On court today...

- Novak Djokovic faces Miomir Kecmanovic in the 3rd all-Serbian Wimbledon men's singles match in the Open Era, with the match scheduled 2nd on Centre Court this afternoon. A victory for Djokovic will be his 24th consecutive Tour-level match-win on grass – and would see him equal the Rod Laver in 3rd place on the Open Era list for longest grass court winning streak by a male player. Djokovic has not lost a grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen's. Kecmanovic has lost his 2 previous matches against Djokovic – both of which came in their shared hometown, Belgrade. Should he record a famous victory against his compatriot today, he will become the 5th Serbian man to reach the last 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era.
- Carlos Alcaraz survived a titanic tussle with Germany's Jan-Lennard Struff in the 1st round on Monday – and the 19-year-old takes on another German on No. 1 Court today, with No. 32 seed Oscar Otte standing between Alcaraz and a place in the last 16. Should Alcaraz triumph this afternoon, he will become the youngest man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since Bernard Tomic reached the quarterfinals at the age 18 in 2011. Otte has enjoyed a comfortable passage into the 3rd round here but can expect a tough encounter with the gritty Alcaraz today. He will have to record his first victory against a Top 10 player on his 7th attempt if he is to progress to the last 16.
- Tim van Rijthoven's grass court season keeps getting better and better. The 's-Hertogenbosch champion defeated No. 15 seed Reilly Opelka on Wednesday to become the first Dutchman to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon since his coach, Igor Sijsling, in 2013 (and was later joined in the 3rd round by compatriot Botic van de Zandschulp). If Van Rijthoven records an 8th consecutive Tour-level victory when he plays No. 22 seed Nikoloz Basilashvili on Court 12 today, he will become the first wild card to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since Denis Kudla in 2015.
- American men make up a quarter of the 3rd round draw at Wimbledon this year, with 7 Americans already through to the last 32 and the winner of the match between Maxime Cressy and Jack Sock – one of two 2nd round matches which are still to be completed – set to join them later today. It is the highest number of American men to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam since the 1996 US Open (when there were 8 American men in the 3rd round) and the highest number of American men to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon since 1995 (when there were 9 American men in the 3rd round).

A 3rd meeting for Djokovic and Kecmanovic – and their first at a Grand Slam or on grass. Both of their previous meetings came in their home town at Belgrade, with Djokovic winning quarterfinal matches both last year and this year.

This is the 3rd all-Serbian match in the men's singles at Wimbledon in the Open Era – after Djokovic defeated Viktor Troicki in the round of 16 here in 2012 and Troicki defeated Janko Tipsarevic in the 1st round here in 2013. It is the 11th all-Serbian men's singles match at the Grand Slams in the Open Era. (NB not including matches between players who represented Yugoslavia)

Djokovic has won all 4 matches he has played against Serbian players at the Grand Slams and has a 27-4 win-loss record against fellow Serbians at Tour-level overall. He is bidding to extend a 10-match Tour-level winning streak against Serbian players, having not to a fellow Serbian since falling to Tipsarevic in the quarterfinals at 2012 Madrid-1000.

Kecmanovic is facing a Serbian player at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time – both of his previous Grand Slam meetings against compatriots came against Laslo Djere, with Kecmanovic defeating Djere in the 1st round at the 2019 US Open but falling to Djere in the 2nd round at 2021 Roland Garros. He has a 5-3 win-loss record against fellow Serbians at Tour-level overall.

Djokovic and Kecmanovic are Davis Cup teammates, with Djokovic having represented the team since 2004 while Kecmanovic made his debut in the competition at the 2021 Finals. Serbia will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Canada and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.

- Three-time defending champion **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 14th time. He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at Wimbledon. Roger Federer and Jimmy Connors are the only men in the Open Era to have reached the round of 16 here more often than Djokovic. This is Djokovic's 17th consecutive Wimbledon appearance.

- Djokovic is also bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 55th time. He is in **2nd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams**, behind Federer. This is his 68th Grand Slam appearance. (see table overleaf)

- Djokovic is bidding to record his 24th consecutive grass court match-win and equal Rod Laver in **3rd place on the Open Era list for longest Tour-level winning streaks on grass**. By winning his opening 2 matches here this year, he equalled John McEnroe's and Pete Sampras's longest grass-court winning streaks at Tour-level. He has not lost a Tour-level grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen's

- Djokovic advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating Soonwoo Kwon 63 36 63 64 in the 1st round on Monday and Thanasi Kokkinakis 61 64 62 in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **82nd Wimbledon match-win**. By defeating Kwon for his 80th victory here in the 1st round, he became the first player in history, man or woman, to record 80 singles match-wins at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments. He also become the 3rd man in history to record 80 Wimbledon men's singles match-wins – after Federer (105 Wimbledon match-wins) and Connors (84).
- Last year here**, Djokovic won his 6th Wimbledon title, defeating Matteo Berrettini 67(4) 64 64 63 in the final. He also won the title here in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson) and 2019 (d. Federer).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **7th Wimbledon title** and equal William Renshaw and Sampras in 2nd place on the all-time list for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won. Federer (8 Wimbledon titles), Renshaw and Sampras are the only men to have won more Wimbledon singles titles than Djokovic.
- Djokovic is also bidding to win his **4th consecutive Wimbledon title** and become the 4th man in the Open Era to record a streak of 4 consecutive Wimbledon titles – after Federer, Sampras and Bjorn Borg. It would be the first time in his career that he has recorded a streak of 3 consecutive titles at a Grand Slam event – in addition to his 3 consecutive titles here since 2018, he has won 3 consecutive Australian Open titles on 2 occasions, in 2011-13 and 2019-21.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **21st Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of 2nd place on the all-time list of most Grand Slam men's singles titles won, ahead of Federer. Nadal, who is bidding to win his 23rd Grand Slam title here, is at the top of the list. In addition to his 6 Wimbledon titles, Djokovic has won 9 Australian Open titles (2008, 2011-13, 2015-16, 2019-21), 3 US Open titles (2011, 2015, 2018) and 2 Roland Garros titles (2016, 2021).
- At 35 years 49 days, Djokovic is bidding to win his 9th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and claim sole ownership of the **record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era**, ahead of Nadal. (NB all ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **330th Grand Slam match-win**. He is 2nd on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles match-wins, behind Federer (369).
- In Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, falling to Nadal in 4 sets. He did not compete at the Australian Open.

- Djokovic's **best result in 2022** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He also finished runner-up at Belgrade (l. Andrey Rublev), reached the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Jiri Vesely) and Roland Garros.
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014-15, 2019 and 2021.
- Djokovic has a 9-1 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeat in a 5-set match here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (34-9) and has a 37-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Of Djokovic's **87 Tour-level singles titles**, 7 have come on grass – in addition to his 6 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 61 titles on hard courts and 17 titles on clay.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 373 weeks. He dropped to No. 3 in the rankings – his lowest position since October 2018 – on 13 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 42-13 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. He won all 4 singles matches he contested as Serbia reached the semifinals last year (l. Croatia). Serbia will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Canada and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Djokovic is coached by 2001 Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic.
- **KECMANOVIC** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Kecmanovic is bidding to become the **5th Serbian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Djokovic (13 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Slobodan Zivojinovic (4), and Janko Tipsarevic and Viktor Troicki (both 2).
- Kecmanovic advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating John Millman 63 26 63 64 in the 1st round on Monday and Alejandro Tabilo 76(4) 76(3) 36 63 in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Kecmanovic has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. He reached the 2nd round on his 2 previous appearances – in 2019 (d. Roberto Carballes Baena, l. Benoit Paire) and last year (d. Facundo Bagnis, l. Roberto Bautista Agut).
- Kecmanovic recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year, where he defeated Salvatore Caruso, Tommy Paul and Lorenzo Sonego before falling to Gael Monfils.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Kecmanovic reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros. He defeated Tomas Martin Etcheverry and Alexander Bublik before falling to Daniil Medvedev.
- Kecmanovic's **best result in 2022** is reaching the semifinals at Munich (l. Botic van de Zandschulp). He has reached the quarterfinals at 5 Tour-level events this year – as a qualifier at Rio de Janeiro (l. Francisco Cerundolo) and as a direct acceptance at Santiago (l. Tabilo), Indian Wells-1000 (l. Taylor Fritz), Miami-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and Belgrade (l. Djokovic).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Kecmanovic fell in the 1st round at both Halle (l. Oscar Otte) and Mallorca (l. Alex Molcan).
- Kecmanovic's **best Tour-level result on grass** is reaching the final at 2019 Antalya (l. Sonego).
- Kecmanovic is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time**. He has lost all 5 of his previous matches against Top 5 players, including his only previous match against a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam – against No. 2 Medvedev in the 3rd round at Roland Garros this year. The highest-ranked players he has defeated at Tour-level are No. 6 Alexander Zverev in the 2nd round at 2019 Cincinnati-1000 and No. 6 Matteo Berrettini in the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 26 Sonego in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year.

- Kecmanovic has lost the last 3 **five-set matches** he has contested, having not recorded a victory in a 5-set match since defeating Gianluca Mager in the 1st round at the 2020 US Open. He has a 2-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall and has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- Kecmanovic has **won one Tour-level title** – on clay at 2020 Kitzbuhel (d. Yannick Hanfmann).
- Kecmanovic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 30 two weeks ago and plays here at the same ranking.
- Kecmanovic is a **former junior world No. 1**. He became the first player to win back-to-back titles at the Orange Bowl since Billy Martin in 1973-74, winning the title in both 2015 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and 2016 (d. Wu Yibing). He also reached the final at the 2016 US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and was named ITF Junior World Champion that year. His best performance in the boys' singles at the Australian Open was reaching the 3rd round in 2016 (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux).
- Kecmanovic made his **Davis Cup** debut for Serbia at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals, falling to Kazakhstan's Mikhail Kukushkin in the only match he contested. Serbia will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Canada and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Kecmanovic is coached by David Nalbandian, who finished runner-up here in 2002, and Johan Ortegren.

- **ALCARAZ** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 7th Grand Slam overall.
- At 19 years 66 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2011**, when Bernard Tomic (18 years 255 days) reached the quarterfinals. He would also be the 3rd teenager to reach the round of 16 here since Tomic in 2011 – after Nick Kyrgios (19 years 70 days) in 2014 and Stefanos Tsitsipas (19 years 337 days) in 2018. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Alcaraz advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating Jan-Lennard Struff 46 75 46 76 64 in the 1st round on Monday and Tallon Griekspoor 64 76(0) 63 in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Alcaraz has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. He reached the 2nd round as a wild card on his Wimbledon debut last year, when he defeated Yasutaka Uchiyama in the first 5-set match of his career in the 1st round before falling to Daniil Medvedev in straight sets.
- Alcaraz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – at the 2021 US Open, where he retired due to an upper leg injury while trailing Felix Auger-Aliassime 63 31, and at Roland Garros this year (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Rafael Nadal won the title at 2005 Roland Garros aged 19 years 2 days. He would also become the 2nd-youngest man to win the Wimbledon title in the Open Era – after Boris Becker, who won the title here in 1985 aged 17 years 227 days and in 1986 aged 18 years 226 days. Alcaraz is the youngest man to begin the main draw at Wimbledon this year.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Alcaraz reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open, where he defeated Alejandro Tabilo and Dusan Lajovic before falling to Matteo Berrettini in 5 sets.
- Alcaraz's **best results in 2022** are winning the titles at Rio de Janeiro (d. Diego Schwartzman), Miami-1000 (d. Casper Ruud), Barcelona (d. Pablo Carreno Busta) and Madrid-1000 (d. Zverev). He is in joint-first place on the list for most Tour-level titles won in 2022, alongside Nadal, who has also won 4 Tour-level singles titles this year. He also reached the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Nadal).
- Alcaraz **did not contest a Tour-level grass court event prior to coming here** after withdrawing from Queen's due to an elbow injury. He is one of 15 players in the men's singles draw not to have played a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Alcaraz is contesting his **3rd grass court tournament as a professional** at Wimbledon this year, having made his professional grass court debut here in 2021. He contested 2 grass court events as a junior – reaching the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at both J1 Roehampton (l. Valentin Royer) and Wimbledon (l. Martin Damm) in 2019.

- Alcaraz's 5-set victory against Struff in the 1st round here improved his win-loss record in **5-set matches** to 5-1. He won the only other 5-set match he has contested here, against Uchiyama in the 1st round last year. His only defeat in a 5-set match came against Berrettini in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year.
- Alcaraz **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in April 2022. Aged 18 years 355 days, he became the youngest man to reach the Top 10 since Nadal (18 years 326 days) in April 2005. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 6 in May and plays here one place lower at No. 7.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals** in Budapest, defeating France in the final. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz made his **Davis Cup** debut in the Qualifiers this year, defeating Marius Copil during Spain's victory against Romania. He was named as a member of Spain's team for the 2021 Finals but was forced to withdraw from the squad prior to the Finals after testing positive for Covid-19. Spain will compete in Valencia alongside Canada, Serbia and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2007 and 2009.
- **OTTE** is contesting his 50th Tour-level match today.
- Otte is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time and become **the 2nd active German man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Alexander Zverev, who has reached the last 16 here in 2017 and 2021. He would become the 20th German man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era. (NB Philipp Kohlschreiber, who reached the round of 16 here in 2012, retired after losing in qualifying here last week)
- Otte advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating Peter Gojowczyk 61 62 61 in the 1st round on Monday and was leading Christian Harrison 3-1 when Harrison retired in the 2nd round on Wednesday. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Otte has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. He reached the 2nd round as a qualifier on his Wimbledon debut last year, when he defeated Arthur Rinderknech in 5 sets before falling to Andy Murray, also in 5 sets.
- Otte's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 as a qualifier at the US Open last year. He defeated Lorenzo Sonego, Denis Kudla and Andreas Seppi before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Otte reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Tseng Chun Hsin, l. Sonego) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Roberto Carballes Baena).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Otte reached the semifinals at both Stuttgart (l. Berrettini) and Halle (l. Daniil Medvedev). He is bidding to record his 9th Tour-level grass court match-win today. His only Tour-level match-win on grass prior to this year came in his 2nd round finish at Wimbledon last year.
- Otte's **other highlights in 2022** are reaching the semifinals at Munich (l. Holger Rune) and the quarterfinals at Belgrade (l. Fabio Fognini).
- Otte is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the first time**. He has lost all 6 of his previous matches against Top 10 players, including all 3 of his previous matches against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 16 Denis Shapovalov in the 2nd round at Stuttgart this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 23 Sonego in the 1st round at the US Open last year.
- Otte has won one of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only victory in a 5-set match coming against Rinderknech in the 1st round here last year.
- Otte broke the Top 100 for the first time in January this year, broke the Top 50 for the first time 2 weeks ago, and plays here at a **career-high ranking** of No. 36.
- Otte is coached by Peter Moraing.

NO. 9 CAMERON NORRIE (GBR) v STEVE JOHNSON (USA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Johnson is facing a British player at Wimbledon for the 2nd time – having contested his first match against a British player in the 2nd round here this year, defeating Ryan Peniston in straight sets. He has a 5-5 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall.

Johnson is also facing a lefthanded player for the 2nd straight round. He is bidding to extend a 5-match winning streak against lefthanders at the Grand Slams, having not lost a Grand Slam match to a lefthanded player since falling to Ruben Bemelmans in the 1st round here in 2018. He has an 8-3 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams and 29-16 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- Lefthander **NORRIE** is bidding to reach the last 16 of a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Norrie is bidding to become the **12th British man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – and the first since Andy Murray reached the round of 16 here for the 11th time in 2017. Murray is the only active British man to have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon.
- Norrie is also bidding to become the **19th British man to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam in the Open Era**. He would become the 4th active British man to reach the last 16 at a Grand Slam – after Murray (38 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), and Kyle Edmund and Daniel Evans (both 2).
- Norrie advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating Pablo Andujar 60 76(3) 63 in the 1st round on Monday and Jaume Munar 64 36 57 60 62 in the 2nd round on Wednesday. His victory against Munar was the **first 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon** and improved his win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall to 3-4.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Norrie has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He reached the 3rd round here for the first time last year when, as No. 29 seed, he defeated Lucas Pouille and Alex Bolt before falling to Roger Federer.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Norrie has also equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He has reached the 3rd round at a Grand Slam on 5 previous occasions – in addition to his 3rd round finish at Wimbledon last year, he also reached the 3rd round at the 2020 US Open (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina), the 2021 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and at Roland Garros in both 2021 (l. Nadal) and this year (l. Karen Khachanov).
- **Also in Grand Slam play this year**, Norrie fell to Sebastian Korda in straight sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Norrie's best results in 2022 are winning his **3rd and 4th Tour-level titles** at Delray Beach (d. Reilly Opelka) and Lyon (d. Alex Molcan) respectively. He also finished runner-up at Acapulco (l. Nadal) and reached the quarterfinals at Rotterdam (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime), Indian Wells-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and Barcelona (l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Norrie reached the quarterfinals at Eastbourne – where he received a bye through the 1st round, before defeating Brandon Nakashima in the 2nd round and falling to Maxime Cressy in the last 8. He also competed at Queen's where, as No. 3 seed, he fell to Grigor Dimitrov in the 1st round.

- Norrie's **best Tour-level result** on grass came at 2021 Queen's, where he finished runner-up to Matteo Berrettini.
- Vesely is one of **6 lefthanders** through to the 3rd round from the 22 who started the men's singles draw here this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Norrie is **one of 4 British players through to the 3rd round** here from the 17 who began the men's and women's singles draws at Wimbledon this year.
- Norrie reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 in April this year, becoming the 4th British man to break the Top 10 – after Greg Rusedski, Tim Henman and Andy Murray. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 12.
- Norrie played college tennis. He represented Texas Christian University and finished his college career in 2017 as the NCAA's top-ranked male player. He compiled a 77-20 win-loss record in singles in college tennis from 2014 to 2017.
- Norrie was a good junior, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 10 in March 2013. He fell in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles event here in 2013 (l. Laslo Djere).
- Norrie made his **Davis Cup** debut for Great Britain in 2018 and has a 4-3 win-loss record in the competition. Great Britain will compete in Glasgow alongside USA, Kazakhstan and Netherlands in Group D at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Norrie was born in Johannesburg but brought up in New Zealand by his British parents. At the age of 16, he switched his nationality from New Zealand to Great Britain.
- Norrie is coached by Facundo Lugones.
- **JOHNSON** is bidding to reach round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 39th Grand Slam overall.
- Johnson advanced to the 3rd round here when Grigor Dimitrov retired due to a left leg injury while leading 64 2-5 in their 1st round match on Tuesday, and after defeating wild card Ryan Peniston 63 62 64 in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- Johnson's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at 2016 Wimbledon, when he defeated Malek Jaziri, Jeremy Chardy and Dimitrov before falling to Roger Federer.
- **Last year here**, Johnson reached the 2nd round (d. Dennis Novak, l. Taylor Fritz).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Johnson reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Jordan Thompson, l. Jannik Sinner) and Roland Garros (d. Jiri Vesely, l. Gilles Simon).
- Johnson's **best Tour-level result in 2022** is reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at Indian Wells-1000, where he defeated Daniel Altmaier and Aslan Karatsev before falling to Hubert Hurkacz. He has reached the 2nd round a 6 other Tour-level events prior to Wimbledon this season.
- **Also in 2022**, Johnson reached the final at the Sarasota Challenger (USA) (l. Daniel Elahi Galan). His only other appearance at Challenger-level this season came at the Tallahassee Challenger (USA), where he fell to Zhang Zhizhen in the 1st round.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Johnson reached the 2nd round of qualifying at both Queen's (d. Stefan Kozlov, l. Paul Jubb) and Eastbourne (d. Jubb, l. Brandon Nakashima).
- Johnson is one of 8 American men to reach the 3rd round here from the 16 who began the main draw this year – **the highest number of American men to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam since the 1996 US Open**, when there were 8 American men in the 3rd round. It is the highest number of American men to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon since 1995, when there were 9 American men in the 3rd round.
- Johnson has **won 4 Tour-level titles** – including 2 on grass. He won grass court titles at both 2016 Nottingham (d. Pablo Cuevas) and 2018 Newport (d. Ramkumar Ramanathan). He is one of 10 players to begin this year's Wimbledon main draw to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass. His 2 other Tour-level titles came on clay at Houston in 2017 (d. Thomaz Bellucci) and 2018 (d. Tennys Sandgren).

- Grass is Johnson's **best surface**. It is the only surface on which he has a positive win-loss record. He has a 34-27 Tour-level win-loss record on grass – compared to 122-128 on hard courts and 33-34 on clay.
- Johnson is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all 17 matches he has contested against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, including all 4 of his previous matches against Top 20 players at Wimbledon. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 21 Dimitrov in the 2nd round here this year.
- Johnson has **won one of the last 11 matches he has contested against Top 20 players at Tour-level**. His only victory against a Top 20 player in that time came against No. 18 Alex de Minaur in the 2nd round at 2018 Washington. He has a 19-53 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Johnson has won 5 of the last 6 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming against Fritz in the 2nd round here last year. He has a 2-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 10-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Johnson reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 21 in July 2016. He plays here at No. 93.
- Johnson won the men's doubles bronze medal alongside Jack Sock at the Rio 2016 Olympic Tennis Event after the pair defeated Daniel Nestor/Vasek Pospisil in the play-off for 3rd place.
- Johnson played college tennis. He was 2011 NCAA singles champion and led USC to 4 consecutive NCAA team titles in 2009-12. He won his final 72 matches in college.
- Johnson is coached by Peter Smith and Marc Lucero.

- **SINNER** is bidding to reach the round of 16 for the 4th consecutive Grand Slam event – and for the 6th time at a Grand Slam overall. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 11th Grand Slam overall.
- At 20 years 328 days, Sinner is bidding to become the **youngest Italian man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era**. The youngest Italian man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era is Matteo Berrettini (23 years 93 days) in 2019. By reaching the 3rd round here, he became the youngest Italian man to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon since Daniele Bracciali (20 years 178 days) in 1998. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- Sinner advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating wild card Stan Wawrinka 75 46 63 62 in the 1st round on Monday and Mikael Ymer 64 63 57 62 in the 2nd round on Wednesday for his **first Tour-level match-wins on grass**.
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon main draw debut, Sinner fell to Marton Fucsovics in the 1st round. He also lost his opening match on his only appearance in qualifying here, falling to Alex Bolt in the 1st round of qualifying in 2019.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **youngest Grand Slam men's singles champion** since Novak Djokovic won the title at the 2008 Australian Open aged 20 years 250 days. He would also become the youngest man to win the Wimbledon title since Boris Becker (18 years 226 days) in 1986.
- Sinner's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Rafael Nadal) and at the Australian Open this year (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas). His quarterfinal finish at 2020 Roland Garros, aged 19 years 56 days, saw him become the youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at Roland Garros since Djokovic (19 years 20 days) in 2006 and the youngest man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since Bernard Tomic (18 years 255 days) at 2011 Wimbledon.
- **Also in Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros. He defeated Bjorn Fratangelo, Roberto Carballes Baena and Mackenzie McDonald before retiring due to a left knee injury during his last 16 match against Andrey Rublev.
- Sinner's **best results in 2022** are reaching the quarterfinals at 5 Tour-level events. In addition to his quarterfinal finish at the Australian Open, he also reached the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Hubert Hurkacz), Miami-1000, where he retired due to a foot blister while trailing Francisco Cerundolo 4-1, Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Rome-1000 (l. Tsitsipas).

- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Sinner competed at Eastbourne but, as No. 2 seed, lost his opening match to Tommy Paul.
- Sinner has won **more Tour-level matches from match point down in 2022** than any other player. He has won matches from match point down on 4 occasions this year – he saved 3 match points against Alejandro Davidovich Fokina at Dubai, 5 match points against Pablo Carreno Busta at Miami-1000, 3 match points against Emil Ruusuvuori at Miami-1000 and 3 match points against Tommy Paul at Madrid-1000.
- Sinner **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in November 2021 and, aged 20, became the youngest man to finish in the year-end Top 10 since Juan Martin del Potro in 2008. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 the same month, but plays here 4 places lower at No. 13.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2020 and has a 5-3 win-loss record in the competition. He won both singles matches he contested during Italy's 3-2 victory against Slovakia in the 2022 Qualifiers in March. Italy will compete in Bologna alongside Croatia, Argentina and Sweden in Group A at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi.
- **ISNER** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and his 54th Grand Slam overall.
- Isner is bidding to reach **the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 11th time**. He has a 10-20 win-loss record in Grand Slam 3rd round matches. He is in 6th place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam 3rd round by American men – but is in 19th place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by American men.
- Isner advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating qualifier Enzo Couacaud 67(6) 76(3) 46 63 75 in the 1st round on Monday and Andy Murray 64 76(4) 67(3) 64 in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- Isner has served 90 aces during his opening 2 matches here. He has served 13,724 aces in Tour-level matches during his career and is in **2nd place on the list for most Tour-level aces served** in ATP Tour history (since 1991). Ivo Karlovic is at the top of the list with 13,728 aces – just 4 ahead of Isner.
- **Last year here**, Isner fell to Yoshihito Nishioka in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Isner's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2018 (l. Kevin Anderson). By reaching the semifinals at a Grand Slam for the first time on his 41st appearance at a major, he went 2nd on the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching the semifinals at a Grand Slam – after Sam Querrey, who reached the semifinals at a major for the first time on his 42nd Grand Slam appearance at 2017 Wimbledon.
- Isner's 76(6) 67(5) 67(9) 64 26-24 defeat to Anderson in the 2018 semifinals – which lasted 6 hours 36 minutes – was the **2nd-longest singles match in Grand Slam history** and the 3rd-longest singles match overall. It was also the 2nd-longest match at Wimbledon – after Isner's 11 hour 5 minute victory against Nicolas Mahut here in 2010 – and the longest match ever contested on Centre Court.
- Isner's 64 36 67(7) 76(3) 70-68 1st round defeat of Mahut at 2010 Wimbledon, played over 3 days, set the record for the **longest tennis match in history** in terms of number of games and duration. The match lasted 11 hours 5 minutes and totalled 183 games. The final set alone lasted 8 hours 11 minutes. Isner served 113 aces during the match – the highest number of aces served in a men's singles match since Tour-level service statistics started being recorded in 1991.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Isner reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros – where he defeated Quentin Halys and Gregoire Barrere before falling to Benabe Zapata Miralles – but fell to Maxime Cressy in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open. His victory against Halys in the 1st round at Roland Garros ended a 4-match Grand Slam losing streak.
- Isner's **best result in 2022** is reaching the final at Houston (l. Reilly Opelka). He also reached the semifinals at Dallas (l. Opelka) and the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov). He contested a 46-point tiebreak – the longest in ATP Tour history (since 1990) – against Opelka at Dallas, losing the match 76(7) 76(22).

- Isner **did not contest a Tour-level grass court event prior to Wimbledon**. He is one of 16 players in the men's singles draw not to have played a grass court event prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Isner is one of 8 American men to reach the 3rd round here from the 16 who began the main draw this year – **the highest number of American men to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam since the 1996 US Open**, when there were 8 American men in the 3rd round. It is the highest number of American men to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon since 1995, when there were 9 American men in the 3rd round.
- Isner is also one of 5 seeded American men to reach the 3rd round here from the 6 who began the main draw this year – **the highest number of American seeds to begin the men's singles at Wimbledon since 1993**, when there were also 6 seeded American men here.
- Isner's 5-set victory against Couacaud in the 1st round here was his first victory in a **5-set match** since he defeated Milos Raonic in 5 sets in the round of 16 at the 2018 US Open. He has a 3-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 12-23 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Isner has won **16 Tour-level titles**, including 4 on grass – at Newport in 2011 (d. Oliver Rochus), 2012 (d. Lleyton Hewitt), 2017 (d. Matthew Ebden) and 2019 (d. Alexander Bublik). He holds the all-time record for the most singles titles won at Newport.
- Isner reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 8 in July 2018 after reaching the semifinals here. He plays here at No. 24.
- Isner is coached David MacPherson.

NO. 22 NIKOLOZ BASILASHVILI (GEO) v (WC) TIM VAN RIJTHOVEN (NED)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Basilashvili has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 104 Van Rijthoven on 3 occasions – against No. 118 Dominik Koepfer in the 3rd round at the 2019 US Open, No. 118 Andy Murray in the 1st round here last year, No. 113 Murray in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.

Basilashvili is facing a wild card at Wimbledon for the 3rd time. He defeated recovered from 0-2 down to defeat James Ward in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2019 but fell to Murray in the 1st round here last year. He has a 1-3 win-loss record against wild cards at the Grand Slams and a 13-13 win-loss record against wild cards at Tour-level overall.

- **BASILASHVILI** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Basilashvili advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating qualifier Lukas Rosol 67(4) 76(6) 36 63 63 in the 1st round on Monday and Quentin Halys 76(7) 06 75 76(5) in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Basilashvili has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 3rd round on his debut here as a qualifier in 2015, when he defeated Facundo Bagnis and Feliciano Lopez before falling to Roberto Batista Agut.
- Basilashvili's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the 2018 US Open, where he defeated Aljaz Bedene, Jack Sock and Guido Pella before falling to Rafael Nadal. He is the only Georgian man to have won a match at all 4 Grand Slams.
- **Last year here**, Basilashvili fell to Andy Murray in 4 sets in the 1st round.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Basilashvili reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Maxime Cressy, I. Mackenzie McDonald) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Murray).
- Basilashvili's **best result in 2022** is finishing runner-up at Doha (l. Bautista Agut). He had not won a match this year until defeating Elias Ymer in his opening match at Doha, after beginning the season with 6 consecutive defeats. His victories in the opening 2 rounds here are the 2nd time this season, other than his semifinal finish at Doha, where he has recorded back-to-back Tour-level match-wins.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Basilashvili reached the 2nd round at both Stuttgart (d. Lorenzo Musetti, I. Nick Kyrgios) and Halle (d. Andrey Rublev, I. Oscar Otte). He also attempted to qualify at Mallorca, but fell in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Mats Rosenkranz).
- Basilashvili's **best Tour-level result on grass** is reaching the semifinals as a qualifier at 2021 Halle (l. Rublev).
- Basilashvili has won all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – including his 5-set victory against Rosol in the 1st round here this year. He has an 8-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Basilashvili reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 16 in May 2019. He plays here at No. 26.

- Basilashvili is currently without a permanent coach.
- Wild card **VAN RIJTHOVEN** is bidding to become the 7th man since 2000 to reach the round of 16 on his Grand Slam debut – after Hyung-Taik Lee (2000 US Open), David Goffin (2012 Roland Garros), Juan Ignacio Londero (2019 Roland Garros), Daniel Altmaier (2020 Roland Garros), Aslan Karatsev (2021 Australian Open) and Lorenzo Musetti (2021 Roland Garros).
- Van Rijthoven is bidding to become the **11th wild card to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – and the first since Denis Kudla in 2015. The last wild card to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam was Jenson Brooksby at the 2021 US Open. (NB fellow wild card Liam Broady is also through to the 3rd round here this year)
- Van Rijthoven is bidding to become the **9th Dutchman to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – and the first since Sjeng Schalken in 2004. (NB fellow Dutchman Botic van de Zandschulp is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here this year)
- If Van Rijthoven and Van de Zandschulp both reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **first time that multiple Dutchmen have reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam since 2002 Wimbledon**, when Schalken and Richard Krajicek both reached the round of 16.
- Van Rijthoven advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating Federico Delbonis 76(7) 61 62 the 1st round on Monday and No. 15 seed Reilly Opelka 64 67(8) 76(7) 76(4) in the 2nd round on Wednesday for his **first Grand Slam match-wins**.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Van Rijthoven and Van de Zandschulp became the **first Dutchmen to reach the 3rd round here since Igor Sijsling in 2013**. They are the 16th and 17th Dutchmen to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era.
- With Van Rijthoven and Van de Zandschulp both reaching the 3rd round here this year, it is the **first time that 2 Dutchmen have reached the 3rd round at a Grand Slam since 2004 Roland Garros**, when Raemon Sluiter and Martin Verkerk both reached the 3rd round. It will be the first time that 2 Dutchmen have reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon since 2002, when both Richard Krajicek and Sjeng Schalken reached the 3rd round here.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Van Rijthoven reached the final round of qualifying at Roland Garros – where he defeated Emilio Gomez and Enzo Couacaud before falling to Norbert Gombos – and the 2nd round of qualifying at the Australian Open (d. Facundo Mena, l. Yannick Hanfmann). They are his only 2 appearances in qualifying at the Grand Slams.

- Tiafoe is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 4th time and become the **3rd active American man to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam on 4 or more occasions** – after John Isner (who is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 11th time today) and Sam Querrey (7 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances).
- Tiafoe advanced to the 3rd round after defeating qualifier Andrea Vavassori 64 64 64 in the 1st round on Monday and qualifier Maximilian Marterer 62 62 76(3) in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Tiafoe has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2018 and 2021, falling to Karen Khachanov on both occasions.
- Tiafoe's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at the 2019 Australian Open. He defeated 2 seeded players – No. 5 seed Kevin Anderson and No. 20 seed Grigor Dimitrov – before falling to Rafael Nadal in the last 8. Aged 21 years 7 days, he became the youngest American man to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal since Andy Roddick (20 years 310 days) at 2003 Wimbledon.

- Tiafoe is also one of 5 seeded American men to reach the 3rd round here from the 6 who began the main draw this year – the **highest number of American seeds to begin the men's singles at Wimbledon since 1993**, when there were also 6 seeded American men here.
- Tiafoe has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – to Khachanov in the 3rd round in 2018 and to Fabio Fognini in the 1st round in 2019. He has a 4-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Tiafoe reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 25 in May this year. He plays here 3 places lower at No. 28.
- Tiafoe had a **successful junior career**. Aged just 15, he won the 2013 Orange Bowl (d. Stefan Kozlov), becoming the youngest boys' singles winner in the event's history. - Bublik reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 30 in February this year. He plays here at No. 38.
- Bublik made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and he has a 9-3 win-loss record in the competition. He won both of his rubbers in Kazakhstan's 3-1 victory over Norway in the qualifiers this year, with one of them coming against Casper Ruud in the deciding set. - Paul **withdrew from Wimbledon last year** due to a foot injury. He competed in qualifying here on 2 occasions – reaching the final round of qualifying in 2019 (l. Vesely) but falling in the 1st round of qualifying in 2016 (l. Edward Corrie).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Paul has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the 3rd round at the 2020 Australian Open, where he defeated Leonardo Mayer and Grigor Dimitrov before falling to Marton Fucsovics.

- Vesely’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 2 occasions – in 2016 (l. Tomas Berdych) and 2018 (l. Rafael Nadal)
- **Last year here**, Vesely defeated Yannick Hanfmann in the 1st round before having to retire with a back injury in the 2nd set against Marton Fucsovics.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Vesely fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Stefan Kozlov) and Roland Garros (l. Steve Johnson).
- Vesely’s **best Tour-level result in 2022** is reaching the final as a qualifier at Dubai, where he defeated 3 Top 20 players (Roberto Bautista Agut, Novak Djokovic and Denis Shapovalov) before falling to Andrey Rublev in the final. He also reached the quarterfinals in Pune (l. Emil Ruusuvouri).

- Vesely is one of **6 lefthanders** through to the 3rd round from the 22 who started the men’s singles draw here this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Vesely is a **former Top 50 player**, having reached a career-high ranking of No. 35 in April 2015. He plays here at No. 68.
- Vesely was the **2011 ITF Junior World Champion**. He won the boys’ singles title at the 2011 Australian Open (d. Luke Saville) and finished runner-up at the 2011 Junior US Open (l. Oliver Golding). He finished runner-up in

the boys' doubles here in 2011 alongside Golding (l. George Morgan/Mate Pavic). His best result in the boys' singles at Wimbledon is reaching the 3rd round in both 2010 (l. Renzo Olivo) and 2011 (l. Liam Broady).

- Vesely has played **Davis Cup** for the Czech Republic since 2013 and has a 13-15 overall win-loss record in the competition. Czech Republic will travel to Israel for a World Group I tie in September.
- Vesely is coached by Jaroslav Navratil and Dusan Lojda.

- Lefthander **HUMBERT** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 15th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Humbert advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating Tomas Martin Etcheverry 63 36 46 63 64 in the 1st round on Monday and No. 3 seed Casper Ruud 36 62 75 64 in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- Humbert's victory against Etcheverry in the 1st round here **ended a 6-match Grand Slam losing streak**. He had not previously recorded a victory at the Grand Slams since he reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open, where he defeated Yasutaka Uchiyama before falling to Nick Kyrgios. He also fell to Kyrgios in the 1st round here last year.
- On his Wimbledon debut in 2019, Humbert recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the round of 16. He defeated Gael Monfils, Marcel Granollers and Felix Auger-Aliassime before falling to Novak Djokovic in the last 16.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Humbert fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Richard Gasquet) and Roland Garros (l. Emil Ruusuvuori).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Humbert reached the 2nd round on his title defence at Halle (d. Radu Albot, l. Hubert Hurkacz) but fell in the 1st round at Stuttgart (l. Arthur Rinderknech).
- Humbert is bidding to record his **8th Tour-level match-win of the 2022 season**. His only victories at Tour-level prior to Wimbledon this year have come at the ATP Cup, where he defeated Daniil Medvedev, and in 2nd round finishes at Miami-1000 (d. Aljaz Bedene, l. Aslan Karatsev), Barcelona (d. Pablo Andujar, l. Alex de Minaur), Lyon (d. Gregoire Barrere, l. De Minaur) and Halle.
- Humbert's **best grass court result** is winning the title at 2021 Halle (d. Andrey Rublev). He is one of 20 players competing at Wimbledon this year to have one at least one Tour-level title on grass. His 2 other Tour-level titles both came on hard courts – at 2020 Auckland (d. - Humbert is one of **6 lefthanders** through to the 3rd round from the 22 who started the men's singles draw here this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Humbert reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 25 in June last year. He dropped outside the Top 100 for the first time since December 2018 last week and plays here at No. 112.
- Humbert is coached by Nicolas Copin and Thierry Ascione.
- **GOFFIN** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 4th time. This is his 8th Wimbledon and his 38th Grand Slam overall.
- Goffin is bidding to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon for the 4th time and equal Xavier Malisse's **Open Era record for most appearances in the round of 16 at Wimbledon by a Belgian man**. Malisse reached the round of 16 here on 4 occasions – in 2002, 2004, 2011 and 2012.
- Goffin is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 13th time. He claimed sole ownership of the record for **most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Belgian man in the Open Era** by reaching the last 16 at a Grand Slam for the 10th time at Wimbledon in 2019 – moving ahead of Malisse, who reached the last 16 at the Grand Slams on 9 occasions.
- Goffin advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating qualifier Radu Albot 62 62 76(5) in the first round on Tuesday and No. 31 seed Sebastian Baez 61 62 64 in the 2nd round on Wednesday.
- Goffin's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 3 occasions, including once at Wimbledon – on his most-recent appearance here, in 2019, when he fell to Novak Djokovic. He also reached the quarterfinals at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Dominic Thiem) and at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Grigor Dimitrov). He withdrew from Wimbledon last year due to an ankle injury.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Goffin reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros – where he defeated Jiri Lehecka and Frances Tiafoe before falling to Hubert Hurkacz – but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Daniel Evans). His victories at Roland Garros ended a 6-match Grand Slam losing streak. He had previously not recorded a Grand Slam match-win since defeating Filip Krajinovic in the 3rd round at the 2020 US Open.
- Goffin's best result in 2022 is winning his **6th Tour-level title** at Marrakech, defeating Alex Molcan. He also reached the quarterfinals at Sydney (l. Andy Murray) and the 3rd round as a wild card at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina) and as a qualifier at Madrid-1000 (l. Rafael Nadal).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Goffin fell to Daniil Medvedev in the 1st round at Halle. His victories in the opening 2 rounds here were his first grass court victories since he defeated Fernando Verdasco in the round of 16 here in 2019.
- Goffin has reached **2 Tour-level finals on grass** – at 2015 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Nicolas Mahut) and 2019 Halle (l. Roger Federer).
- Goffin has **won all 5 matches he has contested against lefthanded players at Wimbledon**. He has an 8-5 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams and a 50-31 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.
- Goffin has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he fell to Milos Raonic in the round of 16 here in 2016 but defeated Medvedev in the 3rd round here in 2019. He has a 13-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Goffin became the **first Belgian man to break the Top 10** in February 2017. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 7 in November 2017. His dropped to No. 74 in April this year – his lowest ranking since July 2014, when he was ranked No. 78 – but plays here at No. 58.
- Goffin has played **Davis Cup** for Belgium since 2012 and has a 26-8 overall win-loss record in the competition. He has helped Belgium reach 2 Davis Cup Finals, losing to Great Britain in 2015 and France in 2017. Belgium will compete in Hamburg alongside France, Germany and Australia in Group C at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Goffin is coached by Germain Gigounon.

Head-to-head: first meeting

Cressy and Sock are 2 of the 13 American men to reach the 2nd round here from the 16 who began the main draw this year – the highest number of American men to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon since 1995, when there were 16 American men in the 2nd round here.

This is the first all-American meeting in the men's singles at Wimbledon this year. It is the 389th all-American men's singles match at Wimbledon in the Open Era and the 1,427th all-American men's singles match at the Grand Slams in the Open Era.

Cressy won his only previous match against an American player at the Grand Slams – defeating John Isner in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year – and has a 4-2 win-loss record against fellow Americans at Tour-level overall.

Sock has won 4 of the 5 matches he has played against American players at the Grand Slams – with his only defeat to an American at a Grand Slam coming against Andy Roddick in the 2nd round at the 2011 US Open. He has a 24-21 win-loss record against fellow Americans at Tour-level overall.

Cressy won his only previous Grand Slam match against a qualifier, defeating Tomas Machac in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year. He has a 2-4 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall – and has lost all 4 of his matches against qualifiers since defeating Machac.

- **CRESSY** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 6th Grand Slam overall.
- Cressy advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating No. 6 seed Felix Auger-Aliassime 67(5) 64 76(9) 76(5) for his **first Wimbledon match-win** in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, Cressy reached the final round of qualifying, defeating Thanasi Kokkinakis and Marc-Andrea Huesler before falling to Mackenzie McDonald in 5 sets. It is his only appearance in Wimbledon qualifying.
- Cressy's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year. He defeated John Isner, Tomas Machac and Christopher O'Connell before falling to Daniil Medvedev.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Cressy fell to Nikoloz Basilashvili in the 1st round at Roland Garros. It was the only occasion he has lost in the 1st round in his 5 previous Grand Slam appearances.
- Cressy's best results in 2022 are reaching his **first 2 Tour-level finals** – as a qualifier on hard courts at Melbourne (l. Rafael Nadal) and as a direct acceptance on grass at Eastbourne last week (l. Taylor Fritz). He also reached the quarterfinals at Sydney (l. Daniel Evans).
- **Elsewhere on grass this season**, Cressy fell in the 1st round at Stuttgart (l. Dominic Stricker) and as a qualifier at Halle (l. Hubert Hurkacz).

- Cressy is bidding to record his **8th Tour-level match-win on grass**. He recorded 4 victories to reach the final at Eastbourne last week – with his only other Tour-level victories on grass prior to Wimbledon this year coming in a quarterfinal finish at 2021 Newport, where he defeated Paolo Lorenzi and Sam Querrey before falling to Jordan Thompson.
- Cressy has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level. He recorded 5-set victories against Carreno Busta in the 1st round at the 2021 US Open and against Isner in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year, but fell to Basilashvili in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year despite leading 2-0 and having a match point. He also contested a 5-set match in the final round of qualifying here last year, falling to McDonald in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- Cressy **broke the Top 50 for the first time** on Monday and plays here at a career-high ranking of No. 45.
- Cressy **played college tennis**, representing UCLA in 2016-19. He was unbeaten in doubles in 2019, finishing his senior season ranked No. 1 in doubles nationally, and received All-American honours in both singles and doubles.
- Cressy has represented USA since December 2018, having previously represented France.
- Cressy is coached by Romain Sichez and Armand D'Harcourt.
- Qualifier **SOCK** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 30th Grand Slam overall.
- Sock advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating qualifier Bernabe Zapata Miralles 76(6) 64 64 for his **first Wimbledon match-win since 2017** in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- As No. 14 seed, Sock defeated Andrea Collarini (ARG) 64 62, Constant Lestienne (FRA) 63 75 and No. 21 seed Hugo Grenier (FRA) 75 75 64 in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying**. It was his first appearance in qualifying here since 2013.
- Sock is making his **first Wimbledon appearance** since 2018, when he fell to Matteo Berrettini in the 1st round.
- Sock's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round in 2016 – as No. 27 seed, he defeated Ernests Gulbis and Robin Haase before falling to Milos Raonic.
- Sock's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Rafael Nadal) and at the 2016 US Open (l. Jo-Wilfried Tsonga).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Sock fell to Daniel Masur in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros. He did not compete in qualifying at the Australian Open.
- Sock is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win of 2022**. Prior to Wimbledon, his only Tour-level match-wins this season came in 2nd round finishes as a wild card at Dallas (d. Oscar Otto, l. Taylor Fritz), Delray Beach (d. Daniel Altmaier, l. Reilly Opelka) and Indian Wells-1000 (d. Juan Manuel Cerundolo, l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Sock reached the final at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (l. Zizou Bergs) and the semifinals at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (l. Daniel Evans).
- Also in 2022, Sock **won his 4th career Challenger title** at Savannah (USA) (d. Christian Harrison). His other highlights at Challenger-level this year are reaching the quarterfinals at the Columbus Challenger (USA) (l. Dominic Stricker) and the Sarasota Challenger (USA) (l. Denis Kudla).
- Sock's **best Tour-level results on grass** are reaching the semifinals at Newport in both 2014 (l. Lleyton Hewitt) and 2015 (l. Ivo Karlovic).
- Sock lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – falling to Sebastian Ofner in the 2nd round in 2017 and to Berrettini in the 1st round in 2018. He has a 6-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Sock is a **former Top 10 player**, having reached a career-high ranking of No. 8 in November 2017. He dropped outside the Top 100 in October 2018 and was unranked between October 2019 and February 2020. He plays here at No. 103.
- Sock **won the US Open boys' singles title** as a wild card in 2010 (d. Kudla). He contested just 5 events during his junior career and never competed in the junior tournament at Wimbledon.

- Sock is coached by Robby Ginepri, who reached the round of 16 here in 2004.
