Hurkacz) – one of his 2 appearances at Challenger-level this season.
- Berrettini **did not contest a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of 17 players competing in the men's singles here to have not competed on grass at any level prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Berrettini has **won 4 Tour-level titles on grass** – at Stuttgart in 2019 (d. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and 2022 (d. Andy Murray), and at Queen's in 2021 (d. Cameron Norrie) and 2022 (d. Filip Krajinovic). He is one of 11 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- Berrettini has won **one of the last 5 matches he has contested against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams**. By defeating No. 25 Rinderknech in the 2nd round at Roland Garros this year, he ended a 4-match losing streak against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams, having not previously defeated a Top 30 player at a Grand Slam since defeating No. 21 Alexander Zverev in the 3rd round here in 2023. He has a 6-4 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Wimbledon, an 11-15 win-loss record against Top 30 players at the Grand Slams and a 53-61 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Tour-level overall.
- Berrettini has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He recorded 5-set victories against Jack Sock in the 1st round in 2018 and Diego Schwartzman in the 3rd round in 2019, but fell to Majchrzak in 5 sets in the 1st round last year. He has an 8-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Berrettini reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in January 2022 after reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open. He plays here at No. 51.
- Berrettini was a member of the **Italian Davis Cup teams that won back-to-back titles in 2024-25**, winning all 9 Davis Cup matches across the 2 seasons. He did not compete during the 2023 season, when Italy also won the title. He made his competition debut in 2019 and has a 14-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. As hosts, Italy have received a wild card to the 2026 Davis Cup Final 8 Knockout Stage in Bologna in November.
- Berrettini is coached by Alessandro Bega and Umberto Rianna.

- Fery advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Damir Dzumhur 36 62 62 61 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Fery has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He has reached the 2nd round on 2 other occasions – as a wild card at Wimbledon last year (d. Alexei Popyrin, I. Luciano Darderi) and as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year (d. Flavio Cobolli, I. Tomas Martin Etcheverry).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fery reached the 2nd round of qualifying at Roland Garros (d. Elias Ymer, I. Pedro Martinez).

- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Munar reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Dalibor Srvcina, l. Casper Ruud) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Hubert Hurkacz).
- Munar's **best Tour-level results in 2026** are reaching the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Tomas Machac), Rotterdam (l. Bublik) and Geneva (l. Mariano Navone).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Munar fell in the 1st round at both 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Martin Damm) and Eastbourne (l. Bergs). His victory in the 1st round here ended a 4-match losing streak – he had previously not recorded a victory since reaching the quarterfinals at Geneva.
- Munar has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – falling to Norrie in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2022 before defeating Bublik in 5 sets in the 1st round last year. He has a 4-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level.
- Munar **broke the Top 50 for the first time** in July last year and reached a career-high ranking of No. 33 in December last year. He plays here at No. 44.
- Munar was a **successful junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in January 2015. He reached the boys' singles final at Roland Garros in 2014 (l. Andrey Rublev) and was a member of the Spain team that won the 2013 Junior Davis Cup by beating Korea, Rep. 2-1 in the final. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (d. Kang Ku Keon, l. Francisco Bahamonde Nicastro).

- Munar was a member of the **Spanish Davis Cup team that reached the final for the first time since 2019 last year**, falling to Italy in the final. He won 3 of the 6 matches he contested in the competition in 2025. He made his Davis Cup debut for Spain in 2017 and has a 3-4 win-loss record overall in the competition. As 2025 runners-up, Spain received a bye to the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round and will play away against Chile in September.
- Munar is coached by Javier Fernandez and Miguel Sanchez.
