A major breakthrough for Tsitsipas...

Stefanos Tsitsipas is bidding to win his first Grand Slam title in his 2nd appearance in a Grand Slam final. He would become the first Greek player to win a Grand Slam title, as well as becoming the 58th Grand Slam men's singles champion in the Open Era and the 153rd in history.

... or a record-equalling 22nd Grand Slam title for Djokovic?

Victory for Novak Djokovic will see him equal Rafael Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles. He would become the 5th player to win 22 Grand Slam singles titles, after Margaret Court (24 Grand Slam titles), Serena Williams (23), and Steffi Graf and Nadal (both 22). He is also bidding to win a record-extending 10th Australian Open men's singles title.

Prize money

Today's champion receives \$2,975,000 (AUD) in prize money, while the runner-up collects \$1,625,000. In total, the men's singles prize fund for the men's singles at the 2023 Australian Open is \$26,907,000 (AUD).

Battle for No. 1

For the 2nd consecutive Grand Slam men's singles final, the winner is guaranteed to become world No. 1 when the new rankings are published on Monday. Tsitsipas will become the 29th player to be ranked No. 1 since the introduction of the ATP rankings in 1973 if he wins tonight. Djokovic will begin his 374th week as world No. 1 if he wins tonight, extending his record for most weeks as world No. 1.

The loser this evening will be ranked at No. 3 on Monday – for Tsitsipas, this would equal his career-high ranking; for Djokovic, this would be his highest ranking since June last year. Current world No. 1 Carlos Alcaraz will drop to No. 2 tomorrow regardless of the outcome of tonight's match.

No. 3 v No. 4

This is the 11th time in the Open Era that the No. 3 and No. 4 seeds have met in a men's singles final at a Grand Slam. Finals between No. 3 and No. 4 seeds are evenly split, with 5 wins apiece. This is the 3rd time in the Open Era that the No. 3 and No. 4 seeds have met in the Australian Open men's singles final – after 1988, when No. 3 Mats Wilander defeated No. 4 Pat Cash, and 2005, when No. 4 Marat Safin defeated No. 3 Lleyton Hewitt.

The Djokovic-Nadal duopoly

Between them, Djokovic and Nadal have won 15 of the last 18 Grand Slam titles (since 2018 Roland Garros), with US Open champions Dominic Thiem (2020), Daniil Medvedev (2021) and Alcaraz (2022) the only other players to have won major titles in that time. Djokovic has won 9 Grand Slam titles in that time, with Nadal claiming 6 Grand Slam titles.

Closing in on a first title

Nine active male singles players have won Grand Slam titles – Nadal (22 Grand Slam titles), Djokovic (21), Andy Murray and Stan Wawrinka (both 3), and Alcaraz, Marin Cilic, Juan Martin del Potro, Medvedev, Dominic Thiem (all one). Tsitsipas is one of 7 active players to have reached a Grand Slam men's singles final but who are yet to win their first Grand Slam titles.

If he wins today, Tsitsipas will become the 12th man in the Open Era to win his first Grand Slam at the Australian Open – and the first since Wawrinka won his first Grand Slam title here in 2014.

Decades apart

With Djokovic (35 years 252 days) and Tsitsipas (24 years 170 days) contesting the final here this year, this match represents the largest age gap between players in an Australian Open men's singles final in the Open Era. It is the joint-6th largest age gap between players in a Grand Slam men's singles final in the Open Era, alongside Djokovic and Tsitsipas' previous meeting in a Grand Slam final at 2021 Roland Garros.

Djokovic is bidding to become the 3rd-oldest man in the Open Era to win the Australian Open title – after Ken Rosewall (who won the title here in 1971 aged 36 years 73 days and won the title here in 1972 aged 37 years 72 days) and Roger Federer (who won the title here in 2018 aged 36 years 173 days). By reaching the final here this year, he has become the 5th man in the Open Era to reach the Australian Open final aged 35 or older, after Rosewall, Federer, Nadal and Mal Anderson.

Meanwhile, Tsitsipas is bidding to become the youngest man to win the Australian Open title since 2011 – when Djokovic (23 years 253 days) defeated Murray (23 years 260 days). By reaching the final here this year, he has become the youngest man to reach the Australian Open final since Djokovic and Murray in 2011.

Australian Open final appearances

By reaching the final here for a 10th time, Djokovic has extended his all-time record for most Australian Open men's singles final appearances. He has also closed the gap on Court at the top of the list for most Australian Open finals reached among men and women.

By reaching his first final here, Tsitsipas has become the 8th active player to reach an Australian Open men's singles final. Tsitsipas is the 55th man in the Open Era – and the 104th in history – to reach the final here.

This is the 13th meeting for Tsitsipas and Djokovic, their 8th meeting on a hard court and their 3rd meeting at a Grand Slam. Djokovic is bidding to extend a 9-match winning streak against Tsitsipas, with Tsitsipas having not recorded a victory against Djokovic since October 2019, when he won their quarterfinal match at Shanghai-1000.

This is the pair's 6th meeting in a Tour-level final and their 2nd meeting in a Grand Slam final. Djokovic has won all 5 of their previous meetings in finals, including in their only previous meeting in a Grand Slam final, when he recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets at 2021 Roland Garros.

Tsitsipas is bidding to defeat a Top 5 player at the Australian Open for the 3rd time. He has a 2-3 win-loss record against Top 5 players here – having defeated No. 3 Roger Federer in the round of 16 in 2019 and No. 2 Rafael Nadal in the quarterfinals in 2021. He has a 3-5 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams and a 14-26 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

Djokovic is bidding to extend a 16-match winning streak against Top 5 players at the Australian Open. He lost his first 2 matches against Top 5 players here – falling to No. 4 Marat Safin in the 1st round in 2005 and to No. 1 Federer in the round of 16 in 2007 – but has won all 16 matches he has played against Top 5 players here since then. He has a 35-23 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams and a 114-74 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

- **TSITSIPAS** is bidding to become the first Greek player in history to win a Grand Slam title.
- At 24 years 170 days, Tsitsipas is bidding to become the **youngest man to win the Australian Open title since 2011** – when Djokovic (23 years 253 days) defeated Andy Murray (23 years 260 days). By reaching the final here this year, he has become the youngest man to reach the Australian Open final since Djokovic and Murray in 2011.
- Tsitsipas is bidding to record his **50th Grand Slam match-win**. He would become the 24th active male player to record 50 match-wins at the Grand Slams.
- The Australian Open is Tsitsipas' **most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won and his joint-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of finals reached, alongside Roland Garros. This is his 6th Australian Open appearance and his 22nd Grand Slam overall.

- Tsitsipas is contesting his **2nd Grand Slam final**. He reached his first Grand Slam final at Roland Garros last year, falling to Djokovic in 5 sets in the final despite holding a 2-0 lead. He became the first Greek player in history to reach a Grand Slam final and, at 22 years 305 days, also became the youngest Grand Slam finalist since Andy Murray (22 years 261 days) at the 2010 Australian Open.
- By reaching his 2nd Grand Slam final, Tsitsipas has become the **10th active male player to reach multiple Grand Slam finals** – after Djokovic (who is contesting his 33rd Grand Slam final tonight), Rafael Nadal (30 Grand Slam final appearances), Murray (11), Daniil Medvedev, Dominic Thiem and Stan Wawrinka (all 4), Marin Cilic (3), and Juan Martin del Potro and Casper Ruud (both 2).
- By reaching the final here, Tsitsipas has recorded his **best Australian Open result**. His previous best result here was reaching the semifinals here on 3 occasions – in 2019 (l. Nadal), 2021 (l. Medvedev) and 2022 (l. Medvedev).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Tsitsipas reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Holger Rune) and the 3rd round at Wimbledon (l. Nick Kyrgios) but fell in the 1st round at the US Open (l. Daniel Elahi Galan).
- Tsitsipas' **best results in 2022** were winning the titles at Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina) and Mallorca (d. Roberto Bautista Agut). He also finished runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime), Rome-1000 (l. Djokovic), Cincinnati-1000 (l. Borna Coric), Astana (l. Djokovic) and Stockholm (l. Rune). He reached the semifinals at Acapulco (l. Cameron Norrie), Madrid-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Paris-1000 (l. Djokovic).
- Tsitsipas recorded **more Tour-level match-wins than any other player in 2022**. He ended the season with a 61-24 Tour-level win-loss record, ahead of Auger-Aliassime (60-27) and Carlos Alcaraz (57-13).

- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Tsitsipas represented Greece at the United Cup. He won all 4 singles matches he contested as the team reached the semifinals, defeating Bulgaria's Grigor Dimitrov, Belgium's David Goffin, Croatia's Borna Coric and Italy's Matteo Berrettini.
- Tsitsipas has won all 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open – including his victory against Jannik Sinner in the round of 16 this year. His 5-set victory against Nadal in the quarterfinals in 2021, in which he recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets, saw him become the 3rd player to record a successful comeback from 0-2 down against Nadal after Federer and Fabio Fognini. He has a 9-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Tsitsipas reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in August in 2021. He plays here one place lower at No. 4 but is guaranteed to rise to at least No. 3 in the new rankings on Monday. He will become world No. 1 for the first time if he wins tonight.
- Tsitsipas is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles here in 2015 (l. Jurabek Karimov) and 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur). His best result at a junior Grand Slam was reaching the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2016 Wimbledon (l. Shapovalov) and at the 2016 US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Tsitsipas made his **Davis Cup** debut in September 2019 and has won all 8 singles matches he has contested in the competition since then. Greece will play at home to Ecuador in the 2023 World Group I Play-offs next week.
- Tsitsipas is coached by his father, Apostolos Tsitsipas.
- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to win his 10th Australian Open title and extend his all-time record for most men's singles titles here. This is his 18th Australian Open appearance.

- At 35 years 252 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **3rd-oldest man in the Open Era to win the Australian Open title** – after Ken Rosewall (who won 2 titles here aged older than Djokovic is now) and Roger Federer (who won the title here in 2018 aged older than Djokovic is now). By reaching the final here, he has become the 5th man in the Open Era to reach the Australian Open final aged 35 or older, after Rosewall, Federer, Nadal and Mal Anderson.

- Djokovic is bidding to win his **4th Australian Open title since turning 30**. By winning 3 titles here in 2019-21, he became the first man in the Open Era to win 3 Australian Open titles aged 30 or older.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his 10th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his **Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won after turning 30**. By reaching his 12th Grand Slam final since turning 30, he has extended his Open Era record for most Grand Slam final appearances after turning 30.

- Djokovic is bidding to win his **93rd Tour-level title** here and claim sole ownership of 4th place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won, ahead of Nadal.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his **28th consecutive match-win at the Australian Open**. He claimed sole ownership of the Open Era record for longest streak of Australian Open men's singles match-wins – ahead of Andre Agassi's streak of 26 match-wins here in 2000-04 – by defeating Tommy Paul in the semifinals on Friday. He has not lost here since falling to Chung Hyeon in the round of 16 in 2018.

- Djokovic has also **won the last 40 matches he has contested in Australia** – having not lost a match in Australia since falling to Chung in the round of 16 here in 2018. In addition to his 27 consecutive match-wins at the Australian Open, he recorded 8 match-wins at the ATP Cup in 2020-21 and 5 match-wins at Adelaide I this year.
- The Australian Open is Djokovic's **most successful Grand Slam event in terms** of titles won, matches won and finals reached.

- By reaching his **10th Australian Open final**, Djokovic has extended his all-time record for most Australian Open men's singles finals reached, ahead of Federer, John Bromwich, Jack Crawford and Roy Emerson (who all reached 7 finals here).
- By reaching his **33rd Grand Slam final**, Djokovic has extended his all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached, ahead of Federer (31 Grand Slam final appearances) and Nadal (30).
- By reaching his 33rd Grand Slam final, Djokovic has equalled Serena Williams in **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam singles finals reached**. Chris Evert (34 Grand Slam final appearances) is the only player to have reached more Grand Slam singles finals than Djokovic.
- **At the Grand Slams in 2022**, Djokovic won his 21st Grand Slam title at Wimbledon (d. Nick Kyrgios), claiming sole ownership of 2nd place on the list for most Grand Slam men's singles titles, ahead of Federer. Elsewhere at the Grand Slams, he reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Nadal) but did not compete at the Australian Open or US Open.
- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2022** were winning the titles at Rome-1000 (d. Tsitsipas), Tel Aviv (d. Marin Cilic), Astana (d. Tsitsipas) and the ATP Finals (d. Casper Ruud). With a total of 5 titles, he jointly led the Tour for most titles won in 2022, alongside Carlos Alcaraz. He also finished runner-up at Belgrade (l. Andrey Rublev) and Paris-1000 (l. Holger Rune) and reached the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Alcaraz).
- Prior to the Australian Open, Djokovic **won his 92nd Tour-level title** at Adelaide I (d. Sebastian Korda), equalling Nadal in 4th place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won. It is the first time he has won a title prior to the Australian Open since 2017, when he won the title at Doha (d. Murray) in the first week of the season.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked at No. 1**, having spent 373 weeks as world No. 1. He dropped to No. 8 in November last year – his lowest ranking since August 2018, when he was ranked at No. 10 – but plays here at No. 5. He is guaranteed to rise to at least No. 3 on Monday and will rise to No. 1 if he wins the title here.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, and was a member of the team which defeated France in the 2010 final to win the nation's first Davis Cup title. He has a 38-7 win-loss record in Davis Cup singles matches and a 42-13 win-loss record in the competition overall. Serbia will play away against Norway in the 2023 Davis Cup Qualifiers in February.
- Djokovic is coached by Goran Ivanisevic, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1989, 1994 and 1997.
