### On court today...

- Three-time defending champion Novak Djokovic opens the action on Centre Court this afternoon, with Soonwoo Kwon bidding to become the first man to defeat Djokovic at Wimbledon since 2017. Victory for Djokovic today will see him record his 80th match-win at Wimbledon and become the first player, man or woman, to record 80 singles match-wins at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. Djokovic has never lost a Wimbledon match to a player ranked as low as No. 81 Kwon, while Kwon is aiming to record his first victory against a Top 10 player on his 8th attempt.
- Two-time Wimbledon champion Andy Murray contests the 3rd match of the day on Centre Court, with Australia's James Duckworth hoping to become the first player ever to defeat Murray in the 1st round at Wimbledon. The former world No. 1 showed good form in reaching the final at Stuttgart earlier this month before withdrawing from Queen's due to an abdominal injury. Duckworth has also endured injury problems this year, undergoing hip surgery in January and missing 4 months of the season. He is bidding to end an 8-match Tour-level losing streak today and record his first Tour-level match-win since last November.
- Nineteen-year-old Carlos Alcaraz, the youngest man in the draw this year, will play the 2nd match on No. 1 Court today, with the No. 5 seed up against Germany's Jan-Lennard Struff. Alcaraz is bidding to become the 2nd-youngest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title, after Boris Becker, who won as a 17-year-old in 1985 and as an 18-year-old in 1986. The Spaniard lost his only previous meeting against Struff, in the 3rd round at Roland Garros last year – but, since then, Alcaraz has climbed 90 places in the rankings to break the world's Top 10, while Struff has struggled with a right foot injury in recent months and dropped outside the Top 100 for the first time in more than 5 years earlier in June.
- British No. 1 Cameron Norrie faces Pablo Andujar in the first match on No. 2 Court at this year's tournament, with the lefthander aiming to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd consecutive time. Despite winning 4 Tour-level titles and breaking into the world's Top 10 for the first time, Norrie is still yet to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam, and will be determined to make his breakthrough on home soil this fortnight. His opponent in the 1st round, Andujar, bidding to record just his 4th Tour-level match-win on grass today.

# NO. 1 NOVAK DJOKOVIC (SRB) v SOONWOO KWON (KOR)

## Head-to-head: Djokovic leads 1-0

2021 Belgrade I Clay (O) R16 Djokovic 61 63

A 2nd meeting for Djokovic and Kwon, but their first on grass or at a Grand Slam. Djokovic lost just 4 games on the pair's only previous meeting.

Djokovic has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 81 Kwon once before – No. 117 Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Djokovic at Wimbledon is No. 75 Marat Safin in the 2nd round in 2008.

- Three-time defending champion **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here. This is his 17th consecutive Wimbledon appearance and his 68th Grand Slam overall.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **80th Wimbledon match-win** and become the first player in history, man or woman, to record 80 singles match-wins at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. He would also become the 3rd man in history to record 80 Wimbledon men's singles match-wins – after Federer (105 Wimbledon match-wins) and Jimmy Connors (84).
- Djokovic has lost in the **1st round at a Grand Slam on just 2 occasions** – at the Australian Open in 2005 (l. Marat Safin) and 2006 (l. Paul Goldstein).
- Djokovic is bidding to avoid becoming only the **3rd defending men's singles champion to lose in the 1st round at Wimbledon** – after 1966 champion Manuel Santana, who lost to Charlie Pasarell in the 1st round in 1967, and 2002 champion Lleyton Hewitt, who lost to Ivo Karlovic in the 1st round in 2003.
- **Last year here**, Djokovic won his 6th Wimbledon title, defeating Matteo Berrettini 67(4) 64 64 63 in the final. He also won the title here in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Roger Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson) and 2019 (d. Federer).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **7th Wimbledon title** and equal William Renshaw and Pete Sampras in 2nd place on the all-time list for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won. Federer (8 Wimbledon titles), Renshaw and Sampras are the only men to have won more Wimbledon singles titles than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is also bidding to win his **4th consecutive Wimbledon title** and become the 4th man in the Open Era to record a streak of 4 consecutive Wimbledon titles – after Federer, Sampras and Bjorn Borg. It would be the first time in his career that he has recorded a streak of 3 consecutive titles at a Grand Slam event – in addition to his 3 consecutive titles here since 2018, he has won 3 consecutive Australian Open titles on 2 occasions, in 2011-13 and 2019-21.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **21st Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of 2nd place on the all-time list of most Grand Slam men's singles titles won, ahead of Federer. Nadal, who is bidding to win his 23rd Grand Slam title here, is at the top of the list. In addition to his 6 Wimbledon titles, Djokovic has won 9 Australian Open titles (2008, 2011-13, 2015-16, 2019-21), 3 US Open titles (2011, 2015, 2018) and 2 Roland Garros titles (2016, 2021).

- At 35 years 49 days, Djokovic is bidding to win his 9th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and claim sole ownership of the **record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era**, ahead of Nadal. (NB all ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **328th Grand Slam match-win**. He is 2nd on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles match-wins, behind Federer (369).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, falling to Nadal in 4 sets. He did not compete at the Australian Open.
- Djokovic's **best result in 2022** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He also finished runner-up at Belgrade (l. Andrey Rublev), reached the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Jiri Vesely) and Roland Garros.
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014-15, 2019 and 2021.
- Djokovic has a 9-1 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeat in a 5-set match here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (34-9) and has a 37-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Of Djokovic's **87 Tour-level singles titles**, 7 have come on grass – in addition to his 6 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 61 titles on hard courts and 17 titles on clay.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 373 weeks. He dropped to No. 3 in the rankings – his lowest position since October 2018 – on 13 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 42-13 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. He won all 4 singles matches he contested as Serbia reached the semifinals last year (l. Croatia). Serbia will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Canada and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Djokovic is coached by 2001 Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic.
- **KWON** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 3rd appearance at Wimbledon and his 13th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, Kwon recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the 2nd round. He defeated Daniel Masur for his first Wimbledon match-win before falling to Dominik Koepfer in 5 sets. On his only other main draw appearance here, as a qualifier in 2019, he fell to Karen Khachanov in the 1st round.
- Kwon's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at 2021 Roland Garros, where he defeated Kevin Anderson and Andreas Seppi before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Kwon reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Holger Rune, l. Denis Shapovalov) but lost in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Andrey Rublev).
- Kwon's **best results in 2022** are reaching the 2nd round at 10 Tour-level events. He has failed to advance beyond the 2nd round at a Tour-level event since winning the title at Nur-Sultan in September 2021.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Kwon competed at 's-Hertogenbosch, falling to Hugo Gaston in the 1st round. He also fell in the 1st round on grass at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (l. Christopher O'Connell).
- Kwon is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous Tour-level victories on grass came in a semifinal finish as a lucky loser at 2021 Eastbourne – when he defeated Marton Fucsovics and Ilya Ivashka before falling to Alex de Minaur – and in his 2nd round finish at 2021 Wimbledon.
- Kwon is one of **4 Korean players to contest the men's singles at Wimbledon** – alongside Hyung-Taik Lee (who competed here in 2001-03 and 2005-08), Yong Il-Yoon (2001) and Hyeon Chung (2015).

- Kwon is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the first time**. He has lost all 7 of his previous matches against Top 10 opponents, including all 3 of his matches against Top 10 opponents at the Grand Slams. The highest-ranked players he has defeated are No. 24 Lucas Pouille in the 1st round at 2019 Zhuhai and No. 24 Dusan Lajovic in the 2nd round at 2020 Acapulco.
- Kwon lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Koepfer in the 2nd round last year. He has a 1-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall, with his only victory in a 5-set match coming against Rune in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Kwon has won **one Tour-level title** – on hard courts at 2021 Nur-Sultan (d. James Duckworth), where he became the 2nd South Korean man to win a Tour-level title after Hyung-Taik Lee at 2003 Sydney.
- Kwon reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 52 in November 2021. He plays here at No. 81.
- Kwon has played **Davis Cup** for Korea Republic since 2017 and has a 9-3 win-loss record in the competition. He won both matches he contested as Korea Republic defeated Austria in the 2022 Qualifiers in March to advance to the Davis Cup Finals for the first time. Korea Republic will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Canada and Serbia in Group B at the Finals.
- Kwon was a recipient of a 2018 International Player Grand Slam Grant, funded by the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund).
- Kwon is coached by Daniel Yoo.

## NO. 3 CASPER RUUD (NOR) v ALBERT RAMOS-VINOLAS (ESP)

### Tour-level head-to-head: Ramos-Vinolas leads 3-1

A 5th Tour-level meeting for Ruud and Ramos-Vinolas, their 2nd at a Grand Slam and their first on grass. All 5 of their previous meetings, at any level, came on clay. Ramos-Vinolas won the first 4 matches they contested before Ruud won their most-recent meeting at Santiago in February 2020.

Ruud is bidding to defeat a lefthanded player at a Grand Slam for the first time at the 4th attempt. He has a 19-12 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall – but has lost his last 2 matches against lefthanders, falling to Rafael Nadal in the final at Roland Garros and to Ryan Peniston in the 1st round at Queen's earlier this month.

- **RUUD** is bidding to record his first Wimbledon match-win on his 3rd appearance here. This is his 15th Grand Slam overall.
- Ruud has **lost in the 1st round on both of his previous Wimbledon appearances** – in 2019 (l. John Isner) and 2021 (l. Jordan Thompson). He also fell in the 1st round of Wimbledon qualifying in 2018 (l. Antoine Hoang).
- At 23 years 200 days, Ruud is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Juan Martin del Potro won the title at the 2009 US Open aged 20 years 355 days. If he reaches the final here, he will also become the youngest Wimbledon men's singles finalist since Rafael Nadal won the title here in 2008 aged 22 years 33 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Ruud became the **first Norwegian player to reach a Grand Slam singles final** at Roland Garros this year, falling to Rafael Nadal in straight sets in the title match. Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year, Ruud withdrew from the Australian Open due to an ankle injury.
- Ruud's **other highlights in 2022** are winning the titles at Buenos Aires (d. Diego Schwartzman) and Geneva (d. Joao Sousa). He also became the first Norwegian player to reach a Masters-1000 final at Miami-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz), reached the semifinals at Rome-1000 (l. Novak Djokovic) and the quarterfinals at Barcelona (l. Pablo Carreno Busta) and Munich (l. Botic van de Zandschulp).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Ruud competed at Queen's where, as No. 1 seed, he fell to Ryan Peniston in the 1st round.
- Ruud is bidding to record his **3rd Tour-level match-win on grass** in his 7th Tour-level match on the surface. His only previous match-wins on grass came in a quarterfinal finish at 2021 Mallorca, when he defeated Gilles Simon and Tennys Sandgren before falling to Daniil Medvedev in the quarterfinals. He has lost in the 1st round of the 3 other grass court events he has played at Tour-level.
- Ruud lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Thompson in the 1st round last year. He has a 5-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Ruud **broke the Top 5 for the first time** one week after reaching the final at Roland Garros this year. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 5 but plays here one place lower at No. 6.
- Ruud is a **former junior No. 1**. He reached the No. 1 ranking in January 2016 and is the only Norwegian player to have held the top junior ranking. He reached the 2nd round of the boys' singles here in 2015 (d. Jumpei Yamasaki, l. Alvaro Lopez San Martin) but fell in the 1st round of the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Ulises Blanch).
- Ruud has played **Davis Cup** for Norway since 2015 and has a 21-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. He was part of the Norwegian team which competed in the Qualifiers this year – equalling the team's best-ever Davis Cup performance – falling to Kazakhstan 3-1. Norway will host India in a World Group I tie in September.
- Ruud is coached by his father, Christian Ruud.
- Lefthander **RAMOS-VINOLAS** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th time – and for the first time since 2017. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 43rd Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Ramos-Vinolas fell to Fabio Fognini in straight sets in the 1st round. He is bidding to record his first Wimbledon match-win since 2017, having also fallen in straight sets the 1st round here in 2018 (l. Stephane Robert) and 2019 (l. Steve Johnson).
- Ramos-Vinolas' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round on 2 occasions – in 2016, when he defeated Vasek Pospisil and Viktor Troicki before falling to Richard Gasquet, and 2017, when he defeated Jordan Thompson and Andrey Rublev before falling to Milos Raonic.
- Ramos-Vinolas' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2016 Roland Garros, where he defeated Horacio Zeballos, Marco Trungelliti, Jack Sock and Raonic before falling to Stan Wawrinka.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Ramos-Vinolas reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Thanasi Kokkinakis, l. Carlos Alcaraz) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Sebastian Baez).
- Ramos-Vinolas' best result in 2022 is winning his **4th Tour-level title** at Cordoba (d. Alejandro Tabilo). All 4 of his Tour-level titles have come on clay. He also reached the semifinals on clay at both Santiago and Estoril, falling to Baez on both occasions.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Ramos-Vinolas fell to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in the 1st round at Queen's.
- Ramos-Vinolas is bidding to end a **7-match losing streak on grass**. He has not won a grass court match since defeating Rublev in the 2nd round here in 2017. He is bidding to record his 7th Tour-level match-win on grass – in addition to his 3rd round finishes here in 2016 and 2017, his only other Tour-level victories on grass came in 2nd round finishes at 2013 Eastbourne (d. James Blake, l. Fernando Verdasco) and 2015 Wimbledon (d. Denis Istomin, l. Jo-Wilfried Tsonga).
- Ramos-Vinolas is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-13 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams, with his only victory coming against No. 9 Raonic in the round of 16 at 2016 Roland Garros. He has an 8-43 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Ramos-Vinolas is also bidding to end a **13-match losing streak against seeded players at the Grand Slams**. He has not defeated a seeded player at a Grand Slam since defeating No. 16 seed Lucas Pouille in the 3rd round at 2017 Roland Garros. He has a 4-26 win-loss record against seeded players at the Grand Slams overall.
- Ramos-Vinolas has won both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Troicki in the 2nd round in 2016 and against Rublev in the 2nd round in 2017. He has an 8-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Ramos-Vinolas is one of **22 lefthanders** starting in the men's singles this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Ramos-Vinolas reached a **career-high ranking** of No.17 in May 2017. He plays here at No. 39.
- Ramos-Vinolas has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2013 and has a 5-2 overall win-loss record in the competition. Spain will compete in Valencia alongside Canada, Serbia and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Ramos-Vinolas is coached by Jose Maria Diaz and Tiago Leivas.

## NO. 5 CARLOS ALCARAZ (ESP) v JAN-LENNARD STRUFF (GER)

### Head-to-head: Struff leads 1-0

2021 Roland Garros Clay (O) R32 Struff 64 76(3) 62

A 2nd meeting for Alcaraz and Struff, but their first on grass. At the time of their previous meeting – a 3rd round match at Roland Garros last year which Struff won in straight sets – Struff (at No. 42) was ranked 55 places higher than Alcaraz (at No. 97). Alcaraz is now ranked 148 places higher than Struff.

- **ALCARAZ** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd straight year. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 7th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, as a wild card on his Wimbledon debut, Alcaraz reached the 2nd round. He defeated Yasutaka Uchiyama in the first 5-set match of his career in the 1st round before falling to Daniil Medvedev in straight sets.
- At 19 years 66 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Rafael Nadal won the title at 2005 Roland Garros aged 19 years 2 days. He would also become the 2nd-youngest man to win the Wimbledon title in the Open Era – after Boris Becker, who won the title here in 1985 aged 17 years 227 days and in 1986 aged 18 years 226 days. Alcaraz is the youngest man to begin the main draw at Wimbledon this year.
- Alcaraz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – at the 2021 US Open, where he retired due to an upper leg injury while trailing Felix Auger-Aliassime 63 3-1, and at Roland Garros this year (l. Alexander Zverev).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Alcaraz reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where he defeated Alejandro Tabilo and Dusan Lajovic before falling to Matteo Berrettini in 5 sets. His defeat to Berrettini was his only defeat in a 5-set match, having won the other 4 five-set matches he has contested.
- Alcaraz's **best results in 2022** are winning the titles at Rio de Janeiro (d. Diego Schwartzman), Miami-1000 (d. Casper Ruud), Barcelona (d. Pablo Carreno Busta) and Madrid-1000 (d. Zverev). He is in joint-first place on the list for most Tour-level titles won in 2022, alongside Nadal, who has also won 4 Tour-level singles titles this year. He also reached the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Nadal).
- Alcaraz **did not contest a Tour-level grass court event prior to coming here** after withdrawing from Queen's due to an elbow injury. He is one of 15 players in the men's singles draw not to have played a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Alcaraz is contesting his **2nd grass court tournament as a professional** at Wimbledon this year, having made his professional grass court debut here in 2021. He contested 2 grass court events as a junior – reaching the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at both J1 Roehampton (l. Valentin Royer) and Wimbledon (l. Martin Damm) in 2019.
- Alcaraz **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in April 2022. Aged 18 years 355 days, he became the youngest man to reach the Top 10 since Nadal (18 years 326 days) in April 2005. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 6 in May and plays here one place lower at No. 7.

- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz made his **Davis Cup** debut in the Qualifiers this year, defeating Marius Copil during Spain's victory against Romania. He was named as a member of Spain's team for the 2021 Finals but was forced to withdraw from the squad prior to the Finals after testing positive for Covid-19. Spain will compete in Valencia alongside Canada, Serbia and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2007 and 2009.
- **STRUFF** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th time. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 34th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- **Last year here**, Struff fell to Daniil Medvedev in the 1st round. He has lost in the 1st round on 5 of his previous 8 Wimbledon appearances.
- Struff's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round on 2 occasions – in 2018 (l. Roger Federer) and 2019 (l. Mikhail Kukushkin).
- Struff's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – at Roland Garros in both 2019 (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2021 (l. Diego Schwartzman).
- Struff is bidding to end a **4-match Grand Slam losing streak**. He has not won a match at the Grand Slams since defeating Alcaraz in the 3rd round at Roland Garros last year, before falling to Schwartzman in the round of 16. Since then, he has lost his opening match at 2021 Wimbledon, the 2021 US Open (l. Tallon Griekspoor) and the 2022 Australian Open (l. Botić van de Zandschulp). He withdrew from Roland Garros this year due to a right foot injury.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Struff reached the 2nd round as a wild card at Stuttgart (d. Marcos Giron, l. Lorenzo Sonego) but fell in the 1st round as a wild card at Halle (l. Ilya Ivashka). He also attempted to qualify at Mallorca, but fell to Fernando Verdasco in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Struff is bidding to record his **3rd match-win, at any level, of the 2022 season**. In addition to his 2nd round finish at Stuttgart, his only other victory, at any level, this year came at the ATP Cup, where he defeated USA's John Isner. He missed nearly 3 months of the year (including the entire clay court season) due to his right foot injury – prior to competing at Stuttgart, he had not played since falling in the 1st round at Miami-1000.
- Struff's **best grass court performance** is reaching the semifinals at 2019 Stuttgart – where he defeated Denis Shapovalov, Miomir Kecmanovic and Lucas Pouille before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Struff is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-11 win-loss record against Top 10 opposition at the Grand Slams, with his only victory coming against No. 7 Andrey Rublev in the 1st round at 2021 Roland Garros. He has a 10-30 win-loss record against Top 10 opposition at Tour-level overall.
- Struff has won 7 of the last 8 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his 5-set defeat to Griekspoor in the 1st round at the US Open last year ended a streak of 7 consecutive victories in 5-set matches. He has a 2-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 10-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Struff reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 29 in August 2020. He dropped out the Top 100 for the first time since October 2016 earlier this month and plays here at No. 155.
- Struff has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2015 and has a 13-8 overall win-loss record in the competition. He lost the only match he contested during Germany's victory against Brazil in the 2022 Qualifiers in March, falling to Thiago Monteiro in straight sets. Germany will compete in Hamburg alongside France, Belgium and Australia in Group C at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Struff is coached by Carsten Arriens.

- **HURKACZ** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 17th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, Hurkacz recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the semifinals, defeating Roger Federer in the quarterfinals before falling to Matteo Berrettini. He became the 2nd Polish man in history to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam after Jerzy Janowicz, who reached the semifinals at 2013 Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Hurkacz reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros, where he defeated Giulio Zeppieri, Marco Cecchinato and David Goffin before falling to Casper Ruud. He reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Egor Gerasimov, l. Adrian Mannarino).
- Hurkacz's best result in 2022 is winning his **first Tour-level grass court title** at Halle, where he defeated Daniil Medvedev in the final. He became the first Polish man to win a Tour-level grass court title in the Open Era. Elsewhere on grass this season, he also competed at Stuttgart but lost his opening match to Marton Fucsovics.
- Hurkacz's **other highlights in 2022** are reaching the semifinals at Dubai (l. Andrey Rublev) and Miami-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Novak Djokovic).
- Hurkacz won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Medvedev in the round of 16 last year. He has a 2-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in October 2021 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 the following month. He plays here one place lower at No. 10.
- Hurkacz has played **Davis Cup** for Poland since 2016 and has an 8-9 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will host Indonesia in a World Group II tie in September.
- Hurkacz has received support from the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund), having been awarded a \$25,000 grant in 2018.
- Hurkacz is coached by Craig Boynton.

- **DAVIDOVICH FOKINA** is bidding to record his first Wimbledon match-win. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 10th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon debut, Davidovich Fokina fell to Denis Kudla in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Davidovich Fokina's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2021 Roland Garros, where he defeated Mikhail Kukushkin, Botic van de Zandschulp, Casper Ruud and Federico Delbonis before falling to Alexander Zverev.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Davidovich Fokina reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Alex Bolt, l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Tallon Griekspoor).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Davidovich Fokina reached the quarterfinals at Queen's, defeating Albert Ramos-Vinolas and Alex de Minaur before falling to Van de Zandschulp. He also competed at Eastbourne, but retired due a left thumb injury during his 1st round match against Pedro Martinez.
- Davidovich Fokina's best result in 2022 is reaching his **first Tour-level final** at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He also reached the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Roberto Bautista Agut), Estoril (l. Frances Tiafoe) and Queen's.
- Davidovich Fokina is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the first time** on his 4th attempt. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 16 Ruud in the 3rd round at 2021 Roland Garros. He has a 2-14 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall, with his 2 victories both coming at Monte Carlo-1000 – against No. 10 Matteo Berrettini in the 2nd round in 2021 and against No. 1 Novak Djokovic in the 2nd round this year.
- Davidovich Fokina won the first 4 **five-set matches** of his career – but has lost the 2 five-set matches he has contested since then, falling to Kudla in 5 sets in the 1st round here last year and to Marco Trungelliti in 6 sets in the 1st round at the 2021 US Open.
- Davidovich Fokina broke the Top 50 for the first time in April 2021 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 27 in April this year. He plays here at No. 37.
- In 2017, Davidovich Fokina became the **first Spanish junior champion at Wimbledon** since Manuel Orantes in 1967, defeating Axel Geller in the title match. He is one of 6 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions to begin the men's main draw here this year. He also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Alexei Popyrin) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in July that year.
- Davidovich Fokina made his **Davis Cup** debut for Spain earlier this year, contesting the doubles match alongside Martinez during Spain's victory over Romania in the 2022 Qualifiers. The pair fell to Marius Copil/Horia Tecau in straight sets. Spain will compete in Valencia alongside Canada, Serbia and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Davidovich Fokina is coached by Jorge Aguirre.

## NO. 9 CAMERON NORRIE (GBR) v PABLO ANDUJAR (ESP)

### Head-to-head: first meeting

Andujar is bidding to defeat a lefthanded player at Wimbledon for the first time. He has lost both of his previous matches against lefthanders here – falling to Adrian Mannarino in the 1st round in 2013 and to Blaz Rola in the 1st round in 2014. He has a 4-8 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams and a 29-39 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

Andujar is facing a British player at Wimbledon for the 2nd time. He fell to James Ward in the 1st round here in 2012. He has a 1-1 win-loss record against British players at the Grand Slams and a 3-2 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall.

Andujar has a 1-4 win-loss record against players at their home Grand Slams, with his only victory against a home player at a Grand Slam coming against Jack Sock in the 1st round at the 2014 US Open.

- Lefthander **NORRIE** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd consecutive time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, Norrie recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the 3rd round. As No. 29 seed, he defeated Lucas Pouille and Alex Bolt before falling to Roger Federer.
- Norrie's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 5 occasions – in addition to his 3rd round finish at Wimbledon last year, he also reached the 3rd round at the 2020 US Open (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina), the 2021 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and at Roland Garros in both 2021 (l. Nadal) and this year (l. Karen Khachanov).
- **Also in Grand Slam play this year**, Norrie fell to Sebastian Korda in straight sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Norrie's **best results in 2022** are winning his 3rd and 4th Tour-level titles at Delray Beach (d. Reilly Opelka) and Lyon (d. Alex Molcan) respectively. He also finished runner-up at Acapulco (l. Nadal) and reached the quarterfinals at Rotterdam (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime), Indian Wells-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and Barcelona (l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Norrie reached the quarterfinals at Eastbourne – where he received a bye through the 1st round, before defeating Brandon Nakashima in the 2nd round and falling to Maxime Cressy in the last 8. He also competed at Queen's where, as No. 3 seed, he fell to Grigor Dimitrov in the 1st round.
- Norrie's **best Tour-level result** on grass came at 2021 Queen's, where he finished runner-up to Matteo Berrettini.
- Norrie has won 2 of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested. Both of his victories in 5-set matches were comebacks from 0-2 down – against Roberto Bautista Agut in Great Britain's 2018 Davis Cup World Group first round defeat to Spain and against Diego Schwartzman in the 1st round at the 2020 US Open. He has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- Norrie is one of **22 lefthanders** starting in the men's singles this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.

- Norrie is one of 17 British players competing in the men's and women's singles draws at Wimbledon this year – the **highest number of British players contesting the singles here since 2001**, when there were also 17.
- Norrie reached a career-high ranking of No. 10 in April this year, becoming the **4th British man to break the Top 10** – after Greg Rusedski, Tim Henman and Andy Murray. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 12.
- Norrie **played college tennis**. He represented Texas Christian University and finished his college career in 2017 as the NCAA's top-ranked male player. He compiled a 77-20 win-loss record in singles in college tennis from 2014 to 2017.
- Norrie was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 10 in March 2013. He fell in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles event here in 2013 (l. Laslo Djere).
- Norrie made his **Davis Cup** debut for Great Britain in 2018 and has a 4-3 win-loss record in the competition. Great Britain will compete in Glasgow alongside USA, Kazakhstan and Netherlands in Group D at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Norrie was born in Johannesburg but brought up in New Zealand by his British parents. At the age of 16, he switched his nationality from New Zealand to Great Britain.
- Norrie is coached by Facundo Lugones.
- **ANDUJAR** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 42nd Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Andujar reached the 2nd round. He defeated Pierre-Hugues Herbert in 5 sets in the 1st round before giving a walkover to Denis Shapovalov due to a rib injury in the 2nd round.
- Andujar's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round in 2015, when he recorded back-to-back 5-set victories against Guillermo Garciz-Lopez and Lukas Rosol before falling to Tomas Berdych.
- Andujar's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the 2019 US Open, where he defeated Kyle Edmund, Lorenzo Sonogo and Alexander Bublik before falling to Gael Monfils.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Andujar reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open – where he defeated Damir Dzumhur and Alex Molcan before falling to Alex de Minaur – but lost in the 1st round at Roland Garros, falling to Marco Cecchinato in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- Andujar's **best result in 2022** is reaching the quarterfinals at Rio de Janeiro, where he defeated Pablo Cuevas and Albert Ramos-Vinolas before falling to Diego Schwartzman. He is bidding to record his 8th Tour-level match-win today – with his only other match-wins at Tour-level this season coming in his 3rd round finish at the Australian Open and in 2nd round finishes at Buenos Aires (d. He opted not to contest any grass court events prior to Wimbledon, competing instead at 2 clay court Challenger events this month – reaching the 2nd round at the Prostějov Challenger (CZE) (d. Lucas Miedler, l. Vit Kopriva) but falling in the 1st round at the Lyon Challenger (FRA) (l. Juan Bautista Torres).
- Andujar is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous grass court match-wins came in his 3rd round finish here in 2015 and his 2nd round finish here last year.
- Andujar is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at the Grand Slams for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-10 win-loss record against Top 20 opposition at the Grand Slams, with his only victory coming against No. 4 Dominic Thiem in the 1st round at 2021 Roland Garros. He has a 14-49 win-loss record against Top 20 opposition at Tour-level overall.
- Andujar has won 3 of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has an 8-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Andujar has **won 4 Tour-level singles titles** – at Casablanca in 2011 (d. Potito Starace) and 2012 (d. Albert Ramos), 2014 Gstaad (d. Juan Monaco) and 2018 Marrakech (d. Kyle Edmund). All 4 of his titles have come on clay.

- Andujar is a **former Top 50 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 32 in July 2015 but plays here at No. 100.
- Andujar is coached by Carlos Calderon-Rodriguez.

- **SINNER** is bidding to record his first Wimbledon match-win. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 11th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon main draw debut, Sinner fell to Marton Fucsovics in the 1st round. He also lost his opening match on his only appearance in qualifying here, falling to Alex Bolt in the 1st round of qualifying in 2019.
- At 20 years 328 days, Sinner is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Novak Djokovic won the title at the 2008 Australian Open aged 20 years 250 days. He would also become the youngest man to win the Wimbledon title since Boris Becker (18 years 226 days) in 1986. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Sinner's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Rafael Nadal) and at the Australian Open this year (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas). His quarterfinal finish at 2020 Roland Garros, aged 19 years 56 days, saw him become the youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at Roland Garros since Djokovic (19 years 20 days) in 2006 and the youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since Bernard Tomic (18 years 255 days) at 2011 Wimbledon.
- **Also in Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros. He defeated Bjorn Fratangelo, Roberto Carballes Baena and Mackenzie McDonald before retiring due to a left knee injury during his last 16 match against Andrey Rublev.
- Sinner's **best results in 2022** are reaching the quarterfinals at 5 Tour-level events. In addition to his quarterfinal finish at the Australian Open, he also reached the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Hubert Hurkacz), Miami-1000, where he retired due to a foot blister while trailing Francisco Cerundolo 4-1, Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Rome-1000 (l. Tsitsipas).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Sinner competed at Eastbourne but, as No. 2 seed, lost his opening match to Tommy Paul.
- Sinner is bidding to record his **first Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only victories on grass, at any level, came in qualifying at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch, where he defeated Lukas Lacko and Thomas Fabbiano to reach the main draw.

- Sinner **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in November 2021 and, aged 20, became the youngest man to finish in the year-end Top 10 since Juan Martin del Potro in 2008. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 the same month, but plays here 4 places lower at No. 13.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2020 and has a 5-3 win-loss record in the competition. He won both singles matches he contested during Italy's 3-2 victory against Slovakia in the 2022 Qualifiers in March. Italy will compete in Bologna alongside Croatia, Argentina and Sweden in Group A at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi.
- **WAWRINKA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 10th time. This is his 16th Wimbledon appearance and his 63rd Grand Slam overall.
- Wawrinka is making his **first Wimbledon appearance since 2019**, when he reached the 2nd round (d. Ruben Bemelmans, l. Reilly Opelka). He has lost in the 1st round here on 6 occasions – in 2005 (l. Fabrice Santoro), 2007 (l. Michael Llodra), 2010 (l. Denis Istomin), 2012 (l. Jurgen Melzer), 2013 (l. Lleyton Hewitt) and 2017 (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- Wawrinka's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – in 2014 (l. Roger Federer) and 2015 (l. Richard Gasquet).
- Wawrinka is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Rafael Nadal) and also won 2015 Roland Garros and the 2016 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic on both occasions. He defeated both the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds en route to his first 2 Grand Slam wins and is the only player to have achieved the feat en route to winning a Grand Slam since Sergi Bruguera won 1993 Roland Garros. He is one of 5 Grand Slam champions to start the main draw here.
- Wawrinka made his **comeback from injury in March this year**. He had been inactive for more than 12 months after having left foot surgeries in March 2021 and June 2021. He made his first Grand Slam appearance since the 2021 Australian Open at Roland Garros last month, falling to Corentin Moutet in the 1st round.
- Wawrinka is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win of the season**. His only victories so far in 2022 came in a 3rd round finish at Rome-1000 – where he defeated Opelka and Laslo Djere before falling to Djokovic – and in a 2nd round finish on grass at Queen's (d. Frances Tiafoe, l. Tommy Paul). He has lost in the 1st round at the 3 other events he has contested at any level since his comeback from injury – at the Marbella Challenger (ESP) (l. Elias Ymer), Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Alexander Bublik) and Roland Garros.
- Wawrinka is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player on grass for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-8 win-loss record against Top 20 opposition on grass, with his only victories coming against No. 15 David Goffin in the round of 16 here in 2015 and against Grigor Dimitrov in the 1st round here in 2018. He has a 34-33 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 109-145 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Wawrinka has won just one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, with his only victory in a 5-set match here coming against Ivo Karlovic in the 1st round in 2006. He has a 29-24 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Wimbledon is Wawrinka's **least successful Grand Slam** in terms of matches won. He has a 20-15 win-loss record here, compared with 44-16 at Roland Garros, 44-13 at the US Open and 43-15 at the Australian Open.
- Wawrinka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in January 2014 after winning his first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open. He dropped outside the Top 100 for the first time since August 2018 in January this year and plays here at No. 267.
- Wawrinka was the 2003 **Roland Garros junior champion** (d. Brian Baker) – the only junior Grand Slam event he contested.
- Wawrinka is coached by Daniel Vallverdu

- **OPELKA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 15th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Opelka fell to Dominik Koepfer in the 1st round. On his only other appearance here, in 2019, he reached the 3rd round, defeating Cedrik-Marcel Stebe and Stan Wawrinka before falling to Milos Raonic.
- Opelka's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the US Open last year, where he defeated Soonwoo Kwon, Lorenzo Musetti and Nikoloz Basilashvili before falling to Lloyd Harris.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Opelka reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open – where he defeated Kevin Anderson and Koepfer before falling to Denis Shapovalov – but lost in the 1st round at Roland Garros (I. Filip Krajinovic).
- Opelka's **best results in 2022** are winning his 3rd and 4th Tour-level titles at Dallas (d. Jenson Brooksby) and Houston (d. John Isner) respectively. He also finished runner-up at Delray Beach (l. Cameron Norrie) and reached the semifinals at Sydney (l. Andy Murray) and Geneva (l. Casper Ruud).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Opelka competed as No. 8 seed at Queen's but fell to Alex de Minaur in the 1st round.
- Opelka is bidding to end a **4-match Tour-level losing streak on grass**. He has not recorded a victory on grass since defeating Wawrinka in the 2nd round here in 2019.
- Opelka's 5-set victory against Wawrinka in the 2nd round here in 2019 is his only victory in a **5-set match** to date. He has lost the other 4 five-set matches he has contested, all of which have come at the Australian Open.
- Opelka **broke the Top 20 for the first time** in September 2021 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 17 in February this year. He plays here one place lower at No. 18.
- Opelka is one of 16 American men to contest the main draw at Wimbledon this year – **the highest number of Americans to contest the men's singles here since 1998**, when there were also 16. Across both men's and women's singles draws, there are 34 American players competing here this year – the most since 1998, when there were 35 Americans contesting the singles here.
- Opelka is also one of 6 seeded American men here – the **highest number of American seeds in the men's singles at Wimbledon since 1993**, when there were also 6 seeded American men here.
- Opelka is **one of 6 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** to begin the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles title here in 2015, defeating Mikael Ymer in the final, and also finished runner-up in the boys' doubles event that year with Akira Santillan. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 4.
- Opelka made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 1-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. USA will compete in Glasgow alongside Great Britain, Kazakhstan and Netherlands in Group D at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.



- Opelka is coached by Jay Berger and Neville Godwin.
- **TABERNER** is bidding to record his first Grand Slam match-win on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 6th Grand Slam main draw appearance overall.
- **Last year here**, Taberner fell in the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Andrea Collarini, l. Anton Matusevich). It was his only previous attempt to qualify here.
- Taberner has **lost in the 1st round on all 5 of his previous Grand Slam appearances** – including at both the Australian Open (l. Dominik Koepfer) and Roland Garros (l. Borna Coric) in 2022.
- Taberner is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win of the 2022 season**. His only match-wins at Tour-level this year have come in 2nd round finishes at Cordoba (d. Federico Delbonis, l. Alejandro Tabilo), Santiago (d. Juan Manuel Cerundolo, l. Albert Ramos-Vinolas), Marrakech (d. Yannick Hanfmann, l. Lorenzo Musetti), as a qualifier at Barcelona (d. Sebastian Korda, l. - Also in 2022, Taberner **won his 5th title at Challenger-level**, on clay at the Roseto Degli Abruzzi Challenger (ITA) (d. Nuno Borges). All 5 of his Challenger titles have come on clay.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Taberner attempted to qualify at Mallorca, but fell to Antoine Bellier in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Taberner is contesting his **first Tour-level match on grass**. His only previous appearances on grass, at any level, came in qualifying at Wimbledon last year and in qualifying at Mallorca last week.

- **CARRENO BUSTA** is bidding to record his first Wimbledon match-win. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 34th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Carreno Busta has **lost in the 1st round on all 6 of his previous Wimbledon appearances** – on his debut here in 2014 (l. David Ferrer), and in 2015 (Gael Monfils), 2016 (Milos Raonic), 2018 (l. Radu Albot), 2019 (l. Alexei Popyrin) and 2021 (l. Sam Querrey). He has won just 3 sets here – in a 4-set defeat to Ferrer in 2014 and a 5-set defeat to Albot in 2018.
- Carreno Busta's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the US Open on 2 occasions – in 2017 (l. Kevin Anderson) and 2020 (l. Alexander Zverev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Carreno Busta reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open – where he defeated Tomas Martin Etcheverry, Tallon Griekspoor and Sebastian Korda before falling to Matteo Berrettini – but fell to Gilles Simon in 5 sets in the 1st round at Roland Garros.

- Johnson has won 5 of the last 6 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming again Fritz in the 2nd round here last year. ## NO. 20 JOHN ISNER (USA) v (Q) ENZO COUACAUD (FRA)

### Head-to-head: first meeting

Isner has never lost a Wimbledon match to a player ranked as low as No. 206 Couacaud. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Isner here is No. 111 Adrian Mannarino, who advanced when Isner retired due to a left knee injury in their 2nd round match in 2013. He has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as Couacaud on 3 occasions – falling to No. 251 Dominik Hrbaty in the 1st round at the 2009 Australian Open, to No. 261 Paul-Henri Mathieu in the 2nd round at 2012 Roland Garros and to No. 213 Sebastian Korda in the 2nd round at 2020 Roland Garros.

Isner has won all 5 of his previous matches against qualifiers at Wimbledon. He has a 13-4 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, but has lost his 2 most-recent matches against qualifiers at the Grand Slams – against Korda in the 2nd round at 2020 Roland Garros and against Bernabe Zapata Miralles in the 3rd round at Roland Garros this year. - **ISNER** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 10th time. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and his 54th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Isner fell to Yoshihito Nishioka in 5 sets in the 1st round. He has lost in the 1st round here on 2 other occasions – on his Wimbledon debut in 2008 (l. Ernests Gulbis) and in 2012 (l. Alejandro Falla).
- Isner's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2018 (l. Kevin Anderson). By reaching the semifinals at a Grand Slam for the first time on his 41st appearance at a major, he went 2nd on the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching the semifinals at a Grand Slam – after Sam Querrey, who reached the semifinals at a major for the first time on his 42nd Grand Slam appearance at 2017 Wimbledon.
- Isner's 76(6) 67(5) 67(9) 64 26-24 defeat to Anderson in the 2018 semifinals – which lasted 6 hours 36 minutes – was the **2nd-longest singles match in Grand Slam history** and the 3rd-longest singles match overall. It was also the 2nd-longest match at Wimbledon – after Isner's 11 hour 5 minute victory against Nicolas Mahut here in 2010 – and the longest match ever contested on Centre Court.
- Isner's 64 36 67(7) 76(3) 70-68 1st round defeat of Mahut at 2010 Wimbledon, played over 3 days, set the record for the **longest tennis match in history** in terms of number of games and duration. The match lasted 11 hours 5 minutes and totalled 183 games. The final set alone lasted 8 hours 11 minutes. Isner served 113 aces during the match – the highest number of aces served in a men's singles match since Tour-level service statistics started being record in 1991.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Isner reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros – where he defeated Quentin Halys and Gregoire Barrere before falling to Benabe Zapata Miralles – but fell to Maxime Cressy in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open. His victory against Halys in the 1st round at Roland Garros ended a 4-match Grand Slam losing streak.
- Isner's **best result in 2022** is reaching the final at Houston (l. Reilly Opelka). He also reached the semifinals at Dallas (l. Opelka) and the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov). He contested a 46-point tiebreak – the longest in ATP Tour history (since 1990) – against Opelka at Dallas, losing the match 76(7) 76(22).

- Isner **did not contest a Tour-level grass court event prior to coming**. He is one of 15 players in the men's singles draw not to have played a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Isner is one of 16 American men to contest the main draw at Wimbledon this year – **the highest number of Americans to contest the men's singles here since 1998**, when there were also 16. Across both men's and women's singles draws, there are 34 American players competing here this year – the most since 1998, when there were 35 Americans contesting the singles here.
- Isner is also one of 6 seeded American men here – the **highest number of American seeds in the men's singles at Wimbledon since 1993**, when there were also 6 seeded American men here.
- Isner has won **16 Tour-level titles**, including 4 on grass – at Newport in 2011 (d. Oliver Rochus), 2012 (d. Lleyton Hewitt), 2017 (d. Matthew Ebden) and 2019 (d. Alexander Bublik). He holds the all-time record for the most singles titles won at Newport.
- Isner has lost the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, including 5-set defeats to Mikhail Kukushkin in the 2nd round here in 2019 and to Nishioka in the 1st round here last year. His last victory in a 5-set match came against Milos Raonic in the round of 16 at the 2018 US Open. He has an 11-23 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Isner reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 8 in July 2018 after reaching the semifinals here. He plays here at No. 24.
- Isner is coached David MacPherson.
- Qualifier **COUACAUD** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 2nd Grand Slam main draw appearance overall.
- Couacaud defeated No. 29 seed Emilio Gomez (ECU) 62 57 62, Facundo Mena (ARG) 76(5) 64 and Dimitar Kuzmanov (BUL) 62 67(3) 63 62 in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying**. It was his first time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 17th attempt.
- **Last year here**, Couacaud reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Juan Manuel Cerundolo, l. Marcelo Tomas Barrios Vera). He also fell in qualifying here in 2015.
- **On his only previous Grand Slam main draw appearance**, as a wild card at 2021 Roland Garros, Couacaud reached the 2nd round. He defeated Egor Gerasimov for his first Tour-level match-win before falling to Pablo Carreno Busta.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Couacaud reached the final round of qualifying at the Australian Open – where he defeated Cem Ilkel and Vit Kopriva before falling to Nikola Milojevic – and reached the 2nd round of qualifying at Roland Garros (d. Philipp Kohlschreiber, l. Tim van Rijthoven).
- Couacaud has **played mainly at Challenger-level this year**. His best results are reaching the final at the Bendigo Challenger (AUS) (l. Ernesto Escobedo) and reaching the semifinals at both the Bengaluru I Challenger (IND) (l. Tseng Chun Hsin) and the Bengaluru II Challenger (IND) (l. Kuzmanov).
- **Prior to competing in Wimbledon qualifying**, Couacaud competed at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR), falling to Daniel Evans in the 1st round. He competed on clay at the Blois Challenger (FRA) the week prior to Wimbledon qualifying, falling to Matteo Arnaldi in the 1st round.
- Couacaud is bidding to record his **2nd Tour-level match-win**. His only previous match-win at Tour-level came in his 2nd round finish at 2021 Roland Garros. He has lost in the 1st round at the 2 other Tour-level events he has contested – as a qualifier at 2020 Montpellier (l. Filip Krajinovic) and as a lucky loser at 2021 Gstaad (l. Mikael Ymer).
- Couacaud is bidding to **defeat a Top 50 player, at any level, for the first time**. He has lost all 5 of his previous matches against Top 50 players at all levels. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 73 Robin Haase in the quarterfinals at the 2014 Rennes Challenger (FRA).
- Couacaud reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 155 in February this year. He plays here at No. 206.



- Couacaud was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 17. He finished runner-up in the boys' doubles at 2013 Wimbledon alongside Stefano Napolitano, falling to Nick Kyrgios/Thanasi Kokkinakis. His best result in the boys' singles here was a quarterfinal finish in 2012 (l. Filip Peliwo).
- Couacaud is coached by Julien Gillet and Ezra Stump.

Murray has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 74 Duckworth once before – against No. 91 Arnaud Clement in the 2nd round at the 2005 US Open and against No. 120 Taro Daniel in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Murray at Wimbledon is No. 28 Sam Querrey in the quarterfinals in 2017.

- Two-time Wimbledon champion **MURRAY** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here.
- Last year here**, as a wild card and making his first Wimbledon appearance since 2017, Murray reached the 3rd round. He defeated Nikoloz Basilashvili and Oscar Otte before falling to Denis Shapovalov.
- Murray has **lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam on 6 occasions** – most recently at the US Open last year, when he fell to Stefanos Tsitsipas in 5 sets. He also fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open in 2006 (l. Juan Ignacio Chela), 2008 (l. Jo-Wilfried Tsonga) and 2019 (l. Roberto Bautista Agut), and at Roland Garros in 2006 (l. Gael Monfils) and 2020 (l. Stan Wawrinka).
- Murray is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. He won the 2012 US Open title and became the first British man to win the Wimbledon singles title in 77 years in 2013, defeating Djokovic in the final on both occasions. He won a 2nd Wimbledon title in 2016 (d. Milos Raonic). He is one of 5 Grand Slam champions to start in the men's draw here.
- Murray is making his 14th Wimbledon singles appearance this year, equalling Tim Henman, John Lloyd and Greg Rusedski in **2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon appearances by a British man in the Open Era**.

- Murray is contesting his 54th Grand Slam event here, extending his record for **most Grand Slam appearances by a British man in the Open Era**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Tim Henman, by contesting his 50th Grand Slam event at 2020 Roland Garros.
- Murray holds the record for **most Grand Slam matches won by a British player**, with a 193-50 win-loss record at the Grand Slams. He is in 3rd place on the list for most Wimbledon match-wins by a British player, with a 59-11 win-loss record here – behind Arthur Gore (64-26) and Josiah Ritchie (62-24).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Murray reached the 2nd round as a wild card at the Australian Open (d. Basilashvili, l. Taro Daniel). He opted to miss the majority of the clay court season, including Roland Garros to prepare for the grass court season.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Murray finished runner-up at Stuttgart (l. Matteo Berrettini). It was his first appearance in a Tour-level grass court final since he won the title here in 2016. He withdrew from Queen's due to an abdominal injury. He also competed at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) – his only appearance at Challenger-level this season – where he reached the semifinals (l. Denis Kudla).
- **Also in 2022** Murray reached the final as a wild card at Sydney (l. Aslan Karatsev) before recording 2nd round finishes in 6 consecutive Tour-level events. He reached the 3rd round in the only clay court event he contested this season, as a wild card at Madrid-1000, defeating Dominic Thiem and Shapovalov before giving a walkover to Djokovic due to illness.
- Murray has won 5 of the 7 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 26-13 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Murray has won **46 Tour-level titles** – most recently at 2019 Antwerp (d. Wawrinka). He has won 8 Tour-level titles on grass – in addition to his 2 Wimbledon titles, he has also won 6 titles at Queen's.
- Murray is a **former world No. 1**. He became the 26th man, and first British man, to reach the No. 1 ranking in October 2016. He remained at No. 1 for 41 weeks, surrendering the top ranking in August 2017. He re-entered the Top 50 for the first time since May 2018 after reaching the final at Stuttgart earlier this month but plays here 5 places lower at No. 52.
- Murray became the first player in history to successfully defend an **Olympic singles gold medal** after defeating Juan Martin del Potro in the final at the 2016 Rio Olympic Tennis Event. He defeated Federer in the final at the 2012 London Tennis Event. He also won a silver medal in mixed doubles at London alongside Laura Robson, falling to Victoria Azarenka/Max Mirnyi in the final. He competed in men's doubles at Tokyo 2020 last year, reaching the quarterfinals alongside Joe Salisbury (l. Marin Cilic/Ivan Dodig).
- Murray has played **Davis Cup** since 2005 and has a 40-8 win-loss record in the competition. He led Great Britain to their first title since 1936 in 2015, defeating Belgium in the final. Great Britain will compete in Glasgow alongside USA, Kazakhstan and Netherlands in Group D at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Murray is coached by Ivan Lendl, who reached the final here in 1986 and 1987.
- **DUCKWORTH** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, Duckworth recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the 3rd round. He defeated Radu Albot and Sam Querrey before falling to Lorenzo Sonego.
- Duckworth is bidding to end a **4-match Grand Slam losing streak**. He has lost in the 1st round at all 3 Grand Slam tournaments since he reached the 3rd round here last year – at the 2021 US Open (l. Pedro Martinez) and at both the Australian Open (l. Adrian Mannarino) and Roland Garros (l. Mikael Ymer) in 2022.
- Duckworth is bidding to end an **8-match Tour-level losing streak**. He has not recorded a victory at Tour-level since reaching the quarterfinals at Paris-1000 – where he defeated Roberto Bautista Agut, Lorenzo Musetti and Alexei Popyrin before falling to Hubert Hurkacz – in November 2021. He was inactive for 4 months following the Australian Open due to a hip injury, making his return on clay at Lyon in May.
- Duckworth is bidding to record his **3rd match-win, at any level, of the 2022 season**. His only victories this season came in qualifying at Eastbourne, where he defeated Daniel Cox and Mikael Ymer to advance to the main draw, but lost to Sonego in the 1st round.

- **Elsewhere on grass this season**, Duckworth fell in the 1st round at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Gilles Simon) and lost in the 1st round of qualifying at Queen's (l. Paul Jubb). He also fell in the 1st round at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (l. Pierre-Hugues Herbert).
- Duckworth has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – defeating Malek Jaziri in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2015, but losing 5-set matches to Denis Kudla in the 1st round in 2013 and to Richard Gasquet in the 1st round in 2014. He has a 4-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Duckworth **broke the Top 50 for the first time** in November 2021 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 46 the same month. He plays here at No. 74.
- Duckworth has **struggled with injuries during his career**. He underwent foot surgeries in February 2017, August 2017 and January 2018; shoulder surgeries in March 2017 and March 2020; right elbow surgery in late 2012, early 2014 and February 2018; and, most recently, hip surgery in January 2022.
- Duckworth was a **good junior player**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 7 in July 2010. He reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2010 Roland Garros (l. Agustin Velotti) and the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at the 2010 Australian Open (l. Gianni Mina) and 2010 Wimbledon (l. Marton Fucsovics).
- Duckworth is coached by Wayne Arthurs, who reached the round of 16 here in 1999 and 2002.

He also competed in the mixed doubles here in 2019 alongside Coco Gauff, falling to Robert Lindstedt/Jelena Ostapenko in the 1st round.
- Clarke reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 153 in July 2019. He plays here 3 places lower at No. 156.
- Clarke reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 15 in January 2016. He competed in the boys' singles here on 3 occasions – in 2014-16 – with his best result coming in 2016, when he reached the 2nd round (d. Tomas Martin Etcheverry, I. Jurabek Karimov).
- Clarke is coached by Patrick Frandji.
- Qualifier **HARRISON** is to record his first Grand Slam match-win. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 3rd Grand Slam overall.
- Harrison defeated wild card Anton Matusевич (GBR) 63 64, Dalibor Svrčina (CZE) 06 63 76(4) and Daniel Masur (GER) 46 63 57 64 61 in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying**. It is the 3rd time he has qualified at a Grand Slam on his 9th attempt. His 5-set victory against Masur in the final round of qualifying was the first 5-set match he has contested at any level.
- Harrison fell in the 1st round on his **previous 2 Grand Slam appearances** – as a qualifier at both the 2016 US Open (l. Paul-Henri Mathieu) and 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kei Nishikori).
- Harrison **did not compete at either the Australian Open or Roland Garros this year**, having been ranked too low to enter qualifying. He was also ranked too low to enter qualifying at Wimbledon last year.
- Harrison is contesting his **2nd Tour-level event of 2022**. His only other Tour-level appearance this season came as a qualifier at Houston, where he fell to Alejandro Tabilo in the 1st round.
- Harrison has **played mainly at Challenger-level this season**. His best result at Challenger-level is reaching the final at the Savannah Challenger (USA) (l. Jack Sock). He also reached the semifinals at the Monterrey Challenger (MEX) (l. Fernando Verdasco).

- Harrison is one of 16 American men to contest the main draw at Wimbledon this year – **the highest number of Americans to contest the men's singles here since 1998**, when there were also 16. Across both men's and women's singles draws, there are 34 American players competing here this year – the most since 1998, when there were 35 Americans contesting the singles here.
- Harrison reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 198 in July 2018. He plays here at No. 251.
- Harrison has **struggled with injuries throughout his career**. He has undergone multiple surgeries – hip surgeries in 2013 and 2014; right shoulder, right wrist, right adductor and left adductor surgeries in 2014; and left femur surgery in 2018.
- Harrison's **older brother, Ryan**, made 6 appearances in the men's singles here between 2011 and 2018, reaching the 2nd round on 4 occasions. Ryan Harrison reached a career-high ranking of No. 40 in July 2017, as won one Tour-level singles title – at 2017 Memphis (d. Nikoloz Basilashvili) – and won the 2017 Roland Garros men's doubles title alongside Michael Venus (d. Santiago Gonzalez/Donald Young).
- Harrison is coached by his father, Pat.

## (WC) RYAN PENISTON (GBR) v HENRI LAAKSONEN (SUI)

Laaksonen has won one of his last 6 Tour-level matches against lefthanded players, with his only victory against a lefthander in that time coming against Mattias Siimar during Switzerland's Davis Cup World Group II victory over Estonia in September 2021. - **Last year here**, as a wild card in qualifying, Peniston fell in the 1st round of qualifying (I. Yasutaka Uchiyama). He also lost in the 1st round in his 2 other appearances in qualifying at a Grand Slam – at 2019 Wimbledon (I. Andrea Arnaboldi) and 2022 Roland Garros (I. Andrey Kuznetsov).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Peniston reached the quarterfinals on his Tour-level debut as a wild card at Queen's, defeating world No. 5 Casper Ruud and Francisco Cerundolo before falling to Filip Krajinovic. He also reached the quarterfinals as a wild card at Eastbourne, defeating Holger Rune and Pedro Martinez before falling to Jack Draper.
- **Also on grass in 2022**, Peniston reached the quarterfinals at both the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (I. Otto Virtanen) and the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (I. Alexei Popyrin).
- Peniston has **played mainly at Challenger-level in 2022**. His best results is reaching his 3rd Challenger final at Ostrava (CZE) (I. Evan Furness). He also reached the final at the only event he has contested on the ITF World Tennis Tour this season, at M25 Loughborough (GBR) (I. Antoine Escoffier).
- Peniston is one of 17 British players competing in the men's and women's singles draws at Wimbledon this year – the **highest number of British players contesting the singles here since 2001**, when there were also 17.
- Peniston is one of **22 lefthanders** starting in the men's singles this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Peniston **broke the Top 200 for the first time** in May 2022. He plays here at a career-high ranking of No. 135.
- Peniston played **college tennis**. He studied at the University of Memphis from 2015 to 2018, earning all-American honours in singles and doubles in his senior year.
- Peniston is coached by his father, Paul.
- **LAAKSONEN** is bidding to record his first Wimbledon match-win. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 12th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Laaksonen fell to Oscar Otte in the 1st round of qualifying. He has fallen in qualifying here on 5 other occasions.

- **On his only previous Wimbledon main draw appearance**, in 2017, Laaksonen fell to Lukas Rosol in the 1st round.
- Laaksonen's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 2 occasions – as a qualifier at both 2021 Roland Garros (l. Kei Nishikori) and the 2021 US Open (l. Peter Gojowczyk).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Laaksonen reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Pedro Martinez, l. Holger Rune) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- Laaksonen is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win of the 2022 season**. His only match-wins at Tour-level this season came in 2nd round finishes as a lucky loser at Melbourne (d. Benoit Paire, l. Jaume Munar), as a direct acceptance at both Miami-1000 (d. Paire, l. Casper Ruud) and Roland Garros, and during Switzerland's Davis Cup World Group I Play-off victory against Lebanon in March, when he defeated both Hady Habib and Benjamin Hassan. He has lost in the 1st round at the 6 other Tour-level events he has contested this year.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Laaksonen attempted to qualify at Eastbourne, but fell to John Millman in the 1st round of qualifying. He also competed at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR), falling to Pierre-Hugues Herbert in the 1st round.
- Laaksonen is bidding to record his **3rd grass court match-win at any level**. His only 2 previous match-wins on grass both came in Wimbledon qualifying – when he reached the 2nd round of qualifying here in 2013 (d. David Guez, l. Ruben Bemelmans) and 2018 (d. Renzo Olivo, l. Jason Jung).
- Laaksonen has won 4 of the five **5-set matches** he has contested. His only defeat in a 5-set match came against Alex de Minaur in the 2nd round at the 2019 Australian Open.
- Laaksonen plays here at a **career-high ranking** of No. 85 in February this year. He plays here at No. 96.
- Laaksonen reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 20 in March 2010. He reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2009 Roland Garros (l. Daniel Berta). He never contested the junior event at Wimbledon.
- Laaksonen has played **Davis Cup** for Switzerland since 2009 and has a 16-14 overall win-loss record in the competition. Switzerland will travel to Ecuador for a World Group I tie in September.
- Laaksonen is coached by David Pultr.
