2026 WIMBLEDON THE CHAMPIONSHIPS



Junior Tournament Preview

In 1947, the first junior singles events were held at Wimbledon, with Denmark's Kurt Nielsen and Belgium's Genevieve Domken winning the inaugural tournaments. The boys' doubles and girls' doubles events were introduced in 1982. This is the 79th edition of the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here, and the 43rd editions of both the boys' doubles and girls' doubles tournaments. 2026 Wimbledon is the 139th staging of The Championships overall.

MIGUEL BATTLES FOR PARIS-LONDON DOUBLE

Brazil's Luis Guto Miguel defeated USA's Michael Antonius to win the boys' singles title at Roland Garros last month. Miguel, the No. 1 seed here, is bidding to become the 11th player to win the boys' singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year – and the first since Tseng Chun Hsin in 2018.

EFREMOVA BIDS TO ADD TO MELBOURNE SUCCESS

France's Ksenia Efremova won the girls' singles title at the 2026 Australian Open, defeating Ekaterina Tupitsyna to become the 2nd French player to win the girls' singles title in Melbourne, after Virginie Razzano in 1999. She is now bidding to become the first French player to win the girls' singles title at Wimbledon since Amelie Mauresmo in 1996.

Efremova is now bidding to become the 5th French player to win multiple Grand Slam girls' singles titles – after Monique Salfati (who won the girls' singles titles at 1963 Roland Garros and 1963 Wimbledon), Pascale Paradis (1983 Roland Garros and 1983 Wimbledon), Amelie Mauresmo (1996 Roland Garros and 1996 Wimbledon) and Razanno (1999 Australian Open and 2000 Roland Garros).

Efremova, who is seeded No. 2 here, is bidding to emulate the achievement of Slovakia's Renata Jamrichova who won the girls' singles titles at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon in 2024. Jamrichova is the most-recent player to have won multiple Grand Slam girls' singles titles.

SESKO SEEKS MORE HISTORY FOR SLOVENIA

Ziga Sesko defeated USA's Keaton Hance to lift the boys' singles title at the Australian Open in February, becoming the first Slovenian player to win a Grand Slam boys' singles title and the first Slovenian player to win a junior singles title in Melbourne.

He also became the 3rd Slovenian player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title, – after Mima Jausovec (who won the girls' singles titles at 1973 Roland Garros and 1974 Wimbledon) and Katarina Srebotnik (who won the girls' singles title at 1998 Wimbledon). He will join Jausovec as the only Slovenian players to win multiple junior Grand Slam singles' titles if he also wins the title here.

HOME CHAMPIONS

2024 US Open girls' singles champion Mika Stojsavljevic is contesting her first junior event of the season here, and will bid to become the first British player to win the girls' singles title at Wimbledon since Laura Robson in 2008. Stojsavljevic is also aiming to become the first British player, boy or girl, to win multiple Grand Slam junior singles titles since Annabel Croft, who won the girls' singles titles at the 1984 Australian Open and 1984 Wimbledon.

Stojsavljevic has focused on her professional career this season and reached a career-high WTA ranking of No. 261 last month. She competed as a wild card in the women's singles event here, falling to Belinda Bencic in the 1st round. She is one of 2 players in the junior events here to enter the draw who used their professional ranking to gain entry to the main draw – along with Australia's Cruz Hewitt in the boys' singles event. Stojsavljevic leads the 10 British girls competing in the singles draw this year.

Prior to 2023, Wimbledon had seen the longest wait for a home player to win the boys' singles title of the 4 Grand Slams – since 1962 when Stanley Matthews won the title. Henry Searle ended the drought by winning the 2023 boys' singles title. There are 9 British players competing in the boys' singles event here in 2026.

In total, there have been 7 British boys' singles champions and 7 British girls' singles champions (including 2-time champion Lorna Cornell) at Wimbledon since the competitions were established in 1947.

GRAND SLAM CHAMPIONS IN THE DRAWS

In addition to Efremova, Miguel, Sesko and Stojsavljevic, 7 other players competing at Wimbledon have won Grand Slam titles in the boys' or girls' doubles events.

There are 5 Grand Slam boys' doubles champions playing at Wimbledon this year: Connor Doig (2026 Australian Open), Keaton Hance (2025 US Open), Dimitar Kisimov (2026 Australian Open), Jamie Mackenzie (2026 Roland Garros) and Vincent Reisach (2026 Roland Garros).

There are 2 Grand Slam girls' doubles champions competing at Wimbledon this year: Jana Kovackova (2025 US Open, 2026 Australian Open and 2026 Roland Garros) and Katerina Zajickova (2026 Roland Garros).

MAKING NATIONAL HISTORY

Top juniors in both the boys' and girls' singles can make history for their nations should they win the title here. Brazil has 3 Top 5 seeds competing across both draws, with boys' singles No. 1 seed Miguel joined by the girls' singles No. 4 and No. 5 seeds, Victoria Luiza Barros and Nauhany Vitoria Leme Da Silva, respectively. They all have the chance to become the first Brazilian player to win a Wimbledon junior singles title and Barros and Leme Da Silva are both bidding to become the first Brazilian player to win a Grand Slam girls' singles title.

Girls' singles No. 1 seed Sun Xinran, who finished runner-up at Roland Garros last month, could become the first Chinese player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title outside the US Open – and the 3rd Chinese player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title overall, after Wu Yibing won the boys' singles at the 2017 US Open and Wang Xiyu won the girls' singles at the 2018 US Open. Should she win the title here this year, Sun would become Asia's first Wimbledon girls' singles champion since Indonesia's Angelique Widjaja in 2001.

Girls' singles No. 3 seed Jana Kovackova leads the ever-strong contingent of Czech players in the draw here. Should Kovackova or one of her compatriots win here, she would become the first Czech player to win a junior singles title at Wimbledon since Kristyna Pliskova in 2010.

Boys' singles No. 2 seed Jamie Mackenzie has enjoyed a stellar season, winning 2 titles at J500-level in May. Should he claim his first Grand Slam title here, he will become the first German player to win a Wimbledon boys' singles title – and just the 2nd German player to win a junior singles title here, after 1991 Wimbledon girls' singles champion Barbara Rittner.

Australian Open boys' singles finalist Keaton Hance (the No. 3 seed) and Roland Garros boys' singles finalist Michael Antonius (the No. 5 seed) are the 2 highest-ranked American players competing in the junior draws Wimbledon this year. The most-recent American champion in the boys' singles here is 2021 winner Samir Banerjee. The most-recent American champion in the girls' singles here is 2023 winner Clervie Ngounoue.

AT THE DOUBLE

The last player to win both junior singles and doubles titles at Wimbledon in the same year was Eugenie Bouchard, who won the girls' singles title and girls' doubles title (alongside Taylor Townsend) in 2012. The last player to win both boys' singles and boys' doubles titles at Wimbledon is Florin Mergea, who won the singles title and the doubles title (alongside Horia Tecau) in 2003.

2025 CHAMPIONS CONTINUE DEVELOPMENT

Aged 17, last year's Wimbledon girls' singles champion, Mia Pohankova, remains eligible to compete at junior-level, but is currently focusing on her professional career and has not played any junior tournaments this season.

Pohankova is currently ranked at a career-high WTA ranking of No. 243. She contested women's singles qualifying at a Grand Slam for the first time at Wimbledon this year after receiving a wild card into qualifying, falling to Harmony Tan in the 1st round of qualifying. She also competed in Billie Jean King Cup action for Slovakia (having made her debut in the competition in 2025), winning 3 of the 4 singles matches she contested at the 2026 Europe/Africa Group I event in Portugal in April. She has also made 2 main draw appearances at WTA Tour events since winning the girls' singles title here last year – reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at Chennai in October last year and reaching the 2nd round as a wild card on the grass at 's-Hertogenbosch last month. She won her 2nd professional titles on the World Tennis Tour at W75 Leszno (POL) in January this year.

2025 boys' singles winner Ivan Ivanov, also 17, backed up his title here by winning the boys' singles at the US Open last year, becoming the first player to win multiple Grand Slam boys' singles titles in a season since Tseng won the titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2018. Despite still being eligible to compete at junior-level, he has not done so since his triumph in New York.

Ivanov reached a career-high ATP ranking of No. 597 in May and is currently ranked at No. 654. He made his ATP Tour main draw debut as a wild card at Athens in November last year, has competed in the main draw at 4 Challenger events in 2026 and claimed his 2nd professional title on the World Tennis Tour at M25 Tarragona (ESP) in March. He also made his Davis Cup debut in September 2025, playing for Bulgaria in both a World Group I victory against Finland last year and a Qualifiers 1st Round defeat to Belgium in February.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

The Grand Slams are the pinnacle of the World Tennis Tour Juniors, with J500 events representing the next-most prestigious level of tournament. There have been 4 events at J500-level in 2026 so far, with 4 different players claiming the girls' singles titles, while 3 different players won the boys' singles titles, with Germany's Jamie Mackenzie winning both J500 Offenbach and J500 Milan.

PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS

No. 13 seed Felitsata Dorofeeva-Rybas is the only seeded player in the girls' singles to have won a professional title in 2026, claiming her first professional title at W15 Bucharest in Romania in May. No. 1 seed Sun, No. 2 seed Efremova, No. 3 seed Jana Kovackova, No. 9 seed Mariella Thamm and No. 12 seed Stojisavljevic have all won multiple professional titles in their careers, but not yet this season, while No. 5 seed Nauhany Vitoria Leme Da Silva has won one professional title, at W15 Sao Joao da Boa Vista in Brazil in October last year.

Two of the Top 10 seeds in the boys' singles have won a professional title in 2026, both American. No. 3 Keaton Hance and No. 6 Michael Antonius won their first professional titles this year, both on home soil. Hance won M15 Orlando, FL in April, while Antonius won M25 Bakersfield, CA in March. Netherlands' No. 11 seed Thijs Boogaard won his first professional title at M25 Lourinha in Portugal last month and No. 12 seed Andrew Johnson, also American, won his first professional title at M15 Sunrise, FL in the US in February. Argentina's Dante Pagani is the only other seeded player to have won a professional title, at M15 Olavarria in Argentina last November.

FLYING THE FLAG

Several juniors here have experienced a taste of Billie Jean King Cup or Davis Cup action. They include Brazil's Victoria Luiza Barros and Nauhany Vitoria Leme Da Silva. Leme Da Silva made her debut at the 2025 Play-offs, winning one of the 2 matches she contested at the event. Barros made her competition debut at the 2026 Americas Group I event in April alongside a returning Leme Da Silva. Barros won all 4 matches she contested at the event, one in singles and 3 in doubles, while Leme Da Silva won all 5 matches she contested, 4 in singles and one in doubles, as both played a starring role in securing promotion to the 2026 Play-offs for Brazil.

Adelina Lacinova has represented Latvia in Billie Jean King Cup competition since 2023, including at the Europe/Africa Group I event in April this year, while Stojisavljevic made her competition debut in the Qualifiers this year, defeating Talia Gibson as Great Britain defeated Australia 3-1 to advance to the 2026 Finals.

Sesko made his Davis Cup debut in Slovenia's 4-0 victory against Uruguay in a 2025 World Group II tie in September and also competed in the 2026 World Group I Play-offs in February, while Yannik Alvaraz has won 4 of the 6 matches he has contested since making his competition debut for Puerto Rico at the 2025 Americas Group III event in June last year. Ecuador's Emilio Camacho made his competition debut against Australia at the 2026 Qualifiers 1st Round in February and South Africa's Connor Doig debuted for his nation in a 2025 World Group II tie against Morocco in September.

GRASS COURT CHAMPIONS

The J300 tournament at Roehampton is the only junior grass court event to have taken place prior to Wimbledon this year. USA's Michael Antonius overcame Slovenia's Svit Suljic to win the boys' singles title, while USA's Janae Preston defeated China, P.R.'s Lin Yu Jun in the girls' singles final.

2026 LEADERS

Roland Garros girls' singles finalist Sun Xinran leads the Tour for most girls' singles matches won at J300-level and above.

FUTURE GREATNESS

2018 girls' singles champion Iga Swiatek became the 4th player to win both the junior singles title and the women's singles titles at Wimbledon, with her victory here in the women's singles last year. There have also been 4 players who have won the boys' singles title and the men's singles title here – most recently 1998 boys' singles champion Roger Federer, who went on to win 8 men's singles titles here.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest and oldest players in the boys' singles tournament here this year are Jordan Lee (16 years 69 days) and Matei Todoran (18 years 190 days), respectively.

In the boys' draw there are 10 sixteen-year-olds, 27 seventeen-year-olds and 27 eighteen-year-olds. (NB all ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

The youngest and oldest players in the girls' singles tournament here this year are Ekaterina Dotsenko (14 years 278 days) and Denisa Zoldakova (18 years 192 days), respectively.

In the girls' draw there is one fourteen-year-olds, 11 fifteen-year-olds, 18 sixteen-year-olds, 23 seventeen-year-olds and 11 eighteen-year-olds. (NB all ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

WILD CARDS

British players received all of the 8 available wild cards in the boys' singles draw: Liam Channon, Joshua Craze, Vincent Fletcher, Rhys Lawlor, Alex Mirrington, William Moxon, Oliver Page and Issac Sallu

In the girls' singles draw, all of the 8 available wild cards also went to British players: Sophie Bekker, Tegan Bush, Daniella Britton, Edie Griffiths, Ophelia Korpanec Danies, Megan Knight, Annabel Wong and Liv Zingg

A total of 38 countries are represented in the junior singles draws at 2026 Wimbledon, with USA having the most players competing in the boys' singles draw and overall, and Great Britain and USA having the joint-most players competing in the girls' singles draw.
