On court today...

- Of the 16 players to reach the 2nd week at 2021 Wimbledon, 9 have reached at least one Grand Slam quarterfinal – but only 3 have reached the last 8 at Wimbledon before. Roger Federer is aiming for a record-extending 18th Wimbledon quarterfinal, while Novak Djokovic is bidding to reach the last 8 here for the 12th time. The only other former Wimbledon quarterfinalist through to the last 16 this year is Roberto Bautista Agut, who reached the semifinals here in 2019.
- Daniil Medvedev, Alexander Zverev and Andrey Rublev are all aiming to reach their first Wimbledon quarterfinals today – and should they do so, they will join the 9 active players who have reached the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam events.
- Wimbledon debutants Sebastian Korda and Ilya Ivashka will look to become the first players to reach the men's singles quarterfinals on their first appearances here since Nick Kyrgios in 2014 – and should both Korda and Ivashka win today, it will be the first time in the Open Era that 2 Wimbledon debutants have reached the last 8.

Head-to-head: Djokovic leads 1-0

A 2nd meeting for Djokovic and Garin but their first at a Grand Slam or on grass. Their only previous meeting came during Serbia's victory over Chile in the group stages at the 2020 ATP Cup, with Djokovic winning in straight sets.

- Two-time defending champion **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach his 50th Grand Slam quarterfinal. He is in 2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances, behind Roger Federer. This is his 65th Grand Slam appearance.

- Djokovic is also bidding to reach his **12th Wimbledon quarterfinal** and equal Arthur Gore in 3rd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles quarterfinal appearances. This is his 16th consecutive Wimbledon appearance.

- Wimbledon is Djokovic's **2nd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of titles won**, and joint-3rd most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won and quarterfinals reached. By defeating Kudla in the 3rd round here for his 75th Wimbledon match-win, he became the first man to record 75 match-wins at all 4 Grand Slam events.

- Djokovic has **reached the quarterfinals or better on 10 of his last 11 Wimbledon appearances**. He has failed to reach the quarterfinals here once since 2009 – in 2016, when he fell to Sam Querrey in the 3rd round.

- **If he wins today**, Djokovic will play either No. 5 seed Andrey Rublev or Marton Fucsovics in the quarterfinals. He leads Fucsovics 2-0 in their previous meetings but has never played Rublev.
- Djokovic advanced to the round of 16 after defeating wild card Jack Draper 46 61 62 62, Kevin Anderson 63 63 63 and qualifier Denis Kudla 64 63 76(7) in the opening 3 rounds here.
- By reaching the round of 16 here for the 13th time, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of **3rd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at Wimbledon**, ahead of Boris Becker. Federer, who has reached the round of 16 here for the 18th time this year, and Jimmy Connors (16) are the only men in the Open Era to have reached the round of 16 here more often than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is also **through to the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 55th time**. He is in 2nd place on the all-time list for most round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams. Federer, who is through to the last 16 at a Grand Slam for the 69th time here this year, is the only player to have reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Djokovic.
- **At 2019 Wimbledon**, Djokovic won his 5th title here, defeating Federer 76(5) 16 76(4) 46 13-12(3) in the final. It was the first men's singles match to be decided with a final set tiebreak and, at 4 hours 55 minutes, it was the longest Wimbledon men's singles final on record. He saved 2 championship points during the final set, making him the first man to win the Wimbledon title from championship point down since Bob Falkenburg in 1948. He was also the first man to win the Wimbledon title having saved a match point at any stage of the tournament since Neale Fraser in 1960, who saved 5 match points in the quarterfinals.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **6th Wimbledon title** and claim sole ownership of 4th place on the all-time list for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won, ahead of Bjorn Borg and Laurie Doherty. Federer (8 Wimbledon titles), William Renshaw and Pete Sampras (both 7) are the only men to have won more Wimbledon singles titles than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is also bidding to win his **3rd consecutive Wimbledon title** and become the 4th man in the Open Era to record a streak of 3 consecutive Wimbledon titles – after Federer, Bjorn Borg and Sampras. It would be the 3rd time in his career that he has recorded a streak of 3 consecutive titles at a Grand Slam event – he has won 3 consecutive Australian Open titles on 2 occasions, in 2013-15 and 2019-21.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **20th Grand Slam title** and equal Federer and Rafael Nadal's record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **5th man in history to win the first 3 Grand Slam tournaments of the season** – after Jack Crawford (1933), Don Budge (1938), Lew Hoad (1956) and Rod Laver (1962 and 1969). Of the 4 men who have previously won the opening 3 Grand Slam tournaments of the season, 2 (Budge and Laver) have gone on to win the Grand Slam, with Laver doing so in both 1962 and 1969.
- Djokovic is also bidding to become the **12th man in history to win back-to-back Roland Garros and Wimbledon titles** – and the first since Nadal achieved the feat for the 2nd time in 2010.
- Djokovic won his **9th Australian Open title** in February this year, defeating Daniil Medvedev in the final. He became the 2nd player to win 9 singles titles at a Grand Slam tournament after Nadal (13 Roland Garros titles) and Margaret Court (9 Australian Championships/Open titles).
- Djokovic also won his **2nd Roland Garros title** in June this year, becoming the 3rd man in history (after Laver and Roy Emerson) to win all 4 Grand Slam tournaments twice. He recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Stefanos Tsitsipas in 5 sets in the final. Having also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Lorenzo Musetti in the round of 16, it was the first time that a Grand Slam champion had recovered from 0-2 down twice en route to winning the title since Ted Schroeder at 1949 Wimbledon. He defeated Nadal in the semifinals – it was Djokovic's 2nd victory against Nadal at Roland Garros and just Nadal's 3rd defeat at Roland Garros.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **314th Grand Slam match-win**. By defeating Milos Raonic in the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year, he became the 2nd player to record 300 men's singles match-wins at the Grand Slams, after Federer.
- **Also in 2021**, Djokovic won the title at Belgrade II the week before Roland Garros, defeating Alex Molcan in the final. He became the first man to win a Grand Slam title having won a Tour-level event the week before since Patrick Rafter won back-to-back titles at Long Island and the US Open in 1998. He also reached the final at Rome-1000 (l. Nadal), the semifinals at Belgrade I (l. Aslan Karatsev) and the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Daniel Evans).

- Djokovic **did not contest the singles at a grass court event prior to coming here**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014-15 and 2019. He did compete in doubles at Mallorca, where he and Carlos Gomez-Herrera reached the final before giving a walkover to Simone Boelli/Maximo Gonzalez due to Gomez-Herrera's right ankle injury.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **31st Tour-level match-win of the season** and equal Cameron Norrie in 3rd place on the list for most victories at Tour-level in 2021.

- Djokovic has a 9-1 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeat in a 5-set match coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006. He has a 35-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- By defeating Musetti and Tsitsipas in 5 sets at Roland Garros this year, Djokovic claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams**, ahead of Federer.

- Of Djokovic's **84 Tour-level singles titles**, 6 have come on grass – in addition to his 5 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 61 titles on hard courts and 17 titles on clay.
- Djokovic has held the world No. 1 ranking for a total of 327 weeks (including this week) and holds the **record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having surpassed Federer's mark of 310 weeks as world No. 1 on 8 March 2021. Djokovic is guaranteed to remain at No. 1 unless Medvedev wins the title or Medvedev reaches final and Djokovic loses prior to the final.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 37-11 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. He won all 3 singles matches he contested as Serbia reached the quarterfinals last year (l. Russia). Serbia will compete alongside Germany and Austria in Group F the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Djokovic is coached by Marian Vajda and 2001 Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic.
- **GARIN** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 11th Grand Slam overall.
- Garin is bidding to become the **8th Chilean man in history to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after Luis Ayala (8 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), Fernando Gonzalez (7), Marcelo Rios (6), Hans Gildemeister (3), and Ricardo Acuna, Patricio Cornejo Seckel and Jaime Fillol (all one).
- Garin is also bidding to become the **3rd Chilean man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Ayala (who reached the quarterfinals here in 1959-61), Acuna (1985) and Gonzalez (2005).
- **If he wins today**, Garin will play either No. 5 seed Andrey Rublev or Marton Fucsovics in the quarterfinals. He trails Rublev 0-2 in their previous meetings and has never played Fucsovics.

- Garin advanced to the round of 16 after defeating qualifiers Bernabe Zapata Miralles 67(6) 63 36 63 62 and Marc Polmans 62 75 46 61, and Pedro Martinez 64 63 46 64 for his **first Wimbledon match-wins** in the opening 3 rounds here.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Garin has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year, where he became the first Chilean man to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam since Gonzalez at the 2010 Australian Open. He defeated Juan Ignacio Londero, Mackenzie McDonald and Marcos Giron before falling to Daniil Medvedev.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Garin has become the **6th Chilean man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Ayala (who reached the round of 16 here in 1955-56 and 1959-61), Jaime Fillol (1974), Acuna (1985), Marcelo Rios (1997) and Gonzalez (2005).
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time, Garin has also become the **6th Chilean man in history to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam on multiple occasions** – after Ayala (12 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Gonzalez (11), Rios (10), Fillol (7) and Gildemeister (4).
- Garin **lost in the 1st round on all 3 of his previous appearances here** – as a qualifier in both 2017 (l. Jack Sock) and 2018 (l. Adrian Mannarino), and as a direct acceptance in 2019 (l. Rublev).
- Garin's **best result in 2021** is winning the title on clay at Santiago (d. Facundo Bagnis), where he became the first Chilean player to win a Tour-level event on home soil since Gonzalez won the title at 2009 Vina del Mar. He also reached the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Matteo Berrettini). He missed the Australian Open this year due to a left wrist injury. Prior to coming here, all 13 of his Tour-level victories in 2021 had come on clay.
- Garin is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win on grass**. In addition to his 3 victories here, his only other Tour-level match-wins on grass came in quarterfinal finish at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch, where he defeated Salvatore Caruso and Robin Haase before falling to Borna Coric. He did not contest a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this year.
- Garin is **facing a world No. 1 for the first time** today. He has a 2-4 win-loss record against Top 5 opposition at Tour-level overall, with his 2 victories coming against No. 3 Alexander Zverev in the quarterfinals at 2019 Munich and No. 3 Medvedev in the 3rd round at Madrid-1000 this year. He lost his only previous match against a Top 5 player at the Grand Slams – against No. 2 Medvedev in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year. The highest-ranked player Garin has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 59 Reilly Opelka in the 1st round at 2019 Roland Garros.
- Garin's 5-set victory over Zapata Miralles in the 1st round was the **first 5-set match he has contested in the main draw at Wimbledon**. He contested a 5-set match in the final round of qualifying here in 2017, defeating John-Patrick Smith 46 76(7) 64 46 12-10. He has a 5-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Garin has won **5 Tour-level singles titles**. In addition to victory at Santiago this season, he also won the titles at Houston (d. Casper Ruud) and Munich (d. Berrettini) in 2019, and at Cordoba (d. Diego Schwartzman) and Rio de Janeiro (d. Gianluca Mager) in 2020.
- Garin **broke the Top 20 for the first time** in February last year, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 18 the same month. He plays here at No. 20.
- Garin had a **successful junior career**. He won the boys' singles title at 2013 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 4. His best result in the boys' singles at Wimbledon was reaching the 3rd round in 2013 (l. Maximilian Marterer).
- Garin has played **Davis Cup** for Chile since 2012 and has a 12-13 overall win-loss record in the competition. Chile will play away to Slovakia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Garin was a recipient of an International Player Grand Slam Grant, financed by the Grand Slam Development Fund in May 2017.
- Garin is coached by Franco Davin.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 18th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Medvedev and fellow Russian players Karen Khachanov and Andrey Rublev are all bidding to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon for the first time this year. Just **4 Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – most recently Mikhail Youzhny in 2012.

- Medvedev is bidding to reach his **5th Grand Slam quarterfinal**. He and Rublev (who is also bidding to reach his 5th Grand Slam quarterfinal today) are level with Andrei Chesnokov in 6th place on the list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances by a Russian man in the Open Era – behind Yevgeny Kafelnikov (13 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), Nikolay Davydenko (10), Marat Safin (9), Aleksandr Metreveli (8) and Youzhny (6).
- Medvedev and Rublev are also bidding to reach their first Wimbledon quarterfinals and complete the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam events. Just **4 Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam events in the Open Era** – Kafelnikov, Metreveli, Safin and Youzhny.
- Medvedev is also bidding to become the **10th active player to reach the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam events** – after Marin Cilic, Juan Martin del Potro, Novak Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal, Kei Nishikori, Jo-Wilfried Tsonga and Stan Wawrinka. (NB Rublev and Alexander Zverev are also bidding to reach their first Wimbledon quarterfinals complete the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam events today)
- If Medvedev, Khachanov and Rublev all win today and reach the quarterfinals, it will be the **2nd time in the Open Era that 3 Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after the Australian Open this year, when Rublev, Medvedev and Aslan Karatsev all reached the last 8.
- If 2 Russian players win today and reach the quarterfinals, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** and the 8th time in the Open Era that multiple Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam.
- Wimbledon is Medvedev's **3rd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won**. The Australian Open and the US Open are his joint-most successful events in terms of matches won and the US Open is his most-successful event in terms of quarterfinals reached.

- **If he wins today**, Medvedev will play either No. 6 seed Roger Federer or No. 23 seed Lorenzo Sonego in the quarterfinals. He trails Federer 0-3 in their previous meetings but has never played Sonego.
- Medvedev advanced to the round of 16 after defeating Jan-Lennard Struff 64 61 46 76(3), wild card Carlos Alcaraz 64 61 62 and No. 32 seed Marin Cilic 67(3) 36 63 63 62 in the opening 3 rounds here.
- Medvedev's 5-set victory against Cilic in the 3rd round here was his **first successful comeback from 0-2 down** and his first victory in a 5-set match at Wimbledon. He lost all 3 of the 5-set matches he had contested here prior to this year. He has a 2-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall, with his only other victory in a 5-set match coming against Filip Krajinovic in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year.
- With Medvedev, Khachanov and Rublev all through to the round of 16 here, it is the **3rd time in the Open Era that 3 Russian men have reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after 2007 Roland Garros (Igor Andrejev, Davydenko and Youzhny) and the Australian Open this year (Medvedev, Rublev and Karatsev).
- By reaching the round of 16 round here, Medvedev has equalled his **best Wimbledon performance**. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2018 and 2019, losing 5-set matches to Adrian Panatta and David Goffin, respectively.
- Medvedev reached his **2nd Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, where he fell to Djokovic in straight sets. The defeat ended a 20-match winning streak, which had seen Medvedev win the titles at 2020 Paris-1000, the 2020 ATP Finals, and win all 4 singles matches he contested at the 2021 ATP Cup. He also finished runner-up at the 2019 US Open, where he fell to Nadal in 5 sets.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Medvedev reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He had never previously advanced beyond the 1st round at Roland Garros.
- Prior to coming here, Medvedev **won his first Tour-level title on grass title** at Mallorca, defeating Sam Querrey in the final. It was his 11th Tour-level title – his previous 10 titles all came on hard courts. He also fell competed at Halle, where he fell to Struff in the 1st round.
- Medvedev's **other highlights in 2021** are winning the title at Marseille (d. Pierre-Hugues Herbert) and leading Russia to victory at the ATP Cup, with the team defeating Italy in the final. He also reached the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Roberto Bautista Agut).
- Medvedev is bidding to record his **30th Tour-level match-win of the season** and become the 5th player to record 30 victories at Tour-level this year. Matteo Berrettini is also bidding to record his 30th Tour-level victory of the season today.

- Medvedev's victories against No. 14 Casper Ruud and No. 13 Pablo Carreno Busta en route to the title at Mallorca last month **ended a 3-match Tour-level losing streak against Top 20 players**. He recorded a 13-match winning streak against Top 20 players from the quarterfinals at 2020 Paris-1000 through the semifinals at the Australian Open this year before falling to No. 1 Djokovic in the final – he then lost his next 2 matches against Top 20 players, falling to No. 12 Bautista Agut at Miami-1000 and No. 5 Tsitsipas at Roland Garros. He has a 6-8 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 43-32 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.

- Medvedev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 on 15 March, becoming the first player other than Djokovic, Nadal, Roger Federer or Andy Murray to have been ranked inside the Top 2 since Lleyton Hewitt was ranked No. 2 in July 2005. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Medvedev reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, I. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev made his **Davis Cup** debut in February 2017 and has a 4-3 win-loss record in the competition. He defeated Henri Laaksonen in Russia's 3-1 victory against Switzerland in the Davis Cup Qualifiers in February. Russia will compete in Group B against 2018 champion Croatia and host Spain in the Davis Cup Finals in Madrid in November.
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **HURKACZ** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 13th Grand Slam overall.
- Hurkacz is bidding to become the **5th Polish man in history to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after Wojtek Fibak (who reached 4 Grand Slam quarterfinals), and Jerzy Janowicz, Lukasz Kubot and Ignacy Tloczynski (all one Grand Slam quarterfinal appearance).
- Hurkacz is also bidding to become the **4th Polish man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Fibak, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1980, and Janowicz and Kubot, who both reached the quarterfinals here in 2013. Fibak, Kubot and Janowicz are also the only other Polish men to have reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams in the Open Era.
- If Hurkacz and Iga Swiatek, who is bidding to reach the quarterfinals of the women's singles here this year, both win today, it will be the **2nd time in history that multiple Polish players have reached the singles quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after 2013 Wimbledon, when Janowicz and Kubot reached the men's singles quarterfinals and Agnieszka Radwanska reached the women's singles quarterfinals.
- **If he wins today**, Hurkacz will play either No. 6 seed Roger Federer or No. 23 seed Lorenzo Sonogo in the quarterfinals. He trails Federer 0-1 and Sonogo 1-2 in their previous Tour-level meetings.
- Hurkacz advanced to the round of 16 after defeating Lorenzo Musetti 64 76(5) 61, Marcos Giron 63 62 64 and Alexander Bublik 63 64 62 in the opening 3 rounds here. His victory against Musetti in the 1st round **ended a 6-match Tour-level losing streak** – he had previously not won a match since reaching the 2nd round at Monte Carlo-1000 in April (d. Thomas Fabbiano, I. Daniel Evans).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Hurkacz has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best result at the Grand Slams was reaching the 3rd round here in 2019, when he defeated Dusan Lajovic and Leonardo Mayer before falling to Novak Djokovic.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Hurkacz lost 5-set matches in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (I. Mikael Ymer) and Roland Garros (I. Botić van de Zandschulp). He has a 1-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches and has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- **Prior to coming here**, Hurkacz lost his opening match at both Stuttgart (I. Dominic Stephan Stricker) and Halle (I. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Hurkacz is bidding to record his **8th Tour-level match win on grass**. In addition to his victories here in 2019 and this year, he also reached the quarterfinals at 2019 Eastbourne, where he defeated Marco Cecchinato and Steve Johnson before falling to Taylor Fritz.
- Hurkacz's best result in 2021 is winning his **first Masters-1000 title** at Miami-1000 (d. Jannik Sinner), becoming the first Polish player to win a title at Masters-1000 level. He also won the title at Delray Beach (d. Sebastian Korda) and reached the quarterfinals at the Great Ocean Road Open in Melbourne (I. Stefano Travaglia). He has won 3 Tour-level singles titles, all of which have come on hard courts.
- Hurkacz is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the first time** on his 4th attempt. He has lost all 3 of his previous matches against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, including his only previous match against a Top 5 player at Wimbledon – against No. 1 Djokovic in the 3rd round here in 2019. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 36 Dusan Lajovic in the 1st round here in 2019.

- Hurkacz has is bidding to extend a **3-match winning streak against Top 5 players**. Since falling to No. 1 Djokovic in the 3rd round here in 2019, he has won all 3 matches he has played against Top 5 players – defeating No. 5 Stefanos Tsitsipas at both 2019 Montreal-1000 and Miami-1000 this year and No. 4 Dominic Thiem at the 2020 ATP Cup. He has a 4-5 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz **broke the Top 20 for the first time** after winning the title at Miami-1000 this year. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 16 and plays here 2 places lower at No. 18.
- Hurkacz has played **Davis Cup** for Poland since 2016 and has a 8-9 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will next compete in the World Group I play-offs in 2022.
- Hurkacz received an International Player Grand Slam Grant, funded by the Grand Slam Development Fund, in 2018
- Hurkacz is coached by Craig Boynton.

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 24th Grand Slam overall.
- Zverev is bidding to become the **12th German man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Boris Becker (11 Wimbledon quarterfinal appearances), Michael Stich (4), Florian Mayer and Alexander Popp (both 2), and Jurgen Fassbender, Tommy Haas, Nicolas Kiefer, Philipp Kohlschreiber, Patrick Kuhn, Alex Radulescu and Rainer Schuettler (all one).
- Zverev is also bidding to reach his 7th Grand Slam quarterfinal. He is in 4th place on the list for **most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances by a German man in the Open Era** – behind Becker (who reached 23 Grand Slam quarterfinals), Stich (10) and Haas (8).
- Zverev is also bidding to reach his first Wimbledon quarterfinal and become the **3rd German man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam events** – after Becker and Stich.
- Zverev is also bidding to become the **10th active player to reach the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam events** – after Marin Cilic, Juan Martin del Potro, Novak Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal, Kei Nishikori, Jo-Wilfried Tsonga and Stan Wawrinka. (NB Daniil Medvedev and Andrey Rublev are also bidding to reach their first Wimbledon quarterfinals complete the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam events today)
- Wimbledon is Zverev's **least-successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won and quarterfinals reached**. Roland Garros is his most-successful Grand Slam event.

- **If he wins today**, Zverev will play either No. 7 seed Matteo Berrettini or Ilya Ivashka in the quarterfinals. He leads Berrettini 3-1 but trails Ivashka 0-1 in their previous meetings.
- Zverev advanced to the round of 16 after defeating qualifier Tallon Griekspoor 63 64 61, Tennys Sandgren 75 62 63 and No. 31 seed Taylor Fritz 67(3) 64 63 76(4) in the opening 3 rounds here.

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Zverev has **equalled his best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the round of 16 in 2017, when he fell to Milos Raonic in 5 sets. He has a 3-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 16-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Zverev also became **the 8th German man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Becker (12 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Stich (5), Haas and Popp (both 3), and Kiefer, Mayer and Schuettler (all 2).
- **At 2019 Wimbledon**, Zverev fell to Jiri Vesely in the 1st round. It was the first time he had fallen in the 1st round here and one of 4 occasions where he has lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam.
- At 24 years 82 days, Zverev is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Novak Djokovic won the title here in 2011 aged 24 years 42 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Zverev reached his **first Grand Slam final** at the US Open last year, where he fell to Dominic Thiem in 5 sets, despite holding a 2-0 lead. He became the first German man to reach a Grand Slam final since Schuettler finished runner-up at the 2003 Australian Open.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at Roland Garros, falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas in 5 sets. He also reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Djokovic).
- **Prior to coming here**, Zverev reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Dominik Koepfer, l. Ugo Humbert).
- Zverev's **best results in 2021** are winning the titles at Acapulco (d. Tsitsipas) and Madrid-1000 (d. Matteo Berrettini). He also reached the quarterfinals at both Munich (l. Ilya Ivashka) and Rome-1000 (l. Nadal), but lost in the 3rd round at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. David Goffin).
- Zverev is bidding to end a **4-match losing streak against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams**. He has not defeated a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam since defeating No. 15 Stan Wawrinka in the quarterfinals at the 2020 Australian Open. He has a 3-12 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 59-62 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Zverev has won **15 Tour-level singles titles** – but none have come on grass. His best results on grass are reaching the finals at Halle in 2016 (l. Mayer) and 2017 (l. Federer).
- Zverev reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in November 2017, becoming the youngest player to break the Top 3 since Djokovic in 2007. He plays here at No. 6.
- Zverev is a former **junior world No. 1**. He was named 2013 ITF Junior World Champion and went on to win the boys' singles title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Stefan Kozlov). He also finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2013 Roland Garros (l. Cristian Garin) and helped Germany reach the 2013 Junior Davis Cup Final (l. Spain). He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon in 2013 (l. Kozlov).
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- **AUGER-ALIASIME** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- Auger-Aliassime is bidding to become the **4th Canadian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Milos Raonic (who reached the quarterfinals here in 2014 and 2016-18), Robert Powell (1908, 1910, 1912) and Vasek Pospisil (2015). Denis Shapovalov is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time today.
- If Auger-Aliassime and Shapovalov both win today and reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time in history that multiple Canadian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**.
- Aged 20 years 337 days, Auger-Aliassime is bidding to become the **youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2014**, when Nick Kyrgios reached the quarterfinals here aged 19 years 70 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- **If he wins today**, Auger-Aliassime will play either No. 7 seed Matteo Berrettini or Ilya Ivashka in the quarterfinals. He trails Berrettini 0-1 in their previous meetings but has never played Ivashka.

- Auger-Aliassime advanced to the round of 16 here after defeating Thiago Monteiro 63 63 63 and Mikael Ymer 64 46 76(4) 61 in the opening 2 rounds, and after Kyrgios retired due to an abdominal injury with the score at 26 61 in the 3rd round.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Auger-Aliassime has **equalled his best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the round of 16 at both the US Open last year (l. Dominic Thiem) and at the Australian Open this year (l. Aslan Karatsev).
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time, Auger-Aliassime has equalled Shapovalov in 3rd place on the all-time list for **most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Canadian man**. Shapovalov reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time after defeating Andy Murray in the 3rd round here on Friday.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Auger-Aliassime has also become the **6th Canadian man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Raonic (5 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Powell (4), and Daniel Nestor, Vasek Pospisil and Shapovalov (all one).
- With Shapovalov and Auger-Aliassime both through to the round of 16 here, it is the **first time that multiple Canadian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era**. It is also the 3rd time in the Open Era that multiple Canadian men have reached the last 16 at a Grand Slam – after the 2020 US Open (Auger-Aliassime, Pospisil and Shapovalov) and the Australian Open this year (Auger-Aliassime and Raonic).
- **At 2019 Wimbledon**, on his debut here, Auger-Aliassime reached the 3rd round. He defeated Pospisil and Corentin Moutet before falling to Ugo Humbert.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, in addition to his round of 16 finish at the Australian Open, Auger-Aliassime fell to Andreas Seppi in the 1st round at Roland Garros.
- Prior to coming here, Auger-Aliassime reached his **8th Tour-level singles final** at Stuttgart (l. Marin Cilic) and the semifinals at Halle (l. Humbert). Auger-Aliassime is yet to win his first title and has lost all 8 Tour-level finals he has contested in straight sets. He also reached the final at 2019 Stuttgart (l. Matteo Berrettini), his only previous Tour-level final on grass.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best results in 2021** are reaching the final at the Murray River Open in Melbourne (l. Daniel Evans) and Stuttgart. He also reached the quarterfinals at both Acapulco and Barcelona, falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas on both occasions.
- Auger-Aliassime is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the first time** on his 2nd attempt. He lost his only previous match against a Top 10 player at the Grand Slams, against No. 3 Thiem in the round of 16 at the 2020 US Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 12 Shapovalov in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year.
- Auger-Aliassime has **won the last 2 matches he has contested against Top 10 players at Tour-level**, having defeated No. 10 Diego Schwartzman in the 2nd round at Rome -1000 and No. 8 Roger Federer in the 2nd round at Halle this year. His victory against Schwartzman ended an 11-match Tour-level losing streak against Top 10 players. He has a 4-15 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Auger-Aliassime broke the Top 20 for the first time in August 2019 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 17 in October that year. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 19.
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He reached the quarterfinals in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur) and also reached the final in the boys' doubles with Shapovalov that year losing to Kenneth Raisma/Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final. He was also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.
- Auger-Aliassime made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019, as the Canadian team reached the final for the first time. He fell to Roberto Bautista Agut in the first match of the final and has a 1-3 win-loss record in the competition overall. As runners-up in 2019, Canada have secured a place at the 2020 Davis Cup Finals, which have been rearranged for 2021.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang and Toni Nadal.

- Rublev is bidding to reach his **5th Grand Slam quarterfinal**. He and Medvedev (who is also bidding to reach his 5th Grand Slam quarterfinal today) are level with Andrei Chesnokov in 6th place on the list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances by a Russian man in the Open Era – behind Yevgeny Kafelnikov (13 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), Nikolay Davydenko (10), Marat Safin (9), Aleksandr Metreveli (8) and Youzhny (6).
- Rublev and Medvedev are also bidding to reach their first Wimbledon quarterfinals and complete the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam events. Just **4 Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam events in the Open Era** – Kafelnikov, Metreveli, Safin and Youzhny.

- Rublev is also bidding to become the **10th active player to reach the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam events** – after Marin Cilic, Juan Martin del Potro, Novak Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal, Kei Nishikori, Jo-Wilfried Tsonga and Stan Wawrinka. (NB Medvedev and Alexander Zverev are also bidding to reach their first Wimbledon quarterfinals complete the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam events today)
- If Rublev, Khachanov and Medvedev all win today and reach the quarterfinals, it will be the **2nd time in the Open Era that 3 Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after the Australian Open this year, when Rublev, Medvedev and Aslan Karatsev all reached the last 8.
- If 2 Russian players win today and reach the quarterfinals, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** and the 8th time in the Open Era that multiple Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam.
- Wimbledon is Rublev's **3rd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won**, behind the US Open and the Australian Open.

- **If he wins today**, Rublev will play either No. 1 seed Djokovic or No. 17 seed Cristian Garin in the quarterfinals. He leads Garin 2-0 in their previous meetings but has never played Djokovic.
- Rublev advanced to the round of 16 after defeating Federico Delbonis 46 64 61 62, Lloyd Harris 61 62 75 and No. 26 seed Fabio Fognini 63 57 64 62 in the opening 3 rounds here.
- With Rublev, Khachanov and Medvedev all through to the round of 16 here, it is the **3rd time in the Open Era that 3 Russian men have reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after 2007 Roland Garros (Igor Andreev, Davydenko and Youzhny) and the Australian Open this year (Medvedev, Rublev and Karatsev).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Rublev has recorded his **best Wimbledon performance**. He reached the 2nd round on his 2 other appearances here – as a qualifier on his debut here in 2017 (d. Stefano Travaglia, l. Albert Ramos-Vinolas) and as a direct acceptance in 2019 (d. Cristian Garin, l. Sam Querrey).
- Rublev's **best Grand Slam performance** is reaching the quarterfinals on 4 occasions – at the US Open in 2017 (l. Nadal) and 2020 (l. Medvedev), at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas), and at the Australian Open this year (l. Medvedev).
- At 23 years 264 days, Rublev is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Djokovic won the title at the 2011 Australian Open aged 23 years 253 days. He would also become the youngest Wimbledon men's singles champion since Nadal won the title here in 2008 aged 22 years 33 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Rublev fell to Jan-Lennard Struff in 5 sets in the 1st round at Roland Garros.
- Prior to coming here, Rublev reached his **first Tour-level final on grass** at Halle, falling to Ugo Humbert in straight sets. He is contesting his 5th Tour-level event on grass here this year – in addition to his appearances at Halle this year and at Wimbledon in 2017 and 2019, he also reached the quarterfinals as a wild card at Halle in 2017 (l. Karen Khachanov).
- Rublev's **best result in 2021** is winning the title at Rotterdam (d. Fucsovics). He also reached his first Masters-1000 final at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Tsitsipas), and reached the semifinals at Doha (l. Roberto Bautista Agut), Dubai (l. Aslan Karatsev) and Miami-1000 (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and the quarterfinals at Barcelona (l. Jannik Sinner) and Rome-1000 (l. Lorenzo Sonego).
- Rublev is bidding to record his **37th Tour-level match win of 2021**. He is in 2nd place on the list for most Tour-level match-wins in 2021, behind Tsitsipas. (see table overleaf)

- Rublev has contested 2 **five-set matches** at Wimbledon – both of which came on his debut here in 2017, when he defeated Travaglia in 5 sets before falling to Ramos-Vinolas, also in 5 sets. He has a 3-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Rublev has won **8 Tour-level singles titles**, including his victory at Rotterdam this year. He won 5 titles in 2020, more than any other player on Tour – at Doha (d. Corentin Moutet), Adelaide (d. Lloyd Harris), Hamburg (d. Tsitsipas), St Petersburg (d. Borna Coric) and Vienna (d. Sonogo).
- Rublev **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in October last year and finished the season ranked at No. 8. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 7 in April this year and plays here at the same ranking.
- Rublev is a **former junior world No. 1** having topped the boys' rankings for the first time in June 2014 after winning the boys' singles title at 2014 Roland Garros (d. Jaume Munar). He also won two medals at the Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing later that year, winning boys' singles bronze and boys' doubles silver with Khachanov. He was named 2014 ITF Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Tim van Rijthoven).
- Rublev has played **Davis Cup** since 2014 and has a 14-9 win-loss record in the competition. He won all 4 singles matches he contested at the 2019 Davis Cup Finals in Madrid. The Russian Tennis Federation team will compete alongside Spain and Ecuador in Group A at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Rublev is coached by Fernando Vicente.
- **FUCSOVICS** is bidding to reach his first Grand Slam quarterfinal and become the first Hungarian player, man or woman, to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal since Agnes Szavay reached the quarterfinals of the women's singles at the 2007 US Open. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 17th Grand Slam overall.
- Fucsovics is bidding to become the **3rd Hungarian man in the Open Era – and the 6th in history – to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. Istvan Gulyas (1971 Roland Garros) and Balazs Taroczy (1976, 1981 Roland Garros) are the only 2 Hungarian men to reach the last 8 at a major in the Open Era.
- Fucsovics is also bidding to become the **3rd Hungarian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Bela von Kehrling (1929) and Jozsef Asboth (1948). He would also become the 4th Hungarian player, man or woman, to reach the quarterfinals here after Von Kehrling, Asboth and Zsuzsa Kormoczy, who reached the quarterfinals of the women's singles at Wimbledon in 1953, 1955 and 1958.
- **If he wins today**, Fucsovics will play either No. 1 seed Novak Djokovic or No. 17 seed Cristian Garin in the quarterfinals. He trails Djokovic 0-2 in their previous meetings but has never played Garin.
- Fucsovics advanced to the round of 16 after defeating No. 19 seed Jannik Sinner 57 63 75 63 in the 1st round, after Jiri Vesely retired due to a lower back injury with Fucsovics leading 63 5-4 in the 2nd round and after defeating No. 9 seed Diego Schwartzman 63 63 67(6) 64 in the 3rd round.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Fucsovics has recorded his **best Wimbledon performance**. His previous best performance here was reaching the 2nd round in 2019, when he defeated Dennis Novak for his first Wimbledon match-win before falling to Fabio Fognini in 5 sets.
- By reaching the round of 16, Fucsovics has also equalled his **best Grand Slam performance**. He has reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam on 3 other occasions – at the Australian Open in 2018 and 2020, falling to Roger Federer on both occasions, and at Roland Garros last year (l. Rublev). He is the only Hungarian man to have reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam since Taroczy reached the last 16 at 1984 Roland Garros.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Fucsovics has become the **3rd Hungarian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Szabolcs Baranyi (1973) and Taroczy (1980).

- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 4th time, Fucsovcics has also claimed sole ownership of **2nd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances by a Hungarian player, man or woman** – ahead of Istvan Gulyas, Andrea Temesvari and Agnes Szavay. Taroczy, who reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam on 5 occasions, is the only Hungarian player to have reached the last 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Fucsovcics.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Fucsovcics reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where he defeated Marc Polmans and Stan Wawrinka – both in 5 sets – before falling to Milos Raonic, and the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Gilles Simon, l. Fognini).
- **Prior to coming here**, Fucsovcics reached the 2nd round at Eastbourne (d. Aljaz Bedene, l. Soonwoo Kwon) but fell to Ugo Humbert in the 1st round at Stuttgart.
- Fucsovcics' **best result in 2021** is reaching the final as a qualifier at Rotterdam, where he fell to Rublev in straight sets. He also reached the quarterfinals at Doha, where he gave a walkover to Rublev due to a lower back injury, and Dubai, falling again to Rublev. He also fell to Rublev in the 3rd round at Miami-1000 – the 4th consecutive tournament that he had exited following a defeat or walkover against Rublev.
- Fucsovcics' **best Tour-level result on grass** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2019 Stuttgart, where he defeated Jaume Munar and Nikoloz Basilashvili before falling to Milos Raonic. His only other Tour-level match-wins on grass came in 2nd round finishes at 2018 Stuttgart (d. Denis Kudla, l. Raonic), at 2019 Wimbledon and at Eastbourne this year.
- Fucsovcics is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the 2nd time** on his 20th attempt. He has a 1-18 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level, with his only victory against a Top 10 player coming against No. 5 Daniil Medvedev in the 1st round at Roland Garros last year. He has a 1-4 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams.
- Fucsovcics has won **one Tour-level title** – on clay at 2018 Geneva (d. Peter Gojowczyk). He became the first Hungarian man to win a Tour-level title since Balazs Taroczy at 1982 Hilversum.
- Fucsovcics lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – to Fognini in the 2nd round in 2019. He has a 7-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Fucsovcics reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in March 2019. He plays here at No. 48.
- Fucsovcics is **one of 3 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** through to the round of 16 from the 8 who began the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles title here in 2010 (d. Benjamin Mitchell) and also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the Australian Open (l. Sean Berman) and the US Open (l. Jack Sock) in the same year.
- Fucsovcics has played **Davis Cup** for Hungary since 2010 and has a 29-16 win-loss record in the competition. He won both singles matches he contested as Hungary defeated Belgium in the Qualifiers in March last year, securing Hungary's place at the next Davis Cup Finals, where the team will compete alongside Croatia and Australia in Group D.
- Fucsovcics has entered the **men's doubles** here with Stefano Travaglia. The pair defeated Radu Albot/Nikoloz Basilashvili 36 62 62 in the 1st round on Thursday but fell to No. 6 seeds Rajeev Ram/Joe Salisbury 63 64 in the 2nd round.
- Fucsovcics is coached by Zoltan Nagy and Miklos Jancso.

- FEDERER is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the 18th time and extend his lead at the top of the all-time list for most Wimbledon quarterfinal appearances, ahead of Jimmy Connors.

- Federer is also bidding to reach his 58th Grand Slam quarterfinal and extend his lead at the **top of the all-time list for most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances**, ahead of Novak Djokovic.

- At 39 years 337 days, Federer is bidding to become the **oldest man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon in the Open Era**. The oldest man to have reached the quarterfinals here in the Open Era is Ken Rosewall (39 years 224 days) in 1974. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Federer is also bidding to become the **oldest man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** since Rosewall reached the quarterfinals at the December 1977 Australian Open aged 43 years 59 days. Rosewall, who reached 3 Grand Slam quarterfinals in his 40s, and Pancho Gonzales, who reached 2 Grand Slam quarterfinals in his 40s, are the only men to have reached the last 8 at a Grand Slam in the Open Era aged older than Federer is now.
- Wimbledon is Federer's **most-successful Grand Slam event** in terms of titles and matches won and quarterfinals reached.

- **If he wins today**, Federer will play either No. 2 seed Daniil Medvedev or No. 14 seed Hubert Hurkacz in the quarterfinals. He leads Medvedev 3-0 and Hurkacz 1-0 in their previous meetings.
- Federer advanced to the 3rd round after Adrian Mannarino retired due to a right knee injury with the score level at 64 67(3) 36 62 in their 1st round match and after defeating Richard Gasquet 76(1) 61 64 and No. 29 seed Cameron Norrie 64 64 57 64 in the 2nd and 3rd rounds.
- By reaching the round of 16 here for the 18th time, Federer has extended his **Open Era record for most round of 16 appearances at Wimbledon**, ahead of Jimmy Connors.
- By reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 69th time, Federer has also extended his **all-time record for most round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams**, ahead of Djokovic.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Federer has become the **3rd-oldest man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after Gonzales (41 years 57 days) in 1969 and Rosewall (40 years 245 days) in 1975.
- **At 2019 Wimbledon**, Federer reached his 12th final here, falling to Novak Djokovic 76(5) 16 76(4) 46 13-12(3), despite holding 2 championship points at 8-7 in the final set. It was the first men's singles match to be decided with a final set tiebreak and, at 4 hours 55 minutes, it was the longest Wimbledon men's singles final on record.
- Federer is bidding to win his **9th Wimbledon title**. By defeating Marin Cilic in the final to win his 8th title here in 2017, he took sole ownership of the all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles titles, ahead of William Renshaw and Pete Sampras. He also won the titles here in 2003 (d. Mark Philippoussis), 2004 (d. Andy Roddick), 2005 (d. Roddick), 2006 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2007 (d. Nadal), 2009 (d. Roddick) and 2012 (d. Andy Murray).
- Federer is bidding to become the **2nd player in history to win 9 Wimbledon singles titles** – after Martina Navratilova, who won 9 women's singles titles here between 1978 and 1990.
- Federer is also bidding to close the gap on Nadal and Djokovic on the list for the **most men's singles titles at any one event**. Nadal tops the list having won 13 titles at Roland Garros, while Djokovic claimed sole ownership of 2nd place on the list, ahead of Federer, by winning his 9th title at the Australian Open this year.
- Federer is bidding to win his **21st Grand Slam title** and reclaim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles, ahead of Nadal. Nadal equalled Federer's mark of 20 Grand Slam titles by winning the title at Roland Garros last year. It was also the first time in their rivalry that Federer and Nadal had won an equal number of Grand Slam titles.
- Federer is also bidding to close the gap on Steffi Graf in 3rd place on the list for **most Grand Slam singles titles**. Margaret Court (24 major titles), Serena Williams (23) and Graf (22) are the only players to have won more Grand Slam singles titles than Federer or Nadal.
- Federer is looking to become the 3rd man to **win 5 Grand Slam titles after turning 30**. Since turning 30 on 8 August 2011, Federer has won 4 Grand Slam titles – at Wimbledon in 2012 and 2017, and at the Australian Open in 2017 and 2018. Djokovic and Nadal have, respectively, won 7 and 6 Grand Slam titles since turning 30.
- Federer is also bidding to become the **first player aged 38 or older to win a Grand Slam men's singles title in the Open Era**. Ken Rosewall is the oldest winner of a Grand Slam men's singles title in the Open Era – he won the title at the 1972 Australian Open aged 37 years 62 days.
- Federer is the **oldest player in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year**. He is 21 years 270 days older than Carlos Alcaraz (18 years 67 days), who was the youngest player to begin the men's main draw here this year.
- Federer is making his **22nd consecutive Wimbledon appearance** this year, having made his debut here in 1999. He claimed sole ownership of the Open Era record for most appearances at Wimbledon, ahead of Jimmy Connors, by competing here for the 21st time in 2019.
- Federer is contesting his **81st Grand Slam** here. He holds the all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances, ahead of Feliciano Lopez, who is contesting his 78th Grand Slam here.

- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Federer reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros. He defeated Denis Istomin, Cilic and Dominik Koepfer before giving a walkover to Matteo Berrettini due to fatigue. It was his first Grand Slam appearance since he fell to Djokovic in the semifinals at the 2020 Australian Open.
- Federer **did not compete during the 2020 season** after reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open. He underwent 2 right knee surgeries in 2020 and returned to action at Dubai this year.
- **Prior to coming here**, Federer competed at Halle, where he defeated Ilya Ivashka in the 1st round before falling to Felix Auger-Aliassime in the 2nd round.
- Federer is contesting his **12th match of the 2021 season**. In addition to his appearances at Roland Garros and Halle, he reached the quarterfinals after receiving a bye through the 1st round at Dubai (d. Daniel Evans, I. Nikoloz Basilashvili) and lost his opening match on clay at Geneva (l. Pablo Andujar).
- Federer holds the Open Era record for the **most Tour-level grass court titles** with 19 titles on grass. In addition to 8 titles at Wimbledon, he has won 10 titles at Halle (in 2003-06, 2008, 2013-15, 2017 and 2019) and one title at Stuttgart (in 2018).
- Federer is the **most successful active player on grass** with a 191-28 career win-loss record.
- Federer is **one of 3 Wimbledon boys' singles champions** through to the round of 16 from the 8 who began the main draw here this year. He defeated Irakli Labadze to win the boys' title here in 1998. He is one of just 4 boys' singles champions who have gone on to win the men's singles title.
- Federer is coached by former world No. 3 Ivan Ljubicic, who reached the 3rd round here in 2006-07 and 2011, and Severin Luthi.
- **SONEGO** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 12th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Berrettini is bidding to become the **18th Italian man in history to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal** – and the 10th in the Open Era. The only Italian men to reach the quarterfinals at a major in the Open Era are Panatta (6 Grand Slam quarterfinals), Corrado Barazzutti (3), Matteo Berrettini (2), and Paolo Bertolucci, Cristiano Caratti, Marco Cecchinato, Fabio Fognini, Renzo Furlan, Martin Mulligan, Davide Sanguinetti and Jannik Sinner (one each).
- Sonego is also bidding to become the **5th Italian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Uberto de Morpurgo (1928), Nicola Pietrangeli (1955, 1960), Panatta (1979) and Sanguinetti (1998). (NB Berrettini is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here today)
- If Berrettini and Sonego both reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time that multiple Italian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon**.
- If Berrettini and Sonego both reach the quarterfinals here, it will also be the **4th time that multiple Italian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – and the first time 1973 Roland Garros, when Panatta and Bertolucci both reached the quarterfinals.
- **If he wins today**, Sonego will play either No. 2 seed Daniil Medvedev or No. 14 seed Hubert Hurkacz in the quarterfinals. He leads Hurkacz 2-1 in their previous Tour-level meetings but has never played Medvedev.
- Sonego advanced to the round of 16 after defeating Pedro Sousa 62 75 60, Daniel Elahi Galan 46 63 76(3) 61 and James Duckworth 63 64 64 for his **first Wimbledon match-wins** in the opening 3 rounds here.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Sonego has become the **6th Italian man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after Panatta (1979), Sanguinetti (1998), Gianluca Pozzi (2000), Andreas Seppi (2013) and Berrettini (2019, 2021).
- With Sonego and Berrettini both through to the round of 16 here, it is the **3rd time that multiple Italian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after 1949 (Cucelli and Rolando del Bello) and 1955 (Pietrangeli and Merlo). It is also the 4th consecutive Grand Slam event where 2 or more Italian men have reached the last 16.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Sonego has equalled his **best Grand Slam performance**. He also reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros last year, when he defeated Emilio Gomez, Alexander Bublik and Taylor Fritz before falling to Diego Schwartzman in the last 16.

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Sonego has also recorded his **best Wimbledon performance**. He fell in the 1st round on his 2 previous appearances here – as a lucky loser in 2018 (l. Fritz) and as a direct acceptance in 2019 (l. Marcel Granollers).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Sonego reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Sam Querrey, l. Feliciano Lopez) but fell to Lloyd Harris in the 1st round at Roland Garros.
- **Prior to coming here**, Sonego finished runner-up at Eastbourne (l. Alex de Minaur). It was his 2nd Tour-level final on grass and his 4th Tour-level final overall. He also competed at Queen's but fell to Viktor Troicki in the 1st round.
- Sonego's **best result in 2021** is winning his 2nd Tour-level title at Sardinia (d. Laslo Djere). He also won the doubles title at Sardinia – his first Tour-level doubles title – alongside Andrea Vavassori (d. Simone Bolelli/Andres Molteni). His other highlights this year are reaching the semifinals at Rome-1000 (l. Novak Djokovic) and the quarterfinals at Montpellier (l. David Goffin).
- Sonego's **best grass court result** is winning the title at 2019 Antalya where, as a qualifier, he defeated Miomir Kecmanovic in the final.
- Sonego is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the first time** on his 2nd attempt. He lost his only previous match against a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam, against No. 3 Federer in the 1st round at 2019 Roland Garros. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 30 Fritz in the 3rd round at Roland Garros last year.
- Sonego has **won 2 of the last 3 matches he has played against Top 10 players at Tour-level**. He won back-to-back matches against No. 4 Dominic Thiem and No. 7 Andrey Rublev before falling to No. 1 Djokovic in the semifinals at Rome-1000 this year. He has a 3-7 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Sonego has a 2-1 win-loss record in **5-set matches**, but has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- Sonego reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 26 in June this year and plays here one place lower at No. 27.
- Sonego is coached by Gipo Arbino.

NO. 7 MATTEO BERRETTINI (ITA) v ILYA IVASHKA (BLR)

Tour-level head-to-head: first meeting

A first Tour-level meeting for Berrettini and Ivashka. Berrettini won the pair's only meeting at Challenger-level – a straight sets victory on hard courts at the Portoroz Challenger 4 years ago.

Berrettini has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 79 Ivashka on 2 occasions – to No. 100 Tennys Sandgren in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open and to No. 186 Daniel Altmaier in the 3rd round at 2020 Roland Garros. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Berrettini at Wimbledon is No. 53 Gilles Simon in the 2nd round in 2018.

- **BERRETTINI** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon and his 14th Grand Slam overall.
- Berrettini is bidding to become the **5th Italian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Uberto de Morpurgo (1928), Nicola Pietrangeli (1955, 1960), Adriano Panatta (1979) and Davide Sanguinetti (1998). (NB Lorenzo Sonogo is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here today)
- Berrettini is bidding to reach his 3rd Grand Slam quarterfinal and equal Corrado Barazzutti, Giovanni Cucelli, De Morpurgo and Giuseppe Merlo in 4th place on the all-time list for **most Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances by an Italian man**. By reaching his 2nd Grand Slam quarterfinal at Roland Garros this year he became the first active Italian player to reach multiple Grand Slam quarterfinals.

- Wimbledon is Berrettini's **3rd-most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won. He is bidding to record his 8th Wimbledon match-win today.

- **If he wins today**, Berrettini will play either No. 4 seed Alexander Zverev or No. 16 Felix Auger-Aliassime in the quarterfinals. He leads Auger-Aliassime 1-0 but trails Zverev 1-3 in their previous meetings.

- Berrettini advanced to the round of 16 after defeating Guido Pella 62 36 64 60, lucky loser Botic van de Zandchulp 63 64 76(4) and Aljaz Bedene 64 64 64 in the opening 3 rounds here. His victory against Bedene was his **100th Tour-level match-win**.
- By reaching the round of 16 here for the 2nd time, Berrettini became the **3rd Italian man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Pietrangeli (who reached the last 16 here in 1955-56, 1958, 1960 and 1965) and Orlando Sirola (1959 and 1962).
- With Berrettini and Sonogo both through to the round of 16 here, it is the **3rd time that multiple Italian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after 1949 (Cucelli and Rolando del Bello) and 1955 (Pietrangeli and Merlo). It is also the 4th consecutive Grand Slam event where 2 or more Italian men have reached the last 16.
- Berrettini's **best Grand Slam performance** is reaching the semifinals at the 2019 US Open (l. Rafael Nadal), where he became the 4th Italian man in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam semifinal – after Panatta (1973, 1975, 1976 Roland Garros), Corrado Barazzutti (1977 US Open, 1978 Roland Garros) and Marco Cecchinato (2018 Roland Garros).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Berrettini reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Novak Djokovic) and the round of 16 at the Australian Open, where he gave a walkover to Stefanos Tsitsipas due to an abdominal injury. By reaching at least the round of 16 at both Grand Slam events this year, he became the first Italian man in history to reach the round of 16 at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Prior to coming here, Berrettini **won the title at Queen's**, defeating Cameron Norrie in the final. He became the first Italian player to win the title at Queen's and the first player to win the title at Queen's on his debut at the event since Boris Becker in 1985. It was his 2nd Tour-level title on grass, having also won the title at 2019 Stuttgart.
- Berrettini's **other highlights in 2021** are winning the title at Belgrade I (d. Aslan Karatsev) and reaching his first Masters-1000 final at Madrid-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev). He also reached the quarterfinals at Antalya (l. Alexander Bublik) and won 3 of the 4 singles matches he contested as Italy reached the final at the ATP Cup, falling to Russia's Daniil Medvedev in the final.
- Berrettini is bidding to record his **30th Tour-level match-win of the season** and become the 5th player to record 30 victories at Tour-level this year. Daniil Medvedev is also bidding to record his 30th Tour-level victory of the season today.

- Berrettini has won 3 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested – including both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon, defeating Jack Sock in the 1st round in 2018 and Diego Schwartzman in the 3rd round in 2019. His only defeat in a 5-set match came against Tennys Sandgren in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open.
- Berrettini has won **5 Tour-level singles titles**. In addition to his victories at Belgrade I and Queen's this year and at 2019 Stuttgart, he also won the titles at 2018 Gstaad (d. Roberto Bautista Agut) and 2019 Budapest (d. Filip Krajinovic).
- Berrettini reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 8 in November 2019, becoming the highest-ranked Italian man since No. 8 Barazzutti in 1978. He plays here one place lower at No. 9.
- Berrettini made his **Davis Cup** debut in February 2019 during Italy's victory against India in the Qualifiers. He has a 2-3 overall win-loss record in the competition. Italy will compete alongside USA and Colombia in Group E at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.

- If Ivashka and Korda both win today, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple Wimbledon debutants have reached the quarterfinals**. With Ivashka and Korda both reaching the round of 16, it is the first time that multiple Wimbledon debutants have reached the last 16 since 2004, when Joachim Johansson and Florian Mayer both reached the round of 16 here.
- Ivashka is bidding to become the **3rd Belarusian man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after Vladimir Voltchkov (who reached the semifinals here in 2000) and Max Mirnyi (who reached the quarterfinals at the 2002 US Open).
- If Ivashka and Aryna Sabalenka, who is bidding to reach the quarterfinals of the women's singles here this year, both win today, it will be the **first time that multiple Belarusian players have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**.
- **If he wins today**, Ivashka will play either No. 4 seed Alexander Zverev or No. 16 seed Felix Auger-Aliassime. He leads Zverev 1-0 in their previous meetings but has never played Auger-Aliassime.

- By reaching the round of 16 here, Ivashka has recorded his **best Grand Slam performance**. His previous best result at the Grand Slams was reaching the 2nd round at the 2019 Australian Open (d. Malek Jaziri, l. Pablo Carreno Busta). He lost in the 1st round on 5 of his 6 previous Grand Slam main draw appearances.
- By winning his 3rd round match and joining fellow Wimbledon debutant Korda in the round of 16 here, Ivashka became the **6th Wimbledon debutant to reach the round of 16 here in the last decade** – after Brian Baker (2012), Nick Kyrgios (2014), Mackenzie McDonald (2018), Ugo Humbert (2019) and Korda, who reached the last 16 here this year after defeating Daniel Evans in the 3rd round on Friday.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Ivashka fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Roman Safiullin) and, as No. 1 seed, fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Andrey Kuznetsov).
- **Prior to coming here**, Ivashka reached the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Eastbourne, where he defeated Alastair Gray and Alexei Popyrin before falling to Soonwoo Kwon. He fell in the 1st round as a lucky loser at Stuttgart (l. Peter Gojowczyk) and as a qualifier at Halle (l. Roger Federer).
- Ivashka's **other highlights in 2021** are reaching the semifinals as a qualifier at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and the quarterfinals as a direct acceptance at Marbella (l. Munar).

- Ivashka is bidding to record his **7th Tour-level match-win on grass**. In addition to his victories at Eastbourne and Wimbledon this year, he also reached the quarterfinals at 2019 Newport, where he defeated Bernard Tomic and Christopher Eubanks before falling to Ugo Humbert.

- **If he wins today**, Bautista Agut will play either No. 25 seed Karen Khachanov or Sebastian Korda in the quarterfinals. He leads Khachanov 5-2 but trails Korda 0-1 in their previous meetings.
- Bautista Agut advanced to the round of 16 after defeating John Millman 62 36 63 76(4), Miomir Kecmanovic 63 63 67(3) 36 63 and Dominik Koepfer 75 61 76(4) in the opening 3 rounds here.
- At 2019 Wimbledon, Bautista Agut recorded his **best Grand Slam performance** by reaching the semifinals, where he fell to No. 1 seed Novak Djokovic in 4 sets. He became the 6th Spanish man in history to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon. His only other Grand Slam quarterfinal appearance came at the 2019 Australian Open (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Bautista Agut reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Mario Viella Martinez, l. Henri Laaksonen), but fell to Radu Albot in the 1st round at the Australian Open.

- Bautista Agut's **best results in 2021** are finishing runner-up at both Montpellier (l. David Goffin) and Doha (l. Nikoloz Basilashvili). He also reached the semifinals at Miami-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- **Prior to coming here**, Bautista Agut reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca after receiving a bye through the 1st round (d. Stefano Travaglia, l. Sam Querrey), but fell to Korda in the 1st round at Halle.
- Bautista Agut has **won one of the last 5 matches he has contested against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams**, with his only victory against a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam in that time coming against No. 9 Karen Khachanov in the 3rd round here in 2019. He has a 7-17 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 31-81 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Bautista Agut has won both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – when he recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Benoit Paire in the 2nd round in 2015, and against Kecmanovic in the 2nd round this year. He has a 12-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Bautista Agut has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2014 's-Hertogenbosch where he defeated Benjamin Becker in the final. He has won 9 Tour-level singles titles, most recently at 2019 Doha.

- Shapovalov is bidding to reach his 2nd Grand Slam quarterfinal and become the **3rd Canadian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at the Grand Slams on multiple occasions** – after Raonic (10 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances) and Powell (3).
- If Shapovalov and Felix Auger-Aliassime both win today and reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **first time in history that multiple Canadian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**.

- Shapovalov advanced to the round of 16 after defeating Philipp Kohlschreiber 64 46 63 57 64, Pablo Andujar, who gave a walkover due to a rib injury, in the 2nd round and wild card Andy Murray 64 62 62 in the opening 3 rounds here. His victory over Kohlschreiber was the **first 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon**. He has a 5-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- With Shapovalov and Auger-Aliassime both through to the round of 16 here, this is the **first time in history that multiple Canadian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon**. It is also the 3rd time in history that multiple Canadian men have reached the last 16 at a Grand Slam – after the 2020 US Open (Auger-Aliassime, Pospisil and Shapovalov) and the Australian Open this year (Auger-Aliassime and Raonic).
- **At 2019 Wimbledon**, Shapovalov fell to Ricardas Berankis in the 1st round. He also fell in the 1st round as a wild card on his Grand Slam debut here in 2017 (l. Jerzy Janowicz).
- Shapovalov's previous **best Wimbledon result** was reaching the 2nd round in 2018 when, as No. 26 seed, he defeated Jeremy Chardy before falling to Benoit Paire.
- Shapovalov recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals at the US Open last year. He defeated Korda, Soonwoo Kwon, Taylor Fritz and David Goffin, before falling to Pablo Carreno Busta in 5 sets in the last 8. Shapovalov was the first Canadian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at the US Open.

- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shapovalov reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Auger-Aliassime). He missed Roland Garros due to a shoulder injury.
- **Prior to coming here**, Shapovalov reached his first Tour-level semifinal on grass at Queen's (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the quarterfinals at Stuttgart (l. Marin Cilic).
- Shapovalov's **best result in 2021** is finishing runner-up at Geneva (l. Casper Ruud). He also reached the semifinals at Dubai (l. Lloyd Harris) and the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Shapovalov is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at the Grand Slams for the 2nd time** on his 4th attempt. He has a 1-2 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams with his only victory against a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam coming against No. 10 David Goffin in the round of 16 at the 2020 US Open.
- Shapovalov is also bidding to end a **4-match losing streak against Top 10 players at Tour-level**. Since defeating No. 10 Goffin at the 2020 US Open, he has lost all 4 matches he has played against Top 10 players. He has a 7-20 win-loss record against Top 10 opposition at Tour-level overall.
- Shapovalov the **only lefthanded player through to the round of 16** from the 18 who started the men's main draw at Wimbledon this year. The last lefthander to win the title here was Rafael Nadal in 2010.
- Shapovalov has **won one Tour-level title** – on hard courts at 2019 Stockholm (d. Filip Krajinovic).
- Shapovalov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 after reaching the semifinals at Rome-1000 in September 2020. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 12.
- Shapovalov is **one of 3 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** through to the round of 16 from the 8 who began the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles title here in 2016, defeating Alex de Minaur in the final. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in July 2016 and was also a member of the Canadian team that defeated Germany to win the 2015 Junior Davis Cup title.
- Shapovalov was part of the **Canadian team which reached the Davis Cup final for the first time** in November 2019. He won 3 of his 5 singles matches and 2 of his 3 doubles matches at the Finals in Madrid, falling to Rafael Nadal in the 2nd match of the final. He made his debut in the competition in 2016 and has a 12-7 overall Davis Cup win-loss record. Canada will compete alongside Kazakhstan and Sweden in Group B at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Shapovalov is coached by his mother, Tessa Shapovalova, and Mikhail Youzhny, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2012.

NO. 25 KAREN KHACHANOV (RUS) v SEBASTIAN KORDA (USA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Khachanov is facing an American opponent for the 3rd time at Wimbledon this year, having defeated Mackenzie McDonald in the 1st round and Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round. He is bidding to extend an 11-match winning streak against American players at Tour-level, having not lost to an American player since falling to Denis Kudla in the 2nd round at 2018 Washington. He has a 4-1 win-loss record against American players at the Grand Slams and a 13-2 win-loss record against American players at Tour-level overall.

- **KHACHANOV** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Khachanov and fellow Russian players Daniil Medvedev and Andrey Rublev are all bidding to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon for the first time this year. Just **4 Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – most recently Mikhail Youzhny in 2012.

- Khachanov is bidding to reach his 2nd Grand Slam quarterfinal and become the **11th Russian man in the Open Era to reach multiple Grand Slam quarterfinals** – after Yevgeny Kafelnikov (13 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances), Nikolay Davydenko (10), Marat Safin (9), Aleksandr Metreveli (8), Youzhny (6), Medvedev and Rublev (who are both bidding to reach their 5th Grand Slam quarterfinals today), Andrei Chesnokov (4), Andrey Cherkasov (3) and Alexander Volkov (2).
- If Khachanov, Medvedev and Rublev all win today and reach the quarterfinals, it will be the **2nd time in the Open Era that 3 Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam** – after the Australian Open this year, when Medvedev, Rublev and Aslan Karatsev all reached the last 8.
- If 2 Russian players win today and reach the quarterfinals, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** and the 8th time in the Open Era that multiple Russian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam.
- **If he wins today**, Khachanov will play either No. 8 seed Roberto Bautista Agut or No. 10 seed Denis Shapovalov in the quarterfinals. He trails Bautista Agut 2-5 and Shapovalov 0-1 in their previous meetings.
- Khachanov advanced to the round of 16 after defeating qualifier Mackenzie McDonald 36 63 65 76(3), Egor Gerasimov 61 76(3) 63 and Frances Tiafoe 63 64 64 in the opening 3 rounds here.

- With Khachanov, Medvedev and Rublev all through to the round of 16 here, it is the **3rd time in the Open Era that 3 Russian men have reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after 2007 Roland Garros (Igor Andreev, Davydenko and Youzhny) and the Australian Open this year (Medvedev, Rublev and Karatsev).
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Khachanov has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the round of 16 here in 2018, when he defeated David Ferrer, Marcos Baghdatis and Tiafoe before falling to Novak Djokovic in straight sets.
- With Khachanov, Medvedev and Rublev all through to the round of 16 here, it is the **first time that 3 Russian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era**. It is also the 3rd time in the Open Era that 3 Russian men have reached the last 16 at a Grand Slam – after 2007 Roland Garros (Igor Andreev, Nikolay Davydenko and Mikhail Youzhny) and the Australian Open this year (Medvedev, Rublev and Aslan Karatsev).
- Khachanov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2019 Roland Garros. He defeated Cedrik-Marcel Stebe, Gregoire Barrere, Martin Klizan and Juan Martin del Potro, before falling to Dominic Thiem in straight sets in the last 8.
- **At 2019 Wimbledon**, Khachanov reached the 3rd round. He defeated Soonwoo Kwon and Feliciano Lopez before falling to Bautista Agut. He has reached at least the 3rd round on all 4 of his appearances here.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Khachanov reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where he defeated Aleksandar Vukic and Ricardas Berankis before falling to Matteo Berrettini, but fell in the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Jiri Vesely, l. Kei Nishikori).
- **Prior to coming here**, Khachanov reached the 2nd round at Mallorca (d. Lucas Pouille, l. Feliciano Lopez) but fell to Andrey Rublev in the 1st round at Halle.
- Khachanov's **best results in 2021** are reaching the semifinals on at the Great Ocean Road Open in Melbourne (l. Jannik Sinner) and at Lyon (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the quarterfinals at Rotterdam (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Marseille (l. Matthew Ebden).
- Khachanov has **won 4 Tour-level titles** – all of which have come on hard courts. He won his first title at 2016 Chengdu (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas) and won 3 titles during the 2018 season – at Marseille (d. Lucas Pouille), Moscow (d. Adrian Mannarino) and Paris-1000 (d. Djokovic).
- Khachanov **dropped outside the Top 20** for the first time since October 2018 in February this year. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 8 in July 2019 but plays here at No. 29.
- Khachanov was a **successful junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 16. He won the boys' doubles silver medal alongside Andrey Rublev at the 2014 Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing, China. The pair fell to Orlando Luz/Marcelo Zormann in the gold medal match. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (d. Marcelo Zormann, l. Laslo Djere).
- Khachanov has played **Davis Cup** since 2013 and has a 9-12 win-loss record in the competition. He won one of the 4 singles matches he contested at the 2019 Davis Cup Finals in Madrid as Russia reached the semifinals before falling to Canada. The Russian Tennis Federation team will compete alongside Spain and Ecuador in Group A at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals.
- Khachanov is coached by Frederik Rosengren and Jose Clavet.
- **KORDA** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 3rd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Korda is bidding to become the **12th man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals on his Wimbledon debut** – and the first since Nick Kyrgios in 2014. (NB Ilya Ivashka is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals on Wimbledon debut today) (see table overleaf)

- If both Korda and Ilya Ivashka win today, it will be the **first time in the Open Era that multiple Wimbledon debutants have reached the quarterfinals**. With Korda and Ivashka both reaching the round of 16, it is the first time that multiple Wimbledon debutants have reached the last 16 since 2004, when Joachim Johansson and Florian Mayer both reached the round of 16 here.
- Korda is bidding to become the **46th American man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – but just the 4th American man to reach the last 8 here in the last decade. Since Andy Roddick reached the last of his 5 Wimbledon quarterfinals in 2009, the only American men to have reached the last 8 here are Mardy Fish (2011), Sam Querrey (2016-17, 2019) and John Isner (2018).
- Aged 21 years 6 days, Korda could become the **youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2014**, when Kyrgios reached the quarterfinals here aged 19 years 70 days. Felix Auger-Aliassime (20 years 337 days) is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here today. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament; Korda celebrates his 21st birthday today)
- Korda is also bidding to become the **youngest American man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since 2003 Wimbledon**, when Roddick reached the quarterfinals aged 20 years 310 days.
- **If he wins today**, Korda will play either No. 8 seed Roberto Bautista Agut or No. 10 seed Denis Shapovalov in the quarterfinals. He leads Bautista Agut 1-0 but trails Shapovalov 0-1 in their previous meetings.
- Korda advanced to the round of 16 after defeating No. 15 seed Alex de Minaur 63 64 67(5) 76(5), qualifier Antoine Hoang 75 64 64 and No. 22 seed Daniel Evans 63 36 63 64 in the opening 3 rounds here.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Korda has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the round of 16 on his Grand Slam debut at Roland Garros last year where, ranked at No. 213, he qualified for the main draw before defeating Andreas Seppi, John Isner and Martinez in the opening 3 rounds. He fell to Rafael Nadal in straight sets in the last 16.
- By reaching the round of 16 here, Korda became the **5th Wimbledon debutant to reach the round of 16 here in the last decade** – after Brian Baker (2012), Kyrgios (2014), Mackenzie McDonald (2018) and Ugo Humbert (2019). Ivashka became the 6th Wimbledon debutant to reach the round of 16 here in the last decade after reaching the round of 16 on Saturday.
- By reaching the round of 16 on his first appearance here, Korda has become the **3rd man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 on his debuts at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon** – after Bjorn Borg, who reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros and the quarterfinals at Wimbledon on his debuts in 1973, and Mikael Pernfors, who reached the final at Roland Garros and the round of 16 at Wimbledon on his debuts in 1986.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Korda fell to Martinez in the 1st round at Roland Garros. He did not compete at the Australian Open.
- **Prior to coming here**, Korda reached the quarterfinals at Halle. He defeated Roberto Bautista Agut and Kei Nishikori before falling to Ugo Humbert. It was the first grass court event that he had contested as a professional.
- Korda's best result in 2021 is winning his **first Tour-level title** at Parma (d. Marco Cecchinato). He also reached the final at Delray Beach (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He has

contested one event at Challenger-level this season, winning the title at the Quimper Challenger (FRA) (d. Filip Horansky).

- Korda reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 50 in May this year and plays here at the same ranking. He broke the Top 100 for the first time in February this year after winning the title at the Quimper Challenger.
- Korda is a **former junior world No. 1**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2018 Australian Open (d. Tseng Chun Hsin). He competed in the boys' singles here on 2 occasions – in 2017, when he reached the 2nd round (d. James Kent Trotter, l. Michael Vrbensky), and 2018, when he fell to Otto Virtanen in the 1st round.
- Korda is coached by his father, Petr Korda, a former world No. 2 and the 1998 Australian Open champion. His mother, Regina Rajchtova, also played professional tennis and reached a career-high ranking of No. 26, while his sisters, Jessica and Nelly, are professional golfers on the LPGA Tour. Nelly won her first major title at the Women's PGA Championship on Sunday 27 June and became world No. 1 for the first time last week.
