



# 2021 ROLAND GARROS



## Men's Tournament Preview

In 1968, the first Grand Slam tournament of the Open Era was held at Roland Garros. This year's event is the 54th French Open and the 212th Grand Slam tournament of the Open Era. The tournament is being played one week later than its usual position in the calendar, but has returned to its traditional May-June slot this year after the 2020 event was rescheduled to September-October due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

2021 Roland Garros is the 120th edition of the French championships, which began in 1891 as a closed championship reserved for national players or players enrolled in French clubs, and the 91st tournament since the event became international in 1925. This is the 88th time that the tournament has been held at Roland Garros, which was built for the 1928 France v USA Davis Cup Final.

### POINTS AND PRIZE MONEY

Total prize money for this year's men's singles event is €13,616,000 – which is an overall decrease of 6% compared to 2020. However, prize money for losing players in the 1st and 2nd rounds remains at 2020 levels (which represented a 30% increase compared to 2019) and prize money for players competing in the qualifying tournament has also remained at 2020 levels (a 27% increase compared to 2019).

### NADAL BIDS FOR ALL-TIME GRAND SLAM RECORD

Nadal is aiming to win his 21st Grand Slam title and take sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles. By winning the title here last year, Nadal equalled Roger Federer's mark of 20 Grand Slam titles – it was the first time that the pair had been level in terms of Grand Slam titles won since Federer won his first Grand Slam title at 2003 Wimbledon. Novak Djokovic is bidding to win his 19th Grand Slam title and close the gap on Federer and Nadal at the top of the list.

## GRAND SLAM LEADERBOARD

Federer and Nadal are bidding to close the gap on Steffi Graf in 3rd place on the list for most Grand Slam singles titles, while Djokovic is bidding to equal Helen Wills Moody in 6th place on the list. By winning the 2020 title here, Nadal became the 5th player in history, man or woman, to win 20 Grand Slam singles titles.

## NADAL GOES FOR FOURTEEN TITLES IN PARIS

Rafael Nadal is bidding to become the first player in history to win 14 singles titles at any Grand Slam event. His victory here in 2019 took his total of Roland Garros titles to 12, which saw him claim the record for most singles titles at the same Grand Slam tournament, ahead of Margaret Court's mark of 11 Australian titles.

By winning the title here last year, Nadal became the first player in the Open Era to win 13 singles titles at any Tour-level event. Roland Garros is Nadal's most successful Tour-level event, but he has won 10 or more titles at 3 other tournaments – at Barcelona (12 titles), Monte Carlo-1000 (11 titles) and Rome-1000 (10 titles).

Nadal is also bidding to further extend his record for the most men's singles Grand Slam titles at any one event.

## FIVE-IN-A-ROW

Nadal is bidding to win the title here for a 5th consecutive year and become the first player in history to record 2 streaks of 5 men's singles titles at the same Grand Slam event. He also won 5 straight titles here in 2010-14. Federer is the only man to have recorded streaks of 5 consecutive titles at the same Grand Slam event on 2 different occasions. (see table overleaf)

## ROLAND GARROS TITLE LEADERS

Nadal currently heads the all-time Roland Garros men's singles title leaders list, with more than double the number of titles of Bjorn Borg, who is in 2nd place on the list.

## DJOKOVIC PURSUES A CAREER GRAND SLAM DOUBLE

Djokovic is bidding to become the first man in the Open Era – and only the 3rd man in history – to win each of the 4 Grand Slam titles twice. Roy Emerson and Laver are the only players to have won each Grand Slam on 2 or more occasions. (NB While Laver completed the feat in 1969, some of the titles were won before the start of the Open Era)

## TITLES IN MELBOURNE AND PARIS

Djokovic enters Roland Garros with a chance to become the 3rd man in history to win the Australian Open and Roland Garros titles in the same year on multiple occasions after Emerson and Laver. In 2016, he became the first man to complete the Melbourne-Paris double since Jim Courier in 1992.

## THE DJOKOVIC-NADAL DUOPOLY

Between them, Djokovic and Nadal have won 10 of the last 11 Grand Slam titles (since 2018 Roland Garros), with Dominic Thiem the only other player to have won a major title in that time – Thiem claimed his first Grand Slam title at the US Open last year. Djokovic has won 6 major titles in that time, with Nadal claiming 4 major titles.

## **THIEM'S TIME?**

Two-time Roland Garros finalist Thiem is bidding to become the first Austrian player in history to win multiple Grand Slam titles, after winning his first major title at the 2020 US Open. Thomas Muster, who won the title here in 1995, is the only other Austrian player to have won a Grand Slam title.

Victory in New York last year saw Thiem become the 150th different Grand Slam men's singles champion in history (and the 55th different Grand Slam men's singles champion in the Open Era), and the first new Grand Slam men's singles champion since Marin Cilic won the title at the 2014 US Open. He also became the first man born in the 1990s to win a Grand Slam title.

## **THIRD TIME LUCKY FOR MEDVEDEV?**

No. 2 seed Daniil Medvedev is bidding to become the 3rd Russian man to win a Grand Slam title – after Yevgeny Kafelnikov (who won the titles at 1996 Roland Garros and the 2000 Australian Open) and Marat Safin (who won the titles at the 2000 US Open and the 2005 Australian Open).

Medvedev reached his 2nd Grand Slam final at the Australian Open this year, falling to Djokovic in straight sets. He previously finished runner-up at the 2019 US Open, falling to Nadal in 5 sets.

## **THE YOUNG PRETENDERS**

No. 5 seed Stefanos Tsitsipas (22 years 305 days) and No. 7 seed Andrey Rublev (23 years 236 days) are both looking to become the youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion since Juan Martin del Potro won the 2009 US Open aged 20 years 355 days. They are also bidding to become the youngest Roland Garros men's singles champion since Nadal won the title here in 2008 aged 22 years 5 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

No. 6 seed Alexander Zverev (24 years 54 days) is looking to become the youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion since Djokovic won 2011 Wimbledon aged 24 years 42 days. He is also bidding to become the youngest Roland Garros men's singles champion since Nadal won the title here in 2010 aged 24 years 3 days.

By reaching his first Grand Slam final at the US Open last year aged 23 years 146 days, Zverev became the youngest man to reach a major final since Djokovic finished runner-up at the 2010 US Open aged 23 years 113 days.

## **FEDERER RETURNS**

Federer is contesting his first Grand Slam event since the 2020 Australian Open, where he reached the semifinals. He missed the rest of the 2020 season due to a right knee injury, returning to action at Doha in March this year. He has contested just 3 matches this season, defeating Daniel Evans before falling to Nikoloz Basilashvili at Doha, and losing to Pablo Andujar in his opening match at Geneva earlier this month.

Federer is bidding to win a 2nd Roland Garros title 12 years after his first in 2009, and set the record for longest gap between winning a 2nd title at an individual Grand Slam event in the Open Era. Jimmy Connors currently holds the record with 8 years between his first and 2nd titles at Wimbledon, having won his first Wimbledon title in 1974 and his 2nd Wimbledon title in 1982.

## **STACKED TOP HALF**

With Djokovic, Nadal and Federer all having been drawn in the top half of the draw, it is the first time that all members of the 'Big 3' have been drawn in the same half of a Grand Slam draw.

## MOST ROLAND GARROS FINAL APPEARANCES

Nadal has reached more Roland Garros men's singles finals than any other player and has won all 13 finals he has contested here. Djokovic or Federer will equal Bjorn Borg in 2nd place on the Open Era list for most appearances in the Roland Garros men's singles final if either of them reach the final here this year..

## MOST GRAND SLAM FINAL APPEARANCES

Federer is top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam final appearances, having contested his 31st major final at 2019 Wimbledon. Djokovic equalled Nadal in 2nd place on the list after reaching the final at the Australian Open earlier this year.

## DECADES APART

Having won the title here last year 15 years 4 months after his first Grand Slam title, Nadal holds the record the largest gap between first and most recent Grand Slam men's singles title wins in the Open Era. Serena Williams is the only player whose Grand Slam title wins have spanned a longer period than Nadal.

Djokovic and Nadal are the only 2 men to have won Grand Slam singles titles in 3 different decades in the Open Era, having both won Grand Slam titles in the 2000s, 2010s and 2020s. Serena Williams (who won at least one major title in the 1990s, 2000s and 2010s) and Martina Navratilova (1970s, 1980s and 1990s) are the only other 2 players who have achieved the feat in the Open Era.

## THE 30s CLUB

Djokovic (34 years 22 days) and Nadal (35 years 10 days) are both bidding to win their 7th Grand Slam titles since turning 30. They jointly hold the Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won after the age of 30. Nadal won his most-recent Grand Slam title aged 34 years 130 days at Roland Garros last year. Djokovic won his most-recent Grand Slam title aged 33 years 275 days at the Australian Open this year. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

Federer (39 years 309 days) is bidding to win his 5th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and claim sole ownership of 3rd place on the list, ahead of Laver and Rosewall. Federer won his most-recent Grand Slam title aged 36 years 173 days at the 2018 Australian Open.

There are 46 men aged 30 or over to start this year's Roland Garros main draw. The record for the most players aged 30 or over in a Grand Slam men's singles draw is 51, which was set at 2016 Roland Garros.

### FIVE GRAND SLAM CHAMPIONS IN MAIN DRAW

There are 5 Grand Slam tournament champions appearing in the 2021 Roland Garros men's singles main draw, including 3 former Roland Garros winners: Djokovic, Federer and Nadal. Just 3 other active male players have won Grand Slam singles titles: Juan Martin del Potro, Andy Murray and Stan Wawrinka.

### SO NEAR YET SO FAR

Six players competing here this year have reached at least one Grand Slam final during their careers but are still bidding for their first major title – including both No. 2 seed Medvedev and No. 6 seed Zverev. None of those 6 players have reached the Roland Garros final.

### 38 YEARS SINCE A FRENCH WINNER

When Marcel Bernard won the men's singles title at Roland Garros in 1946, it marked the 9th victory by a Frenchman in 16 tournaments here after the event went international. However since then, Yannick Noah is the only Frenchman to win his home Slam, lifting the title in 1983. In fact, he is the only French Grand Slam men's singles champion in the Open Era. The last French finalist at Roland Garros was Henri Leconte in 1988. No. 14 seed Gael Monfils is the highest-ranked Frenchman in the main draw this year. (see table overleaf)

## ROLAND GARROS ACHIEVERS

By winning his 7 matches here last year, Nadal became the first player, man or woman, to win 100 singles matches at Roland Garros. He also became the 5th player, and 2nd man, to record 100 match-wins at a Grand Slam event – after Chris Evert (101-12 at the US Open), Federer (102-15 at the Australian Open, 101-13 at Wimbledon), Martina Navratilova (120-14 at Wimbledon) and Serena Williams (106-14 at the US Open).

With 6 match-wins here in 2020, Djokovic moved into 2nd place on the all-time list for most Roland Garros men's singles match-wins, ahead of Federer.

## KING OF CLAY

Nadal has a 125-2 win-loss record in best-of-five set matches on clay. His only defeats came at Roland Garros – against Robin Soderling in 2009 and Djokovic in 2015. He has lost just 42 matches on clay at Tour-level in his career overall.

Nadal holds the record for the longest winning streak on clay having won 81 successive matches from 2005 AMS Monte Carlo through the 2007 AMS Hamburg final.

Nadal became the first man in the Open Era to win 50 clay court titles and took sole ownership of the Open Era record for most clay court titles at 2017 Monte Carlo-1000. (see table overleaf)

## PICKING A WINNER

In the Open Era, 35 of the 53 Roland Garros champions entered the event having won at least one Tour-level clay court title in the months leading up to Roland Garros. The most recent player not to have won a clay court title prior to Roland Garros was Nadal last year (although the changes to the calendar due to the Covid-19 pandemic meant that Nadal played just one clay court event prior to Roland Garros in 2020).

Muster (in 1995) and Nadal (in 2005 and 2013) have won the most titles on clay prior to winning here – both winning 5 clay court titles before triumphing at Roland Garros.

## HOW HAS THE TOP SEED FARED AT ROLAND GARROS?

The top seed has won the title on just 15 occasions in the 53 Roland Garros tournaments played since 1968. This is the least successful performance by the top seed at any of the Grand Slam events. In the Open Era, the top seed has had most success at Wimbledon, triumphing 22 times.

Overall, in the 89 French Championships played since seeding began here in 1925, the top seed has won the title 28 times. The only No. 1 seed to lose in the 1st round here since 1925 is Stefan Edberg in 1990.

The No. 1 seed here has reached the quarterfinals or better in each of the last 11 years – winning the title 4 times (Nadal in 2011, 2014 and 2018; Djokovic in 2016), finishing runner-up 3 times (Djokovic in 2012, 2015 and 2020), reaching the semifinals 3 times (Djokovic in 2013 and 2019, Murray in 2017) and reaching the quarterfinals once (Federer in 2010).

Dominic Thiem (2011), Alexander Zverev (2013), Jaume Munar (2014), Taylor Fritz (2015) and Felix Auger-Aliassime (2016) reached the boys' singles final here.

## **MISSING IN ACTION**

Players who withdrew before the draw are as follows: Attila Balazs (leg), Borna Coric (shoulder), Kyle Edmund (knee), Nick Kyrgios (non-medical), Vasek Pospisil (non-medical), Denis Shapovalov (shoulder), Stan Wawrinka (left foot).

## **WILD CARDS**

Seven of the 8 men's singles main draw wild cards were awarded to French players: Gregoire Barrere, Benjamin Bonzi, Mathias Bourgue, Arthur Cazaux, Enzo Couacaud, Hugo Gaston and Arthur Rinderknech. The final wild card was awarded to Christopher O'Connell as part of an agreement between the FFT and Tennis Australia.

## **FIRST TIMERS**

12 players in the men's main draw are making their debut appearances at 2021 Roland Garros – of the 12 debutants, 7 are qualifiers, 3 are wild cards and 2 are direct acceptances (including one seed).

The last Grand Slam men's singles champion to win a title on his first appearance at that event was Nadal at 2005 Roland Garros.

Four players are making their Grand Slam main draw debuts here this year: Arthur Cazaux, Enzo Couacaud, Lorenzo Musetti and Bernebe Zapata Miralles.

## **LEFTHANDERS**

There are 18 lefthanders starting in this year's men's singles. Nadal is the only lefthander to win the title here since Thomas Muster in 1995.

## **YOUNGEST AND OLDEST**

At 39 years 309 days Federer is the oldest man in the men's singles draw, while Carlos Alcaraz, at 18 years 39 days, is the youngest man to compete. Alcaraz is one of 4 teenagers in the draw.

## COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

41 countries are represented in the men's singles draw at 2021 Roland Garros, with France having the most players competing here. Italy and Russia have the most seeded players here, with 4 seeds from each nation.
