On court today:

- In the last of this year's quarterfinals, the Russian Tennis Federation team will bid to reach the last 4 for the 2nd consecutive season, while Sweden aim to reach the Davis Cup semifinals for the first time since 2007. The RTF team has looked to be in good form so far this year, with world No. 2 Daniil Medvedev spearheading the team's drive for a 3rd Davis Cup title. Andrey Rublev has provided the support act in singles so far and although the 24-year-old lost to Feliciano Lopez in the opening match of RTF's group stage victory over Spain, he rebounded well to win the decisive doubles match of that tie alongside Aslan Karatsev. This afternoon's tie will also be a milestone moment for RTF's captain already comfortably the longest-serving captain in the competition's history, Shamil Tarpischev leads the team for the 100th tie today.
- Sweden impressed in the group stages, with the team winning the first 9 sets they contested in Madrid to ensure that, despite defeat to Kazakhstan in their 2nd tie, they were able to advance to the quarterfinals as one of the 2 best group runners-up. Captain Robin Soderling will know that his team face a formidable challenge today, but his top 2 players brothers Mikael and Elias Ymer performed well in their group stage matches and will be optimistic of carrying that form into the knockout stages. Sweden also lead the head-to-head against RTF, having won 5 of the nations' previous 7 Davis Cup meetings.

Russian Tennis Federation - Team Information

RTF

- RTF are bidding to reach the semifinals for the 2nd consecutive season. They are making their 2nd appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- In 2019, RTF **reached the semifinals for the first time since 2008**. The team defeated Croatia and fell to Spain in the group stages, but advanced to the knockout stages as one of the best runners-up. They then defeated Serbia in the quarterfinals before falling to Canada in the semifinals. As semifinalists in 2019, they qualified automatically for the Finals this year.
- RTF are 2-time Davis Cup champions. They won the title in 2002 (d. France) and 2006 (d. Argentina).
 They have finished as runners-up on 3 further occasions 1994 (l. Sweden), 1995 (l. USA) and 2007 (l. USA).
- Until 1991, RTF players competed under the flag of USSR, and then CIS in 1992.
- RTF are ranked No. 13 on the **Davis Cup Nations Ranking** their best ranking since February 2012, when they were ranked No. 10. They are one of only 8 nations (alongside Argentina, Australia, Croatia, Czech Republic, France, Great Britain and Spain) to have been ranked No. 1 since the Davis Cup Nations' Ranking was introduced in 2001, having held the No. 1 ranking between December 2006 and May 2009.
- Captain Shamil Tarpischev is the longest-serving Davis Cup captain of all-time and is contesting his 100th Davis Cup tie as captain today. He first captained the Russian Tennis Federation team in 1974 and began his current spell as captain in 1997, missing just one tie since then. He guided the RTF team to their only 2 Davis Cup titles to date (in 2002 and 2006), has a 39-22 win-loss record in his current spell as captain and a 63-36 overall win-loss in the competition.

- Age: 25 (born 11 February 1996 in Moscow, Russia)
- Rankings: 2 (singles), 277 (doubles)
- **2021 singles highlights**: Won Marseille, Mallorca, Toronto, US Open; RU Australian Open, Paris, ATP Finals; SF Cincinnati; QF Miami, Roland Garros; R16 Wimbledon
- Davis Cup: Medvedev made his first Davis Cup appearances in nearly 3 years in the group stages, recording victories over Ecuador's Emilio Gomez and Spain's Pablo Carreno Busta. He had previously not played in the competition since defeating Switzerland's Henri Laaksonen in the 2019 Qualifiers. He made his debut in the competition in 2017, retiring while trailing Novak Djokovic in RTF's defeat to Serbia in the World Group first round, and is bidding to improve a 5-3 Davis Cup win-loss record.



ANDREY RUBLEV

- Age: 24 (born 20 October 1997 in Moscow, Russia)
- Rankings: 5 (singles), 74 (doubles)
- 2021 singles highlights: Won Rotterdam; RU Monte Carlo, Halle, Cincinnati; SF Doha, Dubai, Miami, San Diego; QF Australian Open, Barcelona, Rome, St Petersburg; R16 Wimbledon
- 2021 doubles highlights: Won Doha; RU Indian Wells
- Davis Cup: Rublev was the star of the RTF team which reached the semifinals in 2019, winning 6 of the 8 matches he contested including all 4 singles matches. He has won one of the 2 singles matches he has played at the Finals so far this week, defeating Ecuador's Roberto Quiroz but falling to Spain's Feliciano Lopez. He has also partnered Karatsev to victory in 2 doubles matches, defeating Ecuador's Gonzalo Escobar/Diego Hidalgo and Spain's Marcel Granollers/Lopez. He will claim sole ownership of 4th place on the list for most Davis Cup matches won by an RTF player, ahead of Nikolay Davydenko, if he wins a match today.

ASLAN KARATSEV

- Davis Cup: Karatsev made his 2nd and 3rd Davis Cup appearances in the group stages at the Finals this year, recording doubles wins alongside Rublev against both Ecuador's Escobar/Hidalgo and Spain's Granollers/Lopez. His only previous appearance in the competition came in 2016, when he lost the dead 5th match of RTF's 4-1 victory against Netherlands, falling to Matwe Middelkoop in 3 sets.

KAREN KHACHANOV

- Age: 25 (born 21 May 1996 in Moscow, Russia)
- Rankings: 29 (singles), 169 (doubles)
- 2021 singles highlights: Silver Tokyo Olympics; SF Melbourne 1, Lyon, Moscow; QF Rotterdam, Marseille, Wimbledon
- Davis Cup: Khachanov won his first singles match at the 2019 Finals, defeating Croatia's Borna Coric, before falling to Spain's Rafael Nadal, Serbia's Novak Djokovica and Canada's Denis Shapovalov. He had previously not lost a singles match in the competition since falling to Marton Fucsovics in Russia's World Group play-off defeat to Hungary in 2017. He won 2 of the 4 doubles matches he contested alongside Rublev at the 2019 Finals.

• EVGENY DONSKOY

- Age: 31 (born 9 May 1990 in Moscow, Russia)
- Rankings: 173 (singles), 642 (doubles)
- Davis Cup: Donskoy was nominated for the 2019 Finals but did not play a match. Should he get on court this week, he will bid to end a 3-match Davis Cup losing streak, having not won in the competition since he and Konstantin Kravchuk defeated Johan Brunstrom/Robert Lindstedt in Russia's 5-0 victory in the 2016 Europe/Africa Group I first round.

Sweden - Team Information

- <u>SWEDEN</u> are bidding to reach the Davis Cup semifinals for the first time since 2007, when they defeated Belarus and Argentina before falling to USA in the last 4. They are making their first appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- By reaching the quarterfinals, Sweden have recorded their best Davis Cup performance since 2011, when they also reached the quarterfinals. In 2011, they defeated Russia in the World Group first round before falling to Serbia in the last 8.
- In the 2020 Qualifiers, Sweden defeated Chile 3-1 in Stockholm, with Mikael Ymer winning both of his singles matches to secure Sweden's place at the Finals.
- Sweden have **won 9 of their last 11 Davis Cup ties**. Since being relegated to Europe/Africa Group II in 2016, their only defeats in the competition came against Colombia in the 2019 Qualifiers and against Kazakhstan in the group stages at this year's Finals.



- Sweden are **7-time Davis Cup champions**, with all 7 of their titles coming between 1975 and 1998. They are 5th on the all-time list of champions behind USA (32 titles), Australia (28), France and Great Britain (both 10).
- Sweden are ranked No. 14 in the Davis Cup Nations Ranking. Their best ranking is No. 4, which they held from December 2001 to July 2002.
- Captain Robin Soderling took over as Swedish captain ahead of the 2020 Qualifiers, leading the team to a 3-1 victory over Chile in Stockholm in his first tie in charge. As a player, he competed in 10 ties between 2004 and 2011 and had a 14-4 win-loss record. He also reached the Roland Garros final on 2 occasions, falling to Roger Federer in 2009 and to Rafael Nadal in 2011.

- Davis Cup: Mikael Ymer has won 5 of his last 6 Davis Cup matches, with his defeat to Kazakhstan's Alexander Bublik on Saturday ending a 5-mtch Davis Cup winning streak. He won his first match at the Finals this year, defeating Canada's Vasek Pospisil in straight sets. He defeated both Marcelo Tomas Barrios Vera and Alejandro Tabilo during Sweden's victory over Chile in the Qualifiers last year. He has never contested a doubles match in the competition.

ELIAS YMER

- Age: 25 (born 10 April 1996 in Skara, Sweden)
- Rankings: 171 (singles), 388 (doubles)
- 2021 doubles highlights: SF Stockholm
- Davis Cup: Elias Ymer won both of the matches he contested during the group stages at the Finals this year, defeating both Canada's Steven Diez and Kazakhstan's Mikhail Kukushkin. He had recorded just one victory in his previous 6 Davis Cup matches prior to this week. He lost the only match he contested in the competition last year, falling to Tabilo during Sweden's victory over Chile in the Qualifiers. He has never contested a doubles match in the competition.

JONATHAN MRIDHA

- Age: 26 (born 8 April 1995)
- Rankings: 512 (singles), 825 (doubles)
- **Davis Cup**: Mridha has appeared in just one Davis Cup tie to date, contesting 2 matches during Sweden's victory over Switzerland in the 2018 World Group play-offs. He fell to Henri Laaksonen in straight sets before defeating Sandro Ehrat in the decisive 5th match.

ANDRE GORANSSON

- Age: 27 (born 30 April 1994)
- Rankings: unranked (singles), 65 (doubles)
- 2021 doubles highlights: RU Belgrade 2; SF Santiago; QF Wimbledon
- Davis Cup: Goransson recorded his first Davis Cup match-win during Sweden's victory over Canada on Thursday, partnering Lindstedt to a win over Pospisil/Brayden Schnur in the doubles match. The pair then fell to Andrey Golubev/Aleksandr Nedovyesov in the decisive doubles match of Sweden's defeat to Kazakhstan on Sunday. His only previous Davis Cup appearance came during Sweden's 2019 Europe/Africa Group I victory over Israel, when he and Markus Eriksson lost the doubles match Daniel Cukierman/Jonathan Erlich in straight sets.

ROBERT LINDSTEDT

- Age: 44 (born 19 March 1977 in Sundbyberg, Sweden)
- Rankings: unranked (singles), 184 (doubles)
- Davis Cup: Lindstedt has won 4 of his last 6 Davis Cup matches including his and Goransson's victory over Pospisil/Schnur in Sweden's win against Canada on Thursday. His only defeats in the competition in that time came in the 2019 Qualifiers, when he and Eriksson fell to Colombia's Juan-Sebastian Cabal/Robert Farah in straight sets, and during Sweden's defeat to Kazakhstan at the Finals this year, when he and Goransson fell to Golubev/Nedovyesov. Since making his debut in 2007, he has played in at least one Davis Cup match a season every year except 2017.
