



2022 WIMBLEDON THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Junior Tournament Preview

In 1947, the first junior singles events were held at Wimbledon, with Denmark's Kurt Nielsen and Belgium's Genieve Domken winning the inaugural tournaments. The boys' doubles and girls' doubles events were introduced in 1982. This is the 75th edition of the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here, and the 39th editions of both the boys' doubles and girls' doubles tournaments.

2022 Wimbledon sees the 135th staging of The Championships, which began in 1877. This is the first year since 2019 that all 4 junior Grand Slam events have taken place. Wimbledon was cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020 and Junior Wimbledon was played as the 2nd Grand Slam event of 2021 after the Australian Open junior event was not played last year.

DEBRU BIDS FOR PARIS-LONDON DOUBLE

France's Gabriel Debru is bidding to become the 11th player to win the boys' singles title at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon – after Butch Buchholz (1958), Nicky Kalogeropoulos (1963), Vladimir Korotkov (1966), Heinz Guenthardt (1976), Ivan Lendl (1978), Ramesh Krishnan (1979), Stefan Edberg (1983), Nicolas Pereira (1988), Gael Monfils (2004) and Tseng Chun Hsin (2018).

Roland Garros girls' singles champion Lucie Havlickova is not competing at Wimbledon. Seven players have won the girls' singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon – most recently Belinda Bencic in 2013.

JUNIOR GRAND SLAM CHAMPIONS IN DRAW

Debru is the only Grand Slam singles champion contesting either the Wimbledon boys' singles or girls' singles event this year. Roland Garros girls' champion Havlickova, as well as the 2022 Australian Open junior champions – Bruno Kuzuhara and Petra Marcinko – are contesting events at professional-level this month instead of competing here.

Three other players in the boys' singles draw here have tasted Grand Slam success – Edas Butvilas (who won the boys' doubles title here in 2021 and the boys' doubles title at Roland Garros earlier this month), Coleman Wong (who won the boys' doubles titles at the 2021 US Open and at the Australian Open this year) and Mili Poljicak (who won the boys' doubles title alongside Butvilas at Roland Garros this year).

AT THE DOUBLE

The last player to win both junior singles and doubles titles at Wimbledon in the same year was Eugenie Bouchard, who won the girls' singles title and girls' doubles title (alongside Taylor Townsend) in 2012. The last player to win both boys' singles and boys' doubles titles at Wimbledon is Florin Mergea, who won the singles title and the doubles title (alongside Horia Tecau) in 2003.

HOME CHAMPIONS

In 2008, Laura Robson became the first British player to win a junior singles title at Wimbledon since Annabel Croft in 1984. Wimbledon has seen the longest wait for a home player to win the boys' singles title of the 4 Grand Slams – Stanley Matthews was the most-recent British boys' singles champion at Wimbledon – Matthews won the boys' title here 59 years ago in 1962.

In total, there have been 6 British boys' singles champions and 7 British girls' singles champions (including 2-time champion Lorna Cornell) at Wimbledon since the competitions were established in 1947.

2021 CHAMPIONS CONTINUE DEVELOPMENT

The 2021 Wimbledon junior champions, USA's Samir Banerjee and Spain's Ane Mintegi del Olmo, have both enjoyed success at professional level since winning the boys' and girls' titles here last year.

Banerjee ended his junior career after competing at JA Plantation (also known as the Orange Bowl) in December last year. He has contested 3 professional events this season, with his best result coming in a quarterfinal finish at M15 Raanana (ISR) last week (l. Adrian Bodmer). He will play college tennis at Stanford University, beginning this academic year.

Mintegi del Olmo continued the momentum from her Wimbledon girls' singles title last year with her first appearance in a W60 final, finishing runner-up at W60 Vitoria-Gasteiz (ESP) (l. Rebeka Masarova) the following week. She also reached the quarterfinals as a wild card at the WTA125 event in Montevideo in November (l. Diane Parry). She underwent elbow surgery earlier this year and intends to return to the tour in August.

WIMBLEDON QUALIFYING

Four British players in the girls' singles draw here competed as wild cards in women's singles qualifying this year, with all 4 losing in the 1st round – Ella McDonald (l. Coco Vandeweghe), Talia Neilson-Gatenby (l. Jamie Loeb), Ranah Akua Stoiber (l. Katarina Zavatska) and Mingge Xu (l. Hanna Chang).

Just one player in the boys' singles draw here contest men's singles qualifying. Luca Pow also competed as a wild card but fell to Mitchell Krueger in the 1st round.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are British wildcards Benjamin Gusic Wan (14 years 231 days) and Hannah Klugman (13 years 132 days), respectively.

The oldest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Thailand's Tanapatt Nirundorn (18 years 181 days) and Bulgaria's Denislava Glushkova (18 years 183 days), respectively.

In the boys' draw there is 1 fourteen-year-old, 2 fifteen-year-olds, 12 sixteen-year-olds, 29 seventeen-year-olds and 20 eighteen-year-olds. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

In the girls' draw there are 1 thirteen-year-old, 2 fourteen-year-olds, 6 fifteen-year-olds, 19 sixteen-year-olds, 20 seventeen-year-olds and 16 eighteen-year-olds. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

WILD CARDS

British players received all of the 8 available wild cards in the girls' singles draw: Jasmine Conway, Hannah Klugman, Isabelle Lacy, Ella McDonald, Talia Neilson-Gatenby, Hephzibah Oluwadare, Sarah Tatu and Mingge Xu.

Home players also received all 8 wild card entries in the boys' singles draw: Louis Bowden, Patrick Brady, Viktor Frydrych, Benjamin Gusic Wan, William Jansen, Luca Pow, Henry Searle and Phoenix Weir.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

The Wimbledon junior tournament is the 6th Grade A event of the 2022 season. Havlickova is the only player to win multiple girls' singles titles at Grade A-level this year. USA's Nishesh Basavareddy is the only player to have won multiple boys' singles titles at Grade A events this season and is the No. 5 seed here.

GRASS COURT CHAMPIONS

The Grade 1 tournament at Nottingham returned to the schedule in 2022, giving players 2 weeks of grass court events prior to Wimbledon. J1 Roehampton was the only junior grass court event to take place during the 2021 season. Spain's Martin Landaluce enjoyed an unbeaten fortnight to win both tournaments, while Australia's Taylah Preston and USA's Liv Hovde claimed the girls' singles titles at J1 Nottingham and J1 Roehampton, respectively.

PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS

Bor Artnak is the only player competing in the boys' singles at Wimbledon this year to have won a professional-level singles title. Three players in the girls' singles here have also won a title at an ITF World Tennis Tour women's event.

Landaluce is bidding to extend his grass court winning streak, having recorded a Tour-leading 11 victories on grass at Grade 1-level and above this season. J1 Nottingham champion Preston leads the Tour for most girls' singles matches won on grass prior to Wimbledon this year.

FUTURE GREATNESS

2011 girls' singles champion Ashleigh Barty became the 4th player to win both the junior singles title and the women's singles titles at Wimbledon, with her victory here last year. There have also been 4 players who have won the boys' singles title and the men's singles title here – most recently 1998 boys' singles champion Roger Federer, who went on to win 8 men's singles titles here.
