On court today...

- Novak Djokovic returns to Centre Court today in search of yet another piece of Wimbledon history. Victory against Roman Safiullin this afternoon would see him record his 106th Wimbledon match-win and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most men's singles matches won at Wimbledon. A win today would send him through to his 17th Wimbledon quarterfinal – and his 9th in-a-row, having reached the last 8 or better at every Wimbledon tournament since 2017. A win would also see him advance to a record-extending 66th Grand Slam quarterfinal.
- Safiullin and fellow qualifier Shintaro Mochizuki are both aiming to pull off monumental upsets on Centre Court today – while Safiullin faces 7-time Wimbledon winner Djokovic, Mochizuki is up against defending champion Jannik Sinner. Neither Djokovic nor Sinner has ever lost a Grand Slam match to players ranked as low as their opponents today. Should either Safiullin (world No. 132) or Mochizuki (world No. 151) win today, they would become the 6th qualifier to reach the men's singles quarterfinals here in the Open Era. If both men beat the odds and win today, it will be the first time in the Open Era that multiple qualifiers have reached the last 8 at a Grand Slam.
- On No. 2 Court, the unseeded duo of Hubert Hurkacz and Jan-Lennard Struff face off for a place in the quarterfinals. Hurkacz is a former semifinalist here, but for Struff, a win today would see him advance to the last 8 at a Grand Slam for the first time. The 36-year-old will become the oldest first-time Grand Slam men's singles quarterfinalist in the Open Era if he defeats Hurkacz this afternoon. Having defeated the Pole in their only previous grass court meeting, in the semifinals at Stuttgart 3 years ago, Struff will be optimistic that he can finally advance to a first Grand Slam quarterfinal on his 47th appearance at a major.

NO. 1 JANNIK SINNER (ITA) v (Q) SHINTARO MOCHIZUKI (JPN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Sinner has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 151 Mochizuki. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Sinner at a Grand Slam is No. 79 Daniel Altmaier in the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Sinner at Wimbledon is No. 48 Marton Fucsovics in the 1st round in 2021.

Sinner has lost Tour-level matches to players ranked as low as No. 151 Mochizuki twice before – to No. 270 Tristan Lamasine in the 1st round at 2019 Lyon and to No. 309 Jack Draper in the 1st round at 2021 Queen’s.

Sinner is facing a qualifier at Wimbledon for the first time. He has won all 6 matches he has played against qualifiers at the Grand Slams. He is bidding to extend a 13-match winning streak against qualifiers at Tour-level. He has not lost a Tour-level match to a qualifier since falling to Dusan Lajovic in the 2nd round at 2023 Cincinnati-1000. He has a 28-7 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- Defending champion **SINNER** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 5th time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner is bidding extend his **all-time record for most Wimbledon men’s singles quarterfinal appearances by an Italian player**. He is one of 8 Italian men in history to reach the quarterfinals here – alongside Uberto de Morpurgo (1928), Nicola Pietrangeli (1955 and 1960), Adriano Panatta (1979), Davide Sanguinetti (1998), Matteo Berrettini (2021), Lorenzo Musetti (2024) and Flavio Cobolli (2025). (NB Cobolli is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time this year)
- Sinner is bidding to reach his 15th Grand Slam quarterfinal and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men’s singles quarterfinal appearances by an Italian player**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Pietrangeli, by reaching his 11th Grand Slam quarterfinal at 2025 Roland Garros. (see table overleaf)

- Sinner is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 5th consecutive year and become the **11th player in the Open Era to record 5 consecutive men's singles quarterfinal appearances at Wimbledon** – and the 2nd active player to do so, after Novak Djokovic, who made 7 consecutive quarterfinal appearances here from 2009 to 2015 and who is bidding to reach the quarterfinals for a 9th consecutive year today.
- Wimbledon is Sinner's **joint-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of quarterfinals reached, alongside the Australian Open. The Australian Open is his most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won – he has recorded 23 match-wins with Wimbledon, Roland Garros and the US Open all tied with 23 wins.

- By reaching the round of 16 here for the 5th time, Sinner has equalled Pietrangeli's **all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles round of 16 appearances by an Italian player**.
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 20th time, Sinner has extended his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles round of 16 appearances by an Italian player**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Pietrangeli, by reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 17th time at Wimbledon last year.
- By defeating Nuno Borges in the 2nd round for his 95th Grand Slam match-win, Sinner claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles matches won by an Italian player**, ahead of Pietrangeli.
- Last year here, Sinner won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating 2-time defending champion Carlos Alcaraz in the final. He became the first Italian player, man or woman, to win a Wimbledon singles title. By reaching his first Wimbledon final, he also became the 11th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. Alcaraz then became the 12th player to achieve the feat by reaching his first Australian Open final this year.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **10th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title** – after Rod Laver, John Newcombe, Bjorn Borg, John McEnroe, Boris Becker, Pete Sampras, Federer, Djokovic and Alcaraz.
- Sinner is a **4-time Grand Slam champion**. In addition to his title here last year, he also won the titles at the Australian Open in 2024 (d. Medvedev) and 2025 (d. Alexander Zverev) and at the 2024 US Open (d. Taylor Fritz). He holds the record for most Grand Slam singles titles won by an Italian player – ahead of 2-time Grand Slam champion Pietrangeli, who won the men's singles title at Roland Garros in 1959 and 1960.
- In Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Djokovic) and the 2nd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Clement Tabur before falling to Juan Manuel Cerundolo in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was his earliest Grand Slam exit since falling to Daniel Altmaier in the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros.
- Sinner **leads the Tour for most singles titles won in 2026**. He has won the titles at all 5 Masters-1000 events this season – at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev), Miami-1000 (d. Jiri Lehecka), Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Alcaraz), Madrid-1000 (d. Zverev) and Rome-1000 (d. Casper Ruud). By winning the title at Rome-1000 he became the 2nd player to complete the set of Masters-1000 titles, after Djokovic.
- Sinner has **lost 3 matches in 2026** – in addition to his defeats at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also fell in the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Jakub Mensik).
- Sinner has **won 2 Tour-level titles on grass**. In addition to his Wimbledon title last year, he won the title at 2024 Halle (d. Hubert Hurkacz). He is one of 4 Italian men to have won a Tour-level title on grass in the Open Era – alongside Berrettini (4 grass court titles), and Andreas Seppi and Lorenzo Sonego (both one). He is one of 17 players who began the men's singles draw here not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.

- By defeating Miomir Kecmanovic in 5 sets in the 1st round here, Sinner ended a **streak of 5 consecutive defeats in 5-set matches**. It was his first win in a 5-set match here, having previously lost both 5-set matches he had contested at Wimbledon – in the quarterfinals in both 2022, when he lost to Novak Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead, and in 2024 when he fell to Daniil Medvedev. He has a 7-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Sinner became **world No. 1** for the first time following 2024 Roland Garros and began his 78th week as world No. 1 on Monday. He will remain world No. 1 following Wimbledon regardless of results at this tournament.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to Davis Cup title in 2023 and 2024**. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 15-4 overall win-loss record in the competition but did not compete in Davis Cup in 2025 as Italy won their 3rd consecutive title. As hosts, Italy have received a wild card to the 2026 Davis Cup Final 8 in Bologna in November.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.
- Qualifier **MOCHIZUKI** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 7th Grand Slam overall.
- Mochizuki is bidding to become the **5th Japanese player in history to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Zenzo Shimizu (who reached the quarterfinals here in 1920-21), Jiro Sato (1931-33), Shuzo Matsuoka (1995) and Kei Nishikori (2018-19).
- Mochizuki is bidding to become the **7th Japanese player in history to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after Nishikori (12 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), Sato (6), Shimizu (3) and Ichiya Kumagai, Matsuoka and Ryosuki Nuno (all one).
- If Mochizuki and Naomi Osaka both reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **2nd time in the Open Era that a Japanese man and a Japanese woman have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after 1995, when Matsuoka and Kimiko Date both reached the quarterfinals here.
- If Mochizuki and Osaka both reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the 4th time in the Open Era that a Japanese man and a Japanese woman have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam – after 1995 Wimbledon and the 2018 US Open and the 2019 Australian Open, when Nishikori and Osaka both reached the quarterfinals at each event.
- Mochizuki is bidding to become the **6th qualifier in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after John McEnroe (1977), Paul Annacone (1984), Ricardo Acuna (1985), Vladimir Voltchkov (2000) and Bernard Tomic (2011). (NB fellow qualifier Roman Safiullin is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here today)
- Mochizuki is also bidding to become the **16th qualifier in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. He would become just the 3rd man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam as a qualifier since Tomic at 2011 Wimbledon – after Aslan Karatsev at the 2021 Australian Open and Botic van de Zandschulp at the 2021 US Open.
- If Mochizuki and Safiullin both reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple qualifiers have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**.
- Ranked at No. 151, Mochizuki is **one of 4 players ranked outside the Top 100 to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon this year** – alongside No. 114 Arthur Fery, No. 146 Grigor Dimitrov and No. 151 Shintaro Mochizuki. Since 1985 (from when full ranking data is available), 14 players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon – with the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery guarantee to join this list. - If Mochizuki wins today, he will become the **lowest-ranked player to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since 2011 Wimbledon**, when No. 158 Bernard Tomic reached the quarterfinals here.
- If Mochizuki and Safiullin both win today and join the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery in the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time since 1985* that 3 or more players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. (*NB full ranking data available from 1985 onwards)
- If one of Mochizuki or Safiullin win today and join the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery in the quarterfinals here, it will be the **2nd time since 1985* that multiple players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after 2000, when No. 114 Alexander Popp and No. 237 Voltchkov both reached the quarterfinals here. (*NB full ranking data available from 1985 onwards)
- If one of Mochizuki or Safiullin win today and join the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery in the quarterfinals here, it will be the **5th time since 1985* that multiple players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after the 1991 Australian Open (when No. 101 Cristiano Caratti and No. 114 Patrick McEnroe both reached the quarterfinals), 1997 Roland Garros (No. 111 Galo Blanco and No. 122 Filip Dewulf), 2000 Wimbledon (No. 114 Popp and No. 237 Voltchkov) and 2026 Roland Garros (No. 104 Matteo Arnaldi and No. 105 Matteo Berrettini). (*NB full ranking data available from 1985 onwards)
- Mochizuki is bidding to record his **6th Grand Slam match-win**. He has recorded 4 of his previous 5 Grand Slam match-wins at Wimbledon.

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Mochizuki has become the **3rd Japanese player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Matsuoka (who reached the round of 16 here in 1995) and Nishikori (2014, 2016, 2018-19).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Mochizuki has also become the **4th Japanese player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after Nishikori (22 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Yoshihito Nishioka (2) and Matsuoka (one).
- With Mochizuki and Osaka both reaching the round of 16 here, it is the **3rd time in the Open Era that a Japanese man and a Japanese woman have reached the round at Wimbledon** – after 1995 (when Matsuoka and Date reached the round of 16 here) and 2016 (Nishikori and Misaki Doi).
- With Mochizuki and Osaka both reaching the round of 16 here, it is the **5th time in the Open Era that a Japanese man and a Japanese woman have reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam**. In addition to Wimbledon in 1995 and 2016, Nishikori and Osaka both reached the round of 16 at the 2018 US Open and the 2019 Australian Open.

- With Mochizuki and Safiullin both reaching the round of 16 here, it is the **first time that multiple qualifiers have reached the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2011**, when qualifiers Lukasz Kubot and Tomic both reached the round of 16 here. It is the first time multiple qualifiers have reached the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam since the 2025 US Open, when qualifiers Leandro Riedi and Jan-Lennard Struff both reached the round of 16.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Mochizuki has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best result at the Grand Slams was reaching the 2nd round at 2 Grand Slam events in 2025 – as a qualifier at both Wimbledon (d. Giulio Zeppieri, l. Karen Khachanov) and the US Open (d. Hugo Gaston, l. Alex de Minaur).
- As No. 21 seed in **Wimbledon qualifying this year**, Mochizuki defeated Vitaliy Sachko (UKR) 63 76(4), Gauthier Onclin (BEL) 62 46 63 and Clement Tabur (FRA) 16 75 26 63 61. It was the 3rd time he has successfully qualified at Wimbledon on his 5th attempt, and the 5th time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 14th attempt.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Mochizuki fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) but fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Remy Bertola).
- **Prior to Wimbledon qualifying**, Mochizuki reached the quarterfinals at the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR), where he defeated Michael Zheng and Mackenzie McDonald before falling to Bertola. He fell in the 1st round at the Birmingham Challenger (GBR) (l. Sho Shimabukuro) and fell in the 1st round of qualifying at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Sander Jong).
- Mochizuki is bidding to record **4 consecutive Tour-level match-wins for the first time**. By winning his opening 3 matches here, he has recorded 3 consecutive Tour-level match-wins for the 2nd time. He also recorded 3 consecutive victories en route to the semifinals as a wild card at 2023 Tokyo, where he defeated Tomas Martin Etcheverry, Taylor Fritz and Alexei Popyrin before falling to Aslan Karatsev.
- By winning his opening 3 matches here, Mochizuki has **ended a 7-match Tour-level losing streak**. He had not previously recorded a victory at Tour-level since he reached the quarterfinals at 2025 Almaty, where he defeated Arthur Cazaux and Luciano Darder before falling to Alex Michelsen. He had lost all 6 Tour-level matches he had contested prior to Wimbledon this season – he fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open and as a lucky loser at Doha (l. Karen Khachanov), lost 2 matches while representing Japan at the United Cup and lost 2 matches during Japan's Davis Cup Qualifiers 1st Round defeat to Austria.
- Mochizuki has recorded **4 match-wins at Challenger-level in 2026**. In addition to his quarterfinal finish at the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR), he reached the 2nd round at the Cap Cana Challenger (DOM) (d. Nicolas Mejia, l. Mariano Navone) and the Morelia Challenger (MEX) (d. Keegan Smith, l. Juan Pablo Ficovich).
- Mochizuki is **facing a Top 5 player for the first time**. The highest-ranked players he has faced are No. 8 Hubert Hurkacz, to whom he lost in the 1st round at 2024 Roland Garros, and No. 8 Alex de Minaur, to whom he lost in the 2nd round at the 2025 US Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 10 Fritz in the 2nd round at 2023 Tokyo.
- Mochizuki has won one of the **3 five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level – including both his victory against Zeppieri and his defeat to Khachanov in the opening 2 rounds here last year. He also lost a 5-set match lost to Hurkacz in the 1st round at 2024 Roland Garros. He has contested one 5-set match below Tour-level – his victory against Tabur in the final round of qualifying here this year.
- Mochizuki broke the Top 100 in October 2025 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 92 the following month. He plays here at No. 151.
- Mochizuki is one of **3 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** through to the round of 16 from the 5 who began the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles title here in 2019 (d. Carlos Gimeno Valero), becoming junior world No. 1 as a result. He became the first Japanese player to win a Grand Slam boys' singles title. Rei Sakamoto became the 2nd by winning the boys' singles title at the 2024 Australian Open. He also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2019 Roland Garros (l. Toby Kodat).
- Mochizuki made his **Davis Cup** debut for Japan in 2021 and has a 1-7 win-loss record overall in the competition. Japan will play away against New Zealand in a World Group I tie in September.
- Mochizuki is currently without a permanent coach.

NO. 3 FELIX AUGER-ALIASSIME (CAN) v NO. 22 ALEJANDRO DAVIDOVICH FOKINA (ESP)

A 5th Tour-level meeting for Auger-Aliassime and Davidovich Fokina and their 3rd at a Grand Slam. Both of their previous meetings at the Grand Slams have come in the 2nd round at the Australian Open, with Auger-Aliassime winning in 2022 and Davidovich Fokina winning in 2025 for his first victory against Auger-Aliassime at any level.

The pair's first Grand Slam meeting, won by Auger-Aliassime in 4 sets, was the 11th men's singles match with 4 sets which went to tiebreaks in Australian Open history. It remains the most-recent instance of a men's singles match with 4 sets which went to tiebreaks at the Australian Open.

The pair's 2nd Grand Slam meeting, won by Davidovich Fokina in 5 sets, was Davidovich Fokina's first successful comeback from 0-2 down – he subsequently recorded another comeback from 0-2 down in his next match to defeat Jakub Mensik in the 3rd round at the 2025 Australian Open. Those matches remain Davidovich Fokina's only successful comebacks from 0-2 down. That match is one of 5 instances where Auger-Aliassime has lost from 2-0 up.

Of the 16 sets the pair have played, at all professional levels, 8 have gone to tiebreaks. Both Auger-Aliassime and Davidovich Fokina have won 2 tiebreaks en route to the round of 16 here.

In addition to their 5 meetings as professionals, Auger-Aliassime and Davidovich Fokina contested 2 matches at junior-level – Davidovich Fokina defeated Auger-Aliassime 57 76(5) 63 in the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2016 Canadian Open Junior Championships in Repentigny, but Auger-Aliassime defeated Davidovich Fokina 64 76(6) in the 3rd round of the boys' singles at the 2016 US Open.

Auger-Aliassime and Davidovich Fokina are the only 2 players in to reach the men's singles round of 16 here this year without dropping a set. It is the 2nd time that Auger-Aliassime has reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam without dropping a set, having also done so at the 2021 Australian Open. It is the first time that Davidovich Fokina has reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam without dropping a set.

- **AUGER-ALIASSIME** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam overall.
- Auger-Aliassime is bidding to become the **3rd Canadian player in history, man or woman, to reach the singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Milos Raonic (who reached the quarterfinals here in 2014 and 2016-18) and Robert Powell (1908, 1910, 1912).
- Auger-Aliassime is bidding to reach his 6th Grand Slam quarterfinal. By reaching his 5th Grand Slam quarterfinal at Roland Garros this year, he claimed sole ownership of **2nd place on the list for most Grand Slam singles quarterfinal appearances by a Canadian player, man or woman**, ahead of Carling Bassett-Seguso and Eugenie Bouchard.

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Auger-Aliassime has become the **4th Canadian player in history to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Raonic (5 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Powell (4) and Shapovalov (2).
- Auger-Aliassime is through to the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 11th time. He is in **2nd place on the list for most Grand Slam men's singles round of 16 appearances by a Canadian player** – behind Raonic, who made 20 appearances in the round of 16 at the Grand Slams.
- **Last year here**, Auger-Aliassime reached the 2nd round, defeating James Duckworth for his first Wimbledon match-win since 2021 before falling to Jan-Lennard Struff.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2021, when he defeated Thiago Monteiro, Mikael Ymer, Nick Kyrgios and Alexander Zverev before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions – at the US Open in both 2021 (I. Daniil Medvedev) and 2025 (I. Jannik Sinner). By reaching the semifinals in 2021 he became the first Canadian man to reach the semifinals at the US Open, and the first man born in the 2000s to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Auger-Aliassime reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (I. Flavio Cobolli) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open, retiring due to a left thigh injury against Nuno Borges.

- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Auger-Aliassime reached the quarterfinals at both 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Kamil Majchrzak) and Halle (l. Frances Tiafoe).
- Auger-Aliassime's best result in 2026 is winning his **9th Tour-level title** at Montpellier (d. Adrian Mannarino). His other highlights this season are finishing runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Alex de Minaur), reaching the semifinals at Dubai (l. Daniil Medvedev) and reaching the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Sinner).
- Auger-Aliassime has **reached 2 Tour-level finals on grass** – finishing runner-up at Stuttgart in both 2019 (l. Berrettini) and 2021 (l. Marin Cilic).
- Auger-Aliassime has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He recorded 5-set victories against Zverev in the round of 16 in 2021 and Duckworth in the 1st round last year, but fell to Kokkinakis in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2024. He has an 8-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Auger-Aliassime broke the Top 5 for the first time in November last year and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 4 in June. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He reached the quarterfinals in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur) and reached the final in the boys' doubles with Denis Shapovalov that year losing to Kenneth Raisma/Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final. He was also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.
- Auger-Aliassime **led Canada to the Davis Cup title in 2022**, defeating Australia in the final. He won 8 of the 9 matches he contested in the competition that year. He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 13-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada will play at home against France in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang.
- **DAVIDOVICH FOKINA** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 25th Grand Slam overall.
- Davidovich Fokina is bidding to become the **10th Spanish player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Rafael Nadal (8 Wimbledon quarterfinal appearances), Carlos Alcaraz and Feliciano Lopez (both 3), David Ferrer and Juan Carlos Ferrero (both 2), and Roberto Bautista Agut, Andres Gimeno, Manuel Orantes and Fernando Verdasco (all one).

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Davidovich Fokina has become the **15th Spanish player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – and the 3rd active Spanish player to do so, after Bautista Agut (5 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances) and Alcaraz (4).
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 5th time, Davidovich Fokina has become the **20th Spanish player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 5 or more occasions** – and the 4th active Spanish man to do so, after Alcaraz (15 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Bautista Agut (14) and Pablo Carreno Busta (10).

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Davidovich Fokina has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. His previous best result here was reaching the 3rd round on his 2 most recent appearances here – in 2023 (l. Holger Rune) and last year (l. Taylor Fritz). He missed Wimbledon in 2024 due to a back injury.
- Davidovich Fokina's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2021 Roland Garros, where he defeated Mikhail Kukushkin, Botic van de Zandschulp, Casper Ruud and Federico Delbonis before falling to Alexander Zverev.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Davidovich Fokina reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where defeated Filip Misolic and Reilly Opelka in the opening 2 rounds before retiring against Tommy Paul. He reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Damir Dzumhur, l. Thiago Agustín Tirante).
- Davidovich Fokina won his **first Tour-level title** at Mallorca last month, defeating Ethan Quinn in the final. He had previously lost in 5 Tour-level finals, 4 of which came in 2025. Elsewhere on grass this season, he reached the quarterfinals at Queen's (l. Paul) but fell in the 1st round at Stuttgart (l. Mattia Bellucci).
- Davidovich Fokina's **other highlights in 2026** are reaching the semifinals at Adelaide (l. Ugo Humbert) and the quarterfinals at Dallas (l. Denis Shapovalov).
- Davidovich Fokina is bidding to extend a **7-match Tour-level winning streak**, having not lost a match since falling to Paul in the quarterfinals at Queen's last month. It is the longest winning streak of his career – his previous longest winning streak was winning 5 consecutive matches en route to a runner-up finish at 2022 Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- Davidovich Fokina is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost both matches he has contested against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams – falling to No. 3 Novak Djokovic in the 3rd round at 2023 Roland Garros and to No. 5 Fritz in the 3rd round here last year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 10 Hubert Hurkacz in the 1st round here in 2022.
- Davidovich Fokina has **won one of the last 6 matches he has contested against Top 5 players**. His only victory against a Top 5 player in that time came against No. 4 Fritz in the quarterfinals at 2025 Washington. He is facing a Top 5 player for the first time this season today. He has a 5-16 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.
- Davidovich Fokina has won one of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He defeated Hubert Hurkacz in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2022, but lost 5-set matches here to Denis Kudla in the 1st round in 2021, to Jiri Vesely in the 2nd round in 2022 and to Rune in the 3rd round in 2023. He has an 11-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Davidovich Fokina broke the Top 20 for the first time in July 2025 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 14 in November. He plays here at No. 23.
- In 2017, Davidovich Fokina became the **first Spanish boys' singles champion at Wimbledon** since Orantes in 1967, defeating Axel Geller in the title match. He is one of 3 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions through to the round of 16 from the 5 who began the men's main draw here this year. He also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Alexei Popyrin) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in July that year.
- Davidovich Fokina made his **Davis Cup** debut for Spain in 2022 and has a 1-5 overall win-loss record in the competition. Spain will play away against Chile in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.

At 38 years 255 days, he became the 2nd player, man or woman, in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam singles final aged 38 or older – after Rosewall, who finished runner-up at 1974 Wimbledon aged 39 years 246 days and at the 1974 US Open aged 39 years 310 days. The oldest player to reach a Grand Slam women's singles final in the Open Era is Serena Williams, who finished runner-up at the 2019 US Open aged 37 years 346 days.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest player in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam men's singles title**. Rosewall, who won the title at the 1972 Australian Open aged 37 years 62 days, is the only man in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title aged 37 or older.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35**. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days.

- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.
- Djokovic is making his 21st Wimbledon appearance, claiming sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances**, ahead of Jimmy Connors. Federer, who competed in the men's singles here on 22 occasions, is the only player to have made more Wimbledon men's singles appearances than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is making his 83rd Grand Slam appearance overall, extending his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances**. He equalled the previous record, held by Federer and Feliciano Lopez, by making his 81st Grand Slam appearance at the Australian Open this year before claiming sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, falling to Joao Fonseca in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was the 2nd time he had lost a match from 2-0 up, after his defeat to Jurgen Melzer in the quarterfinals at 2010 Roland Garros. It was also his joint-earliest defeat at a Grand Slam since falling to Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open – he also fell in the 3rd round at the 2024 US Open (l. Alexei Popyrin).
- Djokovic is contesting his **5th event of the 2026 season here**. In addition to his appearances at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also competed at Indian Wells-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Kamil Majchrzak and Aleksandar Kovacevic before falling to Jack Draper in the round of 16, and at Rome-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round before falling to Dino Prizmic in the 2nd round.
- Djokovic is **one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass**, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles who has not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **102nd Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the all-time list for most Tour-level men's singles titles won – behind Connors (109 titles) and Federer (103).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **9th Tour-level title on grass**. In addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils).
- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the 2023 final. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-10) and has a 41-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked at No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended in June 2024, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He plays here at No. 7.
- Djokovic became the **5th player to complete the career 'Golden Slam' in singles** by winning Olympic singles gold for Serbia at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event, defeating Alcaraz in the final. He joined Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams as the only players to have achieved the feat. He also won Olympic singles bronze at Beijing 2008 and is the only player to have won a medal for Serbia in the Olympic Tennis Event.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 46-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia play at home against Lithuania in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.

- Qualifier **SAFIULLIN** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 16th Grand Slam overall.
- Safiullin is bidding to become the **6th qualifier in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after John McEnroe (1977), Paul Annacone (1984), Ricardo Acuna (1985), Vladimir Voltchkov (2000) and Bernard Tomic (2011). (NB fellow qualifier Shintaro Mochizuki is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here today)
- Safiullin is also bidding to become the **16th qualifier in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. He would become just the 3rd man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam as a qualifier since Tomic at 2011 Wimbledon – after Aslan Karatsev at the 2021 Australian Open and Botic van de Zandschulp at the 2021 US Open.
- If Safiullin and Mochizuki both reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple qualifiers have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**.
- Ranked at No. 132, Safiullin is **one of 4 players ranked outside the Top 100 to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon this year** – alongside No. 114 Arthur Fery, No. 146 Grigor Dimitrov and No. 151 Shintaro Mochizuki. Since 1985 (from when full ranking data is available), 14 players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon – with the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery guarantee to join this list.

- Safiullin could become the **lowest-ranked player to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2014 for the 2nd time** – having reached the quarterfinals here in 2023 ranked at No. 92, he is already the lowest-ranked player to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon since No. 144 Nick Kyrgios reached the quarterfinals here in 2014. (NB Dimitrov or Mochizuki could become the lowest-ranked men's singles quarterfinalist here since No. 158 Tomic in 2011)
- At No. 132, Safiullin could also become **the lowest-ranked player to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since the 2016 US Open**, when No. 142 Juan Martin del Potro reached the quarterfinals. (NB Dimitrov or Mochizuki could become the lowest-ranked men's singles quarterfinalist at a Grand Slam since Tomic at 2011 Wimbledon)
- If Safiullin and Mochizuki both win today and join the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery in the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time since 1985* that 3 or more players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. (*NB full ranking data available from 1985 onwards)
- If one of Safiullin or Mochizuki win today and join the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery in the quarterfinals here, it will be the **2nd time since 1985* that multiple players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after 2000, when No. 114 Alexander Popp and No. 237 Voltchkov both reached the quarterfinals here. (*NB full ranking data available from 1985 onwards)

- If one of Safiullin or Mochizuki win today and join the winner of the match between Dimitrov and Fery in the quarterfinals here, it will be the **5th time since 1985* that multiple players ranked outside the Top 100 have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after the 1991 Australian Open (when No. 101 Cristiano Caratti and No. 114 Patrick McEnroe both reached the quarterfinals), 1997 Roland Garros (No. 111 Galo Blanco and No. 122 Filip Dewulf), 2000 Wimbledon (No. 114 Popp and No. 237 Voltchkov) and 2026 Roland Garros (No. 104 Matteo Arnaldi and No. 105 Matteo Berrettini). (*NB full ranking data available from 1985 onwards)
- Wimbledon is Safiullin's **most-successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won and quarterfinals reached. He has recorded more match-wins here than at the 3 other Grand Slam tournaments combined.

- With Safiullin and Mochizuki both reaching the round of 16 here, it is the **first time that multiple qualifiers have reached the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2011**, when qualifiers Lukasz Kubot and Tomic both reached the round of 16 here. It is the first time multiple qualifiers have reached the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam since the 2025 US Open, when qualifiers Leandro Riedi and Jan-Lennard Struff both reached the round of 16.
- After winning his opening 2 matches here this year in 5th-set tiebreaks, Safiullin has become the **first player to win multiple deciding set tiebreaks in the men's singles in a single year at Wimbledon** (since deciding set tiebreaks were introduced in 2019). He is the first player to win multiple 5th-set tiebreaks at a Grand Slam men's singles event since Alexander Zverev at the 2024 Australian Open, and the first to do so in consecutive matches since Pedro Cachin at the 2022 US Open.
- As No. 15 seed, Safiullin defeated James McCabe (AUS) 63 76(4), Kimmer Coppejans (BEL) 76(2) 75 and Jerome Kym (SUI) 46 76(2) 36 76(6) 64 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying this year**. It was his 2nd appearance in qualifying here – he reached the 2nd round of qualifying in 2021 (d. Ivo Karlovic, I. Federico Gaio). It is the 4th time he has successfully qualified on his 9th appearance in the qualifying draw at a Grand Slam.
- Safiullin recorded **3 consecutive victories in 5-set matches across qualifying and the main draw here**, from the final round of qualifying through the 2nd round of the main draw here. He defeated Jerome Kym in 5 sets to qualify for the main draw before defeating Andrey Rublev and Botic van de Zandschulp in the opening 2 rounds. He has a 4-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches in the main draw here and a 5-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Safiullin has **saved 3 match points en route to the round of 16 here**. He saved one match point in his victory against Kym in the final round of qualifying and saved 2 match points in his victory against Rublev in the 1st round of the main draw.
- **Last year here**, Safiullin fell to Luciano Darderi in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Safiullin's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on his Wimbledon debut in 2023. He defeated Roberto Bautista Agut, Corentin Moutet, Guido Pella and Denis Shapovalov before falling to Jannik Sinner. Ranked No. 92, he became the lowest-ranked man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since No. 144 Kyrgios in 2014.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Safiullin qualified for the main draw at Roland Garros before falling to Casper Ruud in 5 sets in the 1st round. He did not compete at the Australian Open due to an injury which saw him miss 6 months on Tour between September 2025 and February 2026.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Safiullin fell in the 1st round as a lucky loser at Stuttgart (I. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (I. Zhang Zhizhen).
- Safiullin is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win in 2026**. Prior to competing in the main draw here, his only 2 appearances in the main draw at Tour-level events this season have come at Roland Garros and Stuttgart. His last Tour-level match-win prior to the main draw here came in a 2nd round finish at the 2025 US Open (d. Gael Monfils, I. Felix Auger-Aliassime) – the final event he contested last season.

- Safiullin has **competed mainly at Challenger-level since making his comeback from injury in February**. He won back-to-back Challenger titles as a qualifier at Oeiras 3 (POR) (d. Valentin Royer) and as a direct acceptance at Mauthausen (AUT) (d. Jaime Faria) in April-May. They were the 7th and 8th Challenger-level titles of his career. He also reached the semifinals at the Montemar Challenger (ESP) (l. Pablo Llamas Ruiz) in March.
- Safiullin is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost both matches he has contested against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams – falling to No. 6 Alexander Zverev in the 2nd round at 2021 Roland Garros and to No. 8 Sinner in the quarterfinals here in 2023. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 13 Andrey Rublev in the 1st round here this year.
- Safiullin is bidding to end an **8-match losing streak against Top 10 players**. He has not defeated a Top 10 player since defeating No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz in the 2nd round at 2023 Paris-1000. He has a 3-14 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall, with his 2 other victories coming against No. 4 Stefanos Tsitsipas in the quarterfinals at 2022 Marseille and No. 10 Zverev in the 2nd round at 2023 Shanghai-1000.
- Safiullin reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 36 in January 2024. He dropped outside the Top 200 for the first time since February 2020 in March this year but re-entered in April and plays here at No. 132.
- Safiullin was a **successful junior**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in May 2014 and won the boys' singles title at the 2015 Australian Open (d. Hong Seong-chan). He never contested the boys' singles here.
- Safiullin is coached by Karl Adrian Ringdal Noerstenaes.

- **HURKACZ** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 31st Grand Slam overall.
- Hurkacz is bidding to become the **first Polish player in history to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon on multiple occasions**. He is one of 4 Polish men to have reached the quarterfinals here – alongside Wojtek Fibak (1980), Jerzy Kanowicz (2013) and Lukasz Kubot (2013).
- Hurkacz is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time. He is in **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles quarterfinal appearances by a Polish player**, after Fibak.

- Wimbledon is Hurkacz's **most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won and joint-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of quarterfinals reached, alongside the Australian Open.

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Hurkacz has become the **2nd Polish player to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Fibak, who reached the round of 16 here in 1977-78 and 1980-81.
- Hurkacz has reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 7th time here. He is in **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles round of 16 appearances by a Polish player**, after Fibak (14 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances).
- Hurkacz **did not compete at Wimbledon in 2025**, withdrawing ahead of the tournament with a lower back injury. On his most recent appearance in 2024 he reached the 2nd round, defeating Radu Albot before retiring with a right knee injury in the 4th set against Arthur Fils.
- Hurkacz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021, when he defeated Roger Federer in the quarterfinals before falling to Matteo Berrettini in the last 4. He became the 2nd Polish man in history to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam after Janowicz, who reached the semifinals at 2013 Wimbledon.
- In Grand Slam play this year**, Hurkacz reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Zizou Bergs, l. Ethan Quinn) and Roland Garros (d. Jaume Munar, l. Frances Tiafoe).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Hurkacz reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Andrey Rublev, l. Daniel Altmaier) but fell in the 1st round at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Marton Fucsovics).
- Hurkacz's **best Tour-level result in 2026** prior to Wimbledon is reaching the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000, where he defeated Luciano Darderi and Fabian Marozsan before falling to Valentin Vacherot. It is the only occasion he won back-to-back matches at an individual event this season prior to Wimbledon. He has fallen in the 1st or 2nd round at the 11 other Tour-level tournaments he has contested in 2026. He was also a member of the Polish team that won the United Cup title this year, winning 4 of the 5 singles matches he contested at the event.
- Hurkacz has also contested **2 Challenger-level events in 2026**. He finished runner-up as a wild card at the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Matteo Arnaldi) but lost his opening match at the Cap Cana Challenger (DOM) (l. Mattia Bellucci). They were his first appearances at Challenger-level since reaching the semifinals as a wild card at the 2019 Poznan Challenger (POL).
- Hurkacz has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2022 Halle (d. Daniil Medvedev), where he became the first Polish man in the Open Era to win a Tour-level title on grass. He is one of 27 players who began the men's singles draw here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Hurkacz has won one of the **2 five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Medvedev in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2021 but fell to Davidovich Fokina in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2022. He has a 9-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz is a **former Top 10 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 6 in August 2024. He dropped outside the Top 100 for the first time since August 2018 on 15 June before returning to the Top 100 last week. He plays here at No. 96.
- Hurkacz made his **Davis Cup** debut for Poland in 2016 and has an 11-9 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will play away against Australia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Hurkacz is coached by Gilles Cervara and Matt Terczynski.

- **STRUFF** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 12th Wimbledon appearance and 47th Grand Slam overall.
- Struff is bidding to become the **12th German man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Boris Becker (11 Wimbledon quarterfinal appearances), Michael Stich (4), Florian Mayer and Alexander Popp (both 2), and Jurgen Fassbender, Tommy Haas, Nicolas Kiefer, Philipp Kohlschreiber, Patrick Kuhn, Alex Radulescu and Rainer Schuettler (all one). (NB Alexander Zverev is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time this year)
- Struff is bidding to become the **18th German player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – and the 2nd active German player to do so, after Zverev, who is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the 18th time here.
- If Struff wins today and Zverev wins tomorrow, it will be the **first time that multiple German players have reached the men's singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since 2012 Wimbledon**, when Philipp Kohlschreiber and Florian Mayer both reached the quarterfinals here. It would be the 7th time in the Open Era that multiple German men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon – after 1988 (Boris Becker and Patrik Kuhn), 1991-93 (Becker and Michael Stich each year), 1997 (Becker, Nicolas Kiefer and Stich) and 2012.
- If Struff reaches his first Grand Slam quarterfinal on his 47th Grand Slam appearance, he will go **2nd on the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching a first Grand Slam quarterfinal**, behind Fabrice Santoro.

- At 36 years 78 days, Struff is bidding to become the **oldest player to reach a first Grand Slam men's singles quarterfinal in the Open Era** – ahead of Santoro, who reached his first Grand Slam quarterfinal at the 2006 Australian Open aged 33 years 51 days. - Struff is also bidding to become the **oldest player to reach a first Wimbledon men's singles quarterfinal in the Open Era** – ahead of Gilles Muller, who reached his first Wimbledon quarterfinal in 2017 aged 34 years 68 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament; see table overleaf)

- Wimbledon is Struff's **joint-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won, alongside Roland Garros.

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Struff has become the **20th German player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – and the 2nd active German player to do so after Zverev, who has reached the round of 16 here for the 4th time this year.
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 4th time, Struff has become the **8th German player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 4 or more occasions** – and the 2nd active German player to do so, after Zverev, who has reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 25th time here.
- With Struff and Zverev both in the round of 16 here, it is the **first time that multiple German players have reached the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2012**, when Kohlschreiber and Mayer both reached the round of 16 here. It is also the first time that multiple German players have reached the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam since 2025 Roland Garros, when Zverev and Daniel Altmaier reached the round of 16.
- At 36 years 78 days, Struff has become the **oldest player in the Open Era to make a first appearance in the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – ahead of Gianluca Pozzi, who reached the round of 16 here for the first time in 2000 aged 35 years 22 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Struff's victory against Brandon Nakashima in the 2nd round here was the **12th men's singles match at Wimbledon where 4 sets went to tiebreaks** – and the 3rd match to do so at Wimbledon this year, after Martin Damm defeated Marco Trungelliti 76(5) 67(5) 76(2) 76(5) in the 1st round on Monday and Matteo Berrettini defeated Stan Wawrinka 67(7) 76(16) 76(7) 76(5) in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Struff's victory against No. 9 Medvedev in the 3rd round was his **first win against a Top 10 player at Wimbledon on his 7th attempt**. The highest-ranked player he had previously defeated at Wimbledon was No. 28 Felix Auger-Aliassime in the 2nd round last year.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Struff has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. His previous best result was reaching the 3rd round on 4 occasions – including last year, when he defeated Filip Misolic and Felix Auger-Aliassime before falling to Carlos Alcaraz. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2018 (l. Roger Federer), 2019 (l. Mikhail Kukushkin) and 2024 (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Struff has **equalled his best Grand Slam result**. He has reached the round of 16 on 3 other occasions – at Roland Garros in 2019 (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2021 (l. Diego Schwartzman), and as a qualifier at the 2025 US Open (l. Djokovic).
- In Grand Slam play this year**, Struff reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Alexander Bublik, l. Jaime Faria) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Vit Kopriva).
- Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Struff reached the 2nd round at Stuttgart (d. Alexis Galarneau, l. Alexander Bublik) and as a wild card at Mallorca (d. Martin Landaluce, l. Nuno Borges).
- By winning his opening 3 matches here, Struff has recorded **3 match-wins at a Tour-level event for the first time since the 2025 US Open**, when he defeated Mackenzie McDonald, Holger Rune and Frances Tiafoe before falling to Djokovic in the round of 16. He had lost in the 1st or 2nd round at all 12 Tour-level events he has contested prior to Wimbledon in 2026.

- Struff has reached **one Tour-level final on grass** – at 2023 Stuttgart, where he finished runner-up to Frances Tiafoe.
- Struff has won 4 of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, including his 5-set victories against Baez and Nakashima in the opening 2 rounds here. It is the 2nd time he has won consecutive 5-set matches at a Grand Slam – after 2018 Wimbledon, when he recorded 5-set victories against Leonardo Mayer and Ivo Karlovic in the opening 2 rounds. He has a 13-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Struff reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 21 in June 2023. He plays here at No. 74.
- Struff made his **Davis Cup** debut for Germany in 2015 and has a 21-12 win-loss record in the competition overall. Germany will play at home against Croatia in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Struff is coached by Markus Wislsperger.
