On court today...

- In the first of today's semifinals, No. 2 seed Alexander Zverev faces British wild card Arthur Fery – who has defied all expectations to reach the last 4. Zverev is extremely familiar with this stage by now – the German is aiming to advance to his 5th Grand Slam final and should he win today, he will become the 3rd man in the Open Era to reach the final at the next Grand Slam event after winning his maiden major title. For Fery, victory today would see him become just the 2nd man to reach a Grand Slam final as a wild card, after Goran Ivanisevic at 2001 Wimbledon. Should he upset Zverev, he will also become the 4th British man in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam final, and the 2nd to do so at Wimbledon after Andy Murray, a 3-time finalist here.
- Jannik Sinner and Novak Djokovic will contest the 2nd semifinal match today, with the pair having also met in the last 4 here in both 2023 and 2025. They become just the 2nd pair of players in the Open Era to contest 3 Wimbledon men's singles semifinals (after Andre Agassi and Patrick Rafter in 1999-2001) and are contesting a Grand Slam semifinal for the 6th time. Sinner leads 3-2 in the pair's head-to-head in Grand Slam semifinals, but Djokovic recorded a famous victory in their most-recent encounter, an epic 5-set win in the semifinals at the Australian Open this year. Defending champion Sinner will become the first Italian player to reach multiple Wimbledon singles finals should he win today, while Djokovic is bidding to reach his 11th Wimbledon final and close the gap on Roger Federer at the top of the all-time list for most men's singles finals here. The Serb would also advance to a record-extending 39th Grand Slam final if he can defeat Sinner today.

Projected rankings

Sinner will remain world No. 1 when the new rankings are published on Monday 13 July, regardless of results today or in the final on Sunday. Zverev will remain at No. 3 on Monday if he loses today, but will rise to No. 2 if he wins the title or finishes runner-up here.

By reaching the semifinals here, Djokovic has ensured he will rise at least one place on Monday. He will be ranked at No. 7 if he loses today, No. 5 if he finishes runner-up and No. 4 if he wins the title.

By reaching the semifinals here, Fery has ensured that he will break both the Top 100 and the Top 50 for the first time on Monday. He will be ranked at No. 36 if he loses today, No. 26 if he finishes runner-up or No. 13 if he wins the title.

No. 1 v No. 2 in Grand Slam finals

If Sinner and Zverev win today, this will be the 18th occasion in the Open Era that the Top 2 seeds have contested the Wimbledon men's singles final. In the previous 17 meetings, No. 1 seeds lead No. 2 seeds 11-6. It would also be the 56th occasion in the Open Era that the Top 2 seeds have contested a Grand Slam singles final. In the previous 55 meetings, No. 1 seeds lead No. 2 seeds 28-27.

If Sinner and Zverev win today, it will be the first Grand Slam final in 2026 contested by the Top 2 seeds. 2025 was the first season in the Open Era where the Top 2 seeds met in the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments – with Sinner and Zverev contesting the final at the Australian Open, and Sinner and Carlos Alcaraz contesting the final at the 3 other Grand Slam tournaments.

Beating the Top 2

If one (but not both) of Djokovic or Fery win today, they will bid to become the 9th player in the Open Era to defeat both the No. 1 seed and No. 2 seed in the men's singles draw at a Grand Slam – and the first since Stan Wawrinka, who achieved the feat en route to his first 2 Grand Slam titles at the 2014 Australian Open and 2015 Roland Garros.

Top 2 seeds losing in Grand Slam semifinals

If Djokovic and Fery both win today, it will be the first time in the Open Era that both the No. 1 seed and No. 2 seed have lost in the men's singles semifinals at Wimbledon. It would be the 5th occasion in the Open Era where the Top 2 seeds have both lost in the men's singles semifinals at a Grand Slam.

Breaking the Alcaraz-Sinner duopoly

By winning his first Grand Slam title at Roland Garros last month, Zverev ended a streak of 9 Grand Slam tournaments won by either Sinner or Alcaraz. Since the start of the 2024 season, Zverev and Djokovic are the only players apart from Sinner and Alcaraz to have reached multiple Grand Slam finals. (see table overleaf)

Most Wimbledon men's singles final appearances (active players)

The winner of the match between Zverev and Fery will become the 7th active player to reach the Wimbledon men's singles final. If Sinner defeats Djokovic, he will become the 3rd active player to reach multiple Wimbledon men's singles finals, after Djokovic and Alcaraz.

A 12th meeting for Sinner and Djokovic, their 7th at a Grand Slam and their 4th at Wimbledon. The pair are tied 3-3 in previous Grand Slam meetings, but Djokovic leads 2-1 in previous Wimbledon matches – Djokovic won their first 2 meetings at Wimbledon, in the quarterfinals in 2022 and in the semifinals in 2023, before Sinner won their most-recent meeting in the semifinals here last year.

Djokovic ended a 5-match losing streak against Sinner by winning the pair's most-recent match, in the semifinals at the Australian Open this year.

Semifinal match-ups

This is Sinner and Djokovic's 3rd meeting in a semifinal at Wimbledon – they are tied 1-1 in previous semifinal matches here. They are the 2nd pair of players in the Open Era to contest 3 Wimbledon men's singles semifinals – after Andre Agassi and Patrick Rafter, who contested semifinal matches here in 1999, 2000 and 2001.

This is Sinner and Djokovic's 6th meeting in a semifinal at a Grand Slam – of their 6 previous Grand Slam meetings, 5 have come in semifinals. They are the 6th pair of players in the Open Era to contest 6 Grand Slam semifinals.

Top 10 meetings

This is the 4th meeting between Top 10 players in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year – after No. 10 Flavio Cobolli's victory against No. 6 Alex De Minaur in the round of 16 on Monday, No. 8 Djokovic's victory against No. 4 Felix Auger-Aliassime in the quarterfinals on Tuesday and No. 3 Alexander Zverev's victory against No. 7 Taylor Fritz in the quarterfinals on Wednesday.

Sinner v Top 10

Sinner is bidding to record his 4th consecutive victory against a Top 10 player at Wimbledon, having won 3 consecutive matches against Top 10 players from the quarterfinals through the final here last year – against No. 10 Ben Shelton in the quarterfinals, No. 6 Djokovic in the semifinals and No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz in the final. He has a 4-3 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Wimbledon overall.

Sinner has won 5 of the last 7 matches he has contested against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams, with his only defeats to Top 10 players at the Grand Slams in that time coming against No. 2 Alcaraz in the US Open final last year and No. 4 Djokovic in the semifinals at the Australian Open this year. He has a 15-14 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams.

Sinner has won 19 of the last 20 matches he has played against Top 10 players at Tour-level. Since falling to No. 2 Alcaraz in the final at the US Open last year, his only defeat to a Top 10 player came against No. 4 Djokovic in the semifinals at the Australian Open this year. He has a 67-37 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.

Djokovic v Top 10

Djokovic's victory against No. 4 Auger-Aliassime in the quarterfinals here ended a 3-match losing streak against Top 10 players at Wimbledon. He had previously lost his last 3 matches against Top 10 players here – losing to No. 1 Alcaraz in the 2023 final, to No. 3 Alcaraz in the 2024 final and to No. 1 Sinner in the semifinals last year. He has a 14-7 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Wimbledon overall.

Djokovic has won 3 of the 4 matches he has played against Top 10 players in 2026, with all 4 of those matches coming at the Grand Slams. In addition to his victory against No. 4 Auger-Aliassime in the quarterfinals here, he faced 3 Top 10 players at the Australian Open - he defeated No. 5 Lorenzo Musetti in the quarterfinals when Musetti retired with a right leg injury while leading 2-0 and defeated No. 2 Sinner in 5 sets in the semifinals before falling to No. 1 Alcaraz in the final. He has a 75-38 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams and 266-121 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.

Djokovic v world No. 1s

Djokovic has won 2 of the 4 matches he has played against world No. 1s at Wimbledon – he defeated Rafael Nadal in the final in 2011 and the semifinals in 2018 but lost to Alcaraz in the final in 2023 and to Sinner in the semifinals last year.

Djokovic is bidding to end a 4-match losing streak against world No. 1s at the Grand Slams. Since defeating Alcaraz in the semifinals at 2023 Roland Garros, he has lost to Alcaraz in the final here in 2023, to Sinner in the semifinals at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon last year, and to Alcaraz in the final at the Australian Open this year. He has a 4-9 win-loss record against world No. 1s at the Grand Slams.

Djokovic is also bidding to end a 4-match losing streak against world No. 1s at Tour-level. Since defeating Alcaraz in the final at 2023 Cincinnati-1000, he has lost to Sinner in the final at 2024 Shanghai-1000 and in the semifinals at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon last year, and to Alcaraz in the final at the Australian Open this year. He has a 16-22 win-loss record against world No. 1s at Tour-level overall.

- Defending champion **SINNER** is bidding to reach his 2nd Wimbledon final. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **first Italian player in history to reach multiple singles finals at Wimbledon**. He is one of 3 Italian players to reach a singles final at Wimbledon – after Matteo Berrettini, who finished as men's singles runner-up in 2021, and Jasmine Paolini, who finished as women's singles runner-up in 2024.
- Sinner is bidding to reach back-to-back Wimbledon finals and become the **18th player in the Open Era to reach back-to-back men's singles finals at Wimbledon** – and the 3rd active player to do so, after Djokovic, who reached 3 consecutive finals here in 2013-15 and 6 consecutive finals here in 2018-2024*, and Carlos Alcaraz, who reached 3 consecutive finals here in 2023-25. (*NB no tournament in 2020)
- Sinner is bidding to reach his 7th Grand Slam final and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles finals reached by an Italian player**, man or woman. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Nicola Pietrangeli, by reaching his 5th Grand Slam final at Wimbledon last year.

- Sinner is contesting his **10th Grand Slam semifinal** – and his 3rd at Wimbledon. He has a 6-3 win-loss record in Grand Slam semifinal matches overall and has won one of the 2 semifinal matches he has contested here.

- Sinner is bidding to record his 99th Grand Slam match-win. By defeating Nuno Borges in the 2nd round for his 95th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles matches won by an Italian player**, ahead of Pietrangeli.
- Wimbledon is Sinner's **2nd-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won, behind the Australian Open. He has reached 2 finals at the Australian Open and the US Open and one final here and at Roland Garros.

- By reaching his 3rd Wimbledon semifinal, Sinner has extended his **all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles semifinals by an Italian player**. He is one of 4 Italian men in history to reach the semifinals here – alongside Pietrangeli (1960), Berrettini (2021) and Musetti (2024).

- By reaching his 10th Grand Slam semifinal, Sinner has extended his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles semifinal appearances by an Italian player**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Pietrangeli, by reaching his 6th Grand Slam semifinal at Roland Garros last year.
- By reaching his 10th Grand Slam semifinal, Sinner has become the **4th active player to reach 10 Grand Slam men's singles semifinals** – after Djokovic (who is contesting his 55th Grand Slam semifinal today), Alexander Zverev (who is contesting his 12th Grand Slam semifinal today) and Alcaraz (10 Grand Slam semifinal appearances).
- Last year here, Sinner won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating 2-time defending champion Alcaraz in the final. He became the first Italian player, man or woman, to win a Wimbledon singles title. By reaching his first Wimbledon final, he also became the 11th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. Alcaraz then became the 12th player to achieve the feat by reaching his first Australian Open final this year.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **10th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title** – after Rod Laver, John Newcombe, Bjorn Borg, John McEnroe, Boris Becker, Pete Sampras, Roger Federer, Djokovic and Alcaraz.
- Sinner is a **4-time Grand Slam champion**. In addition to his title here last year, he also won the titles at the Australian Open in 2024 (d. Daniil Medvedev) and 2025 (d. Zverev) and at the 2024 US Open (d. Taylor Fritz). He holds the record for most Grand Slam singles titles won by an Italian player – ahead of 2-time Grand Slam champion Pietrangeli, who won the men's singles title at Roland Garros in 1959 and 1960.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Djokovic) and the 2nd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Clement Tabur before falling to Juan Manuel Cerundolo in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was his earliest Grand Slam exit since falling to Daniel Altmaier in the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros.
- **Sinner leads the Tour for most singles titles won in 2026**. He has won the titles at all 5 Masters-1000 events this season – at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev), Miami-1000 (d. Jiri Lehecka), Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Alcaraz), Madrid-1000 (d. Zverev) and Rome-1000 (d. Casper Ruud). By winning the title at Rome-1000 he became the 2nd player to complete the set of Masters-1000 titles, after Djokovic.
- Sinner has **lost 3 matches in 2026** – in addition to his defeats at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also fell in the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Jakub Mensik).
- Sinner has **won 2 Tour-level titles on grass**. In addition to his Wimbledon title last year, he won the title at 2024 Halle (d. Hubert Hurkacz). He is one of 4 Italian men to have won a Tour-level title on grass in the Open Era – alongside Berrettini (4 grass court titles), and Andreas Seppi and Lorenzo Sonego (both one). He is one of 17 players who began the men's singles draw here not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- By defeating Miomir Kecmanovic in 5 sets in the 1st round here, Sinner ended a **streak of 5 consecutive defeats in 5-set matches**. It was his first victory in a 5-set match here, having previously lost both 5-set matches he had contested at Wimbledon – in the quarterfinals in both 2022, when he lost to Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead, and in 2024 when he fell to Medvedev. He has a 7-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Sinner became **world No. 1** for the first time following 2024 Roland Garros and began his 79th week as world No. 1 on Monday. He will remain world No. 1 following Wimbledon regardless of results at this tournament.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to Davis Cup title in 2023 and 2024**. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 15-4 overall win-loss record in the competition but did not compete in Davis Cup in 2025 as Italy won their 3rd consecutive title. As hosts, Italy have received a wild card to the 2026 Davis Cup Final 8 in Bologna in November.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach his 11th Wimbledon final and close the gap on Roger Federer at the top of the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles finals reached.

- Djokovic has a **10-4 win-loss record in Wimbledon semifinals**. Prior to his semifinal defeat to Sinner last year, he had won the last 9 semifinal matches he has contested here, having not lost a Wimbledon semifinal since falling to Federer in 2012. - Djokovic is bidding to record his 108th Wimbledon match-win and extend his **all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles match-wins**, ahead of Federer. He claimed sole ownership of the record by defeating Roman Safiullin in the round of 16 here this year. - By reaching his 15th Wimbledon semifinal, Djokovic has extended his **all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles semifinal appearances**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer, by reaching his 14th Wimbledon semifinal last year.
- By reaching his 55th Grand Slam semifinal, Djokovic has extended his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles semifinal appearances**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer, by reaching his 47th Grand Slam semifinal at the 2023 US Open.
- By reaching his 8th consecutive Wimbledon semifinal, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most consecutive Wimbledon men's singles semifinal appearances**, ahead of Federer, who reached 7 consecutive semifinals here in 2003-09. Djokovic also recorded a streak of 6 consecutive semifinal appearances here in 2010-15.

- At 39 years 51 days, Djokovic has become the **2nd player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles semifinals at Wimbledon aged 39 or older** – after Rosewall, who reached the semifinals here in 1974 aged 39 years 246 days. Across men's and women's singles, he is the 3rd player in the Open Era to reach the semifinals here aged 39 or older – after Rosewall and Billie Jean King (who reached the women's singles semifinals here aged 39 years 223 days in 1983). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- By reaching his 5th Wimbledon semifinal since turning 35, Djokovic has extended his **Open Era record for most Wimbledon men's singles semifinals reached aged 35 or older**. Rosewall (3 Wimbledon semifinal appearances after turning 35) and Federer (2) are the only other players to reach multiple Wimbledon semifinals after turning 35.
- By reaching the semifinals here, Djokovic has become the **4th man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam aged 39 or older** – after Rosewall (4 Grand Slam semifinal appearances after turning 39) and Pancho Gonzales and Jimmy Connors (both one).
- By reaching his 13th Grand Slam semifinal since turning 35, Djokovic has extended his **Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles semifinals reached aged 35 or older**. Rosewall (10 Grand Slam semifinal appearances after turning 35) and Federer (6) are in 2nd and 3rd place on the list, respectively.
- **Last year here**, Djokovic reached the semifinals, falling to Sinner in straight sets. - Djokovic is bidding to become the **first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35**. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.
- Djokovic is making his 21st Wimbledon appearance, claiming sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances**, ahead of Connors. Federer, who competed in the men's singles here on 22 occasions, is the only player to have made more Wimbledon men's singles appearances than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is making his 83rd Grand Slam appearance overall, extending his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances**. He equalled the previous record, held by Federer and Feliciano Lopez, by making his 81st Grand Slam appearance at the Australian Open this year before claiming sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, falling to Joao Fonseca in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. It was the 2nd time he had lost a match from 2-0 up, after his defeat to Jurgen Melzer in the quarterfinals at 2010 Roland Garros. It was also his joint-earliest defeat at a Grand Slam since falling to Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open – he also fell in the 3rd round at the 2024 US Open (l. Alexei Popyrin).
- Djokovic is contesting his **5th event of the 2026 season here**. In addition to his appearances at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, he also competed at Indian Wells-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Kamil Majchrzak and Aleksandar Kovacevic before falling to Jack Draper in the round of 16, and at Rome-1000, where he received a bye through the 1st round before falling to Dino Prizmic in the 2nd round.

- Djokovic is **one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass**, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 17 players in the men's singles who has not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.

- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked at No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended in June 2024, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He plays here at No. 8.
- Djokovic became the **5th player to complete the career 'Golden Slam' in singles** by winning Olympic singles gold for Serbia at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event, defeating Alcaraz in the final. He joined Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams as the only players to have achieved the feat. He also won Olympic singles bronze at Beijing 2008 and is the only player to have won a medal for Serbia in the Olympic Tennis Event.

- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 46-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia play at home against Lithuania in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.

NO. 2 ALEXANDER ZVEREV (GER) v (WC) ARTHUR FERY (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Zverev has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 114 Fery twice before – when he fell to No. 138 Ernests Gulbis in the 3rd round here in 2018 and when he fell to No. 124 Jiri Vesely in the 1st round here in 2019.

Zverev lost his only previous match against a wild card at Wimbledon – on his Grand Slam debut here in 2015, when he fell to Denis Kudla in the 2nd round. He has won the 6 other matches he has contested against wild cards at the Grand Slams.

Zverev won his only previous match against a British player at Wimbledon – he defeated Cameron Norrie in the 3rd round here in 2024. He has a 5-2 win-loss record against British players at the Grand Slams, with his 2 defeats coming in his first 2 Grand Slam matches against British players – against Andy Murray in the 1st round at the 2016 Australian Open and against Daniel Evans in the 2nd round at the 2016 US Open.

Zverev is bidding to extend an 8-match Tour-level winning streak against British players. His last defeat to a British player at Tour-level came against Murray in the 2nd round at 2023 Doha. He has a 19-4 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall.

Zverev has a 13-1 win-loss record against players at their home Grand Slams. In addition to winning his only previous match against a British player at Wimbledon, he has a 2-0 win-loss record against Australian players at the Australian Open, a 5-0 win-loss record against French players at Roland Garros and a 5-1 win-loss record against American players at the US Open. His only defeat to a player at their home Grand Slam came against Taylor Fritz in the quarterfinals at the 2024 US Open.

Fery is facing a Top 5 player for the 2nd time. He lost the only match he has played against a Top 5 player, falling to No. 3 Daniil Medvedev in the 1st round here in 2023. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 10 Flavio Cobolli in the quarterfinals here on Wednesday.

- Zverev is bidding to become the **first German player, man or woman, to reach a Wimbledon singles final since 2018**, when Angelique Kerber won the women's singles title here. Three German players have reached the women's singles final here since Becker reached his 7th Wimbledon final in 1995 – Steffi Graf (who contested her 8th and 9th Wimbledon finals in 1996 and 1999, respectively), Sabine Lisicki (who finished runner-up here in 2013) and Kerber (who finished runner-up here in 2016 and won the title in 2018).
- Zverev is bidding to claim sole ownership of **4th place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam singles final appearances by a German player, man or woman** – ahead of Kerber, who contested 4 Grand Slam women's singles finals.

- Zverev is bidding to become the **3rd man in the Open Era to reach the final at the next Grand Slam event after winning a first Grand Slam title** – after Andy Murray (who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2012 US Open and then finished runner-up at the 2013 Australian Open) and Daniil Medvedev (who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2021 US Open then finished runner-up at 2022 Australian Open). - By reaching the semifinals, Zverev has become the **5th German man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon** – after Becker (who reached 9 semifinals here, in 1985-86, 1988-91 and 1993-95), Stich (1991 and 1997), Rainer Schuettler (2008) and Tommy Haas (2009).
- Zverev is contesting his 12th Grand Slam semifinal. He is in **2nd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam semifinal appearances by a German man**, behind Becker (18 Grand Slam semifinal appearances).
- By reaching his first Wimbledon semifinal on his 10th appearance here, Zverev has gone **joint-4th on the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching a first Wimbledon men's singles semifinal**, alongside Kevin Anderson, John Isner, Sam Querrey and Schuettler. Jonas Bjorkman (13 attempts before his first Wimbledon semifinal), and Marin Cilic and Haas (both 11) are the only players in the Open Era to have made more Wimbledon appearances before reaching their first men's singles semifinals here.

- By reaching his first Wimbledon semifinal, Zverev has become the **27th player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles semifinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments** – and the 5th active player to do so, after Carlos Alcaraz, Cilic, Novak Djokovic and Sinner. He has also become the 3rd German player to achieve the feat in the Open Era – after Becker and Stich.
- By reaching the semifinals here, Zverev has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. His previous best result was reaching the round of 16 here on 3 occasions – in 2017 (l. Milos Raonic), 2021 (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and 2024 (l. Fritz).
- Zverev won his **first Grand Slam title** at Roland Garros this year, defeating Flavio Cobolli in 5 sets in the final. By winning his first Grand Slam title on his 41st appearance at a major, he went 2nd on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances before winning a first title – after Goran Ivanisevic, who won the title here in 2001 on his 48th major appearance. He also became the first German player to win a Grand Slam men's singles title since Becker at the 1996 Australian Open.
- Zverev has reached **3 other Grand Slam finals**. In addition to his title at Roland Garros this year, he finished runner-up at the 2020 US Open (l. Dominic Thiem), 2024 Roland Garros (l. Alcaraz) and the 2025 Australian Open (l. Sinner).
- **Last year here**, Zverev fell to Arthur Rinderknech in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Zverev is bidding to become the **3rd German man to win the Wimbledon title in the Open Era**, after Becker (1985-86, 1989) and Stich (1991).
- Zverev is bidding to become the **14th man in history to win back-to-back Roland Garros and Wimbledon titles** – and the 7th in the Open Era after Rod Laver (1969*), Bjorn Borg (1978-80), Rafael Nadal (2008, 2010), Federer (2009), Djokovic (2021) and Alcaraz (2024). (*NB Laver also achieved the feat prior to the Open Era, in 1962)
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Alcaraz).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at Halle (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Zverev's **other highlights in 2026** are finishing runner-up at Madrid-1000 (l. Sinner) and reaching the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Sinner), Miami-1000 (l. Sinner), Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Sinner) and Munich (l. Cobolli).
- Zverev has won 3 of the 8 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 24-15 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Zverev has reached **3 Tour-level finals on grass** – at Halle in both 2016 (l. Florian Mayer) and 2017 (l. Federer) and at Stuttgart last year (l. Fritz).
- Zverev reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after reaching the semifinals at 2022 Roland Garros. He plays here at No. 3.
- Zverev **won Olympic singles gold for Germany** at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event in 2021, defeating Russian Olympic Committee's Karen Khachanov in the final. It was Germany's 3rd Olympic gold medal in tennis – after Steffi Graf in women's singles at Seoul 1988 and Becker/Stich in men's doubles at Barcelona 1992. He reached the quarterfinals on his title defence at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event (l. Lorenzo Musetti).
- Zverev was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2014 Australian Open, defeating Stefan Kozlov in the final. He also finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2013 Roland Garros (l. Cristian Garin) and was named 2013 Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (l. Kozlov).
- Zverev has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2016 and has an 11-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Germany will play at home against Croatia in the 2026 Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.

- **FERY** is bidding to reach his first Grand Slam final. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 5th Grand Slam overall.
- Fery is bidding to become the **2nd British player in the Open Era to reach the Wimbledon men's singles final** – after Andy Murray, who finished runner-up here in 2012 and won the title in 2013 and 2016. Murray is the only British player to have reached the men's singles final here since Bunny Austin finished runner-up in 1938.
- Fery is bidding to become the **4th British player in the Open Era, man or woman, to reach a Wimbledon singles final** – after Murray, Ann Jones (who won the women's singles title here in 1969) and Virginia Wade (who won the women's singles title here in 1977).

- Fery is bidding to become the **2nd player to reach a Grand Slam men's singles final as a wild card** – after Goran Ivanisevic, who won the Wimbledon title as a wild card in 2001. Across men's and women's singles, he would become the 4th player to reach a Grand Slam final as a wild card – after Ivanisevic (2001 Wimbledon men's singles champion), Kim Clijsters (2009 US Open women's singles champion) and Justine Henin (2010 Australian Open women's singles runner-up).
- At No. 114, Fery is bidding to become the **2nd-lowest ranked player* to reach a Wimbledon men's singles final** – after No. 125 Ivanisevic at 2001 Wimbledon. Ivanisevic is the only player to reach the men's singles final here while ranked outside the Top 100. (*since the introduction of ATP rankings in 1973)

- By reaching the semifinals here, Fery has become the **9th British player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles semifinals at a Grand Slam** – after Murray (21 Grand Slam semifinal appearances), Tim Henman (6), Roger Taylor (3) and Jack Draper, Kyle Edmund, John Lloyd, Cameron Norrie and Rusedski (all one).
- By reaching the semifinals here, Fery has become the **2nd player to reach the men's singles semifinals as a wild card at Wimbledon** – after Ivanisevic in 2001. - By reaching the semifinals here, Fery has recorded the **best Grand Slam performance by a British wild card, man or woman**. The previous best performances by British wild cards at the Grand Slams were round of 16 finishes by 4 players – Deborah Jevans (1979 Wimbledon), Andrew Foster (1993 Wimbledon), Samantha Smith (1998 Wimbledon) and Raducanu (2021 and 2024 Wimbledon).
- At No. 114, Fery has become the **lowest ranked player to reach the men's singles semifinals at Wimbledon since 2001**, when No. 125 Ivanisevic won the title here.
- At No. 114, Fery has become the **joint-lowest ranked player to reach the men's singles semifinals at a Grand Slam since 2001 Wimbledon**, when No. 125 Ivanisevic won the title here. Aslan Karatsev was also ranked at No. 114 when he reached the semifinals at the 2021 Australian Open.
- By reaching the semifinals here, Fery has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best Grand Slam result was reaching the 2nd round on 2 occasions – as a wild card at Wimbledon last year (d. Alexei Popyrin, l. Luciano Darderi) and as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year (d. Flavio Cobolli, l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fery reached the 2nd round of qualifying at Roland Garros (d. Elias Ymer, l. Pedro Martinez).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Fery reached his **first Tour-level quarterfinal** as a wild card at Queen's, defeating Toby Samuel and Adrian Mannarino before falling to Francisco Cerundolo. He also reached the 2nd round as a wild card at Eastbourne (d. Roman Andres Burruchaga, l. Juan Manuel Cerundolo).
- Fery has contested **4 events at Challenger-level in 2026**. His best results are reaching the semifinals at 2 events – on clay at the Zagreb Challenger (CRO) (l. Jan Choinski) and on grass at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (l. Bu Yunchaokete).
- Fery's 5-set victories against Zizou Bergs and Grigor Dimitrov here this year were his **first victories in 5-set matches**. He lost the only other 5-set match he has contested at Tour-level – against Daniel Altmaier in the 1st round here in 2024. He also lost a 5-set match in the final round of Wimbledon qualifying in 2021, falling to Tallon Griekspoor despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- Fery broke the Top 200 for the first time in October 2025. He plays here at a **new career-high ranking** of No. 114.
- Fery **played college tennis** at Stanford University from 2020 to 2024, ending his college career with a 58-16 singles win-loss record. He was named an all-American in singles in both 2022 and 2023.
- Fery had a **good junior career**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 12 in March 2020. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Shintaro Mochizuki).
- Fery made his **Davis Cup** debut for Great Britain in 2025, winning the only match he has contested in the competition to date. Great Britain will play at home against Ecuador in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September.
- Fery is coached by Benoit Foucher and Jeroen Benard.
