On court this weekend...

- The women's doubles gold medal match here will be the 2nd clash between Czech Republic and Switzerland this weekend – and Belinda Bencic will hope that her exertions in singles on Saturday will not affect her attempts to win doubles gold alongside Viktorija Golubic. The challenge for the Swiss team could not be any greater than facing the No. 1 seeds and 3-time Grand Slam champions in Barbora Krejckikova and Katerina Siniakova. Both pairs have equalled their nations' previous best performances in women's doubles at the Olympic Tennis Event – the Czechs have won the silver medal in women's doubles in 1988, 1996 and 2012, while the Swiss won the silver medal in this event at Rio 2016. Prior to this year, neither Czech Republic nor Switzerland had won an Olympic gold medal in a women's singles or doubles – both nations have 2 chances this weekend to claim their first.
- In the bronze medal match, Wimbledon runners-up Veronika Kudermetova and Elena Vesnina bid for ROC's first medal at the Olympic Tennis Event this year – and there is also some personal glory on offer for Vesnina. She is aiming to win her 2nd Olympic medal (having won gold in this event at Rio 2016) and will also go level with Conchita Martinez in 3rd place on the list for most Olympic women's doubles match wins in history, with only the Williams sisters having won more Olympic women's doubles matches. But on the other side of the net will be a team who have defied all the odds to reach this stage – Laura Pigossi and Luisa Stefani are bidding to win a first medal for Brazil at the Olympic Tennis Event and finish a sublime week in style.

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GOLD MEDAL MATCH

No. 1 Barbora Krejčíková/Katerina Siniakova (CZE) v Belinda Bencic/Viktorija Golubic (SUI)

Head-to-head: first meeting

A first meeting for these 4 players – but a 2nd meeting between Switzerland and Czech Republic in a gold medal match at the Olympic Tennis Event, after Bencic faced Marketa Vondrousova in the women's singles final here on Saturday. It is the first time in history that the same 2 nations are contesting both the women's singles and doubles gold medal matches at the Olympic Tennis Event. (NB written prior to the Tokyo 2020 women's singles gold medal match)

Should either Switzerland or Czech Republic win gold medals in both women's singles and doubles here, they will become the 2nd nation to win women's singles and doubles gold medals at an Olympic Tennis Event since tennis returned to the Games at Seoul 1988 – after USA, which swept both women's singles and doubles gold in 1992, 1996, 2000 and 2012.

Switzerland and Czech Republic have been drawn together in Group D at the 2021 Billie Jean King Cup Finals, alongside Germany.

Bencic/Golubic saved a match point against Spain's Garbine Muguruza/Carla Suarez Navarro in the 2nd round here before winning 11-9 in the match tiebreak.

Krejčíková and Bencic also played each other in the women's singles 3rd round here, with Bencic winning 16 62 63. Golubic also competed in singles but fell to Japan's No. 2 seed Naomi Osaka 61 64 in the 2nd round.

- **KREJCIKOVA/SINIAKOVA** are bidding to become the first Czech team to win women's doubles gold at the Olympic Tennis Event. Both players are making their Olympic debuts at Tokyo 2020.
- With Krejckikova through to the women's doubles final and Marketa Vondrousova through to the women's singles final here, **Czech Republic have won medals at the Olympic Tennis Event for the 3rd consecutive Olympic Games**. The Czech tennis team won one silver medal at London 2012 and 3 bronze medals at Rio 2016.

- By reaching the final here, Krejckikova/Siniakova have become the **3rd Czech pair to reach the women's doubles gold medal match** since tennis returned to the Olympics in 1988 – after Jana Novotna/Helena Sukova, who won silver at both Seoul 1988 and Atlanta 1996, and Andrea Hlavackova/Lucie Hradecka, who won silver at London 2012.
- Krejckikova/Siniakova are **3-time Grand Slam doubles champions**. The pair won back-to-back Grand Slam titles in 2018 – at Roland Garros (d. Eri Hozumi/Makoto Ninomiya) and Wimbledon (d. Nicole Melichar/Kveta Peschke) – before winning a 3rd major title together at Roland Garros this year (d. Bethanie Mattek-Sands/Iga Swiatek).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Krejckikova/Siniakova reached the final at the Australian Open (l. Elise Mertens/Aryna Sabalenka) and the quarterfinals at Wimbledon (l. Veronika Kudermetova/Elena Vesnina).
- Krejckikova/Siniakova's **other highlights in 2021** are winning the titles at the Gippsland Trophy in Melbourne (d. Latisha Chan/Chan Hao-ching) and Madrid-1000 (d. Gabriela Dabrowski/Demi Schuurs).
- Krejckikova won her **first Grand Slam singles title** at Roland Garros this year, defeating Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova in the final. She became the first Czech woman to win a Grand Slam singles title since Petra Kvitova at 2014 Wimbledon.
- Krejckikova is also a **3-time Grand Slam mixed doubles champion**. She has won 3 consecutive Australian Open mixed doubles titles – alongside Rajeev Ram in 2019 and 2021, and alongside Nikola Pietrangeli in 2020. She is one of 4 active players, men or women, to have won Grand Slam titles in singles, doubles and mixed doubles – alongside Samantha Stosur, Serena Williams and Venus Williams.
- Siniakova's **best Grand Slam singles performance** is reaching the round of 16 at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Madison Keys).
- Krejckikova/Siniakova have **won 8 Tour-level doubles titles as a team**. Krejckikova has won one other doubles title, while Siniakova has won a further 3 doubles titles – including one alongside Bencic, at 2015 Prague.
- Krejckikova/Siniakova have both reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 1 – they jointly held the top ranking for the first time in October 2018. Krejckikova is currently ranked at No. 2, with Siniakova at No. 3.
- Krejckikova reached a **career-high singles ranking** of No. 11 earlier this month and played singles here at the same ranking.
- Siniakova reached a **career-high singles ranking** of No. 31 in October 2018 and is currently ranked at No. 57.
- Krejckikova and Siniakova both **represent Czech Republic in Billie Jean King Cup**. They were members of the team which defeated USA to win the title in 2018, with Siniakova winning both matches she contested. Siniakova has a 5-5 overall win-loss record in the competition, while Krejckikova has a 1-1 overall win-loss record in the

competition. Czech Republic will compete alongside Germany and Switzerland at the 2021 Billie Jean King Cup Finals.

- Krejčíková is coached by Ales Kartus. Siniakova is coached by her father, Dmitri Siniakov.
- **BENCIC/GOLUBIC** are bidding to become the first Swiss team to win women's doubles gold at the Olympic Tennis Event. Both players are making their Olympic debuts at Tokyo 2020.
- Bencic/Golubic are bidding to **add to Switzerland's gold medal tally at the Olympic Tennis Event**. Prior to Tokyo 2020, Switzerland had 2 Olympic tennis gold medals, won by Marc Rosset in men's singles at Barcelona 1992 and by Roger Federer/Stan Wawrinka in men's doubles at Beijing 2008. (NB written prior to the women's singles gold medal match on Saturday)
- Bencic will also contest the **women's singles gold medal match here** – she faces Marketa Vondrousova in the final on Saturday. (NB written prior to the women's singles gold medal match on Saturday)
- By reaching the final of both the singles and doubles events here, Bencic will become the **2nd Swiss tennis player to win multiple Olympic medals** – after Federer, who won gold in men's doubles at Beijing 2008 and silver in men's singles at London 2012.
- Bencic could become the **4th woman in history to win singles and doubles gold medals at the same Olympic Tennis Event** – after Helen Wills (Paris 1924), Venus Williams (Sydney 2000) and Serena Williams (London 2012). She would also become the 12th player, man or woman, to achieve the feat and the 4th player to do so since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988. - By reaching the final here, Bencic/Golubic have become the **2nd Swiss pair to reach the women's doubles gold medal match at the Olympic Tennis Event** – after Tímea Babcsinszky/Martina Hingis, who won silver in women's doubles at Rio 2016.
- Prior to this event, **Bencic/Golubic had contested 2 matches as a team** – defeating Brazil's Gabriela Ce/Laura Pigossi in a Billie Jean King Cup tie in 2014, but falling in the 1st round 's-Hertogenbosch in 2016 (l. Darija Jurak/Anastasia Rodionova).
- Bencic's **best Grand Slam doubles result** is reaching the 3rd round at 2015 Roland Garros alongside Siniakova. Golubic's best Grand Slam doubles result is reaching the 3rd round on 3 occasions – most recently alongside Sara Sorribes Tormo at the 2019 US Open.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Bencic fell in the 1st round alongside Sofia Kenin at both the Australian Open (l. Alexa Guarachi/Desirae Krawczyk) and Wimbledon (l. Marta Kostjuk/Jelena Ostapenko). Golubic reached the 2nd round at Wimbledon alongside Misaki Doi (d. Ekaterina/Alexandrova/Wang Yafan, l. Hsieh Su-Wei/Elise Mertens), but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros alongside Alexandra Panova (l. Xu YiFan/Zhang Shuai).
- Bencic's **best doubles result in 2021** is reaching the semifinals at Madrid-1000 alongside Jil Teichmann (l. Krejčíková/Siniakova). Golubic won 3 Tour-level doubles matches in 2021 prior to this event, but won the title at W25 Fujairah (UAE) alongside Çağla Buyuğcakçay (d. Liang En Shuo/You Xiaodi).

- Bencic has **won 2 Tour-level doubles titles** – alongside Siniakova at 2015 Prague and alongside Kristina Mladenovic at 2015 Washington. Golubic is bidding to win her first Tour-level doubles title.
- Bencic reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 59 in February 2016. She plays here at No. 161. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 4 in February 2020 and is currently ranked at No. 20.
- Golubic reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 63 in January 2019. She plays here at No. 127. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 48 earlier this month and is currently ranked one place lower at No. 49.
- Bencic and Golubic both **represent Switzerland in Billie Jean King Cup**. Bencic has a 14-7 overall win-loss record in the competition, while Golubic has a 7-7 overall win-loss record. Switzerland will compete in Group D alongside Czech Republic and Germany at the 2021 Billie Jean King Cup Finals.
- Bencic is coached by Sebastian Sachs and her father, Ivan Bencic. Golubic is coached by Dominik Utzinger

- **KUDERMETOVA/VESNINA** are bidding to win ROC's first medal in tennis at Tokyo 2020.
- Kudermetova/Vesnina are bidding to ensure that **ROC wins 4 medals at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event**. Karen Khachanov is guaranteed at least a silver medal after reaching the men's singles, while in mixed doubles, ROC are guaranteed both a gold medal and a silver medal after 2 ROC teams reached the final.
- If Kudermetova/Vesnina win today and ensure that ROC will win 4 medals at Tokyo 2020, it will be the **3rd time that a nation has won 4 or more medals at an Olympic Tennis Event since 1988**. USA is the only nation to have won 4 or more medals at an Olympic Tennis Event in that time – at Seoul 1988, when they won 5 medals, and London 2012, when they won 4 medals.
- Vesnina is bidding to win her **2nd Olympic medal**. She won the gold medal in women's doubles alongside Ekaterina Makarova at Rio 2016 (d. Timea Bacsinszky/Martina Hingis). She is guaranteed to win a 3rd Olympic medal when she competes in the mixed doubles gold medal match on Sunday.
- Vesnina is **competing at the Olympic Tennis Event for the 4th time**. In women's doubles, she reached the quarterfinals alongside Vera Zvonareva at Beijing 2008 and alongside Makarova at London 2012 before winning gold with Makarova at Rio 2016. Kudermetova is making her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020.

- Vesnina is bidding to win her 13th women's doubles match at the Olympic Tennis Event and equal Conchita Martinez in **3rd place on the list for most women's doubles match-wins at the Olympic Tennis Event**. Serena Williams and Venus Williams (15 women's doubles match-wins each) and Martinez are the only players to have won more women's doubles matches at the Olympics than Vesnina.
- Kudermetova and Vesnina both competed in **women's singles here**. Vesnina defeated Latvia's Jelena Ostapenko 64 67(2) 64 in the 1st round before falling to Italy's Camila Giorgi 63 61 in the 2nd round. Kudermetova fell to Spain's No. 7 seed Garbine Muguruza 75 75 in the 1st round. It was Vesnina's first appearance in women's singles at the Olympics.
- Kudermetova/Vesnina are contesting their **4th event as a team**. They lost in the 1st round at the first 2 events they contested – at Roland Garros and Eastbourne this year – before finishing runners-up at Wimbledon (l. Elise Mertens/Hsieh Su-Wei).
- Vesnina is a **3-time Grand Slam women's doubles champion**. She won 3 major titles alongside Makarova – at 2013 Roland Garros (d. Sara Errani/Roberta Vinci), the 2014 US Open (d. Hings/Flavia Pennetta) and 2017 Wimbledon (d. Chan Hao-ching/Monica Niculescu). She has also won one Grand Slam mixed doubles title – alongside Bruno Soares at the 2016 Australian Open.
- Kudermetova's **best doubles result in 2021** is winning the title at Istanbul alongside Mertens (d. Nao Hibino/Makoto Ninomiya). It was her 2nd Tour-level doubles title, having also won the title at 2020 Wuhan alongside Duan Yingying.
- Vesnina **returned to professional tennis at the beginning of the 2021 season** after taking maternity leave from November 2018 until the end of last year. Since making her comeback, her best results are reaching the final at Wimbledon and the quarterfinals at a further 5 Tour-level events this year.
- Kudermetova reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 16 earlier this month and plays here at the same ranking. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 28 in April this year and is currently ranked at No. 32.
- Vesnina is a **former doubles world No. 1**, having reached the No. 1 ranking in June 2018. She is currently ranked at No. 56 but entered using a special ranking of No. 1. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 13 in March 2017 and is currently ranked at No. 303.
- Kudermetova and Vesnina both **represent the Russian Tennis Federation (RTF) team in Billie Jean King Cup**. Kudermetova made her debut in 2014 and has lost all 4 matches she has played in the competition so far. Vesnina made her debut 2006 and has a 14-8 overall win-loss record in the competition. The RTF team will compete in Group A alongside France and Hungary at the 2021 Billie Jean King Cup Finals.
- Kudermetova is coached by Sergey Demekhine and Vladimir Platenik. Vesnina is coached by Eugenia Maniokova.
- **PIGOSSI/STEFANI** are bidding to win Brazil's first medal at the Olympic Tennis Event. Both players are making their Olympic debuts at Tokyo 2020.
- By reaching the bronze medal match, Pigossi/Stefani have **equalled Brazil's best performance at the Olympic Tennis Event** – Fernando Meligeni reached the bronze medal match of the men's singles at Atlanta 1996, but fell to Leander Paes.
- Prior to Tokyo 2020, Pigossi/Stefani had **contested 4 matches together at any level** – they reached the semifinals together at 2019 W60 Asuncion (PAR) (l. Anna Danilina/Conny Perrin) and lost the only match they have contested in Billie Jean King Cup, falling to Germany's Anna-Lena Friedsam/Antonia Lottner in the 2020 Qualifiers.
- Pigossi is contesting her **first Tour-level doubles event of 2021**. Below Tour-level, her best doubles result this year is reaching the final at W60 Nur-Sultan (KAZ) alongside Evgeniya Levashova (l. Alina Charaeva/Maria Timofeeva). She has never competed at the Grand Slams in either singles or doubles.
- Stefani's **best results in 2021** are reaching 3 Tour-level finals alongside regular partner Hayley Carter – at Abu Dhabi (l. Shuko Aoyama/Ena Shibahara), Adelaide (l. Alexa Guarachi/Desirae Krawczyk) and Miami-1000 (l. Aoyama/Shibahara).

- Stefani's **best Grand Slam performance** is reaching the quarterfinals at the 2020 US Open alongside Carter (l. Nicole Melichar/Xu Yifan). At the Grand Slams this year, Carter/Stefani reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Aoyama/Shibahara) but fell in the 1st round at Wimbledon (l. Aleksandra Krunic/Nina Stojanovic).
- Stefani has **won 2 Tour-level doubles titles**, both of which came alongside Carter – at 2019 Tashkent and 2020 Lexington.
- Pigossi reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 125 in February 2020. She plays here at No. 188. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 247 in July 2014 and is currently ranked at No. 326.
- Stefani reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 23 in June this year and plays here at the same ranking.
- Pigossi and Stefani both **represent Brazil in Billie Jean King Cup**. Pigossi made her debut in the competition in 2013 and has a 4-4 overall win-loss record, while Stefani made her debut in 2017 and has a 9-2 overall win-loss record. Brazil fell to Poland in the Play-offs earlier this year and will compete in Americas Group I in 2022.
