On court today...

- Daniil Medvedev returns to action this evening after winning his first Roland Garros match on the 5th attempt on Monday, with the No. 2 seed facing Tommy Paul in the night session on Court Philippe-Chatrier. The Russian had reached the final at 2 different Grand Slam tournaments before he managed to win a match at Roland Garros, but he looked comfortable in victory over Alexander Bublik in the 1st round. But former Roland Garros boys' singles champion Paul is in good form, having enjoyed a run to the semifinals at Parma last week, and he will be determined to record his first victory against a Top 5 player and score upset the world No. 2 tonight.
- No. 6 seed Alexander Zverev battled back from 0-2 down to defeat qualifier Oscar Otte in the 1st round on Sunday, maintaining his unbeaten record against qualifiers at the majors – and his 2nd round match on Court Suzanne-Lenglen today sees him take on another qualifier, world No. 182 Roman Safiullin. Zverev and Safiullin have never contested a Tour-level match – but they met 3 times as juniors within the space of a month during the 2013 clay court season. Zverev won all 3 of their junior-level matches in straight sets, including a victory in the boys' singles here, and will hope for further success against the Russian today.
- World No. 177 Enzo Couacaud is the only Frenchman in action today. He faces a challenging encounter against experienced campaigner Pablo Carreno Busta on Court Simonne-Mathieu today. Couacaud recorded his first Tour-level victory in the 1st round on Sunday, but will have to play a superb match if he is to defeat Carreno Busta. The Spaniard reached the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time last year and has continued his good form into 2021, winning his 5th Tour-level singles title on clay at Marbella in April. Carreno Busta is also bidding to extend an 11-match winning streak against wild cards at Tour-level.
- The 2nd match on Court 7 today sees Casper Ruud, of Norway, up against Poland's Kamil Majchrzak, with No. 15 seed Ruud aiming to reach the 3rd round for the 3rd straight year and equal his best Roland Garros performance. Both Ruud and Majchrzak are beneficiaries of the Grand Slam Development Fund's International Player Grand Slam Grant programme, which aims to support players from developing tennis nations, enabling them to compete at the highest level. Ruud is now firmly among the sport's elite players, having broken the world's Top 20 earlier this year, while Majchrzak, who is aiming to become the first Polish man to reach the 3rd round here in 7 years, is edging closer to a return to the world's Top 100 after struggling with injury in 2020.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 5th Roland Garros appearance and his 17th Grand Slam overall.
- Medvedev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Alexander Bublik 63 63 75 in the 1st round on Monday for his **first Roland Garros match-win**.
- **Last year here**, as No. 4 seed, Medvedev fell to Marton Fucsovics in 4 sets in the 1st round. He lost in the 1st round on all 4 of his previous appearances here - on his debut here in 2017 when he retired due to cramping in the 4th set of his match against wild card Benjamin Bonzi, and in both 2018 (l. Lucas Pouille) and 2019 (l. Pierre-Hugues Herbert).
- Medvedev reached his **2nd Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, where he fell to Novak Djokovic in straight sets. The defeat ended a 20-match winning streak, which had seen Medvedev win the titles at 2020 Paris-1000, the 2020 ATP Finals, and win all 4 singles matches he contested at the 2021 ATP Cup. He also finished runner-up at the 2019 US Open, where he fell to Rafael Nadal in 5 sets.
- Medvedev's **other highlights in 2021** are winning his 10th Tour-level title at Marseille (d. Herbert) and leading Russia to victory at the ATP Cup, with the team defeating Italy in the final. He also reached the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Roberto Bautista Agut).
- Medvedev is bidding to record his **2nd clay court match-win of the 2021 season**. His only match-win on clay this year came at Madrid-1000, where he defeated Alejandro Davidovich Fokina before falling to Cristian Garin. He lost his opening match at Rome-1000, falling to Aslan Karatsev in straight sets. His victory over Davidovich Fokina was his first match-win on clay since he defeated Kei Nishikori in the semifinals at 2019 Barcelona and ended a 6-match clay court losing streak.
- Medvedev's **best results on clay** are reaching the final at 2019 Barcelona (l. Dominic Thiem) and the semifinals at 2019 Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Dusan Lajovic). He has an 11-20 win-loss record on clay – compared to 150-59 on hard courts and 18-12 on grass.
- Medvedev recorded his first victory in a **5-set match** at the Australian Open this year, defeating Filip Krajinovic in 5 sets in the 3rd round. He has a 1-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall and lost the only 5-set match he has contested at Roland Garros, to Herbert in the 1st round in 2019.
- Medvedev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 on 15 March, becoming the first player other than Djokovic, Nadal, Roger Federer or Andy Murray to have been ranked inside the Top 2 since Lleyton Hewitt was ranked No. 2 in July 2005. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Medvedev reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 13 in January 2014. He reached the 3rd round in his only appearance in the main draw of the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Orlando Luz).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.

- **PAUL** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 3rd Roland Garros appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Paul advanced to the 2nd round after defeating wild card Christopher O'Connell 62 64 46 46 10-8 in the 1st round on Monday. It was his first victory in a **5-set match** at Roland Garros and improved his overall win-loss record in 5-set matches to 2-2.
- **Last year here**, Paul reached the 2nd round. He defeated James Duckworth in the 1st round for his first Roland Garros match-win before falling to Casper Ruud in 5 sets in the 2nd round. He lost in the 1st round on his only other appearance here, as a wild card in 2019 (l. Dominic Thiem).
- Paul's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at the 2020 Australian Open, where he defeated Leonardo Mayer and Grigor Dimitrov before falling to Marton Fucsovics.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Paul reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Nikoloz Basilashvili, l. Ruud).
- Paul's **best result in 2021** is reaching the semifinals at Parma last week (l. Sebastian Korda). He also reached the quarterfinals on hard courts at Rotterdam in March (l. Fucsovics).
- **Also on clay this season**, Paul reached the 2nd round at Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Pedro Martinez, l. Roberto Bautista Agut), Madrid-1000 (d. Martinez, l. Andrey Rublev) and Lyon (d. Jo-Wilfried Tsonga, l. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He fell in the 1st round at Sardinia (l. Yannick Hanfmann) and as a qualifier at Rome-1000 (l. Bautista Agut).
- Paul is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time** on his 3rd attempt. He has lost both of his previous matches against Top 5 players, falling to No. 4 Thiem in the 1st round here in 2019 and to No. 5 Tsitsipas in the 2nd round at Lyon this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 7 Alexander Zverev in the 2nd round at 2020 Acapulco. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 20 Dimitrov in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open.
- Paul reached a **career high ranking** of No. 51 in March this year. He plays here one place lower at No. 52.
- Paul **won the Roland Garros boys' singles title** in 2015, defeating Taylor Fritz in the final. He also finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Fritz) and reached the quarterfinals at 2016 Junior Wimbledon (l. Patrik Niklas Salminen). He is one of 5 former Roland Garros boys' singles champions through to the 2nd round from the 8 who began the men's main draw this year.
- Paul made his **Davis Cup** debut in USA's victory against Uzbekistan in the 2020 Davis Cup Qualifiers, defeating Denis Istomin in the only match he contested. USA will compete alongside Italy and Colombia in Group E at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Paul is coached by Brad Stine.

NO. 5 STEFANOS TSITSIPAS (GRE) v PEDRO MARTINEZ (ESP)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Tsitsipas has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 102 Martinez. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Tsitsipas at a Grand Slam is No. 89 Thomas Fabbiano in the 1st round at 2019 Wimbledon. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Tsitsipas at Roland Garros is No. 28 Stan Wawrinka in the round of 16 in 2019.

- **TSITSIPAS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd straight year. This is his 5th appearance at Roland Garros and 15th Grand Slam overall.
- Tsitsipas advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Jeremy Chardy 76(6) 63 61 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Last year here, Tsitsipas equalled his **best Grand Slam performance** by reaching the semifinals, where he fell to Novak Djokovic in 5 sets. He has reached the semifinals at a Grand Slam on 2 other occasions – at the Australian Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal), where he became the first Greek man in history to reach the semifinals at a major, and this year, where he fell to Daniil Medvedev in straight sets.
- At 22 years 305 days, Tsitsipas is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Juan Martin del Potro won the 2009 US Open aged 20 years 355 days. He is also bidding to become the youngest Roland Garros men's singles champion since Nadal won the title here in 2008 aged 22 years 5 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Tsitsipas' **best results in 2021** are winning the titles at Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Andrey Rublev) and Lyon (d. Cameron Norrie). His victory at Monte Carlo was his first title at Masters-1000-level.
- **Also on clay in 2021**, Tsitsipas reached the final at Barcelona (l. Nadal) and the quarterfinals at Rome-1000 (l. Djokovic).
- Tsitsipas' **other highlights in 2021** are reaching the final at Acapulco (l. Alexander Zverev), the semifinals at Rotterdam (l. Rublev) and the quarterfinals at Marseille (l. Pierre-Hugues Herbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Hubert Hurkacz).
- Tsitsipas has won 3 of the last 4 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming against Djokovic in the semifinals here last year. He has a 1-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Roland Garros and a 4-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Tsitsipas has **won 7 Tour-level titles** – including 3 on clay. In addition to his titles at Monte Carlo-1000 and Lyon this year, he also won on clay at 2019 Estoril (d. Pablo Cuevas).
- Tsitsipas broke the Top 10 for the first time in March 2019, and rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in August 2019. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Tsitsipas is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the boys' singles quarterfinals here in 2016 (l. Shapovalov), as well as the boys' singles quarterfinals at the Australian Open in 2015 (l. Jurabek Karimov) and 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur).

- Tsitsipas made his **Davis Cup** debut at the 2019 Europe Group III event in Athens. He won both matches he contested as Greece defeated Philippines in the World Group II play-offs in March this year. Greece play at home to Lithuania in a World Group II tie in September.
- Tsitsipas is coached by his father, Apostolos Tsitsipas.
- **MARTINEZ** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 3rd Roland Garros appearance and his 6th Grand Slam overall.
- Martinez advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Sebastian Korda 64 62 62 in the 1st round on Monday.
- Last year here, Martinez recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier. He defeated Aleksandar Vukic and Mikhail Kukushkin before falling to Korda. He also reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year, defeating Yoshihito Nishioka and Emil Ruusuvuori before falling to Dusan Lajovic.
- Martinez is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win of the season**. In addition to his 2 victories at the Australian Open and his 1st round victory here, Martinez reached the 2nd round as a qualifier at both Estoril (d. Alexander Bublik, l. Cameron Norrie) and at Parma (d. Gilles Simon, l. Richard Gasquet).
- **Also on clay this year**, Martinez fell in the 1st round at Marbella (l. Ilya Ivashka) and as a wild card Madrid-1000 (l. Tommy Paul), and retired in his 1st round match against Paul as a lucky loser at Monte Carlo-1000. He contested 2 clay court events at Challenger-level, reaching the quarterfinals at the Zagreb Challenger (CRO) (l. Sebastian Baez) and the 2nd round at the Oeiras Challenger (POR) (l. Nuno Borges).
- Martinez is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time** on his 2nd attempt. He lost his only previous meeting against a Top 5 opponent, falling to No. 4 Daniil Medvedev in the 2nd round at the Australian Open last year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 50 Korda in the 1st round here this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Tour-level is No. 43 Bublik in the 1st round at Estoril this year.
- Clay is Martinez's **best surface**. He has a 277-136 win-loss record on clay at all levels – compared to 48-38 on hard courts, 2-2 on carpet and 1-1 on grass.
- Martinez **broke the Top 100 for the first time** after reaching the 3rd round here last year. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 82 in November last year and plays here at No. 103.
- Martinez reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 16. He was a member of the Spanish team that won the Junior Davis Cup title in 2013, defeating Germany.
- Martinez is coached by Daniel Gimeno-Traver and Sergio Gallego.

NO. 6 ALEXANDER ZVEREV (GER) v (Q) ROMAN SAFIULLIN (RUS)

Tour-level head-to-head: first meeting

While they have never contested a match at Tour-level, Zverev and Safiullin contested 3 matches at junior-level. All 3 of their junior meetings came during the 2013 clay court season – in the semifinals at the Grade 2 event in Prato (ITA), in the 2nd round at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio in Milan (ITA), and in the 1st round of the boys' singles at Roland Garros. Zverev won all 3 of the pair's junior meetings in straight sets.

Zverev and Safiullin won the boys' singles title at the Australian Open in back-to-back years, with Zverev defeating Stefan Kozlov to win the title in 2014 and Safiullin defeating Hong Seong Chan to win the title in 2015.

Zverev has won all 3 of his previous matches against qualifiers at Roland Garros – including his victory against Oscar Otte in the 1st round here on Sunday. He also defeated Mikael Ymer in the 2nd round in 2019 and Marco Cecchinato in the 3rd round in 2020. He has a 7-2 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams and a 29-10 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

Zverev has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 182 Safiullin. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Zverev at the Grand Slams is No. 138 Ernests Gulbis in the 3rd round at 2018 Wimbledon. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Zverev at Roland Garros is No. 75 Jannik Sinner in the round of 16 last year.

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 5th time. This is his 6th Roland Garros appearance and his 23rd Grand Slam overall.
- Zverev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Oscar Otte 36 36 62 62 60 in the 1st round on Sunday. It was the **2nd time in his career he has successfully recovered from 0-2 down**, having also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Pablo Carreno Busta in the semifinals at the US Open last year.
- **Last year here**, Zverev reached the round of 16, falling to Jannik Sinner in 4 sets.
- Zverev's **best Roland Garros performance** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – in 2018 (l. Dominic Thiem) and 2019 (l. Novak Djokovic).
- Zverev reached his **first Grand Slam final**, at the US Open last year, where he fell to Thiem in 5 sets, despite holding a 2-0 lead. Aged 23 years 146 days, Zverev became the youngest man to reach a major final since Djokovic finished runner-up at the 2010 US Open aged 23 years 113 days. He is one of 5 players competing here this year who has reached a Grand Slam final without winning a major title, alongside Kevin Anderson, Daniil Medvedev, Kei Nishikori and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga.
- At 24 years 54 days, Zverev is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Djokovic won the title at 2011 Wimbledon aged 24 years 42 days. He is also bidding to become the youngest Roland Garros men's singles champion since Rafael Nadal won the title here in 2010 aged 24 years 3 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- **In Grand Slam play in 2021**, Zverev reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open, falling to Djokovic in 4 sets.

- Zverev's **best results in 2021** are winning the titles on hard courts at Acapulco (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and on clay at Madrid-1000 (d. Matteo Berrettini). He also reached the quarterfinals on clay at both Munich (l. Ilya Ivashka) and Rome-1000 (l. Nadal), but lost in the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. David Goffin).
- Zverev has won all 7 **five-set matches** he has contested at Roland Garros, including his victory against Otte in the 1st round here this year. He has won 8 his last 9 five-set matches, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming against Thiem at this year's US Open Final. He has a 16-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Zverev has won **15 Tour-level titles**, including 6 on clay. He is the 5th active player, after the 'Big 4' of Djokovic, Nadal, Roger Federer and Andy Murray, to win 3 or more Masters-1000 titles, having won the titles at 2017 Rome-1000, 2017 Montreal-1000 and at Madrid-1000 in both 2018 and this year.
- Zverev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in November 2017, becoming the youngest player to break the Top 3 since Djokovic in 2007. He plays here at No. 6.
- Zverev is a **former junior world no.1**. He was named 2013 ITF Junior World Champion and went on to win the boys' singles title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Stefan Kozlov). As well as finishing runner-up in the boys' singles at 2013 Roland Garros (l. Cristian Garin), he helped Germany reach the 2013 Junior Davis Cup Final (l. Spain).
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- Qualifier **SAFIULLIN** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Roland Garros debut. This is his 2nd Grand Slam appearance.
- Safiullin advanced to the 2nd round after defeating fellow qualifier Carlos Taberner 76(4) 16 60 62 in the 1st round on Sunday for his **first Tour-level match-win on clay**.
- Safiullin defeated Guido Andreozzi (ARG) 46 64 61, No. 28 seed Liam Broady (GBR) 61 63 and No. 14 seed Jozef Kovalik (SVK) 61 67(3) 63 in the 3 rounds of qualifying here. It is the **2nd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam** on his 3rd attempt.
- **Last year here**, Safiullin reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Bradley Klahn, Jurij Rodionov). It was the first time he had competed in qualifying at a Grand Slam.
- Safiullin made his **Grand Slam debut** as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year. He reached the 2nd round of the main draw, defeating Ilya Ivashka for his first Grand Slam match-win before falling to Cameron Norrie.
- Safiullin is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win**. Prior to coming here, his only Tour-level match-wins came in 2nd round finishes as a wild card at 2020 St Petersburg (d. Emilio Gomez, l. Borna Coric) and at the Australian Open this year.
- Safiullin has **played mainly at Challenger-level in 2021**. His best result is reaching the quarterfinals on hard courts at the Lugano Challenger (SUI) (l. Vitaliy Satchko).
- Safiullin's victory in the 1st round of qualifying here **ended a 5-match losing streak**. Prior to coming here, he had not recorded a match-win, at any level, since defeating Jack Sock in the 2nd round at the Lugano Challenger. He fell in the 1st round of qualifying on clay at Marbella (l. Henri Laaksonen), and lost in the 1st round at 3 clay court Challenger events – at Ostrava (CZE) (l. Benjamin Bonzi), Prague (CZE) (l. Jiri Lehecka) and Zagreb (CRO) (l. Thiago Seyboth Wild).
- Safiullin is **facing a Top 10 player for the first time**. The highest-ranked player he has previously faced, at any level, is No. 17 Stan Wawrinka in the 2nd round at the 2020 Prague Challenger (CZE), with Wawrinka winning in 3 sets. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 90 Lorenzo Sonego in the 1st round of qualifying at 2018 St Petersburg.
- Safiullin was a **successful junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in May 2014. He won the boys' singles title in his final junior event at the 2015 Australian Open (d. Hong Seong Chan). He also won the title at the 2014 Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan (ITA) (d. Andrey Rublev). He lost to Zverev in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013.
- Safiullin is coached by Mikhail Bril.

NO. 11 ROBERTO BAUTISTA AGUT (ESP) v (Q) HENRI LAAKSONEN (SUI)

Head-to-head: Bautista Agut leads 1-0

A 2nd meeting for Bautista Agut and Laaksonen, but their first since 2013 and their first at a Grand Slam.

Bautista Agut is bidding to maintain his unbeaten record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, having won all 7 matches he has played against qualifiers at the majors – including 3 victories against qualifiers at Roland Garros, having defeated Paolo Lorenzi in the 1st round in 2014, Santiago Giraldo in the 2nd round in 2018 and Mario Vilella Martinez in the 1st round this year. He has a 39-12 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- **BAUTISTA AGUT** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 6th straight year. This is his 9th Roland Garros appearance and his 33rd Grand Slam overall.
- Bautista Agut advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Mario Vilella Martinez 64 64 62 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- **Last year here**, as No. 10 seed, Bautista Agut reached the 3rd round. He defeated Richard Gasquet and Attila Balazs before falling to Pablo Carreno Busta.
- Bautista Agut's **best Roland Garros performance** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – in 2016 (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2017 (l. Rafael Nadal).
- Bautista Agut's **best Grand Slam performance** is reaching the semifinals at 2019 Wimbledon, where he fell to Djokovic in 4 sets. He became the 6th Spanish man in history to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Bautista Agut fell to Radu Albot in the 1st round at the Australian Open. It was the 5th time in 32 Grand Slam appearances that he had lost in the 1st round.
- Bautista Agut's **best results in 2021** are finishing runner-up at both Montpellier (l. David Goffin) and Doha (l. Nikoloz Basilashvili). He also reached the semifinals at Miami-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- **On clay in 2021**, Bautista Agut reached the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev), Barcelona (l. Jannik Sinner) and Rome-1000 (l. Rublev), but fell to John Isner in the 2nd round at Madrid-1000.
- Bautista Agut has lost the last 3 **five-set matches** he has contested, having not recorded a victory in a 5-set match since defeating Marin Cilic in 5 sets in the round of 16 at the 2019 Australian Open. He won the only 5-set match he has contested at Roland Garros – against Denis Istomin in the 1st round in 2018 – and has an 11-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.

- Bautista Agut has won **one Tour-level title on clay**, at Stuttgart in 2014 – the last year the event was played on clay – where he defeated Lukas Rosol in the final. He has won 9 Tour-level singles titles, most recently at 2019 Doha.
- Bautista Agut **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in August 2019 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 in November that year. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 11.
- Bautista Agut has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2014 and has an 8-6 win-loss record in the competition. He won 2 of the 3 matches he contested at the 2019 Finals – including defeating Canada's Felix Auger-Aliassime in the first match of the final – as Spain won the Davis Cup title for the 6th time. Spain will compete alongside the Russian Tennis Federation team and Ecuador in Group A at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Bautista Agut is coached by Pepe Vendrell.
- Qualifier **LAAKSONEN** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 3rd Roland Garros appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Laaksonen advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Yannick Hanfmann 61 63 46 62 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Laaksonen defeated wild card Luca van Assche (FRA) 75 63, No. 15 seed Juan Pablo Varillas (PER) 46 61 75 and No. 29 seed Juan Manuel Cerundolo (ARG) 67(5) 63 76(7) in the 3 rounds of qualifying here. It was the **4th time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam** on his 20th attempt.
- **Last year here**, Laaksonen qualified for the main draw but fell to Pablo Cuevas in the 1st round.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Laaksonen has equalled his **best Grand Slam performance**. He has reached the 2nd round at the Grand Slams on 3 other occasions, including once at Roland Garros – as a lucky loser on his debut here in 2019 (d. Pedro Martinez, l. Novak Djokovic). He also reached the 2nd round as a qualifier at the 2019 Australian Open (d. Mirza Basic, l. Alex de Minaur) and as a direct acceptance at the 2019 US Open (d. Marco Cecchinato, l. Denis Shapovalov).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Laaksonen qualified for the main draw at the Australian Open but fell to Salvatore Caruso in the 1st round.
- Laaksonen victory against Hanfmann in the 1st round here **ended a 5-match Tour-level losing streak**. He had not previously recorded a victory at Tour-level since he reached the 2nd round at Cologne I last year (d. Daniel Altmaier, l. Felix Auger-Aliassime). Prior to coming here, he had fallen in the 1st round at all 4 Tour-level events he had contested in 2021 – on hard courts at the Great Ocean Road Open in Melbourne (l. He recorded just one victory at the 3 clay court Challenger events he has contested, reaching the 2nd round at the Marbella Challenger (ESP) (d. Roberto Carballes Baena, l. Martin Klizan).
- Laaksonen is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player for the first time** on his 11th attempt. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 21 Marco Cecchinato in the 1st round at 2018 Basel. The highest-ranked player Laaksonen has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 66 Cecchinato in the 1st round at the 2019 US Open.
- Laaksonen has won 4 of the five **5-set matches** he has contested. His only defeat in a 5-set match came against De Minaur in the 2nd round at the 2019 Australian Open. He has never contested a 5-set match at Roland Garros.
- Laaksonen reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 93 in August 2017 but plays here at No. 150.
- Laaksonen reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 20 in March 2010. He reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2009 Roland Garros (l. Daniel Berta).
- Laaksonen has played **Davis Cup** for Switzerland since 2009 and has an 12-14 overall win-loss record in the competition. Switzerland will play Estonia in a World Group II tie in September.
- Laaksonen is coached by Olli Leppanen

NO. 12 PABLO CARRENO BUSTA (ESP) v (WC) ENZO COUACAUD (FRA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Carreno Busta is facing a French player at Roland Garros for the 2nd time. He lost his only previous meeting with a French player here, in 2019, when he retired due to a right thigh injury while trailing Benoit Paire 62 46 76(1) in the 3rd round. He has a 3-4 win-loss record against French players at the Grand Slams and a 23-25 win-loss record against French players at Tour-level overall.

Carreno Busta has a 3-2 win-loss record against players at their home Grand Slams. In addition to his 0-1 win-loss record against French players here, he has a 2-0 win-loss record against American players at the US Open, a 1-1 win-loss record against Australian players at the Australian Open and has never faced a British player at Wimbledon.

Carreno Busta is bidding to extend an 11-match winning streak against wild cards at Tour-level. He has not lost a match to a wild card since falling to Nicolas Mahut in the 2nd round at 2017 Paris-1000. He has a 2-1 win-loss record against wild cards at the Grand Slams and a 23-7 win-loss record against wild cards at Tour-level overall.

- **CARRENO BUSTA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 5th straight year. This is his 9th consecutive Roland Garros appearance and 29th Grand Slam overall.
- Carreno Busta advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Norbert Gombos 63 64 63 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Last year here, Carreno Busta equalled his **best Roland Garros result** by reaching the quarterfinals, where he fell to Novak Djokovic in 4 sets. He also reached the quarterfinals here in 2017 when he retired due to a left abdominal injury while trailing Rafael Nadal 62 2-0.
- Carreno Busta's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the US Open on 2 occasions – in 2017 (l. Kevin Anderson) and 2020 (l. Alexander Zverev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Carreno Busta reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where he defeated Kei Nishikori and Jiri Vesely before retiring due to an abdominal injury while trailing Grigor Dimitrov in the 3rd round.
- Carreno Busta's **best result in 2021** is winning the title at Marbella, where as No. 1 seed he defeated Jaume Munar in the final. He also reached the semifinals at Barcelona (l. Nadal) and the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Casper Ruud). He reached the 2nd round at Rome-1000, where he defeated Laslo Djere before giving a walkover to Kei Nishikori in the 2nd round due to a lower back injury, and fell in the 1st round at Madrid-1000 (l. Federico Delbonis).
- Carreno Busta has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Roland Garros – he defeated Milos Raonic in 5 sets in the round of 16 here in 2017, but lost 5-set matches to both Youzhny in the 1st round here in 2014 and Aljaz Bedene in the 2nd round here in 2016. He has a 6-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Carreno Busta has won **5 Tour-level titles**, including 2 on clay – in addition to his victory at Marbella this year, he also won the title at 2017 Estoril (d. Gilles Muller). His other 3 titles came on hard courts at 2016 Winston-Salem (d. Roberto Bautista Agut), 2016 Moscow (d. Fabio Fognini) and 2019 Chegdu (d. Alexander Bublik).

- Carreno Busta **broke the Top 10, at No. 10, for the first time** in his career after reaching the semifinals at the US Open in September 2017. He plays here at No. 12, his highest ranking since August 2018, when he was also ranked No. 12.
- Carreno Busta made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2016. He has a 3-5 win-loss record the competition. He was a member of the Spanish team that won their 6th Davis Cup title last year, but lost the only match he contested at the Davis Cup Finals, falling to Guido Pella in the first match of Spain's quarterfinal victory over Argentina. Spain will compete alongside the Russian Tennis Federation team and Ecuador in Group A at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Carreno Busta is coached by Samuel Lopez and Cesar Fagueras.
- Wild card **COUACAUD** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here on his Grand Slam debut.
- Couacaud advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Egor Gerasimov (76(3) 64 63 in the 1st round on Sunday for his **first Tour-level match-win**.
- **Last year here**, Couacaud reached the final round of qualifying. He defeated Denis Kudla and Juan Pablo Ficovich before falling to Steven Diez. He also fell in qualifying here in 2014-15 and 2019.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Couacaud fell to Mitchell Krueger in the 1st round of qualifying at the Australian Open. He has failed to qualify on all 12 of his appearances in qualifying at the Grand Slams.
- Couacaud is contesting his **2nd Tour-level event here**. He made his Tour-level debut as a qualifier at 2020 Montpellier, falling to Filip Krajinovic in the 1st round of the main draw.

He also reached the final on clay at the Biella Challenger (ITA) (l. Thanasi Kokkinakis), but has lost in the 1st round at 6 of the 10 Challenger events he has contested this year.
- Couacaud is **facing a Top 20 player for the first time**. The highest-ranked players he has faced, at any level, are No. 44 Adrian Mannarino in 1st round at the 2015 Noumea Challenger (CAL) and No. 44 Krajinovic in the 1st round at 2020 Montpellier – he lost both matches. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 73 Robin Haase in the quarterfinals at the 2014 Rennes Challenger (FRA).
- Couacaud reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 164 in July 2019. He plays here at No. 177.
- Couacaud was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 17. He finished runner-up in the boys' doubles at 2013 Wimbledon alongside Stefano Napolitano, falling to Nick Kyrgios/Kokkinakis. His best result in the boys' singles at Roland Garros was a 3rd round finish in 2013 (l. Calvin Hemery).
- Couacaud is coached by Xavier Le Gall.

- Ruud advanced to the 2nd round here for the 4th straight year after defeating Benoit Paire 57 62 61 76(4) in the 1st round on Monday.
- Last year here, Ruud equalled his **best Roland Garros performance** by reaching the 3rd round. He defeated Yuichi Sugita and Tommy Paul before falling to Dominic Thiem in straight sets. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2019 (l. Roger Federer).
- Ruud recorded his **best Grand Slam performance** by reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year, where he defeated Jordan Thompson, Paul and Radu Albot before retiring due to an abdominal injury while trailing Andrey Rublev 62 76(3) in the last 16. He became the 2nd Norwegian player, man or woman, to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam – after his father, Christian, who reached the last 16 at the 1997 Australian Open.
- Ruud's **best result in 2021** is winning the title on clay at Geneva, where, as No. 3 seed, he defeated Denis Shapovalov in the final. He also reached the semifinals on clay at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Rublev), Munich (l. Nikoloz Basilashvili) and Madrid-1000 (l. Matteo Berrettini), and the quarterfinals on clay at Marbella (l. Alcaraz).
- **Also in 2021**, Ruud reached the quarterfinals on hard courts at Acapulco, where he gave a walkover to Alexander Zverev due to a wrist injury. He withdrew from Miami-1000 due to the same injury.
- Ruud has won **2 Tour-level singles titles**, both of which have come on clay. In addition to his victory at Geneva this year, he also won the title at 2020 Buenos Aires (d. Pedro Sousa).
- Clay is Ruud's **best surface**, and the only surface on which he has a positive win-loss record. He has a 63-29 Tour-level win-loss record on clay – compared to 20-29 on hard courts and 0-1 on grass.

- Ruud has won both **5-set matches** he has contested at Roland Garros, defeating Jordan Thompson in the 1st round in 2018 and Paul in the 2nd round last year. He has a 4-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Ruud is coached by his father, Christian.
- **MAJCHZRZAK** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here and equal his best Grand Slam performance. This is his 2nd appearance at Roland Garros and his 7th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Majchrzak is bidding to become the **first Polish man to reach the 3rd round here** since Jerzy Janowicz in 2014. He is also bidding to become the 6th Polish man to reach the 3rd round at Roland Garros in the Open Era – after Wiesław Gasiorek (1968-69), Tadeusz Nowicki (1971-72), Wojtek Fibak (1976-82, 1984), Lukasz Kubot (2011-12) and Janowicz (2013-14).
- Majchrzak advanced to the 2nd round after defeating wild card Arthur Cazaux 64 26 64 64 in the 1st round on Monday for his **first Roland Garros match-win**.
- **Last year here**, on his Roland Garros debut, Majchrzak fell to Karen Khachanov in straight sets in the 1st round.
- Majchrzak recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the 3rd round as a lucky loser at the 2019 US Open. He defeated both Nicolas Jarry and Pablo Cuevas in 5 sets before falling to Grigor Dimitrov. He has fallen in the 1st round on his 5 other Grand Slam appearances prior to coming here.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Majchrzak fell to Miomir Kecmanovic in straight sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Majchrzak is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win this year**. - **Also on clay this year**, Garin reached the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Matteo Berrettini). He also competed in the quarterfinals at Estoril (l. - Garin **won the Roland Garros boys' singles title** in 2013, defeating Alexander Zverev in the final. He also finished runner-up in the boys' doubles here alongside Nicolas Jarry the same year (l. Kyle Edmund/Frederico Ferreira Silva). He is one of 5 former Roland Garros boys' singles champions through to the 2nd round from the 8 who began the men's main draw this year.
- Garin has played **Davis Cup** for Chile since 2012 and has a 12-13 overall win-loss record in the competition. Chile will play away to Slovakia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Garin was a recipient of an International Player Grand Slam Grant, financed by the Grand Slam Development Fund in May 2017.
- Garin is coached by Franco Davin.
- Qualifier **MCDONALD** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 3rd Roland Garros appearance and his 11th Grand Slam overall.
- McDonald advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Emil Ruusuvuori 46 63 76(4) 63 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- As No. 8 seed, McDonald defeated Thanasi Kokkinakis (AUS) 64 64, Renzo Olivo (ARG) 63 64 and Marco Trungelliti (ARG) 64 64 in the 3 rounds of qualifying here. It is the **2nd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam** on his 7th attempt.
- **Last year here**, McDonald reached the 2nd round. He defeated Steven Diez in the 1st round for his first Roland Garros match-win before falling to Rafael Nadal.
- McDonald equalled his **best Grand Slam performance** by reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year. He defeated Marco Cecchinato, Borna Coric and Lloyd Harris before falling to Daniil Medvedev in straight sets. He also reached the round of 16 at 2018 Wimbledon (l. Milos Raonic).
- McDonald's other **Tour-level highlights in 2021** are 2nd round finishes on hard courts at the Murray River Open in Melbourne (d. Richard Gasquet, l. Alex Bolt), Marseille (d. Stefano Travaglia, l. Karen Khachanov) and as a qualifier at Miami-1000 (d. Vasek Pospisil, l. John Isner), and on clay as a qualifier at Munich (d. Dusan Lajovic, l. Ilya Ivashka).
- **At Challenger-level this year**, McDonald won the title on hard courts at Nur-Sultan (KAZ) (d. Jurij Rodionov) and reached the semifinals on clay at Heilbronn (GER) (l. Daniel Elahi Galan).
- McDonald lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Roland Garros, falling to Yoshihito Nishioka in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2019. He has a 1-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches, with his only victory coming against Nicolas Jarry in the 2nd round at 2018 Wimbledon.
- McDonald reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 57 in April 2019 but fell to as low as No. 272 in March 2020 after missing 6 months of the 2019 season due to a hamstring injury. He plays here at No. 119.
- McDonald played **college tennis** at UCLA in 2014-16, winning the 2016 NCAA singles and doubles titles before turning professional.
- McDonald is coached by Jaime Pulgar and Mat Cloer.

- **KHACHANOV** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 3rd round here. This is his 5th Roland Garros appearance and his 18th Grand Slam overall.
- Khachanov advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Jiri Vesely 61 62 63 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- **Last year here**, Khachanov reached the round of 16. He defeated Kamil Majchrzak, Vesely and Cristian Garin before falling to Novak Djokovic in straight sets.
- Khachanov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals here in 2019. He defeated Cedrik-Marcel Stebe, Gregoire Barrere, Martin Klizan and Juan Martin del Potro, before falling to Dominic Thiem in straight sets in the last 8.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Khachanov reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Matteo Berrettini).
- Khachanov's **best results in 2021** are reaching the semifinals on hard courts at the Great Ocean Road Open in Melbourne (l. Jannik Sinner) and on clay at Lyon (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the quarterfinals on hard courts at Rotterdam (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Marseille (l. Matthew Ebden).
- **Also on clay in 2021**, Khachanov reached the 2nd round at Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Laslo Djere, l. Pablo Carreno Busta) but lost his opening match at Barcelona (l. Norrie), Madrid-1000 (l. Nishikori) and Rome-1000 (l. Federico Delbonis).
- Khachanov lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Roland Garros – falling to Alexander Zverev in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2018. He has a 5-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Khachanov has **won 4 Tour-level titles** – all of which have come on hard courts. He won his first title at 2016 Chengdu (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas) and won 3 titles during the 2018 season – at Marseille (d. Lucas Pouille), Moscow (d. Adrian Mannarino) and Paris-1000 (d. Djokovic).
- Khachanov **dropped outside the Top 20** for the first time since October 2018 in February this year. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 8 in July 2019 but plays here at No. 25.
- Khachanov was a **successful junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 16. He won the boys' doubles silver medal alongside Andrey Rublev at the 2014 Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing, China. The pair fell to

Orlando Luz/Marcelo Zormann in the gold medal match. He reached the 3rd round on both of his appearances in the boys' singles at Roland Garros – in 2013 (l. Guillermo Nunez) and 2014 (l. Zormann).

- Khachanov has played **Davis Cup** since 2013 and has a 9-12 win-loss record in the competition. He won one of the 4 singles matches he contested at the 2019 Davis Cup Finals in Madrid as Russia reached the semifinals before falling to Canada. The Russian Tennis Federation team will compete alongside Spain and Ecuador in Group A at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Khachanov is coached by Frederik Rosengren and Jose Clavet.
- **NISHIKORI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 7th time. This is his 11th Roland Garros appearance and his 41st Grand Slam overall.
- Nishikori advanced to the 2nd round here for the 10th time after defeating qualifier Alessandro Giannessi 64 67(4) 63 46 64 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- **Last year here**, Nishikori reached the 2nd round, defeating Daniel Evans in 5 sets before falling to Stefano Travaglia, also in 5 sets. He has won 9 of the last 10 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming against Travaglia here last year. He has an 8-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Roland Garros and a 25-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Nishikori's **best Roland Garros result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 3 occasions – in 2015 (l. Jo-Wilfried Tsonga), 2017 (l. Andy Murray) and 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal).
- At the 2014 US Open, Nishikori became the **first Asian male to contest a Grand Slam final** after defeating 3 Top 10 players – Milos Raonic, Stan Wawrinka and Novak Djokovic – in consecutive matches before falling to Marin Cilic in the title match. He is one of 5 players competing here this year who has reached a Grand Slam final without winning a major title, alongside Kevin Anderson, Daniil Medvedev, Jo-Wilfried Tsonga and Alexander Zverev.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Nishikori fell to Pablo Carreno Busta in straight sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Nishikori's **best results in 2021** are reaching the quarterfinals at Rotterdam (l. Borna Coric) and Dubai (l. Lloyd Harris).
- **On clay this year**, Nishikori reached the 3rd round at both Barcelona, where he defeated Guido Pella and Cristian Garin before falling to Nadal, and Rome-1000, where he defeated Fabio Fognini and Pablo Carreno Busta before falling to Zverev. He also reached the 2nd round at Madrid-1000 (d. Khachanov, l. Zverev).
- Nishikori has won **12 Tour-level singles titles**, 2 of which have come on clay – at Barcelona in 2014 (d. Santiago Giraldo) and 2015 (d. Pablo Andujar).
- Nishikori is a **former Top 5 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 4 in March 2015 but plays here at No. 49 – his lowest-ranking since September 2011, when he has ranked at No. 54.
- Nishikori reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 7 in July 2006. He reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at both the Australian Open (l. Alexandre Sidorenko) and Roland Garros (l. Petru-Alexandru Luncaanu) that year, and also won the Roland Garros boys' doubles title in 2006 with Emiliano Massa.
- Nishikori is coached by Michael Chang, who won Roland Garros in 1989, and Max Mirnyi.

- **FOGNINI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 9th time. This is his 14th Roland Garros appearance and his 51st Grand Slam overall.
- Fognini advanced to the 2nd round here for the 10th time after defeating wild card Gregoire Barrere 64 61 64 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- **Last year here**, as No. 14 seed, Fognini fell to Mikhail Kukushkin in the 1st round. It was his earliest defeat at Roland Garros since 2016, when he also fell in the 1st round (l. Marcel Granollers).
- Fognini recorded his **best Grand Slam result** here in 2011 when he became the first Italian man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since Davide Sanguinetti reached the last 8 at 1998 Wimbledon. He gave a walkover to Novak Djokovic in his quarterfinal match with a thigh strain – the first time a player had given a walkover in the quarterfinals of the men's singles at a Grand Slam since Stefan Edberg pulled out of his quarterfinal match with Thomas Muster at the 1989 Australian Open.
- **In Grand Slam play in 2021**, Fognini reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open, where he defeated Pierre-Hugues Herbert, Salvatore Caruso and Alex de Minaur before falling to Rafael Nadal.
- Fognini's **best result in 2021** is reaching the quarterfinals on clay at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Casper Ruud). Also on clay this year, he reached the 2nd round at Madrid-1000 (d. Carlos Taberner, l. Matteo Berrettini) and Lyon (d. Guido Pella, l. Laslo Djere), but lost his opening match at Marbella (l. Jaume Munar), Barcelona (l. Bernebe Zapata Miralles) and Rome-1000 (l. Kei Nishikori).
- Clay is Fognini's **best surface**. He has a 216-153 win-loss record on clay, compared to 142-155 on hard courts and 19-18 on grass.
- Fognini's **best clay court result** is winning the title at 2019 Monte Carlo-1000, where he became the first Italian player to win a Masters-1000 title, defeating Dusan Lajovic in the final. He defeated defending champion Rafael Nadal in the semifinals, ending Nadal's 18-match winning streak at Monte Carlo. He is one of just 4 players – alongside Djokovic, Gaston Gaudio and Dominic Thiem – to record 3 or more clay court match-wins against Nadal.
- Fognini has won **9 Tour-level singles titles**, 8 of which have been on clay. - Fognini has won 11 of the last 12 **five-set matches** he has contested. His only defeat in a 5-set match in that time came against Marin Cilic in the round of 16 here in 2018. He has a 6-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Roland Garros and a 23-13 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Fognini broke the Top 10 for the first time in June 2019 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 9 the following month. He plays here at No. 29 – his lowest-ranking since September 2017, when he was also ranked No. 29.
- Fognini reached the quarterfinals of the **boys' singles** here in 2004, falling to eventual champion Gael Monfils. He also reached the last 8 at the 2004 Junior Australian Open.
- Fognini has played **Davis Cup** for Italy since 2008 and has a 32-15 win-loss record in the competition. He won the only match he contested in Italy's victory over Korea, Republic in the Qualifiers last year, securing Italy's place at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals, in which Italy will compete alongside USA and Colombia in Group E.

- **FUCSOVICS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 4th Roland Garros appearance and his 16th Grand Slam overall.
- Fucsovics advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Gilles Simon 64 61 76(5) in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Last year here, Fucsovics equalled his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the round of 16. He defeated Daniil Medvedev, Albert Ramos-Vinolas and Thiago Monteiro before falling to Andrey Rublev. He has reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 2 other occasions – at the Australian Open in both 2018, when he became the first Hungarian man to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam since Balazs Taroczy at 1984, and 2020, falling to Roger Federer on both occasions.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Fucsovics reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open. He defeated Marc Polmans and Stan Wawrinka – both in 5 sets – before falling to Milos Raonic. He has a 7-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches, but lost the only 5-set match he has contested at Roland Garros, falling to Diego Schwartzman in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2019.
- Fucsovics' **best result in 2021** is reaching the final as a qualifier at Rotterdam, where he fell to Rublev in straight sets. He also reached the quarterfinals at Doha, where he gave a walkover to Rublev due to a lower back injury, and Dubai, falling again to Rublev. - Fucsovics reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in March 2019. He here at No. 44.
- Fucsovics was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at 2010 Wimbledon (d. Benjamin Mitchell) and also reached the semifinals at the Junior Australian Open (l. Sean Berman) and the Junior US Open (l. Jack Sock) in the same year. He did not contest the junior event at Roland Garros.
- Fucsovics has played **Davis Cup** for Hungary since 2010 and has a 29-16 win-loss record in the competition. He won both singles matches he contested as Hungary defeated Belgium in the Qualifiers in March last year, securing Hungary's place at the next Davis Cup Finals, where the team will compete alongside Croatia and Australia in Group D.
- Fucsovics is coached by Zoltan Nagy and Miklos Jancso.

- Isner advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Sam Querrey 76(2) 63 64 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Isner reached the 2nd round (d. Eliot Benchetrit, l. Sebastian Korda).
- Isner's **best Roland Garros performance** is reaching the round of 16 on 3 occasions – in 2014 (l. Tomas Berdych), 2016 (l. Andy Murray) and 2018 (l. Juan Martin del Potro).
- Isner's **best Grand Slam performance** is reaching the semifinals at 2018 Wimbledon, where he fell to Kevin Anderson 76(6) 67(5) 67(9) 64 26-24. At 6 hours and 36 minutes, the semifinal was the 2nd-longest singles match in history, after Isner's victory against Nicolas Mahut at 2010 Wimbledon, which lasted 11 hours and 5 minutes. Isner hit a tournament record of 214 aces during his run to the semifinals.
- Isner's **best results in 2021** are reaching the quarterfinals on hard courts at Delray Beach (l. Korda) and on clay at Madrid-1000 (l. Dominic Thiem). He also reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open in 2019 (l. Borna Coric) and this year (l. Daniil Medvedev), and at the 2020 US Open (l. David Goffin).
- **Last year here**, Krajinovic fell to Nikola Milojevic in 4 sets in the 1st round.
